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Friday Night Sale Includes Musical Note

Shoppers in Plymouth during Friday evening's share of Sidewalk Days will have the opportunity to enjoy a touch of lively musical entertainment beginning at 8 p.m. when the Community Band presents still another free concert in Kellogg Park.

Directed by James Griffith, the 55-member band will perform from a recently-purchased portable band shell, financed jointly by the City of Plymouth and various service organizations here.

The 90-minute program will consist of a standard band repertoire and will include the appearance of a youthful singing trio during intermission.

The Upton sisters, daughters of band member William Upton, of Carol St., will sing folk songs. Youngest of the sisters is six and the oldest is 14.

They also appeared during intermission at this year's first Community Band concert late in June.

Meanwhile, Sidewalk Days — a two-day sale event — should prove to be particularly appealing to budget-minded shoppers here.

The sale begins Friday morning and lasts until 9 p.m. that evening. It will resume Saturday morning and conclude at 6 p.m.

Unique aspect of the sale, which actually marks the end of the annual July clearances here, is a feature whereby display centers and racks are moved onto sidewalks and shoppers browse through — and select from — the merchandise as they walk along.

A regular event in recent years, Sidewalk Days is a Chamber of Commerce promotion, arranged by the Retail Merchants Division and the Plymouth Mail. Most local merchants are participating.

The band concert Friday evening is the sixth in a string of seven conducted this summer by the Community Band. Previous concerts this season have attracted an average of 900 guests. One drew an estimated 1,500 persons to Kellogg Park.

Once again a soft-drink stand will be set up in the park, and proceeds will help further to defray the cost of the new portable band shell.

Win World Series from Pirates

Orioles "Tops" in Junior League

Plymouth's 1963 Junior League season ended last week as the Orioles, champions of the American Division, defeated the National Division title-winning Pirates two games to one in the world series.

It brought to a close another highly-successful Junior League program that involved the participation of approximately 250 players ranging in age from eight to 12.

The Orioles won the American Division crown on the strength of a 12-3 record and entered the world series as a slight underdog in view of the Pirates' National Division championship record of 13 victories in 15 games.

The Pirates opened the best-two-out-of-three playoff with a tight 1-0 victory last Tuesday evening. The Orioles came up with 11 hits, one more than the Pirates.

Thursday evening, the two teams met for the third and deciding game and the Orioles posted another one-run victory, 6-5, to wrap up the local Junior League world series championship.

The game went seven innings before the Orioles settled for a 1-0 win. The Pirates scored in the sixth inning.

One night later, the Orioles evened the series with a 5-4 decision over their National Division rivals. The Orioles picked up 11 hits, one more than the Pirates.

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Water Issue No Closer To Permanent Solution

Ask a Commissioner here what his feelings are on the City's so-called "water problem" and you'll get a definitive answer.

But ask all seven Commissioners, and you'll receive practically seven different answers.

It boils down to one observation: The water problem is really no closer to a specific solution today than it was last fall when the pot was just beginning to boil.

The topic of water will make still another appearance on the Commission's agenda next Monday night. Commissioner Arch Vallier has requested Manager Albert Glassford to add the item to the agenda in hopes of reaching a solution to Western Electric's difficulties over low pressure at its plant on Sheldon Rd.

"We've delayed a decision on water — and the reservoir — long enough," Vallier said at the last Commission meeting, "and I feel it's high time we moved ahead."

He was referring specifically to a previous proposal that the City build a two- or three-million-gallon water storage tank at a site on Beck Rd. Presumably it

would alleviate Western Electric's pressure difficulties and, simultaneously, furnish the City with adequate storage facilities over the years ahead.

For what it's worth, the City is thinking in terms of a 2-million-gallon tank, costing about \$250,000.

Whether the Commission can reach agreement at this time on the proposed reservoir is pure conjecture. A safe guess, however, is that it can't...not today, at least.

And the reason is an age-old one: Detroit water. Once firmly convinced that the City should proceed with its intentions to build a new reservoir, Commissioner Robert Beyer now says: "I'd like more information."

Beyer, one of three hold-over members from the previous Commission, feels that "we've heard so many different facts on Detroit water in recent months that I personally can't make any decision on the reservoir until more information is at hand."

It is doubtful today that even three commissioners would vote in favor of building the reservoir, should Vallier bring the matter to a head. But Vallier is not without support.

Mayor Richard Wernette, a six-year veteran of the Commission and long involved in the various studies of the water situation here, favors moving now on the reservoir. The possibility that the City might receive a second federal grant, this one to aid in constructing the reservoir, does not deter Wernette from his belief that plans to build the storage facility should proceed now.

He is not overly-confident that City of Plymouth will even receive another public works grant.

James Houk, mayor pro-tem, favors waiting a bit longer. "Federal funds may still enter in to the situation," he said, indicating a

hope that the City will eventually receive another government grant.

But Houk divorces the proposed reservoir from any talk that the City may some day take Detroit water. "I don't think Detroit water has any bearing on the reservoir," he said. "We should move ahead on the reservoir whether we take Detroit water or not."

Robert Smith, one of four new Commissioners, feels that a decision on Detroit water has to be made before any definite action can be taken regarding the reservoir. He had some related thoughts on the matter as well.

"If we stand alone on this water matter, I think we're (Continued on page 2)

Joseph Staub, of the Greenspan firm, said the multiple dwelling project might consist of as many as 140 apartments.

It is expected the project will comprise about 12 separate buildings, situated on a 15-acre tract of land. A swimming pool will be among the luxury features.

Although necessary rezoning has been passed by the Plymouth Township Board to permit the project, the Greenspan firm's architects are currently revising plans for the development.

However, Staub said that "we might be able to start work this fall." He said that financing of the project must be worked out and plans for architectural plans have yet to be completed and approved.

Motif of the multiple dwelling project will follow closely that of the single family homes in Lake Pointe Village, Staub said.

Meanwhile, Lake Pointe itself has swelled in size to nearly 550 homes and plans are pending now on another 150 homes. Lake Pointe will eventually consist of about 1,200 homes.

Junior High West Second Phase Ahead of Plan

Moving steadily toward completion, Phase II of Junior High West stands a "good possibility" of being placed in at least partial use by the start of the second semester next year.

That was the announcement this week by Assistant Superintendent Melvin Blunk, in charge of business affairs for the Plymouth school system.

Blunk said both the architect and general contractor have indicated the \$620,000 project could be completed by the end of calendar 1963.

"That's with ideal conditions between now and then," he added.

Whatever the final completion date is, it appears certain to be well ahead of the original planning that called for September, 1964, as the target date for opening.

"There is a very good possibility we will be able to put to use at least a portion of the building at the start of the second semester in February," Blunk explained.

Once complete, Phase II of Junior High West will add another 12 classrooms to the fast-growing Plymouth school system. It will provide space for approximately 400 more pupils.

A \$165,000 sanitary sewer extension in Plymouth Township is expected to enter the construction stage late in September, according to a directive from the federal government which is putting up half of the costs.

# Custodial Pay Scale Outlined

Hard hit by words from the business agent for the local custodial workers' union when a \$2.6 million operating budget was passed recently, school authorities this week released figures on wages for custodians employed by schools here.

It shows that the beginning hourly wage for a custodian — depending on his work assignment — ranges from \$1.88 an hour to \$2.77.

After two years, the scale ranges from \$2.24 as a minimum to \$3.13 at the maximum. There are 12 different job categories, each calling for a specific hourly wage.

Other statistics included mention that the total number of custodial workers employed by the Plymouth system has risen from 21 during 1955-56 to 42 at present.

Since February, 1957, a total of 74 new classrooms have been added here.

Custodial workers received a five-cent across the board pay increase in the new operational budget. The union's business agent termed the raise "inadequate."

# To Recall Early Years Of Telephone

The early beginnings of the telephone industry will be observed Aug. 5, a date that marks the 85th anniversary of exchange telephone service in Michigan.

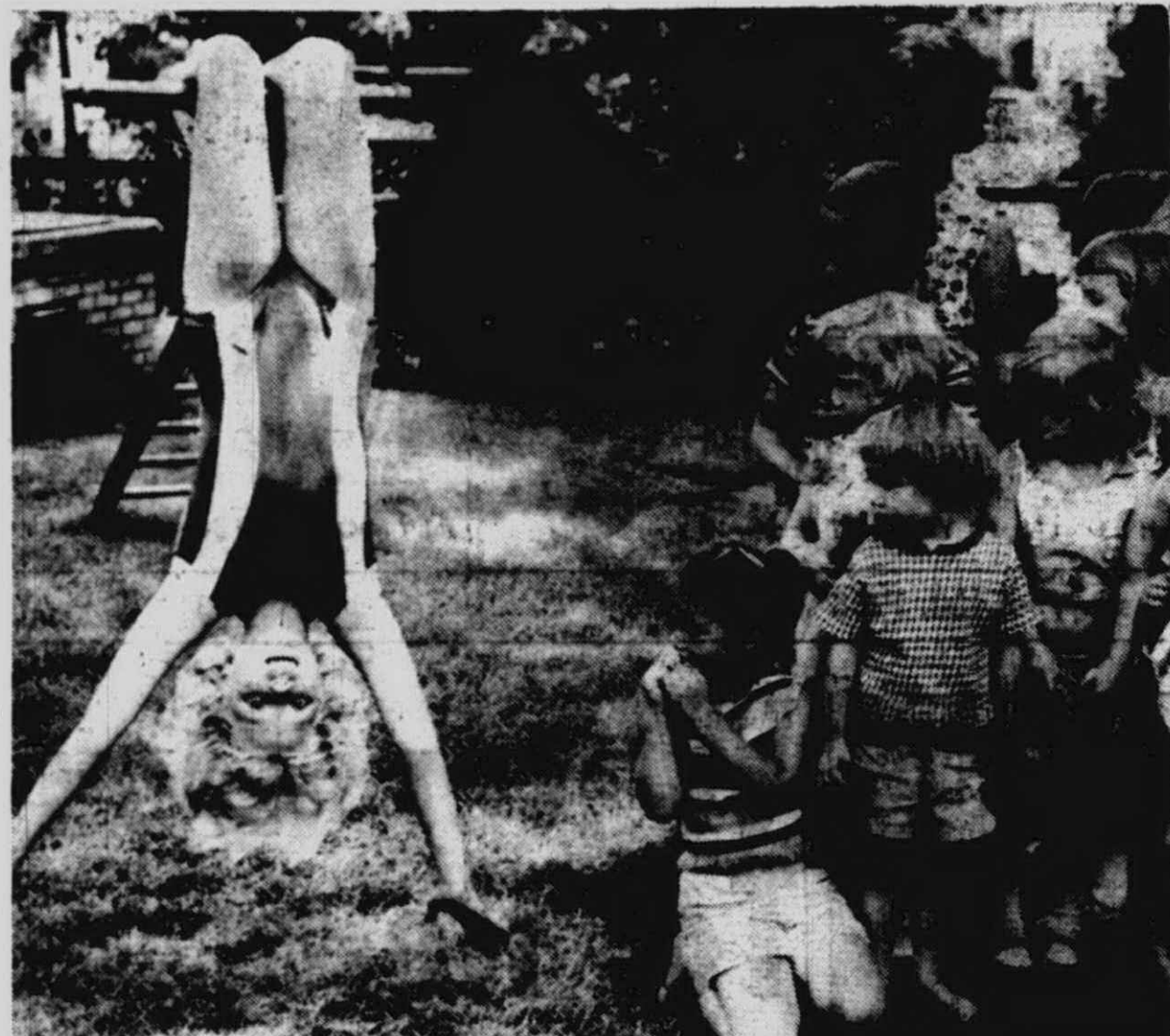
It was on Aug. 5, 1878, that the original switchboard was placed in operation in downtown Detroit. It connected 53 telephones and consisted of a crude box-like switchboard with small manually operated switches to provide interconnections.

The device was Michigan's first telephone exchange, a primitive fore-runner of today's multi-channel service, known locally by Michigan Bell Telephone Co.

Boys operated the first switchboard and reports say they "freely sassed" customers. In 1880, girls were put to work as switchboard operators. A year later, the first long-distance line was put into operation and linked Detroit to Fort Huron. From those early beginnings, the industry has grown to a point where today Michigan boasts more than 3.5 million telephones.

ing Phase II are several storage areas, music practice rooms, a library, a cafeteria, a small stage and accompanying administrative offices.

more likely to impair the growth of the area," he said. "It seems that it would be almost financially impossible for the Detroit system to expand itself much beyond its present position unless we become a Detroit customer."

"The future growth of the area depends largely upon a cooperative effort as far as the water issue is concerned. I don't believe we can stand alone," Smith said.

He indicated he, too, needed more information on which to base a decision.

James Jabara, another freshman member of the Commission, said he was also "not ready to make a decision on the reservoir at this time."

Jabara — like Beyer — said he would "like to see negotiations with Detroit re-

opened in order to obtain the latest information."

George Lawton, elected to office April 1 with Vallier, Smith and Jabara, proposed that the reservoir question be turned into a study. Lawton said he was "not firmly convinced that the Beck Rd. site for a reservoir is absolutely the best one."

Said Lawton: "We don't have to build a new reservoir to solve Western Electric's low pressure situation and, before we do build the reservoir — whenever that is — we're going to have to determine Plymouth's long-range needs."

He divided the "water problem" into three aspects: 1. Source of supply; 2. New reservoir; 3. Improvements to the City's internal distribution system.

**Board Chairman Ronald Hees Says:**

**Personal Touch Key To Down River Growth**

Take an old, but sometimes forgotten, philosophy, put it into use by a new company in a highly competitive industry, and you're bound to find success.

This, at least, is how Plymouthite Ronald Hees, of 42106 Lakeland Ct., chairman of the board and co-founder of Down River Packaging Co., 4301 Lilley Rd., explains the growth and success of the company which will mark its second anniversary this Thursday.

Hees feels that the company's emphasis on the "personal touch," between both employees and customers is the key to the success thus far experienced by Down River.

"The packaging industry is a large and highly competitive business," he said. "During recent years the larger companies in the industry have tended to forget and neglect the customer, turning their attentions toward the moving of tonnage from their paper mills. In addition, the trend towards centralized accounting, impersonal in its nature, has created a void between the employer and employee."

When Down River first opened its doors, on Aug. 1, 1961, then located at 1764 Marie St., the company sought to correct this situation.

Now, two years later, hard work, careful planning and a continuation of the "personalization" policy, have begun to pay off.

Last summer Down River began construction of a new building on Lilley Rd. and

will be doubled in size to accommodate the container offices, scheduling sales service and the production department.

Future plans for the corrugated container manufacturer include the opening of a new plant in California this fall, which in line with its "personal touch" policy and like the Lilley Rd. operation, will be operated and managed by individual plant personnel.

Although primarily a corrugated container manufacturer, Down River has attempted to be diversified in packaging by offering specially products related to containers and customer needs.

The company's two major specialty products are Dor-Kor, a form of expandable honeycomb used by bifold and flush door manufacturers as the interior core for wood, veneer doors and Fome-Cor, an expanded polystyrene sandwiched between Kraft paper to form a rigid waterproof sheet.

Dor-Kor, developed by Hees and Paul Meyer, of Livonia and president and co-founder of the company, provides an even, equally spaced support form upon which the "skin" material may be adhered with a minimum of show-through. Since the core is independently united through its own bonded area, no loose pieces or "rattlers" are possible. Patents for the product are pending in the United States and Canada.

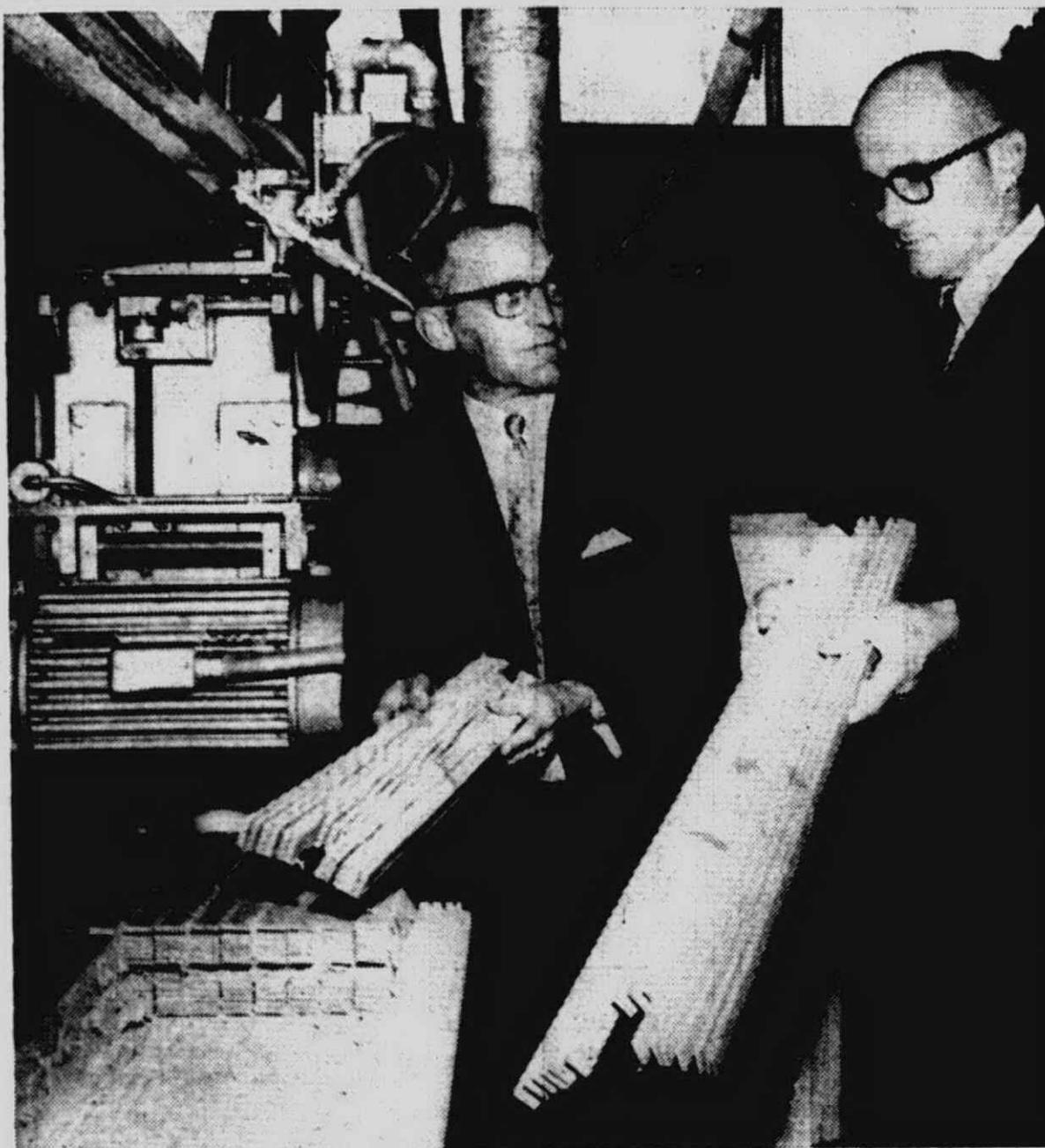
Down River has licensed Union Bag-Camp Paper Corp., New York, to market Dor-Kor in the eastern section of the U.S. and Hoerner Boxes, Keokuk, Ia., to manufacture and sell the product in the central region.

For the past 18 months Down River has had the Michigan franchise for Fome-Cor, manufactured by Fome-Cor Corp., division of Monsanto Chemical Corp.

Fome-Cor, a versatile waterproof arts and drama board, is light to handle, yet rigid and strong, needing little or no wood support, and contains the added qualities of dimensional stability and ease of fabrication.

The product has been used by the J. L. Hudson Co. for window displays, Plymouth High School for scenery, the automotive industry for interior trimming, and by Down River in its finished containers.

In addition to Hees and Meyer, other company officials include Robert Kauffman, of 42370 Schoolcraft Rd., vice president of research and development; Ray Bissell, of 41062 Russett Ln., vice president in charge of sales; and Spencer Thompson, of Garden City, vice president in charge of production.

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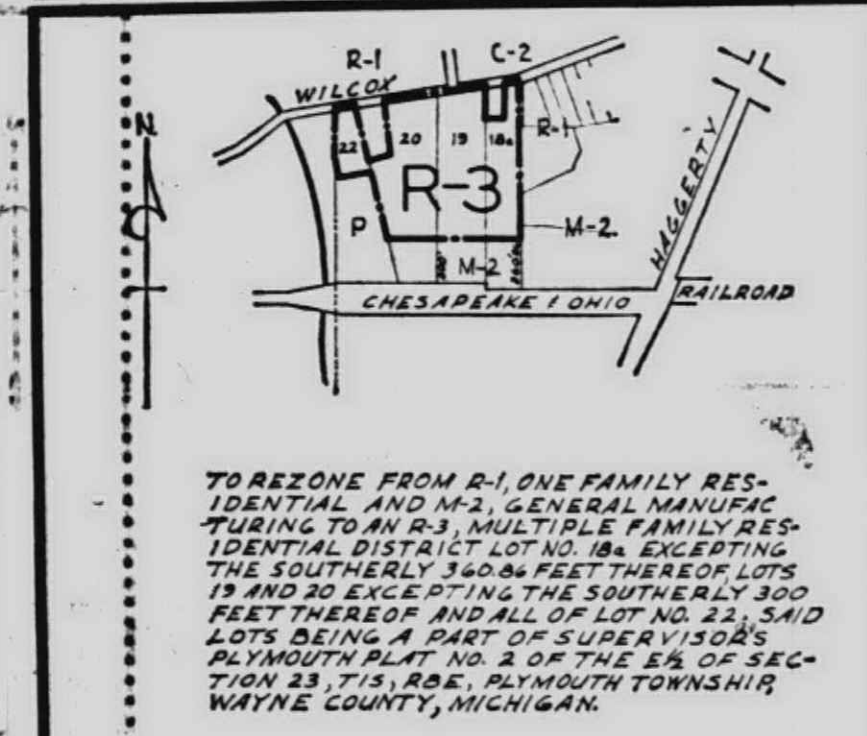

**ORDINANCE NO. XIV-0**  
AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 14, KNOWN AS THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH

THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

PART I. That the Township Zoning Ordinance is hereby amended by amending the Zoning Map, by changing those areas indicated on the Amending Zoning Map No. 204.11, attached hereto and made a part of this ordinance.

PART II Section 2.04 is hereby amended by the addition of the following paragraph to read as follows:

The areas comprising the zoning districts, the boundaries of said districts, as heretofore established and adopted, are hereby amended as shown and provided on the Map attached hereto and marked Amendment No. 204.11 to the Zoning Map of the Township of Plymouth, which map is hereto attached and made part of this Ordinance, and any part of the Zoning Map of the Township of Plymouth as now established, which conflicts with said Amendment No. 204.11, of the Zoning Map is hereby expressly void and of no force and effect

PART III. CONFLICTING PROVISIONS REPEALED. Any Ordinance or parts of Ordinance in conflict, herewith, are hereby repealed

PART IV. EFFECTIVE DATE. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety and are hereby ordered to take immediate effect and be in force from and after the earliest date allowed by law.

PART V. ADOPTION. This Ordinance was adopted by the Township Board of the Township of Plymouth by Authority of Act 184, of the Public Acts of Michigan, 1943, at a meeting duly called and held on the 9th day of July A.D. 1963, and ordered to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.

**Penniman and Main, Plymouth**

Twenty-eight years ago, in 1935, Evalyn and I purchased fifteen acres of land on McClumpha Rd. Having spent most of my boyhood somewhere near Ann Arbor, we were striving to locate in that vicinity. Being in the real estate business in Detroit, we were living in a neighborhood that was becoming very commercial, the traffic was commencing to be heavy, the 'hemmed in' feeling became evident with the central city rapidly spreading out in all directions; we decided that it became unpleasant to live in that area.

As time went on the real estate business went into a tail-spin and I was prevailed upon to take a job as road man for one of the big automobile companies. Accordingly, it no longer made a difference where I lived, and both of us liking rural life decided to look over the location we had purchased in Plymouth Township. This proved to be the best, most exciting and eventful portion of our married life.

After considerable research and investigation relative to our land and new home, it was discovered that we would have to have a well drilled, install our own sewage system, even get Edison to install several poles to get electricity. All this happened in 1938 and in October of that year we moved into our home for which we have never been sorry, and have enjoyed living in the community ever since.

This move seemed to be the beginning of a series of events in our life that we never anticipated. First, we thought we were going to be farmers, this gave us plenty of experience and knowledge we had never thought of before. We had two saddle horses, chickens, and at one time a sow with a litter of pigs. This was all very interesting for the two boys we were raising and sending to school at this time.

World War II broke out, this made a change in most everyone's life. My job was discontinued and I was immediately placed in charge of the main gate security at Willow Run. About a year of this and I was transferred to the rationing department of all items concerning the company, with an office in the Ford Administration building on Schaefer Road. When the war ended the position was naturally discontinued.

Real Estate being my first love, and having kept my broker's license active, I immediately commenced looking around for a business location. During the war much of my time was spent in the City of Dearborn, and most of my business acquaintances and contacts were located there. Nevertheless, the warm friendly greetings we received from the Plymouth Community prevailed, and I decided to open an office here in Plymouth. Locations were scarce around here right after the war, and I was forced to build my own office at the corner of Ann Arbor Road and Oakview, where I am today. The location has been an excellent one, being located on a main highway out away from the congested area.

Recognizing a need for an organization of the Real Estate Brokers in the Western Wayne County area, I started to investigate the possibilities of such an organization and the procedure to organize. With the assistance of Clyde Alexander, who was located on Ann Arbor Road in Livonia Township; Lee Eaton of Northville Realty; George Robinson and Clyde Maben of Wayne, all interested realtors, we organized.

Being elected the organizing president, we were presented our charter as Western Wayne County Board of Realtors in October 1946. The organization started growing immediately and soon became one of the big boards in the national, state and local organization. Today our initial organization is now amalgamated with the United North Western, which makes it one of the biggest boards outside the City of Detroit.

In my experience here as a realtor, I discovered this area had the best potential for growth in the metropolitan area. I have always been concerned about the proper or orderly type of development. We had speakers at several realtor board meetings who went to great length on this subject of development in this area and the unlimited possibilities, so naturally I became interested in civic affairs and Government of my Township and City.

I attended some meetings in the Township and also some special meetings and for a few years was on the Board of Review. In May of 1953 Charles Rathburn, who was then Supervisor of Plymouth Township, passed on. He had been Supervisor for some 28 years with a record to be proud of. He was not only an excellent Supervisor, but also had a good personality and was a sincere friend.

One evening while attending a realtors meeting in the Mayflower Hotel, I received a telephone call notifying me that I had been appointed by the Plymouth Township Board to fulfill the unexpired term of the late Charles Rathburn. It was a great challenge, and I gave it considerable thought before accepting the appointment. That was June 8, 1953. My thought was to follow the late Charles Rathburn's policy while he was Supervisor, as much as I could, and do the best I could from there on until the expiration of his term.

It seemed to be about the time when things were really beginning to happen in the Township. We were beginning to grow up. Along with the Township Board and myself we had the undertaking of establishing several ordinances that became neces-

sary such as heating, electrical, plumbing and building, with governing eating establishments, both itinerant and permanent, peddler and what have you.

Another big item was to improve on the zoning ordinances and also the zoning map, indicating certain areas for certain types of use. We have had several amendments in the meantime. We had sewer and water problems that had to be solved in some way, shape or form, and which took considerable time for the proper development of the Township.

We were held up a few years as everybody remembers, by litigation, by annexation proceedings, which stopped any growth as far as sewer and water were concerned, and until these were cleared away our hands were tied in this respect. We tried to create a sewer and water authority, which after much effort and expense did not materialize; but eventually by steady efforts with the Detroit Water Board, we finally signed a contract with the City of Detroit Water Department to supply water for Plymouth Township.

However, prior to this we had a sewer program covering a good share of the Eastern half of the Township, extending over as far as Sheldon Road to the West, making us about 27 miles of sewer and about 27 miles of water, which has been a tremendous help in further development.

While being Supervisor, I was also serving on several committees of the Wayne County Board of Supervisors, such as the sewer and water committee, Wayne County General Hospital, Wayne County Training School, legislation committee, roads and bridges, and four years on the Ways and Means Committee. Our efforts have not been in vain. Our policies to make this one of the cleanest Townships in the County has materialized. It was not easy to do, but it is worth every effort to keep it that way. We have several plans in mind as to future development, and particularly for industrial purposes, all of which require more sewer and water extension to accommodate and make it inviting for any industry to come in, along with a proper and suitable residential program, all of which in the next few years will occupy practically the whole Township. It has been a wonderful challenge. I have appreciated the opportunity and attempted to carry on to the best of my ability, but will also state that I could not have done these things without the help of my constituents and the wonderful people in the Township Hall.

To my friend and Township resident, Sterling Eaton, for whom I have attempted to write this column, it is hoped that he will be able to sit up and enjoy it with his critical mind of an Editor. I hope, Sterling, your progress from now on will be swift and that you will soon be able to return to your home. The well-wishes of this community have been with you throughout your illness and all of us will be delighted at your homecoming.

The Plymouth Mail Plymouth, Mich. Dear Editor:

In the Detroit News of July 21, 1963 there was an article by the NAACP regarding the OPEN-HOUSING LAW in Detroit. The ordinance is proposed by Councilman William T. Patrick Jr. and Mel J. Ravitz. "The Proposed ordinance calls for a \$500 fine or 90 days in jail for anyone convicted of bias in any real estate transaction, including those by individual homeowners."

If that is what some people want for Plymouth, I want no part of it. Today the rights and freedoms of the individual American property owner are being eroded. This endangers the rights and freedom of all Americans. It is our solemn belief that the individual American property owner, regardless of race, color, or creed, must be allowed, under law to retain:

- 1. The right to privacy. 2. The right to choose his own friends. 3. The right to own and enjoy property according to his own dictates. 4. The right to occupy and dispose of property without governmental interference in accordance with the dictates of his conscience. 5. The right of all equally to enjoy property without interference by laws giving special privilege to any group or groups. 6. The right to maintain what, in his opinion, are congenial surroundings for tenants. 7. The right to enjoy the freedom to accept, reject, negotiate, or not negotiate with others.

Loss of these rights diminishes personal freedom and creates a springboard for further erosion of liberty.
