Ford plans huge plant on Plymouth Township site

Ford Motor Co. plans to build a 642,000 square-foot plant in Plymouth Township to manufacture heaters and air conditioners.

The new facility is needed to meet a continuing increase in consumer demand for air conditioners in the company's passenger car and truck lines. Installation rates are currently running at an average level of 22% and it is anticipated that this rate will more than double in the next ten years.

The new Ford Motor Co. plant — to be operated by the company's general parts division — will be located on a 168-acre site northwest of Plymouth.

It is planned to put the plant into operation in late 1967 with employment of more than 1,000 persons. Construction is expected to start within two months.

The new plant site will be on Sheldon Road, just north of Western Electric Co., south of Five Mile Road about 22 miles west of downtown Detroit.

Ford's general parts division currently assembles nearly all of the company's U.S. heater and air conditioner requirements at the Ford plant in Ypsilanti, Mich.

manufacturing operations at Ypsilanti. Parts which will continue to be produced at Ypsilanti include distributors, generators, horns, ignition coils, master brake cylinders, regulators, shock absorbers, starters and transistor ignition systems, according to Ford spokesmen.

The Detroit architectural firm of Diehl & Diehl has been named to design the new facility. Construction contracts will be awarded later.

Ford Motor Co. now is in the third year of a \$2.6 billion world wide capacity expansion program covering 1964 through 1967. The company's facility spending in 1966 is expected to total a record \$800 million of which \$500 million will be in the United States.

This year, Ford expects to add about 6,500,000 square feet of floor space to its U.S. facilities and Ford's foreign affiliates expect to add about 3,000,000 square feet.

U.S. projects scheduled for completion this year include a parts manufacturing plant at Saline, Mich., a paint manufacturing plant at Mt. Clemens, Mich., an automotive safety center at Dearborn, Mich., and a new Dearborn office building to house a computer center and credit and insurance subsidiaries as well as 18 other projects.

A huge new stamping plant at Woodhaven, Mich. was substantially completed late last year.

City appoints nine-man parking study committee

Parking problems in downtown Plymouth will be attacked anew after the appointment of a nine-man committee Monday night by the City Commission.

The committee is to be chaired by Ralph Lorenz, owner of the Mayflower Hotel, and long active in creating parking downtown. Lorenz is a sort of unofficial expert on parking, having

served on various study groups over the past years.

Other members named by Mayor James Houk, and approved by the City Fathers in their regular meeting, are Bob Reid, of Reid Corporation, Robert Barbour, of the National Bank of Detroit; Kenneth Fisher, City administrative assistant; G. Eugene Davidson, Alexander Hamilton Life Insurance executive;

Herman Backus, owner of Cloverdale Dairy; Robert Beyer, drug store chain operator; Jim Taylor, real estate agent; and Rev. Peter Schweitzer, of the First Methodist Church.

PARKING has been a continuing problem facing both the City Commission and the Chamber of Commerce.

Some months ago the Chamber asked for some action on parking, including a ban of all-day parkers in the central parking lot.

A parking committee at that time, headed by Robert Barbour, indicated they had gone about as far as they could, and needed new direction.

The Commission, however, took over the matter, ordered surveys of existing parking, and even closed the central lot in the morning to see if there was enough room for all-day parkers to park elsewhere.

New meters to better enforce on-street parking were also recently installed.

Back drive for workshop

Support was added this week to The Plymouth Mail's drive to help the Community Opportunities Center's Sheltered Workshop as leaders of both governmental units in the Plymouth area endorsed the campaign.

Both Plymouth Township Supervisor John D. McEwen and City of Plymouth Mayor James Houk issued statements of support and made contributions to the fund for the Sheltered Workshop.

The Sheltered Workshop is a grass-roots project designed to help mentally retarded persons help themselves by teaching them simple, but useful skills.

The program is not eligible for either State or Federal aid and, if it is to survive, requires financial support from local people.

Last week, The Plymouth Mail began a campaign on behalf of the Sheltered Workshop, noting editorially that persons who object to large-scale expansion of State and Federal Government could take this opportunity to support a necessary program locally.

In his endorsement of the campaign, Plymouth Township Supervisor John D. McEwen said:

"Permit me to congratulate you enthusiastically on your article last week relative to the Community Opportunities Center's Workshop."

"I am more than pleased to endorse a program to provide training to handicapped persons which has

stemmed from a grass roots level; and without the aid of government handouts.

"Those residents of Livonia, Northville, Plymouth, Northville Township and Plymouth Township, who have already participated in making this program available, are to be commended and deserve help from all of us who are more fortunate than those we are attempting to assist in a new way of life.

"I am quite happy to join others in providing funds necessary for . . . operation of this project . . ."

Mayor Houk also expressed his complete support of the drive and contributed a check. He said:

The announcement was made Monday night by City Manager Richard Blodgett, and the resignation was accepted by the City Commission, with regrets.

Bida said he expects to remain in the community, and continue his activities as the head of the Plymouth Community Junior Baseball League, and a leader in the Junior Basketball program. Blodgett said: "Joe has done an outstanding job; this will be a great loss to the City."

CITY COMMISSIONER George Lawton agreed and cited Bida's efforts above and beyond the call of duty—including his work as an ex-officio member of the Fall Festival committee. Bida normally works long, extra

hours on the Fall Festival many months prior to September, and can be seen helping barbecue chickens right down to the final day.

Commissioner James McKeon praised Bida's recent work on the main break on Northville Rd., noting "that kind of dedication is hard to find."

Tax expert to speak at March 3rd Forum

Alfred Pelham, well-known municipal tax and finance expert, will be the featured speaker at the March meeting of the Businessmen's Forum.

The noon luncheon is set for the Miles Standish Room of the Mayflower Hotel, March 3.

Pelham, who has published several articles on financial subjects, is expected to discuss the role of taxation in local government. He will also explain the much-discussed equalization fac-

tor, a state equalized valuations, and the Michigan Supreme Court decision that made equalization law.

PELHAM at one time was controller for the City of Detroit and Director of budget and finance for Wayne County.

One of his most recent posts was budget officer for Wayne State University.

A past member of the State Board of Equalization, Pelham is

currently a member of the Board of Trustees of several Detroit hospitals, a member of the Wayne County Board of Supervisors and a consultant to the Mayor's committee for economic growth.

He is also a member of a long range community mental health planning committee for Detroit and Wayne County.

A graduate of the University of Michigan, Pelham did graduate work at Harvard.

CURRENTLY, at age 66, he is assistant vice-president for finance and an associate professor at Wayne State University.

Vandals hit downtown windows

Seven windows on downtown store fronts were broken by chunks of concrete hurled through them sometime last Wednesday morning.

WINDOWS AT Fisher's Shoes, Observer Newspapers, Automobile Club of America, West Side Electronics, Western Auto Supply, Air Tite, Inc. and a vacant building on Penniman were smashed.

The windows were on either Main St. or Penniman Ave.

Police found the windows before the stores opened Wednesday, according to Loren Johnson, City of Plymouth assistant police chief.

Johnson said the windows were broken with pieces of broken concrete; the vandals apparently threw them from the car.

The charge for the crime is malicious destruction of property - a misdemeanor, with a sentence of 90 days in jail and \$100 fine, all or part, on each count.

Johnson said they had no clues in the vandalism, and no suspects at this time.

 January, Commissioner George Lawton urged that a new committee be appointed with new ideas and new members.

No term was set for the committee, but they are expected to work in close conjunction with a similar committee from the Chamber of Commerce.

On other matters, the City gave the owners of a house on Holbrook ten weeks to repair or raze the structure, recently declared a public nuisance.

City Attorney Thomas Healy agreed to cloud the title of the property after several commissioners expressed concern because the house was up for sale, and there was no indication on the building that they had condemned the house.

The Commission also agreed to take bids for a \$23,000 sewer project that

would complete the hookup with Plymouth Township's Tonquish Creek Sanitary Sewer and the new sewer now under construction south of Ann Arbor Rd.

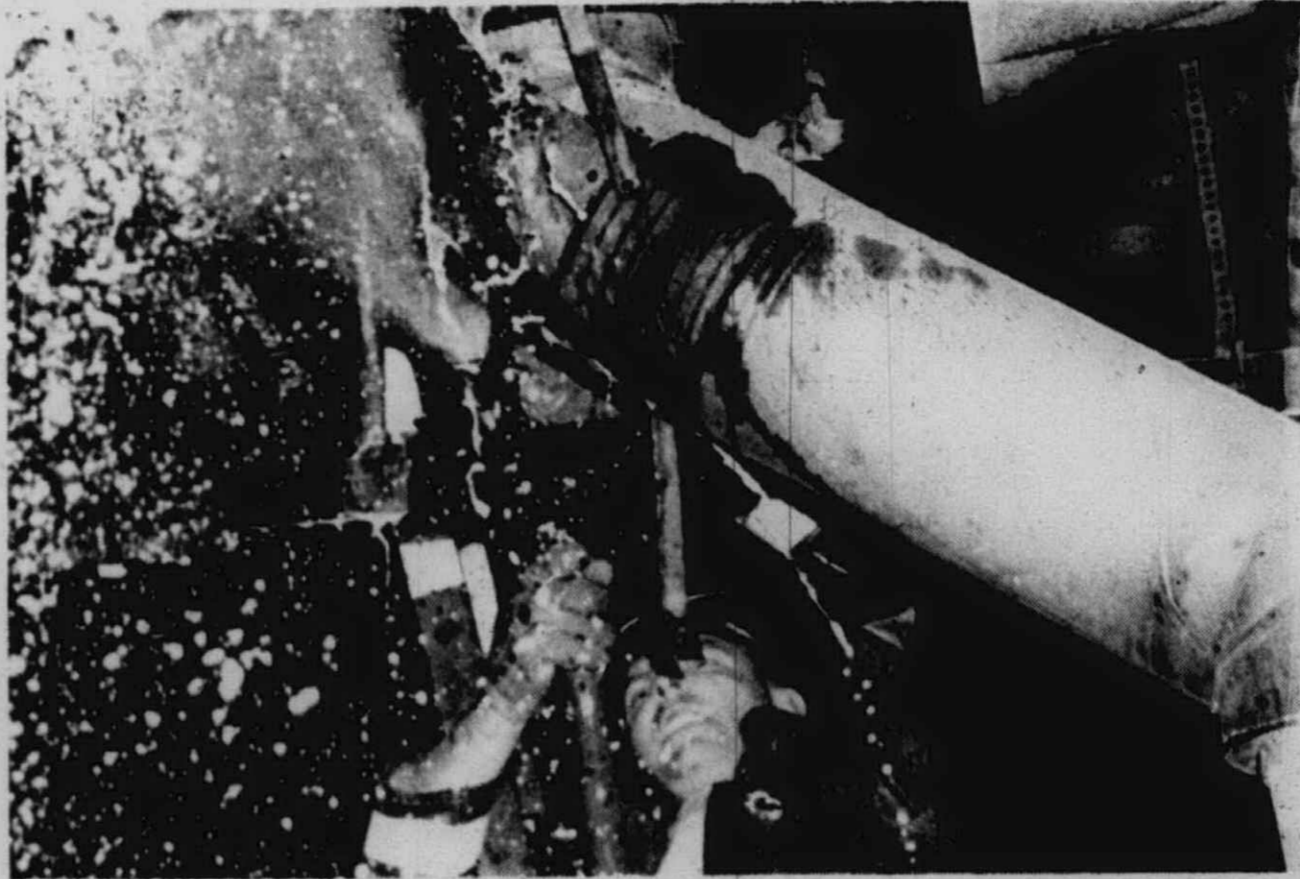
The Township's portifib is scheduled for competition in May.

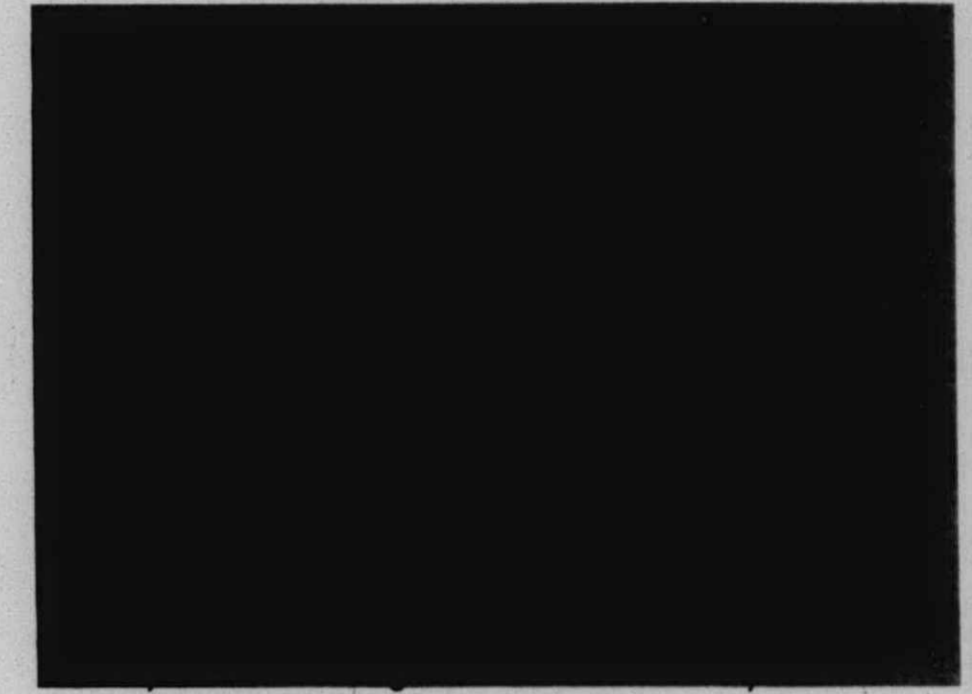

Better manners needed at School Board meetings Twp. plans hearing on NBD rezoning

The recent meeting of the Plymouth Community School District Board of Education offered a lesson in studied rudeness to all those on hand to observe.

A small band of Lake Pointe parents were present to gripe, in general about Lake Pointe school problems, and, in particular, about the conditions which forced a class of first graders into a crowded storage room next to a gym in the Farrand Elementary School.

It was an unpleasant meeting. The Board, chaired by Carl Schultze in the absence of president Gerald Fischer, listened rather impatiently to the parents.

One asked about the pay-as-you-go financing method, and he was told to come back when he knew more about it, because the Board didn't have that kind of time.

Another asked if portable, or mobile classrooms might be investigated, and she was told that: (a.) the money was not available, (b.) the units could not be ordered in time, or erected in time, and (c.) the Board could not possibly overbuild classrooms, or fit classroom availability to population exactly.

This parent insisted, however, and it finally agreed the matter would be studied by Melvin Blunk, assistant superintendent of schools.

In all, the parents were treated as if they were children who didn't know exactly what they wanted. It was a hostile confrontation, and the Board's reaction was hostile.

The parents aren't blameless. Some of them had never appeared before the Board before. They were un-

informed about the so-called pay-as-you-go financing, which has been abandoned. They interrupted while Board members were speaking. And it was not clear whether or not they were speaking just for themselves, or for a whole group of people.

We can't help but remember a School Board candidates' night held last summer at Farrand School attended by two people from the press, four school board candidates and about 20 parents.

Nor can we forget the poor voter turnout at the election the next week.

The Board is composed of elected officials serving long hours without pay. Citizen interest must be expanded beyond the gripe sessions before the Board. They can expect to get testy at times, no matter how right the parents may be.

Gripes should be vindicated at the polls, in citizen study committees, and in calm, well thought-out discussion with the School Board.

The shot-gun affect with a few parents taking pot shots makes good headlines, places pressure on the Board, but is really poor government, and a poor substitute for concerted citizen action.

Granted, the parents of the school children, above all, have a right to go before the Board, and question their actions.

But there is no excuse for the rudeness displayed on the part of the parents, or the Board, at the meeting. Future meetings should be devoted to more fruitful discussion, with less ill-will.

A public hearing in March confronts National Bank of Detroit officials who want to build a branch bank on a site along Sheldon Rd. Just north of the professional park. The hearing was set at last Wednesday's meeting of the Plymouth Township Planning Commission. NBD spokesman John Ferrath, said the bank felt the building proposed would conform to the uses already in effect in the professional park to the south.

ZONING ON the NBD site is currently residential, single family homes. AC-2 commercial rezoning has been requested, but some doubts were apparent in the minds of the planners. Clayton Koch spoke out after hearing professional planner W. C. Johnson recommend the site remain professional office area.

Set for a public hearing the plat of Stoller Estates, the JAR Corporation's development on Beck and Joy Roads. Table a request from Dr. A. Leo Speer to rezone land along the western edge of the Township from agriculture to R-3, multiple family residential.

Denied Saul Rose's application for apartment rezoning on a site along Northville Rd. Tabled for Johnson to study a request for an apartment complex also on Northville Rd.

Jam church to hear of Medicare

Congenial Sam Test, district manager of the Social Security Administration, spoke before about 70 senior citizens in a special Medicare meeting held Friday at the Methodist Church. Test explained the nature of the Federally supported health insurance, and noted that it provides two things: (1) Hospital benefits, which cost the senior citizen nothing, and (2) medical insurance, which costs \$3 per month. The protection provided begins, July, this summer. But those over 65 must file before March 31, or wait until two years from now.

Test explained that this message applies to anyone 65 or older who has never worked under social security, or has never had a social security number. It also applies to those persons 65 or older who are still working. For the convenience of the public, the Social Security offices are open now on Wednesday evenings to 8:30 p.m. and on Saturday morning, from 8:30 a.m. to noon. These hours are in addition to the regularly scheduled hours of 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Monday through Friday. If anyone is unable to visit the office, Test suggested that he write or telephone for the necessary instructions. The Detroit-Northwest office is located at 18500 Grand River. The telephone number is 272-0080.

Fulton Lewis III speaks on Communist infiltration

Handsome Fulton Lewis III spoke to hundreds of women at the Mayflower Meeting House luncheon and earlier at the Northville Town Hall Feb. 17. In his talk about communist infiltration in our schools he told of the apathy of college students during the 50's with a revolution of intellect taking place now, during the 60's.

"Communists depend upon young people to keep the party going and use every device possible to sway them to their way of thinking", Lewis said. He went on to say that communist propaganda funds have QUADRUPLD during the past year. In communist literature, which includes "The Worker", "The Peoples World" and the "Insurgent", young people are encouraged to lead race riots, so called "peace demonstrations", and to recruit aid for communist troops in Vietnam.

He told of a demonstration in New York with draft card burners among students and of the four men who were responsible. One was a 35-year old "student" and three were 4F because of emotional problems. They were burning their draft cards.

Lewis went on to tell of leaflets circulated among young people which encourage them to engage in combat with police, describe how to make Molotov cocktails

and even say that "cops and judges" are to be killed. "The youth of our country is important because of sheer number," Lewis said. "By 1970, it is predicted that more than half of our population will be 25 or younger," he said. He went on to say that 92% of young people make a political decision before they are 21 and keep it the rest of their lives.

Dissent and debate can be a good and healthy thing, says Lewis; but it can also lead to violence and disrespect for law and order and even revolution.

He says he is concerned by our tolerance of students placing themselves above the law. During the question and answer period at the Meeting House, Lewis was asked what our country needs to do to improve this situation.

He answered that we need stronger laws which will be enforced. For example, all communist speakers are required by law to register with the attorney general, but they NEVER do and this law isn't enforced.

He also said that peace demonstrators ENJOY the publicity and personal attention they get when they are fined for breaking a law, they don't mind in the least because all fines are paid by the communist organizations anyway. Lewis says that we should sentence them to hard labor instead - something they are not likely to forget for a while.

He also feels that we are not doing the job we should of educating our young people. Too many of our soldiers who were captured by the enemy were brainwashed successfully. We should give our youth more knowledge of communism and how its forces work.

Lewis closed by saying that we should write a whole new set of laws for our internal security and enforce them.

Fulton Lewis III is the son of well known Fulton Lewis, Jr. He was the youngest member of the house un-American activities committee and spends all his time now touring the country with his lectures. His home is in Washington, D.C.

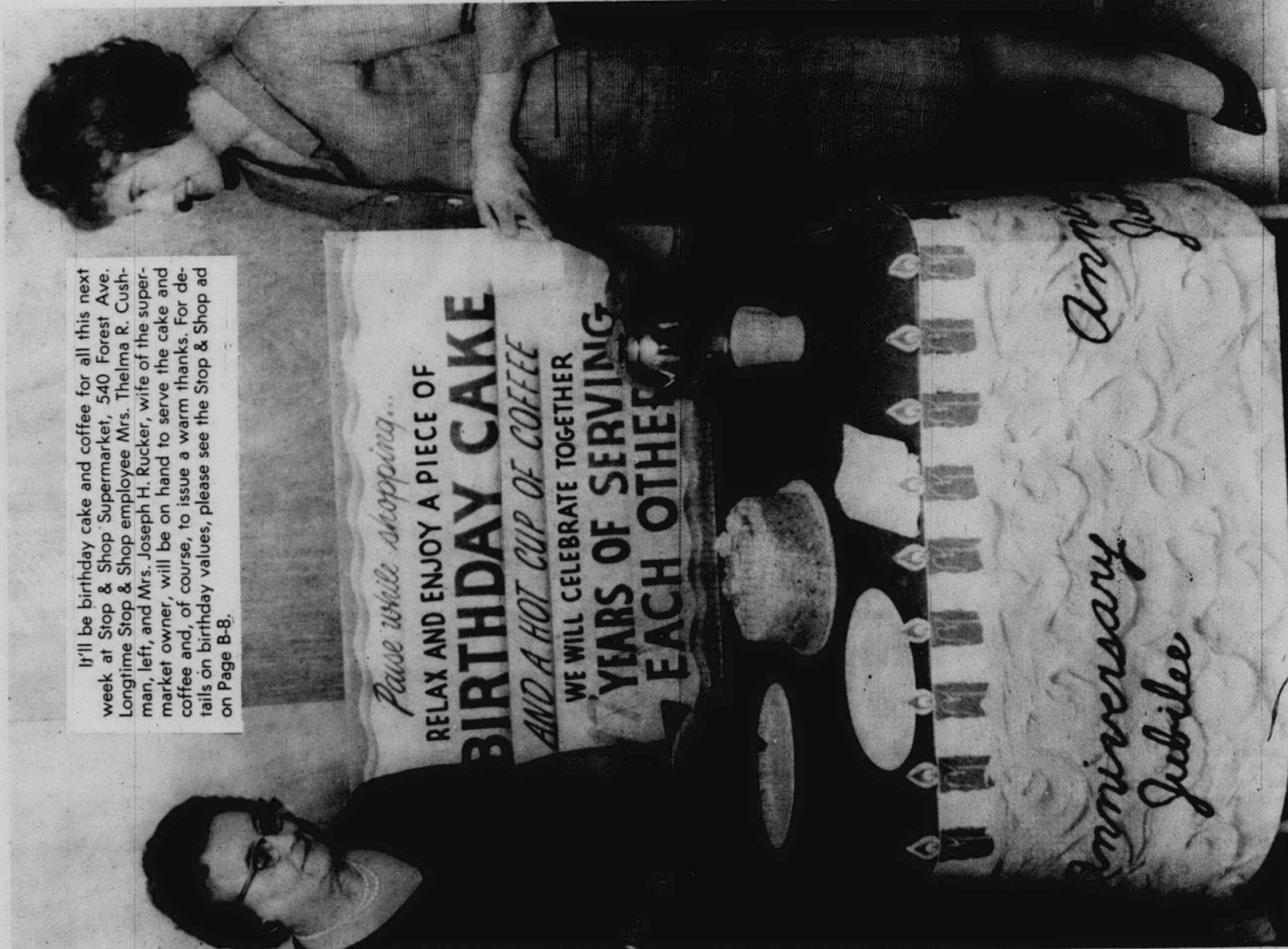

"Rich Man, Poor Man, Freud and Fruit"

At Dunning Hough

"Concise History of Ballet" by Ferdinando Reyna traces the history, traditions, techniques and personalities of the art from its beginnings in 15th century Italy to the present day.

Tierney and other lawmakers, nearly all of whom have lengthy experience in local government posts.

'The Task Force's primary goal will be to shortcut present procedures for getting to the major problems of local government,' said the group's chairman, Representative Stanley J. Davis, former Mayor of Grand Rapids.

The first area which the Task Force will investigate will be problems of cities so that legislation aimed at high-priority problems can be prepared for the next session of the legislature.

Tierney said he has accepted the new assignment as an obligation to apply the knowledge he has acquired from his two

decades of local governmental operation, to improving and advancing the best interest of the people of his district, as well as the best interest of the state of Michigan.

First announcement of the project appeared in the Pacific Edition of "Stars and Stripes" in mid-November of 1965.

Mrs. Mae Hoelscher, President of Unit No. 391 of the American Legion Auxiliary of Plymouth, announced that the Unit has received a re-

quest for a subscription from Bruce Lee LaPointe presently stationed in Viet Nam and in cooperation with Dave Wiley of The Plymouth Mail, the newspaper will soon be on its way to Viet Nam with the good wishes of the American Legion Auxiliary.

Passage-Gayde Unit No. 391 wishes to express a special thanks to Dave Wiley for the cooperation with this Unit on project "Operation Hometown Newspaper."

Mrs. Phyllis Hewer, Chair-

man of the Foreign Relations Committee of Passage-Gayde Unit No. 391, has announced that the country to be studied in 1966 will be the Philippines. She added that there are American Legion Auxiliary Units organized in the Philippines, an added personal incentive to this year's project.

One of the Latin American Republics has been studied by the Auxiliary members in Unit meetings throughout the United States each year and a self-help project for the people of the country being studied was a "good will" gesture of the members. We have just completed a year's study of Costa Rica and found it very interesting, explained Mrs. Hewer. As our gesture of good will we collected our pennies and purchased kits of "tools for training" for the Costa Rican vocational schools to aid a self help project of teaching new trades to the Costa Ricans, who had

been displaced by a volcanic disaster.

The Philippines, Mrs. Hewer explained, consists of 7,000 islands strung across the Pacific between Southern Formosa and the northern tip of Borneo. The American Legion Auxiliary—"care" Barrio Development Program will provide kits of tools to frontier barrios (villages) in Cotabato on the Island of Mindanao. The total cost of a kit of tools is \$339—these tools to be purchased and distributed through the CARE organization.

Mrs. Hewer said that the Barrio development is accomplished through the cooperative efforts of the people concerned. She said that it has been shown that the settlers have the courage to begin life in the frontier of Cotabato and tools provided by the American Legion Auxiliary CARE Program will help "Open the Door" to a progressive future.

Senator Roberts reveals Michigan tourism booms

Figures compiled by the State Department of Revenue, the Conservation Department and the Michigan Tourist Council show that Michigan's total tourist spending has reached about \$960 million annually, according to Senator Farrell E. Roberts of Pontiac.

The comprehensive survey resulted from an inquiry by Senator Roberts following a recent meeting by Senate Republicans with the Conservation Department.

A survey by Central Michigan University put tourist spending at \$857 million in 1964 and increased by 12% in 1965.

"These figures," Senator Roberts said, "certainly indicate the tremendous impact of tourism on our state's economy and we should continue to do everything we can to stimulate its growth and provide adequate vacation facilities for Michigan visitors and residents."

Associated Spring Corporation sales and earnings for the year ended December 31, 1965, set new records, Carlyle F. Barnes, chairman, and Wallace Barnes, president, announced.

Sales rose 49 percent to \$84,662,367, compared with \$57,005,286 in 1964.

Net earnings per share rose 70 percent to \$3.80. In 1964 the per share figure was \$2.24. Earnings totaled \$4,306,210, compared with \$2,502,945 the previous year.

"This sharp growth is due principally to the contribution of more than \$21 million of sales volume from companies acquired during the latter part of 1964," the ASC executives said. "A high level of activity throughout the corporation and continuation of our programs to increase market penetration and improve efficiency also were significant factors in achieving the records."
