

Women enter Jaycee ranks

Moira Breen of Plymouth Township has become the first woman to officially become a member of the Plymouth Jaycees.

Breen, daughter of Plymouth Township Supervisor Maurice Breen and Schoolcraft Trustee Mary Breen, was sworn-in as a Jaycee at the group's recent summer state meeting. Other women were sworn in at the Jaycee's state convention held recently in Troy.

Another woman joining the Plymouth Jaycees is Karen Murphy, also of Plymouth Township, who is a local high school graduate and a two-time candidate for the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education.

Michigan Jaycees, the first to admit women, were honored at the state gathering with a visit from Jaycee national president Tommy Todd of Georgia.

In the wake of a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision, the Jaycees' bylaws were amended to admit women at a national conference in Tulsa, Okla., last month

Todd, along with former Michigan Supreme Court Justice Dorothy Comstock Riley, were speakers at an evening session at the Troy Hilton Inn.

On the same evening at Allen Park's Thunderbowl, Todd and Michigan Supreme Court Justice Patricia Boyle addressed Wayne County Jaycee members. Both speakers were on hand as several Canton and Plymouth women were sworn in as the local chapters' first female members.

"As being the first woman sworn into the Plymouth Jaycees," said Breen, "I am truly honored. It could not have happened at a better time or place. I was sworn in at the Banquet of the Summer State Meeting in Marquette along with many of the ex Jaycee women." Her father is a former member of the Plymouth Jaycees

The motion to accept women as Michigan Jaycee members was seconded by the Canton chapter during the recent state quarterly meeting in Mar-quette, said Doug Ritter, former Plymouth Jaycee and immediate Canton Jaycee past president and Marybeth's husband.

'We're real tickled that we were the chapter to second this thing. It's big news for the Canton Jaycees," said Ritter, Ritter attended the summer assembly at Northern Michigan Universi-

Current Jaycee President Bob Olson seconded the motion after "we asked Dennis Keith, the state president, if he would allow us the honor," Ritter said.

"HE SAID, 'If you're there, and if you second the motion, chances are you'll be recognized.' '

The amendment changed every mention of "young man" to "young person." Membership in the organization, which emphasizes leadership training, still is open only to people ages 18-35.

Jaycees from nearly 800 Upper and Lower Penninsula chapters witnessed the induction of 115 women members at the state assembly.

Canton Jaycees, unlike some other chapters, are excited about the change. Unlike local Jaycees, a chapter in Zilwaukee has announced its intentions to disband rather than accept women into membership.

"We're very pleased," Ritter said. "We're already making changes within our local chapter. We have three or four board vacancies, and we anticipate at least some of them will be filled by women.'

# 2 arrested after armed standoff

A 21-year-old Plymouth man was arrested following an armed standoff with police late Saturday night/early Sunday morning.



Plymouth's city attorney will decide whether disorderly conduct charges will be brought against Department of Public Works Superintendent Ken Vogras.





# Couple teaches Bible through clowning

Most Bibles don't tell you that Noah's wife was allergic to animal hair.

Or that after being kicked out of the garden, Adam and Eve settled somewhere east of Eden.

Or that while inside the whale, Jonah was heard playing the kazoo to the tune of "Nobody Knows the Trouble I've Seen."

But that's how Jim and Kathy LeDuc, whose Giggle Productions interpret these biblical passages.

Jim, pastor of Kirk of Our Savior United Presbyterian Church in Westland and vice president of the Wayne-Westland Board of Education, and his wife Kathy have been pastoral clowns/ storytellers for almost five years.

"We take stories from the Bible and retell them. We try to bring out the humor and the warmth," Jim said.

TO THE LeDucs, clowning is a theology, not just a gimmick to hold the audience's attention. The clown is a religiously historical tradition, according to Kathy. "It symbolizes the unique creations of God," she said.

In their book of skits, "Wearing the Face of God," the LeDucs write that they have attempted to convey the original messages from the Bible, but that they "have also exercised the storyteller's privilege in bringing the characters to life by giving them props, signs and symbols of contemporary times."

times." "Experience has taught us that the use of this special technique brings the Bible to life in a unique way which leaves a lasting impression and memory with the viewer/listener," they write.

The LeDucs' interest in pastoral clowning started about 10 years ago, and they have studied with nationally

known clowning teachers. Jim's interest has progressed to the point that the doctoral thesis that he currently is writing is entitled "A Guidebook for Clown Ministry."

THE LeDUCS start by exploring the stories of the Bible that have humorous aspects, researching them thoroughly and fleshing out little-known characters. It's a serious and spiritual journey," Jim said.

Each skit begins with a reading of the Bible passage, because "it gives it credibility," Kathy said.

"We scrape below the surface and the superficial and give them a new twist," Jim said. "I have a hunch that many people are hearing the stories for the first time or just now discovering the depths."

Most of the Giggle Production performances are for adults in groups of 50 to 100 people. "Clowning is an adult activity," Jim said. "Children enjoy the visuals, but the humor is on an adult level."

Initially the adult audience may be uncomfortable with the clowning. "People are confused between acting with childlike innocence and acting childish," Jim said.

TO COMBAT the uncomfortableness, the LeDucs do some warm-up activities including juggling and fire eating. Any uneasiness that remains after that may be because "the clown has a tendency to hold up a mirror," Jim said. "Somtimes looking at the mirror is very hard."

The LeDucs consider pastoral clowning just a different art form. "We're not out to compete with anyone," Jim said. "We need different things to nourish us."

Jim said all of the money samed from their dominute and dominute performances has gone back into the clowning equipment. As well as giving their performances, the LeDucs have taught workshops on applying clown makeup, how to do storytelling, and ways to find humor in the Bible.

A new show in rehearsal includes passages from the Book of Ruth and Song of Solomon.

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# Japanese company plans move to Canton site

A \$10-million complex will be built on a 20-acre site in Canton Township to house the U.S. headquarters of a Japanese-based multinational corporation.

Canton Township board members Tuesday night approved, 8-0, the sale of the property bounded by Haggerty and Warren roads to the American Yazaki Corp. for \$405,000.

**Trustee Carol Bodenmiller and Clerk** John Flodin were absent.

American Yazaki, currently leasing offices in Livonia, is a diversified electronics corporation which makes wiring equipment for automotive, solar and gas industrial use. It is involved in the import, export, sale and design of electrical wiring and lists Ford, General Motors, Chrysler and Nissan as major customers.

The property, southeast of the intersection of Haggerty and Warren roads and west of I-275, is situated near the center of approximately 550 acres of largely vacant industrially zoned land.

The 200,000 square-foot facility will house the firm's administrative offices, and will provide area for prototype design and assembly and product storage and distribution, according to Keith Groebe, an attorney for Yazaki.

American Yazaki has been negotiating the purchase of the property since May, according to David Nicholson, director of economic growth for the township.

NICHOLSON SAID Yazaki plans to begin construction as soon as possible

and expects to relocate to the new facility by mid-1985.

Industrial revenue bond funding will be sought to help finance the construction, and American Yazaki will receive a 12-year tax abatement from the township, Nicholson said.

"American Yazaki would provide substantial tax base and employment," Nicholson said.

American Yazaki employs 105 people at its Livonia plant and projects a \$110-million net sales figure for the current fiscal year, Groebe said. The company expects to hire at least 30 new employees after the move.

Groebe said 53 of the company's 86 suppliers are located in Michigan. 'American Yazaki is truly attached to the state of Michigan," he said.

Groebe said the new construction is the first phase of a two-phase plan which would include the future purchase of an additional 35 acres for a manufacturing facility.

American Yazaki Corp. was impressed with the Canton Township site because of "the favorable labor base,

... prospects for favorable financing characteristics of the property," Groebe said.

Board member Robert Padget said the Yazaki purchase "is the most exciting thing that has happened in my time on the board."

Padget said the township's work at attracting industrial development was "all coming to focus, all bearing fruit." Padget told American Yazaki repre-

sentatives that he felt "honored that you have selected Canton. We are flattered and proud."

An attempted horse theft early Sunday morning resulted in the destruction of a horse belonging to the owner of Banbury Cross Horse and Carriage Service.

The horse, a 13-year-old Tennessee Walker owned by John Hopkins, was destroyed by a veteri-narian because of a broken leg.

The horse best may be remembered pulling carriages and surreys through Plymouth and Detroit streets. For years Hopkins, a former French teacher at Plymouth Centennial Educational Park (CEP), operated the ride service in Plymouth. He recently moved his operations to downtown Detroit

Hopkins and his carriage service have been featured in P.M. Detroit and metropolitan newspapers and magazines. He first ran the service regularly in downtown Plymouth, then switched to the Plymouth Hilton, before his most recent move.

According to police reports, Hopkins secured the horse outside 1105 Starkweather about midnight. Officers responded to the neighborhood about 3:20 a.m. on a report of a horse and buggy running loose. When they arrived, officers spotted a horse buggy wedged between a lamp post and the northwest corner of 950 Starkweather. The horse was standing at the south side of the building with a collar around its neck and its right front leg bleeding.

Apparently the horse injured the leg after someone tried to hitch it to the buggy. Hopkins told police he secured the horse without the buggy being attached.

A witness told police she saw two men with Hopkins' horse earlier in the morning. The men said they were securing the horse for Hopkins.

Both men were described as white, in their early 20s. about 5 foot 7 or 8 inches tall, stocky builds with dark complexion, short-cut dark hair, with one wearing a mustache, green T-shirt and jeans, and the other wearing a yellow T-shirt.

The horse was valued at an estimated \$1,200 while a dollar value for damage to the buggy has not yet been determined.

I support the 1.74 mill increase in school operating money to be voted upon Oct. 2. I sincerely hope enough people agree with this position to make the increase in operating money a real-



# Michigan economy inches up

The Michigan economy as measured by the Michigan Business Activity Index, rose in July to a level of 130, up 2 points from a revised 128 in July, Manufacturers Bank said today.

The index stands 14 percent ahead of its year-ago level of 114.

Auto and truck production jumped sharply, along with financial activity comsumption, employment, and energy usage sectors experienced minor gains and losses.

Manfacturers Bank Staff Economist Patrick L. Anderson noted that with the deadline for the auto workers' contract approaching, automobile production was likely to rise.

"With the automoible manufacturers anticipating a possible strike, they will keep production at a high level. Any stockpile they accumluate now can be sold during a strike if necessary.

"With the national economic recovery continuing, automakers already have low inventories. The possibility of a strike is another incentive to keep the plants producing at full speed. "This high level of auto production is boosting the

"This high level of auto production is boosting the Michigan economy, by pumping in wage income to employees and increasing demand for goods and services," Anderson stated.

The Michigan Business Activity Index is compiled from statistics on five major sectors of the state's economy. It is calculated on a seasonal and inflation-adjusted basis, from a 1967 equal 100 base.

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# 10A(P) No place to hide in a glass house

THE PLYMOUTH Police Officers As-Sociation wants accountability from the City Commission. The association is demanding answers to questions about pofice department finances, as well as demanding the reinstatement of Ralph White as police chief.

Why all the fuss? We don't know for sure - the union leadership refuses to talk to the Observer.

How ironic that a group crying out for accountability and answers chooses to withhold information from the Observer and its readers. Brings to mind the adage about people living in glass houses not throwing stones.

But to clarify matters, it's not the entire union throwing the stones, just the leadership - president Mike Gardner.

Gardner, you see, is upset with the Observer's coverage of the police department. Rumor has it he thinks it was onesided, especially a story in which City Manager Henry Graper charged that "there are some problems with the performance of the police officers."

GARDNER MAY have preferred that the story go unprinted. Perhaps he believed that his refusal to comment on Graper's concerns would quash the cover-

age. The city manager's statements were laid out before Gardner - prior to the story being written. He was given the opportunity to respond and chose not to. It's his right to refuse comment — but he shouldn't squawk later about one-sided stories

When the police arrest someone for a crime, a certain amount of credibility is given to the officer's observations and/or investigative work. We've never killed a crime story simply because the suspect refused comment or disagreed with what police said about the incident.

Likewise, when the city manager says some of the police officers write as few as 15 tickets in an entire year, we aren't going to kill the story because Gardner doesn't comment or disagrees.

As city manager, a certain amount of credibility is given to Graper's comments about the department. Gardner's comments would be nice, but they don't make or break the story.

TECHNICALLY, Gardner has no obligation to speak with us - just as Graper and the commission have no obligation.

But, most city officials speak with us because they recognize that the Observer is "representative" of residents (because it reports to the residents). In fact, many police association members speak with us despite their president's reservations.

Possibly Gardner has forgotten that the majority of residents depend on the press to keep informed. Possibly Gardner doesn't have misgivings about soliciting the support of residents at the same time he turns his back on their vehicle for keeping abreast of local issues.

Because the union desires community support when fighting for job protection, it owes the community a certain amount of accountability - including an accessible spokesman.

NOBODY WINS with a "no comment." If Graper is off base, then Gardner should say so. Likewise, if Gardner is off base, Graper should say so. It all boils down to the premise of truth surviving in the free market place of ideas.


Ours is not to determine who's right and who's wrong. Our function is to present both sides and let the reader decide who's right and who's wrong.

Yet that task isn't accomplished when one side doesn't talk. A "no comment" does a disservice to those the spokesman represents as well as to those the "no comment" is directed at - the readers.

The Plymouth Police Officers Association deserves more. It's an organization whose members pride themselves in doing a professional job. It's an organization respected and supported by the community. And unfortunately, it's an organization whose leader refuses to comment.

Currently, there are 2,400 day care centers in Michigan. Social institutions are following the lead of business in offering programs that meet the needs of working parents, but their programs aren't comprehensive and lack the creativity shown elsewhere in the country.

The Michigan Department of Social Services funds a non-profit information and referral service in Oakland County.

LATCHKEY programs for school age children operate in some districts. Few. with the exception of Birmingham, offer the program in all elementary schools. And Troy school officials "aren't convinced of the need one way or the other," according to administrative assistant Barbara Fowler.

try show that Michigan is behind in delivery of child caring programs.

An alternative to the latchkey program operates in Reston, Va., where the Fairfax County Office for Children coordinates a day care/check-in program. The program allows parents to decide how much structure they want their kids to have.

"CAFETERIA-STYLE" benefit plans at some companies include such benefits as child care subsidies or child care centers. Those options may be selected in lieu of other benefits. In 1978, there were 105 such programs. That figure nearly quadrupled to 415 in 1982. Hospitals offer 195, business and industry offer 197, public agencies 17 and labor unions 6.

Now about 1,000 companies offer some kind of child care benefits.Some allow for



# Child care — now a necessity

WHEN THE Big Ten football season opens on Saturday and The Stroller takes his place in the press box at the Michigan Stadium, he will be starting another trip down Memory Lane to the night he met Fielding Harris "Hurry Up" Yost, the legendary Michigan Coach and sowed the seed for a friendship that bouyed him as a young sports writer trying to make good in the big city.

It was a rather cool evening in the fall of 1924 (when he was the rookie in the Free Press sports department), when this legendary figure walked into the sports room with a big cigar dangling in his mouth. When he was introduced as Coach Yost, the man who produced the Point-A-Minute teams in the early part of the century, The Stroller stood aghast.

It was the week of the game with Illinois when the Illini were to dedicate the new stadium with Harold (Red) Grange, who was regarded as the brightest star of the season.


WHEN YOST was asked what he thought of the Red Head, he swirled his cigar and said, "he won't bother us." But he did. Grange scored four touchdowns and was headed for stardom.

Yost was the target of a lot of criticism at the time. But the next fall when he returned for a visit to the sports depart-ment, he was asked about Grange and he countered: "He won't gain enough ground to bury himself — standing up." Sure enough when the statistics were

released after the second game, Grange was rated minus seven yards. Yost's pre-diction had been correct.

That startled the rookle sports writer so much that he never missed a chance to talk with the coach who was pleasantly called "The Old Man" by the Michigan at. He never missed a chance to talk th him and be learned something with every visit.

YOUT WAS A great main for playing football on the ground and he had little une for the forward pain when it was coming in the forward pain when it that you



never want the ball in your own territory, you always kick it back to the opposition?"

Yost twiddled the cigar a bit, then answered: "Doesn't it seem silly to try to buck the ball over from Ypsilanti when the goal posts are in Ann Arbor?"

That was frank enough - but it taught The Stroller that these old time coaches were great students of the game.

As the friendly conversation went on, Yost explained, "Son, if they wanted you to throw the ball, they would have made it for throwing. It is eggshaped now - and that's for kicking. So we'll continue to kick.'

AND WHILE he was a great student of the game Yost also was a dreamer. It was in his office in the athletic department at the university he dreamed of a stadium "up on the hill." He realized that the field then known as Ferry Field had outlived its usefulness.

And he led the move to have the present stadium built where there would be plenty of room for expansion. It was a giant un-dertaking, but he lived to see it built, even

though he may not know the place now. Yost and The Stroller became quite friendly and they seemed to enjoy each meeting in the stadium or in the office. He was unlike most men who have their own office. When he was absent, instead of having a sign on the door, as most men do, saying what time he would return, his no-tice simply read "The fish are biting on Whitmore Lake."

It is many memories such as this that The Stroller will enjoy Saturday and it will seem that "The Old Man" will be at his side in the press box. He just winner that was possible.

THE COST of child care for the two single parents represented about 25 percent of their take home pay. Not measured in the weekly bill was the cost in terms of energy expended transporting and guilt in leaving kids.



# **Right intensity is key to exercise**

Many inactive adults who initiate exercise pro-grams have unrealistic impressions of safe and effective exercise practices

The appropriate intensity of exercise needed to improve physical fitness is frequently overestimat-ed. As a result, undue fatigue, extreme muscle soreness, and injury often occur.

Exercise intensity is generally regulated by sev-eral popular methods including: a prescribed train-ing heart rate range; assigned pace for walking or jogging; tecommended workload for the stationary bicycle; and rating of perceived exertion.


THIS LATTER method, regulating exercise intensity by the sense of perceived exertion, particularly when used in conjunction with other guidelines, provides a reliable method for adjusting exercise intensity within safe and effective limits.

The perceived exertion scale shown in the figure, developed by a Swedish scientist, provides a rating of exercise intensity from 6rest to 20maximum effort.

The rating is based on the individuals' total feeling of exertion, including general and leg fatigue as well as breathing effort. Among healthy young persons, the scale often approximates one-tenth of the heart rate response to exercise.

ALTHOUGH the perceived exertion scale may appear to be extremely subjective, current research indicates that the scale is highly related to exercise heart rate and workload.

Exercise rated as 11 to 15, between "fairly light"

honestly and objectively as possible. If your ratings are either below or above the 11 to 15 exercise training zone, chances are your exercise intensity is either too light or too strenuous.



# Lookout begins for 'winter birds'

Summer's end has started me thinking about some of the many species of birds I have not seen since last winter. Seasonal visitors like the tree sparrow with its red cap and prominent "tie tack" or breast spot will be coming soon.

Tree sparrows are very common species in this area, according to surveys done by the Audubon Society dur-ing the Christmas season. Every year since 1945 the Detroit Audubon Society has counted all the birds in a 15-mile diameter circle over an eight-hour period

During the past 39 years 118 differ-ent species of birds have been identified, but the Tree Sparrow has been the most common bird counted, next to the ever present house sparrow and starl-

The dark-eyed junco, another visitor from its northern nesting grounds, was the fourth most common species counted. Our familar chickadee, blue jay and

volunteers reveals information that can be helpful in explaining some questions about our local bird populations. For instance, some species are very common one winter and then absent for the next two or three winter seasone winter and then absent for the next two or three winter seasons.

Species like red crossbills, common redpolls or snow buntings have shown periodic invasions that average about three years. The reason for these inva-sions is still a matter of debate, but from this basic information we can then begin looking for a cause.

The Christmas count data has also shown a likely correlation between the increase in the number of red-headed and red-bellied woodpeckers and the spread of the Dutch elm disease in this area

Both species reached their peak numbers around 1976 and have now started to decline - probably because many affected trees have fallen to the ground.

ONE SPECIES that has been seen quite frequently during the winter is the robin. Most robins migrate south and, to many people, the first bird seen the following year marks the first day of spring.

But over the past 39 years robins have been seen 79 percent of the time in December. Though worms and insects are unavailable, there are evidently enough fruits and berries to support some of these birds.

Winter not only brings changes in temperature, it also brings new species of birds for us to see, either at our feeder or in the field. And if we examine the changes in the numbers and kinds of birds seen over the years, we will be

# SC placement record impressive

#### By Ann Laura Shaw special writer

Schoolcraft College's Career Planning and Placement Center has an impressive record. For every two calls from prospective employers, it places a student or alumnus.

"Our two-to-one ratio is high" director Dr. Jean Pike said. Dr. Pike heads a staff of two job placement specialists, two counselors and four student aides. "Counselor William Heise" Dr. Pike said, "is one of only three nationally certified career counselors in Michigan.

The SC Placement Center is a two-

way resource center. They have talent between the College, the work place employers are looking for and jobs the students are seeking. "We average 25 calls a day" Dr. Pike said. "On a busy day we receive over 40 inquiries from employers.'

Open to all SC students, past and present, who have taken traditional credit classes and to alumni, the center provides personal interiews, testing and evaluation, career counseling, video-taped mock interview sessions and \* placement. The counseling services and test interpretations are available to area residents for a \$25 fee.

"The Career Planning and Placement Center is creating a stronger link and community" Dr. Pike said. Adding another link, this month the Center launched a new career awareness program for SC students.

The Livonia Rotary Club is assisting the Center in the pilot program, **PROJECT SERVE** (Students Exploring Rotarian Vocational Experiences.) The Rotarian goal is to help students make intelligent career decisions and con-

duct productive job searches. PROJECT SERVE programs include "shadowing" a person at a job site and simulating interviews. Rotarians are available for informational interviewing to explain to students job entry, career patterns and job responsibilities.

# Pro-life activists renew picketing efforts

#### **By Diane Gale** staff writer

A group of Livonia anti-abortion ac-'tivists, who were banned from picketing in front of a Livonia clinic by a circult court order, continue to fight with renewed efforts and on a changing battle ground.

Before the picketers marched in front of the Metropolitan Gynecologists at 26750 Grand River in Redford, and later in Flint and Kalamazoo last weekend, they held a rally spotlighting Joe Scheidler, director of the National Pro-Life Action League

His appearance at St. Michael Catholic Church in Livonia Friday morning marked the opening of pro-life activities here under the banner of the newly formed Michigan Pro-Life Action League. At the helm is Lynn Mills of Livonia

Scheidler, who spearheaded the closing of six abortion clinics in Chicago, gave a kickoff speech to about 25 peo-



"This is a brazen and unjustified in-terference with their First Amendment rights of free speech," according to the group's attorney Robert Van Cleef. George Leikin, the attorney for the clinic, said the picketers stepped past their First Amendment rights by "in-vading the privacy of patients and

vading the privacy of patients and going beyond the bounds of decency."

Mills and the Rev. Eduard Perrone, who was at the time associate pastor of St. Genevieve Catholic Church in Livonia and also actively involved in the pro-life picketing, were named in the suit filed by the clinic and Dr. Ebrahim Fayavi. Perrone has since been transferred to a another church on the east side of Detroit.

VAN CLEFF HAS requested that the State Supreme Court hear the case at an earlier date because the picketers are being "denied their free speech rights" during the three years before the case would be heard.

A decision on whether the court date will be pushed up is expected within the next two months.

Court cases, opposition and ridicule are to be expected by people who are willing to fight against the "murdering of our small brothers and sisters," said Scheidler, who is finishing the first draft of his book, "99 Ways to Close an Abortion Clinic."

"I think what this judge has done is unconscionable and unthinkable," he said. "Can you imagine women from NOW (National Organization of Women) or blacks being enjoined (restricted) from picketing."

Let me simply say this: The sophisticated tool I consulted before making such a statement consisted of eight spinning digits.

When those numbers stopped whirling Monday evening, they revealed that a record \$32 million give or take a few thousand - had been raised in Jerry Lewis' annual fight against muscular dystrophy

My premise is simple: People won't (or can't) donate record amounts of currency to charity if they don't have it.

BASED ON that belief, it seems any worthy institution should be raking it in these days. If an organization can make a case for itself, can prey upon the public's charitable nature, it can make a killing.

My guess is that's what the Great Lakes Junior Hockey League (GLJHL) failed to do.

In a time span in which the economy rebounded and flourished, the GLJHL floundered. Only three of the six teams of a year ago survived to this season

The Redford Royals "A" Division team was one of the casualties. So were Ecorse Paddock Pools and the Fraser Highlanders.

IN ITS NEW alignment, the GLJHL will send two local A teams against much tougher competition, with four B teams acting as feeders.

Compuware, a Birmingham corporation, will sponsor one A team and Data Vision the other. Together with Buffalo, the trio will play what is termed an "interlocking schedule" against teams from the midwest and Canada.

"The schedule is very strange," said GLJHL acting commissioner Ted Wahby. "It's a very aggressive schedule, a definite upbeat brand of hockey."

Included are opponents from Chicago, St. Paul (Minn.), Des Moines and Sioux City (Iowa).

And what of the Redford Royals? Their 'A' Division franchise was sold to Compuware when costs for the upgraded schedule - mainly in travel expenses - nearly doubled the budget. Owner Paul Kulka balked at the rising costs and sold out.

Redford will have one of the four 'B' Division teams, but for the first time since 1978 no A team will play at the Redford Ice Arena.

"The A teams will be much stronger," promised Wahby, "and the B teams will be like the A teams were last year.



accurate assessment. But there's no dodging the truth: "A" Division hockey carries an aura of superiority with it. "B" Division teams are comparable to the minor leagues in any sport they develop talent for the parent club.

From now on, Redford will no longer host a parent club.

Money is the reason. According to Wahby, a GLJHL franchise operated on a budget in the neighborhood of \$45,000 last season. A majority of that cost - about 60 percent, Wahby said covered travel costs

Most of the revenue did not come from ticket sales. It came from sponsorships. When costs rose, Redford no longer could afford an A team.

With it went a service of some value: the chance for some young, talented hockey player to catch the eye of a college scout and land a scholarship.

"THE CHANGES (in the GLJHL) were dictated by the amount of participation you get (from sponsors)," said Wahby. "It's going to cost \$75,000 this year to meet this aggressive schedule. With more local teams, there was less travel." Which translated into less expense. The Redford

Royals had problems keeping up with costs on the smaller budget of a year ago. The Royals B squad, which last season skated out of Plymouth, moves over to the Redford Ice Arena and will operate on a budget half that of a year ago. Fraser, Toledo and Taylor will be sites of other B teams.

The unfortunate victims of this restructuring -as Wahby put it, "It will keep (the GLJHL) alive" are the players. Ask anybody associated with the GLJHL its purpose, and they will recite basically the same creed Wahby repeated:

"Our whole intent, the intent of the league, is to put kids into college, or into the pros if they can make it.'

COLLEGE HOCKEY is where the top GLJHL players usually end up. Wabby approximated that 20 made the jump after last season

Whether or not that number decreases remains to be seen. Certainly, with fewer teams they'll be fewer spots available for a young player to prove himself.

"If we could get better gates - you won't see any better hockey around outside the NHL - then there wouldn't be any trouble," said Wahby. "We can't get the crowds out, that's the problem. We've tried everything."

Two bucks a ticket to watch hockey stars of tomorrow isn't much. But apparently it was too great to keep Redford's A franchise afloat.

Maybe they should have called Jerry Lewis for some fund-raising tips. He might have told them to peg their financial pleas on charity — "Send a boy to college" - instead of solid sports entertainment

# Damon's a demon on weights

Tom Damon turned in a heavy duty performance last weekend at the Michigan State Powerlifting championships in Charlevoix.

The 38-year-old Livonian bench pressed 475 pounds, on his first attempt, to break the previous mark of 474 held since 1982 by former Adrian College football star Ray Moran. Damon, however, wasn't completely

satisfied with his efforts.

"I missed 485 on my next try," he said. "I had it three-fourths of the way. I almost had it up. I think it was because of a lack of concentration."

Damon, a tool and gage maker for Sensor Manufacturing (one of his sponsors), hopes to crack 485 and maybe even 500 by the next meet, which will be the Metro Detroit Open Bench Press competition, Sunday, Oct. 14, at the Downriver YMCA in Taylor (his training center).

It was only in June that Damon lifted 435 pounds in a Detroit meet, but that was as a competitor in the 198-pound class.

IT WAS ONLY last March, competing in the same weight division, that Damon won the Iron Masters meet of Ohio with a lift of 420.

But despite his success at 198, Damon was forced to move up a class. "I could only go so far once I start-

ed," Damon said, "and I had to keep cutting my weight right up until the meets, and that didn't help my strength."

Damon's formula in reaching his present weight of 216 was simple. "I began eating right," he said. "I'm

eating three good meals a day - a lot of carbohydrates like pasta. I also eat a lot of steak, milk and potatoes."

Maria's Italian Bakery of Novi, his other sponsor, furnishes him with all the carbohydrates he needs. Eating there regularly has given him added bulk.

Damon, however, at one time was soft and chunky.

"When I started lifting I was 200 pounds of fat," he said. "Then I took up body building. I started at Vic Tanny, believe it or not."

IT WAS only eight years ago, at age 30, that Damon took up powerlifting.

"I not only wanted to look strong, but be strong," he said. "Powerlifting (as opposed to weightliftng) was the more natural way to go. I got a late start and weightlifting would have been more strenuous on the body.

"In powerlifting, you need a lot of rest. In weightlifting, you could spend 10 hours a day on technique."

Damon, who now ranks 33rd in the country among all bench press artists, says he can win without using controversial steroids.

"Some guys are using it, but they'll never admit it," said the Southfield native. "There are so many things on the market, like natural supplements, so you don't need to take steroids." Damon, meanwhile, has some imme-

diate goals he'd like to achieve.

"It won't be much longer before I'll be breaking 500," he says confidently. "Hopefully, it will be the next meet or by the end of the year.

"And I want the Champion of Champions trophy, too."

NEXT YEAR, the Vietnam veteran will able to compete in the Masters Class (40 years and up), his sights set on a world record.

"Right now nobody can believe how old I am," he said. "I'm competing against guys a lot younger.

"I have no plans on quitting. I'll do it while I'm still able."

Damon right now appears to be able and willing.



Elegant features that immediately catch the eye and little, not-so-apparent features that offer gentle surprises. They're both in abundance at Homearama '85, the display of 12 new model homes under way at the Farmington Brook subdivision in Farmington Hills.

This is the second year of the show, again orchestrated by the Builders Association of Southeast Michigan (BASM). It's a showcase of the newest home construction technology, featuring 12 custom-designed homes by 11 different builders. Each of the homes was individually landscaped and decorated by local landscape architects and interior designers.

The houses this year are larger and in a higher price range (\$120,000 to \$250,000) than those seen last year, according to Dennis Dickstein of Ralph Manuel Associates, a member of the Homearama managing committee.

"There is more flexibility for the builders," he said.

APPARENT TRENDS in Homearama '85 include large windows, high ceilings, wood decks, stove grills that can be changed for making waffles or barbecuing, recessed ceiling lights, intercoms and whirlpool bathtubs, along with energy-efficient insulation. Oriental motifs, ceiling fans, large vases and such soft colors as beige and mauve were seen frequently.

Dramatic entrances highlight homes by Robert R. Jones Associates of West Bloomfield and Robert Halperin of Southfield's Crannie Inc. But there are more subtle features as well.

The former has a stately, two-story structure with a sunken living room.

can look out a window that runs under- vate outdoor retreat. neath cabinets.

The Halperin house is a contemporary, one-story house with a metal gate leading to the front door. The foyer ceiling is tall and rounded. There is a corner fireplace and a redwood deck. The kitchen features cabinets with linen surfaces. In the bedroom, there is a walk-in closet.

BOTH HOUSES are energy-efficient. Jones' is insulated with urethane foam that doesn't contain formaldehyde. Halperin's features insulated glass windows and Tyvek wrap that prevents air infiltration.

A Tudor-style house by Steven Eicholtz of Professional Home Builders Group Inc. of Plymouth also boasts energy-saving features, such as double exterior wall construction and a fully insulated basement. All these are hidden under the vaulted ceilings, solid oak cabinets and hand-stained trim.

A cozy great room sounds like a paradox, but John Scaccia of Scaccia Builders of Warren achieved that effect in his English Tudor turret colonial house, one of two colonial style structures he built for Homearama '85. The room features a natural fireplace that dominates one wall. Circular stairways in the foyers, and dining rooms with bay windows are found in both Scaccia houses

An example of the added indulgences found at Homearama is the master ald Brody of Country Ridge Home Builders of Troy. The room contains a whirlpool tub and shower steamer. And then there's the deck off the master bedroom suite in the garden home built

VISITORS DON'T have to go inside the homes to be impressed. The Shakertown, by Janet Compo of Farmington's James D. Compo Inc., has an updated Victorian exterior and an octagonal sunroom. Inside, there's a mirrored exercise area and a whirlpool tub for two. For whom are these houses built?

The answer is for any age or family size that can afford them. Gwen Halperin, the builder's wife, told a Homearama visitor last week that Halperin's three-bedroom contemporary home would be comfortable for a family or "empty nesters," a couple whose children have grown and left home. The den could be made into a bedroom if necessary, she said.

The intention of Homearama is to stimulate the state's home-building industry. Detroit Edison and Standard Federal Savings are sponsoring the event, along with the BASM.





# Keep clutter under control

In past columns, I've discussed the need to keep things simple. When you express a single idea and keep backgrounds simplified you make sure the viewer's attention will be directed towards the main subject.

But, there are times when using the environment as a backdrop can add an

extra dimension to your pictures. You might even say that "controlled clutter" can add important information

to a photograph and make it easier to understand and relate to. In a picture of a person, for example,

what do the objects included tell us about the subject - interests, job, or social status?

You'll often see environmental portraits where much is learned about the person by the "clutter" in the finished picture. This applies to non portrait



photographs as well.

The accompanying picture shows an almost 200-year-old cabin in Pine Mountain, Ga.

At first glance, the shot may appear too cluttered. But notice how all the elements work together to produce a photograph with lots of impact.

The dark window is located off-center and the chairs, broom, axe and saddle bag are placed in strategic locations to make the picture "flow" and

produce an overall rustic feeling. Even the pile of logs behind the left chair was carefully positioned to add to the effect.

All in all, this is a photograph that "tells a story" of the past. The picture works because of "controlled clutter," the careful use of complementary items to compose the shot.

As in all good photography, pay attention to lighting and camera angle and choose the lens that will enable you to include all that you want in the viewfinder. Be sure to use an aperture small enough to place all items in your composition in the camera's depth-offield

So organize your photographic thinking by adding a little "clutter" to your

On Tuesday, renowned violinist Itzhak Perlman joins Maestro Herbig and the orchestra in a sold-out gala concert which includes William Schuman's "New England Triptych," Tchaikovsky's Violin Concerto, and works by Wagner, the Prelude from "Die Meistersinger," Prelude and Liebestod from "Tristan und Isolde," and the Overture to "Tannhauser." Concert time is 8:30 p.m. in Ford Auditori-

THE GALA Tuesday concert and a post concert afterglow, which Maestro Herbig and Perlman are expected to attend, are sponsored by the Handleman Company of Detroit. A national distributor of books, records and, more recently, computer software, the Handleman Company has supported many Detroit Symphony activities in recent

A festive dinner preceding the eve-ning's concert will be held at the Renaissance Club and sponsored by the Women's Association for the Detroit Symphony Orchestra.

Then at 8 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 20 and at 8:30 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 22 an all-Beethoven program, Symphony No. 3 "Eroica" and Symphony No. 8, begins the regular subscription season. Both concerts are in Ford Auditorium.

Violinist Perlman is one of the most sought-after artists on the current musical scene. Israeli by birth, he came to this country to study at the Juilliard School in New York.

Since winning the prestigious Leventritt Competition in 1964 he has excelled as an orchestral soloist, a recitalist, chamber musician, and recording artist. His most recent Detroit Symphony appearance was in September 1982.

German conductor Herbig begins a three year term as Detroit Symphony music director. Formerly he held positions in Weimar, Erfurt, Dresden and Potsdam. # Like fine wine Age no barrier for these coaches

70U NOTICE one thing right away when you shake the hand of Jack Reardon or Ralph Weddle - it's firm - what you expect from a good football coach.

The two coaches know of each other but don't know each other, even though Reardon's school, Livonia Stevenson, and Weddle's, Livonia Clarenceville, are only a couple of miles apart.

But the two have a lot in common starting with the fact that they are the deans among head coaches in Observer-

Reardon has been in the high school coaching business for 28 years, 19 of which have come at Stevenson, Weddle, meanwhile, is starting his 25th year, 18th as the head coach at Clarenceville.

The other thing that brings them together is winning programs. Reardon's record is 108-56-1 at Steven-

son, while Weddle is 143-79-3 overall and structed. 84-69 at Clarenceville.

THE TWO ARE a dying breed, both teaching in the buildings where they coach. And neither coach has any immediate plans to retire.

"I take it year to year," said Reardon, the Spartans' coach since 1965. "I still re-







# Miller: Class act on and off the field

OHN MILLER is a senior.

The applause you hear is from opposing football coaches across the state, delirious that Miller will finally be gone. The sobs you hear are coming from Farmington Harrison head coach John Herrington, who has had the pleasure of coaching Miller the past two

You see Miller has been the most dominating high school football player in this area and probably the state the past two seasons. His statistics overwhelmingly support that claim:

In two seasons, Miller has gained 2,973 yards in 481 carries - that's an average of 6.2 yards a carry. He has scored 42 touchdowns. He's caught 21 passes for 474 yards and three more TDs. In all, he's scored 258 points for Harrison

And that's just his offensive contribu-

On defense, where he plays safety, he's picked off a Harrison-record 15 passes, made 74 solo tackles and 96 assists. And, when Miller hits you, you know you've been hit

He also punts, averaging 40.7 yards a crack.

MILLER WAS all-state as a sophomore. He was all-state and All-American in his junior year last year. He's already been named to Street & Smith's pre-season All-American team for 1984. In his three years at Harrison the Hawks have a 31-2 record and a Class A state championship (in 1982).

It's no wonder that opposing coaches are anxious to see him play college ball.

But, the statistics aren't really what John Miller is all about. In fact, football isn't entirely what John Miller is about.

Without gushing, and it's easy to gush about him, John Miller is as polite, as level-headed, as completely unselfish a young man as you could ever hope to

"There isn't anyone who doesn't like him," Herrington said. "He talks to all the different groups at school. No one is at all jealous of him. If there's anyone who doesn't like him, they won't tell him to his

Miller is easy to like. His politeness and gentlemanly conduct are alarming. He is completly unassuming. He talks in terms of the team. He never mentions himself or his accomplishments.

ON THE practice field. Miller is i command. He's a senior now and he's anxiously assumed a leadership role. He badgers those who don't give 100 percent effort, he applauds those who do. He enters the junior varsity huddle and pumps up the young Hawks. He finishes first in all the sprint drills - he leads by example. He directs the calisthenics. He is perpetual motion.

This is odd for Miller. In past years, Miller seemed rather shy on the field. He was most effective and most inspirational but in a quiet way. There is a gleam in Miller's eves this

year. You sense that this year will be a big year, not just for him, but for the team.

"That loss last year (13-12 to Livonia Churchill) is something I'm really sorry for. I'm sorry for last year's team," Miller said. "But, that loss really helped this vear's team."

Miller said that as a result of last year's loss, the 1984 Hawks are hungrier. Their pre-season practices have been awesome

"If we had gone undefeated last year we'd have a 38-game winning streak, or something like that, on the line and three straight state championships. Now, we have a two-game winning streak. There's no pressure. It's like we have to prove ourselves all over again. Our practices have been great. Everyone is going all out. Everyone wants to win real bad," Miller said.

MILLER HAS accomplished in two years what very few players have in a full career. Yet, he is entering into his third varsity season with the enthusiasm of a


"I can't wait to start," he said, "We've got a special thing on this team this year. I don't even know if the coaches know about this. But, we are all brothers on the field. And it's helped a lot. Nobody is out for themselves. Everyone is out there trying to help the team."

Brothers have always been a big part of Miller's life. Miller has three older brothers, Bob (28), Jim (22) and Bill (20). All three were all-league standouts at Harrison. Bob went on to be a three-year starter at Central Michigan University.

Those close to the Millers, and even Mr. and Mrs. Miller (Larry and Nancy), say that John's older brothers are responsible for keeping his head on straight through all the glory days.

"My brothers made sure nothing got out of hand." John said.

He also credited Herrington. "Playing on this team has been great. I've seen

Miller's accomplishments and the fact that he is one of the most sought-after players in the state by college recruiters could turn this 1984 season into a circus - a media circus.

But, Miller won't allow it

He has said up front that he will not choose his college until after the season. So, don't ask. He has said he will definitevisit Michigan State, Penn State and Wisconsin. There will be more, but for now, that's it.

John Miller won't let anything, especialnot something as individualistic as where he's going to school, overshadow what his team accomplishes in 1984. John Miller is a special young man.


