**Minister Tells Kiwanians About Visit to Alaska**

The Rev. Melbourne I. Johnson, D.D., pastor of First Methodist church and a Kiwanian, presented a program at last week's Kiwanian Club meeting on his recent visit to Alaska.

The pastor revealed that one community of 1,900 people has 13 different churches and so assistance from churches in the other 49 states is essential for operation.

He showed slides of the snow-capped mountains and other sites in the 49th state. He noted that only six varieties of trees grow in the state. Bread sells for 52 cents a loaf, gasoline for 73 cents a gallon or more and carpenters in one city receive \$14 an hour.

He added that of the 49 families from Michigan who went to Alaska several years ago, only two or three remain. Only the most hardy people are able to successfully live there, Rev. Johnson declared.

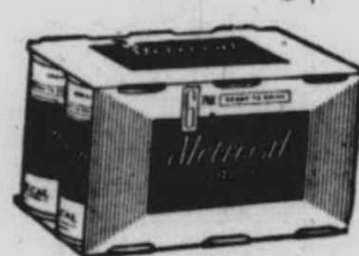
**Early Spring Yield Promises Big Crop**

**Summer Officially Here Thursday**

Summer is just beginning — officially. The season's official beginning comes at 4:24 p.m. Thursday (June 21) according to University of Michigan astronomer Hazel M. Losh. "On this day Michigan will receive the most heat from the sun for any 24-hour period of the year, because the sun will reach its most direct position over the northern half of the earth," she explains. 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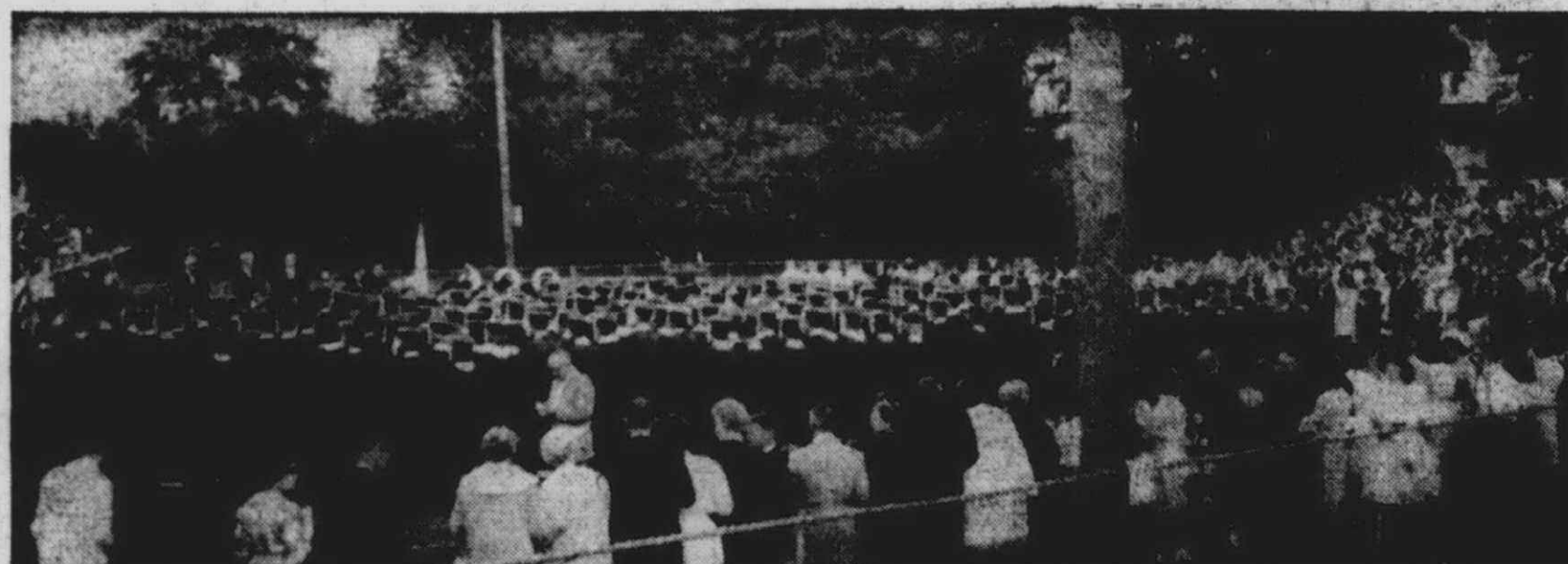

hearing notice to property owners who are to be assessed. But bond firms have advised Michigan communities that they still won't touch the bonds unless a court case tests the legality of the new law.

"It's a ridiculous situation," Supervisor Stein lamented. "Almost every community in Michigan has issued special assessment bonds under the old act these many years and now the Supreme Court says it was illegal. To make it worse, three of the justices were once state attorney generals who had passed on the legality of these special assessment bonds over the years."

Stein led a group of 10 supervisors and attorneys to Gov. Swainson's office recently to try to straighten the matter out. A union leader protested that his men were losing work because pipe was not being sold for the jobs.

Stein claims that by the time a test court case is ended and new bonds are readied, the summer construction season will be over.

The Detroit Water Board, Stein added, apparently has faith in Canton Township's future. Detroit is laying a 24-inch trunk line westward on Cherry Hill to Lilley Rd. and north on Lilley to Ford. A water meter will be placed here and the Township must pay for the mains running from this point.

As a result, the only way that the playground program could be saved would be by funds from another source.

The Board of Directors of the Community Fund took the matter at a special meeting Tuesday morning and voted to furnish \$1,500 for the playground program and \$300 for the baseball program for boys 15 and under. This league is for boys who are unable to qualify for the Little League and B League. Boys 13 to 15 wanting to play should register at the Recreation office.

Up until three years ago, the Community Fund furnished \$5,000 for the summer recreation program, but it was dropped as an agency when the Board decided that playgrounds should be the responsibility of the community recreation department now handled by the school system.

Playgrounds now open, and their hours, are:

Allen, 12:30 to 2:30; Central 2 to 4 p.m.; Gallimore, 9:30 to 11:30 a.m.; Farrand, 1 to 3 p.m.; Smith, 9 to 11 a.m.; and Starkweather, 1:30 to 3:30 p.m.

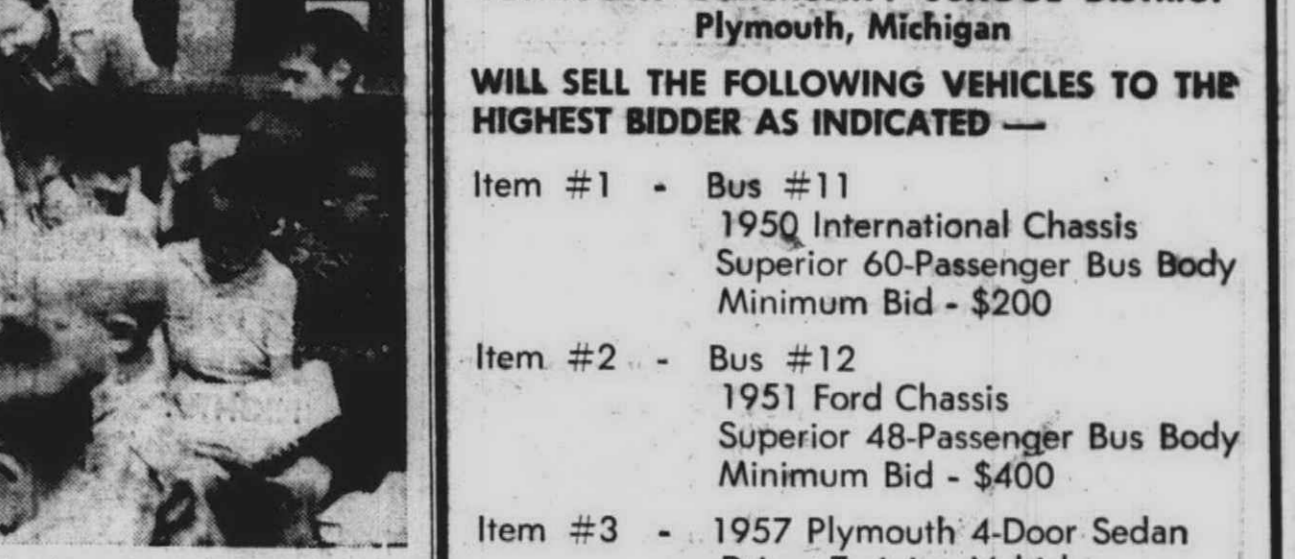

A special meeting of the Board of Education of the Plymouth Community School District, Wayne and Washtenaw Counties, Michigan, was held Monday evening, May 28, 1962, in the Board Room of the Administration Building, 1024 S. Mill Street, Plymouth, at 8:00 o'clock p.m.

It was mutually agreed that the scope of the project would be limited to full compliance with the fire marshal's recommendations plus other mechanical work in connection with modernization of the heating, ventilating and lighting systems. The preliminary budget allocation for full compliance with the fire marshal's recommendations for this project, including fees, was set at \$250,000. It was also mutually agreed that a new contract be written with the Architect which would include service fees as follows:

2 1/2 per cent on all work constructed.

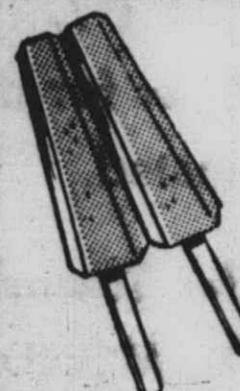

**SPORTS SEEN**

By Jerome O'Neil

What happened to the Plymouth Golf Tournament this year? In the simplest of terms, it washed out. The evidence has been in for some while now, but the public announcement has been delayed. It's an unfortunate turn of events, at least from the observations made by this desk. Particularly so, since 42 Plymouthites had already replied to a coupon questionnaire that appeared on the sports pages of The Plymouth Mail. They indicated their interest in a 1962 renewal of the tournament.

There is little question that the tourney exists . . . on paper, that is!

When 42 potential participants see fit to indicate their interest well before the true golfing season is underway, it bespeaks that the required minimum number of entries is readily available.

The minimum number was set at 100, in light of past tournaments and in view of financial demands projected for a new one in 1962.

If 42 persons saw fit to indicate their interest before the actual golfing season was upon us, this number would certainly have swelled considerably as balmy weather and blue skies sent the compelling urge to play golf through the veins of hundreds of other potential participants.

At any rate, the tournament evidently will not be resumed this year, for reasons ranging from a question over profits, to prizes, doubt and hesitation. Perhaps it will be different in 1963.

On another subject, The Detroit News last week provided a word of caution for high school athletes, especially those that will be back in high school next fall.

The words of caution bear repeating here.

It has to do with participation in summer sports and how high school athletic eligibility is involved. The Michigan High School Athletic Assn. has laid down the law governing prep sports eligibility.

The ruling has two categories, awards and amateur practices.

Under the awards provision, high school students cannot accept anything other than a trophy for participation in athletics if they are to retain eligibility for further high school sports.

A trophy is defined as a medal, ribbon, badge, plaque, cup, banner, picture or ring. The value of such an award may not exceed \$5, excluding engraving.

This also applies to acceptance of merchandise, clothing, sports equipment or services. A prep athlete may not accept any offering exceeding the \$3 ceiling, regardless if he pays part or all of the purchase price.

While prep athletes may attend banquets, luncheons, dinners and may go on trips or accept admission to athletic events, they may not accept membership, privileges or special services in clubs or similar organizations as awards or payment for sports participation.

The sports in which a prep risks violation of the awards provision include baseball, basketball, boxing, cross-country, football, golf, hockey, skiing, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, track or wrestling.

Violation of the awards rule will render a student ineligible for interscholastic athletic competition for a period of not less than one full semester from the date of violation.

Under the amateur practices section of the MHSAA code, no student will be eligible to represent his high school if he has accepted money or other valuable considerations for participating in athletics.

"Valuable consideration" is defined as the same things applying in the awards rule — nothing other than a trophy whose maximum purchase price is \$3.

Prep athletes who accept jobs, in school or out, where they may be employed as umpires in recreation programs, as golf caddies, or at swimming pools or beaches, will not be in violation of the amateur practices rule.

The penalty for violation of the amateur practices rule is loss of athletic eligibility for a period of not less than one full school year (two semesters) from the date of the infraction.

The two rules also apply to any boy who will be entering high school for the first time in the fall.

**Issues Track Awards**

Varsity and junior varsity awards were announced last week for Plymouth's track team, which enjoyed its first unbeaten, untied season in 10 years this spring.

Track coach Keith Baughman awarded 19 varsity letters, 34 junior varsity letters and two managerial letters just prior to the close of school last week.

The Rocks this season rang up six consecutive dual-meet thinclad victories, added a league championship meet victory and placed second in the Class 'A' regional meet mid-way through the spring.

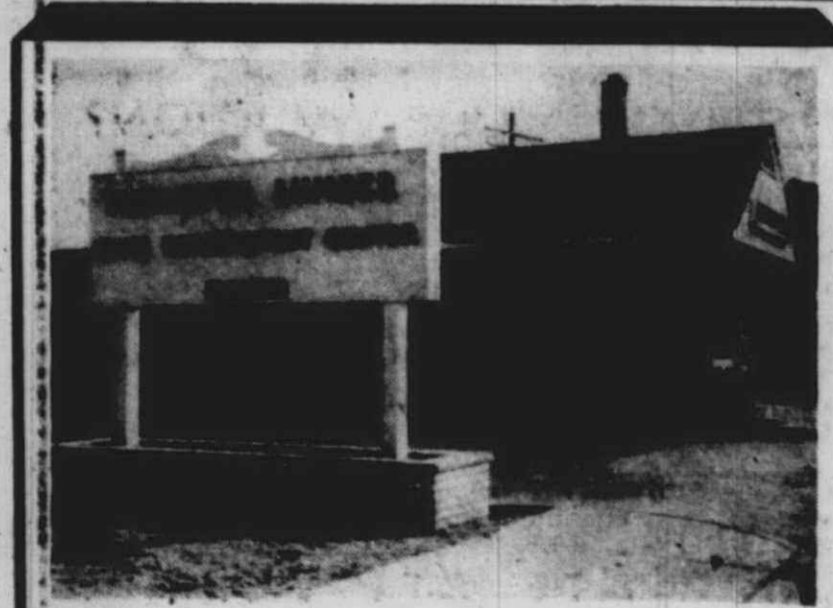

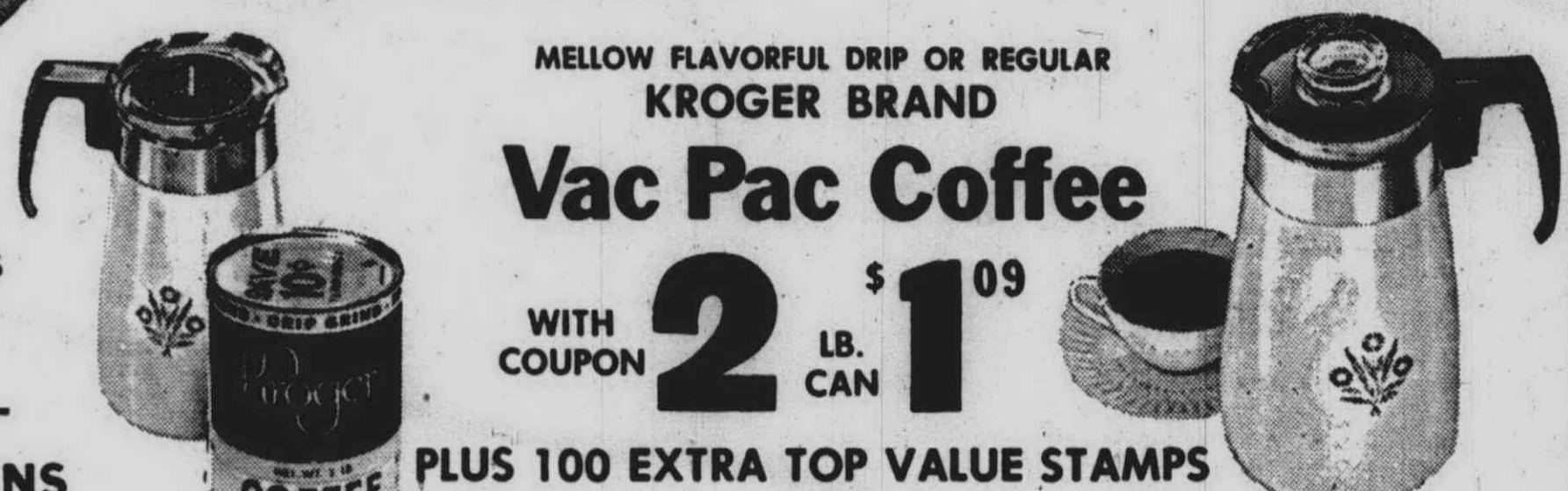

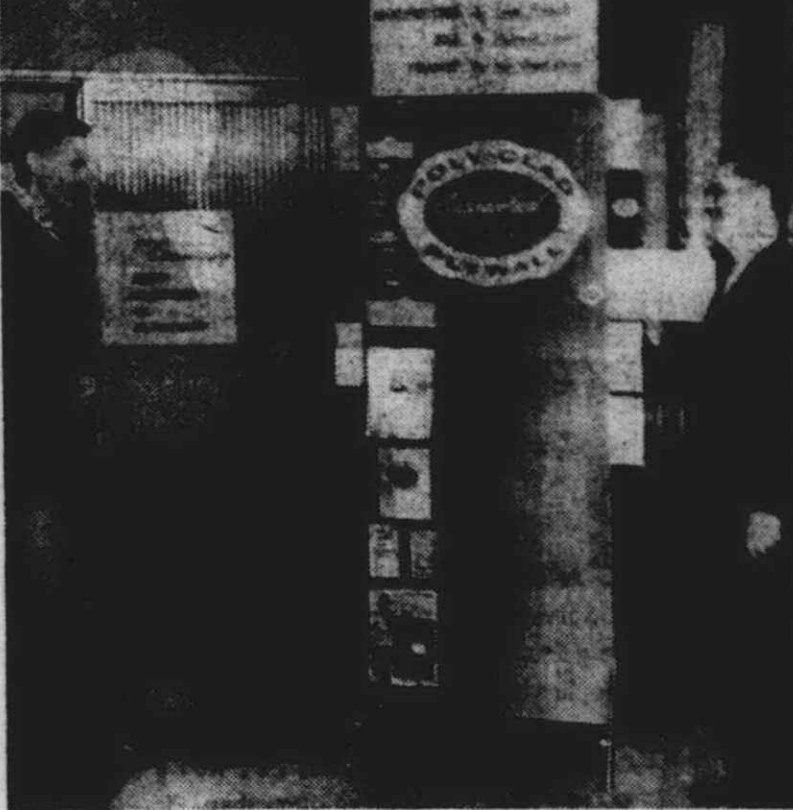
