

Students oughta be in pictures

Ever hear someone tell a story about their high school days that was unbelievable?

Ever told a high school story others refused to believe? Seniors at Plymouth Canton and Plymouth Salem high schools won't have that problem.

For the first time, students at the Centennial Educational Park (CEP) can purchase a video yearbook produced by the yearbook staff and yearbook alumni.

What better way to provide proof of a high school claim? Slip the six-hour video tape into a recorder and presto — instant verification of that high school dance contest you won, the 80-yard touchdown you ran, or how cute you were in that cheerleader's outfit.

Although every event won't appear on the tape, the yearbook staff is trying to incorporate a wide variety of footage that will appeal to a broad range of interests, according to Mark Even, yearbook coordinator.

"This is not to replace the actual yearbook. We don't want to create a new yearbook, but we want to supplement what we already have," Even said.

The purpose or aim of the video staff

is to "catch the personality or flavor of the year," he said.

A RECENT viewing of a promotional tape revealed how the video book will accomplish its goal.

By combining popular music with narrative, the tape works its way through footage of different school events such as football games, band performances, band camp, and other activities.

The promotional tape even included some of the comedy spoof items which will go into the final product. A takeoff on a music video (MTV style) renders a comical look at some of the hidden talents which students possess.

Also, candid interviews with students in the hallways or at events allow a look at the lighter side of student life — not to mention a look at the ridiculous.

"We are in a unique situation because we have so much tape to pull from with the Ricky and Wicky Show," Even said. Ricky and Wicky is a school-sponsored show which appeared on cable television.

Other footage includes memorable shots from community events such as the balloon festival, Fall Festival and even the building of the Central Parking Lot deck.

And because the video book will go through final editing after the school

year ends, Even said graduation and spring sports will be included.

"It's really kind of nice to be able to give the spring sports some recognition and get something on graduation."

The printed yearbook is put together by early spring, and those events are not included.

All told, Even expects some 1,000 hours of work to go into the video books by the time they are mailed in July.

THE PROMOTIONAL tape will be used to encourage local business owners to purchase a commercial spot.

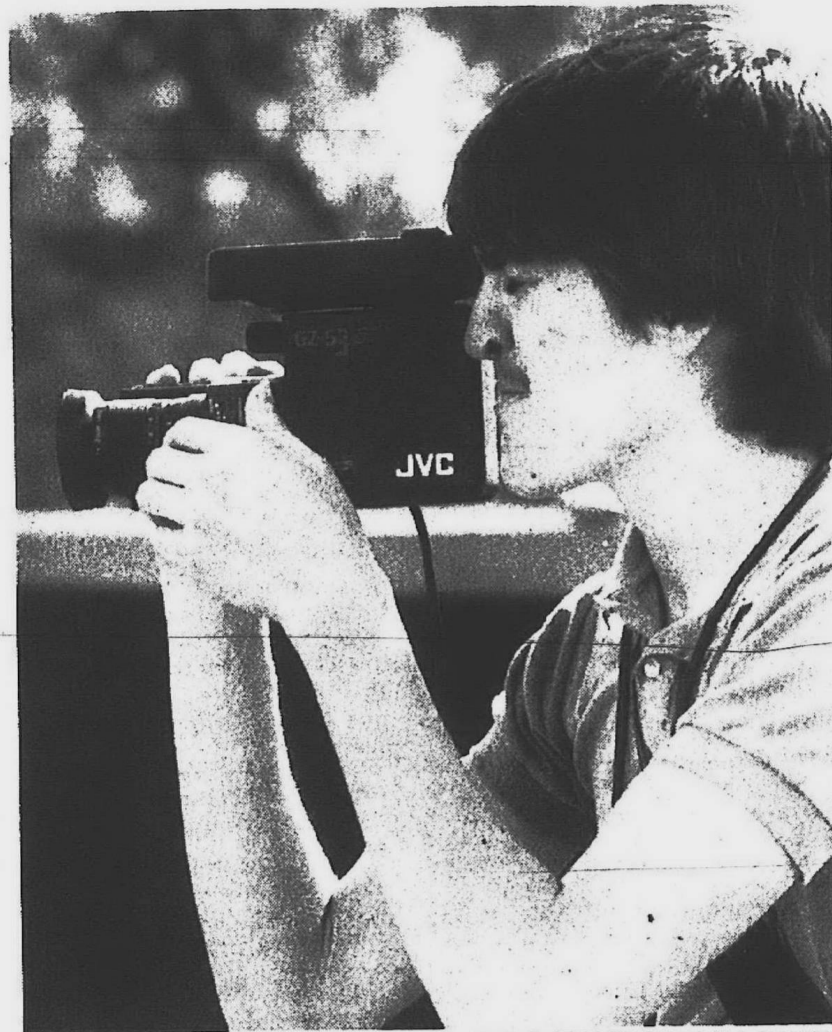
The funds will go toward the costs of producing the final tape.

"We don't have all the necessary equipment, and the funds will be used for that and as a fund-raiser, since we haven't done one in a long time," Even said.

The price of a "commercial spot" is \$250 for roughly 60 seconds. Commercial sponsors also will be mentioned in the printed guide which accompanies the tape.

The spots, which are done in a "low-key" manner, will be used to separate video chapters.

Hoben asks to get tough

- be staffed by certified teachers,
- offer 180 days of instruction per year,
- use curriculums comparable to those of public schools, and
- teach government and history courses.

The criteria present a problem when non-traditionally educated students try to transfer into public schools. Many pupils do so before their "senior year" in order to earn a public high school diploma.

In the case of Central Christian School, said Hoben, "it's a non-accredited school, which means they don't have certified teachers. We have no knowledge of how much or how little they're teaching. How do you evaluate credits?"

PLYMOUTH-CANTON schools now are refusing to grant requests from parents and correspondence schools for copies of curriculums and transcripts, said Hoben. Often the district discovers that students supposedly transferring to Illinois' Christian Liberty Academy and other institutions "have never left the district. It's a guise," he said.

For legal reasons, Hoben chose not to discuss issues regarding Clonlara School, which assists home teachers and instructs 2-15-year-olds in "unstructured, ungraded" classes on its Ann Arbor campus.

Clonlara's director, Dr. Pat Montgomery, "would welcome seeing (Hoben) in court."

"We have always demanded that our parents follow state regulations. We feel very confident when approaching these issues, because we never have lost an issue," said Montgomery, whose school is non-denominational.

"We take a firm stand on that, and are in full compliance. The reason Dr. Hoben is upset with any home school is because it keeps money from public school institutions. Most school people view home schooling as a threat to the public school system, and consequently, to their own jobs. Cooperation is out of the question for them. Their line of thinking is, 'If one family does it, everyone will try it; where will that leave the schools?'"

Montgomery said she is at a loss to determine

what legal action could be brought against Clonlara.

"It boggles the mind. We're talking about people so involved in the education of their children that they're taking it on themselves. (Pursuing litigation) would be wasting money I didn't think Plymouth-Canton had, judging from the number of times it has cried poor mouth and sought millage renewals," said Montgomery.

"Supt. Runkel and schools at the highest levels are trying to work with home schools, not make martyrs out of them."

SHIRLEY WATERS, Plymouth-Canton schools' attendance supervisor, has long wrestled with the problem and thinks the attorney general should "move to shut down non-complying schools."

"We're not opposed to alternative educational systems. We are opposed to sub-standard educational systems. We hate to see youngsters punished by what essentially is the decision of parents to enroll them in one of these non-approved programs," said Waters, who is active in an educational organization trying to remedy the problem.

"Every so often we hear about kids who may be starting on a home study program. In most instances when we contact the family, the family decides against going with the program and heads off the long-term consequences."

Students transferring out of non-traditional programs with "sub-standard credits" confront teachers with difficult choices," added Waters. "Teachers have to make a super-human effort to help students catch up, put them back a year, or let kids flounder in something less than the situation they should be in."

"If the state is unwilling to bring about litigation, maybe a local district will have to, and maybe we should be that district."

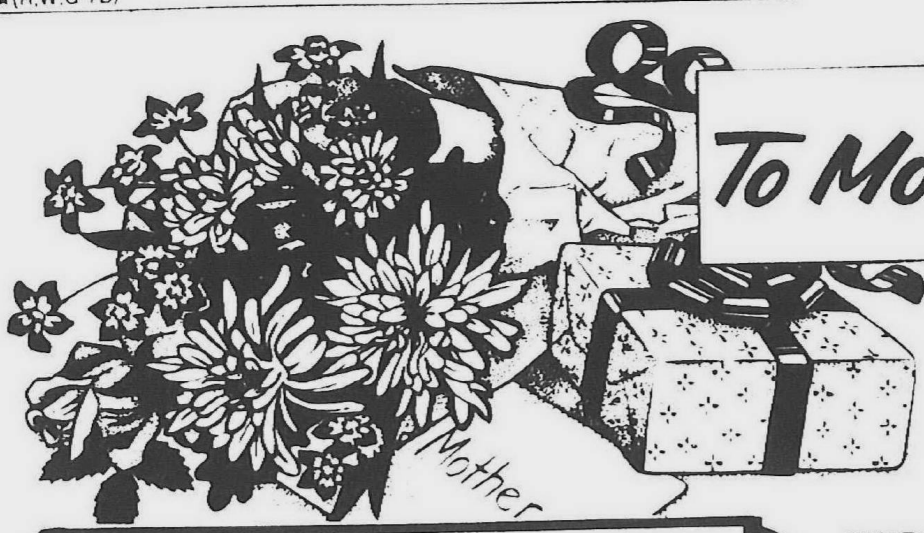

Story of Plymouth's early log cabin schools

(Part 2)

The first school trustees in Plymouth Township — James Purdy, I. Davis and Samuel Sterling — were elected in 1829.

That was a year before the first school house was built in the Plymouth area, but two years after a log school house was built in the Northville area, then part of Plymouth Township.

By 1831, Plymouth Township had five school commissioners and five school inspectors.

THE FIRST SCHOOL built in Plymouth was a log cabin erected in 1830 on the brow of Shattuck Hill, on Plymouth Road opposite what later was to become Riverside Cemetery.

At the time, Plymouth Corners was a tiny settlement at the junction of Main Street and Ann Arbor Trail. William Starkweather had built the first house in the village only five years before.

His son, George, the first settler's child to be born here, had just reached the age of 4. The village had not yet been platted.

Andrew Jackson was serving his first term as president of the United States. Michigan Territory had a population of 31,639. Indians already were in the minority (it has been estimated that there were only 15,000 Indians in the entire territory when the white man arrived).

After that first log cabin school house was constructed, others began to go up in various parts of the township. There was one on the Marcus Miller farm at the corner of Sheldon and North Territorial Road, where Norma Cassidy now lives.

Another, the Rotnour District School, was built on the John Inwagen farm on Golden Road (later renamed Ann Arbor Road.) A third was at the corner of

Beck and North Territorial Roads on the Baker farm.

A fourth known as "The Red School house," was on the J.C. Peterhans farm, a fifth was near the Charles Bradner farm, and a sixth on land that was owned in 1907 by a Mr. Pfeiffer. There also was one on the H.R. Root farm at the corner of Ridge Road and Joy, of which more is written later.

A long-hand history of Plymouth Schools, written by Margaret M. Abelson in 1907, indicated that the first

frame school house in the village was built on the triangle of land at the corner of Church Street and Sutton (now Penniman Avenue). The triangle later became Penniman-Allen Park.

Another frame school in the village was built by William Starkweather on Main Street in 1836. A select school, it was about where Starkweather Avenue was later cut through. One of the teachers was a man named Millett who specialized in Latin and Greek. This was a private school, but there was a charge for attending any school in the area in

those days. No free school existed in Michigan until 1842.

THE FIRST school house in what now is called "Old Village," the north end of Plymouth, was built in 1837.

It stood on what today is called Holbrook Street, but was then called North Main. That was the school house where teacher Rufus Brown gave a sand-papery to children who came to school with dirty faces.

One of Brown's favorite expressions, "It isn't the stature that makes the man, but the intellect," prompts one to speculate that he was small in size. This north-end school house remained in existence until Union District number one was formed in 1853.

IN 1837, the year Michigan was admitted to the Union, a statewide public school system was adopted, the first of its kind in the U.S.

The plan was proposed to the Legislature by the Rev. John D. Pierce who became Michigan's first Superintendent of Public Instruction. Pierce's plan included tax-supported public schools in which no tuition would be required of primary schools to be free.

Money for the primary school fund was raised by the state from acreage that had been granted to it for the support of schools by an Act of Congress on May 20, 1826. Under this law the state was enabled to sell a section of land (Section 16) in every township and use the proceeds for education.

In addition to money from this primary school fund, based on the number of children of school age in the district, each local board obtained income from "rate bills." This was a tax levied on parents in accordance with the number of days their children attended school.

Under John Pierce's plan, people in each township elected a board of school inspectors charged with establishing school districts, supervising teachers, inspecting schools and distributing money received from the state primary school fund. District boards, each composed of a moderator, a director, and an assessor, also were elected and authorized to levy taxes for the building and maintaining of schools.

Typical of the school districts organized under the 1837 plan was Fractional District number one, Canton and Plymouth, whose officials first convened on Oct. 3, 1837, "pursuant to the statute for the organization of primary schools." Fortunately, the minutes of that school district have come down to us and are now in the possession of the Plymouth-Canton Community School system.

With every armful, we would start calling on the neighbors who do most of the home cooking and we'd always sell all of our lot. We called every armful a mess and collected 15 cents for each of them.

It was our way of getting spending money and we never had to bother Mother for some of her cash. She got a thrill out of that after she realized we were earning a business lesson.

BUT THE BIG satisfaction came when she set us down to dinner and we would have dandelion for our main course. She would have a special dressing for the dandelion and we would help ourselves to a large portion of them, along with mashed potatoes. We would then cover that mound with dandelion greens and the special dressing for them. And Mother looked on with happiness.

As a matter of fact, the children in our home, including The Stroller, were raised on dandelion greens. During Sundays for most of the year, we would have chicken or grandmother raised. And at times we had meatloaf as the

meat went further in that style. And even in those days she would bring in her favorite mock duck.

That's why the scene today is so puzzling. The dandelion is there in great

quantities, but you don't see any in the markets or on the dining tables. Yet for us, there was no meal more satisfying. Possibly this was because we picked it ourselves.

Aside from the nourishment we received, the sale of the dandelion in our neighborhood was our first lesson in business — the type we wouldn't get in school.

WHEN ALL these things are considered, a fellow has to wonder why the young folks of today aren't out on the open spaces to pick dandelion.

It isn't often that you can enjoy a good meal and take a lesson in business that may come in handy later in life.

So, when a fellow sees these wide open spaces filled with the dandelion flowers he really has good cause to wonder why the young fellows today aren't out there picking.

They don't know what they are missing.

Right now a good mess of dandelion would be a real treat, especially if we could still have some of Mother's tasty dressing for it.

Rockwell show opens with benefit reception

Sculptor Peter Rockwell is coming to town this week for a one-man show.

He'll spend Wednesday and Thursday arranging his bronze and marble works of art at the Frank Lloyd Wright "Snowflake House" in Plymouth Township. Everything will be in place for the opening night benefit, 7-10 p.m. Friday, May 10, when everyone will have an opportunity to meet Rockwell. Tickets for the benefit at \$25 per person may be reserved by calling the Plymouth Community Arts Council office, 455-5260, between 9 a.m. and noon.

After May 11, the show will be open to the public free. Those interested in acquiring any of Rockwell's works will have an opportunity to do so while viewing the exhibit and the house.

BECAUSE PARKING space is unavailable at the Frank Lloyd Wright house, admission to the house and exhibit is available only through a shuttle bus service which will leave the Frame Works on Penniman Avenue every half hour.

Show hours will be 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday-Saturday, 7-9 p.m. Thursday-Saturday and 1-5 p.m. Sunday. Group tours may be arranged by calling the arts council, 455-5260.

The PCAC and Frame Works are sponsoring the exhibit with partial funding from the Michigan Council for the Arts. Helen Milliken is honorary chairwoman of the show.

PETER ROCKWELL is the son of artist Norman Rockwell. Because his mother and an elder brother also were artists, he said he was not interested in painting as his own form of expression.

After receiving a bachelor of arts degree in English literature from Haverford College in Pennsylvania, he studied sculpture at the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts in Philadelphia. He was awarded the J. Henry Scheidt traveling fellowship and went to Rome in the fall of 1961. He planned to stay there six months or a year.

"We never got around to leaving," he

said. He stayed in Italy partly because of the bronze foundries in Rome, the marble quarries nearby, and "being able to look at carvings by people like Bernini, Donatelli and Michelangelo."

MEMBERS OF Plymouth arts council met Rockwell in Rome two summers ago and visited his studio and apartment. It was there the first inking of a local show occurred.

Rockwell has had one-man shows of his sculpture in the United States almost yearly since 1968. He has shown in Barthelet Gallery, New York; Shore Galleries, Boston; Byck Gallery and Actors Theatre, Louisville; Newman Galleries, Philadelphia; Kingpitcher Gallery, Pittsburgh; and Mickelson Gallery, Washington, D.C.

His work is in collections of the National Portrait Gallery, Washington, D.C.; the Bridgeport Museum of American Art, Bridgeport, Conn.; and the Corner House Museum in Stockbridge, Mass. He has executed monumental

bas-reliefs, hanging pieces and fountains in bronze, polyester and stone. He also is represented in numerous private collections in the United State and Europe.

FOR MANY, the site of the Rockwell show is a major attraction.

Tom Monaghan, owner of the Detroit Tigers and Domino's Pizza, was a long-time admirer of Frank Lloyd Wright architecture when he bought the "Snowflake House" last spring.

The hexagonal structure has four levels and seven flat, sky-lighted roof lines to harmonize with the site. He used glass extensively to give the illusion of being outdoors. The building, with much of its furniture designed by Wright, and its surrounding gardens are one with the land.

The bedroom wing, added later, was designed by Wright.

JANET CAMPBELL and Judy Morgan are co-chairing the show which has been in the planning for more than a year.

Working with them have been a host of arts council members in various committees. Nancy Sharp (chair) has Judy Lore, Fran Nistal, Nancy Rizzo and Joan Wehmeyer on the invitations committee.

The public relations group, chaired by Joanne Hulce, includes Gae McCord, Nan Cooper, Toni King, Betty Stremich, Carl Cederberg, Ruth Tonner, Maribel Carroll, Marian West and Tiv Balogh.

The Friday evening benefit reception is being co-chaired by Jo Ellen Odom and Sue Gallas. Marlene Ciofani, Maret Garard, Michelle Dorrington, Claudia Snyder, Carolyn Simons and Beth Stuart serve on the committee.

Wilma Newton is in charge of finances and her husband, Richard Newton, is arranging transportation.
