Speakers Bureau and Films Tell League Story

Nearly 80, a fragile, determined and courageous woman has given the bulk of her life to the realization of an idea.

Margaret Sanger, one of a family of 11, was born to an economically insecure father and a tubercular mother. After the death of her mother, and a dreary childhood burdened with adult responsibility the conviction began to grow in her young heart that she wanted to be of service to mankind.

Through her experiences as a trained nurse, with lower-income groups of New York's east side, she saw the need for family planning as a solution to many of man's problems.

Renouncing her career as a nurse, she decided to pursue studies in planned parenthood. Subject to ridicule, abuse and the threat of a government lawsuit, she traveled to Europe in 1914 for a world study on the matter. In Holland she visited clinics that were offering information to the public on family-size control.

What she learned on the continent convinced her to continue her crusade. Among her most vigorous opponents on her return to America, were the anti-vice leagues, those who based their objections on religious grounds, and the Socialist Party. The latter felt to condone Mrs. Sanger's position might conceivably take the edge off poverty, make labor less dissatisfied with its lot and hence less revolutionary.

Her program, as she envisioned it, was not merely one of health, but one taking into account the economic and social aspects as well. Now, after a half century of battling ignorance and prejudice the Planned Parenthood League has become a program of world-wide scope with approval from domestic and foreign governments and the support of many church denominations also.

The same Sanger spirit of dedication can be found at the two area League Centers, as the growing number of Plymouth patients have found. Their clinics, staffed by a doctor, nurse, marriage counselor and trained volunteers,

offer three weekly evening sessions at their Ann Arbor Headquarters, 201 E. Liberty St., and Ypsilanti, 38 1/2 E. Michigan.

Having adopted the slogan "Every Child A Wanted Child", they also advise childless couples who want children.

Program chairmen of women's clubs may be interested to learn that the Planned Parenthood League has available to groups a Speakers Bureau and films available to groups.

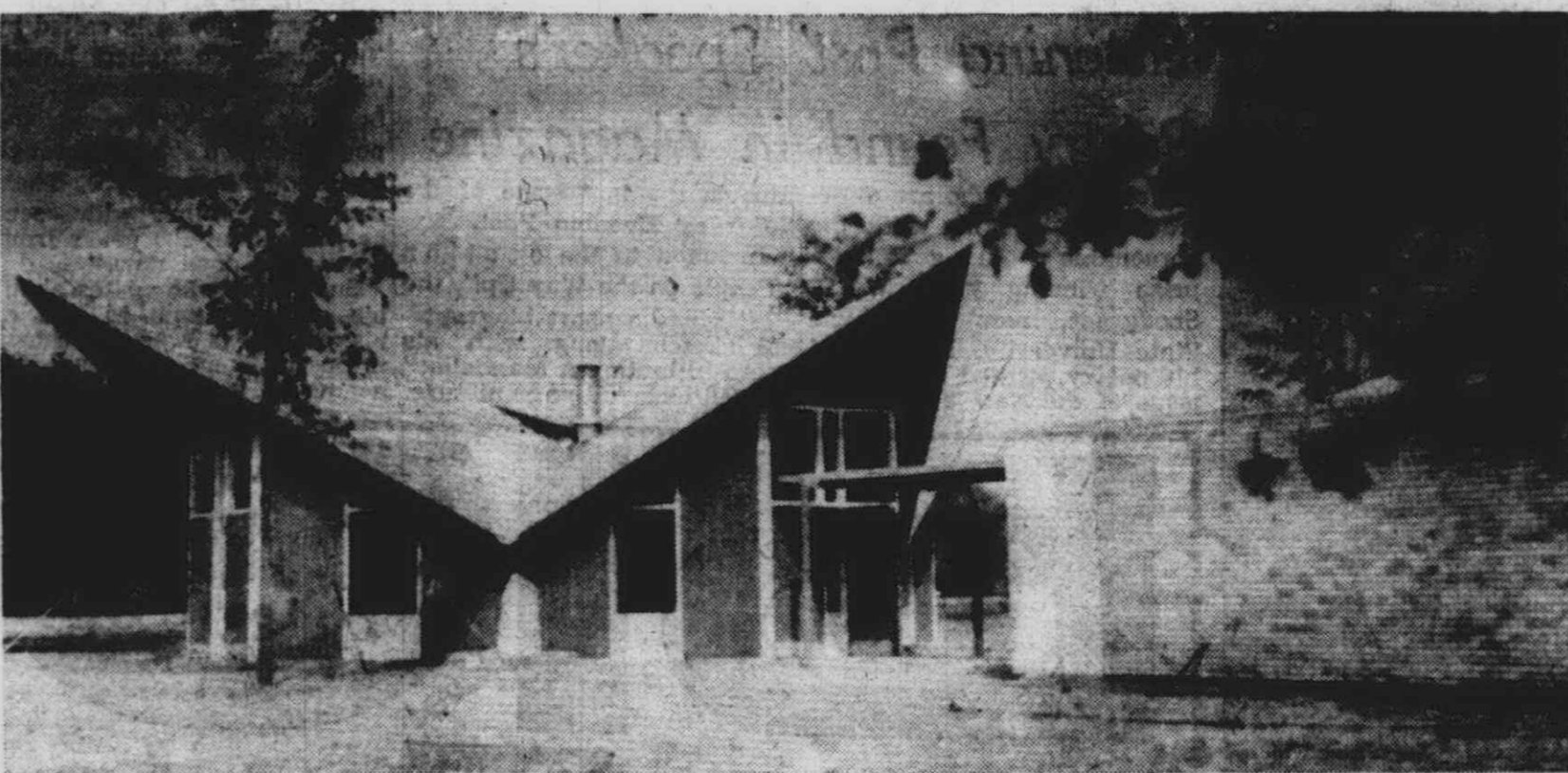

# CD People Battle 'Tornado'

A tornado struck Plymouth last Wednesday night — but very few people knew it. It was a Civil Defense test exercise to try-out the effectiveness of the communications system — and an evaluation showed the test to be fairly successful.

The mock tornado was scheduled to strike at 6 p.m. in the area from Penniman Ave. to Farmer St., and from Evergreen to Blunk Ave. By 6:15 p.m. the section was completely controlled, and three of the 13 intersections had traffic control personnel on duty within four minutes.

All D.P.W. employees had reported by 6:20 p.m. and Dr. Lee Feldkamp, City health officer, stated that by reports from the telephone fan-out system, 50 nurses would have been available and on duty by 6:36 p.m., and 13 physicians responded to their telephone by 6:27 p.m.

Taking part in the simulated disaster exercise were the Nurse's Society, Medical Aid Group, Stu Rockefeller Amateur Radio Society, volunteer firemen, City commissioners and all City employees. A total of 172 persons reported ready for action.

At the evaluation meeting held following the exercise, several improvements were suggested, among them an inter-com system to strengthen communications.

Civil Defense meetings have been suspended for the summer months but will resume in the fall. A new basic first aid course will also begin in the fall.

## Credit Union Issues 4% Dividend Again

"The sixth consecutive four-percent dividend was voted at the June meeting of the Board of Directors of the Plymouth Community Federal Credit Union," Dr. A. E. Van Ornum, the Credit Union's president, announced today.

This means that \$17,200 will be paid in dividends to members of the Plymouth Community Credit Union. The Board also approved a budget of \$48,700 for the final half of 1962. Of this, it is estimated that \$34,000 will remain in the Plymouth community.

According to George Lawton, treasurer of the Credit Union, "Plymouth families will save between \$60,000 and \$70,000 in interest charges during this period, which will result in direct disposable income and an increased standard of living for members of the Credit Union."

One provision in the budget is for \$2,000 in tax payments, which the Credit Union will pay during this period.

"The announcement of this sixth consecutive dividend of four per cent provides an occasion to remind people of the importance of saving some amount each pay day," Lawton said. "In addition to the four per cent, the Credit Union members also get life insurance at no charge on savings up to \$2,000," Lawton added.

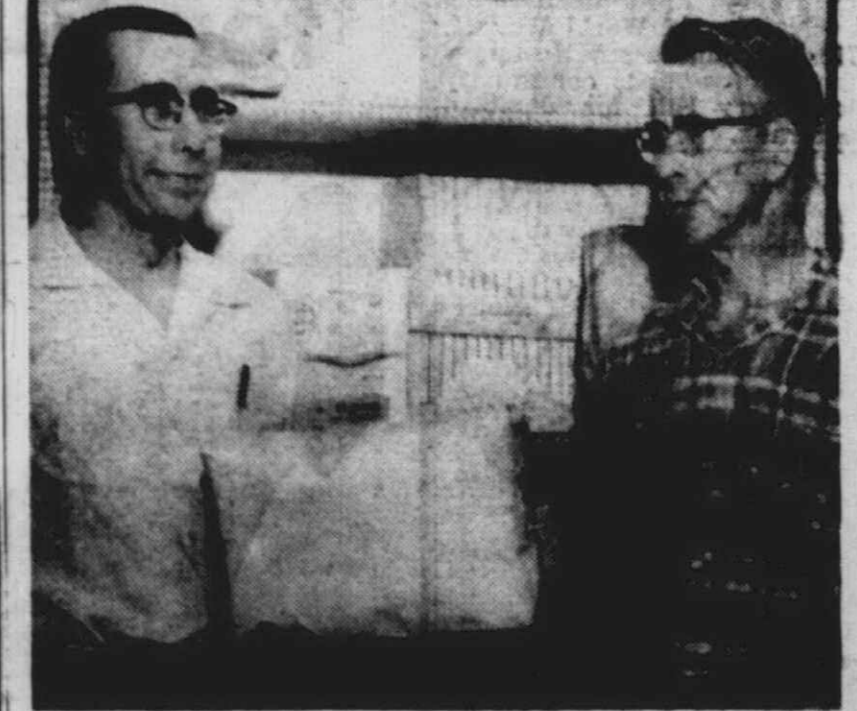

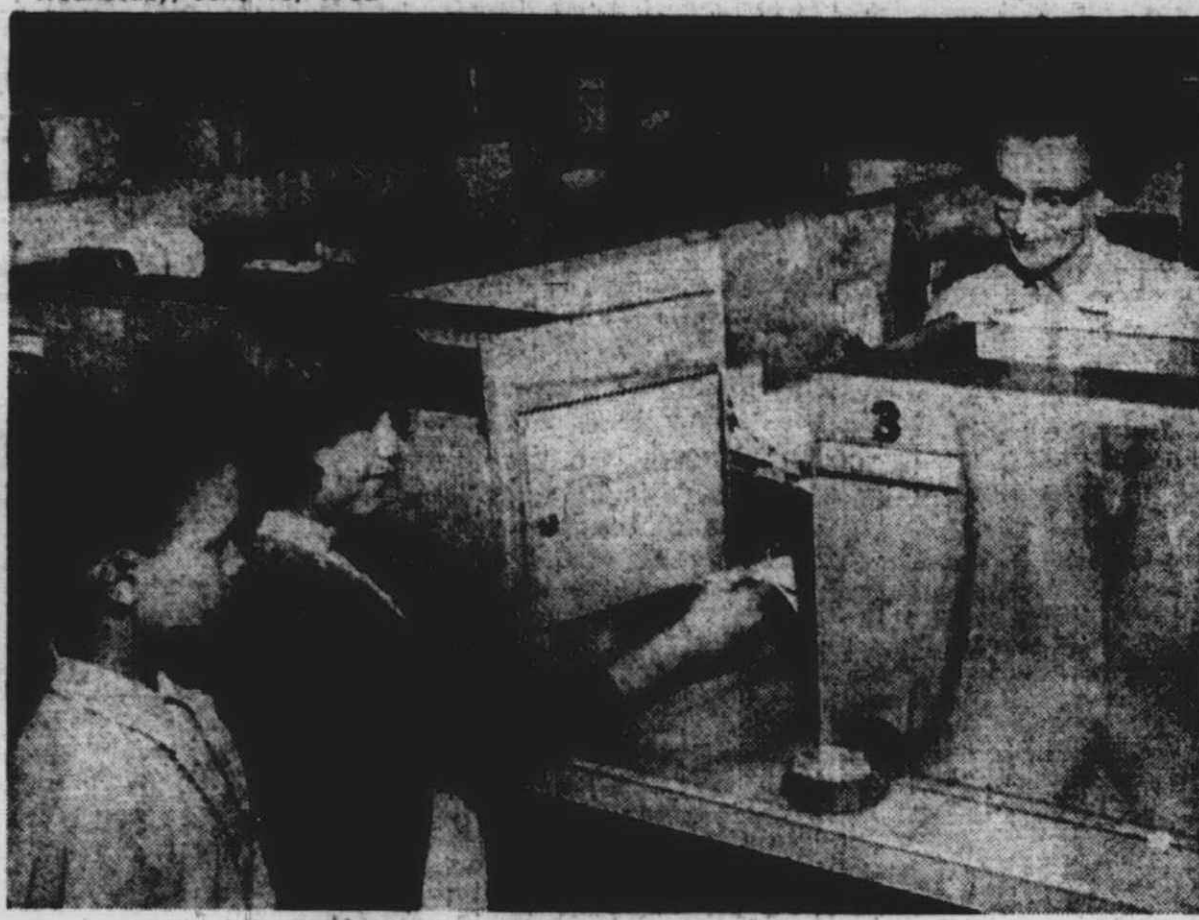

 Operating millage was then 14.40. It is now 10.90 mills. It is presumed that the Board will come back with a lower level of millage than the 5 1/2 mills just rejected. There were some cuts in school services to obtain this. What further slices will be made remains to be seen.

The Board may run into some timing trouble with its new election because of the state primary election in early August when voting machines must be locked up for some time afterward. A thunderstorm and a deluge of rain late in the afternoon slowed down voters but they apparently came out later because long lines formed at the polls as the 8 p.m. closing time neared. Over 200 people reported in line at the High School at 8 p.m.

Assistant Postmaster Ernest Henry led the candidate race with 1,310 votes. Next came Soth with 1,125. The

four unsuccessful candidates were Carl Schultheiss, 1,031; Mrs. Clara Scharmen, 883; Phillip Settles, 587; and Mrs. Beatrice Foersterling, 357.

Observers found it interesting to note that while the majority of voters disapproved of the millage issue, they returned to office one of the Board members, Robert Soth, and elected a new, Ernest Henry, who also favored the millage and told a Town Hall audience that he had no quarrel with Board operations.

Because of record 52 absentee votes had to be cast on the machines after the long lines disappeared, results were not known until after 10 p.m. The Plymouth Mail office was swamped with 350 telephone calls Monday night and more Tuesday morning.

### School Board Approves Loan Of \$125,000

National Bank of Detroit was low bidder for a loan of \$125,000 to the Plymouth Community School District. Quotations were opened at the Board of Education meeting Monday night.

The short-term loan is being secured because state aid is now lagging \$173,367. Plymouth has been receiving only half of the state payments. The National Bank of Detroit bid carried an interest rate of 1.92 per cent. A bid from Detroit Bank and Trust carried an interest rate of 2.26 per cent. The loan is payable by Sept. 1.

In other business before the Board, resignations were received and accepted from four teachers. They were Ruth Good, E. Thomas Gorycyca, Carole A. Zang and Eugene Alexander.

Teacher appointments made were Jessie Hudson, Diane Lakin Montagnano, John A. Olson and Kathleen Sempiliner.

 The Plymouth District in 1955, Bartlett School, on Canton Center Rd., closed up several years ago because of the lack of water. A more modern school, Truesdell, located on Haggerty Rd., will remain open. It has two third grades.

Hough School is the only frame building of the remaining four. It was built around 1893 and named after the family who owned a farm in the area. The School District owns nine acres next to this school upon which a larger school may someday be built.

The red brick Canton Center School has all the typical appearances of a one-room school and it may be of interest to a historical society for preservation. It was built in 1871. When it was annexed to the Plymouth schools, it had grades kindergarten through eighth grade. In recent years it has just had kindergarten.

# Chips from the ROCK

"A COMMUNITY DOES NOT ENDURE BY THE WORK OF HIRELINGS. A COMMUNITY ENDURES WHEN ITS LEAST AND ITS GREATEST CITIZEN LOVE IT ALIKE AND WILL LIVE AND WORK AND DIE THAT IT MAY BE GLORIOUS."

Things have a way of working out, and my wife has a wonderful outlook on life in that she is a firm believer that fate and the Good Lord have a way of solving most problems. With mixed emotions I write the following. Our lovely, charming and efficient Jean Campau has encountered a family care problem at home where she finds her full time will be demanded in the future to care for her children. So, with the advent of summer vacation, her interesting columns and her stories will come to an end in the next week or two. For this we are sorry, but we certainly know her family comes first and we'll just say we are sorry to lose her services.

To replace a person so capable is not easy and we have fretted about this problem for the last ten days. Here is where my wife's kind of philosophy fits into this picture. A phone call from Chicago Sunday from our daughter Cynthia made me wonder if there actually was such a thing as mental telepathy. She called and merely stated that she had been thinking about us here at home and had been thinking about my offer of seven months ago of coming back to Plymouth to put her journalistic talents to work on the Mail... and... what do you think she said. "Dad, I've just about made up my mind to resign my job as Associate Editor of Advertising Age and come home to help you at The Mail if you want me." This threw quite a scare in me as I heard her words because actually she knew nothing of our losing Mrs. Campau. I had thought about calling her, but felt I shouldn't gain impose my problems on her budding career but, believe me... that call was "Manna from heaven" and three weeks hence another Eaton's journalistic finger will be in the pie.

Our over-taxed printing department had a delivery of some 1,200 pounds of color brochures to be delivered for one or our customers to southern Indiana. Delivery time was short, freight couldn't be used, so, as one of the less important producers of printing in this department it fell my lot to make the tedious trip, at 35 miles per hour, in my car.

After three boring hours I decided to sit back and enjoy the rest of the day's drive by taking in all of the sights that the highways provided. During the next few hours I counted 32 closed-up gas stations... and then I started to observe the empty stores on the main streets of all of the towns I passed through. This aroused my curiosity. In this area we explain our empty stores by saying shopping centers have caused this exodus of business. But, here there were no shopping centers but hun-

reds and hundreds of empty stores all along the route.

There had to be an explanation, so on the return trip I decided to investigate. In the case of the gas stations, today a highly-competitive business at best, I found re-routing of traffic by new major highways as probably the greatest influence on this tremendous loss of businesses. In the case of the stores, I found by investigation, high costs of doing business today for the small businessman; a complexity of detail costly in bookkeeping, competition by progressive merchants willing to spend their surpluses on store enlargement and improvement, extending their lines and inventory of merchandise, modernizing and advertising had caused the less efficient and less progressive merchants to fall by the wayside in these areas, and it wasn't shopping centers at all because there were none.

This all added up to things I had read in recent weeks, things all of us have read... and it's just this... if small business is to exist today, it must be alert. Costs must be held to the actual bare necessities and when a dollar is spent it must be spent in the area that will bring the greatest return. Stores must be stocked to provide their customers with the quality, variety, and properly priced items to satisfy their demands and attract them back for continuing shopping trips. Constant modernization of exteriors and interior is a must. Ample parking facilities, and free if possible, are as important on the outside as the merchandise on the inside. These things are basic. I knew it before I started asking questions along the way, we all know it. I only repeat it in the hope that we here in Plymouth can forestall the further encroachment of this blight before it overtakes anymore of our local business establishments.

I also enjoyed a good laugh as I passed Peru's Mobile Manor. About 20 various sized trailers were parked along the highway where huge signs invited the motorist to select any size suite of his choosing for overnight accommodations. It was a first for me to see, and I thought it not a bad idea because if business was bad at this particular site all Mobile Manor had to do was haul its motel accommodations to a busier spot and start business all over again.

Stewart (Bud) Kirvan was a Mail visitor last week. A former member of our staff, Bud has, during the last seven months, been public relations director for the Constitutional Convention in Lansing. Now through with his work with this body he told us he had sold his home in Birmingham and had bought a farm at Winan's Lake where he will move his family and be able to golf weekends with former Plymouthite Arthur Meyers, who also lives there, Free Press Columnist Judd Arnett, and other suburbanites, along with working on his new job as public relations director for the Dundee Cement plant at Dundee.

Advertising is basically intended to inform and remind. The billions of dollars spent annually by major manufacturers and merchandisers is done in the hope that when a prospective buyer spends one

of his own dollars he will remember where to spend it. When Lewis Wright walked into the Latture Keal Estate office at 4 p.m. last Wednesday with a copy of Latture's Buy of the Week ad which was printed that afternoon, the realtors didn't even know the paper was on the streets for sale at that time. It didn't make any difference, said Mr. Latture, whether we knew or not because by 5 p.m. that same day Mr. Wright bought the house we advertised. "Talk about results, what more could we ask or what more could anyone want than a sale of a house all within an hour and all from one of your ads", said Mr. Latture.

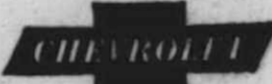

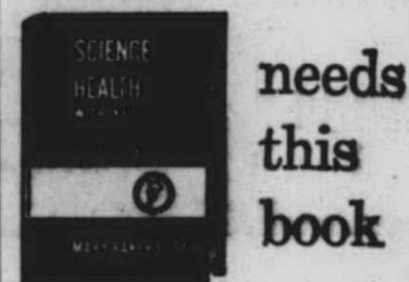

Daisy Workers Turn Down Union

Charlie Ketterer, Plymouth's head basketball coach during the winter months and a junior high physical education instructor during the entire school year, was in a talkative mood the other day.

His words dealt with a subject close at hand. One, in fact, that President Kennedy has stressed relatively often in past months.

The subject: Youth Physical Fitness.

Ketterer, who himself appears as physically fit as might be required for a basketball coach and physical education instructor, was not only sincere in his remarks about the matter, but he was also rather adamant as he made his point.

"Physical fitness," he said, "to a youngster is as important to his future health and mental attitude as are good meals."

"The youngster who is fit physically is equally fit mentally and emotionally. He's better able to cope with his school work, he does a better job studying and he's a better-adapted individual."

Charlie had no axe to grind.

Instead, he felt that Plymouth parents might like to know how their youth stand today with regard to physical fitness.

Ketterer recently completed a standard physical fitness test on youngsters in grades seven, eight and nine here. It has been administered before. The results, evaluated in comparison to a national standard, were enlightening.

Generally speaking, Ketterer felt that "the general muscle tone and overall physical fitness of the youth of Plymouth is not particularly good."

He based his observation on the results of the recent physical fitness testing here.

Ketterer's test results were evaluated on a basis of percentile accomplishment, using figures that had been established as a standard by the President's Council on Youth Fitness and the American Association of Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

Of 175 Plymouth seventh graders who were tested, 97 could not reach the "50th percentile" in the pull-up category, meaning that 97 were unable to do just two pull-ups. (A percentile measurement is slightly different from straight percentages. A 50th percentile accomplishment would mean that as many other boys performed better than one single lad than there were boys who performed less well.)

There were seven categories in the recent testing that Ketterer administered: pull-ups, sit-ups, shuttle run, standing broad jump, 50-yard dash, softball throw, and 600-yard run/walk.

In the entire seventh grade class, only 26 of 175 boys managed to achieve the 50th percentile performance in all seven categories.

Only three achieved the 80th percentile of performance. The overall results of the testing measured, in relative terms, the stamina, general physical ability, and the willingness of the youngster to work physically.

"Plymouth's boys are lacking in physical fitness," Ketterer emphasized.

A 50th percentile performance is considered to be satisfactory.

Seventh graders are either 12 or 13 years old generally. In sit-ups, 31 of 175 seventh graders could not achieve the 50th percentile performance here. In the shuttle-run, 86 were unable to reach the 50th percentile "satisfactory" performance.

In the standing broad jump, 96 boys were unable to reach the 50th percentile performance. For a 12-year-old seventh grader, this means that he could not leap 5-foot-1 from a standing position. For 13-year-old seventh graders, they could not jump 5-foot-5 from a stand-still.

"It's a funny thing," Ketterer added. "These youngsters eat better, live better and generally play harder... yet they're not up to snuff from a general physical fitness standpoint."

His statistics continued: In the 50-yard dash, 115 of the seventh graders tested could not reach the 50th percentile performance. In the softball throw, 76 could not throw the ball 100 feet, the equivalent of the 50th percentile for 12-year-olds.

In the 600-yard run/walk, 50 of the youngsters failed to achieve the 50th percentile.

There was some improvement at the eighth and ninth grade level, pointing out that frequency of physical training means a great deal.

In testing ninth graders, Ketterer observed the most improvement. During the first semester, 33 ninth graders missed the 50th percentile performance in pull-ups. This diminished to 22 during the second semester.

In the category of sit-ups, four failed during the first semester, none during the second. Twenty-three missed the 50th percentile performance during the first semester in the shuttle run, while only five missed attaining the median performance during the second semester.

A similar story of improvement showed up among the ninth graders in the other categories as the boys progressed from the first semester to the second semester of testing.

"Frequency of the physical fitness training will bring out a marked improvement," Ketterer said.

What this means to parents here is rather obvious. The youth of Plymouth require more frequent physical training. But, Ketterer added, not necessarily does this require an increase in physical education facilities within the school system. "The Plymouth physical training program for younger boys is an excellent one," he said.

Off on a brief tangent, Ketterer pointed up a recent test on adults with regard to frequency of physical training.

It took place at Kent State University in Ohio. The results deserve a hard look... since they can be projected into the adult world of Plymouth as well.

Quoting from the report of the testing at Kent:

"The experiment at Kent began with 42 overweight weaklings, ranging in age from 29 to 63. All were sedentary, half of them were faculty members from Kent State."

"Some hadn't lifted a finger in 20 years."

"The exercise regime: a mile and a half run, 30 laps in the swimming pool, 35 push-ups and 55 sit-ups, plus a few other basic calisthenics."

"When they began, the men could barely do four push-ups, only five sit-ups and could manage to swim only seven widths — not lengths — of the pool, and then only by resting between each lap."

"Ten out of 42 couldn't take it and dropped out. The testers pushed the remaining men rather hard and each week the requirements would be raised a bit higher."

"The testing program began in September and by Christmas the men were so depressed they wanted to quit entirely. Then the testers had the men repeat the first week's performance requirements."

"The men completed those earlier testing requirements in a speedy 10 minutes without huffing or puffing. They finished the rest of the year's testing in a breeze."

It's like Charlie was saying: "Frequency is the difference."

Anybody for 20 push-ups?

## Summer Swim Team Begins

Plymouth's summer swimming team, a recreation department activity supervised by high school swim coach John McFall, is currently being organized for participation in five scheduled meets this season.

The team, open to both boys and girls, is comprised of four divisions: 10- and under; 11- and 12 year olds; 13 and 14 year olds; and 15- and older.

McFall, announcing the 1962 renewal of the program which has been in existence here for several years, explained that Plymouth is one of five schools which comprise the recreation summer swimming league.

The other four schools are Livonia, Belleville, Thurston and Redford Union.

In reality, the recreation summer swimming team program lasts eight weeks and will begin early in July. Enrollment is currently in progress, according to McFall.

Five meets are scheduled for this summer, with the first slated for Thursday, July 5. The other four meets will follow on successive Thursdays. There will be one meet at each of the five schools.

All events in the various meets will consist of relays. A diving relay has been added this year.

Any youngster is invited to participate in the swimming program. There is an initial registration fee of one dollar. Last year approximately 100 youngsters enrolled, McFall said.

Further information on enrollment in the recreation summer swimming team program may be obtained at the recreation department or from Mc Fall at the high school.

## Michaels Selected All-America

Dick Michaels, whose accolades as a swimmer are already numerous, added another impressive achievement to a growing list last week.

Michaels, for the second consecutive year, was named All-America high school swimmer by the National High School Interscholastic Swimming Coaches Assn.

Membership in the All-America circle is considered to be among the highest individual recognitions a prep swimmer can possibly receive.

The selection of Michaels, a graduating senior, marked the eighth All-America swimming title to go to a Plymouth High School athlete in the 10 years the Rocks have constituted swimming teams.

The first All-America swimmer to come out of Plymouth High was Bill Brandell in 1956. Brandell is now head swimming coach at Belleville High.

Michaels' selection, announced last week, was based on his record-shattering time of :57.5 in the 100-yard backstroke, his specialty in a dual meet here this past winter.

The :57.5 clocking, which set a new Plymouth school record, also turned out to be the 12th fastest time in that event in the nation during the 1961-62 swimming season.

Michaels, a lithe 17-year-old, was an invaluable asset in individual scoring in dual-meet competition as Plymouth racked up an 11-4 record and placed second in the Suburban Six league.

During the season, he served as team captain and later was named as the squad's most valuable player by his teammates.

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# Rocks Upset Northville Twice, Conclude with 9-4 Record

# Majorette Wins Contest Medal

Plymouth's baseball season ended on a high note last week as the Rocks twice upset neighboring Northville High, first by a 2-0 margin and later by a 4-3 difference.

But the Rocks' success against the Mustangs was overshadowed by another disconcerting fact:

For the first time in six seasons, Plymouth's varsity baseball team failed to finish in first place in the Suburban Six conference.

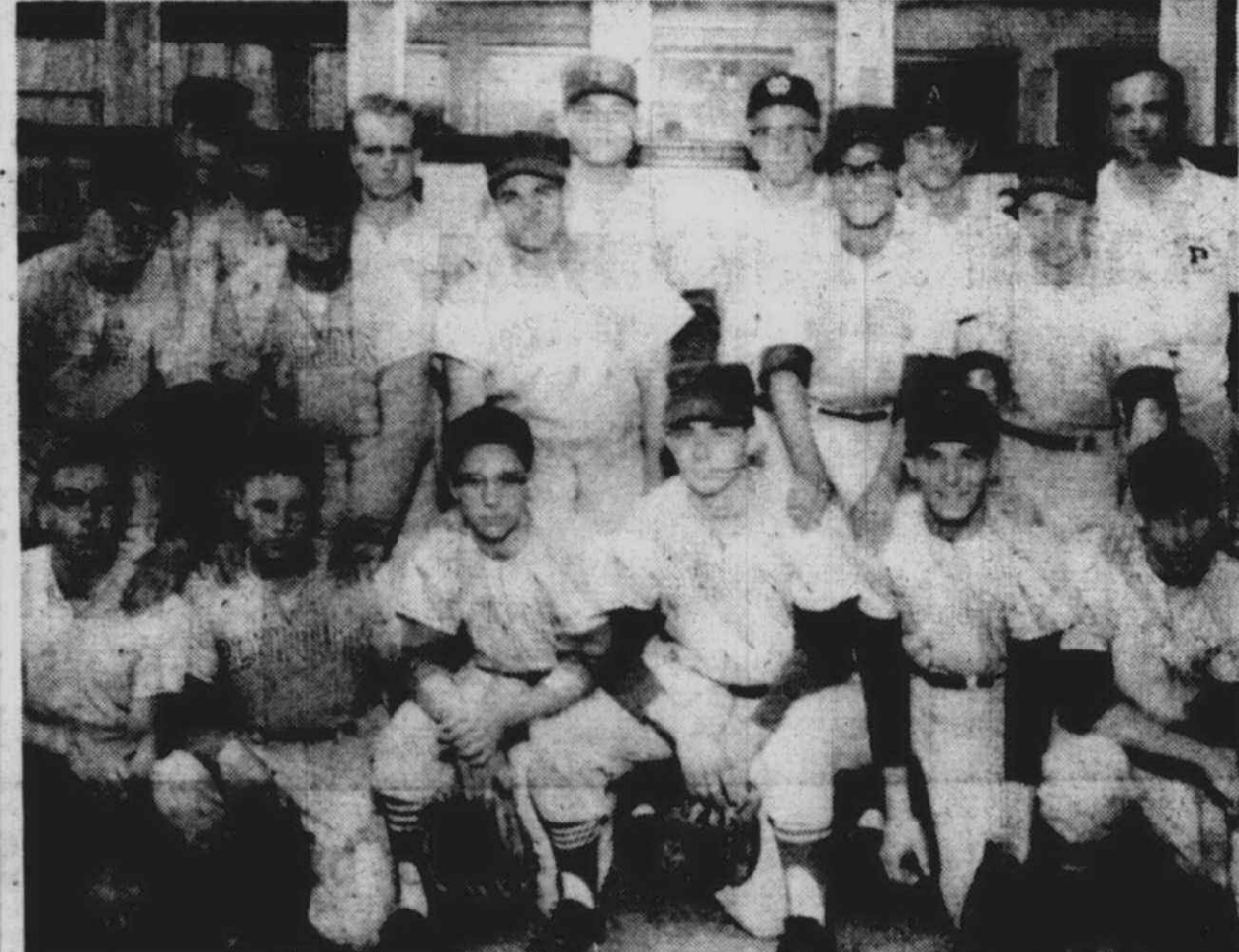
Instead, the Rocks this spring had to settle for a half-share of second place, tied with arch-rival Bentley High. Each team completed the league schedule with identical 6-3 marks.

Allen Park nosed its way ahead of Plymouth and Bentley in the race for the league crown. The Parkers, who only narrowly escaped a threat from the Bentley Bulldogs, emerged as title-winners on the strength of a 7-2 won-and-lost record.

Although Plymouth gained a respectable tie for second place, the Rocks were out of the race well before the season ended. A pair of conference defeats three weeks ago ended all of Plymouth's hopes for a sixth conference crown.

The Rocks — in order to gain a shot at second place — were forced to beat Bentley High in the last league encounter of the season. And then, after Allen Park too defeated the Bulldogs, Plymouth abruptly found itself deadlocked with Bentley for second.

The two Northville games last week were morale-building victories for Plymouth and had no bearing whatever on the final standings in the Suburban Six league. (In fact, Northville is not even a member school within the Suburban Six.)
