Detroit Tiger owner buys home designed by Wright

One of the most unusual homes in Plymouth - the Wall home designed by the world famed architect Frank Lloyd Wright more than 40 years ago - has a new owner. When the Walls move out on in the next few months the many angled home on the rolling hills will be taken over by Tom Monaghan, the "Pizza King" who recently purchased the Detroit Tigers.

"We sold the place to him," Wall explained, "because we were told he was a great admirer of Mr. Wright and we knew that the home we cherished so much would be well kept and admired through the years."

BUILT ON the rolling hillside, just opposite the Fox Hills Golf course, the home is so constructed that it follows the contour of the land. That is one of the features of many Wright designed homes. It has five bedrooms, four baths and seven roof levels. Along with all this unusual design is a covered car port that is part of the home.

As Wall explained the design, the home has four different floor levels, and yet carries a horizontal line.

The Walls came to the ownership of the home in a most unusual way, especially to have such a famed architect design it.

Asked why he and his wife were willing to sell the home they said

they've worked enough and the upkeep of this place, beautiful as it is, would be a task.

"And we are satisfied that we have found a buyer who is just as interested in the work of Frank Lloyd Wright, as we are, and will see that it is maintained with the respect it deserves."

What makes the home so unsual, is the fact that one of architect Wright's principals in design of buildings is to use the materials which are native to the region. That's why the Wall home features cypress wood, and bricks made in the area, and the other materials found in and around Plymouth.

Teacher innocent in assault charge

A judge has ruled in favor of a Plymouth-Canton school teacher convicted in December 1982 in 35th District Court of assault and battery against a 15-year-old student.

Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Paul Teranes ruled last week that Scott Kurtz, 31, was acting in a proper supervisory role when he used physical force to subdue John James during an altercation which took place in Central Mid-

dle School in October 1982. Teranes' decision overturns one given in 1982 by District Court Judge Dunbar Davis. Davis found Kurtz guilty of the misdemeanor and fined him \$135. Davis ruled that James was not under Kurtz's supervision at the time of the incident and therefore Kurtz had no legal right to discipline him. Kurtz appealed Davis' ruling, which was based on a 1956 state attorney general's opin-

In his decision, Teranes ruled that James was indeed under the supervision of Kurtz and that Kurtz never gave up supervision of James throughout the whole incident.

ACCORDING to district court testimony, the altercation began in Kurtz's drafting class.

James came into the class, even though he wasn't a student in the class. Kurtz escorted James to a classroom across the hall, where the student ap-

It was at this point, Davis ruled, that Kurtz gave up supervision of James, turning him over to the teacher in that room. Any physical force used by Kurtz after that turnover was illegal, Davis

Teranes overturned Davis' reasoning, apparently agreeing with a 1964 state statute which states teachers may

attending school when such force is necessary to maintain discipline.

"This is a significant case," said Charles Bokos, Kurtz's attorney. "Davis ruled on that one issue of supervision to find him guilty of assault and battery. It was the first time a judge said an element of supervision was necessary to discipline a student."

Bokos said Teranes also ruled that no unnecessary force was used in the subduing of James and that the amount of force that was used by Kurtz was rea-

IN DISTRICT court, James testified Kurtz grabbed his arm, pulled his hair, physically lowered him to the floor and pounded his head against the concrete

Teranes' ruling has "no bearing" on disciplinary action taken against Kurtz by the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education, said Norman Kee, assistant superintendent for employee relations. That action is now being appealed by Kurtz to the State Teacher Tenure Commission.

In November 1982, the board accused Kurtz of "excessive use of physical force" against James and placed him on an indefinite suspension, with pay, pending the outcome of a board hearing.

In February 1983, the board ruled that Kurtz could have avoided the altercation, that he had previously shown a propensity to use excessive force against students, that he was trained in karate and that, even though James was defiant, he didn't pose a physical threat to Kurtz or to other students or teachers. The board also ruled Kurtz acted in a highly unprofessional

The city of Wayne resident was suspended without pay until the second se-mester of the 1983-84 school year. On Feb. 6, he returned to the district as a

KEE SAID the board never agreed with Davis' decision in the case and won't waiver now, in light of Teranes' decision, from its judgment that Kurtz used excessive force against James.

'We didn't agree with the court's decision in the first place," Kee said. "That's not our philosophy at all. Teachers have the responsibility to take corrective action, but in this case that action was excessive. It's a district policy not to use excessive force."

School Superintendent Dr. John Hoben said the district follows state law in determining what teachers should do when faced with a disruptive "Teachers are not to use physical

force unless the teacher or students are

threatened, only when they feel their life is in danger," Hoben said. "They have the freedom to make that decision, but it's a fine line to walk." WHILE THE courts have now ruled on the criminal charge against Kurtz,

the state tenure commission has yet to give its decision on Kurtz's appeal of the board's ruling. A decision from the commission is expected within 90 days, said Steven Amberg, attorney for Kurtz. Amberg

predicted the commission will reverse the board's ruling. "The record establishes Kurtz's ac-

tion was proper, appropriate and didn't violate rules," he said. "The school district's actions should be reversed." In January 1982, Davis denied a

motion filed by Bokos to reconsider his guilty verdict. But, at that time, Davis admitted his decision raised difficult legal questions.

City prosecutor Ronald Lowe has maintained Kurtz should have taken James to the principal's office instead of trying to find out where he belonged.

Homebound teacher on tight schedule

Janet Shazer walks stiffly to her worktable and carefully grasps a pencil in her swollen fingers.

For the past several weeks, 13-yearold Janet has been confined to her Livonia home with a painful bout of arthritis. With swollen, painful joints, Janet is unable to attend regular seventh grade classes at Holmes Middle

BRINGING SCHOOL to Janet is Lorna Durand of Canton, homebound teacher for the Livonia school district. Janet is one of a handful of students temporarily served at home until they are well enough to return to classes.

So far this year, Durand has had 17 students who have been out for varying lengths of time because of surgery, sports injuries and automobile accidents. Policy calls for the student to be out for at least four weeks in order to qualify for a homebound teacher, but some recover more quickly and go

Durand delivers assignments from her students' teachers in a warm, encouraging manner. After a quip or two, it's down to business. Durand visits her students for one hour twice a week, and every moment must count.

"I have some tests for you," Durand sald. "You're on your honor. It's a closed-book test."

"Oh, boy, just what I need," Janet responded, with a smile.

DURAND, A 1968 graduate of Thurston High School in Redford, has received a bachelor's degree in special education and a master's in learning disabilities, both from Michigan State University.

After graduating in 1972, she was hired by the Livonia school district the tollowing year and has worked in several schools working with special ed and learning-disabled students.

"I like this a lot," Durand said. "I don't mind traveling. I meet different people and work with different kids, different grade levels."

Most of the homebound students are recuperating at home. On occasion Durand may visit a pupil confined to a hospital. Since few districts in western Wayne County have homebound teachers. Durand sometimes provides shortterm assistance to students in nearby communities.

In one such case, Durand has been working with a girl who suffered paral-ysis and speech loss as a result of car crash injuries.

ADAPTATION TO a student's medical condition requires Durand to be

For example, Janet's arthritis was diagnosed late last summer. Currently, she is resting at home while undergoing a series of injections of gold, which her physician hopes will put the arthritis in

Janet receives temporary relief from pain by soaking her hands, feet and ankles in a liquid solution of hot wax, kept in a heating unit in her home. The athletic Janet enjoys softball and gymnastics - activities which

must be set aside right now. "I love running," Janet said. "Hopefully, the medicine will work and I can go back to it."

Janet's mother, Jean, is grateful for the homebound program. "I was sending her to school crying (from pain), but she didn't want to miss.'

Durand and Janet have discussed the possible limitations of the arthritis. "This is one hurdle she is going to have to overcome," Durand said. "She

AT THE END of an hour, Durand and Janet have reviewed proportions and ratios for math, and plant reproduction for science. It was time for Durand to climb into her car and drive to the next assignment with 14-year-old Leisa Mellberg.

Leisa, an eighth grade student at Riley Middle School in Livonia, recently underwent surgery on her back and was in a body cast. Unable to sit comfortably, Leisa reclined on a couch while Durand curled up on the floor.

"The cast is uncomfortable at times, but most of the time it's okay," said

From Leisa's teachers, Durand brought several assignments: Tapes of French lessons, a history piece on the Civil War and a project on the influence of advertising.

"I think I've overwhelmed you with these assignments," Durand said. "I'm going to be home all weekend. Call me if you have a problem."

OBVIOUSLY, DURAND cannot duplicate the education a child would receive in his or her regular classroom. Some subjects are too accelerated or too specialized. But she enjoys the chal-

"I have had a marvelous year," Durand said. "I have to do some paring down (and) develop lesson plans for each child. I have met a cross-section of (people)."
When she isn't teaching, Durand en-

joys bowling and playing golf with her husband, Bob, an electrician with the family-run Durand Electric Co. of Northville.

Durand also teaches Sunday school at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Livonia and spends plenty of time with daughters Nicole, 111/2, Alicia, 6, and staff writer

It's been a long, costly 17 months from that day in October 1982 when Scott Kurtz was first accused of assaulting a student to a day last week when a circuit court found him not

But for the Plymouth-Canton industrial arts teacher, the ordeal is not yet over. There's at least another 90 days to go before a state commission rules on whether the district erred in suspending Kurtz for using excessive force against a student and for acting in an unprofessional manner.

For punishment, the district took away Kurtz's job and his paycheck for one year, an action now on appeal before the State Teacher Tenure Commis-

The one-year suspension took place back in February 1983. From that time until Feb. 6, when he returned to the school district as a substitute teacher, Kurtz learned the meaning of the word

"I certainly suffered financial losses." said Kurtz Thursday after getting the news that his assault and battery

"I was used to a teacher's salary at a certain level. I had bills, responsibilities. I had to get out and scramble and find something. I worked five different jobs, sometimes three jobs at one time,

to make ends meet." Kurtz ticked off other losses he encountered during the last year: the loss of a year's seniority and the loss of prestige. "I had to take nonprofessional jobs," was the way he put it.

BUT THE losses did not come without a silver lining.

"I tried to turn this into something positive, a real learning experience,"

he said. One of the things implanted firmly in his mind is how to handle an unruly, belligerent student.

"Of course, it's easier to say from hindsight, but I know I would handle it completely different. I would have the same feelings about it, but I would adopt a complete 'hands-off' approach. It was a unique experience, and will probably never happen again, dealing with someone out of control. But if it

The commission's decision on Kurtz's appeal will decide whether the teacher will be able to regain his losses and get back his lost pay and seniority. In the meantime, he is substitute teaching at all levels in the school district, await-

ing a permanent opening.

Kurtz started with the district in 1976 as a high school industrial arts teacher. He was transferred to Central Middle School in 1981.

WHATEVER the commission's decision is, Kurtz said he will greet it with the same unemotional detachment he greeted the decision of the circuit

"I felt my obligation throughout this whole thing was to keep a clear mind, to try to stay as unemotional about things as I could. I have hardened myself to news, whether good or bad. I got a lot of disappointments as the months dragged along."

Kurtz said he never felt a "wash of relief" on hearing of Teranes' reversal because he felt he had been in the right all along. "It's like being right and having someone else tell you you're right again. When I get everything back (seniority, back pay) that's when I'll take a big breath."







Building for lords



At Pearle

Schweitzer tells of many paths through ministry, politics, health

When it comes to unusual careers few persons could beat the jagged path Peter Sweitzer has travelled.

Now a resident of Plymouth who doubles as the superintendent of a camp for the retarded in Mayville, he has been in the ministry, a member of the Plymouth City Commission, a public relation director at the Plymouth Center for Human Development and then the camp.

Born in Flint 45 years ago he graduated from Flint Central High School, then went to Western Michigan University, off to the seminary, and then to serve as assistant pastor at the United Methodist Church in Plymouth. He later bacame the center of a political fight for a place on the Plymouth City Commission that

Sitting at his home in Plymouth the other afternoon he recalled the turmoil of the court battle and confided that the peace and quiet is a relief from those days.

The political battle, as he recalls it, started in 1967 when it was ruled he was ineligible to serve on the City Commission because he was not a property owner in the city.

THE CASE was heard before Wayne Circuit Judge Victor Baum (now retired) who listened to testimony most of the day and then ruled Schweitzer was eligible to run. Baum threw out the city charter provision requiring elected officeholders to be property owners in the city and Schweitzer became the first

renter to serve on the Commission. It was a hectic time for awhile and the political battle continued a far cry from the quiet of the Methodist Church where he had served for three years.

'When that happened and I finally left the Commission," he recalled,"I went to work at the Plymouth State Home and was there for 13 years."

As he recalled the next jag in the road he had to smile.

"My job was eliminated and it meant that I actually was fired. Then came a change and it became the Plymouth Center for Human Development and I served there. When that position took a turn I finally ad a heart attack on the day I closed my desk. It was an odd position to be in, but I made it."

Unemployed for a time he finally made a connection with Camp Happy Hollow in Mayville and has been there since last March.

"We had 64 campers, and because it is for the retarded the position offers a real challenge. But it is very worthwhile to make the lives of these campers happier."

As he prepares for the summer session at the camp, Schweitzer has no desire to get back into politics. But he admits it was exciting while



Greenstein announces candidacy for judgeship

Attorney Robert Greenstein, former Canton Township Supervisor, has announced his candidacy for 35th District Court Judge.

The seat will be vacated by District Judge Dunbar Davis of Plymouth, who retires this year.

A general practitioner with offices in Canton, Greenstein served as supervisor 1974-76 and as township trustee 1978-80. He was beaten by Noel Culbert in a second bid for supervisor in the Democratic 1980 primary.

Greenstein was Canton's municipal judge 1968-70, a stint that makes him "the youngest retired judge in Wayne County." Earlier, he worked as Livonia's chief probation officer. A graduate of Detroit's Criminal Justice Institute and a certified police officer, Greenstein was Canton's first police chief 1974-76.

"I have accomplished almost every position in the law enforcement and legal field, including the judgeship. There were different times in my life when it was appropriate to be involved with the law as a police officer, attorney, chief probation officer and as municipal judge," said Greenstein.

"My feeling today is that given my age, background and experience, the best possible position for me to be in would be district judge."

Greenstein says experience, particularly in criminal law, will be a plus for

"I probably have, by far, more legal, trial and public service and certainly judicial service than anyone else who would be running."

Being outspoken could work against him, he added.

"I may be my own worst enemy at times. I tend to take positions for the underdog that create hard feelings with people on the other side."

Greenstein said his work in the forefront of Canton's farmland preservation movement in the 1970s proved controversial.

"BETWEEN 1978-80 I was the director of farmland preservation for Canton.

"In our efforts to save farmland, we made enemies with developers and folks who owned real estate and wanted to sell it at high prices," said the father of daughters Wendy, 17, and Tammy, 15.

"There were a lot of commercial people who would have felt better if the whole township was developed en masse. Mine was an honestly held position, and I would do it again if I had to to protect farmland."

Greenstein also has received negative response stemming from his involvement with First Step - a nonprofit, Westland-based organization for

the victims of spouse abuse. "I have been on the board of First Step 'forever,' " he said. "Spouse abuse is an issue I've been outspoken on and

Social problems more complex than those of past

David Breeden, who has headed Plymouth Family Service since early 1983, holds a bachelor's degree in social science from Michigan State and a master's in social work from St. Louis University with a concentration in child and family case work. His wife, Linda, also is in social work at the Family Service office in Ypsilanti. They have two children, 16 and 14.

Breeden meets with the Plymouth Family Service Advisory Board once a month. Beside's receiving Breeden's report, the board discusses programs and finances and listens to a short program each month on some social service group that has a relationship with Family Service.

Many prominent citizens have served on the board since it was set up by the Plymouth Community Fund in 1966. The current board, whose president is Kenneth Hulsing, includes: Joyce Bohlander, Jan Carney, Isabel Gerlach, Earl Gibson, Harger Green, Jim Jabara, Dale Knab, Bernice Maurer, William Morrison III, Peggy Laney, Shirley Spaniel, Jean Wagner, Sally Wisotsky, Tim Yoe and honorary life members Ethel North and Robert Barbour. The board president attends monthly meetings with the board of the Ann Arbor agency.

In addition to Breeden, the staff includes a full-time caseworker/therapist and two others who work parttime. All of the counselors are licensed and certified by the State of Michigan. There also is a secretary and a parttime clerical assistant.

CONNIE CAVANAUGH, who has served as secretary since 1970, has worked under five different directors.

"I wouldn't still be here if I hadn't

seen good things happening over the years. It is rewarding to see kids gra-duating from high school who say they might not have made it without the help they received from Plymouth Family Service."

Asked to compare the workings of Family Service today and 14 years ago, Connie says the problems of clients today seem to be more complicated than those of the past. Alcohol-related problems are on the rise. She says the agency has a much more sophisticated record and billing system than when she arrived.


"We were not in a position then to accept Blue Cross and other insurances as partial payment of fees are we are

Connie says when she joined Family Service the agency often had a long waiting list, but today clients are usually seen in one week, or less, depending on the urgency of the case. Some clients contact the office di-

rectly. Others are referred by schools, physicians, attorneys, clergymen, industrial firms, social service agencies, medical units, the courts or others community-based organizations.

Clients are counseled on a variety of everyday living problems including marriage and family, divorce adjustment, alcohol or drug abuse, child management, issues of aging, death loss and grief, single parent problems, stress reduction, job-related problems, spouse or child abuse, and sexual abuse and harassment. Clients also have sought assistance in cases of excessive shyness, loneliness or depression.

Because of the support Plymouth Family Service receives from the Community Fund, Plymouth residents and those who work here can avail themselves of counseling service at a reduced rate, depending on family size



and income. Breeden says that in some cases fees are waived completely; no one is ever denied service because of his financial limitations. And confidentiality is assured in all cases.

THE NUMBER OF cases the agency

has handled has remained steady during the past five years, about 250 annually. Most are adults.

Most of the service rendered is on an individual or family basis, but Breeden would like to see more use of self-support groups to counsel people in stress. least 60 self-support groups operating in the Plymouth area today, but Breeden believes Family Service can make further contributions in this area.

The agency offers a six-week Alcohol Education Series and has been active in community concerns about the use of drugs by adolescents. It was among those who sponsored a national speaker to come to Plymouth to talk about ado-

The agency, located on Wing Street near the corner of Forest Avenue, is a member of the Plymouth Chamber of

A recent study showed there are at the Plymouth Rotary Club. Family Service continues to provide speakers for service clubs, the school system and business in the area.

People in all income brackets have availed themselves of the services of the agency. In 1970, it was reported that most of those who visited the office had annual incomes of less than \$14,000 a year.

Today, the agency is counseling people whose income ranges from zero in some cases to six figures in others. As one caseworker observed: "We deal with people with problems regardless

medicine?



It wasn't that way when The Stroller was young and subject to all the common ailments of youth. When there was any sign of a cold the first thing his mother did was get out the piece of red flannel to wrap around his neck. Why it was always red and no other color always has remained a mystery.

SHE WOULD take the piece of red flannel and use some sort of oil and then wrap it around his neck. This was supposed to be a sure cure.

Along with the red flannel she would make him take a spoonful of castor oil



(and this was punishment). But the real rememberance comes when he recalls when he retired at night she made him wrap his stocking around his neck. It had to be stocking he wore during the

If it was a chest cold that gripped The Stroller she would go to the cupboard and return with a bottle of camphortated oil. Then, for the next five or 10 minutes, she would rub his chest.

Mother would repeat the treatment if he complained of a pain in his back. But one thing was certain he would get a good rub before he went to sleep. And the wonder of it all is the fact that these old fashioned methods brought

THERE WERE no pills in those days

and Mother was a watchdog with any of our ailments as she couldn't afford to call a doctor. (There were doctors who made house calls in those days.) But the one case that The Stroller re-

members best concerned his grandmother (his mother's mother). She suffered with what she called "rheumatis." It was the same sort of ache that now is referred to arthritis. She had tried every thing and finally

sent for the doctor. After a thorough examination he recommended the oddest treatment The Stroller ever has heard - even after all these years.


He recommended that she take an ordinary wash cloth, moisten it, and then place it on top of her head and keep it moist all day. He added that she should smoke a pipe.

HE DIDN'T suggest an ordinary pipe. He prescribed a corn cob pipe. You don't see them any more, but they were common in those days down in the Dutch Country.


So, all day long, she would sit at the window of the living room, with the moist cloth on her head and a corn cob pipe in her mouth. It was an odd sight. But it seemed to help.







This recipe serves a crowd and the bars are easy to serve and eat. The dough can be mixed and baked quickly. and ready-to-spread frostings make quick work of decorating.

MINT-FROSTED BUTTER BARS l cup firmly packed brown sugar 1 cup margarine or butter, softened

2 cups all-purpose flour 1 cup flaked coconut

1/2 tsp. salt 4 tsp. baking powder

1 tub vanilla ready-to-spread frosting 4 tsp. peppermint extract 2 drops green food color 1/2 cup creamy deluxe chocolate ready-

ANGEL SHAMROCK COOKIES 1 pkg. (16 oz.) white angel food cake

1/2 cup water

l tsp. vanilla ½ cup chopped nuts

1 pkg. (7 oz.) shredded coconut

l cup ready-to-spread vanilla frosting 2 or 3 drops green food color

12 to 15 spearmint gumdrop leaves

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Cover cookie sheet with aluminum foil or heavy brown paper. Beat cake mix (dry), water and vanilla on low speed, scraping bowl constantly, 30 seconds. Beat on medium speed, scraping bowl occasionally, 1 minute. Fold in nuts and coconut. For each shamrock, drop batter by three ½-teaspoonfuls with edges touching (place each shamrock about 2 inches apart). Bake until set and edges are brown, 12 to 15 minutes. Slide foil onto wire rack; cool cookies completely before removing from foil.





hearth for a homey supper and a restoring cuppa. (For the uninitiated, a "cuppa" is a cup of tea — pronounced "tay" by the Irish and served hot and hearty enough to warm the proverbial "cockles of the heart").

Traditional components of a St. Patrick's Day supper are potatoes, corned beef and cabbage. Today's menu fea-tures these basics in new guise. In place of ordinary boiled "spuds" there are baked stuffed potatoes flecked with the green of chopped parsley and chives. Instead of slices of slow-simmered corned beef, the Galway Bay Casserole is made with thick slices of the canned variety. The slices are set on a bed of sauerkraut (not Irish to be sure but a flavorful combination all the same) and the whole is baked until bubA big pot of freshly brewed "tay" should be served throughout the meal, preferably with milk rather than lemon. Use good quality tea either in loose form or in teahags to insure a brew that gives a gentle lift without a later let down. Follow these simple rules endorsed by tea experts: Heat a teapot by filling it with but water while you bring filling it with hot water while you bring fresh cold water to a full rolling boil. Empty the teapot and measure one teaspoon of tea or one teabag per serving into the pot. Cover the pot and let stand for 3 to 5 minutes. Stir and strain before serving.

Rocks own district title

The only thing missing Friday night was the wishbone offense and Tom Moshimer, with his head set on, pacing the sidelines.

Plymouth Salem and Northville, two big and bruising teams, squared off for the championship of the state Class A district basketball tournament at Plymouth Canton.

The teams transformed the normally passive, non-contact sport of basketball into something more akin to football. It was an all-out, last-one-standing-wins

The last one left standing Friday night was Salem. The Rocks won the game, and their third straight district championship, 57-42. But, they may have to change the school colors from blue and white to black and blue.

"WE KNEW it was going to be a hard-fought game," said Salem coach Fred Thomann. "Based on our size and their size, and based on their key player Steve Schrader and our key player Rick Berberet, who are big, physical players, we knew we were in for a physical game. But, I didnt know that it would be as physical as it was. It was probably as physical a game as I have ever coached in."

But, a Thomann-coached Salem team rarely backs down in a physical ballgame.

"Oh, we are a physical team," he said. "We like to play physical basket-ball, no question. We weren't surprised at all. We just had enough basketball ability to overcome Northville. We played better basketball than they did

Erich Hartnett led Salem in the basketball ability department. He scored

basketball 17 points, hitting seven of 12 shots from the floor. He also made some sparkling

assists, six in total.

Jeff Arnold added 15 for the Rocks, including six important free throws in the final stanza. Berberet scored 11 points and five assists.

IN THE physical department, Scott Jurek, Berberet and LeSean Haygood took on Northville's Schrader, Greg Wendel and Dan Perpich. Salem may have won the physical battle as well at least it didn't have an ill-effect on the rest of Salem's game.



This annual All-Area Wrestling Team brings out the best in each weight class, but Catholic Central's Joe Urso, the state Class A champion at 167 pounds, is definitely The Elite among the elite.

The CC standout leads this year's team, selected

recently by the coaches.

"My kids are special, but this kid (Urso) is special," said CC coach Mike Rodriguez. "He'd run five miles in practice, go home and eat dinner, study, and then run 15 on his own.

"He had calluses on his hands from doing pull-ups just a tremendously dedicated athlete. I could talk about him all night."

Urso came out for wrestling at CC after deciding he was too short to play basketball (he's 6-foot-1).

URSO also excels in the classroom, carrying a 3.46 grade-point average.
"He's very likeable," said the CC coach. "There's

not a teacher in the school who doesn't have a kind word about him. He's very Christian. He'd pray before the matches, not to win, but have the strength

Urso, who holds a career record of 122-20, has been selected to wrestle later this month in the Michigan-Ohio dual meet.

Purdue has already offered him a full-ride scholarship, according to Rodriguez. Notre Dame and Michigan are also interested.

Joining Urso on the All-Area squad are Dan Gibson of Westland John Glenn and Mark Zenas of Livonia Bentley, both of whom finished third in their respective weight classes.

Here is a rundown of the first teamers.

Jim Malson, heavyweight, Plymouth Canton: The Canton heavyweight was 26-13 as a junior to go along with individual titles at the North Farmington and Rochester Adams invitationals.

CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH

ORDINANCE NO.

THIS IS AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 83, AP-PENDIX TO ARTICLE NO. 3 TO ESTABLISH THE OBLIGATION OF PROPERTY OWNERS TO PAY FOR THE MAINTENANCE OF A STORM DRAIN(S) WHICH BENEFIT THEIR PROPERTY AND TO ESTABLISH A PROCEDURE BY WHICH UNPAID STORM DRAIN MAINTENANCE COSTS BECOME A LIEN ON THE PROPERTY BENEFITED BY SAID STORM DRAIN(S).

PREAMBLE

WHEREAS, it is the public purpose of the State of Michigan and its principal subdivisions to provide stormwater drainage for its citizens; WHEREAS, storm drains are under the original jurisdiction of the County of

WHEREAS, said Wayne County requires the Charter Township of Plymouth to

assume jurisdiction over and financial responsibility for the repair and maintenance of storm drains within the Charter Township of Plymouth, located within the road right-of-way and/or public easement to the extent the drain is located within the road right-of-way and/or public easement;

WHEREAS, the Charter Township of Plymouth desires to pass along the costs of repair and maintenance of a storm drain to those property owners whose property is benefited by said storm drains;

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees is the governing body of the Charter Township of Plymouth;
WHEREAS, MCLA 41.341 authorizes the Township Board to promulgate rules and

regulations establishing possession of and maintenance of public water systems; WHEREAS, on June 14, 1983, the Board of Trustees of the Charter Township of Plymouth adopted an Appendix to Article III, Floodplain and Stormwater Districts, Ordinance No. 83 (zoning), which, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is being amend-

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

STORM DRAIN MAINTENANCE AND REPAIRS

Section 1. Costs. All repairs for or replacement of storm drains shall be made at the expense of the owners of the premises served. The Township may in case of an emergency repair and/or replace any storm drains and if this is done the cost of such repair or replacement work shall be repaid to the Township by the owner of the

Section 2. Lien. Charges for storm drain repair or replacement shall be a lien upon the premises whenever a bill for storm drain repair or replacement remains unpaid for sixty (60) days after such repair or replacement has been rendered. The Township Clerk shall file a statement of lien claim. This statement shall contain the legal cription of the premises served, the amount of the unpaid bill, and a notice that the Township claims a lien for this amount as well as for all charges for storm drain replacement or repair rendered subsequent to the period covered by the bill.

If the tenant on the premises is not the owner of the premises, and the Clerk has notice of this, then notice shall be mailed to the owner of the premises, at the last known address on file with the Clerk, whenever a repair or replacement bill remains unpaid for sixty (60) days after a service is rendered.

The failure of the Clerk to record such lien claim or to mail such notice, or the failure of the owner to receive such notice, shall not affect the right to foreclose lien for storm drain repair or replacement as mentioned in the following section. Section 3. Foreclosure of Lien. Property subject to a lien for unpaid storm drain maintenance charges shall be sold for nonpayment of the same, and the proceeds of

such sale shall be applied to pay the charges, after deducting costs, as in the case is the foreclosure of statutory liens. Such foreclosure shall be by bill in equity in the name of the Township. The Township Attorney is hereby authorized and directed to institute such proceed-

ings, in the name of the Township, in any Court having jurisdiction over such matters, against any property for which storm drain maintenance charges have remained unpaid sixty (60) days after service has been rendered. Section 4. The various sections and provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed to

be severable, and should any section or provision of this Ordinance be declared by any Court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole or any section or provision hereof other than the section or provision so declared to be unconstitutional or invalid. Section 5. Repeal. All Ordinances and parts of Ordinances inconsistent with the

provisions hereof are, to the extent of such inconsistencies, hereby repealed. Section 6. The Township Clerk shall publish this Ordinance in the manner required

Section 7. This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon publication





'Splash' offers fun, fantasy, romance

There's lots of new movies around, as Hollywood gears up for post-Oscar summer prime-time. Good news if you're tired of the

same old numbers overplaying their welcome.

There's something for everyone: song and dance, sex and serious

There's something for everyone: song and dance, sex and serious drama, adventure and comedy.

On the lighter side is Touchstone Films' "Splash" starring Daryl Hannah as Madison the Mermaid and Tom Hanks as her lover, Allen Bauer, the Vegetable King. The film is a two-hour Disney adventure with a mildly mature theme.

Hannah, the acrobatic replicant in "Blade Runner," is an accomplished swimmer, dancer and gymnast. She showed her training in "Reckless," starring as the sweet young thing who had everything except a sleazy boyfriend. She soon remedied that. When she wasn't working out on the parallel bars, she worked out on the mat (tress)

"Splash" showcases her attractively and she does her own stunts and swimming while conveying the rudimentary emotions re-

Hanks manages his mermaid-lover role minimally well, strongly aided by two very funny supporting actors. John Candy plays the fat, fast-living playboy brother Freddie as a cross between John Madden and Hugh Hefner. Eugene Levy provides a lot of laughs as screwball scientist Dr. Kornbluth, who is out to prove

there really is a mermaid in town.

On the whole, "Splash" is fun, although unevenly paced with draggy moments between comedy, romance and slapstick routines. It's a Disney real-life adventure with nifty underwater

routines. It's a Disney real-life adventure with nirty underwater sequences, fantasy and a semi-mature plot. It's PG enough for preteens and probably will do well at the box office.

Apparently Disney Studio fears its real-life-adventure "G" rating would prove terminal box office, so it opted for a new name, Touchstone, which screams out, "This is not a Disney film!"

The bottom line: If "Splash" does as well as Disney's "Never Cry Wolf," now nearing the \$25-million mark (and it probably will), then all the Disney concern about no market for "The Recorn Who."

"ICE PIRATES" is an unabashedly naked steal of "Star Wars," with liberal borrowing from "Alien," "I Spy." "Raiders" and e thing else since "The Jazz Singer."

How the theme music avoids copyright infringement is beyond me. Perhaps the film makers borrowed so much from so many that no one knows who should file the first lawsuit.

It's a fairly polished production, however, and worth an idle 90 popcorn-iminutes if you don't mind plagfarism and occasional foolishness: High-heeled boots in the desert, spaceship brigs with windows and actors dragged unscathed across the rocky desert by




