

## Formal Beginning for New City Hall Draws Near Despite Tabling Action

City Commissioners in special session Monday evening postponed two decisions on the proposed new colonial-styled City Hall here, yet still moved closer toward a formal beginning for the project.

The Commission tabled action concerning appointment of an architect for the proposed \$500,000 structure, and similarly tabled the adoption of the legal articles under which the "City of Plymouth Municipal Building Authority" would be incorporated.

Edward Draugelis, the City's attorney, had previously been authorized to prepare the incorporating articles, which were submitted in draft form during Monday evening's special meeting.

With minor changes, the articles presumably will be adopted this coming week. Actual incorporation of the Building Authority will follow shortly.

The "Municipal Building Authority" which will thus be formed, will be a governmental unit by itself, but will — in essence — be an extension of the City Commission. Direction of the authority will come from the Commission.

It will have the power to sell self-liquidating revenue bonds in order to finance the construction of the new City Hall, and will also be empowered to obtain land for the project through either direct purchase or condemnation.

Later, as legal owner of the City Hall (when it is completed), the Building Authority would rent space to the City's municipal agencies.

At the same meeting, the Commission interviewed four architectural firms, one of which evidently will be designated to prepare preliminary plans for the new City Hall. Two of the firms interviewed are from Plymouth.

No formal appointment of an architect was made at the Monday evening session, however. This move is expected to come next Monday night when Commissioners also adopt the incorporating articles for the Building Authority.

The sudden rush to build a new City Hall here was brought about by the recent passage of the Public Works Acceleration Act by the U.S. Congress. The act allows \$900 million — nationally — to aid local governmental bodies in civic construction, which will stimulate employment.

Michigan's share of the \$900 million is \$90 million, the major portion, presumably, to go into the Detroit area.

Under the terms of the Public Works Acceleration Act, the federal government will put up as much as 50 per cent of the total project cost — in this case approximately \$250,000 for the new City Hall.

However, to qualify for the federal assistance, preliminary plans of the project must be submitted with the request for federal grant-in-aid. This includes an architect's drawing of what the City of Plymouth intends to construct.

A tight time-table hangs heavily over the Commission's collective heads. The actual construction contract for the new City Hall must be let within 120 days after the City makes application for the federal grant-in-aid. For this reason, City Commissioners desire to have as much of the architectural and financial details

cleared up as possible at the time of application.

The application will be made to the Community Facilities Administration, headquartered in Chicago. This federal agency is charged with handling the grants under the Public Works Acceleration Act.

Site for the proposed City Hall is in the vicinity of the Dunning-Hough library, and tentatively situated between the library and the present City Hall building.

Interestingly, no City Commission member may serve on the Building Authority. Building Authority members must be registered City electors and residents of the City for at least six months. They are appointed by the City Commission.

No candidates for membership on the Building Authority were determined Monday night. Instead this move will follow immediately after the Authority has been incorporated.

# Industrial Solicitation To Begin Next Week

Glassford and his divisional chairman will meet Monday morning for a progress report.

Oct. 11 with a kick-off luncheon at the Mayflower Hotel, following which a torch-lighting ceremony will take place in Kellogg Park. Exactly who will light the 1962 Torch symbol had not been determined Wednesday.

Individual team captains will assist Hedlund in distributing the industrial pledge cards next week. The team captains include Robert Fischer, A. D. Johanson, J. B. McKeon, J. E. Orvis, James Guyot, James Van Gieson, Donald Ward and Ken Fisher.

Simultaneously, letters will be sent next week to various company officers informing them that a team captain will visit the industry early in October to discuss the campaign goals. Accompanying the industrial pledge cards will be descriptive brochures, defining the significant role of the Plymouth Community Fund.

One change has been made in the list of divisional chairmen who are aiding general chairman Glassford. Sidney Strong has replaced Frank Henderson as chairman of the professional solicitation.

Henderson relinquished the position due to pressing business matters. Other divisional chairmen in addition to Hedlund include: Reva Barber, residential solicitation; Tom Notebaert, business; and Sterling Eaton, advanced gifts.

A determined effort will be made this year to tell those living in the Plymouth community — yet who work where Detroit's United Foundation conducts a drive — exactly how they may divert their donation to the Plymouth Community Fund.

On the face of their United Fund pledge card, they are advised to write: "Please credit to the Plymouth Community Fund."

Plymouth Druggist Spearheads Fight

Plymouth druggist Robert Beyer — with the help of Attorney Edward Draugelis — is spearheading a statewide effort to restrain a chain store discount pharmacy movement in Michigan.

The battle was scheduled to reach a climax Wednesday in a hearing before the State Board of Pharmacy in Lansing.

Beyer began his battle in May on an independent basis when he learned that Kroger Co. was making plans to open a discount drug store here next to the present Kroger store. It carries the name of Super-X Drugs.

The firm reported to the Board of Trustees that the borings were "the best in the entire metropolitan area for some time."

At the same time, the contract calls for the extension of existing water lines located at Ann Arbor Rd. and Sheldon, beginning water to Parklane Estates subdivision on Sheldon north of Ann Arbor Rd. New homes are presently under construction in the development there.

Similarly, existing water lines on Ann Arbor Rd. in the Township will also be extended from Canton Center west to McClumpha Rd., under the terms of the contract.

Cost of the three projects encompassed in the contract is \$51,677 with funds to come from the present budget. It is estimated that work will be completed by mid-November.

## Double Premium Gives Teachers Added Coverage

In order to provide retroactive participation in hospital-surgical coverage for professional and non-professional employees of the Plymouth Community School District, the School Board on Oct. 1 will make a double premium payment.

It will assure coverage for the employees back to Sept. 1, under the terms of a plan recommended by Supt. Russell Isbister.

Had the insurance plan gone into effect on Oct. 1, it would have deprived employees of eligibility benefits during the month of September, argued the Plymouth Education Assn.

Following passage of the five-mill levy in July, the Board voted to pay one-half of the hospital-surgical premium up to a maximum of \$12.

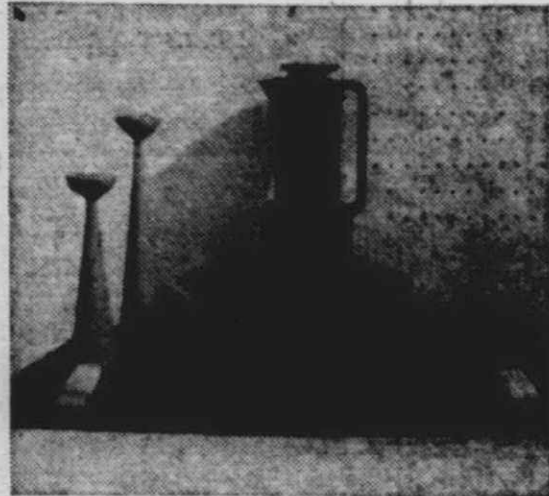

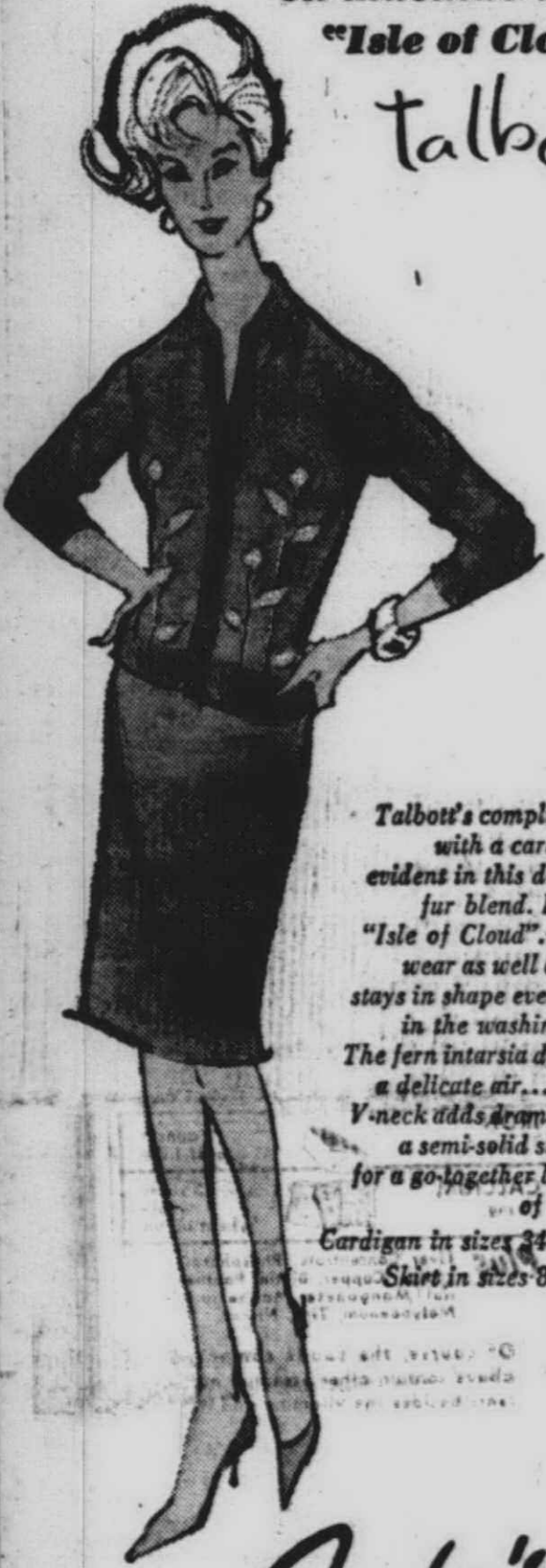

Sun Kissed Glace 3 C. Water 3/4 C. sugar 2 Tbl. cornstarch 4 lemons 2 egg yolks To prepare lemon sauce, bring water to a boil in a sauce pan. Mix sugar and cornstarch and add to boiled water. Cook slowly for about 10 minutes. Meanwhile, juice lemons, grate rind and add lemon juice and grated rind to egg yolks. Whip egg yolk mixture well and add to cornstarch mixture. Cool thoroughly. Makes one pint. To serve, place a generous scoop of lemon sherbet into each sherbert dish, top with two or more tablespoons of lemon sauce and garnish with a very thin center-cut slice of fresh lemon.

## 'Rally Day' Signals Renewed Activities At Lutheran Church

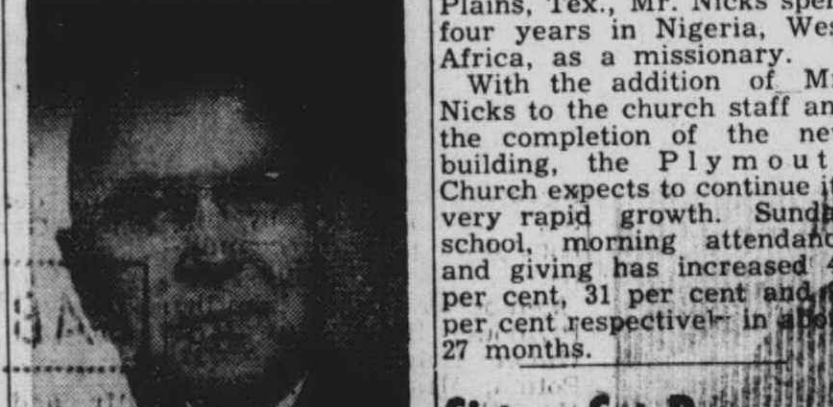

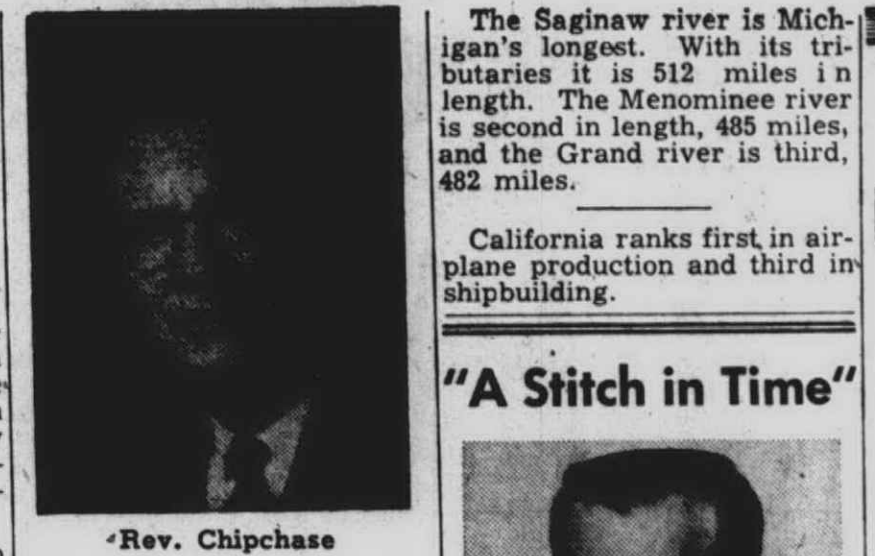

Our University neighbors to the west, Ann Arbor and the U of M, are preparing for one of the most active theatrical seasons ever to be held. Over 30 stage productions will grace the busy boards of the Trueblood and Lydia Mendelssohn auditoriums from September, 1962 to September, 1963. Who said the stage was dying a slow death? Ann Arbor residents are ready to refute such allegations.

What organizations are responsible for all these plays? A New York company of professional actors, the Assn. of Producing Artists (APA) has signed a three-year contract with the University. Professor Robert C. Schnitzer has been named executive director of the project. APA will be in residence in Ann Arbor for twenty weeks presenting a total of eight plays yearly. The Fall Drama Festival starts on Oct. 3 with a new play each week until Nov. 4. "The School for Scandal" is the opening production. Season tickets are still available and can be purchased quite reasonably. Drop a letter to: U-M Professional Theater Program, Frieze Building, Ann Arbor — for complete details.

The APA company has already presented the five plays to be done this fall earlier last spring on Broadway. High praise has been heaped upon the APA by Howard Taubman of the N.Y. Times and Washington critic Jay Carmody: "an acting ensemble not to be missed... brilliant... a special delight." Will Greer is a member of the company that old George will be looking forward to seeing. Mr. Greer always does an excellent job of characterization.

Prior to the opening date of October 3 of the APA company the local Ann Arbor Civic folks will premiere their five play season with "Under the Yum Yum Tree" with the versatile Mr. Heusel directing. A few weeks later the U of M players open their five play season on Oct. 30 with Goldin's "The Servant of Two Masters" in the course, later in the year the Trueblood location. Of course, later in the year Spring Drama Season will bring six plays with professional actors and to round out the season the summer session with five plays. As we said earlier it looks like a full round of theatrical high-jinks for all players in the immediate area.

Wayne State University, looking a bit to the east, has announced their year's schedule of six plays (three classics and three contemporary works of art). "The Fantasticks" the off-Broadway smash, guides off their ambitious season on Oct. 19. Wayne State's season ticket offer of six plays for seven dollars still remains one of the top economy offers in the area. You can get an illustrated brochure about the season by dropping a postal to Wayne State University Theater, Detroit 2, Michigan. One interesting item about the new season: the powers-to-be have added a Sunday matinee at 3:30 p.m. Good idea for those of us out in the suburbs that hate to fight the traffic on those forever-crowded expressways. I recommend the Sunday matinee for less wear and tear on the nerves.

"The Three Penny Opera" starts tonight for what looks like an eight week capacity run at the Vanguard Theater. Marie Powers and Robert Rounseville are featured in this tuneful Kurt Weill musical. My prediction for such a happy combination is that "Three Penny Opera" will duplicate its long run in New

York city and stay at the Vanguard until Christmas at least. "Mack, the Knife" and the "Bilboa Song" are two popular favorites that originated with this musical comedy. Incidentally, "The Beggar's Opera", the ballad opera masterpiece that provided the source for "Three Penny" will be given by the Wayne State University group late in the Spring. And to top it all off the Ann Arbor Civic Players will give "Three Penny" in February. Looks like we're going to have at least a dime's worth or more of opera during the 1962-63 season.

Meanwhile at the Fisher and Shubert Theater theatrical events are still going full steam. "Step on A Crack" opened this week for a three week run prior to opening on Broadway. Nancy Kelly and Gary Merrill were in top form and with a little tightening of the script this production could have possibilities. "Get On Board" lights up the Shubert on Oct. 1. This jazz musical revue should have great appeal to all those folks that like their music on the rhythmic side of the groove.

Over at the Music Hall "The Wonderful World of the Brothers Grimm" continues to amaze audiences. The acting of Laurence Harvey and Karl Boehm rate Academy Award consideration. And there's still plenty of scenery to gawk at in the

production. The eye-filling castles of Bavaria, Franconia and the Rhineland, plus the medieval village of Rothenburg and Dinkelsbuehl have all been beautifully captured on the gigantic size Cinema film. You can't help enjoying the "Brother's Grimm" with its emphasis on story telling. Who doesn't enjoy hearing a story? And the music weaves a magic spell. In fact, it held old George right to his front row center position all during the intermission. The Music Hall thoughtfully has filled most of the intermission period with some stereophonic music from the production. My only wish that is with the next production the entire intermission is filled with music. Helps to kill those hunger pangs and hides the noisy gnawing by thoughtless patrons close by as they munch so crassly on their calorie-loaded candy bars. Oh, yes, old George is on a diet again and so you can be sure that I am in a surly mood most of the time. But "The Brothers Grimm" will do wonders for those blue feelings. Take the whole family it's a swell-egant production from beginning to end.

# Stopped in Final Minutes, Rocks Settle for 6-6 Tie

Plymouth marched into Farmington last Friday afternoon with high hopes and a one-game win streak going, only to be greeted with tough luck and a 6-6 tie for its efforts.

"It just wasn't our afternoon," remarked Plymouth football coach Mike Hoben later. "But we had all the chance in the world to win."

In fact, the Rocks stumbled three times at victory's doorstep — the last opportunity coming with less than a minute remaining.

With the score tied on the strength of off-setting TD's in the third period, Plymouth — late in the final quarter — took the ball at mid-field and moved to the Falcons' one-yard line.

Plymouth's powerhouse fullback, Hugh Sarah, made a last desperation lunge at the goal line on fourth down, only to be stopped short and the ball went over to Farmington on downs virtually as the game ended.

It was the same story on two other occasions for the Rocks.

On the last play in the first half, Sarah raced 22 yards to Farmington's two-yard stripe, but was tackled there as the half-time gun sounded.

"We heeded 24 yards on that play and Sarah got 22

of them," said Hoben. "We couldn't have been any closer right there."

Earlier, it was an identical problem for Plymouth.

The Rocks took the opening kickoff and drove to the Farmington 9 but ran out of gas at that point.

"We made a lot of yardage between the 20's," said Hoben, "but we couldn't do much when we got in close."

Both teams scored in the third period, although Plymouth had the ball for only four plays during that time.

Quarterback Steve Hoffman went the final yard on a sneak and Farmington led with only two minutes left in the period.

On the following kick-off, Dick Egloff returned to the Plymouth 39 and then speedy left half Jim Walasky rambled 46 yards on a weak-side counter play to the Farmington 15.

The Rocks fumbled, but regained possession when Farmington fumbled right back. Then Sarah burst

down to the five on the next play, and moved to the one moments later. Schryer scored on a quarterback sneak.

A misguided pass from center squelched the Rock's extra point attempt.

Late in the fourth quarter, Plymouth engineered its last effort to win. Schryer hit end Mark Schultheiss for 27 yards moving the Rocks to Farmington's 7.

Sarah gained one yard. Schryer picked up another pass at the two and was stopped. Sarah's fourth-down run was short at the goal and the ball went over.

There were 26 seconds left to play.

Plymouth's defense was clicking in the first half while the offense was in good form all afternoon. The Rocks gave up only 13 yards on the ground and 34 yards in the air during the first two periods.

Farmington gained a total of 171 yards during the game. Plymouth had 10 first downs — nine by rushing — and amassed 294 yards all told. Walasky led the Rocks with 68 yards on nine carries and a 7.5 rushing average.

Sophomore Gary Grady contributed 66 yards and

Sarah had 47.

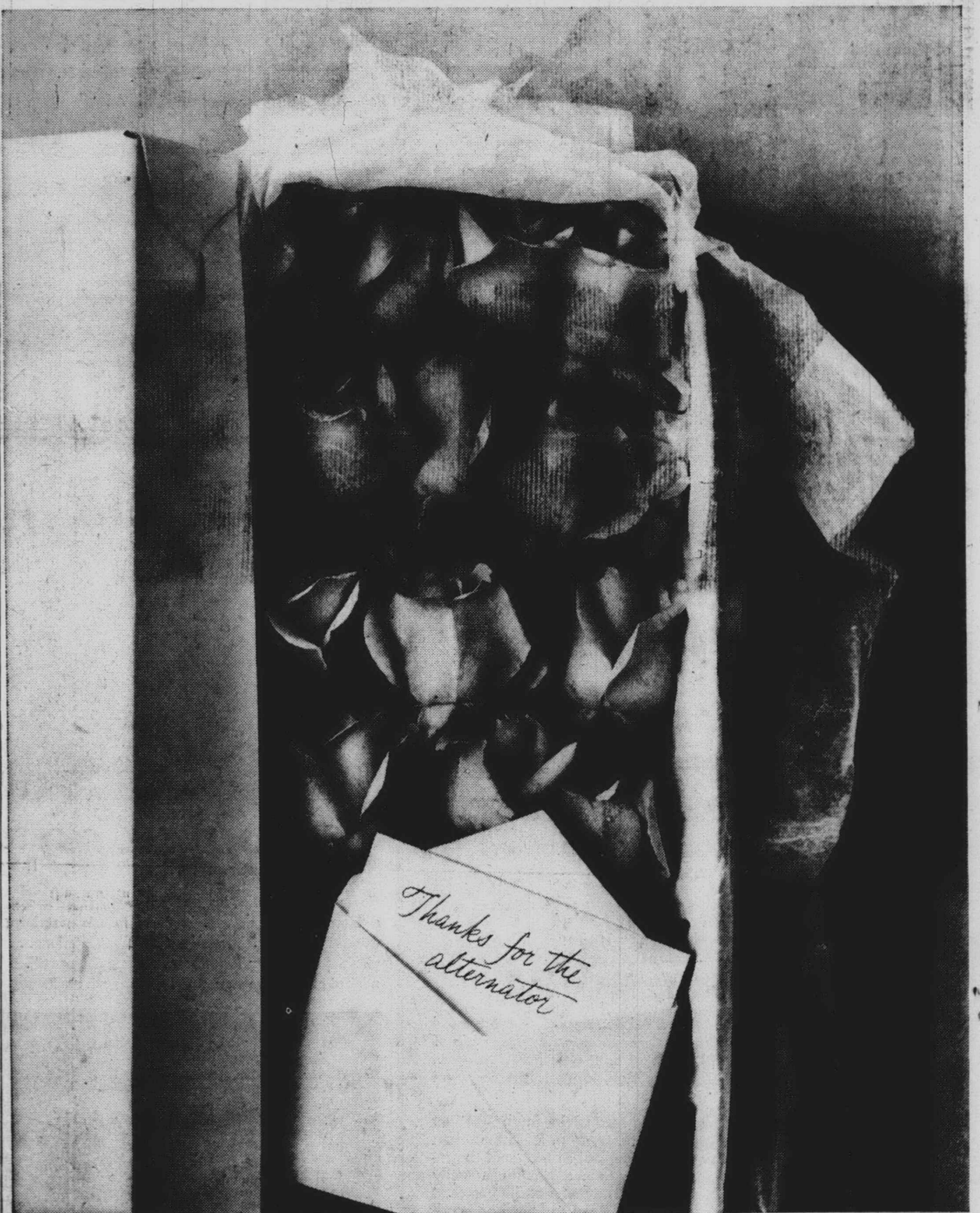

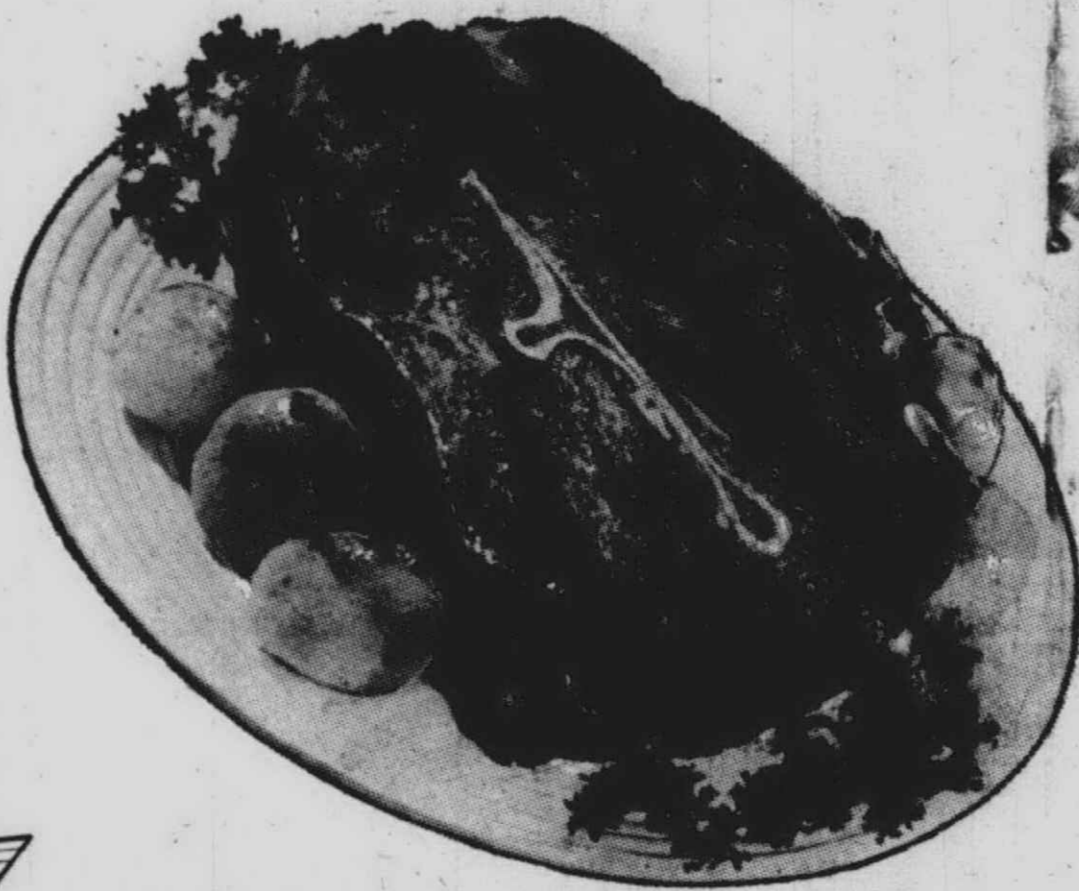

Then we approached a small cross-roads town, and saw two small boys of not more than 8 or 7 years of age. They were trying to "thumb" a ride somewhere—I wondered if their parents knew, and how dangerous this might prove for such small tots.

Leaving the town we came upon two colored men walking down the lonely road—they did not try "hitching a ride" even though there was not a building for the next three miles.

I could not help but wonder about the thoughts in the minds of each of those individuals as they wandered down the highway. Particularly the old man who must have realized that his remaining days on this earth were numbered. Was he reflecting events of his past life; or something that might happen in the days ahead, such as, an illness, loneliness etc.

Yes, I had a notion to stop and interview him, and wish now that I had done so. I probably could have given you a much more interesting human interest story. Someday I will.

# O'Neil Ends 1st Day Of Walk-a-thon Here

Wrapping up the first day of his week-long vote-seeking walk-a-thon, James F. O'Neil, Republican candidate for Congress from the 17th District, was in Plymouth Monday night after having "hoofed it" here from neighboring Northville.

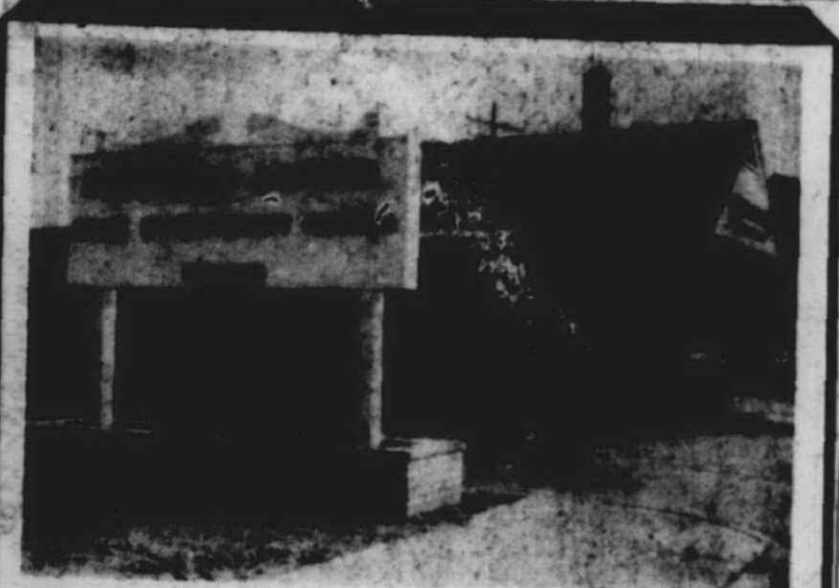
