

# Trustees Once Again Delay Decision on Site for Community College

Trustees of the Northwest Wayne County Community College — in a special meeting last Friday night — once again deferred decision on the selection of a site for the college campus and buildings.

There were overtones at the meeting that led spectators to wonder if any of the three sites currently under consideration would be chosen at all.

The three sites are located at:

Warren and Lilley Roads in Canton Twp., Bradner off Five Mile in Northville Twp., and Farmington Road at Six Mile in Livonia.

Each of the three sites is comprised of approximately 100 acres, the minimum acreage desired by the college's Board of Trustees, and each would cost no more than \$250,000 for land acquisition and fill.

The Northville Twp. site, just outside the Ply-

mouth Community School District, would have to be annexed to the local district before it would serve as the college's location.

At the meeting Friday night, Trustee Clarke Oldenburg put into words the hopes of all of the voters in the four school districts where approval of a one-mill tax levy for the college was affirmed last month.

Discussing the selection of a college site, Oldenburg said:

"I believe that our prime responsibilities are the education of the youth of the District, and every \$100,000 additional we spend for land, over the \$250,000 figure, means that we can educate some 500 to 600 less students."

Earlier he remarked that he would prefer a site as close to the center of the district as possible.

"It is the consensus of the Board that we must have approximately 100 acres of useable land with

adequate power, water and sewer facilities," he said. "Our budget is such that we can spend \$250,000 or less for land to include the cost of filling that land and relocating drains."

In addition to the \$250,000 limit placed on land acquisition and fill, the Trustees have determined that they are able to spend approximately \$160,000 more for general improvements such as parking facilities, water and sewer tap-in fees.

The one-mill tax levy approved by voters in the four school districts last month will create approximately \$2,400,000 in funds for the college.

By estimating first the cost of construction and beautification of the college, Trustees came up with the \$250,000 maximum for land acquisition.

There were nearly 75 persons attending the Trustees' meeting Friday evening at Newburg School. They remained in

the school building, discussing the many aspects of the Community College, long after the meeting, a brief one, was adjourned shortly before 9 p.m.

When the Trustees finally do locate a suitable site for the college, a simple majority vote of the seven-member board will make the decision official and lead to the next phase of the program, namely land purchase and then construction.

The site-selection deci-

sion will be delayed at least until August 1, it was determined.

During the interim, officials for the college will seek possible alternative sites which may meet an 18-point criteria set up by Dr. Eric Bradner, president of the college.

At an earlier meeting of the Trustees last week, much friction was generated when Board Secretary Ward McCain charged some of his fellow Board members with deal-

ing out "erroneous information" concerning the Livonia site on Farmington Rd.

That meeting was held Wednesday, July 11. McCain, who had been hospitalized previously and unable to attend meetings for many weeks, had invited the Board to hold its Facilities and Financial committee meeting at his home the previous Saturday. There, he claimed

## City in Action

### Parking Lot Construction Nears Finish

Much to the pleasure of shoppers and downtown businessmen alike, Plymouth's central parking lot — displaying the results of a major facelifting — will reopen completely late this week.

City Commission members, at their regular meeting Monday night, acknowledged that the central lot should be opened by Saturday of this week, and at the same time agreed to defer for one year the application of a primary surface coat over the entire lot.

A 1½-inch 'binder' surface is presently being applied over the lot by the subcontracting firm allotted that portion of the overall reconstruction job.

During the course of the ensuing 12 months, the binder coat will be allowed to settle and next year, minor repairs will be made where settling has occurred and then the primary 1-inch surface topping will be applied.

The decision to defer the primary coat for one year was made at the recommendation of DPW director Joseph Bida.

At their meeting Monday evening, Commissioners also approved an initial payment of approximately \$18,000 to Thompson-McCully, general contractor on the parking lot project.

Total reconstruction of the parking lot will cost approximately \$35,000.

Robert Thompson, a Plymouthite, and a member of Thompson-McCully contractors, verified later that the parking lot reconstruction will be completed by the end of this week, weather permitting.

His firm finished the shaping and gravel treatment work Tuesday and turned the initial surfacing over to a subcontracting firm.

The lot, which measures approximately 400-feet by 300-feet, will provide parking provisions for a total of 230 cars, an increase of 50 over the previous accommodations there.

Minor landscaping and parking surface "stripping" is yet to be done. As in recent years, parking will be free in the central lot.

In other action Monday night, Commissioners authorized City Manager Albert Glassford to order 55 new street lights and related facilities from Detroit Edison.

The lights, mercury-vapor, color-corrected street lamps, will be installed by Detroit Edison along certain downtown streets to improve downtown lighting. They will replace the present outmoded street lamps.

Cost of the project, which has previously been incorporated in the city's budget, is \$5,500. Portions of five downtown streets figure in the project.

They are: Ann Arbor Tr. from South Harvey to the Eastern-most point of Kellogg Park; Penniman Ave. from South Main to the Eastern tip of the park; South Main from Fralick to Maple; Forest Ave. from Ann Arbor Tr. to Wing St.; and Wing from Forest to Main.

Previously, the up-to-date mercury vapor street lamps had been installed along the newly-surfaced portion of Penniman Ave. from Harvey

### Bad Check Charge Brings 60-Day Term

A Wayne man, Christopher LaBombard, was sentenced to 60 days in Detroit House of Correction last week after he was found guilty of passing numerous bad checks in Plymouth.

The sentence was handed down by Judge Robert Lorion, in Municipal Court here. Lorion was filling in for Plymouth Municipal Judge Harry Deyo, who has been ill.

LaBombard, who had been in custody up to the time of his prosecution on the bad check charge here, was convicted for a series of "insufficient fund" checks that he had passed at several Plymouth stores last fall.

The amount of the checks was undisclosed, but it was described as 'considerable.'

### Twp. Receives Custom Fire Truck

Plymouth Township's first custom-built fire engine was delivered last week and after three hours of grueling tests, it became a permanent member of the department's fire-fighting force.

The American LaFrance truck, which cost \$27,932, was delivered last Thursday. On Friday, it was driven to Wilcox Lake where a company representative put it through its paces.

Filling out a Board of Fire Inspectors check list, the inspector ran the pumper for three hours with 100 gallons of water per minute shooting out across Wilcox Lake. The water was drawn through an intake hose, dropped into the lake.

## Major Mfg. Firm May Locate Here

A major auto, truck and farm implement manufacturer may soon locate a large central distribution warehouse here, it was learned by The Plymouth Mail Tuesday afternoon.

Already, negotiations between the City and manufacturer have reached a stage whereby official announcement is expected within two weeks.

Mayor Robert Sincock, who declined to reveal the name of the manufacturer before negotiations have been completed, said that — if the project goes through — an additional real and personal property tax base of between \$300,000 and \$400,000 will be created.

He was unable to give figures as to the number of new jobs that would be created.

The land involved is another parcel within the City's industrial property belt located on the southwest corner of Plymouth and Haggerty Rds., opposite Burroughs Corp.

Under consideration is a two-acre portion of the 27-acre industrial park. It is property that adjoins the land recently purchased and placed under construction by RCA.

The property is set back approximately 700-feet from Plymouth Road and measures 330-feet wide and 230-feet deep.

Monday night, the City Commission gave its informal approval for Sincock to correspond with an intermediary that is representing the manufacturing concern in negotiation with the City.

Sincock's letter will inform the intermediary that the City will accept a bid on the property. A City ordinance requires that advertisements for bids on the same property be published before the intermediary's bid may be accepted.

If plans go according to schedule, Sincock stated that the company will be in operation by November. He said that construction will begin immediately following completion of the purchase.

The manufacturing concern thus would become the third such property owner within the City's industrial park on Plymouth Road.

Wheel Truing Co. in 1959 purchased 12 acres and eventually will build a manufacturing plant on the site. The company deals in industrial diamonds, Sincock said.

The second property owner there was RCA, which only recently completed its negotiation with the City. Already, an RCA research center is under construction. RCA's property comprises five acres there.

Involved in the current talks are aspects of the City's responsibility. The City will provide sewer and water as well as a service drive to the distribution center.

Spearheading this current move, as well as past industrial development, has been former mayor Harold Guenther.

## School Issue Faces Third 'Decision Day'

With a third 'Day of Decision' fast drawing near for one of the most controversial school millage issues ever placed before voters in the Plymouth Community School District, a number of special citizens' committees are once again marshalling forces in hopes of assembling a favorable majority at the polls July 30.

The school district, school board members have stated, is confronted with the necessity of a \$450,000 cutback in operating expenditures, should the 5-mill proposal be defeated in 13 days.

Two previous millage proposals — one for 7½ mills and the other for 5½ — have already been shunned down by the electorate. Because the July 30 election will be the last opportunity for the Board to submit a proposal to the public before taxes are collected next winter, Board members are calling this election "the most important in the history of the district."

Already, committees of interested citizens — among them many independents — are busy canvassing voters by telephone and even door-to-door in an effort to bring about a millage victory July 30.

Precinct groups are rapidly re-organizing with missions to spearhead the "get-out-and-vote-Yes" campaign. Superintendent of Schools Russell Isbister reports that School Board members as well as scheduling numerous appearances before neighborhood groups and grass-roots coffee-kitchen meetings.

The biggest share of this campaign, it was indicated, will not get rolling until early next week, with the election then only a week away.

A special brochure, urging a "Yes Vote", is being prepared under the direction of a campaign officials and shortly will be distributed to every home in the school district. It will contain a question and answer portion, designed to clear up hard to understand aspects regarding the millage and the operating cutbacks.

A total of 17 individual cutbacks, amounting to approximately \$450,000, would be instituted if the millage proposal fails.

Almost ironically, 3½ mills of the 5-mill proposal represent a renewal of millage (Continued on Page 8)

### College Board Makes Request For Two Loans

Resolutions to issue \$2,425,000 worth of bonds and to borrow \$125,000 for operation were approved by the Board of Trustees for the Northwest Wayne County Community College last week.

Applications for the two transactions are now pending before the Michigan Municipal Finance Commission for approval.

When voters last month approved two proposals concerning the Community College, one was for levying one mill and the other for the bond issue.

One half mill will be used for paying off the bond issue and the other half for operation.

Because the first tax collection will not be made until next December, the Board of trustees approved a resolution asking to borrow the \$125,000 on anticipated revenue. Business Manager Kenneth Lindner estimates that the present funds, secured from the four school districts, will last only until Sept. 1.

It is hoped that the borrowing transaction will be completed by then.

The \$125,000 loan will not be repaid until April 1, 1964 — two tax rolls from now. The \$2,425,000 bond issue will be dated Nov. 1, 1962 and the first bond will be callable by Nov. 1, 1967. It is expected that the bonds will be sold for between 4 and 14 per cent interest.

## Volunteers-for-Romney To Organize Thursday

Undoubtedly to the chagrin of Gov. Swainson, whose hometown is Plymouth, local citizens will hold a "Volunteers for Romney" organizational meeting Thursday evening, July 19, at the Hotel Mayflower here.

Goal of the Plymouth Romney for Governor chapter is to lend support to the Michigan Republican Party's efforts to elect George Romney governor this fall. The former head of American Motors Corp. is expected to be unopposed for the Republican gubernatorial nomination in the August primary.

The meeting tomorrow night will begin at 8:30 p.m. in the Mayflower's Captain's room. A community-wide invitation to attend has been issued, according to Ned Stirton who will serve as professional meeting chairman.

Principal speaker will be Dr. John Dempsey, state director of the Romney Vol-

unteers, who will also present the Plymouth chapter with its charter. Dempsey, former news analyst for Detroit radio-TV station WJBK, has been state director for "Volunteers for Romney" since its inception several months ago.

Some 15 people have served as key figures in the evolution of a local Romney for Governor movement. A preliminary meeting was held last week at the home of W. E. Stirton, Jr., to make plans for the forth-coming organizational meeting.

Among those attending the preliminary meeting were Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Hulsing, Wendell Miller, Harry Reeves, Robert Tripp, Robert Iles, Mark Wehmeyer and Norman Kaiser.

The nomination and election of chapter officers will take place during the organizational meeting Thursday night.

Dr. Dempsey, who surprisingly is a former democrat, assumed the leadership of the Romney Volunteers because he "believed that Michigan's economic health and prosperity were more important than political affiliation."

A student of state, national and international affairs, Dr. Dempsey majored in political science, received B.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of Detroit. He gained his Ph.D. from the University of Michigan.

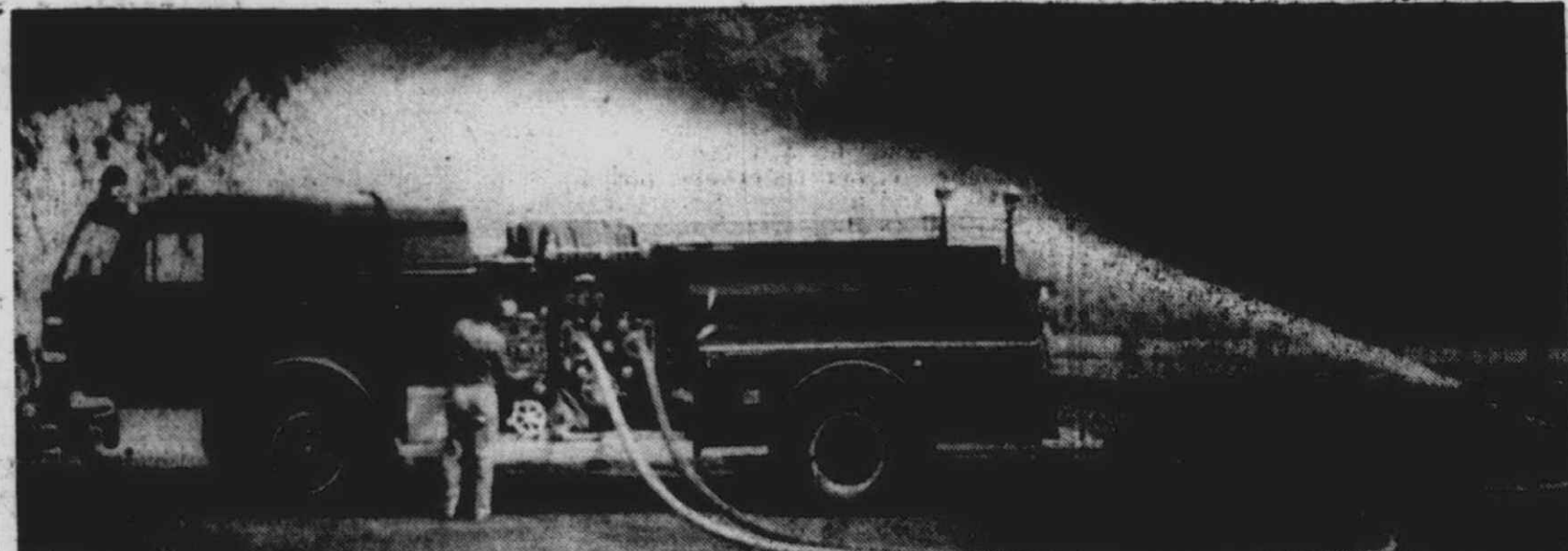

# Pastor Tells How Science Proves Bible To Be True

The Rev. Arnold H. Kehrl, summer supply preacher for the pulpit of the First Baptist Church here, presented the first of a series of three sermons July 1 on the subject "Science and the Bible." The specific event for study was the record of the long day of Joshua, one of the greatest miracles recorded in Holy Writ.

That the event really took place is beyond question. It is historic and confirmed by the very exacting science of astronomy.

Somehow it is quite generally assumed that the conclusions of modern scientific research are in grave disagreement with the Bible, however, says Mr. Kehrl.

Living as we do in our technological age when men are building human brain cells into electronic computers, it is well for us to consider the fact as to whether the Bible will stand up under scientific test and be accepted as credible and trustworthy.

Some seek excuse for not accepting the Bible on the grounds that it has been proven scientifically incorrect. The example of the text at hand appears as one of the most radical claims. What shall be thought about the "Sun Having Stood Still"?

There are many parallel accounts of the incident, even from antiquity and apart from the sacred record. Ancient Chinese writings record a long day. The Incas of Peru, and Aztecs of Mexico likewise carry such a record.

Records of both Babylonia and Persia state that at one occasion a day was miraculously extended. Research found that the priests of ancient Egypt preserved temple records that contained the account of a day that was twice natural length. There is the striking legend in the folklore of the Polynesians of the great feat of Maui who to satisfy the time element of a meeting of the gods, snared the sun by climbing a mountain and lassoing it with a cable of coconut fibers.

Having done so, the legend states, he broke off the legs of the sun and the sun was obligated to sit atop the mountain until he grew a new pair of legs, which took nearly an entire day.

These multiplied historical traditions all show the universal agreement that there is a fact of basic truth behind them all.

Let us apply the findings of the science of astronomy to the Biblical case. Fantastic as it may appear, astronomical computations are irrefutable and answers the question of our problem. The record states that the sun was in the "Midst" of Heaven. This means "High" or "Bisection". It stood over Gibeon. The moon was "In the valley of Aijalon", a low mountain pass between peaks, which fix us with what may be called a "Gun-sight pass" much as one would shoot the azimuth

(Continued from page 1) perhaps \$6,000 and the Township, \$4,000. Commissioners will meet soon with a Wayne County Library representative in an effort to resolve the situation. The present City library budget is approximately \$26,000. Improve Ann Arbor Tr. Glassford was also authorized to direct the preparation of plans and specifications for paving Ann Arbor Tr. from Hamilton St. east to the City limits, and for re-capping Ann Arbor Tr. from Hamilton to South Main.

The City Engineer's office will prepare the plans and specification sheets and eventually bids will be requested on the job. Glassford could name no target date for start of the project. In other official matters, Commissioners approved an expenditure of \$200 to help defray the cost of the Plymouth Community Band concerts that are now being held regularly on Friday evenings in Kellogg Park.

On this same item, authorization was given the Community Band to hold ice cream socials in Kellogg Park during the July 27 and Aug. 3 concerts. Sick leave benefits for city employees were up-dated. Employees, who previously were limited to the accumulation of 100 days sick leave, now are held to no limit. Sick leave accrues at the rate of one day per month of service.

Stal-Van Manufacturing Co., of 350 South Mill, notified the Commissioners of its intentions to expand its plant facilities. The company inquired about the possibility of bidding on a portion of the Urban Renewal property that comprises a part of that neighborhood. Stal-Van indicated it would require from three to five acres for the expansion program. Commissioners took the matter under advisement.

Later, a motion calling for a meeting to obtain the architect's recommendations was approved and the Friday night meeting was arranged. McCain, weakened by his illness, left the Wednesday meeting early. Afterward, a citizen in the audience, Attorney Rodney Kropf, of Livonia, demanded that the Board of Trustees get busy and select a site and hinted that a recall of the entire board may be forthcoming if members don't take some positive action soon.

**Too Late to Classify**

McCain also lashed out at "certain members" and the new business manager, Kenneth Lindner, for negotiating directly with property owners for a site instead of leaving it up to the college's lawyers.

Lindner, on the job only two weeks, denied that he had dealt directly with any property owners but had talked with a real estate agent. He noted that he had been instructed by the Board to compile facts concerning site costs. This action was later verified by reading minutes of a previous meeting.

Board Chairman Harold Fischer of Plymouth said that he had no direct dealings with property owners, with the exception of an inquiry about a property located in both Livonia and Plymouth, which proved to be of no value. McCain, pointed out that the proposed Northville Township site is far from the center of population, since 80 per cent of the district's population is east of Farmington Rd.

A motion by Oldenburg to have a thorough investigation of the Northville Township site was turned down by a 3-3 deadlock vote. A simple majority was required.

While Oldenburg, Fischer and Mrs. John Moehle voted for the motion, McCain, Paul Mutnick and Charles Kirkpatrick voted against it.

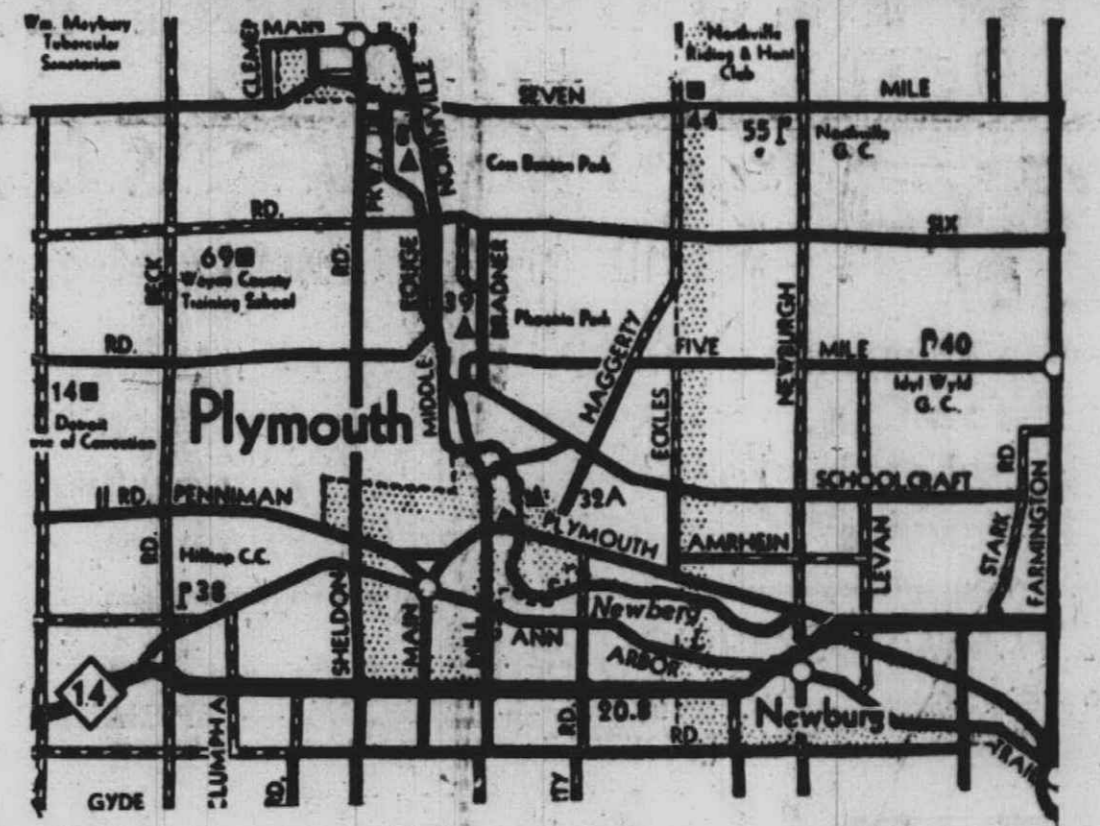

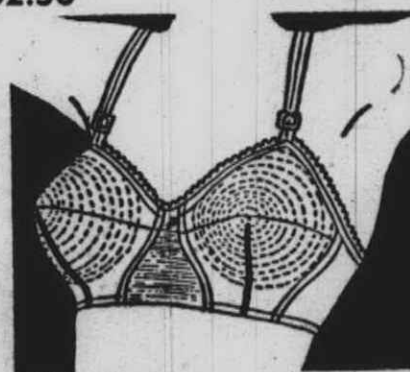

**Chips from the ROCK**

Plymouth voters will soon again go to the polls to pass judgement on the request of the Board of Education for five mills for school operating funds. This request, which school officials have convinced me, is necessary to at least continue on our present excellent operation causes a dilemma for certain of our residents, namely, those now living on fixed incomes, and there are many.

As longevity increases, due to daily advances by the medical profession, more and more of our citizens pass into a well deserved retirement, living on funds they had saved and provided through their productive years. These are the people now caught in the squeeze of more city, state, and school taxes, higher living costs, and no extra income to take up the slack. This is a sorry situation and one which gives any tax supported agency a built-in resistance group, and who can blame them. However, under our system of assessment and spreading of tax rolls there is no way relief can be offered to this group by our tax-supported agencies. The only way this can be changed or helped would be by action of the Michigan Legislature and I think this is a problem so severe every resident of not only Plymouth, but every Michigan community should sit right down today and demand of their Representatives and Senators some form of tax relief for this group.

However, in spite of this squeeze there is another factor of importance that enters into the picture. That is the factor in devaluation of property which would ensue in an area where schools would start to deteriorate because of insufficient operating funds, and where the children of the area would be given a less satisfactory education.

Certainly those retired people owning their own homes would lose in real estate valuation and this item alone in a few years might result in many, many hundreds of dollars more than the few dollars this tax increase would amount to at this time.

There is no question but what a school cut-back now would be severe blow to our industrial and business community. Industry, whether it is here now or lured here in the future, will have no part of a community which doesn't have excellent schools for the benefit of the children of its employees. Reviewing the cut-back possibilities, which we will enumerate later, practically convinces me that we are faced with a major set-back in this community, from which we may well never recover... and, if this is true... every home owner, every businessman, every industrialist will suffer the loss of hundreds and, in some cases, thousands of dollars.

WHO WILL LIVE IN A COMMUNITY THAT HAS OVER CROWDED SCHOOL CLASSES... HAS PART OF ITS SCHOOLS ON HALF DAY SESSIONS DOESN'T HAVE A SCHOOL OFFERING A FULL ROUNDED CURRICULEM EVEN WITHOUT FRILLS? And on and on... these are the things that might cause a major catastrophe to every resident of the area, and these are only a few of the things which I think we must all consider.

Now to look at the ways our present operation would have to be cut if the voters don't approve the five mill proposal. These are the ways it will be possible for the school to operate on the money it will have available if the voters fail to support their present request. These are actual items submitted by the Superintendent, at the request of the Board, most of which would have to be eliminated. We'll give and take on a few of the smaller ones but here are \$450,000. of services which would have to be sacrificed without question if the proposal fails. Probably you read the complete list on last week's issue of the Mail so we'll only pick up a few major ones. One, the delayed opening of the junior high school where there are already enough available students to fill it. Two, closing all school buildings at four every afternoon with no usage of any kind on Saturday and Sunday. Three, elimination of cost of living increases for employees, and elimination of hospital and surgical benefits for the same a total amount of about \$61,000. Four, the discontinuance of bus service for pupils less than two miles from school. Six, a reduction in the maintenance section of the schools saving about \$45,000 a year. In this instance no one as yet has tried to figure what it might cost the taxpayers in the future if the school system ever tried to put things back in first class shape again. Seven, complete closing of the swimming pool... and wouldn't that be something when Plymouth for years has been so proud of the fine teams it has had and the excellent swimmers it has developed.

These are only a few of the possibilities you read of last week. There are more. Certainly the administration will try desperately to save what ever it can by jockeying some of these items around but as sure as I put this on paper something has to go if the issue is defeated... and if it is defeated I'm afraid a whole lot more than just school services will depart from this proud community.

I write this knowing full well it is going to cause a real hardship on many of our people. One letter we received from a local resident actually brought tears to our eyes when we read this mother's tale of hardship in keeping her family of children fed and clothed decently enough to even go to school. I know she meant every word she said in her letter, and I am sure we are as sympathetic toward her plight as is anyone, but if her taxes were to increase some 6 to 15 dollars a year she might well be better off than to have the valuation of their little home drop five hundred to a thousand dollars because of the decline in real estate values brought about by a community's failure to support a school system strong enough to interest and hold new residents, new industries, and new businesses. Every manufacturer knows that he can't keep help in his plant if his people are dissatisfied with the schools their children attend. He pays the major share of school and municipal taxes so it will hit him hardest but he also knows he can't run his machines unless he has a satisfied family base under his footings.

I am sincerely convinced we must vote "YES." I have explored and discussed this matter frequently and at length with retiring school board president Harold Niemi, new member elect Ernest Henry, Superintendent Russell Isbister, several parents, several people against the proposal and several local businessmen, and industrialists. There just isn't any other way out than to tighten our belts and shell out the five mills... or five dollars a thousand per assessed valuation, three and one half dollars of which we have been already paying AND ONLY A DOLLAR AND A HALF per thousand in new taxation. Actually it isn't much. We say VOTE YES for Plymouth's future and if you are going to be out of town get an absentee ballot today to do your part in preserving our present cultural level.

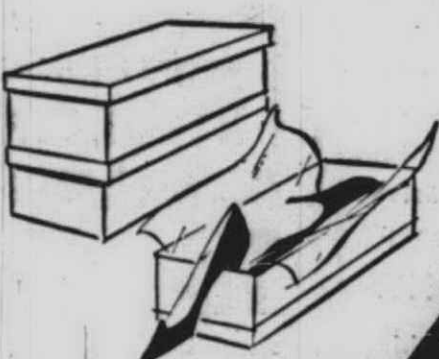

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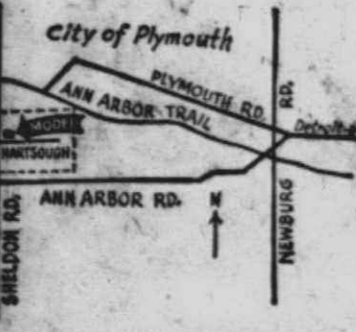

### Local Engineer Designs Fallout Shelter Into New Office Building

"Provide a fallout shelter for 700 persons — in a building now under construction!" That was the first assignment given by Julian R. Cowin, president of Harley, Ellington, Cowin and Stirton, to Milton Lehnhardt, PE, 47095 Saltz Rd., Plymouth, assistant chief structural engineer, and Manfred Stryk, PE, 18011 Kentucky, senior structural engineer, following successful completion of the Office of Civil Defense Fallout Shelter Course at the University of Illinois.

The project involved was the new home office building of The Union Central Life Insurance Company, which the Detroit architectural firm had designed and which was already under construction in suburban Cincinnati.

Cowin explained that to Lehnhardt and Stryk, both of whom were among the first to have completed the OCD Course, the assignment meant providing an area which, in the event of a nuclear emergency, would be completely self-sufficient and adequate in every respect to sustain life for 700 persons for up to 2 full weeks.

"The Fallout Course," Lehnhardt added, "explored ways and means of providing protection against fallout following nuclear attack in both new and existing structures. Studies of radiation effects, the total environment necessary to survive in complete isolation, etc. were aspects well covered. This information was immediately put to work in The Union Central Building — a 310,000 square foot structure of three stories.

"Modification of the original plan was made to provide ventilation, electrical power, cooking and living facilities and communications equipment. Underground installation of a 6,000 gallon oil tank and five 10,000 gallon water tanks was added to the specifications. Building plans were modified immediately so that overhead floor slabs were thickened. In that the shelter area will be in the second basement, only minor alternations to walls enclosing duct shafts and stairways were necessary.

"A decontamination area, necessary for people who might have been exposed to radiation and who would have to be cleaned before entering the actual shelter area, also was provided."

Lehnhardt explained that, as an extension to this assignment, his firm also would make suggestions to provide food, clothing (coveralls and sandals), sleeping facilities (cost of air mattresses which require minimum storage space), first aid equipment,

**Favorite Recipes from Plymouth Kitchens**

Between helping out at her husband's office and her many club activities, Mrs. Ralph Snoke, of 1419 Carol, agreed to be this week's Plymouth Mail guest cook. The recipe she chose, a chocolate souffle pie, is a favorite with her husband and 12-year-old son Don, and, thanks to a sample of this delicious pie, is now on the Mail editorial staff's list of favorites.

**Chocolate Souffle Pie**  
3 bars Baker's German sweet cooking chocolate (4 oz. each)  
3 Tbl. hot water  
2 Tbl. flour  
1 tsp. sugar  
2-3 c. softened butter or margarine  
4 eggs, separated  
unbaked 9" graham cracker crust

Melt chocolate with hot water in top of double boiler. Remove from heat, beat in flour, sugar, and butter, until smooth. Beat egg yolks and add gradually to chocolate mixture, stirring constantly to blend.

Beat egg whites until stiff, fold into chocolate mixture. Pour into unbaked graham cracker crust. Bake in hot oven (400-425 degrees) for 15 minutes. The pie will be soft in the center when removed from the oven, but will set when cooled.

Mrs. Snoke said the pie is delicious when served plain, but is even more so when topped with whipped cream. She added that because the pie is very rich, servings may be small. This recipe will serve eight.

In addition to caring for her family, Mrs. Snoke is active in many organizations. She is past vice president of the Plymouth Symphony Society, membership chairman of the Woman's Club of Plymouth, and was refreshment chairman for the Plymouth PTA this past year. 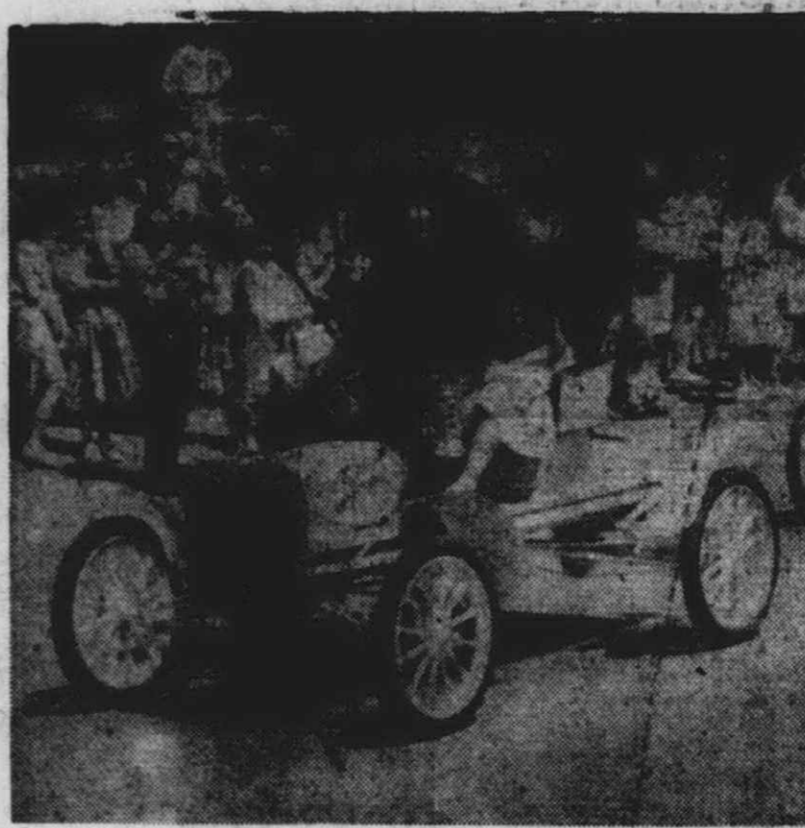
On Thursday eve, June 28, Virginia Bartel was elected president of the Fourth District Past Presidents Is—Was Club. Gertrude A. Danol will

**Agreement Defines Red Cross Duties in Case of Disaster**

Also present was James Houk, 346 Irwin, Red Cross volunteer disaster representative in Plymouth and Henry Maurer, Red Cross field service representative.

The agreement, which is similar to that in effect in many other Wayne County communities, provides that the City will maintain its normal welfare and medical services in case of a natural disaster and that the American Red Cross will augment those services when necessary with the aid of volunteer personnel, services and supplies.

The Red Cross, acting under its Charter issued by Congress, will provide assistance for disaster victims including food, clothing, shelter, medical and nursing care, household building, repair and furnishing, and restoration of occupational materials and equipment, on the basis of need.

The agreement provides that the Plymouth office of Civil Defense will work in conjunction with the Red Cross according to a prearranged plan. The facilities of the Medical and Welfare services of the Civil Defense organization will be co-ordinated with Red Cross activities throughout its participation in relief from natural disasters.

In addition to Houk, other members of the Plymouth disaster preparedness committee are Mr. M. J. Kincaide, 9243 Rocker, alternate disaster representative, Mrs. C. B. Lytle, 1049 Dewey, branch chairman; Mrs. Mowry Arnold, 1311 Williams, and Mrs. C. C. Wiltse, 986 Roosevelt.

Ah, woe is the world, sometimes. The rich are getting richer... or at least it seems that way occasionally.

Neighboring Livonia, it was suggested the other day, is considering floating a king-sized loan in order to build an outdoor swimming pool and an artificial ice rink.

Summer makes an outdoor swimming pool a rather prime consideration, so goes Livonia's thinking, and at the same time Robert Girardin, Livonia parks and recreation superintendent, remembers that more than 500 boys last winter were unable to skate regularly there because of the shortage and unpredictability of natural ice.

Livonia recreation officials met with Garden City recreation director Dick Huebler, a former Plymouthite, to discuss the business of a pool and ice rink.

Huebler is familiar with such circumstances, since Garden City not too long ago passed a \$550,000 bond issue in order to raise funds to build an outdoor pool and artificial ice rink of its own.

It's interesting to note here that recreation funds in both Garden City and Livonia come from a direct fund labeled for that purpose.

In Plymouth it's a little bit different... Funds for Plymouth's recreation program are derived from the school budget and are dependent upon what voters say at the polls whenever a school millage issue arises.

In case you didn't already know, there is such a controversy tumbling around us here right this moment.

If the proposed 5-mill levy is defeated on July 30 here, there is every indication that Plymouth's recreation program will come to a dead halt.

The board of education points out that certain recreation cutbacks — amounting to \$23,500 — will be necessary. It will toss a brick through the recreation department's window and place a firm padlock on its door. It will eliminate all adult education and recreation here.

Another cutback will be the simultaneous closing of the swimming pool, which plays an important part in the recreation department's summer program.

There is a point to be learned here. The life-blood of one important department should not be satellited to another important department. Because it means that as one goes, so goes the other.

School matters and recreation activities are unrelated in Livonia and Garden City. The same might well be the case here. That is, if you're at all interested in a recreation program.

Attendance figures in both the adult education classes and the recreation activities indicate you are.

On a lighter matter, a press release from the Motor City Open the other day provided an interesting observation.

You just never know what's in the wind. Mac McElmurry, head pro at Knollwood, site of the Motor City affair this year, was quoted in the press release to be anticipating some spectacular low rounds, but he didn't think "anyone would take the course apart."

So Pete Cooper fires an opening day 65, which was a new course record, and 35 other contestants break par (which is 71) and 19 more match par figures. There were some 150 first-round entries.

Where was host pro McElmurry? He carded a '74 and was well back in the race. Maybe what he meant was that he didn't think he'd take the course apart. Well, he didn't. But a good many others did.

Elsewhere, a lot of ex-college guys, especially those who squandered study hours in a campus billiard room, paused for a moment the other day over news stories relating the death of Charlie "Show Me the Billiard Shot I Can't Make" Peterson. He was in his 80's.

He once was the world's ruling Red-Ball champion, a curious billiard game that has since gone out of style.

He was also the most amazing trick shot billiard artist a young man could have the pleasure of viewing.

Charlie toured the colleges giving pool tips, billiard hints and sage advice to young hopefuls.

We remember him from about 10 years ago at MSU's Union Billiard Room. He was astounding, and he was decidedly elderly even then.

One shot stands out. He lined up the three billiard balls in their proper spots on the table. One was close to one rail, another was near a corner beneath his arm. He fired the cue ball at the first object ball.

It slammed into the object ball, skipped up on the cushion, rolled along the rail — so help me, Hannah — and bounced back onto the playing surface.

The "English" that he'd imparted to the cue ball took hold when it returned once again to the table top, and the cue ball raced around, hitting two more cushions and then spanking the second object ball.

It was a perfect three-cushion billiard.

Really, I suppose he had about nine cushions, counting all the bounces on the rail top.

A lot of eyes popped at that one.

Charlie had a million of those trick shots.

Unfortunately, the notoriety of billiards, snooker and pool stifled the game for many years. Now, I understand it's on the upswing.

Charlie Peterson helped that upswing.

There aren't many of his kind left anymore.

At the present time, Mrs. Tauriainen and her husband Marvin, a life underwriter for Security Mutual, are residing in Ann Arbor but plan in the near future to move to an area closer to their work.

Future plans also include study in the field of aphasia. (Among the many characteristics of this brain damage is the child who hears but does not speak, and also the child who speaks but is unable to interpret the printed word.) Work has been done in this field only since the second World War when so

many men suffered brain damage during combat.

Children who work with Mrs. Tauriainen not only learn to produce correct sounds but enjoy a close personal relationship with her, and also benefit from her intense interest in their individuality.

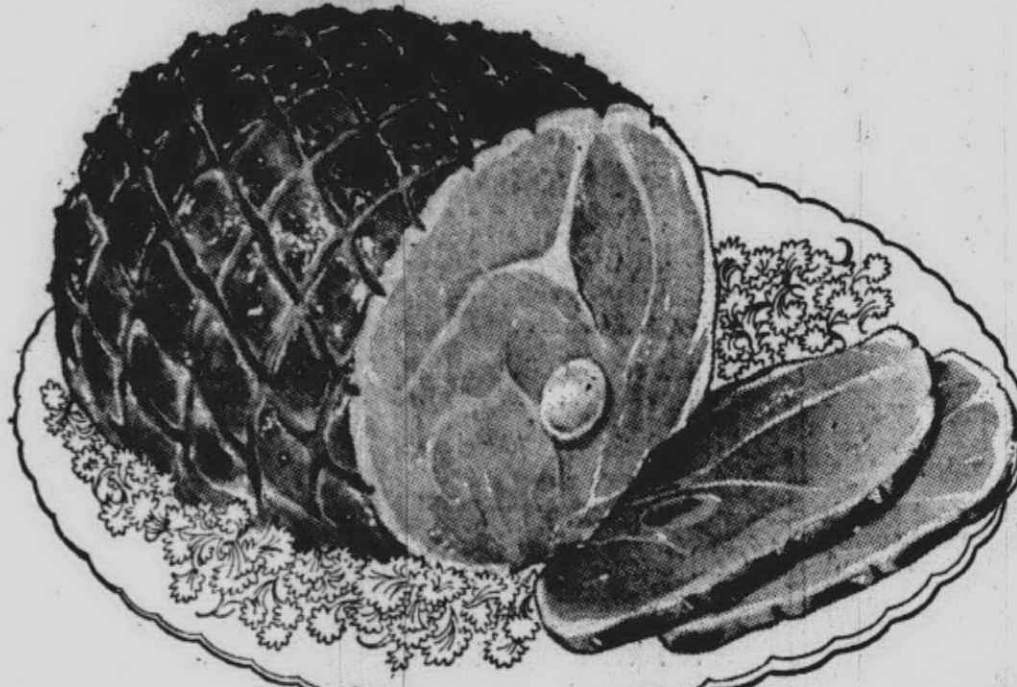

## TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH PLUMBING ORDINANCE NO. 22

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE INSTALLATION, ALTERATION, MAINTENANCE, INSPECTION AND RE-INSPECTION OF THE PLUMBING, DRAINAGE AND WATER SUPPLY SYSTEMS IN ALL STRUCTURES AND PREMISES IN THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH EXCEPT PUBLIC AND CITY WATER SUPPLY MAINS AND SERVICE CONNECTIONS. TO DEFINE THE POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE PLUMBING INSPECTOR; TO PROVIDE FOR LICENSING AND REGISTRATION OF PLUMBERS AND HOME OWNERS WHO INSTALL, ALTER, REPAIR OR MAINTAIN PLUMBING, DRAINAGE OR WATER SUPPLY SYSTEMS; TO PROVIDE FOR THE FIXING AND COLLECTION OF FEES; TO PROVIDE FOR THE ADOPTION BY REFERENCE OF A PLUMBING CODE WITH AMENDMENTS; TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION HEREOF AND TO REPEAL ANY ORDINANCE OR PART THEREOF IN CONFLICT HEREWITH.

### THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. This Ordinance shall be known and cited as the PLUMBING ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH and may be amended under such title. It is hereby declared to be necessary to the public health, safety and welfare of this community.

SECTION 2. The purpose of this ordinance is to establish an authority to control and regulate the practice of plumbing and to ensure the use of proper, safe and approved materials and methods of installation.

SECTION 3. There shall be appointed a plumbing inspector qualified as required by law, whose remuneration shall be set by the Township Board, and whose duty it shall be to enforce the provisions of this ordinance. He shall be responsible to the Township Supervisor or his designated representative in the performance of his duties.

SECTION 4. Fees for licenses, registrations, permits and inspections shall be established by resolution of the Township Board and may be so changed or amended from time to time. Such fees shall be sufficient to pay for the cost of administration and inspections required by this ordinance.

SECTION 5. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance may be fined not less than ten (\$10.00) dollars nor more than fifty (\$50.00) dollars or imprisoned for not more than thirty (30) days or both fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court. Each day of violation shall be a separate offense.

SECTION 6. There is hereby adopted by reference, the official plumbing code of the City of Detroit, being CITY OF DETROIT ORDINANCE NO. 849-E, adopted August 21, 1956, as last amended and as same may be amended from time to time by the Detroit Common Council; and said plumbing code of the City of Detroit is hereby made a part of this ordinance. Any part of this code in conflict with conditions or stipulations now or hereafter expressly set forth in this ordinance are hereby repealed. All references in this ordinance to plumbing laws, codes, rules or regulations shall refer to the said official plumbing code of the City of Detroit.

SECTION 7. It is hereby recognized that, due to ever changing conditions, introduction of new materials and discovery of new techniques and methods, certain parts of CITY OF DETROIT ORDINANCE NO. 849 E AND AMENDMENTS THERETO, known as the Official Plumbing Code of the City of Detroit, may in the future be considered by the Board of Plymouth Township to have become obsolete or inadequate; therefore, the right is hereby reserved for that body, at its discretion, to adopt additional provisions, amend existing provisions or delete certain provisions of this code, by ordinance amendment or resolution, as it may deem necessary for the purpose of providing a Plumbing Code that will best serve the interests of this Municipality.

SECTION 8. That part of Ordinance No. 6 formerly recognized and referred to as the Plumbing Ordinance of Plymouth Township and all related amendments plus any ordinance or part of an ordinance in conflict herewith is hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

SECTION 9. This Ordinance shall become operative and effective on the 17th day of July A. D., 1962, made, passed and adopted by the Plymouth Township Board at a regular meeting, held on the 10th day of July A. D., 1962.
