## City budget plan calls for 5 police layoffs

The Plymouth City Commission will present a \$4.5 million general fund budget for fiscal 1985-86 at tonight's public hearing.

The proposed budget calls for a 15-member police department and would hold Plymouth's property tax rate at last year's level of 18.17 mills (one mill equals \$1 per \$1,000 state equalized value or SEV).

Although primarily based on recommendations from City Manager Henry Graper, the major change from

Graper's budget is the level of staffing in the police department.

As required by the city charter, the city manager presented his recommended budget to the Commission at the beginning of the April. Since then the Commission has studied the budget and amended it as needed.

Graper suggested cutting the 20-man police department to 13, because of the loss of a \$467,000-a-year contract for shared police with Plymouth Township. The township is starting its own department effective July 1.

Reducing the department by seven men was recommended by Graper to

balance the budget, he said earlier.

"The Commission wants to go with 15 men, which means five layoffs instead of seven," Graper said Friday.

"They want to stay at 15 as long as we can afford it," he said. "We were able to go with 15 men by cutting 4 percent out of the budgets for other departments."

Because of the anticipated layoffs, the administration has been working on a plan to reconfigure the police department. Police consultant Rod Bartell recently performed a reconfiguration study for Plymouth.

"I will be sitting down with Bartell

on Tuesday or Wednesday, and we will make a final determination on the department," Graper said.

"We are not getting a whole lot of support from the police department right now. I'm hoping that will change," he said.

The amount of cooperation from the police union will factor in whether the city attempts four, 12-hour work days as Bartell suggested — rather than the current five, 8-hour days.

Cooperation also will factor in whether the city attempts Bartell's "team concept" for operation, according to Graper.

"THE CITY Commission worked a long time on the budget," the city manager said. "They took a good look at promotions and found that we really don't spend that much on promotions — \$13,000 totally."

One of the surprises in Graper's budget was the revenue projections. Because of the loss of the shared services contract with Plymouth Township, the city's revenues were expected to drop sharply.

Instead, projected revenues fell only \$165,000 or 3.6 percent from last year. The revenue projections included increases in other sources which offset the \$467,000 loss.

All but four of the revenue sources are expected to increase in the coming fiscal year. The major increases include:

- State shared revenues, up 17 percent.
- Administrative fees, up 61 percent.
- Miscellaneous revenues, up 71 percent.
- Cultural Center revenues, up 7 percent.

- Parking fees, up 92 percent.

The Commission, according to Graper, has given him instructions to avoid using Federal Revenue Sharing money for operation.

"We've never used federal revenue sharing for operation before and they don't want to start. We want to continue using shared revenues for capital improvements," he said.

Graper said the millage rate, although not increased, won't be rolled back either due to a drop in the city's State Equalized Valuation (SEV). When the SEV increases, municipalities are required by the Headlee Amendment to roll back their millage rates so as to offset any increases in revenue.

Plymouth's millage rate of 18.17 includes almost seven-tenths of a mill for library operation. By charter, the city can go to a maximum of 20 mills for operation.

Tonight's budget hearing starts at 7:30 in the second-floor auditorium at City Hall, the corner of Main and Church streets.

## Young blamed in prison delay

Lawmakers from Plymouth and Northville will not accept Detroit Mayor Coleman Young's request to build a state prison on the former Plymouth Center for Human Development property at Five Mile and Sheldon.

Last week, Young threw a monkey wrench into prison plans by saying a prison should be built at the Northville Township site before Detroit accepts a state prison.

"If the Plymouth Center property were converted to prison use, it would become the fourth state prison facility planned in this small corner of northwestern Wayne County," said Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville.

Geake and Rep. Gerald Law, R-Plymouth Township, were outraged by Young's announcement. State officials, faced with a cry for more prison space, have asked that Detroit accept two 550-bed regional prisons to shoulder its share of the crime burden.

Young earlier agreed to taking two prisons while plans were made to convert the Detroit House of Correction (DeHoCo) in Plymouth Township into a prison — making it the third state correctional facility on Five Mile between Beck and Sheldon.

"I have played an active, deliberative role in defense of the rights of our communities and I believe our good faith negotiations have brought about an understanding of the unfair burden we have already accepted," Geake said.

"I will not allow Mayor Young to destroy the just agreements that have been reached after long hours of discussion and hard work. Coleman Young does not run the State of Michigan," he said.

is creating all the obstacles to prisons being built," Law said.

"Felons are walking the streets of Detroit because Coleman Young is being unreasonable. No one else is to blame — he is at fault."

"The felons aren't in my neighborhood, they are in his and I think people should know that. It's becoming a joke the way he is acting," Law said.

"Young's got to start addressing the problem. Running around blaming the problem on everyone is just a bunch of bologna. He keeps blaming everyone else for his problems and it's just a bunch of talk — campaign talk," Law said.

"This is an election year for the mayor and he is trying to blame everything on the suburbs."

"The felons are not walking our streets. Instead, we house the prisoners. We are the only communities which have participated in solving the prison process."

"Apparently his approach is to sit back and wait. If he doesn't want a prison he should come out and say he doesn't want a prison. That doesn't bother me, we can go to other communities up north that want prisons and let the criminal's relatives travel farther to visit them," he said.

"We haven't asked Young to take any prisoners. We have already taken three and only are asking that we take no more. His demands for another prison on the Plymouth Center property are unreasonable."

"He is holding everything up and he is allowing a minimum of 650 felons to remain free," Law said.

BEFORE YOUNG'S announcement last week, Law and Geake believed they were near closing the deal on DeHoCo — allowing the state to buy the facility for more than \$4 million and house 650 inmates temporarily until Jan. 1, 1987, and 500 permanently after that.

## Policy aimed at investigations

### Outside agencies will take all reports involving police

Plymouth's new police chief has initiated a policy regarding investigations involving police officers to avoid any appearances of impropriety.

Stemming from a January auto accident involving an off-duty Plymouth police officer, Chief Richard Myers said outside police agencies will be called in to investigate accidents and crime reports where an officer is involved.

"When I started here I was informed about that accident, and I found out that there was nothing in writing that said an outside agency will be called when an officer is involved," Myers said Friday morning.

"I would think that to eliminate anyone pointing a finger at the department you should have such a policy," he said.

Hill said "I was cutting straight across Starkweather and I misjudged his speed."

Hill said Jarvis told him to stay in his truck "because I am a police officer and he wanted me to keep a low profile." According to Hill, Jarvis turned the report over to Henry to investigate because it did involve another officer.

"I told Henry that because I had been drinking, and I was leaving a bar, to just put me down at fault," Hill said. "I just told him to put me at fault and check the box 'had been drinking.'"

PITTS TALKED to City Manager Henry Graper after the accident.

"He said they didn't follow their procedures because one of the Plymouth officers wrote it up," Pitts said.

Graper agreed he talked to Pitts. The city manager said he told Pitts it was unfortunate and apologized.

"I told him I wasn't aware the report had been changed but I told him it had been changed to his benefit because now he didn't have to pay the deductible on his insurance," Graper said Friday.

"I was appalled when I found out we did not have a policy to call outside agencies in effect. We didn't have such a policy at the time of the accident," Graper said.

"Every city I've worked in always had another jurisdiction come in and either handle the investigation or at least assist in it."

As for changing the report, Graper has asked for an investigation.

"Once a police report is written it should not be changed without notifying the chief. This report should not have been changed," Graper said.

"We don't know who changed the report or made the call. We currently are looking into it to see who is responsible."

"I asked former police chief Ralph White to take action on this right before he left. I don't think he got around to it," Graper said.

"It's unfortunate and it shouldn't have happened because it's a mark against the department because of the way it was handled."

"Anytime an officer is involved in an accident, and he appears the slightest bit impaired there should be a Breathalyzer test. I don't know why they didn't do it on this one," he said.

ALTHOUGH MANY police departments do have outside agencies investigate reports involving their officers, it isn't mandated, according to State Police Lt. Harry Hall of the Northville post.

When an on-duty State Police trooper is involved in an accident the state's policy is to send a supervisor to investigate or an outside agency, depending on the magnitude of the accident, Hall said.

"When an off-duty officer is involved there is no real problem of having an officer from that agency investigate," he said.

As for changing an accident report, Hall said there's usually no problem.

"You have to remember that an accident report is a statistical document. They're not for court purposes, although very often they do make it into court one way or another," he said.

"The accident report contains investigative matter and also the officer's opinion — it's very subjective."

Also, as new information is discovered, accident reports very often are changed, according to Hall.

A spokesman for the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office said it wasn't uncommon or illegal to change a report in most cases — adding that many times changes are necessary as departments complete investigations.

The assistant prosecutor refused comment about having officers investigate accidents involving fellow employees but did say there are no laws requiring outside investigations.

THE ACCIDENT in question happened about 8:30 p.m. on Jan. 24 as officer Curtis Hill left the driveway of Station 885 on Starkweather.

Hill was off-duty and his vehicle was struck by Plymouth Township resident Ken Pitts as he attempted to pull straight across Starkweather onto Division. Pitts was heading south on Starkweather.

A Plymouth officer, Jim Jarvis, responded to the scene and later turned the investigation over to traffic officer Robert Henry.

"It was bad weather that night, really icy. I went over the railroad tracks, and he just pulled out in front of me. I couldn't have stopped in time even if it was dry," Pitts told the Observer last week.

Officer Jarvis apparently wrote an accident report that night. Pitts said he was listed 49 percent at fault for "failing to maintain," while Hill was listed at 51 percent for "failing to yield."

"The next morning a police officer called me and said he had rewritten the report and put me at zero percent at fault," Pitts said. He didn't know Hill was a police officer until the call.

Pitts said he believed Hill was drunk at the time of the accident.

Hill told the Observer last week that he "had a couple of drinks" but wasn't drunk.

"The kid was speeding and it was bad out, icy,"



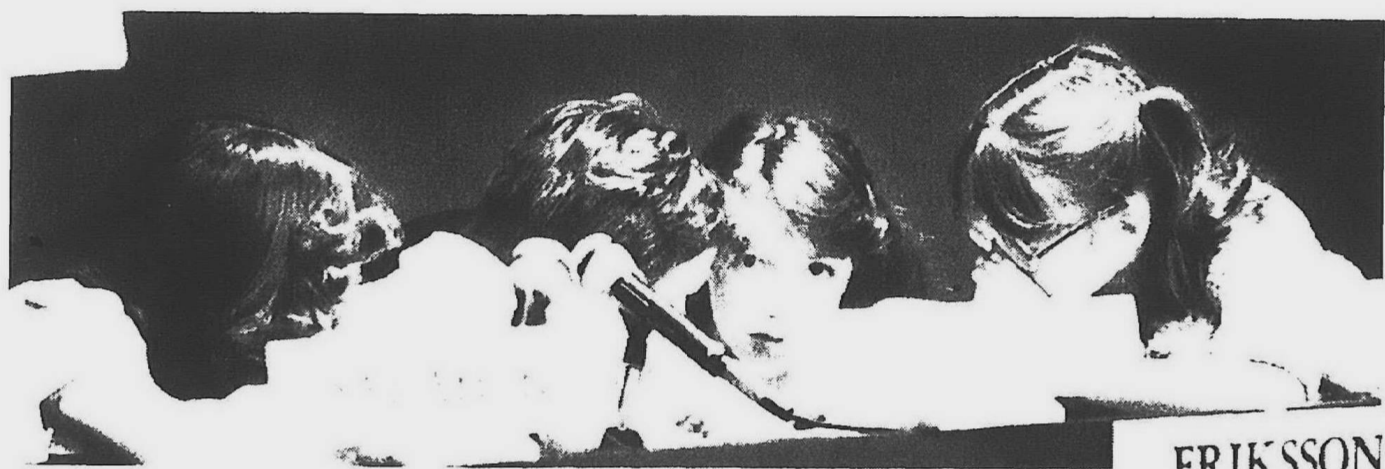
"A couple girls wanted go to the bathroom right before we started, and another contestant felt a little queasy and nervous," said Corrigan.

# Accident victim of alcohol appeals to students

Strong arms helped support Brian Moore as he made his way to the podium Tuesday to address an assembly of more than 1,000 teenagers and adults at the kickoff workshop for "Project Graduation."

The 24-year-old Livonian spoke slowly and deliberately when he told of the events that left him paralyzed seven years ago when as a 17-year-old Bentley High School student he and two friends over a Memorial Day weekend got into a car after a drinking spree and crashed.

"My two friends both had minor cuts. Andy was knocked out, and Tom suffered a shoulder injury. I was cut up

real bad and unconscious for more than nine months," said Moore, who is now in a wheelchair.

"Maybe my true story can exemplify what drinking and driving will do to you. It's not worth it. Let me tell you."

Moore's personal testimony touched most who attended the program which was designed to encourage youngsters to have a safe alcohol-and-drug-free prom and graduation season. The audience in Roma's of Livonia included students from 250 high schools throughout Wayne, Oakland, Macomb, Washtenaw and Monroe counties.

MARK STUART, a 17-year-old senior at Livonia Stevenson High, said "to see how hard hit Brian was is an example that reinforces the program's goal) to get others to commit themselves

against drinking and driving."

Stuart was one of the students attending the workshop. He is a member of SADD (Students Against Drunk Driving), one of the program's sponsoring groups.

Another student, Robin Rhodes, 17, a senior at Ann Arbor's Huron High School, also was inspired by Moore's talk.

"It made me think a lot of my friends," Rhodes said.

"Most of my friends are drinking orientated. I guess it's a fact of school life. And it's true, you always think, it'll never happen to you, just like what Brian said. It will make me think twice."

Moore told the students and school-related adults in the audience of his struggles to regain his mobility. "I still have a way to go," Moore said.

"I'm confident I'll walk fine again someday," he said.

He encouraged the "young women to stand up to your guy and let him know when he's out drinking you don't want to put your life on the line and ride with a drunk driver. And don't drink and drive, yourselves, you young men."

"Believe me, living in a hospital is usually a very lonely place."

Aside from affecting his body, the crash left his "mind scattered," he said.

"I USED to write a lot, stories, poems, newspaper articles for school, and one problem the crash caused still after seven years is that I'm not able to organize my thoughts even writing or speaking."

"I'm sorry for that here, but I believe that I still can give you a fair warning. I hope none of you have to go through the hell I did. It's a miracle we all survived the crash."

"Thank you and spread the word," he ended, receiving a standing ovation.

In addition to Moore, other workshop speakers included Detroit Free Press columnist Bob Talbert, who spoke of his own alcoholism and his 23 years of drink-free living, and Ted Hunt, a retired military officer and motivational speaker.

Hunt's message focused on the "prevention" of such social problems by youngsters learning to "feel good about yourself."

"If your mind conceives it, and you believe it, then you can achieve it," said Hunt.

Presentations were made by students and police officials. Tuesday's program also included rap sessions in which alternate ways to celebrate prom and graduation season were discussed.

Marge Moore credited her son's improvement when he was hospitalized for two years following the accident and since then to his strong will and determination.

"He will not learn to use that wheelchair, for instance," she said looking over to where a small crowd and television reporters had gathered around her son, who had lifted himself up out of the chair to greet them. "The reason is he refuses to admit he'll be in it for the rest of his life."

"He's always been very determined," she added. "If you cross him, he'll argue 'til day one."

Mrs. Moore recalled one evening when she returned home to find her son lying in the street. His physical therapist was on hand and explained that Brian had fallen and simply had to learn to get up on his own.

"THAT KID crawled on his hands and knees up a gravel driveway, into the house, with his knees bloody, and got into a chair," she said with tears in her eyes.

Today, Moore still works hard at his physical therapy and in recent weeks

has moved out of his family's home in Livonia, where he lived with his mother and two sisters, and into an independent living apartment, operated by Total Therapy Management, in Lincoln Park.

He is a ready and eager public speaker, said his mother, who added that he often speaks before teen groups in area high schools.

Last year he completed the high school education that was interrupted by the car crash by receiving a General Equivalency Diploma (GED) from the program at Livonia Churchill High.

Project Graduation 1985 is an outgrowth of a 1984 safe-driving workshop for high school student organized by Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) and radio station WNIC.

Among the other sponsoring groups of Tuesday's program were Birmingham-Bloomfield Families in Action, Junior League of Detroit, Inc., Lawrence Institute of Technology, Oakland Schools, Southeast Michigan "Chemical People" Coalition and DART/Wayne County Intermediate School District.

Geraldine Joyner, a member of the Wayne County Intermediate School Board, one of the program sponsors, said: "It seems like every year at this time there's some kind of accident involving teen-agers that touches the community. Maybe this effort will curtail some of them."

# Living memorial a drama

Lovers of real drama possibly never would think of it in a greenhouse.

Yet, every minute of every day for the past two years, there is heavy drama in the Graye greenhouse at Joy and Lilley. And with the drama there is a real challenge being met.

It is just two years since Joe Graye died and his wife, Sylvia, and a daughter are working steadily just if they were actors on a stage play, to keep his name alive.

"I am thinking of him every day," Mrs. Graye explains as she works with the seedlings and the planting of others to keep the house in top shape. "I know he would want it that way and I feel that he is looking down on us all the time. It sure is a wonderful feeling. But we keep going for Joe's sake."

THE GREENHOUSE has been part of Mrs. Graye's life since childhood. It was built in 1928 and, after she married Joe, the Grayes purchased the green-

house and the entire business from her father.

They have worked together, always close to nature, in the hope of producing the latest flowers, plants, and garden vegetables.

"I am so happy working here, keeping the place up for Joe. He was a good man to work with and he wanted things just right. And that's what we are trying to do."

"I never have been happier at work, knowing that we are meeting the challenge."

Before they purchased the greenhouse Graye worked in a nursery at Grand River and Shaefer in Detroit. And it was through this nursery work that he met Sylvia. So, it was only natural that when they married their desire was to have a greenhouse.

"We are always looking for something new because we have so many good old-time customers we'd like to please. But with it all, my favorite is the cyclamen. We raise plenty of them. The most interesting, though, is the stone flower — the lithop. They bloom

each year and we have one that has been blooming for 15 years. It is odd, but interesting."

HOW DOES she keep going?

"Well, I found out," she said, "that if we keep the aisles as nature has them and not cover them up with wood or cement, I don't get too tired by the end of the day. And don't forget we are out here meeting this challenge from morning until night."

As part of the drama to keep Joe's name alive, she has a special plant each year — an azalea — that grows tall and bears about 1,000 blossoms. This choice plant she presented to Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic Church in her husband's honor.

While she works closely with her daughter, her son Joe Jr. does most of the heavy work with the heater in the winter time. This is just another part of the drama, as is the planting of seeds now that won't bloom until Christmas of 1986.

It is an all around drama — found far away from the theatrical stage in a greenhouse.

# Geake blames Young for prison delay

In exchange, the two lawmakers would tie-bar a bill to the purchase calling for no more correctional facilities in Northville or Plymouth townships. Young's demand now puts that agreement in jeopardy, they said.

"The Plymouth/Northville area is doing more than its share already," Geake said. "When 34 percent of Northville Township is already comprised of

public land and institutions, how can anyone have the gall to suggest yet another prison there?"

Geake vows to fight "big city politicians who think they can export all their criminals, mentally ill and mentally retarded to northwestern Wayne County."

Likewise, Law will not allow Young to demand another prison on Five Mile.

"He doesn't like our moratorium on institutions for our area — he called it

a veto power and said we should have two or three more prisons," Law said.

"It's a very unfortunate position he is taking. He hates us, he hates western Wayne County because we are growing and his city isn't. He does not want to support any development projects in our area."

"There's not even a discussion point — we're right and he's wrong and it's not even worth talking about," he said.

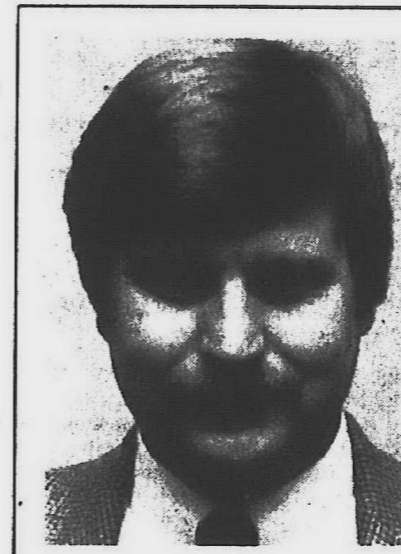

## Pursell ignores phoned-in views

To the editor:

As a citizen raised on the principles of representative democracy, I am outraged to learn that Congressman Carl Pursell is not interested in what his constituents are thinking.

I recently telephoned his Washington office to register an opinion about his recent MX vote and was informed that my message would not be conveyed to the congressman. I encouraged 12 other people to call the Congressman to find out whether his office would record their phone calls.

The message was the same: Because the Washington office can't identify the actual origin of phone calls, they don't record them. Even when I gave my name, address and phone, I was told that my constituent status could not be

confirmed. I was informed Pursell's official policy is not to record constituent phone calls or to convey to the congressman messages from his voters.

This is in direct opposition to the policies of other congressional offices. Their practice is not to treat constituents with suspicion, but to respect the right of citizens to communicate with their elected representative.

In a recent Ann Arbor News article, Congressman Pursell reported he had not received even 20 letters regarding his position on the MX. How can he complain he doesn't hear from his voters when his office refuses to listen to our concerns and convey them to him?

Carl Pursell was elected to represent the voters of this district, not President Reagan, and it is his duty to listen to our concerns and take them seriously. If that is not his intention, then perhaps it is time for the voters in this district to elect a representative who will.

# Early attitudes reflected in old school records

(Part I)

In mid-October 1845, a Plymouth school board asked suppliers for ten cords of stove wood in two-foot lengths, specifying maple, beech or white ash. The low bid, submitted by Valentine Clark, was 50 cents a cord.

In 1846, Rufus Brown, who taught in a primary school on N. Main Street, was known as a "first-class" teacher. He also was known for the way he indoctrinated pupils in the need for cleanliness. If a child arrived at school with a dirty face, "Mr. Brown would sand-paper it off a little."

At a school board meeting in Plymouth in 1879, a member moved that "all salaries paid to teachers be reduced to the basis of just compensation for services rendered."

THESE ARE JUST A few of the nuggets panned from the stream of minutes that have emanated from Plymouth school boards since 1837, the earliest year from which records exist.

Several other items found in school board minutes over the years indicate the changes which time has brought on the state of the economy, on school policies, and on community attitudes about a variety of matters.

In 1880 John Fuller, who was president pro-tem of the village in that year, moved that no teacher be paid more than \$800 a year "and as much less as we can." In 1887, the school board held a special meeting to consider the mat-

ter of changing the charts in the school's anatomy class.

In 1900, C.E. Baker was appointed truant officer at a salary of \$10 a year. During the same year, when some of the school rooms were crowded, the board went along with Principal G. Rogers' suggestion that he advance some of the pupils to higher grades "to be able to get along this year."

In 1915 a school board motion, asking for abolition of saloons in the village, went down to defeat. On Feb. 4, 1918, when the United States was at war with Germany, the school board decided to drop German from the school curriculum. On Oct. 16 of the same year, the board voted to prohibit dancing as a school function.

On March 4, 1921, the board adopted a policy of hiring only those teachers "who can spend the weekends in Plymouth, and thus identify themselves more completely with the community during the school year."

On Feb. 13, 1922, the board gave its full support to those in the community who made an unsuccessful effort to prevent Kate Allen from starting Sunday movies at her Penniman-Al-

Theatre. The motion, made by William Sutherland and seconded by Charles H. Bennett, expressed the board's feeling that "Sunday picture shows tend to give boys and girls a wrong attitude toward those institutions which have always stood for the best things in every community; and because the influence of such approval is detrimental to the teaching of good citizenship in our school."

George A. Smith, who was then superintendent of schools, told a reporter that he had 800 reasons — all pupils — why Sunday movies should not be shown. One wonders what Superintendent Smith would have thought about the influence of television on the student body today.

On Dec. 5, 1923, the board told the school janitor to visit one of the neighboring towns to see how the janitor there kept the school clean "and to see that ours is kept cleaner in the future."

On Jan. 4, 1928, the board passed a motion by Charles H. Bennett, president of the Daisy Manufacturing Co., "that no married lady teachers be hired from now on." On March 23, 1932, during the depths of the great de-

pression, the board decided to reduce the salaries of the teachers, the principal and the superintendent of schools by 10 percent.

On July 17, 1942, when Michigan was spearheading the production of war material for the United States and its allies, William Wood, the local insurance agent, was given a contract for War Damage Insurance in the amount of \$431,000. It covered Plymouth High School, the grade school, Starkweather School and the Leach building. The yearly premium was \$333.

TO PUT THESE miscellaneous board entries in perspective, however, one should begin in the early 1800s when the first schools were built in the

area.

The honor of having the first school house in the region goes to Northville, which was then part of Plymouth Township. In 1827, three years before a school arrived in Plymouth, a log schoolhouse was built "on Taff's land on Baseline" in Northville.

Two other school houses, built on the outskirts of Plymouth, also lay claim to being older than any in or near the Village of Plymouth. The Geer School, in Superior Township at Plymouth and Gotfredson Roads, and the Stone School, at N. Territorial and Curtis Roads in Washtenaw County, were both built in 1829.

Other rural schools in the area include Cherry Hill School (1834), Canton

Center School (1838), the Truesdell School (1850) and the Hough School (1900).

A history of the Geer School was written for the Landmarks Committee of the AAUW in 1974 by Mary Louise Horwood. Mrs. Horwood taught at the Geer School in the 1960s and '70s.

Peggy Price Heiney's unpublished paper, "Plymouth Rural Schools, Past and Present," written in 1977, contains information about all of these six peripheral schools that eventually were absorbed into the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

There also was a Kenyon School, located southwest of the Village of Plymouth, of which more will be said later.

## Belt law's not for everyone

Before July 1 rolls around and the new state law requiring the use of seat belts takes effect it might be well to get acquainted with the law and what has to be done to avert a fine on the road.

Knowing that the law is meant to cut deaths and injuries, state Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, has supplied the advance information that is needed.

He was quick to point out that not

everyone sitting in the front seat was compelled to use one of the leather straps and buckle.

Under the law if a person sitting in the front seat next to the driver is unable to reach the belt or buckle it up, he or she is required to obtain a letter from a physician explaining the trouble and keep that letter in the car at all times.

If the card or letter is available when a police officer hails you on the highway, show him the doctor's letter and you will escape the fine of \$10 the first time and \$25 if you are caught without the belt the second time.

Geake suggested that a person with a letter from the doctor should keep it in a case on the dashboard. In any case it would be wise to keep the letter with such things as your insurance certificate and road service membership card.

IT IS interesting to note those persons to whom the new law does not apply. They are:

- An individual with a physician's statement that the person is physically unable to buckle up.

- A bus driver or bus passengers.

- A motor vehicle not required to be equipped with belts under federal law.

- A motor vehicle manufactured before Jan. 1, 1965.

- A commercial vehicle or U.S. Postal Service vehicle which makes frequent stops for pick up or delivery.

- A motor vehicle operated by a rural mail carrier of the U.S. Postal Service.

The law is based on the fact that in a head-on collision belts help keep you from tumbling inside, striking steel and glass.

In a crash involving fire or submersion in water, belts help keep you conscious and able to escape.

Belts help keep you behind the wheel to control the vehicle after a sideswipe or skid.

And wearing a seat belt is a no-cost simple way of cutting deaths and injuries.

- 1 container (8 ounces) frozen whipped topping, thawed
- 2 tablespoons chocolate flavored syrup
- Pecan halves

Beat oven to 350. Prepare cake mix as directed on package except spread half of the batter in each of 2 ungreased jelly roll pans.

15 1/2 x 10 1/2 x 1 inch  
Bake until light golden brown, 20 to 25 minutes. Cool 10 minutes.

Loosen cakes from edges of pans, invert on towels generously sprinkled with powdered sugar. Trim off stiff edges of cakes. While hot carefully roll each cake and towel from narrow end. Cool on wire rack.

Beat milk and pudding and pie filling; dry until blended. Stir chopped pecans and candy into pudding mixture. Reserve 3/4 cup of the whipped topping. Fold remaining whipped topping into pudding mixture. Unroll 1 cake; remove towel.

Spread half of the pudding mixture over cake; roll up. Repeat with remaining cake. Drizzle half of the chocolate flavored syrup over each cake roll. Spoon reserved whipped topping onto top of cakes. Garnish with pecan halves. Refrigerate at least 1 hour. Cut into slices; electric knife works best. 2 cake rolls.

Note: Cake rolls can be frozen loosely covered up to 2 weeks. Before serving, cut into slices; let stand 20 minutes.

High Altitude Directions (3500 to 6500 feet): Unroll jelly roll pans with waxed paper. Prepare cake mix as directed in high altitude directions on package except spread half of the batter in each jelly roll pan. Continue as directed in recipe.

## CHOCOLATE ANGEL ROLL

- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 1 package white cake mix
- 1/4 cup water
- 1/3 cup vegetable oil
- 3 egg whites
- 1/3 cup red raspberry preserves
- 1 tub vanilla ready to spread frosting
- Yellow, green and red food colors
- 24 pecan halves

Heat oven to 350. Spread chopped pecans evenly in ungreased square pan, 9x9x2 inches. Bake uncovered until light brown, 10 to 12 minutes. Cool.

Grease and flour rectangular pan, 13x9x2 inches. Blend cake mix (dry), water, oil and egg whites in large bowl on low speed, scraping bowl constantly about 30 seconds. Beat on medium speed, scraping bowl occasionally, 2 minutes. Stir in chopped pecans. Pour batter into pan; spread evenly.

Bake until cake pulls away from sides of pan and springs back when touched lightly in center or when wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean, 30 to 35 minutes. Cool 10 minutes. Remove from pan; invert onto wire rack. Spread top of cake with preserves; cool completely.

tint 1/4 cup of the frosting with 1 or 2 drops yellow food color. tint 1/4 cup of the frosting with 1 or 2 drops green food color.

tint remaining frosting pink with 2 or 3 drops red food color. (Keep all frostings covered to prevent drying.) Place cake on serving tray. Frost sides of cake with pink frosting.

Fit open star tip #20 into decorating bag. Divide cake into 24 servings by piping yellow, green and pink frostings in alternating colors in 5 rows crosswise and 3 rows lengthwise. Pipe border around top edge and base of cake with pink frosting. Place 1 pecan half in center of each serving.

High Altitude Directions (3500 to 6500 feet): Toast pecans as directed. Increase oven temperature to 375°. Stir 1/4 cup all purpose flour into cake mix (dry). Increase water to 1 1/2 cups. Bake about 30 minutes.

## TOASTED PECAN PARTY CAKE

## STREUSEL NUT CHEESECAKE



- 1/3 cup firm margarine or butter
- 1 package golden pound cake mix
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 2 packages (8 ounces each) cream cheese, softened
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 eggs
- 1 can (12 ounces) cherry pie filling

Heat oven to 350. Cut margarine into cake mix (dry) until crumbly. Stir in pecans and

cinnamon. Reserve 1 cup of the crumbly mixture. Press remaining crumbly mixture on bottom and about halfway up side of springform pan, 9x5 inches.

Beat cream cheese, sugar, vanilla and eggs on medium speed until almost smooth. Pour about 1 1/2 cups cream cheese mixture into pan; spread evenly. Sprinkle with reserved crumbly mixture. Carefully spoon remaining cream cheese mixture over crumbly mixture; spread evenly. Bake until center is firm, about

50 minutes. Cool 30 minutes. Spread pie filling over cheesecake. Refrigerate at least 3 hours. Let stand at room temperature 10 minutes before serving. Loosen edge of cheesecake with knife before removing side of pan. Garnish with whipped cream and chopped pecans if desired. Refrigerate any remaining cheesecake, 16 servings.  
High Altitude Directions (3500 to 6500 feet): No adjustments are necessary.

## PECAN PIE BARS



- 1/2 package chocolate chip cookie mix (1 pouch)
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup dark or light corn syrup
- 1 tablespoon margarine or butter, melted
- 2 eggs
- 1 1/2 cups pecan halves

Heat oven to 350. Prepare cookie mix as directed on package for 3 dozen cookies except press dough evenly in ungreased rectangular pan, 13x9x2 inches. Bake 20 minutes.

Beat sugar, corn syrup, margarine and eggs until blended. Stir in pecans. Pour over

baked layer. Bake until toppings are dark golden brown, 25 to 30 minutes. Loosen edges from sides of pan while warm. Cool, cut into bars, about 2 1/4 x 1 inch, 48 bars.

High Altitude Directions (3500 to 6500 feet): Decrease sugar to 1/3 cup.

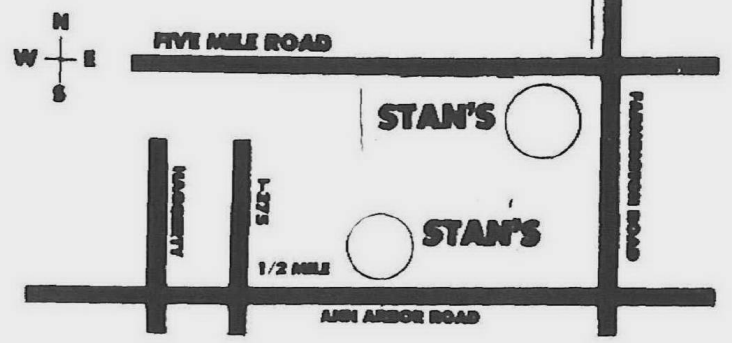

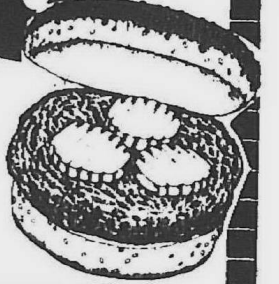

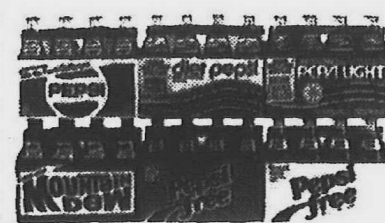

# These elegant desserts will grace any occasion

Festive spring celebrations, such as wedding showers, anniversaries and graduations, are a perfect time to serve luxurious desserts featuring fruit and cool, creamy fillings.

Refreshing and elegant flavors that even seem to taste like spring are highlighted in two lovely, make-ahead desserts - Peaches 'N' Coconut Chocolate Chip Torte and Raspberry Sugar Cookie Cheesecake. Although they are especially attractive and may at first appear complicated to make, both of these luscious desserts easily fit into a busy schedule.

Each dessert should be finished at least eight hours before serving to allow time for the flavors to blend and the dessert layers to soften. Preparation time is shortened since the interesting dessert layers are actually large, tender cookies, made from refrigerated cookie dough.

Peaches 'N' Coconut Chocolate Chip Torte is a colorful dessert with two layers of chocolate chip cookies and creamy coconut filling, topped with peach slices in the bottom of two foil-lined round cake pans. As the cookie crust bakes, the slices puff up and spread just enough to fill the pan.

The two large chocolate chip cookies are then layered with a fluffy toasted coconut filling. The finished torte is decorated with an attractive arrangement of sliced peaches and a mint garnish.

When it comes to cool, rich elegance, cheesecake certainly takes the cake. Raspberry Sugar Cookie Cheesecake is an especially glamorous version

featuring glazed raspberries hidden between layers of sugar cookies and a creamy filling. Instead of the usual cheesecake mixture that is "set" with eggs, this adaptation is made with a fluffy filling of marshmallows, cream cheese and a hint of lemon.

The creamy cheesecake-like filling covers a sugar cookie base, which is made in a springform pan. Cookies standing upright along the edges of the pan help support the luscious filling. A few raspberries saved from the raspberry layer garnish the top.

**PEACHES 'N' COCONUT CHOCOLATE CHIP TORTE**  
16-oz roll refrigerated natural chocolate flavored chocolate chip cookies  
**FILLING**  
2 cups miniature marshmallows  
1/4 cup milk  
8 oz pkg cream cheese, softened  
1/4 tsp almond extract  
2 cups whipping cream, whipped  
1 cup coconut, toasted  
16-oz can peach slices, well drained or 1 cup fresh peach slices

Heat oven to 350°. Line two 9- or 8-inch round cake pans with aluminum foil. Slice well-chilled dough into 30 slices, about 1/4-inch thick. Arrange slices in bottoms of prepared pans. Bake at 350° for 16 to 24 minutes or until golden brown. (Cookie layer will be puffy when removed from oven.) Cool completely. Remove cookie layer from pans; carefully peel off foil.

In medium saucepan, melt marshmallows with milk over low heat until

mixture is smooth. Chill until slightly thickened.

In large bowl, combine cream cheese and almond extract, mixing until well blended. Stir in marshmallow mixture; fold in shipped cream and coconut.

Place 1 cookie layer on serving plate. Spread 1/4 of filling over cookie layer; top with second cookie layer. Spread with remaining filling. Refrigerate 8 hours or overnight. Top with peach slices before serving. Garnish with mint, if desired. 12 to 14 servings.  
**RASPBERRY SUGAR COOKIE CHEESECAKE**

17-oz roll slice 'n' bake refrigerated sugar cookies  
**CREAM CHEESE FILLING**  
4 cups miniature marshmallows  
1/2 cup milk  
2 (8 oz) pkg cream cheese, softened  
2 tsp lemon juice  
1 tsp grated lemon peel  
1 tsp vanilla  
2 cups whipping cream  
2 tsp powdered sugar  
**RASPBERRY FILLING**  
10-oz pkg frozen raspberries, thawed, drained (reserve liquid and add water to make 1 1/2 cups)  
2 tsp cornstarch

Heat oven to 350°. Slice well-chilled dough into 36 slices, about 1/4-inch thick. Place about 18 slices in bottom of 9- or 10-inch ungreased springform pan. Bake at 350° for 20 to 25 minutes or until golden brown. (Cookie layer will be puffy when removed from oven.) Cool completely.

Reduce oven to 325°. Place remaining cookie slices 2 inches apart on un-

greased cookie sheets. Bake at 325° for 11 to 13 minutes or until golden brown. Cool 1 minute on cookie sheet; remove to cooling rack. Cool completely.

In medium saucepan, melt marshmallows in milk over low heat until mixture is smooth. Chill until slightly thickened.

In large bowl, combine cream cheese, lemon juice, lemon peel and vanilla; mix until well blended. Stir in marshmallow mixture; mix well. Set aside.

In large bowl, whip cream until soft peaks form. Add powdered sugar; beat until stiff peaks form. Fold whipped cream into cream cheese mixture. Refrigerate while preparing Raspberry Filling.

In small saucepan, gradually stir raspberry liquid into cornstarch. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil; cook 1 minute. Refrigerate mixture until slightly thickened, about 15 to 20 minutes. Fold in raspberries.\*

Place 10 to 12 cookies, side by side around inside edge of springform pan. (Top of cookies should face outside of pan and rest on top of the cookie base.) Spread half of cream cheese mixture over cookie crust. Place 4 to 6 cookies on top of cream cheese mixture; press down gently. Spread raspberry mixture evenly over cookie layer. Top with remaining cream cheese mixture. Cover. Refrigerate 8 hours or overnight before serving. Garnish with reserved raspberries. 12 to 14 servings.

\*If desired, set aside a few raspberries for garnish.

## How to know when enough is enough

What constitutes an adequate portion? That question pops up at our house when we have guests.

My wife always believes there'll never be enough food to go around. Her motto: cook a ton.

I'm more conservative. I calculate servings as precise as possible, then allow an extra one or two for big eaters.

Sometimes, we have leftovers galore. Occasionally, we run short and have to rely on appetizers and overflowing salads to fill the gap.

For a recent dinner, I miscalculated rather badly. I figured the main course, a gourmet dish, should be enjoyed in small portions.

"Is that all the chicken you're going to serve?" Anita asked.

"I guess not," I said.

It was too late to thaw and bone more breasts so I zipped to the supermarket and bought fillets. My penalty: three times the price of preparing the chicken myself.

You can avert such a problem by gauging the appetites of your guests as accurately as possible.

If you're a superb chef, however, enough may not be enough. Check with your back-seat cookmate.

**CREAMED CHICKEN FILLETS**  
4 chicken breasts, boned, skinned and split  
1 tsp. salt  
1/2 cup all-purpose flour  
4 tbsp. cooking oil  
3/4 cups sherry sauce

Wipe chicken fillets with damp paper toweling. Stir salt into flour. Dredge chicken in flour, brown well in large skillet, adding oil as needed, and remove to warm plate. Prepare sherry sauce in skillet, return chicken and cook on medium heat 10 minutes. Serves 4.

**SHERRY SAUCE**  
4 tbsp. butter

4 tbsp. all-purpose flour  
1 cup clear chicken broth  
2 cups cream  
2 egg yolks, slightly beaten  
4 tbsp. sherry wine

Melt butter on medium heat in skillet. Off heat, stir in flour. Return skillet to heat, add broth and cream and cook until thickened, stirring. Stir 1/2 cup

sauce into egg yolks, return to skillet and cook several more minutes, stirring. Yields 3 1/2 cups.

## Sandwich is nutritious

Since flavor, not nutrition, is usually uppermost in the minds of the hungry, it's nice to know that the sardine is delicious eaten as is. It can also be turned into a rare treat like this sandwich below, a very contemporary recipe:

2 or 4 pita loaves  
Lettuce  
Sliced tomato  
Alfalfa sprouts

Mix two cans of sardines with eggs, mayonnaise, celery, green peppers, salt and pepper. Halve and open pita bread. Line with lettuce, fill with sardine-egg filling. Add sliced tomato, while sardines from remaining can and alfalfa sprouts. Makes for servings.

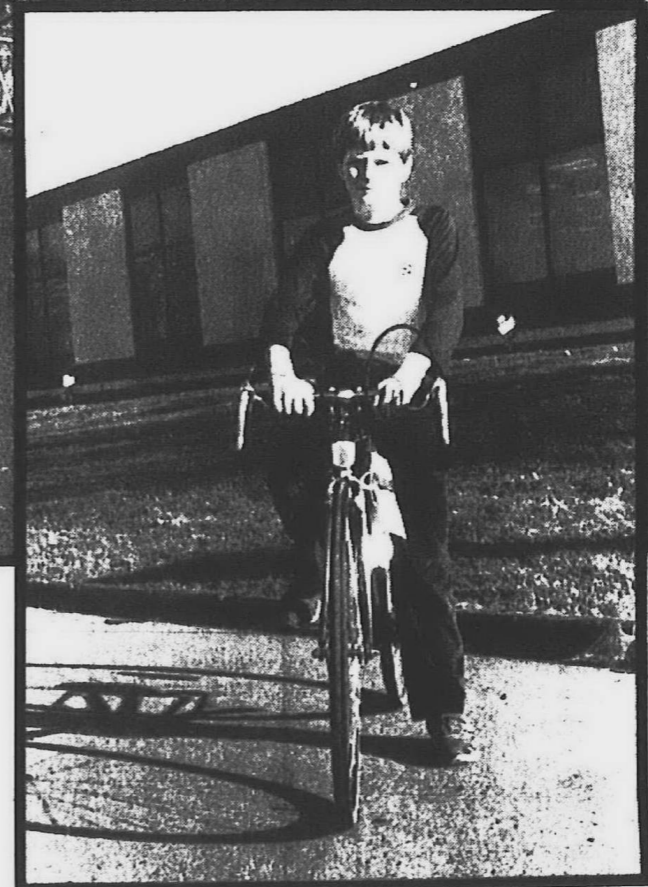

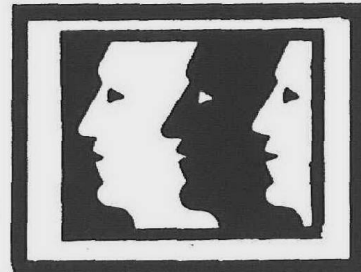

## Used book sale opens Thursday

More than 18,000 used books, 700 cartons in all, will go on sale this weekend in the Central Court of Westland Mall. The 31st annual sale planned by the Plymouth branch American Association of University Women will be 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Thursday and Friday, May 2 and 3, and 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, May 4. Saturday is bargain day with books going for \$2 per box or bag.

The books have been sorted into 26 categories — paperbacks, children's books, classics, text books, cook books, sports, sciences, art, music, best sellers, romances, poetry, and many more.

Dealers and book lovers are attracted to the old and rare volumes. Lynne Homes and Sue Sayers, who are co-chairing this year's sale, remarked on the unusual number of beautiful old Bibles donated for the sale. They also have a gold leaf copy of "Pilgrim's Progress."

SMITHSONIAN and Scientific

American magazines all are priced at 10 cents per copy.

National Geographics, all pre-1970 with some going back to the '30s, are 10 cents.

There are 75 cartons of hardback fiction books, most of them in like-new condition.

Book prices begin at 25 cents with most priced under \$1. Some in excellent condition go as high as \$5.

**PREPARING** for the used book sale is a year-long project for AAUW members. The drop box in Dunning-Hough Library is the central collection point.

Each week the donated books are picked up and taken to St. John's Seminary. Every Wednesday, members meet at the seminary to sort, price and box the books. All proceeds from the sale fund scholarships and fellowships.

When the sale opens at 9 a.m. Thursday, book dealers from all over the state will be waiting to sort through the books. They buy a major number of volumes each year.

For those who prefer autobiographies and biographies, they're all pre-sorted in a separate category.

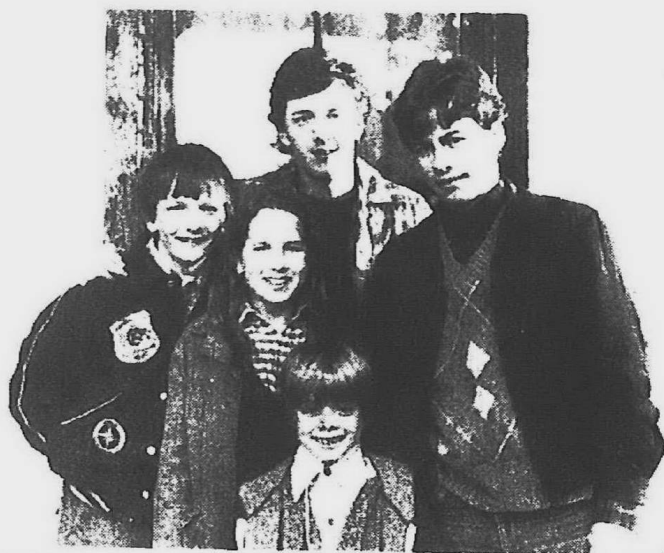

## 'The Beniker Gang' has all the warmth of family classics

How long since you saw a "G" movie that was neither animated nor a Disney true-life adventure? Thirty years?

I bet you thought they didn't make movies like that any more. Well, you were right until "The Beniker Gang" opened recently.

No, "The Beniker Gang" is not an old-style Cagney gangland movie. It is an engaging comedy about five young people who have no one but each other. In spite of its "goodie-two-shoes" aura and its "G" rating, the film is mature and should appeal to all age levels.

The gang is led by Arthur Beniker (Andrew McCarthy), an 18-year-old orphan who works in the kitchen of the Esther Watson Memorial Home for Orphaned and Abandoned Children in New Jersey. His dour supervisor, Mrs. O'Malley (Paddy Croft), looks like a refugee from a Dickensian orphanage who was cleaned up for this role.

But Arthur is able to sweet-talk Mrs. O'Malley with the wise sayings of his dear old Aunt Ida. In fact, Arthur is pretty glib all around and is able to sweet-talk readers in the 437 newspapers that syndicate his "Dear Lola" advice column.

But don't tell because only the gang knows that Arthur is Lola.

**WHO PLAYS THESE** gang members? Three very attractive and talented youngsters and one grown-up who doesn't look it. Twenty-one-year-old Jeff Alan-Lee is James, the quietest member of the gang, who spends most of his time hiding in a blanket-like bag.

Jennie Dundas is Cassie, short for Cassandra, only gal in the gang, which also includes Charlie Fields as mischievous Edmund and eight-year-old Danny Pintauro as Ben, who eats paper.

All five members of "the Beniker Gang" are "inmates" of the Watson Orphan Home, four because they are committed as wards of the court. Only Arthur is free to leave. He remains, however, because the other four are the only "family" he has ever known.

When potential, adoptive parents are found for Edmund and Ben, the gang escapes from the Watson Home to avoid separation. They set up housekeeping on their own, halfway across the country.

Complications ensue when the gang's new hometown looks askance at five kids living on their own without a guardian.

The five young people portraying the Beniker gang are five accomplished, experienced performers you've probably seen before. Dundas appeared in "Hotel New Hampshire," "Mrs. Soffel" and in the title role of the NBC mini-series "Little Gloria, Happy at Last."

**IN ADDITION TO** his continuing role in "As the World Turns," Pintauro is the youngster who salutes the TWA pilot on national television. Although Alan-Lee's appearance in "Ghostbusters" wound up on the cutting-room floor, he has numerous stage and TV credits and has appeared with the Michigan Opera Theater in "Trouble in Tahiti."

Fields made his motion picture debut in "The Beniker Gang" following numerous television appearances and an Emmy nomination in "The Demon Murder Seed." McCarthy made his movie debut, in a role quite different from Arthur Beniker, in "Class" with Jacqueline Bisset.

Such an impressive list of credits reflects a lot of talent and experience, and their acting is uniformly excellent. The five have sufficient enthusiasm and naturalism to project just what the film is about, young people determined to make their own way through guile and charm but never harm or nastiness.

The film's pacing is a bit slow and uneven, particularly at the beginning. Its conclusion overdoes our patience with happy endings. In spite of that, touching moments, low-key humor and five engaging performers amuse and entertain you with antics as "The Beniker Gang."

## Fast Freddie recovers, eyes Observerland meet

Fred Owens missed a lot of his last football season this year at Redford Bishop Borgess because of an injury but still got a University of Wisconsin scholarship.

He's recovered now and running smoothly for the Spartan track team. So smoothly, in fact, that he's established 2 new school records in his best events — the 100 and 200 meter sprints.

If an injured Owens — he missed 5 football games with a knee injury — is still worth a scholarship to Wisconsin recruiters, you have to wonder what a healthy, record-setting Owens might have been worth to college track recruiters.

**HIS EARLY-SEASON** success has him thinking about college track, Owens admits. "I really would like to run track, but there's that conflict with spring football practice, so I don't know," he said.

Have no fear, Badgers. Owens isn't about to forsake football for track. But when a kid coming off a knee injury rattles off a 10.5 100-meter dash — breaking the Borgess record of 10.6 held jointly by Owens (last year) and Steve Krogulecki (1978) — it's only natural for him to start thinking about 2 sports.

Owens, the Observer's track man of the year in 1984, has also bettered Krogulecki's school mark at 200 meters. Krogulecki had gone 22.2 in the

220-yard dash in 1978; Owens went 22.1 over 200 meters.

**OWENS'** 10.5 100-meter record translates to 9.6 over 100 yards. Krogulecki's record was 9.7 for 100 yards.

The question is, how much better can Owens get?

"That's what we keep asking ourselves," said Borgess track coach Gene Grewe. "It's hard to say. We'd like to think he hasn't reached his peak yet. We hope he can take a couple more tenths off his 100 time."

"He's running strong. I don't think he's stretched to his limit yet."

Owens, too, believes there's still room for improvement, although he won't estimate how much in terms of time. "I sat down at the beginning of the season with my coach and set some goals," Owens said. "He's pretty positive, and that keeps me pretty positive."

**THOSE GOALS** were in "technique, leg speed," rather than actual time shaved off the clock, Owens said.

"In the 100 meters, I think I could be one of the best in the state if I keep working hard at it," he added. At last year's state meet, Owens finished seventh in the 100. He did not race in the 200.

"You know, track is one of those sports that, other than the relays, is really individual," he said. "You can only improve so much, but every day you go out and feel you can improve some more."

"I guess once you become satisfied is when you stop improving."

Owens will be defending his Observerland Relays 100-meter title Saturday and helping Borgess defend its team title. In addition to winning the 100, Owens anchored Borgess' winning 400, 800 and 1,600 meter relays.

The Observerland Relays will be at Livonia Churchill, with field events starting at 3:30 p.m. and preliminary track events at 5 p.m. Track finals start at approximately 7 p.m.

# Unearned run spoils Rock bid

There's a thin line in sports between luck and execution.

Livonia Stevenson softball coach Lee Cagle feels his team was lucky in Friday's 3-2 victory over Western Lakes rival Plymouth Salem. And, in a sense, he's correct.

The Spartans, undefeated this season, scored the winning run in the bottom of the sixth inning on a strikeout. With Joan Frysinger on first with a two-out single, Janet Mitchell struck out for what would have been the final out of the inning.

But Salem's sophomore catcher Denise Tackett dropped the ball. Instead of throwing to first to finish the strikeout, she fired to second in an attempt to get Frysinger. The ball went into center field, eluded Leslie Plichta and Frysinger came around to score.

"I THINK if we hadn't scored that

run, we would have gone 9, 10, 11 innings with them," Cagle said. "But we always play these types of games with Salem. Their catcher was inexperienced. She feels so bad right now. But, we won this game by luck."

The Spartans may have been lucky to score the third run, but it wasn't luck that put them on the doorstep of victory. Consider the following:

• Pitcher Lisa Bokovoy struck out 9 and gave up just 3 hits. Neither of Salem's runs were earned.

• With Salem leading 2-0 in the third inning, the Spartans turned an inning-ending double play that saved another. With runners on first and third and one out, Maggie Meissner hit a ground ball to second baseman Cathy Gage. She flipped the ball to Frysinger for one out and Frysinger fired a bullet to first to complete the play.

• A hustling Donna Cannozoni beat a throw to second base on an infield hit by Bokovoy in the fifth which allowed Mitchell to score the tying run. Her

speed enabled Stevenson to score its first run as beat out a throw from third base in the fourth.

• With two out in the sixth, Cagle had Frysinger (a right-handed hitter) switch over to left side. She beat out a pretty bunt which kept the inning alive.

"IT WAS a tough way to lose a ballgame," said Salem coach Rob Willette.

But Willette couldn't be too displeased with his ultra-young team.

"We played about as well as we're going to play," he said.

Sue Carlson, a complete contrast to Bokovoy on the mound, kept the Stevenson hitters off balance. Where Bokovoy throws the ball some 70 miles per hour, Carlson's pitches may be

classified as slow, slower and slowest. But, she moves the ball around and has excellent control. Stevenson scratched out six hits, three of which never left the infield.

Aiding Carlson was some sterling defensive play of shortstop Jessica Handley and third baseman Marci Walker, both sophomores.

Salem jumped ahead 2-0 on a pair of unearned runs. Handley led off the game with a strikeout, but reached first when the ball scooted by catcher Shannon Snyder. Handley went to second on a wild pitch then scored on a pair of passed balls.

**SALEM PUT** runners on first and third with one out in the second, but Bokovoy fanned the next two.

In the third, Handley made it to second on an error, went to third on a

# Salem bats tip Gabriele

The scouts were out in droves on a rainy Wednesday afternoon. They came from as far away as San Francisco to see Plymouth Salem and Walled Lake Western play baseball.

Well, actually, they came to see one of the hottest pitching prospects to come through these parts — Walled Lake Western's Dan Gabriele.

But, what they ended up seeing was an impressive 5-4 victory by Salem.

"We took Gabriele right off of his game," said a happy Salem coach John Gravlin. "We made contact, we bunted, we ran, we did everything we could to upset him."

Salem was the first team to get a hit off Gabriele this season. Rob Adams got the honors with a safety in the third. That was promptly followed by long 2-run home run by Tom Moore to deep right-center field.

"It would have been very easy for us to get down after that inning," Gravlin said. "After blowing a lead like that, we could have easily packed it in. And, to be honest, I didn't know if our guys had it in them to come back. But they did, they came battling back."

Fittingly, it was Lynch who delivered the key blow. Gabriele gave the Rocks a run in the fifth on a single by Dom DeBello and 3 straight walks, the last to Doug Kirkpatrick.

Salem won it dramatically in the bottom of the seventh. Adams walked and pinch-hitter Chris Belhart walked. Then Lynch delivered a game-winning single.

The smiles continued for the second year coach as the Rocks came back Friday with a 4-2 victory against Livonia Stevenson.

The Rocks played long ball with the Spartans, scoring all 4 runs via the home run. Dom DeBello had the big bat, booming a solo homer in the third and a 2-run shot in the fifth. Designated hitter Mike Kesson added another homer in the sixth.

Meanwhile, junior John Storm (2-0) was blanking the Spartans on just 4 hits. Both runs were unearned. Storm threw just 75 pitches in 7 innings. He walked 1 and fanned 4.

# Boyd finds his gift (not too) late in life

Bill Boyd, a 37-year-old, 190-pound accountant at Ford Motor Co., was playing a round of golf with a friend. The year was 1979.

"He was talking about running in a 5-mile run on July 4. It sounded kind of intriguing," the Canton resident said.

Six years later, a 155-pound, 43-year-old Bill Boyd was running in his second Boston Marathon and had earned a reputation as one of the best marathon runners on the Corporate Cup circuit.

"I never ran in high school or college," Boyd said. "It's kind of neat to find out you have some talent that you never knew existed."

Indeed.

BOYD, WHO runs in the 40-44 age division, was the 400th person to cross the finish line April 15 at the 89th running of the Boston Marathon. He was the 393rd male to finish.

But more importantly, Boyd ran the 26-mile, 385-yard course in 2:48. He was one of the few runners who reached their goal.

"The weather was just terrible (a muggy 72 degrees)," Boyd said. "A lot of people were falling out. I wanted to break 2:50 and I did. I had run Boston in 1982 and finished in 3:08. So I knocked a good chunk off my time."

Boyd credits a new training method, based on the book "Galloway's Book On Running" by celebrated runner and author Jeff Galloway, for readying him for Boston.

"I was really in good shape," he said. "I worked real hard through the winter. I was trying to run longer races to prepare for Boston. When I ran marathons before, I'd run up to maybe 18 miles. But for this race, I went up to 24 miles."

That is the training theory espoused by Galloway, who is a former world-class runner. Galloway claims that runners hit the wall (a term used to describe the painful period runners feel

caused by lactic acid buildup in muscles) at 20 or 21 miles because that's as far as their training has taken them. If you train up to 26 miles, Galloway purports, then you'll hit the wall at 26 miles.

BOYD WON'T disagree. He ran three 21-mile courses and a 24-miler prior to Boston. He qualified for Boston by running the Detroit Marathon course in 2:42.10, placing him 61st.

"At about 20 miles, the heat was making me nuts," Boyd said of his Boston run. "But, I was still passing people. That made me feel better about things."

For taking up the sport as late in life as he has, Boyd has reaped plenty of success — his biggest coming through the Corporate Cup running circuit sponsored by many major corporations including Ford Motor Co. and Xerox.

In October of 1983, Boyd was featured on the cover of Runners World magazine — something Boyd terms his "biggest achievement" as a runner.

Boyd has been a leading member of the Ford team the past three years. Most recently, Boyd led his Ford team to victory in the Xerox Marathon in Huntington Woods. The win earned the

Ford team an all-expenses-paid trip to San Francisco in May to compete in the Xerox finals.

"I'd like to run the New York Marathon someday," Boyd said of his future plans. "And I'd like to run Chicago, too. But, right now I'm just staying involved in the Corporate Cup. That's really a lot of fun. The most important thing for me, though, is that I've been improving every year."

Boyd's passion for running has sifted down to his children. His son, Bill Boyd, is a junior cross-country runner for Plymouth Canton High School and his daughter, Brenda Boyd, is a sophomore runner at Plymouth Salem.

"They got interested in running after seeing me do it," Boyd said. "That makes me feel real good."

## Rock girls overpower Falcons

The Plymouth Salem girls track team played a numbers game with Farmington Thursday in a Western Lakes Division showdown — which was easy for the Rocks to do. They had all the numbers.

The Rocks used their depth and some clutch individual performances to dispose of the Falcons, 72-56.

"We told the kids before the meet that if we were to be division champs we would have to beat Farmington and Livonia Stevenson," said Salem coach Fred Thomann. "We were good in the hurdles, good in the sprints, good in the distance — really, we ran well all across the track."

Each team won six events excluding the relays. But the Rocks put the

meet away by conquering three of the four relay events and taking a 10-point edge out of them.

JANET HOLMSTEAD, Nancy Smith, Jenny Smith and Stacy Stojeba won the 440 relay (54.1). Mary Zorney, Mary Beth West, Nancy Smith and Cheryl Durrer won the 880 relay (1:55.3). And, in a bit of a surprise, Zorney, West, Cheryl Durrer and Kristin Hostynski won the mile relay in 4:27.1.

Ironically, Salem set a school record in the only relay it lost. Heidi Dupret, Amy Miyazaki, Trish Donnelly and Denise Durrer placed second with a 10:37.0 run in the 2-mile relay.

The run eclipsed Salem's old school record of 10:40.0 set last year.

Amy Johnson won a pair of individual events for the Rocks, taking the high jump (4-8) and the 110-yard high hurdles (16.83).

Other individual winners for Salem were Karen Marciniak in the discus (99-7), Stojeba in the 100-yard dash (12.0), Zorney in the 440 (1:04.7) and Denise Durrer in the mile (5:38.9), defeating the Falcons' All-Area standout Jenny Lindbert.

"Another key was that we didn't get hurt in the field events," Thomann said. "We scored seven points in the long jump, got four in the high jump, went 1-3 in the discus and four in the shot put."

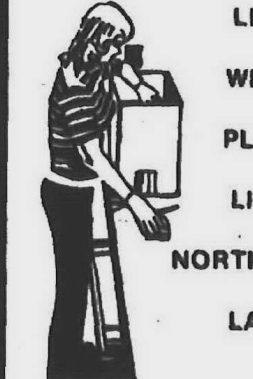
