Parking deck to open, but . who pays?

A 30-year-old dream of city merchants and city planners comes true Thursday with the official opening of the new two-story Central Lot Parking Deck in downtown Plymouth

The finishing touches to the gleaming \$1-million structure, at Ann Arbor Trail and Harvey, will be made this week, in time for Thursday's grand opening Some 500 downtown employees have been invited to a "Party on the Deck" 5 30-7 30 p.m. Thursday

But while seiling the bonds to build the deck went smoothly, and while it took two months less time to build the structure than anticipated, one question still plagues city officials

Who will foot the bill to pay the estimated \$40,000 a year it will cost to keep the structure running"

Who will pay to keep the structure lit, clean, swept, safe? Local merchants? Store customers? Plymouth employees who will park there daily?

AND HOW will that money be collected? Through a special assessment on local merchants? Through coin col-



lection machines at the deck? Through some form of token system?

Some dozen local merchants and members of the city's parking commission went round and round on the question last Monday at a special meeting in city hall. Numerous suggestions were aired.

And the same ground will be covered tonight in a special meeting at city hall of the Plymouth City Commission. The meeting takes place after the regular commission meeting.

As it stands now, when the deck opens to the public Friday, gates and coin collection machines will greet exiting customers. If, and how long the 25 cent charge stays, depends on what plan city officials ultimately decide to follow

THE MERCHANTS do agree, they want free parking for customers." said parking coordinator Paul Sincock, who has been spearheading the building of the deck ever since plans got under way last fall.

So we're trying to develop a plan to provide that But for the time being. the parking commission has suggested everyone pay 25 cents until we decide what to do

Sincock said five main plans were floated at Monday's meeting They are

• Divide downtown property owners into six "zones" Owners would be charged a special assessment depending on how far away they are from the deck

· Permanently install a gate coinbox system on the lower deck Everyone entering the deck would pay the same fixed fee, no matter which of the two decks they parked on

 Charge only upper-deck parkers. mostly employees of downtown merchants. Shoppers would be able to park free for up to two hours on the lower deck



AT MONDAY'S meeting, City Mana ger Henry Graper and the parking commission pushed for the special assessment plan, saying the money could be collected more easily at city tax collection time

Sincock described the plan as follows. A special assessment, based on square footage and nearness to the deck, would be levied against downtown property owners. The downtown area would be divided into six zones. fanning out from the spot where the deck is located.

Merchants closest to the deck would pay a 30 percent assessment, the larg est share. Those in the second zone would pay 24 percent, third, 19 percent. fourth, 16 percent, fifth, 7 percent, sixth. 4 percent. Some property owners. would be assessed in two zones because their property lies within both zones

For example, National Bank of Detroit, 306 S. Main, would be assessed twice, for a total of \$1,019, because the building lies within zones one and two Cloverdale Farm Dairy, 447 Forest, lies totally within zone five and would be assessed only once at \$296. The two

Plymouth revs up for July 4th balloon fest

outh Wednesday for the Fourth of July and thousands will be in town Friday for the beginning of the three-day Mayflower Hot Air Balloon Festival

And, except for residents, both rowds are likely to be totally different gatherings of individuals

Activity at the Mayflower will begin Wednesday night with Benny & the Jets bringing in some music from the '50s and 60s to the Mayflower Meeting House at 8 pm

But the balloon festival officially will begin at dusk Friday with the American Airlines Race at 6 p.m. at the launch site at Plymouth Township Park, McClumpha at Ann Arbor Trail

Nearby residents are advised by festival planners that it would be much easier and more pleasant for them to walk to the park to avoid traffic congestion. Likewise, add coordinators Gordin Boring and Scott Lorenz, many residents will find it easier to bike to the site.

Another option is to take advantage of the free bus shuttle service offered for the afternoon launches by Plym-

outh Township. The buses will be leaving at 8-minute intervals from the Ford-Sheldon Plant parking lot at M-14 and Sheldon Road. The shuttle will run 5-9 pm Friday, and 4 to 9 30 pm Sat urday and Sunday

Scheduled balloon flights will depend upon weather Boring and Lorenz of fered a few tips to residents on how to determine if the weather will delay or cancel a flight

A launching will not occur if winds are greater than 12 m p h , said Boring A good way of measuring wind speed. he adds, is to check a flag on a flagpole At 12-14 m.p.h. the flag will be stiff or flying straight out. So anytime the flag is flying less than straight out, wind conditions are favorable to a flight

A launch also will be cancelled or delayed, adds Lorenz, anytime there is a thunderstorm within 25 miles of the site

Festivals goers who "chase" balloons in flight are asked not to walk on or drive onto private property Spectators are asked to stop at the side of the road and call out to the pilot to see if he or she needs help, or to ask the property owner for permission to walk onto the property

Most pilots bring their own chase crews, said Boring, but a few could use volunteers willing to help. Anyone interested in volunteering for a ground or chase crew may sign up at the balloon tent at the launch site. Plymouth Township Park

There will not be any free flights given during the three-day festival, adds Lorenz Anyone wanting to arrange for a flight later in the summer may sign up at the balloon tent.

After the Friday launch is completed, pilot, participants and spectators will be gathering on the deck of Mayflower II for the Balloon Ball, beginning 8 p.m for an admission of \$5. The ball will be held Friday and Saturday evenings.

Saturday's events will begin with the Sunrise Inflation Sale featuring 50 percent off sales starting 5 a.m., 40 percent off at 6 a.m., etc., at participating shops

The Saturday launches will be the Hare & Hound Race at 6 a.m. or thereabouts and the Eastern Airlines Charter.

race at 6 pm. Art In the Park will fill the day's activities from 10 a.m. to 4 pm in Kellogg Park with the Kite Flying Contest being held at 2 p.m in Plymouth Township Park

Sunday will begin with the CNT Race at 6 a m and end with the British Airways "Pick-em up Key Contest" at 6 p.m. featuring cars given away by Dick Scott or Red Holman Pontiac to the pilots able to fly by and pick up keys from the mast of sailboats donated by Bloomfield Beech & Marina.

The sponsors announce that tether rides will be available, weather permitting, at the township park after each launch at \$5 each.

About 50-60 pilots are expected to participate in the three-day event.

Volunteers take over traffic control

When thousands of cars begin descending on the Plymouth area next Friday for the 1984 Mayflower Hot Air Balloon Festival, the extra traffic congestion will be handled by a band of volunteers.

Unless called in for special emergencies, city and township police will not be used for traffic and crowd control during this year's festival, said Township Police Chief Carl Berry. The festival takes place July 6-8 in Plymouth Township Park, a 70-acre park near the intersection of I-275 and M-14.

This is the first time in the four-year history of the festival that uniformed police will not be directing the extra influx of traffic, said Berry.

"Last year, the traffic jams were incredible. The traffic and crowds went beyond our capability and

were handled by a combination of community service officers and uniformed police. But few tickets were issued and we think the extra traffic can be handled by the volunteers. Besides, who could represent our community better than volunteers?'

WEARING orange and red shirts and reflective vests, the 55 helpers will be easy to spot. They are members of the Plymouth Alea Citizen's Band Radio Team (REACT) and the Plymouth Area Citizen's Team (PACT). The township's community service officers, who wear uniforms but are a strictly volunteer force, also will be helping out. The officers have limited enforcement power for parking problems, said Berry.

FESTIVAL planners are hoping a free shuttle bus service will help ease traffic problems. Three buses

will run every eight minutes during evening festival hours from the Ford Motor Co. parking lot on Sheldon Road at the M-14 exit to the township park.

On July 6, the bus will run 5-9 p.m.; on July 7 and 8, 4-9:30 p.m. The service will not operate during the 6 a.m. July 7 and 8 sunrise flights. Balloon launchings will take place each of the three evenings at 6 p.m. at the park.

If the weather is good, festival planners expect a turnout of more than 200,000 during festival days.

Ann Arbor Trail west from Sheldon to Ann Arbor Road will become a one-way westbound road during the festival. McClumpha between Ann Arbor Trail and Ann Arbor Road will be locked, with parking banned, except for local traffic. Glenview and Powell from Beck to Ann Arbor Trail will be, open to local traffic only.



State center closes **Residents leave quietly**

The Plymouth Center for Human Development has closed its doors.

It may be the largest institution of its kind to close under court order in the United States ever.

Without fanfare or publicity, the last 40-60 residents were transferred to other institutions. They were the last of their "class" - members of the class action lawsuit filed on their behalf in 1978

Before 1978, Plymouth Center for Human Development (PCHD), at Five Mile and Sheldon in Northville, was just another state institution for the mentally retarded. At the height of the movement which believed institutionalization was the best answer for the mentally retarded, 1,200 adults and children lived there. In 1978 the number had declined to about 850 with most coming from the metropolitan Detroit area.

It was the parents and friends of these residents who sued the state Department of Mental Health in United States District Court in Detroit alleging neglect and abuse. Judge Charles W Joiner heard the case and it is his order, dated Aug. 30, 1979, which is still in effect

The plaintiffs in the case were the Michigan Association for Retarded Citizens (MARC) and the Plymouth Association for Retarded Citizens (PARC), both parent-friend-concerned-citizen advocacy groups for the mentally retarded. Several of the residents were also listed as plaintiffs.

PRESIDENT OF the PARC at that time was Alice Saules, who recently moved to Plymouth.

Her son Christopher, now 23, had been a resident of Plymouth Center but had gone to live in a group home before the suit was filed.

"It was just so bad," Saules said Even with the extra money the legis-Everything lature was allowing us .

they tried to do just didn't seem to help. Oh, sure, it got a little better. But not for all the money that was going into it. "So we got together and decided to sue

Like most parents of the time, the Saules had placed their son in the institution when he was quite young.

There were no services back then. no mandatory special education." she said. "Everybody from the doctor to clergy, friends, relatives advised us this was the only thing to do.

Saules does not know if Christopher was one of those abused. Profoundly retarded, Christopher was not able to talk

"I may have buried my head," Saules said. "I look back now and there were

little things. But they'd always say, 'the kids hurt each other.

"THERE WERE no big bruises or anything serious enough that he wound up in the hospital. We were lucky. "It has been a long struggle," she

said. "The department has done a good job. I just wish more could have been placed

Saules seemed quietly pleased that PCHD is closing. 'We are the only ones who actually followed through," she said, "and we're

not through yet. We're sticking with it until all the others are placed, too."

According to David Verseput, Plymouth master appointed by the federal district court to oversee the closing,

those transferred in the last few weeks to other institutions were "fragile" or had behavior problems making them more difficult to place in community residential facilities. Some of these people require specialized nursing care.

But, he said, a number of those have already been placed, and he expects the remainder to be in the community by the end of the year.

"It was coming down to the point where it was difficult to keep staff." Verseput said. "They knew it would close eventually. It was hard to provide services and care."

VERSEPUT SAID it was especially difficult to keep specialists and professionals such as registered nurses.

"Last year we only had one psychologist and we still had 100 residents," he said.

There was also some risk in terms of progress made by 'class" members if they remained.

"Consistency is a real important thing for them," Verseput said. Verseput said parents agreed to the

transfers Joiner's decree set up a timetable by which specific numbers of residents were to be placed in the community.

By March 31, 1983, the maximum PCHD census was to be 100, with those out by Jan. 1, 1984. Any remaining thereafter were to do so only subject to the review of the master and "until, and only until, appropriate community placements are developed."

A recent visitor to PCHD found the parking lots mostly empty and the only regular traffic that of the security guards making their rounds. The lobby of the administration building was full of furniture - not for visitors to sit upon hut piled high and ready to be moved out.

THE RECEPTIONIST in her cubicle was surrounded by drawers of file cards; she too was preparing to move.

"Everything is going," she said. "Someone even came by the other day

Many of the playfields at the Plymouth Center for Human Development in Northville have become overgrown with weeds. The center was ordered

and wanted my Rolodex telephone file. I told them they could wait until I'm gone

And then she said, "I don't know why they're closing this place. No one can understand it. They all come in from Lansing . . . and they can't understand it either. This place is really nice." But in 1978 it wasn't so nice. The 850

residents who lived there, adults and children, were subject to neglect, physical abuse, sexual abuse.

At about the same time the parents were filing their lawsuit, the Detroit Free Press was exposing in detail the horrors of Plymouth.

Then-director William Womack was quoted in regard to a young woman who had been tied in a chair with her mouth taped shut. The woman's shrill voice and aggressive behavior would make anyone "want to tape her mouth shut and put your fist in her mouth and what not

WOMACK WAS transferred and a few months later fired.

Walk past Binet, Molloy or John F. Kennedy halls today and what you see are buildings new by institutional standards. The cornerstone on the Kennedy building says 1962. It was built, no doubt, by well-meaning people who thought the modernistic structure was an enlightened treatment center and a suitable tribute to President Kennedy. After all, one of his sisters was mentally retarded, and he had established a presidential commission to study and make recommendations

30, 1979.

The buildings are empty, doors closed and locked. While the vast lawns are mowed periodically, weeds fill cracks everywhere. Where once perhaps children lined a wall waiting to re-enter a building, flowered thistles now grow in abundance.

The buildings are clean inside and out, the floors shine with a high luster. But not even fresh air, time and vacancy can erase the institutional odor that emanates from inside, a combination of urine, soap, sweat, vomit.

"THE COURT order played a part' in the closing of PCHD, said Tom De-Loach, acting director of the office of communications for the Department of Mental Health. "But Michigan was already moving to reduce the size of DD (developmental disability) centers all over the state anyway

closed by District Judge Charles Joiner on Aug.

"The court order just speeded thingup," he said.

"The people of this state - different governors, different legislatures, the courts - the overwhelming majority of the people have been amazingly consistent over the past 15 years in their support of community placement," he

As for PCHD itself, no one knows for sure what will happen to it. There had been some talk of using it as a correct tional facility but area resident strongly protested, so that use is un likely.







Joiner issued lengthy decree

U.S. District Judge Charles W. Joiner's 1979 order has resulted in the closing of Plymouth Center for Human Development. Joiner's 21-page decree set guidelines for the care and treatment of all the residents at PCHD and provided for constant monitoring by parents, professionals and the court itself through its appointed master.

Here are a few excerpts:

All mentally retarded individuals can and should live in the more normalized environment of the community and do not require institutionalization, given the development of necessary habilitation and support services in the community.

"Defendants are required to provide for the residents of PCHD such adequate habilitation as will afford a reasonable opportunity for them to acquire and maintain such life skills as are necessary to enable them to cope as effectively as their capacities per

'Residents and clients are entitled to live in the least restrictive, most normal residential alternative and to receive appropriate habilitation, training, and support suited to their individual needs.

'The determination of the appropriate residential and non-residential placement for each resident and client will be made so as to guarantee that all persons are placed in the least restrictive alternative which will provide them with appropriate habilitation, training, and support; smaller residential alternatives are preferred to larger ones. Defendants agree that they will not place members of the class in new residences having more than an eight-bed capacity . . .







More on old d'Etroit — French frontier village

(Part 10)

Readers familiar with the history of Plymouth will recognize the names of many of those who subscribed to the Presbyterian brick church in 1848, or rented pews in 1850.

Some of them - notably John S. Tibbits. Jonathan Shearer, Henry Fralick, E.J. Penniman, John Kellogg, Bethuel Noyes, John Fuller and George A. Starkweather - made their marks in the community's business or political spheres.

Penniman and Starkweather are among several Presbyterians who won a place in the Plymouth Hall of Fame when it was established in 1980 by the Kiwanis Club of Plymouth.

When church pews were rented on Jan. 7, 1850. Penniman paid \$30 for three of them. Shearer and Fralick each paid \$12.50 for their-pews. Kellogg and Tibbits rented pews at \$10

each. Twenty-four-year old George Starkweather got one for \$6.

IN 1853, the year Martin Luther's "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" was translated into English, some church member made a sketch of the pews and the amounts at which they were rented. Pews on the aisle went for \$12.50 a year. Those on an outside aisle, or toward the back of the church, varied in prices down to \$5. Some of the pews were located immediately to the right and left of the pulpit.

It was the custom to ask the congregation to sign a subscription list each year, with the money going toward the salary of the minister. The list signed in April 1854 pledged payment toward a fund of \$200 to be paid quarterly to the Rev. Sylvester Cochrane. Similar subscriptions were signed in 1855 and 1856



The Rev. Mr. Cochrane had been supplying the pulpit since the spring of 1854. He became resident minister on May, 1856, the day after the bursting of a whale oil lamp in Root's Hotel on Main Street started a fire that destroyed all but two of the buildings in the business block facing Kellogg Park. Although Cochrane had organized a New School church in Northville in 1848, he apparently had no qualms about accepting a call from Plymouth, a member of the Old School. As previ-

ously noted, the schism, so serious at high levels, may not have seemed as important at the local level, at least in this area

COCHRANE REMAINED here until April 19, 1859, when he and the congregation joined in asking the Presbytery to dissolve his pastoral relationship with the church. He is buried in Rural Hill Cemetery in Northville.

Arthur D. Stevens, who was to establish a record as an elder and a record

for church attendance, joined the congregation in 1858, the year the Reverend George Duffield, Jr. wrote "Stand up, Stand up for Jesus." Duffield was pastor of churches in Adrian and Saginaw. Arthur Stevens' wife, Agnes Sawyer, joined the church in 1860. More about the Stevens and their son, Clarence, later

On March 30, 1859, Daniel Punches and his wife, Mehitabel, conveyed to the trustees of the church the west 20 feet of lot 193 and the west 20 feet of lot 192 adjacent to church property.

In 1863, Perry Stevens and Joseph S. Clayton became the church's first ushers. Actually, they were appointed to "seat strangers," probably as a means to divert them from occupying rented pews.

In December 1863, the members of the church who had formed the "Plymouth Social Union" five years earlier held their last meeting. The group had first met in October 1858 at the home of Dr. Rodger. Members read essays, sang, played the melodeon and occupied themselves at "social enjoyment and prayer.'

AT THE MEETING in November 1858, John S. Tibbits read an essay on "America and Her Institutions." At another meeting, O.R. Pettingill read one on "Individuality and Character." On Dec. 12, 1858, when he was 52, George Anson Starkweather spoke about "True Self and National Greatness." Any one of these topics could have been influenced by a reading of the works of Ralph Waldo Emerson, the great New England essayist, philosopher, poet and lecturer, who was then at the height of his career

O&E Monday, July 2, 1984

Among the members of the Plymouth Social Union, in addition to those named, were Ebenezer J. Penniman, Arthur D. Stevens and Mary B. Hough.

In January 1864, the church trustees posted notices in conspicuous places throughout the village. They offered a reward of ten dollars for detection and conviction of the person who broke the lock used to secure the "gate opening into the yard and shed." During the same year, the church paid \$3 for two cords of wood. If the price seems low, one must take into account that the collection for Jan. 11 of that year totalled only \$5.25.

The annual report, dated April 1, 1864, showed 60 communicant members and 50 children in the Sunday School. In that year, the congregation held a donation party for the Rev. B.F Murden. It netted \$100, no small sum at that time. Murden was the minister here from 1863 to 1868. (To be continued).


July Fourth and the 2 Plymouths

IT WAS in that year that our city established and celebrated its centennial and invited the Lord Mayor of Plymouth, England, and his court to be our guests. The ties between the two Plymouths were made stronger than ever.

It was during that visit that Lord Mayor Frank Chapman, now deceased, surprised the throng at a civic dinner, when he reached under the table and presented to the city a bit of rock from the dock from which The Mayflower sailed.

The rock is a valuable piece of history. People walk by this bit of rock each day and don't know it. Others notice the rock but don't realize its significance.

There are several Plymouth Rocks in America, but none that have the significance of the one enclosed in glass on the City Hall lawn. It is the only official Plymouth Rock in America.

Plymouth has maintained close ties with Plymouth, England over the years.

A FEW YEARS ago a group of Plymouth friends journeyed to Plymouth, England, to help celebrate the 350th anniversary of the sailing of The Mayflower. While there they saw the gap in the dock from which the bit of rock was taken by Lord Chapman.

During the celebration, the Stars and Stripes were flown over British government buildings for the first time. Every shopkeeper's window displayed an American flag.

The people of Michigan presented four trees to the folks over there. They are growing on the lawn of the government buildings as a reminder of the friendship that has been built over the years.

These events give special meaning to Independence Day in Plymouth, Michigan. Other communities have their parades and clebrations and try to imagine what really has been going on through the pages of history

TAKE A STROLL down Main Street and have a good look at the "bit of rock" the late Frank Chapman, the Lord Mayor of Plymouth, England brought here.

Sure, weather permitting the city will have a parade and there will be picnics and all sorts of gatherings. But a trip down Main Street to look at the rock that is the tie between two countries would be well worthwhile. It is a bit of history one can get without reading history books. Have a happy Fourth of July!

discover Michigan by Bill Stockwell

DID YOU KNOW that famed architect Albert Kahn was a native-born German who opened a small architectural office in Detroit in 1895 and went on to become a legendary figure in architecture?

At one time, he earned money as a waiter in a Detroit restaurant on Third Street. He advanced to \$30 a week tracing and drafting plans for a Detroit architect.

During the 47 years that Kahn headed his firm - until he died in 1942 his company was responsible for billions of dollars worth of office buildings, factories, warehouses, docks, foundaries, smelters and mills

DID YOU know that some houses, a primitive school and a printing office began to appear in the settlement of Holland, Mich., late in the summer of 1847? The early Dutch settlers endured plenty of hardships.

Arriving by oxcart, they completed two log cabins which had no stoves, so cooking had to be done outside over the open fire. Bread was rolled into balls and baked in the ashes. A brew made from roasted corn substituted for tea and coffee.

Later, real estate activity picked up with city lots being offered at \$10-15 a piece. Holland was beginning to sink its roots deep into the soil of the Michigan wilderness



Decanting bottle is an old ritual

One of the rituals of wine, and there are a great many, is associated with the opening of a bottle of well-aged red wine, usually a bordeaux or a cabernet sauvignon. Like most cultural rituals, this one, decanting the bottle, has much historical foundation behind it.

The logic behind the practice is essentially simple. Red wines tend to develop (the verb "throw" is usually used) a sediment as they age. This consists of small, dark particles, harmless in themselves but visually unattractive. These are a natural process with highly tanic wines and in no sense should be considered a fault of any kind in the wine itself. Like aches and pains, it is an artifact of the aging process.

Wine so aged needs special handling, and a major step in that involves extricating the sediment for the clear wine. Step one involves bottle preparation,

a simple matter of standing the bottle upright for a day or two prior to opening. This allows the sediment to settle on the bottom of the bottle rather than its extended interval of horizontal stor

age. STEP TWO involves pouring the wine out of the original bottle into a large, clear, clean carafe. The wine is poured slowly, with a sharp light behind it (visualize the scene in the cartoon with the candle behind the bottle), until the sediment begins to show in the original bottle and threatens to escape. An additional feature may involve using a cheesecloth or coffee filter to pour the wine through, thereby catching even more stray particles.

The wine that surrounds the particles is, sadly, lost in this process, but if the operation is well done, this usually amounts to an ounce or less. Loving our wines clear as we do (the "claret" of the British), it is a small price to pay.

An enhancement to this is to return the wine to the original bottle once it has been thoroughly rinsed. This enables the host to display the precious label to guests, another ritual impossi-



ble to execute with a decanter, however lovely that may be.

The whole trick in all this, and the only time of risk, is at the point just ahead of the release of the sediment. A bit too much of a gamble shatters the effect rather badly and because the old wine has been exposed to a great deal of air by now, there is no second chance.

Some wines, usually from California, state on the label that they have been "unfined" or "unfiltered" or both. Of whatever age, these as well should be poured carefully if not decanted.

Wines to be routinely decanted are seven years and older hermitages, bourdeaux and cabernets. Pinot noir does not generally require it, but a 10year-old burgundy may require modest treatment. Some quality zinfandels of sound age should also be carefully checked prior to serving. Big Italian red wines, especially chianti reserves, barolos, barbarescos and brunellos, should also be decanted after six to eight years of age.

ACTOR KILMER DOES a creditable job as the rock star and is pleasantly mild, or is it mildy pleasant, particularly in his musical numbers.





Plymouth implements Neighborhood Watch

Plymouth, with all its amenities, is one of the few communities in Michigan — or in the United States for that matter — that does not have a citywide Neighborhood Watch program.

Although the program has been in operation for a decade in other parts of Michigan, the Plymouth Police Department is just beginning to organize the city into the block-by-block crime alert system that has been working so successfully in other areas.

Plymouth is not the only newcomer to Neighborhood Watch. Plymouth Township, too, is just beginning to getinvolved in the program. According to Michael T. Gardner,

According to Michael T. Gardner, crime prevention officer for Plymouth, the city plans to meet with as many neighborhood block clubs and other organizations as it can find, in an effort to get the program started.

"The good news is that break-ins are down 74 percent from last year," said Gardner. "But the bad news is that they are going to increase."

OFFICER GARDNER spoke with the Plymouth chapter of the American Association of Retired Persons Wednesday in the Plymouth Cultural Center.

Following a crime prevention film narrated by veteran actor Scott Brady, Gardner explained that the watch program, which has been tried in many other communities, is working.

"But even if everyone does everything (they are supposed to do as part of the Neighborhood Watch program)," said Gardner, "that is still no guarantee against crime. However, statistics show that this actually does work.

"Break-ins are not pleasant. You have the feeling that your home has been violated. The thieves know what's there and they may be back."

Gardner said prevention is the key to lowering the crime rate. "A criminal triangle needs to exist before a crime can be committed," he said. "There must be desire or criminal intent, a victim and an opportunity.

"But all it takes (to prevent crime) is people willing to work together."

Gardner said Plymouth Township and Canton Township have watch programs, but that such a program is just beginning to get under way in Plymouth.

For those neighborhoods interested in getting into the watch program, he advised that they get their applications for assistance in as early as possible.

"We will take the neighborhoods in the order that we receive their requests for assistance," said Gardner

FIRST, EACH neighborhood must form an organization. That is, they must get the cooperation of a group of blocks within a specific area of the city.

Second, they must select a representative, who will act as liaison with the Plymouth Police Department, arrange neighborhood meetings and enlist residents in the program.

"We are attempting to organize all Plymouth neighborhoods block-byblock," said Gardner. "We require that a neighborhood representative distribute invitations (to form the watch) to

his neighbors. Next, a meeting will take place, probably in city hall. There, residents will be told how to make their homes more secure. We will provide them with a security survey if they ask for it.

"We'll look at their locks, their doors,

their lighting and make recommendations. An important part of the Neighbor-

hood Watch program is Operation Identification. "Under this procedure, residents are less likely to become victims," said Gardner. "We will show you what to look for, because people are

sometimes uncertain about what is considered suspicious behavior.

"There are also some techniques to be used in responding to suspicious behavior. For example, we try to keep people on the telephone so that the police dispatcher can radio patrol cars on the latest activity; or, if nothing is happening, the (telephoner) can let the police know which way the thleves went."


Neighborhoods that participate will be provided with the familiar Neighborhood Watch stickers, to be placed in windows, and with Neighborhood Watch signs at street intersections.




were from Plymouth, the girls informed the seniors they were from Canton Troop 303, from Isbister School. For the next four hours, the girls



Cigarette smokers have a two to four times greater risk of sudden death from heart disease than nonsmokers. Their risk markedly increases when such factors as high blood pressure, high blood cholesterol or diabetes are also present.



Triathlon training is no picnic

Canton's Robbi Woolard has been working hard to prepare herself for what is considered to be the most grueling sports event known - the Ironman Triathlon.

The strenuous World Championship event, which takes place in Kona, Hawaii, Oct. 6, is the most prestigious triathlon anywhere. It consists of a 2.4mile ocean swim, followed immediately by a 112-mile bike race, and finishes with a 26.2-mile marathon. But Woolard believes she'll be ready when it comes time for her to face her stiffest challenge ever.

"I'm very excited," the 30-year-old housewife and mother of two said. "I'm thrilled that I'll be able to do it in Hawaii. It's such a great race. They've really built it up over the past couple of years.

"I hope to do better than just finish - I'd like to place in my age group. But my main goal is to finish. There are a lot of tremendous athletes out there.

OF THE 8,000 athletes that applied for the Ironman, only 1,250 were accepted. Woolard was one of 300 that won their spot in an open lottery. The other 950 earned their berths by placing well in local, regional and national triathlons

For the past three years, Woolard has been competing in triathlons in Michigan, Indiana, Illinois and most recently Texas, so she knows what it will take to get herself ready for the big

"I started training hard last Fall," she said. "I decided to make a full commitment. Now, I feel like I'm getting down to the wire. It takes at least a year to build up a good base."

Woolard trains four hours a day, six days a week. Her weekly conditioning program includes six to eight hours of swimming, 200 miles of cycling and at least 50 miles of running.

Because the competition is made up of three separate events (with one immediately following the other), she has to concentrate on all three if she is to do well

"SWIMMING AND RUNNING are my strengths," she said. "Swimming has always been easy for me, and I've always jogged and run in local races.

Cycling is the sport I've had to pick up. It's been my weak point.

"A lot of triathlete's weakness is swimming. It's encouraging to come out of the water good, but then it's depressing when I get passed on the bike. I usually come back strong in the running to pass the same people that passed me.

The physical abuse these athletes take is tough enough, but they also take a mental beating, according to Woolard.

"The mental aspects of competing can be even more difficult," she said. "If you lose your concentration, you're in trouble. You have to focus on finishing.'

Woolard prepares herself by mentally breaking down the triathlon into different phases.

"YOU THINK ABOUT the race as if each segment is a race in itself," she said. "It makes it much easier to handle."

Competing in triathlons can get expensive with equipment and travelling costs, and Woolard is in need of a spon-

"I can't imagine the pain cf not finishing after all the time and money I've invested," she said.

She'll leave for Hawaii two weeks before the competition starts to get accustomed to the intense heat.

The women's record was set last year by 22-year-old Sylviane Puntous of Montreal, who completed the race in 10:43:36. Woolard said a realistic goal for her would be to finish in from 13 to 14 hours.

Grid coach opts for South Lyon job

The revolving door continues to whirl at the office of head football coach at Thurston High School.

The latest to exit is John Switchenko, who announced his resignation on Thursday, June 14 (the school's graduation day).

The Connecticut-native Switchenko, who posted a 2-7 record last year with a less-than-talented outfit, is moving to greener pastures.

He'll be the new head football coach at South Lyon and has been hired as a permanent substitute teacher. Last year, Switchenko was strictly on call as a sub in the South Redford and Plymouth-Canton school districts.

"I'll have a better chance getting into the district than I would have had at Thurston," Switchenko said. "They have only two or three teachers on layoff in South Lyon, so in a couple of years I should be part of the staff."

Thurston principal Jack Harms, meanwhile, saw the move coming.

"I KNEW he (Switchenko) was looking for a full-time job and we're sorry to lose him," Harms said. "He started to turn things around last year.

"He'll get (medical) benefits there. That's the big thing. I can't blame him.

The Thurston principal said he is taking applications immediately for a new head coach. Those interested should contact Harms at 535-4000.

"I had one area coach in mind who did not coach last year," said Harms, but he wasn't interested.

This is twice that we've been left in the lurch, but I'm glad it's not August. John already had a summer program planned and we'll be doing everything we can to get somebody as quickly as possible

"We just won't get anybody, we'll get somebody good.'

Early in the 1982 season, head coach Mark LaPointe suffered a mild heart attack and eventually stepped down the following summer. Dan Knapp served out the 1982 campaign as interim coach. Switchenko, who moved to Plymouth because of his wife's job transfer, was hired by Harms just before the 1983 season kicked off.

WITH ONLY 23 varsity players and no JV squad, Switchenko led Thurston to non-league wins over Walled Lake Western and Romulus. His team also battled Northwest Suburban League (NSL) foes Livonia Franklin and Redford Union down to the wire before los-

"It was an opportunity to get my foot in the door," Switchenko said. "I was able to get established and make a name for myself. And I learned a lot as a head coach. It's a lot different than being an assistant.

"South Lyon is an up and coming program and Kensington Valley Conference has had some teams make the playoffs. This is a nice opportunity for myself."

Ironically, South Lyon beat Thurston in last year's season finale, 29-20.

"I had 80 kids at the first meeting at South Lyon and that's encouraging," Switchenko said. "Thurston was a tough situation as far as football goes.

"The numbers will be very low this year and that was a problem, but they have some good kids."

South Lyon head coach Dan Skatzka was dismissed last January because of philosophical differences with principal Garvin Smith.

South Lyon athletic director Brad Lloyd then contacted Switchenko last month. Switchenko won out over 43 other applicants.






