## Christmas Parade Thursday Is Start Of Santa's Visit

A triumphant Christmas parade through the streets of downtown Plymouth this Thursday evening quite likely will attract as many grown-ups as it will the good little boys and girls of the community.

The reason is simple: Santa Claus, the jolly gentleman whose white beard and red suit become style-setters each year at this time, will be the featured attraction in the parade.

He also will begin his traditional visit from his little red shoe house in Kellogg Park following the conclusion of the parade itself.

Organized by Ron Coosaia, as a project of the Plymouth Jaycees, the parade will begin at 6:30 p.m. Thursday. This is the parade route: After forming a long line of march will be along Forest Ave. east to Main St., north on Main St., east on Penniman Ave. to Union St., north on Union St. to a dispersal point mid-way up that block.

Santa Claus himself will be the final attraction in the parade and will disembark from his special holiday vehicle adjacent to Kellogg Park, there to greet youngsters and to begin his holiday "office hours" in his red shoe headquarters, which is sporting a bright, new coat of paint.

Plymouth's Goodfellows will be passing out free candy canes to all youngsters along the route of the parade. Coosaia has lined up nearly two dozen various clubs and organizations which will enter floats and displays in the parade.

Attendance is limited to 200 couples, so it is advised that those planning to attend not wait until the night of the dance to purchase their tickets. They may be obtained from Mrs. Conrad Krinkel (GL 3-4454) or at Melody House, 770 Penniman, Plymouth.

Eleven door prizes of silver serving pieces will be offered. The public is invited to attend. Proceeds will benefit the Symphony Orchestra.

Tickets may still be purchased for the Plymouth Symphony League's annual Symphony Ball which will be held this Saturday, Dec. 7, at Junior High School East, from 9:30 p.m. until 12:30 a.m., with Les Shaw and his orchestra.

## School Election Voters Approved \$4.2 Million

The 1,945 voters in last week's special school millage election were having the say-so on at least \$4.2 million in school revenue between now and December, 1969.

That's considered to be the bare minimum the 8-mill tax package — heartily renewed Nov. 25 — will produce during its life span.

More precisely, the 3 1/2-mill operating levy, which runs from December, 1964, through December, 1968 inclusive, will produce some \$1,867,500 at a minimum.

Similarly, the new 4 1/2-mill building and site sinking fund, which runs from December, 1966, through December, 1969 inclusive, will create at least \$2.4 million in revenue.

These are minimum figures based on the approximate \$107 million current state equalized value of the School District. The state valuation is expected to rise well above that amount between now and 1969.

In fact, if it doesn't the District will have giant cause for concern. While no local school official has said so, the School District's state equalized value could conceivably exceed \$110 million — a jump of more than \$3 million — when the new valuation is announced next spring.

Beyond that time, the exact value of the District is open to conjecture. It will go up as construction in the District continues. It will remain constant, should construction come to a stand-still.

According to a letter sent out recently to the study committee members, the Local Board of Education "has become increasingly aware of the need for an expansion and updating of programs which are specifically designed to prepare students for employment at the completion of high school."

Members of the study committee were given six "top priority" goals in the letter which went out over Fischer's personal signature. The goals are:

1. Expand further the cooperative occupational training program.
2. Establish close communication with Schoolcraft College to avoid duplication of facilities and programs in vocational training.
3. Begin now to plan a program in a automobile and power mechanics.
4. Begin now to offer a program of instruction in food service skills which will open avenues of employment in the local community.

5. Give added emphasis to the value of work experience in developing proper attitudes and habits of work.

6. Survey the need for and recommend what to include in the new facilities which should be built to house the expanded vocational program.

Fischer's move to appoint the study committee followed a recommendation by the entire Board of Education, the letter pointed out.

Supt. Isbister explained the purpose of the study committee as being one whereby the vocational education program at Plymouth High will be strengthened — particularly for those youths who go directly from high school into permanent employment situations.

Presumably, much of the activity that now is being centered on the vocational training curriculum here results from the efforts of the highly successful Y M C A Youth Employment Project.

Mike Hoben, a member of this new study group, also administers the employment project and has turned up considerable evidence showing that many local high school graduates are ill-prepared to enter the working world.

Those high school graduates who complete a "college preparatory course" at Plymouth High are well schooled to compete in college classrooms.

But those local high school graduates who do not choose to continue their education are often-times found to lack the fundamental skills that otherwise would enable them to compete for worthwhile jobs in today's economy.

It is this predicament the School Board hopes to resolve, by relying partly on the findings of the new study group.

Previous facts entered in evidence during the frequent curriculum reviews will also figure heavily in an ultimate decision.

## Seek Stronger Curriculum For Vocational Students

A 14-member study group to explore in depth the immediate needs of Plymouth's public school vocational training program has been formed at the request of School Board President Gerald Fischer.

With Board member Ernest Henry as chairman, the study committee will evaluate the current vocational training curriculum and make recommendations as to how to strengthen it.

The committee has been instructed by Fischer to attempt to complete its task and report its findings by Feb. 15.

Fischer and Supt. of Schools Russell Isbister comprise two ex-officio members of the study group.

Other members of the committee are Esther Hulsing, a School Board member, too; school faculty members Carvel Bentley, Philip Johnson, John "Mike" Hoben, Merle Atchinson, Keith Baughman and William Campbell; Paul Malboeuf, a local resident who was appointed by Gov. Romney to the State Board of Control for Vocational Education; James Dotseth, of Schoolcraft College; Douglas Shelby, of the Wayne County Intermediate School District; and Kai Jabara, of Plymouth Tank and Fabricating Co.

The study of the vocational training curriculum arises out of a series of curriculum reviews conducted over the past two years by the Board of Education.

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City Commissioners didn't cope with any earthshattering developments during their regular meeting Monday evening, but still they dealt with a succession of business matters that demanded policy decisions.

It was one of those Commission meetings when the dry routine of helping run a City showed through without a touch of glory.

Not even the water situation cropped up to make matters more interesting. Among the items that did hold the Commission's attention, at least briefly, were:

1. The disposal of a junked auto to a 4-H youth group in Canton Township.
2. A resolution commending Plymouth High's football coach and unbeaten 1963 football team.
3. The extension of an occupancy permit for a light industrial firm occupying a business place on Forest Ave.
4. Recognition of the recently-formed City housing commission and appointment of members thereto.

All-in-all, the meeting passed swiftly and was adjourned in less than an hour's time.

The housing commission was formed by resolution about two months ago and the ordinance legally creating the new body was drawn up by Edward Draugelis, the City's attorney.

However, not until Monday evening did the Commission get around to appointing members to the 5-man body.

Purpose of the newly-formed commission is to explore the possibility of constructing housing for the elderly here through the use of federal funds. Commissioners have been told that there is no cost to a local government in such a project.

Mayor Richard Wernette recommended Kenneth Fisher, Stewart Oldford, Jr., William Silvis, Robert Webber and William Nelson to membership on the group, and the ordinance legally creating the Commission promptly confirmed the appointments without objection.

Oldford was named for one year, Nelson for two, Silvis for three, Webber for four and Fisher, who is also the

City's director of public safety, for five years.

City Clerk Richard Shafer was named housing director in accompanying action.

Wernette explained later that one of the responsibilities of the commission will be to prepare the paper-work necessary so that the City will be in a position to request federal assistance at

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## Voter List 'Purge' Gets Underway

A "purge" of voter registration lists — in compliance with state law — is about to get underway and some 1,600 Plymouth voters are on the brink of becoming ineligible if they don't act swiftly.

Plymouth Township Clerk John D. McEwen intends to send out about 300 warning cards later this week, telling those Township voters that they have not voted at a local, state or national election in the past two years.

Similarly, City Clerk Richard Shafer will be mailing out just about the same number of reminder cards to voters living in the City of Plymouth.

The cards explain that the voter has not cast a ballot in two years and if he doesn't fill in the card and return it to his respective clerk's office within 30 days he faces immediate ineligibility.

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## 200 Voices Give Boost To Concert

Some 1,000 guests are expected at Sunday afternoon's popular Christmas concert presented by the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra in the Senior High gymnasium. The program will begin at 4 p.m. and is free to all comers.

Highlighting the holiday concert will be a performance of Bach's Christmas Oratorio featuring the Kenneth Jewell Chorale, of Detroit.

Nearly 200 other choral voices, including members of the PHS choir, the First Presbyterian Church choir, the First Methodist Church choir and the St. John's Episcopal Church choir, will assist in the program.

Fred Nelson directs the high school and Presbyterian Church choirs. John Flowe directs the Methodist Church choir and Robert Towne is director of the Episcopal Church choir.

The Kenneth Jewell Chorale, an ensemble of 30 voices consists of professional singers formed about two years ago by the head of the fine arts department at Detroit's Osborn High School.

The Chorale appeared with the Plymouth Symphony last April and was well received at that time. Jewell himself, director of the Chorale, has masters in music from the University of Michigan.

He has directed the choirs at Interlochen National Music Camp since 1949 and was an associate conductor of the Rackham Symphony Choir in Detroit for nearly 14 years.

Prior to becoming director of fine arts at Osborn High in Detroit, Jewell was a vocal music director at Pershing High for 15 years ending in 1957.

The 100-piece Symphony orchestra will be under the direction of Wayne Dunlap. A baby-sitting service will be provided at no charge — for youngsters two years of age and older.

## Huge Mountain of Mail In Store for Post Office

The crushing mountain of Christmas mail that annually is moved through the Plymouth post office beginning about this time of year is expected to be considerably larger this season.

In fact, Postmaster George Timpona estimates that the increase over last year's holiday surge of cards and parcels may be better than 10 per cent.

Peak days for outgoing mail are expected to fall between Dec. 15 and Dec. 18, Timpona said. He explained that the big rush of in-coming mail will probably be between Dec. 19 and Dec. 22.

"We're busy every single day during the holiday season," Timpona said, by way of further explanation, "but from Dec. 15 to Dec. 22, several days when we handle several hundred thousand pieces of mail daily."

He said that as far as the post office is concerned, the holiday season is already in full swing. Merchants around town will back this up in spades, too.

But the similarity between the rush of Christmas mail and the crush of Christmas shoppers ends abruptly about Dec. 22, Timpona said. He figures that all of the mail will have been "cleaned up" by no later than Monday, Dec. 23.

And everywhere presumably will be doing a land-office business during those final two days before the big holiday itself.

A bit of research at the post office shows that during the period of Dec. 8 to Dec. 21 last year, postal employees here handled more than 1.7 million pieces of in-coming and out-going mail. This season, Timpona is geared for a flood of 2 million pieces during a comparable period.

While he doesn't plan to take on any extra mail carriers, he has hired a few additional sorting clerks to help out during the holiday rush.

It is in unique contrast to years past when the post office here often hired upwards of 100 temporary employees — most college students home on vacation — to help during the mountainous surge of holiday season mail.

### Dick Egloff Named All-State Gridder

Dick Egloff, 17-year-old team captain and end on the Rocks' league championship grid squad, was named to the first string of The Detroit News' all-state team over the weekend.

The Detroit Free Press named Egloff to its second string all-state squad at the same time.

The 6-foot-1, 195-pound senior had been widely acclaimed previously for his football talents. He was a major contributing actor in the Rocks' surge to a 1963 conference crown and an unbeaten season.

Earlier, Egloff was a unanimous selection on the first string Suburban Six all-league team and made both The News' and Detroit Free Press' all-suburban teams.

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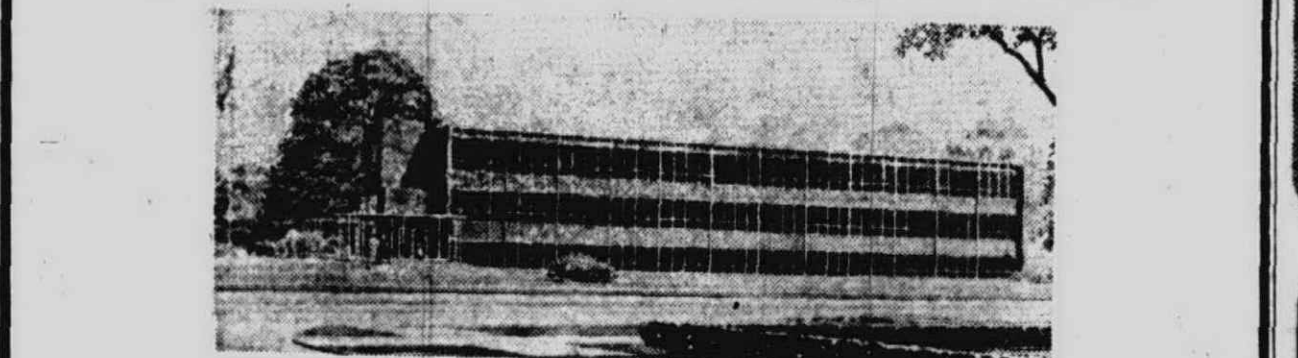

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**Suggested Name Change Receives Little Support**

A recent suggestion to both City and Township officials to consider changing the names of Ann Arbor Rd. and Plymouth Rd. has met with little favor among residents of Plymouth, The Mail learned Friday.

Harlan Hickerson, of 9595 Gold Arbor and a 10-year resident of the community, has suggested that the name of Ann Arbor Rd. be changed to "Plymouth Rd." and the present Plymouth Rd. be changed to either "Main St." or "Mayflower Rd."

The Mail learned that neither the City nor the Township has been encouraged by other residents to pursue Hickerson's suggestion.

Township Supervisor Roy Lindsay said Friday that he had received "maybe four or five phone calls on the matter and all of them were opposed to the idea."

City Manager Albert Glassford said he had received one mention of it and that, too, was a voice in opposition to Hickerson's suggestion.

Hickerson, meanwhile, says he has talked to "at least 100 residents." He says only one person thus far has objected. He said he made the suggestion to eliminate the confusion that now exists.

Postmaster George Timpona has announced the hours the Plymouth post office will observe during the holiday season.

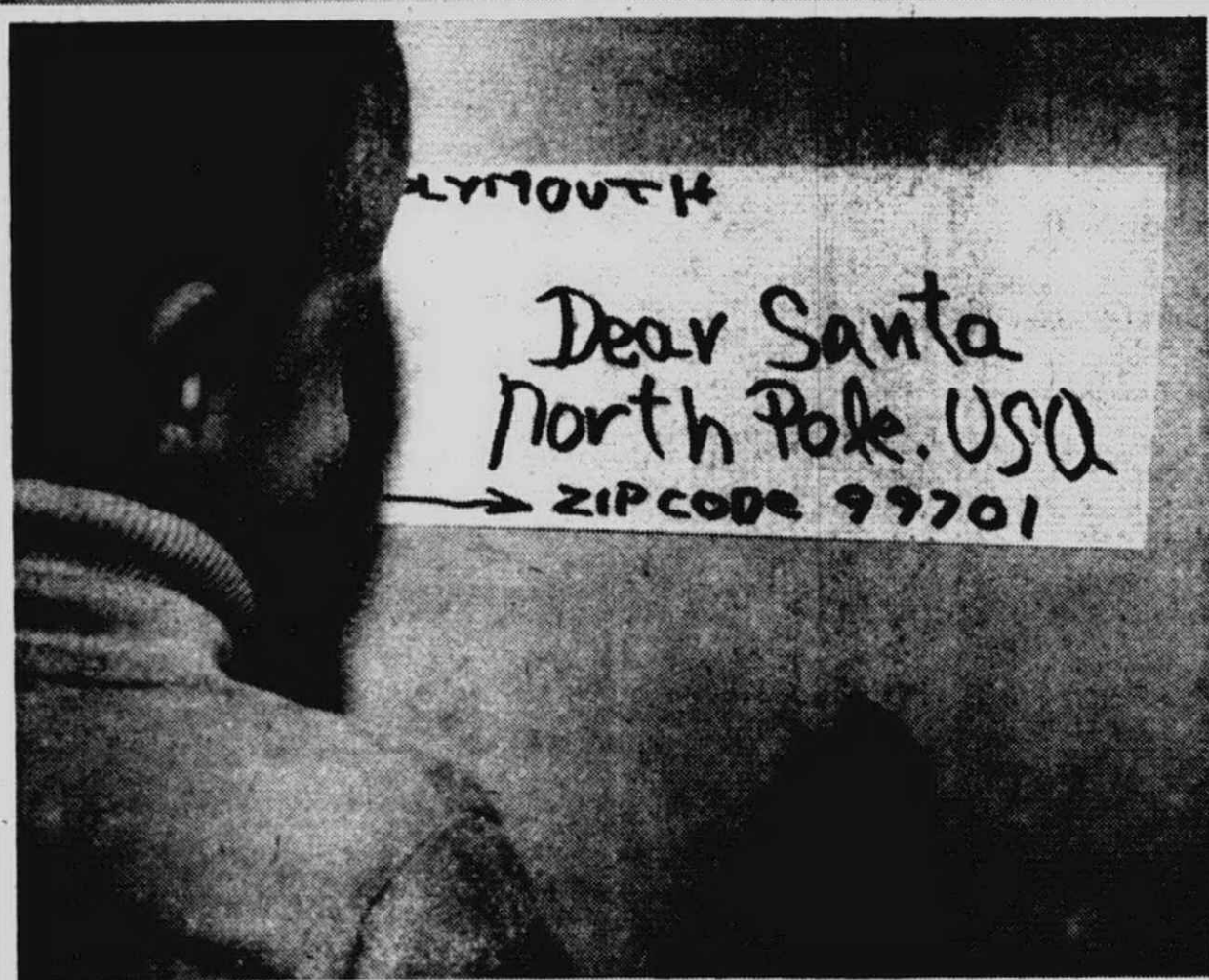
There will be window service at the post office between 12 and 4 p.m., Sunday, Dec. 15, he said.

The letter is written by Mr. and Mrs. Harry Madge, of Leeds, England. They twice have visited Plymouth, once in 1961 and again only last October. Among their acquaintances here are the Kellys, Dr. and Mrs. Ford Sutherland, Mr. and Mrs. Garland Wright, Mr. and Mrs. George Hudson, Mr. and Mrs. James Randall and Mr. and Mrs. Tivadar Balogh.)

Leeds, England  
Nov. 22, 1963

Dear All:

The news over the radio this evening has absolutely shattered us both. To hear that President Kennedy had been shot and injured was a dreadful shock but to be told half an hour afterwards that he had died seemed just unbelievable.

I find it terribly difficult to know what to say, because

whatever is said cannot alleviate one bit your great loss and, indeed, the loss to us all over here.

We feel this more deeply having just had that wonderful month and we do say with all the sincerity we can that your loss means just as much to Madge and me since in our little way we liked to think of ourselves and ourselves as one happy family. Now, part of that family has tragically gone.

Please, all of you, accept our deepest sympathy and know that our thoughts are with you. Whatever our politics or views, Mr. Kennedy was a great man and no man can give more for his country than his life.

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

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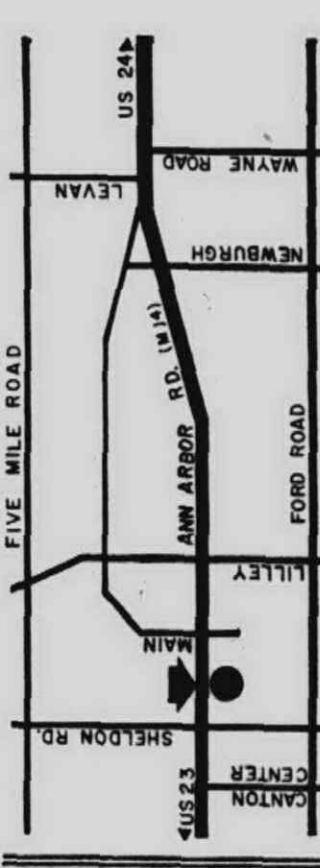

(Continued from Pg. 1, Sec. 1) since it is the responsibility of his office to put the statements in envelopes, stamp them and place them in the mail. The approximate amount of the collection being made by the City, according to Way, is \$1,105,000. He won't know the precise amount until all of the individual tax statements have been totaled, another chore that befalls his office. Interestingly, the City is not at this time collecting its own municipal taxes. Instead, the levy during the winter is for school, county and community college taxes. In the summer the City collects its own municipal tax. Thus, City property owners pay taxes in two stages. It is not the same in the Township. There, property owners get tapped just once by the Township, on behalf of its own needs as well as those of the county, schools and community college. Mrs. Holmes said the Township's total roll this year amounts to \$2,180,182. Of this, the Township's portion is \$254,460, the county's is \$422,785, the School District's share is \$1,442,938 and the community college will receive \$60,847. The Township's state equalized valuation is \$60,847,610. The Township levies 3.5 mills for its own use and another one mill for the college. The balance is shared by the local School District and Wayne County. In both the City and the Township, the current taxes are due and payable through Jan. 19 without penalty.

(Continued from Pg. 1, Sec. 1) It could fall if local assessment figures are reduced or if the county or state equalizing factors are lowered. "Equalization" is certainly one of the most confusing aspects of taxation ever to greet an ordinary taxpayer. There are about three basic steps involved before the final valuation of a school district is reached for a year. 1. Local assessors pass on to the county the assessment figures pertaining to their respective municipalities. 2. The county applies an "equalization" factor against the local assessment figures, presumably for the purpose of "bringing into line" the various reports filed by the local assessors. Quite obviously, the county feels that assessment figures vary from one local assessor to another. 3. The county then forwards a "county equalized valuation" figure to the state, where again another "equalization" factor is applied. This, too, is for the purpose of "bringing into line" the 84 county reports which also vary among each other. Finally, the state informs each individual school district exactly what its "state equalized value" is for the coming year. The Plymouth School District is presently working on a state equalized value of \$106,681,964, a figure set forth by the state last May.

City Commissioners several weeks ago had heard a full-scale report on a housing-for-the-elderly project as presented by a firm that engages in this type of construction. Exactly when federal funds might become available for this type of project is not known. The matter over the "junked auto" was a bit on the lighter side. Autos impounded by the City are stored at the DPW yard on Junction St. They are mostly worn-out cars that have simply been abandoned. Commissioner Arch Vallier learned that a Canton Township 4-H group, which meets at the vacant Cherry Hill School, was seeking an old auto to use as part of a mechanic's project. He proposed the matter to his fellow City Commissioners. The end result was agreement among the Commissioners to give a junked car, worth about \$15, to the Plymouth Kiwanis Club, which has been helping the 4-H club in other ways. The Kiwanians will, in turn, give the car to the 4-H group for use in the mechanic's project. In another matter, the Commission agreed to extend an occupancy permit for two months for Micro-Tech Co. which presently is located in the former Kroger store at 355 Forest Ave. Micro-Tech officials have explained they presently have a building under construction in Ypsilanti and it is expected to be completed in about two months. At that time, the local company will move from Plymouth and the former Kroger store will fall vacant again. Commissioners unanimously passed two proclamations one commending Plymouth High football coach Mik Hoben for his overall contributions to the community and the other citing the PH football team which this fall fashioned an unbeaten record in eight games. Hoben is gaining wide acclaim, not only as a coach but also as the administrator of the YMCA's youth employment project which has helped innumerable unemployed young persons in Plymouth find worthwhile work here.

Twenty-five years after he starred from Plymouth High in three sports and a bit of a fourth, Doug Egloff is a belt notch or two wider and maybe only half as nimble. But over the weekend he added an indirect claim to further sporting fame when his second eldest son, Dick, was announced as a first-string selection on The Detroit News' All-State football team for 1963.

It makes Doug twice the father of an All-state football player, since his first-born boy, Randy, now a senior at Yale, was picked as an All-Stater by both the Free Press and the dead Detroit Times in 1959.

Dick's achievement this season keeps Doug's record intact, so to speak, and gives him a chance at four-for-four, as they would say in the baseball world. The reasoning of this is rather ordinary since Doug and his wife, Irene, have two more athletically-inclined boys, one named David, 10, and the other entitled Ronald, who is 8. Both like to play football, too.

But back to Doug, whose real name is Orlan although he doesn't necessarily remind you of the fact in casual conversation.

One day late in the spring of 1938 — after the baseball season had ended — Doug was asked to accompany PHS' track team to the regionals in Ypsilanti and participate there as a shot-putter. Needing exercise perhaps and being plain agreeable to boot, he readily accepted, made the journey, placed third in his event and a little later learned he had earned a varsity track letter for his brief efforts.

It was not the sort of thing that brought him a deluge of congratulations nor other endless commendations. However, when he sat down and figured it up, Doug realized he had accumulated a total of 10 varsity letters at Plymouth High, one more than usually is considered the maximum.

He'd won three each in football, basketball and baseball and — unexpectedly — added the tenth one in track during the waning days of the 1938 season. Interestingly, as a senior he was awarded honorable mention on the Detroit News and Detroit Free Press all-state football and basketball teams.

But it's the 10 varsity letters that somehow hold up today. Maybe he didn't mean to, but he accomplished something that none of his four sons is likely to match or improve upon. When Randy graduated from PHS four years ago, he had assembled nine varsity letters. Dick, with six letters to his credit already, presumably will add two more before high school is behind him, making a total of eight.

If Dave and Ron Egloff follow the family pattern, they still have only scant chance of winning better than nine letters. It's understandable. Baseball and track schedule-wise conflict with each other and, besides, how many track coaches are going to ask a baseball player to fill in at the last minute as a shot-putter?

In the Navy during World War II, Doug played both football and baseball and later, back in Plymouth after the war, played city-league basketball and recreation softball.

Today, his athletic endeavors are limited to golf. He plays a pretty mean piano, however, as part of an amateur trio that also includes his older brother, Russ, and Francis "Red" McGough. Russ plays the tenor saxophone and Red is on drums. The three performed the other evening out at the Elks Lodge.

After 10 years with the All-State Ins. Co., Doug now is a partner in the Giese Co., of Detroit, a firm specializing in all sorts of fire-damage repair work.

Dick Egloff, a sturdy teen-ager packing 195 pounds on a 6-foot frame, has already had 10 college inquiries regarding his future football-playing interests. Among the schools that asked is Michigan State, and Dick says he would like to play football for a mid-western college.

He may only wind up with eight varsity letters at Plymouth, but he'll prize the three in football the most.

As a sophomore, he went both ways at end. The past two seasons he has alternated between end on offense and a line-backer on defense. His well-learned skills at both positions helped measurably this past fall as the Rocks rolled unbeaten through eight games and added a conference championship as well.

Much like his brother before him, Dick made the two all-suburban teams this fall before all-state recognition this weekend. For two years in succession, he has been named to the Suburban Six All-League squad.

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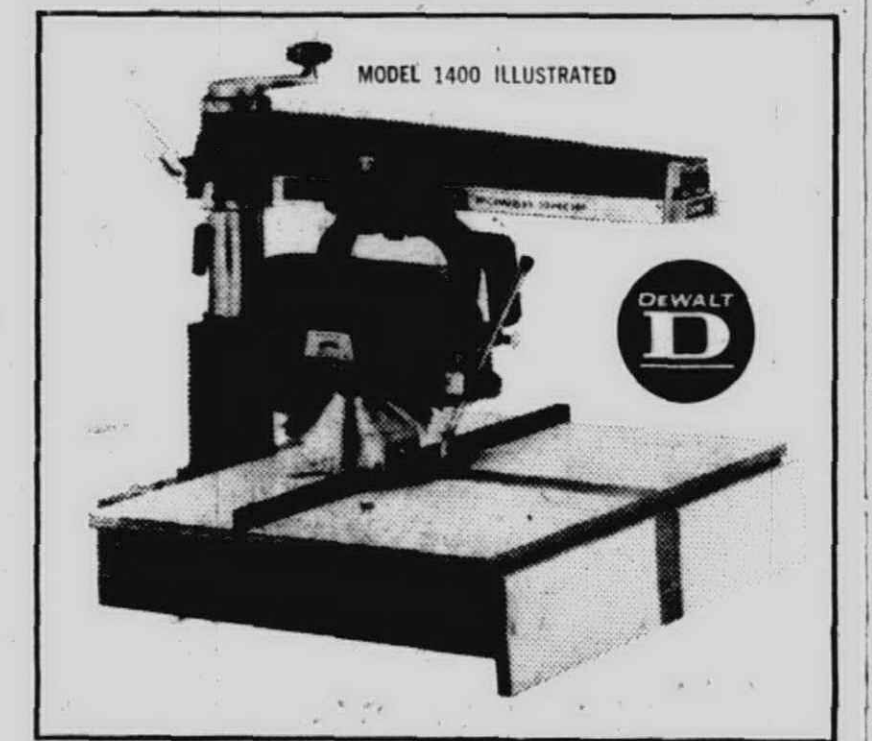

# Commissioners Salute Grid Coach, Players

Plymouth's winningest football coach, Mike Hoben, and his unbeaten 1963 football team will be special guests of the Elks Club here Tuesday evening, Dec. 10.

## Urges Band Shell Advisory Board

In a written report to City Commissioners Monday night, Manager Albert Glassford urged the formation of a "band shell committee" to serve as an advisor to the City Commission.

He also suggested that the use of the recently-acquired portable band shell be free for such events as annual Memorial Day ceremonies, the Fourth of July and all summer band concerts.

The City purchased the \$9,200 band shell with the financial help of various service clubs here. Glassford's report suggested that a \$50 fee be charged for the use of the band shell by any profit-making organization.

## Cage Rule Change Affects Playing Time

The 1963-64 State Basketball Rules Committee met in Lansing, September 23, for consideration of the 1963-64 Basketball Rules. Out of this meeting came some rule changes that will be important in the time it takes to play a game.

One of the changes is that the referees must hand the ball to the thrower for all throw-ins except those made from outside an end line following a score.

Another important change is that a time-out occurs

when an official signals a violation. In previous years the clock only stopped on jumpballs, charged time-outs and fouls.

This year officials are not allowed to take time-outs for slight delays such as replacing a shoelace or replacing a shoe.

One of the former rules that

the committee wished this year officials to emphasize is the one that states it is a violation to excessively swing the arms and elbows while protecting the ball and there need not be any contact with the opponents to receive a foul.

There were other minor changes and modifications

made but most of these will go unnoticed by the fans because of their lesser importance.

Again this year after the fourth personal foul in each half the bonus rule will go into effect which means that a player with one-shot foul will receive another if he makes the first shot.

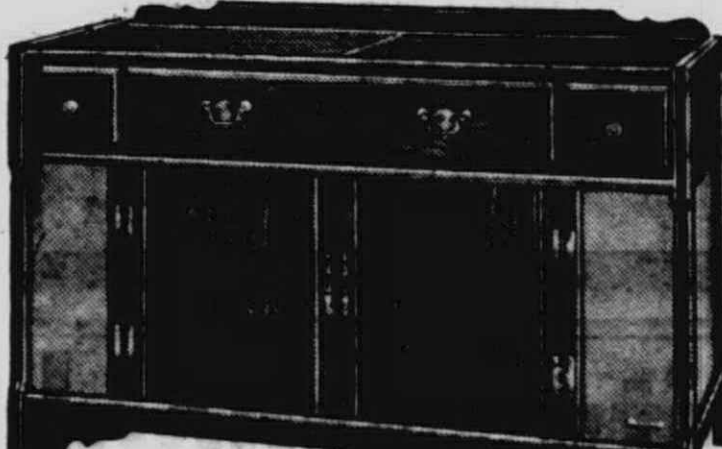

Fama Underhill and Patrick Riondon participated in the ribbon cutting. The Children's Chorus of the 3rd, 4th, and 5th, grades sang America the Beautiful under the direction of Mrs. Sharbough.

The Wallace Construction Co. presented a large gold key to the school, receiving the assistant principal Mrs. Sidie E. Smith.

After the Children's Chorus and audience sang My Country 'Tis of Thee the benediction was given by Rev. Elwood Chiphase of the Salem Federated Church.

Following is a brief summary of the history of Salem given by Glenn Wickard and Mrs. Felma Ward:

John and Joseph Dickenson were the first settlers in 1825. Others soon to follow were Calvin Wheeler, Dr. Pratt, John McCormick, George Renwick and many others. The town was originally known as Panama but was changed about 1832 to Salem.

The Honorable George Renwick was born in England in 1789. Mr. Renwick was elected a Territorial Representative and helped in forming the Territorial Constitution. He was the first Supervisor of Salem Township.

Schools in the early days were few and of a frontier type, the children walked several miles to school and often encountered the winter weather.

It is believed the first school was a log building located at Bullocks corners. The seats were of slabs set on pins, and desks along the sides of the room. The room was heated by a small box stove.

The second school was built on the corner of 5th Mile and Curtis Roads in 1832. By the turn of the century the township became a prospering agricultural community and a town of great activity.

With the Pere Marquette Railroad Salem became a shipping point for lumber and produce of the community.

One would never believe that in the early days of Salem boasted a cheese factory, two hotels, stock yard, harness, tin and butcher shops. A drug and jewelry store, saw and grist mills, grain elevator, coal yard, a blacksmith and barber shop, general store and post office.

The Sylvester A. Childs property of 37 acres in School District No. 1 was valued at \$330 with a total school tax of \$55.

In July 1907 south of Salem two passenger trains collided killing 32 people. In 1917 a tornado passed through the area causing extensive damage. The school built in 1880 was completely destroyed.

Uncle John Lewis died in 1941 and was the last survivor of the First Michigan colored Infantry and was buried with full military honors. He was at one time a Drummer Boy and saw service in the Battle of Gettysburg. He lived in Salem for 60 years and some of his six children still live in Salem.
