## Over the Top with \$69,450

# Fund Drive Hits Record Objective

Plymouth's 1963 Community Fund campaign went crashing over the top last Friday evening as divisional chairmen reported total pledges and contributions in excess of \$69,000 at a victory banquet at Lofy's.

With a goal of \$66,480 this year, the precise total reported at the banquet was \$69,450, an amount that surpassed the quota by nearly \$3,000.

It brought an understandable sigh of relief from Fund officials, divisional chairmen and workers alike. At one

point early in the drive, many were more than just a bit concerned that the appeal would fall short for the first time in its 48-year history.

But instead the record of having reached the quota each year since the Fund's inception in 1945 was continued by a heartening margin.

If last year's drive is any indicator, the total donations this year may well exceed \$75,000. Last spring, the 1962 appeal received a belated gift of nearly \$8,000 from Detroit's United Foundation. The same could easily occur again this time, insiders believe.

The total contributions from the 1962 appeal reached slightly more than \$65,000 at a time when the goal was only \$45,050. This time the margin of success was far less.

It is significant that the total thus far this year is a record achievement for the Plymouth Community Fund.

This was the divisional break-down:

As a result of the drive having reached its quota, 12 local agencies will receive full allocations during next year and 22 state and national agencies will share in 15 per cent of the total.

The victory banquet, which indeed lived up to its name, was sponsored by Michigan Bell Telephone Co., Consumers Bell Telephone Co., Edison Power Co. and Detroit Edison Co. as a "plus" contribution to the campaign.

More than 200 workers,

Fund officers, guests and their husbands or wives attended the affair.

Fund President Russell Isbister addressed the gathering. "The Plymouth Community Fund drive," he said, "was indeed a community effort. It was a perfect illustration of people working together with a common and meaningful goal."

"I want to take this opportunity to compliment a and commend all of those who had a part in this mutual effort," he said. General Campaign Chairman Robert Stremich also extended his thanks and congratulations to all of the workers and the divisional leaders who made the drive a success.

Frank Palmer, business chairman, was presented with the traditional large-size "go-go bird" in recognition of his efforts. The business phase raised its highest total in the Fund's history, hitting nearly \$14,000. A year ago, Industrial Division Chairman Elmer

Hedlund was the "go-go bird" recipient.

Other divisional chairman this year received miniature "go-go birds." The other chairmen included: Hedlund in charge of the industrial division again; Sidney Strong in charge of the professional di-

## Will Capitalize for \$6 Million

# New Life Insurance Company Obtains Charter, Opens Here

Plymouth became the official headquarters for the newly-formed Alexander Hamilton Life Insurance Co. last week when the Michigan Insurance Commission granted the company its long-sought legal charter.

The new firm is located at 843 Penniman Ave. in the building that previously housed First Federal of Detroit.

The State of Michigan has granted Alexander Hamilton Life the authority to capitalize at \$6 million through the sale of 1.5 million shares of common stock at \$4 per share.

Sale of the stock shares will get underway about Nov. 15, according to E. Keith Owens, chairman of the board. Owens said the \$6 million authorized capitalization is the largest in the history of insurance companies in the state.

He said that Alexander Hamilton Life Insurance Co. is one of "only a few" insurance companies to be chartered by the State of Michigan in recent years.

Owens, a native of Illinois with a wide background in the insurance business, said that

it was largely through the efforts of the Chamber of Commerce and the non-profit Industrial Development Corp. that the new insurance company selected Plymouth as its home.

A search for a prospective headquarters for the proposed firm began about two years ago. Late last year, the officers of the proposed company acquired the building at 843 Penniman, moved in and began their efforts to obtain a legal charter.

Insurance Commissioner Sherwood Colburn signed the charter into effect last Thursday noon, the second from last day of his term of office.

Owens explained that an approximate 60-man sales force has already been lined up to handle the sale of stock across the state and that these same salesmen represent the core of insurance salesmen that will comprise the new company's field force.

Several High School Bands and other marching units will be invited by the Jaycees to participate.

Ceremonies will include the lighting of the community's Christmas tree and street lights, the arrival of Santa and the dispersal of candy canes to the thousands of kiddies expected to witness the affair. Members of the Plymouth Goodfellows have been asked to handle the distribution of the candy canes.

The Chamber also has scheduled Thursday, Dec. 5, as the official night opening of stores for the balance of the holiday season. More plans of the Christmas opening will be announced shortly. Planners anticipate that some 4,000 children will witness the holiday celebration.

## Committee Called to Study Water

The topic of water hadn't arisen before the City Commission in a couple meetings or more, so Commissioners Monday night did something about it.

They discussed water. Not only did they discuss it, but they also formed a special committee to study the problem.

Purpose of the committee — comprised of Commissioners George Lawton, Arch Vallier, Robert Smith and Jim Jabara

— will be to draw up ground rules as to how the City might conceivably solve its water problems.

The committee plans to meet with federal and state authorities to learn more detail about the City's water resources and specifically what the life expectancy of the City's well field might be.

The subject arose in rather subtle fashion Monday night. Johnson & Anderson, Inc., of Pontiac, the City's consult-

ing engineer firm, recommended the City undertake a "ground water supply survey to determine the extent of water resources here.

Commissioner Vallier challenged the recommendation. He said he recalled that J&A sometime ago reported to the City that its water supply was sufficient "for about 20 years."

A spokesman for J&A could give no estimate as to an ap-

## Reports Show a Multitude of Youth Activities

The members of a Citizens for Plymouth steering committee may have a wider understanding today of the various types of youth programs being offered here, but exactly how to use this knowledge is going to pose some problems.

The interest in the extent of Plymouth's youth activities stems from an earlier inquiry into the matter of

whether the community could stand a so-called Civic Center.

In attempting to decide what should be contained in such a municipal structure — which may well cost \$1 million — the steering committee was urged to explore the need for additional youth program facilities.

Last Wednesday evening, seeking information on that subject, eight steering committee members heard a series of special reports describing

the wide and varied youth activities now being conducted in Plymouth.

It was an impressive list, as chairman Russell Isbister later was quick to emphasize. Isbister is the steering committee leader and the initiator of two Open Forum meetings which have dealt with the question of a possible Civic Center.

(The most recent Open Forum — last September — prompted the inquiry into the extent of youth activities here.)

On hand at last week's informal meeting at Junior High East were representatives from six churches, the recreation department, the public and parochial school systems, and eight service organizations.

Between them all, the representatives described a variety of youth activities that conceivably offers something for every young person in the greater Plymouth area, practically from pre-school age up to the late teens and beyond.

Churches represented included: First Presbyterian; Epiphany Lutheran; First Baptist; Calvary Baptist; St. John's Episcopal; and Our Lady of Good Counsel.

There were spokesmen on hand for the recreation department of the school system as well as administrators from the two Junior Highs and the Senior High.

Service organizations that sent representatives included: Optimists, Plym-

# Precision Controls Company Gets Up Full Head of Steam

Precision Controls, Inc., a subsidiary of Stahl Mfg. Co., of Detroit, is rapidly getting into full operation in the former Continental Can Co. plant here and already boasts of 41 employees, according to plant supervisor Fred Firman.

The Continental Can plant had been vacant for more than two years until this summer when Precision Controls — through arrangements handled by the non-profit Industrial Development Corp. — elected to move into it.

The new firm is engaged in the manufacture of special shaped-wire parts for the automotive industry. With 41 employees to date, the company expects to have upwards of 100 when it reaches full capacity. Meanwhile, plans for a 90-foot by 90-foot additional warehousing building are being contemplated in order to free existing space for manufacturing purposes.

Precision Controls is located at 800 Junction. As a result of the company's arrival here, there is no remaining idle factory space in all of the City of Plymouth.

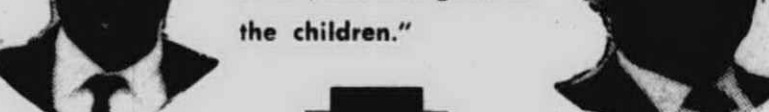

to spiral upwards and the City's will increase to only about 12,000 at its maximum capacity.

Ultimate total population of Plymouth Township is being estimated at somewhere between 50,000 and 55,000. This is, of course, still several years away.

Not only did Plymouth Township and City show healthy gains in population, but so did Canton Township, a portion of which is contained within the Plymouth Community School District.

Canton grew from 5,313 to approximately 5,600, according to the regional planning commission's report. Canton's ultimate population figure is expected to exceed 35,000 eventually.

outh Firemen's Association, JayCees, Boy Scouts, YMCA, Plymouth Youth Club, Rotary and Kiwanis.

All-in-all, it was an exceptionally enlightening two-hour meeting. But how the information gleaned from the session will aid the steering committee is far from clear.

As Isbister himself put it the next day:

"Plymouth's young people are almost 'over-programmed' in one sense and still there is obviously a segment of the youth of the community that is not being touched despite the extensive activities offered by various agencies and organizations."

The YMCA supervises and sponsors the Hi-Y, Tri-Hi-Y, other youth organizations. It also has formed the Youth Employment Service and has found work for 300 of 400 young persons who have registered.

Plymouth Firemen's Association conducts frequent dances for the 13-19 age group. Optimists have a budget of between \$1,200 and \$1,500 and sponsors dances, a bicycle safety rodeo, subsidize athletic teams and contribute toward an oratorical contest.

Churches have similar programs, most of them tailored to the specific needs and desires of their respective congregations.

The recreation department has a summer program that lures 3,000 youngsters and a winter program that attracts 1,500. It is heavy in athletics, but features a variety of handicraft and cultural classes, too.

Endless other youth programs are also offered.

The next day, Isbister explained that he would attempt to compile a series of observations as put forward by his steering committee in a brief meeting following the reports. He said he will have the list of observations early this week.

He said the steering committee would meet later this week to discuss what the next step might be.

The committee ultimately will attempt to assess the need for further youth facilities as well as provide some tentative proposals for direction of the existing youth activities program here.

Beyond that goal, the steering committee eventually hopes to recommend what sort of a Civic Center would best suit Plymouth's needs.

One of the questions it must answer, of course, is whether a "youth center" should be included in any plans for a Civic Center or Auditorium.

It will be a tough decision.

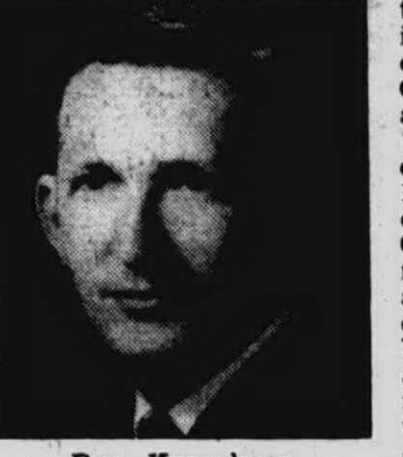
**Saline Minister Sunday Guest of Methodists**

Studies of major municipal and school problems with helping hands and constructive recommendations to these groups is a Chamber of Commerce function.

Retail promotions and suggestions from a skilled expert should be presented in depth to the business segment of the Chamber membership. Experience in plotting survival from the many encroaching shopping centers for the local merchant is most certainly another Chamber function.

I could fill pages with the responsibilities of a Chamber of Commerce including parking, traffic control, modernization, etc. In fact, only a week or two ago I read with interest the problem presently being encountered by the Chamber in Ypsilanti. The Chamber there alerted its membership to the fact Ypsilanti builders were not building new homes within the city limits and they pointed out the fact that there were two reasons for the condition they had uncovered. The reasons . . . Ypsilanti zoning and building restrictions were so constrictive that home-town builders were forced to build their new homes elsewhere. What did the Chamber do? Presently there is a study of these problems underway spear-headed by the Chamber and meetings are being held with city fathers to change these conditions so that Ypsilanti builders will build their new homes in Ypsilanti.

Now I hope someone doesn't purposely choose to misinterpret my thoughts as presented above and let me state for the benefit of all concerned they are a consensus garnered from all corners of this community.

There is a concern today by merchant and industrialist of how his dollars that he gives to many things are being spent and if he is getting all he is entitled to for his generosity. Plymouth is "BIG" in its willingness to endorse and support meaningful undertakings.

But, there is considerable concern, which prompts this writing, on the question as to whether or not the Chamber is accepting its full responsibility to its membership and why it isn't providing the kind of assistance outlined above since they are prime Chamber functions.

Interestingly enough everyone knows that to provide these services will cost a lot of money but, also interestingly enough, practically everyone will be willing to pay for the increased service.

The small businessman is faced with two problems today, margin of profit and survival. If, today, he pays \$25.00 dues he'll gladly pay \$50.00 if he knows there is some trained specialist on the alert for his problems and out planning and trying to improve the whole community as a better place in which to live and to work.

This is no indictment of the present Chamber operation, its personnel or past officials. I think they have done a most creditable job but they need more money to provide the additional skilled talent and enlarge their services to business and industry. It is a condition brought on by changing times and it is, in our opinion, a necessary move if the community is to keep pace with the ever increasing progress springing up on our boundaries.

Michigan State College tells me they have an intensive seven days course, held once each year, meeting some 14 hours per day in which already skilled Chamber executives participate yearly and receive accreditation after a six year completion dealing with all of the subjects outlined above plus many, many more. At the end of six years Chamber executives then enter another yearly academy where even more intensive study is made of ever changing problems and their solutions are applied back to the hometown area by charting experiences of trials and errors of others.

This type of service and experienced person is needed in Plymouth. It's needed by the Wendell Lents, the Sterling Eatons and all the rest. If it will provide the talent to help make this a "BETTER PLACE IN WHICH TO LIVE AND WORK," and to solve some of our many problems, then to the new officers and Board of the Chamber of Commerce let me be the first to say . . . start your solicitation now for funds to provide this kind of expanded service and when you say it's done I'll write my check for double my last years dues.

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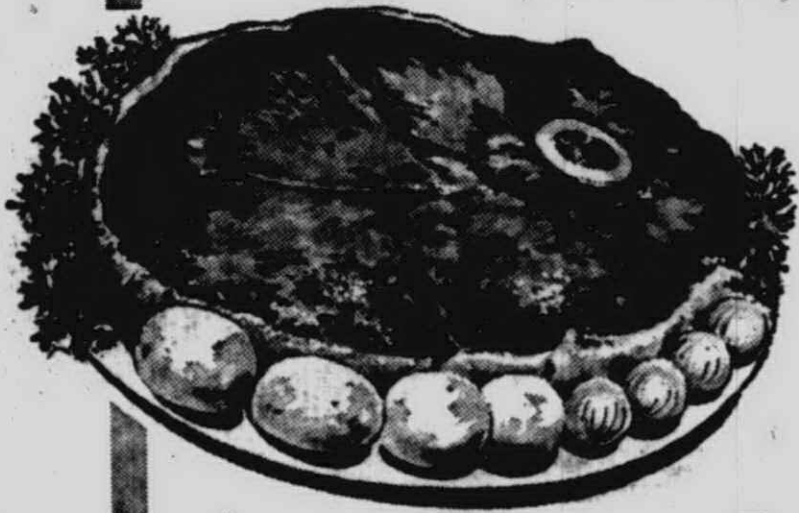

Walled Lake is beginning to dread Plymouth High like a terrible, contagious plague these days.

The reason was emphasized last Friday evening when the Rocks overran the Vikings by a 12-7 score and added a blenish to Walled Lake's previous unbeaten record.

It also marked the fourth time in the past decade that Plymouth has managed to spoil what otherwise would be a perfect season for Walled Lake.

And over the same span, Plymouth and Walled Lake have faced each other eight times and the Rocks have captured seven of the contests, bowing only once. It makes sense why Walled Lake couldn't care less if the Plymouth gridders were abruptly erased from the picture.

Plymouth's coach, Mike Hoben, was quick to point out that the Rocks won much of their grid-iron success this year "up front."

"If you had to single out any one thing where the (Walled Lake) game was won," he stressed, "it would be in terms of line play."

John McFall and Tom Workman are the two culprits who assembled what might rank as one of Plymouth's best lines in history. McFall, perhaps better known as the Rocks swimming coach, is — during the fall — Plymouth's interior line coach. Workman, an assistant swimming coach, is the Rocks end coach during football season.

At any rate, the two "did a tremendous job," according to Hoben. It shows up in the won-lost record for Plymouth this year.

McFall's efforts — combined with those of Hoben's — are widely in evidence over the past decade.

Since Mike Hoben came to Plymouth as the Rocks' head football coach in the fall of 1955, the local gridders have enjoyed some of the finest seasons in the school's history.

After nine years at it, Hoben has helped Plymouth to a 52-15-3 record for a .742 winning percentage. McFall's work in building outstanding lines has contributed measurably, as has Workman's efforts in more recent years as far as the ends are concerned.

Over Hoben's span at Plymouth's helm, the Rocks have racked up two outright league titles, two co-championships, one perfect season, another (this one) when only a tie marred the year's work.

"It has been the balance of this year's team that has made it a good one," Hoben said most recently. He hesitated to rank it as the best high school team he has coached here, but he was full willing to put it high on the list.

"Maybe we've had better individual performers in past years," he commented, "but never have we had the fine overall balance that we did this fall."

"A tremendous amount of credit for this goes to McFall and Workman who combined to build an absolutely fine line for us this year."

In the past 11 years, Plymouth has either won or tied for seven Suburban Six league football crowns, starting with three in a row under Charlie Ketterer (1952-53-54) and adding four more under Hoben since the autumn of 1955.

In 1957, Plymouth was 6-0 for the year and in '58, the Rocks assembled a 7-1 mark for their toil. That 1957 unit would have played two more games, but an attack of the flu caused the cancellation of the final contests of the season.

Thus — in nine years under Hoben — the Rocks have played only 70 games, whereas they might otherwise have done battle in 72. In the last seven years, the Plymouth gridders have lost only 10 times and tied three. That's out of 54 contests. An impressive record, no matter how you slice it.

Off the strength of its 1963 record, Plymouth ranks high in the state — among Class A teams — and also dominates the Suburban Six All-League selections, announced Monday.

Plymouth placed three players on the All-League first team, added two more to the second team and had seven players acknowledged as honorable mention recipients. No other single team in the conference did so well, in the combined eyes of the six head football coaches around the circuit. The coaches select the conference "dream teams."

On the subject of what Plymouth will have on hand next fall, Hoben will lose the talented services of such stalwart performers as guard Hal Smith, tackle Kevin Huntington, end Dick Egloff and fullback David Agnew, among others. But he will still be able to turn to Roger Tobey, John Daniel, Gary Grady and a host of proven performers from this year's team.

If this year — and the past eight years — are any indication, Hoben will weld still another fine football squad next fall.

As we have mentioned in the past: If winning isn't fast becoming traditional with Hoben-coached football teams, it is most certainly a commonplace occurrence. And the fans and players alike welcome the result.

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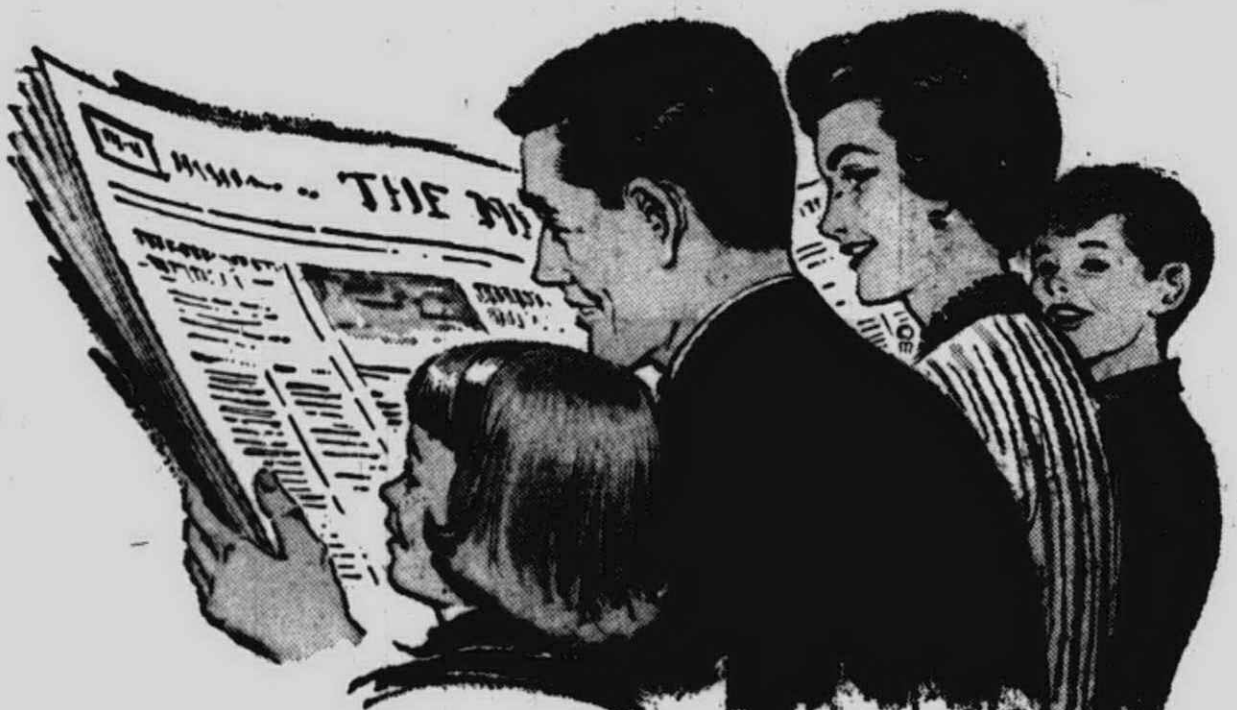
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# Rocks Edge Vikings, 12-7; Remain Unbeaten

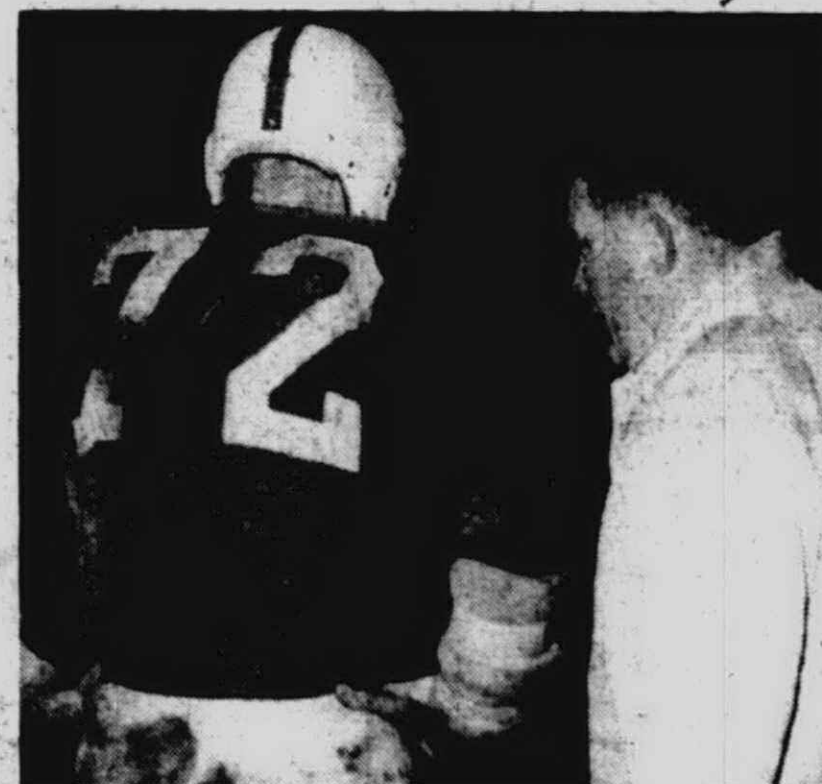

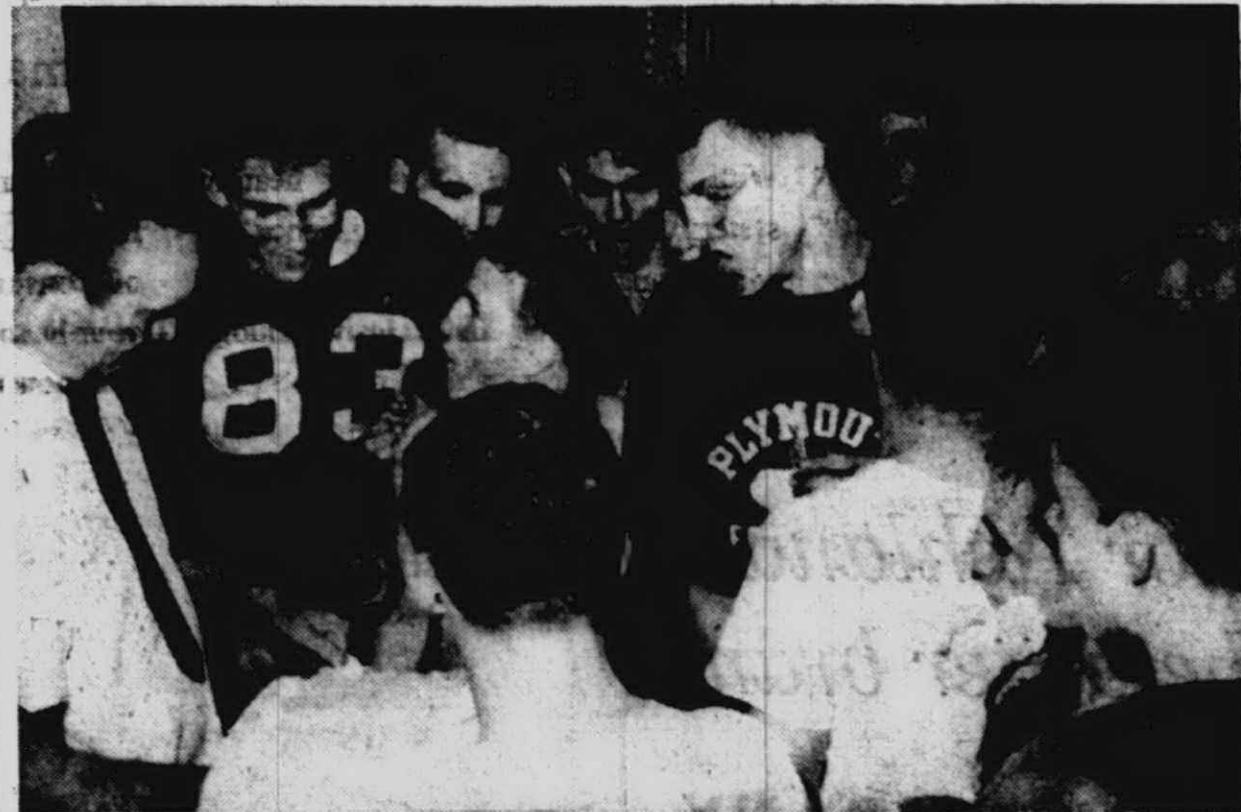
