

Metro West plans second industrial park

Developer Robert DeMattia announced plans Friday for a 130-acre industrial park at M-14 and Beck Road in Plymouth Township, expected to attract between \$40 million and \$80 million in development.

DeMattia, based in Farmington Hills, made the announcement during a press conference called to disclose plans for finishing the construction of his Metro West Industrial Park at Five Mile and Sheldon roads.

'This second industrial park (to be called Metro West II) is an ambitious project which will require \$4 million to develop and will result, when complet-

ed, in a captial investment of at least \$42 million and 3,000 jobs," he said. We will be going to Plymouth

Township within the next week for help with this project," said DeMattia.

More than 100 government officials, business and financial institution representatives attended the conference Friday at the Plymouth Hilton.

Ventures like this truly do take the efforts of all - government, business and lending institutions," DeMattia said.

He praised the cooperation of township, county and state officials in bringing Metro West I to the point where all four phases can be completed in the next 18 months, representing a \$6 million tax base increase and the creation of some 5,000 jobs.

METRO WEST I, now entering con- firm which recently purchased a 10struction of phase II plants and warehouses, is comprised of 215 acres and will have between \$65 million and \$200 million worth of development when completed.

"When we sat down and mapped out plan to have phase II of the park platted within two months, everybody though we were chewing loco weed or something," he said.

Instead, DeMattia said he found government officials interested in economic development and willing to cut through red tape.

Without their help, we would have missed landing a couple of major firms," he said.

One of these is Aisin U.S.A., a Japanese-based electronics and robotics

acre site in the park. The company, an automotive supplier, plans to build a large facility for manufacturing and will bring several hundred jobs. They already have sales offices in Detroit.

"The Aisin development represents all new jobs, and they plan to fill the 10 acres up," DeMattia said, noting that Aisin will build the largest facility in the park to date.

DeMATTIA BELIEVES the Plymouth Township area is one of the hottest industrial places in the state. Demand for sites in Metro West I, according to him, is incredible.

Situated close to the east/west M-14. and north/south I-275 expressways, DeMattia says this area has the most to

offer in western Wayne County.

"Besides the expressways, we are close to the airports, railroads, the University of Michigan, and the area can provide the people needed for a work force." he said.

The residential areas of Plymouth and Northville also provide incentives for companies to locate in Metro West, as well as the local governments' willingness to provide tax and financial incentives, he said.

It is for those reasons that DeMattia believes Metro West II can fly. The proposed park will be between M-14 and the C&O railroad tracks, west of Beck

"This is the future area of western Friday were such notables as: Wayne County," he said.

The developer plans to get the land,

which he closed on Thursday, rezoned for light industrial and office use. On the 80 to 100 lots he plans to land "nonsmoke-stack industries," offices and research buildings.


"I imagine the process to get this through will take one year," he said. DeMattia recently made a trip to Ja-

pan to attract businesses to his parks. We really have to stop thinking of

firms as Japanese, Polish, French or whatever," he said. "Once they come here they are Michigan firms, and we should start thinking of them as Michigan firms."

Commission to vote on \$4.4 million city budget

Plymouth City Commissioners will be asked to approve a \$4.42 million general fund budget for 1985-86 at tonight's meeting.

The budget contains a 3.6 percent drop in total spending from last year, caused by a decrease in anticipated revenues.

The resulting cuts in expenditures will come in five areas: federal programs/special events, district court payments, facilities maintenance, legal fees and the police department.

The Commission will meet at 7:30 tonight in the second-floor Commission Chambers at City Hall, the corner of Main and Church.

The budget which the Commission will vote on is a revision of the recommended budget presented by City Manager Henry Graper at the beginning of vices is set to expire on July 1 as the April. Since that time, the commissioners have met and shifted some of the spending.

tion fees, up 61 percent, and state shared revenues, up 17 percent.

The general property tax revenue decrease of 1 percent would have been higher if Graper hadn't kept the city's millage rate at the 1984-85 level.

Plymouth's total State Equalized Valuation (SEV) is expected to drop from \$143 million to \$141 million. The SEV drop is being offset by including four-tenths of a mill which was scheduled to be rolled off the city's levy.

"In order to balance the budget, it is necessary to keep the four-tenths of a mill, which was to originally be dropped this year, and use that to replace the monies lost by the lower value," Graper said.

"This works out to a revenue loss of approximately \$65,000. The four-tenths of a mill applied against \$141 million works out to about \$56,400," he said.

"Inasmuch as the police and fire departments have traditionally taken cuts during the past three years, the mayor and City Commission chose to cut 3 percent in each of the other departments to make money available for the addition of two or more police officers (from Graper's recommended level of 13)," he said.

The police department will be cut from 20 men to 15 or 16.

The commissioners also have requested using \$25,930 from the city's surplus to balance the budget, as well as tapping Federal Revenue Sharing (FRS) and decreasing contributions to the equipment reserve fund.

Besides the police department, other areas of the budget planned for spending cuts are:

Non-approved schools eyed by Hoben

Dr. John Hoben, superintendent, is proposing that the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education consider going to court to resolve home teaching and non-approved school issues.

School districts are losing students to both home and non-approved schools, and as a result, a "lot of kids are not getting a proper education," said Hoben at an April 22 school board meeting.

A resolution Hoben drafted recently was passed by the Michigan Association of School Administrators' (MASA) executive board. The action urges state legislators, the State Board of Education and other organizations to "discuss what steps could be taken to force the issue on this," said Hoben, an MASA executive board member.

"For three years we've watched (non-approved and home schools) grow and grow. By law, it's parents' responsibility in this state to see that their kids have a proper education. We're just trying to see that that's enforced.

We're the ones pushing pretty hard on this," added Hoben. "I'd like to pursue it through the courts if necessary. Someone's got to stand up to them."

NON-APPROVED, non-public schools, most of which are "affiliated with Christian fundamentalist churches supported politically by the religious right," have increased in number from four in 1978 to more than 250 in 1982, according to Plymouth-Canton school officials. Central Christian School (formerly Central Baptist Temple School). next door to Central Middle School on Church Street in Plymouth, is among them

WHILE MANY area families are teaching children at home - several through the Home Based Education Program of Cloniara School in Ann Arbor - those contacted by the Observer were reluctant to be interviewed or photographed. Some fear they'll be sued by Plym-

outh-Canton schools. At least one family is engaged in a legal battle with the district. Others are afraid of being charged with child neglect, or that their children will be harassed.

One home teacher, who insisted her name not be used, said her son has prospered since leaving public school Jan 1

"From the day we told him he wasn't going back to public school, his whole outlook changed. The whole peer pressure thing involving drugs, drinking, clothes - it's like this big load was lifted," she said. "His grades were suffering, and we figured there was more we could do at home.

A "MORATORIUM on enforcement" imposed by Attorney General Frank Kelley and state Supt. Phil Runkel in 1981 is thwarting efforts to close down non-complying programs, said Hoben. The moratorium will remain in effect until the Michigan Supreme Court decides a case involving non-approved Christian schools in Bay County, say school officials.

Hoben acknowledges that "if (the issue) is in litigation, maybe there's nothing we can do." Administrators are seeing "kind of a flagrant thumbing of the nose at na."

But, he said, local administrators are the ones saddled with enforcing the law "which is very clear; children must attend school up to the age of 16."

State law also stipulates that alter-

THE CITY'S revenues for 1985-86 are projected at \$4.42 million, down from \$4.58 million last year.

The reduction is caused by three factors: lower general tax money, loss of the \$467,000-a-year contract for police service with Plymouth Township and a decrease in federal grants.

Part of those losses have been offset by increases in other revenue sources. with the largest coming in administratownship starts its own police department - resulting in a total loss of that revenue to the city.

Revenues from the 35th District Court are scheduled to decrease from \$56,840 to \$15,000 in the coming year, a 73-percent loss.

ON THE expenditure side, Graper said the Commission has requested a number of changes from his recommended budget.

The major change was cutting all recommended city departmental costs by 3 percent, with the exception of the police and fire departments.

• District court expenditures down from \$58,580 to \$8,030. City payments to the court are planned to go down as the court continues to move toward self-support.

• Facilities maintenance - down from \$209,260 to \$203,500.

 Legal services - down from \$88,905 to \$37,500.

The largest increase in spending is scheduled for parking, up from \$81,810 to \$113,060. Last week Graper said consideration was being given to replacing the parking enforcement officer with a police officer - to save the 16th police position.

16-man force in works? S

Plymouth Police Department is expected to be discussed during tonight's city budget deliberations.

Following a long and emotional budget hearing last week, city officials reportedly were looking at ways to keep 16 officers in the wake of department layoffs. The department was targeted to be cut from 20 to 15 men, but resident protest may change that to 16. The cuts are due to the loss of a shared-services contract with Plymouth Township, planned to expire on July 1. The township is starting its own department.

There are some things that are developing," Mayor David Pugh said Friday. "I can't comment on it until some of the things are put to bed."

City Manager Henry Graper confirmed last week that he was considering replacing the city's parking enforcement officer with a policeman. Graper could not be contacted for comment Friday.

'Many of the things are working out to the benefit of the city administration and the police union," Pugh said. "It's kind of a win-win-win situation.

All sides are going to win, but we're not going to a 20-man department," he said.

"A 16-man department will be a subject for consideration. How we are going to fund it in the budget I can't say right now."

Students oughta be in pictures

Ever hear someone tell a story about their high school days that was unbelieveable?

Ever told a high school story others refused to believe?

Seniors at Plymouth Canton and Plymouth Salem high schools won't have that problem.

For the first time, students at the Centennial Educational Park (CEP) can purchase a video yearbook produced by the yearbook staff and yearbook alumni.

What better way to provide proof of a high school claim? Slip the six-hour video tape into a recorder and presto instant verification of that high school dance contest you won, the 80yard touchdown you ran, or how cute you were in that cheerleader's outfit.

Although every event won't appear on the tape, the yearbook staff is trying to incorporate a wide variety of footage that will appeal to a broad range of interests, according to Mark Even, yearbook coordinator.

"This is not to replace the actual yearbook. We don't want to create a new yearbook, but we want to supplement what we already have," Even said.

The purpose or aim of the video staff

the year," he said.

A RECENT viewing of a promotional tape revealed how the video book will accomplish its goal.

By combining popular music with narrative, the tape works its way through footage of different school events such as football games, band performances, band camp, and other activities.

The promotional tape even included some of the comedy spoof items which will go into the final product. A takeoff on a music video (MTV style) renders a comical look at some of the hidden talents which students possess.

Also, candid interviews with students in the hallways or at events allow a look at the lighter side of student life - not to mention a look at the ridiculous.

"We are in a unique situation because we have so much tape to pull from with the Ricky and Wicky Show," Even said. Ricky and Wicky is a schoolsponsored show which appeared on cable television.

Other footage includes memorable shots from community events such as the balloon festival, Fall Festival and even the building of the Central Parking Lot deck.

And because the video book will go through final editing after the school

is to "catch the personality or flavor of year ends, Even said graduation and spring sports will be included.

'It's really kind of nice to be able to give the spring sports some recognition and get something on graduation."

The printed yearbook is put together by early spring, and those events are not included.

All told, Even expects some 1,000 hours of work to go into the video books by the time they are mailed in July.

THE PROMOTIONAL tape will be used to encourage local business owners to purchase a commercial spot.

The funds will go toward the costs of producing the final tape.

We don't have all the necessary equipment, and the funds will be used for that and as a fund-raiser, since we haven't done one in a long time," Even said.

The price of a commercial spot is \$250 for roughly 60 seconds. Commercial sponsors also will be mentioned in the printed guide which accompanies the tape.

The spots, which are done in a "lowkey" manner, will be used to separate video chapters.

"The commercials can be their idea or our idea, as long as it fits our format we don't want stark commercials."


The yearbook staff is in the process of contacting businesses and already has taped several spots.

Even hopes to sell between 300 and 400 of the final tapes, which were sold in a package with the printed book for \$39.95.

"We originally offered it with the regular yearbook because we didn't want to replace the yearbook. But there has been quite a few requests for the tape now, and we are working on a way to sell the tape without the printed book," he said.

Even said a small video company attempted to put together a video yearbook in a past year, but it didn't fly. He also said other companies have approached the schools in regard to a video production.

'We just decided to do it ourselves, and planning started back in the fall. We may not get everything on tape, but if we can't get everything then I know an outsider can't get everything," he said.

 use curriculums comparable to those of public schools, and

teach government and history courses.

The criteria present a problem when non-traditionally educated students try to transfer into public schools. Many pupils do so before their "senior year" in order to earn a public high school diploma.

In the case of Central Christian School, said Hoben, "it's a non-accredited school, which means they don't have certified teachers. We have no knowledge of how much or how little they're teaching. How do you evaluate credits?"

PLYMOUTH-CANTON schools now are refusing to grant requests from parents and correspondence schools for copies of curriculums and transcripts, said Hoben. Often the district discovers that students supposedly transferring to Illinois' Christian Liberty Academy and other institutions "have nev-

er left the district. It's a guise," he said. For legal reasons, Hoben chose not to discuss issues regarding Clonlara School, which assists home teachers and instructs 2-15-year-olds in "unstructured, ungraded" classes on its Ann Arbor campus. Clonlara's director, Dr. Pat Montgomery, "would

welcome seeing (Hoben) in court."

"We have always demanded that our parents follow state regulations. We feel very confident when approaching these issues, because we never have lost an issue," said Montgomery, whose school is non-denominational.

We take a firm stand on that, and are in full compliance. The reason Dr. Hoben is upset with any home school is because it keeps money from public school institutions. Most school people view home schooling as a threat to the public school system, and consequently, to their own jobs. Cooperation is out of the question for them. Their line of thinking is, 'If one family does it, everyone will try it; where will that leave the schools?"

"We're not opposed to alternative educational systems. We are opposed to sub-standard educational systems. We hate to see youngsters punished by what essentially is the decision of parents to enroll them in one of these non-approved programs," said Waters, who is active in an educational organization trying to remedy the problem.

'Every so often we hear about kids who may be starting on a home study program. In most instances when we contact the family, the family decides against going with the program and heads off the long-term consequences.

Students transferring out of non-traditional programs with "sub-standard credits" confront teachers with difficult choices," added Waters. "Teachers have to make a super-human effort to help students catch up, put them back a year, or let kids flounder in something less than the situation they should be in.

"If the state is unwilling to bring about litigation, maybe a local district will have to, and maybe we should be that district."

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aw anticipates vote on DeHoCo this week

Two bills dealing with the state's purchase of the Detroit House of Correction (DeHoCo) in Plymouth Township are expected to clear the House of Representatives this week.

Rep. Gerald Law, R-Plymouth Township, announced last week that a deal had been struck on his bill to limit the number of prisoners and the number of correctional institutions in Plymouth and Northville townships.

"I made an agreement with Carolyn Kilpatrick that we would not make any amendments to the bill on the floor in -the House," Law said Friday.

woman of the corrections subcommittee which reported out Law's "moratorium" bill last week. It now goes to the full House Appropriations Committee for approval.

The moratorium bill is being sought by Law and Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, in the wake of a corrections department decision to buy DeHoCo, on Five Mile Road, and use it for a state Drison.

LAW'S BILL would prohibit the state from placing any more correctional or rehabilitation facilities in either township.

The bill also would cap the number

Rep. Kilpatrick, D-Detroit, is chair- of prisoners for the three prisons either planned or existing in the townships -550 at the Scott Correctional Facility, 311 at the Phoenix Correctional Facility and 500 at DeHoCo.

'I am happy that my bill got reported out of subcommittee, we wanted to move the bill. If it is approved, no other community in the state will have a moratorium or cap on the number of prisoners," Law said.

A bill authorizing the state purchase of the DeHoCo compound is awaiting approval on the House floor.

According to Law, Detroit legislators were afraid attempts would be made to amend the moratorium bill once it was placed on the House floor - amendments to restrict the use of DeHoCo.

Detroit wants to sell the DeHoCo complex to the state and reportedly has an agreement that the corrections department will pick up DeHoCo employ-On the other hand, Law and Geake

don't want the purchase bill to go through without the moratorium on future institutions. Law said the purchase bill is being held up for the moratorium bill. He be-

lieves the moratorium bill will pass the House Appropriations Committee and full House without a problem.

"They're all in line," he said. Once passed by the House, both bills

will be sent to the Senate for approval.

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"My understanding is that we will sue is dead," Law said. "Legally there is no way the state can put a prison on the land, with the deed restriction."

The land was bought by the state from Wayne County. The deed includes a reverter clause which calls for the land to go back to Wayne County if the state doesn't use it for mental health purposes.

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"Besides that, the governor has already said he won't accept the site for a prison," Law said. "And if the moratorium bill is passed, there is no way another prison can go there or anywhere else in the townships."

State officials reportedly are working with Wayne County to be able to sell the land.

Chôres program takes on new look

Two federally funded programs for senior citizens in a five-community area, including Canton, will be serviced differently beginning in the fall.

City of Plymouth officials have decided to relinquish responsibilities as the administrator for the senior citizen chore and the personal care/homemaking programs beginning Oct. 1. As the "implementing agency" Plymouth's tasks include writing monthly reports, fielding calls from seniors and sending employees out to recipients.

Canton, Northville, Northville Township, Plymouth and Plymouth Township were serviced as a combined group.

"We're (Plymouth) talking about other communities taking over, but one way or another our seniors will be served," said Chuck Skene, Plymouth recreation director.

"Possibly a non-profit group will handle it," he said. "We've been running them (the programs) for the past eight years, and we decided it was time for one of the other communities to take the leadership.

'We haven't had any bites from the other communities, but there is a chance that an outside organization will run it," Skene said.

At last week's board meeting,

Allocating money for the program is also difficult, because it is impossible to determine in advance when and how much work will be needed, he said.


EACH COMMUNITY is responsible for a portion of the \$10,000 it costs to administer the programs beyond what is allocated in federal funds. For the 1983-84 fiscal year, Canton paid \$580 for the services, Skene said. On a yearly basis, the programs are allocated about \$25,000 in federal money from the Area Agency on Aging.

Residents of the five communities who are 62 years old or older are eligible for the free services. The chore program provides lawn cutting and snow shovelling. The personal care/ homemaking program provides for everyday cleaning needs.

In the five communities, approximately 210 seniors have taken advantage of the home chore program, and about 50 people are involved in the personal care/homemaking services. Canton has 29 people receiving the chore program and 11 accepting the personal care/homemaking work, Skene said.

During the past few years an increasing number of Canton senior citizens have called for services, said Dianne Neihengen, administrator for the Canton Senior Citizen Center.

"We're finding people are being released earlier from hospitals and they need more care " Neih gen said Mike Gouin, Canton's recreation superintendent, said the five-community program "is one of the most smoothest-



TRIGGER POINTS AND THEIR TREATMENT

Trigger points are focal areas of sharp and radiating pain originating in muscles. Usual sites are at transitions where muscle inserts into bone, such as in the neck, shoulders, elbows, mid and low back, hips, below the knees and at the sides of the ankles. These sites may be single or present in a symmetrical fashion on both sides of the body.

Treatment centers on stopping the cycle of pain and irritation that originates from the trigger point. Drugs are of little value, heat may help, and there are advocates for the use of pressure, though this approach remains to be proven. The therapy with the most success is injection, in which local anesthetic and then steroid solution are injected into the center of the trigger point site.

Such therapy does not always result in a cure, trigger points may recur and require further injection. Fortunately the problem does not continue indefinitely, as eventually the body's own reparative processes replace the inflammed area with normal tissue.

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





Story of Plymouth's early log cabin schools

(Part 2)

The first school trustees in Plymouth Township - James Purdy, I. Davis and Samuel Sterling - were elected in 1829.

That was a year before the first school house was built in the Plymouth area, but two years after a log school house was built in the Northville area, then part of Plymouth Township.

By 1831, Plymouth Township had five school commissioners and five school inspectors.


THE FIRST SCHOOL built in Plymouth was a log cabin erected in 1830 on the brow of Shattuck Hill, on Plymouth Road opposite what later was to become Riverside Cemetery.

At the time, Plymouth Corners was a tiny settlement at the junction of Main Street and Ann Arbor Trail. William Starkweather had built the first house in the village only five years before. His son, George, the first settler's child to be born here, had just reached the age of 4. The village had not yet been platted.

Andrew Jackson was serving his first term as president of the United States. Michigan Territory had a population of 31,639. Indians already were in the minority (it has been estimated that there were only 15,000 Indians in the entire territory when the white man arrived).

After that first log cabin school house was constructed, others began to go up in various parts of the township. There was one on the Marcus Miller farm at the corner of Sheldon and North Territorial Road, where Norma Cassady now lives.

Another, the Rotnour District School, was built on the John Inwagen farm on Golden Road (later renamed Ann Arbor Road.) A third was at the corner of



Beck and North Territorial Roads on the Baker farm.

A fourth known as "The Red School house," was on the J.C. Peterhans farm, a fifth was near the Charles Bradner farm, and a sixth on land that was owned in 1907 by a Mr. Pfeiffer. There also was one on the H.R. Root farm at the corner of Ridge Road and Joy, of which more is written later.

A long-hand history of Plymouth Schools, written by Margaret M. Abelson in 1907, indicated that the first those days. No free school existed in Michigan until 1842.

THE FIRST school house in what now is called "Old Village," the north end of Plymouth, was built in 1837.

It stood on what today is called Holbrook Street, but was then called North Main. That was the school house where teacher Rufus Brown gave a sandpapering to children who came to school with dirty faces.

One of Brown's favorite expressions, "It isn't the stature that makes the man, but the intellect," prompts one to speculate that he was small in size. This north-end school house remained in existence until Union District number one was formed in 1853.

IN 1837, the year Michigan was admitted to the Union, a statewide public school system was adopted, the first of its kind in the U.S.

The plan was proposed to the Legislature by the Rev. John D. Pierce who became Michigan's first Superintendent of Public Instruction. Pierce's plan included tax-supported public schools in which no tuition would be required of primary schools to be free.

Money for the primary school fund was raised by the state from acreage that had been granted to it for the support of schools by an Act of Congress on May 20, 1826. Under this law the state was enabled to sell a section of land (Section 16) in every township and use the proceeds for education.

In addition to money from this primary school fund, based on the number of children of school age in the district, each local board obtained income from "rate bills." This was a tax levied on parents in accordance with the number of days their children attended school.

Under John Pierce's plan, people in each township elected a board of school inspectors charged with establishing school districts, supervising teachers, inspecting schools and distributing money received from the state primary school fund. District boards, each composed of a moderator, a director, and an assessor, also were elected and authorized to levy taxes for the building and maintaining of schools.

Typical of the school districts organized under the 1837 plan was Fractional District number one, Canton and Plymouth, whose officials first convened on Oct. 3, 1837, "pursuant to the statute for the organization of primary schools." Fortunately, the minutes of that school district have come down to us and are now in the possession of the Right now a good mess of dandelion Plymouth-Canton Community School

Easy way to earn money overlooked



Although individual menus have been designed for each astronaut on all previous U.S. manned space missions, preassembled standard menus providing three meals and supplying 3,000 calories per person per day will be used on all Shuttle flights.

When Shuttle is fully operational there could be up to one flight per week. The logistics involved in processing, testing, packaging and stowing the food aboard the spacecraft make individualized menus impossible when turnaround time is so short. During all previous manned missions, crew members were required to make final menu selections from three to six months before launch.

To accommodate individual food preferences during flight when a standardized menu is used, a pantry selected and approved by the crew for each mission is provided to supplement the menu. The pantry's main purpose is to serve as a contigency food supply in case of emergency but, on a nominal mission, pantry items may be exchanged for menu items if a crew member prefers.



Churchill wins Observerland war

Salem a close 2nd as controversy taints Observerland meet

Livonia Churchill, amidst a storm of controversy, won its fifth Observerland Track and Field Relays title in 15 years Saturday, nipping Plymouth Salem 75-72.

Defending champion Redford Bishop Borgess, competing without four frontline performers including Observerland's 1984 Track Man of the Year Fred Owens, placed third with 64 points. Plymouth Canton and Farmington tied for fourth with 42 points.

The meet was technically decided in the final event when Churchill's Gordon Babcock brought home the 1,600-meter relay ahead of Salem's Bryan Waldron. Churchill finished in second place in the relay (3:31.79), Salem fourth (3:34.40).

BUT SALEM would tell you the meet was decided in the shuttle medley relay. The Rocks placed second in the event and would have earned eight points. But meet officials ruled that Salem runner Mike White cut off a Churchill runner, thus disqualifying the Salem team

Salem coach Gary Balconi argued long and hard that White was far ahead of the Churchill runner and couldn': possibly have cut him off. But meet director John MacKenzie upheld the official's ruling.

"In sports, sometimes things happen that you cannot control." Balconi said "You have to learn to accept it.

Said Churchill coach Fred Price: "Our kids ran very well, we had many pleasant surprises. But the sad part is that our effort will be overshadowed by the controversy over the call. The way I look at it, the call was made and, right or wrong, you have to live with it A lot of people haven't been on the other side. I have been. You learn to take the good with the bad."

Churchill was bolstered by a strong showing in field events, winning the shot put (141-1/2) and the discus (423-10) In both events, Dave Mize placed first. He threw the shot 51-1/2 and the disc 154-8

Churchill placed second to Farmington in the high jump with Mike Meehan taking individual honors with a 6-6 leap

'Gotcha!' wavers between spy story, comedy-romance

"Gotcha!" will almost getcha if you don't watch out. But if you lay back and play it for laughs, the film's occasional quirks will not interfere with an entertaining 97 minutes.

Jonathan (Anthony Edwards) is a stereotypical Southern California undergraduate. His sex life is largely composed of leering at cute coeds who turn him off before he gets started. He only succeeds in "Gotcha!" - an assassination, mock-terrorism game of international hit-men.

Using guns with paint pellets instead of bullets makes it legal, although there have been recorded cases when college-town police have been summoned to restaurants because someone thought students were carrying actual weapons.

Proving you can do anything if you have money, Jonathan and his friend, Manolo (Nick Corri), spend their spring break in Paris. As sophomoric stereotypes they are mainly interested in girls, and Jonathan meets every undergraduate's fantasy, the lovely, willing, exotic, sultry Sasha Banicek (Linda Fiorentino).

DOES SASHA love him for his handsome visage, his virginal beauty, his inept and bumbling moves? No. Sasha is a spy who needs a courier-decoy to travel with her to East Berlin. She'll do anything to ensnare Jonathan.

The film was shot in Paris and Berlin as well as Los Angeles. Romantic-comedy thrillers always benefit from the allure of attractive images of far-away places. "Gotcha!" is no exception to that rule although the views aren't particularly imaginative - just pretty postcard stuff.

After phoning home, Jonathan leaves Paris with Sasha to visit West Berlin and, subsequently, East Berlin. All the usual spythriller complications develop as Sasha uses Jonathan to smuggle out the conventional film which half the world's population of spies is after.

One of the inconsistencies in "Gotcha!" that proves bothersome is the film's attempt to do too much. There is the comedy-romance of Jonathan and Sasha and the spy-thriller complications of smuggling film from East Berlin. The movie fails to make transitions smoothly from tense and exciting chase episodes to light-hearted

Players 'Applause' lacks magic

Performances of the Farmington Players production of "Applause" continue Thursday-Saturday, May 9-12, and Thursday-Saturday, May 16-18, at the Farmington Players Barn in Farmington Hills. For ticket information call 626-5061.

"Welcome to the theater - to the magic and the fun," exclaims the main character in the musical "Applause," current offering of the Farmington Players. This production is at times fun, but it fails to deliver the very magic it celebrates.

Many weak vocalists plus some unusually tacky costumes and sets do not rate much applause. On the plus side, though, are many fine characterizations and the outstanding voice of Barbara Haag, who plays the ingenuous but double-dealing Eve Harrington.

Passing herself off as a devoted fan, Eve wheedles her way into the employ of Margo Channing (Sandra Sutherland), an aging Broadway star. Soon Margo finds both her career and her

personal life theatened by the treacherous Eve.

Based on the award-winning film "All About Eve," the musical has lots of bouncy tunes by Charles Strouse, but Lee Adams' lyrics are generally forgettable aside from the title song.

HAAG IS TOTALLY convincing, both as the saccarine Eve and as the no-holds-barred tigress sleeping her way to the top. Haag's lovely rich voice sounds like a trained professional, while most of the other cast members just manage to get by in the musical numbers.

As Margo, Sutherland has an easygoing charm that works fine everywhere except her drunk scene; she's just too likable to turn believably bitchy. Instead Sutherland excels by showing Margo's vulnerability.

Mark Maccagnone is credible as Margo's director and romantic interest, a younger man who chides her about her insecurities and obsession with age.

Ralph and Judie Rosati give strong performances as playwright Buzz Richards and his wife Karen. Rosati elicits pathos as he foolishly stumbles into Eve's clutches, while his vivacious wife uses facial expressions to great advantage.

Joe Haynes is enormously likeable as Duane, Margo's hairdresser and former confidente. Haynes' droll delivery gets lots of laughs without overdoing the homosexual mannerisms.

JOHANNA McKEEVER is a perky Bonnie, leader of the "gypsy" chorus dancers who befriend Eve and are eventually snubbed by her. McKeever's

singing and dancing are a cut above the rest, and she does a nice job with the title number.





bits. Many of the sequences are very funny and the concept of someone adept at mock-terrorism games getting caught up in the real thing deals with the basis of humor: the unexpected. To make that work well, one needs to continually fool the audience into expecting a comic turn when the real thing is about to happen and vice versa. Initially "Gotcha!" is effective in building suspense but the last third of the film loses its touch.

THE PROBLEM LIES with credibility. While Sasha is picked up by the East German Secret Police and obviously doomed, Jonathan makes it across the border at Checkpoint Charlie with relative ease. His crossing is so easy in fact - after considerable tension in an earlier sequence when a spy's murderers chase him - that the film's flow ebbs.

Continuity, then, is a problem as well as credibility. Particularly during the last third of the film, the episodic quality of individual shticks undercuts continuity. It seems as if the director, Jeff Kanew ("Revenge of the Nerds"), and scenarist Dan Gordon write themselves into a corner by getting enamoured with an idea and a routine.

The idea is the film's basic story that needs some pretty fast footwork to get the lead characters out of East Berlin custody and happily reunited.

The routine that gets them in trouble is an elaborate chase sequence where Manolo's street friends bushwhack the CIA. It's a neat routine but to work it into the plot requires complications that are really too much and never clearly explained.

Of course, there is another viewpoint. Films like "Gotcha!" are meant to be enjoyed not critiqued. There are plenty of comic sequences that will amuse every audience, even though some of these are too easy and not fully exploited: for example, the Hispanic maid at Jonathan's parents' home and her misunderstanding of Jonathan's overseas phone calls.




