## Aug. 6 primary set for commission race

There will be a primary election this August in the City of Plymouth. One was assured earlier this week when Lloyd Duston of St. Union, Plymouth, became the ninth resident to file for one of the four City Commission seats up for election this year. Later on Tuesday, Greg Green of Plymouth filed, making a field of 10 candidates. Monday night it was learned that candidate Robert Kroeger, a school teacher and volunteer firefighter, was told he would have to take a leave of

absence or resign his position as a volunteer firefighter to be a commission candidate. Last week, the same option was given to Plymouth police officer Mel Meck. Meck withdrew as a candidate and will remain a police officer, while Kroeger has decided to resign as a volunteer firefighter and remain a candidate. Other candidates are incumbent William Robinson and challengers Karl Gansler II, William Bingley, Robert

Jones, Donald Keller Jr., Jean Morrow and Anthony Anason. The deadline to withdraw as a candidate is 4 p.m. Friday, June 21. **KROEGER REVEALED** during the citizens comments portion of Monday night's regular city commission meeting that he had received a letter from the administration saying that he had to resign or take a leave of absence as a volunteer firefighter to be a candidate. Ron Lowe, city attorney, said the let-

ter was based on a state law which makes it a conflict of interest for a person to hold an elective office in a municipality which he/she is employed by. The law does not require the commission to take any action, explained Lowe. In case of such conflicts, the law provides that the employee must resign if elected. Part of the law, Lowe added, gives the administration the option of asking the employee to take a leave or resign at the time nominating petitions are filed. The city attorney said that the issue

came up last year when Plymouth police officer Jerry Vorva filed for city commission and was told he would have to quit his job if elected. "We are just trying to be consistent." **THE FOUR SEATS** up for election now are being held by Robinson, Ron Loiselle, Jack Kenyon and Mayor David Pugh. Loiselle, Kenyon and Pugh cannot seek re-election because of a city charter provision which limits commissioners to two consecutive terms.

Gansler is a former city commissioner, chairman of the retail committee of the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce, a Plymouth Rotarian and a past member of the Plymouth Jaycees. Robinson, an accountant, is presently mayor protem. He is a Plymouth Kiwanis member and a longtime member of the Plymouth Housing Commission. He also serves as a representative on the Conference of Western Wayne.

## Police say to watch for cons

Gypsies haven't hit the Plymouth area in some time, but Lt. Robert Commire doesn't believe that's reason to let your guard down.

Just as the warmer weather brings flowers and birds, it signals the return of Gypsy groups which often bilk elderly residents out of their life savings through repair or home invasion scams.

"It usually starts in the spring," said Commire, who heads the Plymouth police detective bureau.

"So far we haven't had any complaints but the Gypsies have already hit in Livonia, Westland, Garden City, Dearborn and Detroit. Mostly, senior citizens are their victims."

A couple years ago the Plymouth area was hit hard by Gypsy routines. Posing as roof and/or driveway repairmen, the con artists earned hundreds of dollars from unsuspecting victims until Plymouth police caught up with them.

After arresting two of the men, the Gypsy activity ceased in Plymouth. Commire said the area has been hit only once or twice since.

"They're fast and they get away fast. The way that they get you is that they confuse you," said Commire.

"The main thing they want is to find out where your money is and get in the house."

Commire divides the Gypsy activity into two categories: scams where they appear to perform work and charge exorbitant fees, and scams where they divert house or store owners and steal cash.

Both types of scams are hard to get convictions on, making it difficult for police departments to combat the activity.

**IN THE** repair scam, the Gypsies go to a home and usually say they have been working in the area — either sealing driveways or coating roofs.

They claim to have left-over materials and offer to give a good price on the work.

Once the homeowner agrees to have the work done, they spray paint or oil on the roof or driveway so that it appears work has been done. The homeowner is charged anywhere between a couple hundred dollars to more than \$1,500 for the worthless job.

Because the men performed a job — spraying something — police really can't arrest them for committing a crime. The homeowner verbally agreed to work for which there is no guarantee or specification.

"Check to see that the person offering to do the work is licensed. Ask to see the license or get the license number," Commire suggests.

"Not all work requires a license, so for jobs that don't, ask for references."

Find out where else they have worked and check on them.

"The worst thing a person can do is accept door-to-door solicitations for work. You shouldn't have that type of work (major repairs) done on a spur-of-the-moment basis," he said.

Legitimate contractors won't require that a job be done on the same day and usually will accept checks for payment. Con artists want to do the job immediately and will offer savings for same-day work or cash payments.

A legitimate repairman won't mind letting you think it over for a couple days, or having you check their references.

**IN THE** diversion scams, the con artists will pose as utility representatives or store customers.

When dealing with homeowners the con artists usually say they need to check a utility meter for a possible refund. Once in the house they claim \$50 is to be refunded and ask the owner to make change.

When the owner makes change for a large bill, they disclose where their money is kept. One of the con artists then takes the homeowner downstairs to the meter, while the other steals the remaining cash.

"No company sends a representative out to make a cash refund. They will credit your bill or send a check," Commire said.

"Utility company workers all have an ID card which they will be glad to show you, and it won't be a quick flash, they will let you look at it," he said.

A homeowner should never leave a stranger alone in their house. If asked to look at a meter, request that everyone go downstairs. Legitimate company representatives won't be offended.

In store diversions, the con artists will "flood" the store with people. Once inside, they create a diversion by starting an argument or feigning illness.

The object of the diversion is to make sure the store office is left unattended so someone can steal the cash.

Storeowners never should leave cash unattended. In the event of a disturbance, the manager should lock the office or instruct an employee to stay in it.

**COMMIRE STRESSES** the importance of notifying police in the event someone falls victim to a con scheme.

Many times victims are too embarrassed to tell their families, let alone police. But unless a report is made there is no chance of recovering the money.

Although the chances of catching the con artist are slim, Plymouth Police have been able to negotiate restitution in some cases.

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## Township stands on record

### Officials cite fiscal policy in millage request

Plymouth Township officials are standing on their fiscal record in asking residents to approve a July 29 millage request.

Speaking at a millage information meeting Monday night, several board members said they need five-mill authorization to operate the township.

"If we are to continue the services we have been providing, we have to ask you to help us," said Trustee Abe Munfakh, chairman of the millage committee which sponsored the meeting.

"The unanimous thinking of the board is that we would only levy what we need to provide the service you want," Munfakh told the more than 50 residents attending the meeting.

On July 29 voters will be asked to approve a township levy of up to four mills (\$4 for every \$1,000 of assessed valuation) for general operation. If approved, the township could levy up to five mills — the four mills plus one mill special voted for fire (which runs until 2001).

Although five mills would be available, township officials said they would levy between three and four mills in the first year. They are seeking a five-mill cap to operate without millage votes in future years.

Under the proposal, the township's millage rate would be set each year to match the upcoming year's budget.

"The budgets will be done after budget hearings so the citizens will have input to make sure that we spend your tax dollars on what you want your tax dollars spent," Munfakh said.

"OVER THE last 10 to 15 years, the township board has exercised a very frugal millage . . . the cost to taxpayers is low," Munfakh said. The decision to ask for a five-mill

maximum levy was based on two assumptions, according to Supervisor Maurice Breen.

"We assumed that the community would not want fire protection to disappear, and that it would not want police services to disappear," Breen said.

"Having established this service level, we looked at what it costs to fund it. The minimum level is 3.88 mills and that's with just a 5 percent increase for 1986."

For a \$140,000 home, Breen said the difference between levying three mills and five mills would be \$140 — \$210 at three mills and \$350 at five mills.

"I submit to you that's not a whole lot of money to pay for police, fire, recreation, and whatever other service we provide," he said.

"For your fundamental services, \$210 is not very much and \$350, the most we could ask for, again is not that much."

"We have the same level of people working in the township, minus police, that we had in 1974," he said.

The township portion of property tax bills makes up only 8 to 9 percent of the total bill, according to Breen.

"Dollar for dollar, you're getting more from the township than any other form of government — county, state or schools," Munfakh said.

"We need some ability to move up and down with the millage rate," Breen said. "In the last two years we have opted not to use the full millage."

"People said, 'What's a half-mill? Who would notice it?' but we did not levy it to demonstrate that we aren't going to levy more than we need."

"We in townships are always very apologetic about going out and saying, 'Gee, we need another mill.' But when you look at the actual dollars, it's not very much," Breen said.

COMMITTEE MEMBER Richard

Gornick, a Planning Commission member and former township board member, echoed Breen's comments.

"I've watched the township evolve, and you have to remember that a charter township is an interim step. We may at some point look at a home rule city," Gornick said.

"There's a great deal of fiscal integrity on the township boards. Many times we didn't levy all the millage we had available."

Gornick cited two reasons which made that possible because the township controlled growth to limit the demand for services, and because the township didn't go into bonded debt to build.

"At the time we went to a charter township, we said we would levy as needed and put some of that millage to the people in the form of special millages," he said.

Going for a millage cap is a break from the special millage tradition. In the past the township levied separate millages for police, fire and administration. Police and fire millages were special voted for a specified number of years.

All of the police millages will expire this year, and fire will be down to the one mill voted through 2001.

Because of that, Munfakh said the township would be left with two mills for 1986 operation should the July 29 proposal be defeated — one for fire and one general.

"It really wasn't a question of whether or not you wanted a vote," Breen said. "It's a question of what you would ask a vote on."

"The only bullet we're asking anyone to bite is this — recognition we're no longer a rural township."

By breaking from the special millage tradition and going to a five-mill maxi-

mum, Munfakh said, "will give the township the ability to function as a charter township."

**IN RESPONSE** to a resident's question, Breen said the millage rate would be reduced in the event a library district with taxing powers was established.

Currently the township and city share the cost of the library, about \$150,000 a year. Voters in both communities will be asked later this year to approve a library district and authorize up to one mill for library operation.

If the library district and millage is approved, Breen said the \$150,000 "strain" would be relieved from the township — about a half-mill of revenues.

"I presume that would be taken into account when the millage rate is set," he said.

Members of the millage committee said the township board would have to determine where cuts would be made in the event the proposal fails.

"We don't use the scare tactics the school board does. With two mills we can only generate so many dollars. There would have to be cutbacks but the board would have to decide where," Munfakh said.

"We could possibly go back for another vote but it would be at the same time of the library millage vote," Breen said in responding to a question if there would be enough time to go back for a lower millage rate.

"If in fact it's voted down, you can come back with another vote — either lower it or come back at the same level," he said.

"It strikes me as asking my kid if he wanted to go to bed now," said resident Al Bentley. "You need a backup plan."

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# Good turnout at festival

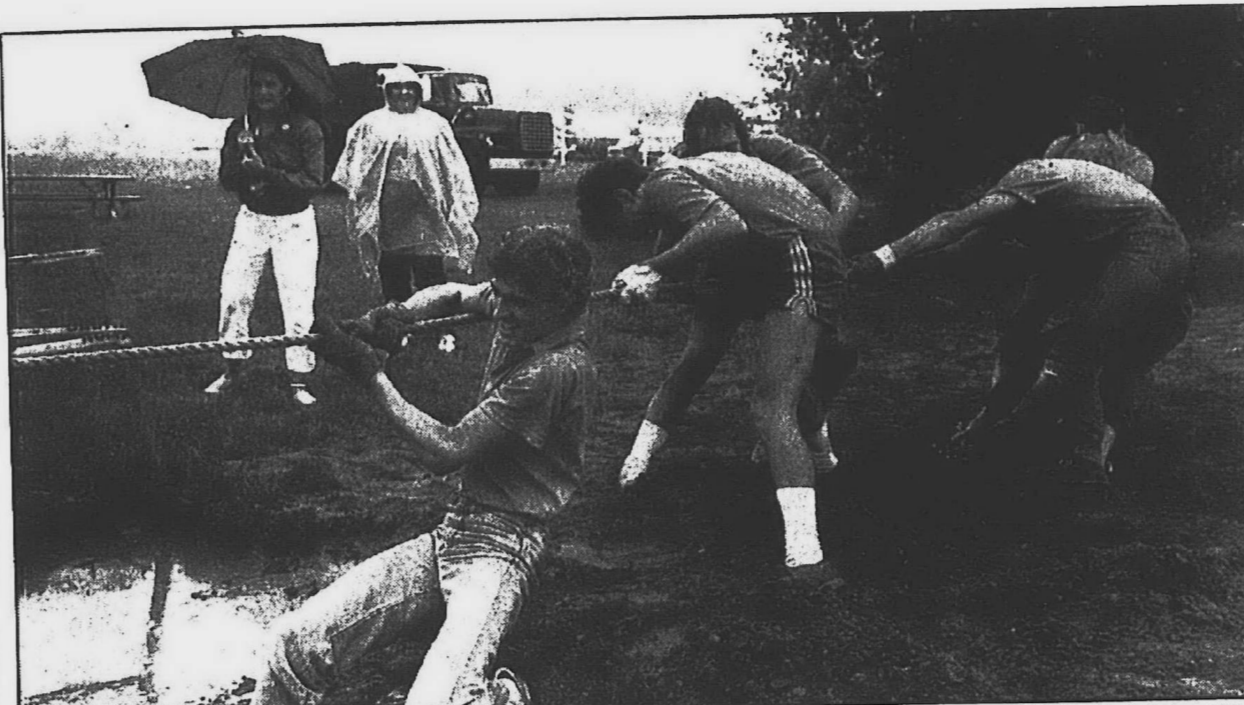
The long-debated "Cow Chip Fling" contest was also held. Trustee Robert Padgett and Mike Gouin, recreation director, were able to fling the furthest.

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# Township buys motorcycle for police force

They wouldn't give him a Honda, so he's getting a Kawasaki instead.

A few weeks ago Police Chief Carl Berry sent a request to the Plymouth Township Board asking them to accept the free use of an American-built Honda Accord. They turned him down.

The car would have been provided for two years by Sunshine Honda on Ann Arbor Road in exchange for advertising the police department had it. Berry wanted the car for special, non-patrol uses.

Despite guarantees that the advertis-

ing wouldn't suggest the car was used as a patrol vehicle, the board got bogged down in a debate over truth in advertising.

Now Berry is getting a Kawasaki 1000 motorcycle to use for many of the same purposes. The township was the successful bidder last week on the used motorcycle being sold by the city of Southgate.

The township is paying \$1,500 for the fully-equipped bike and expects to take delivery within the next two weeks.

BERRY, AN avid motorcycle fan, said he really didn't have plans for a motorcycle when he embarked on building a police department.

The township is starting a department and plans to have officers on the street July 1, the same date a contract for shared services with Plymouth expires.

Berry found out Southgate was selling the motorcycle through his recently-hired police commander, Larry Hall. Before coming to the township, Hall worked as a Southgate police officer.

Having been the past president of the Honda Gold Wing Association, a motorcycle touring club, Berry was asked whether the purchase had anything to do with his passion for bikes.

"Believe it or not, it really didn't," Berry said last week. "Larry came in and knew about it, and we couldn't pass it up for that price."

The chief said the bike is considerably cheaper than a car, both in initial outlay and operational costs.

"After a thorough review of the short- and long-term law enforcement needs of the township, and after meeting with Supervisor Maurice Breen, it is my recommendation that a bid of \$1,500 be submitted," Berry wrote in a memo to the board last week.

"The estimated value of the motorcycle is approximately \$2,500 and if our bid is accepted this would be an exceptional buy," he wrote.

"COMMANDER Hall, a trained police motorcycle operator, previously used this motorcycle with the Southgate Police Department, has all the uniform implements required to ride and has agreed to do so for the township.

"It is my intention to utilize the motorcycle for general patrol, traffic control, crowd control, and special events including the Fourth of July parade, picnic and upcoming balloon festival," he wrote.

At this point, Berry doesn't have any plans to expand the motorcycle fleet and expects Hall will be the only rider.

Although police motorcycles normally are used only during daylight hours in the summer, Berry jokingly said "it depends on your viewpoint."

No policies for night or winter use have been made, the chief said.

"It can't be used in chases. The minute it is, it will be taken off the road. I know what it's like to be involved in those type of things," he said.

How does he know about chases on motorcycles, having come from a department without a motorcycle?

"I just do," said Berry.

To operate a police motorcycle, an officer must have special certification from a motorcycle course, according to the chief. Such courses are put on by the Wayne County Sheriff's Department and the Detroit Police Department.

Berry, also known to have a fondness

for using helicopters, said he has no other plans for purchasing special vehicles or equipment.

It's unknown whether any of the incoming officers are certified police pilots.

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# Gypsy activities focus of police task force

(First of a series looking at Gypsy culture.)

Mention the word Gypsy to someone and images of crystal balls, tea leaves, palm reading and tarot cards usually appear.

Mention Gypsy to a law enforcement official and images of con schemes and elderly victims usually appear.

In the midwest, warmer weather usually means the return of Gypsy groups and hundreds of con artist reports — many of which police link to the Gypsies.

Police agencies across the nation regularly track Gypsy activities. Gypsy bulletins and updates are exchanged to keep apprised of the latest schemes, movements and investigative techniques.

The effort is immense. Criminal intelligence bulletins, issued out of the Illinois Department of Law Enforcement, contain the names and pictures of hundreds of Gypsies who have been involved in thefts of one type or another.

The bulletins, compiled in a notebook, stand several inches high and contain an array of information including: Gypsy history, explanations of Gypsy culture and details of different law enforcement encounters with Gypsies.

In Michigan, most police departments are members of the Gypsy Task Force which tracks Gypsy-related crimes throughout the state. Besides police agencies, utility companies, hospitals, insurance companies and other private industries are members.

THE WORD Gypsy, a shortened version of the word Egyptians, refers to a

people whose roots are traced back to northern India — to the province of Punjab, which now is divided between India and Pakistan.

The Gypsies left Punjab and migrated into Central Europe by the middle of the 14th century. When they arrived in America is not known but many migrated north from South America, while others moved from Europe.

Gypsies, as a people, have led a life of travel throughout the world — with much of it being marked by persecution. Thousands of Gypsies were killed in Nazi concentration camps during World War II. Prior to that, they were the focus of laws and decrees making them virtually "untouchables."

According to the intelligence bulletins, the Gypsy population is estimated to be 10 million worldwide, with 1 million in the United States and Canada.

Much of the Gypsy culture is related to beliefs in magic and superstition. Their hierarchy is based on family ties, with community councils and rulers.

According to the intelligence information, the myth of a Gypsy king is just that — a myth. Law enforcement officers believe kings are named but don't rule.

"Frequently law enforcement officials will be confronted by an individual who claims to be 'King of the Gypsies.' This individual is not a king but a Rom Baro," the bulletin states.

Rom Baro means "boss man," and usually is the community leader. Kings were named in earlier years as governments would imprison a king in an attempt to have Gypsies conform to their law. Typically, the king was anything but a ruler, in some cases being a Gypsy member who was mentally deficient.

cers with an understanding of the Gypsies, the bulletins look at Gypsy folklore.

"One of the most important legends handed down from one generation to the next is the role the Gypsies played in the crucifixion of Jesus.

"Gypsies traditionally were blacksmiths and, as such, were commissioned by Roman soldiers to make four nails to be used for the crucifixion. After making the nails, the Gypsies went to bed and woke up the next morning to find the fourth nail glowing."

According to the legend, an angel came and told the Gypsies the fourth nail was going to be used to go through Jesus' heart.

"A Gypsy boy stole the nail. Jesus supposedly told the Gypsies that since this boy stole the nail to save him from pain, the Gypsies could steal forever and ever."

Another version of the legend says that Jesus told them, "Gypsy, you are free to go and travel anywhere and you can steal your food and take what you need to live."

Regardless of the reason why, Gypsies have become marked as a people who steal and never settle in one place. The intelligence reports state that a Gypsy who takes a job and keeps it usually becomes an outcast.

As for travel, the reports suggest that being transient for hundreds of years has led Gypsies to keep their possessions in easily moveable form. Cited as an example is a young Gypsy girl who was arrested for shoplifting.

While being booked, the girl placed an unusual amount of jewelry in her property envelope. The jailer called a local jeweler to examine the jewelry. Its value was estimated at \$60,000.

Weeks later the jailer talked with a police officer from another city who

had arrested the same girl. At the time of that arrest she was wearing diamonds valued at \$100,000.

"Although the above example is an unusual case, it illustrates the Gypsies' ability to move large amounts of negotiable property with them as they travel," the report states.

"This was essential to them as they migrated around the world, because they had little faith in paper money from the various countries."

ONE GYSPY researcher inter-

viewed a Gypsy regarding his ability to earn money.

The Gypsy told the interviewer he learned to steal by watching his mother and favorite aunt shoplift from department stores when he was 7.

By the time he was 10, the Gypsy said his father had taught him how to "work a series of sophisticated confidence games" that could swindle people out of their savings.

When he was 11, the Gypsy earned between \$600 and \$800 a week selling handbags in bars. He told the custom-

ers a hard-luck story and charged them \$30 for 75-cent handbags.

By age 15, the Gypsy claimed he was traveling the country on his own, "paving driveways and sealing roofs with worthless materials" and selling cheap travel trailers for "thousands of dollars more than their market value."


By age 19, the Gypsy was estimated to be making and spending between \$150,000 and \$200,000 a year.

Commire also urges persons who suspect con schemes to call police.


"If you call, at least we can check it out," he said. "If it's legitimate, then there's no harm done. If it isn't legitimate, then we can prevent someone from getting ripped off," he said.

Plymouth Police were able to make the earlier mentioned arrests because someone spotted the men offering to do work at an elderly resident's home. The person called police and officers were able to catch them before they left the neighborhood.

# 2nd Activities Day in Hines is this Sunday

The public asked for it, and the Wayne County Parks and Recreation Department is delivering it — starting June 23 in Hines Park.

The first in a series of regional Activities Days will run from 9 to 4 Sunday in a Livonia-Plymouth segment of Hines Park. From Newburgh Road in Livonia to Northville Road in Plymouth, the drive will be closed to motor vehicles.

"I got the idea last month just talking to people at the first Activities Day, when we closed the entire road," said Vic Chiasson, in his first season as recreation chief for the county.

Parking Sunday will be available at three points along Hines Parkway:

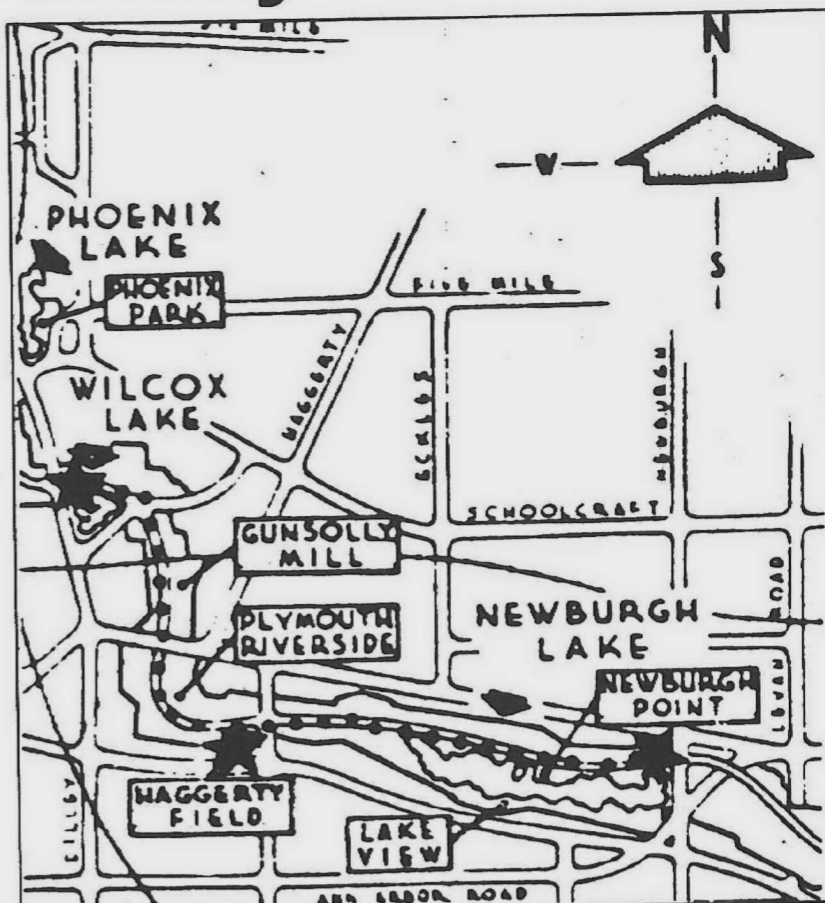
- 1) East — along Hines Drive from Newburgh Road to Newburgh Point.

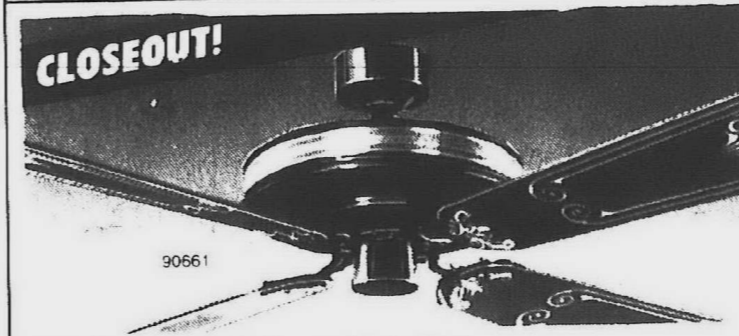
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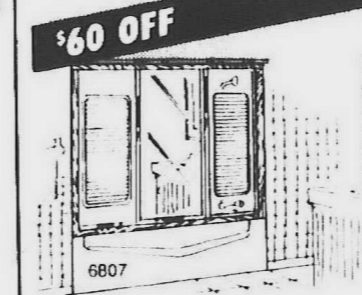
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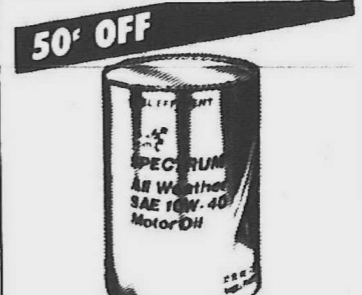
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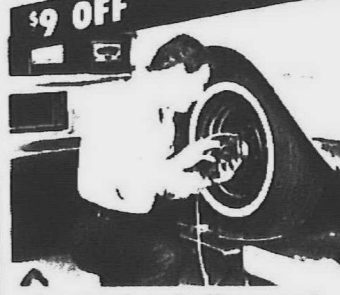
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# Key training role for local colleges

Michigan's community colleges will be heavily involved in new, intensified, coordinated efforts to retrain Michigan's workforce, college representatives and state officials said last week.

The community college leaders met with Dr. Phillip E. Runkel, state superintendent of public instruction, and other state job development leaders. The occasion was the annual planning conference of the Community Colleges Network for Economic Development and Job Training.

"I commit to you a stronger partnership than we have ever had," said Runkel. "We think you are the most important new ingredient in education in the state — we need to work together. There needs to be a partnership."

Runkel said efforts in the state to coordinate education in partnership will be increased, and that the role of K-12 education and community colleges will be defined.

**BOTH RUNKEL** and Philip H. Power, chairman of the Michigan Job Coordinating Council and member of the Governor's Commission on Higher Education, said that the state will be helping to coordinate all job development agencies.

Power, owner of Observer & Eclectic Newspapers, said an inventory by the Governor's Office of Job Training has shown that there are nine state departments operating 36 different training programs at a cost of \$650 million annually.

In response to a question about the new programs, Runkel suggested: "We could even borrow money, look at bonding for equipment and pay it off with long term debt. I support that

if we could be assured that the outcome was there, that people would be productive in jobs, that productivity would be increased.

"We've got to find ways to bring together members of the community college community and faculty statewide to share ideas," Runkel said.

"We should be bringing all these people together in a series of meetings. If we can develop a record of placement, matching people with jobs, we can make a big difference."

Power said the state must target training money on the type of jobs which are anticipated in this state five to 10 years in the future.

**DR. JACK Russell** of the Governor's Cabinet Council on Jobs and Economic Development said the community colleges will be asked to participate in the state's new technology deployment service.

"The technology deployment service will work with medium-sized and small Michigan manufacturers that are modernizing their production technology," he said.

He explained that the technology deployment service will qualify selected manufacturers for employee training required by the new technologies. "Community colleges will play a strong role in providing such training," Russell said.

The community college network, headed by Barbara Eldersveld, agreed to intensify efforts in marketing the industrial training services of community colleges and to step up development of staff. State corporations will be contacted to increase awareness of the training services of community colleges.

# SC provides a Sweet service

Michigan, eighth largest state in population, ranks 20th in getting federal contracts.

"You're going to see this turn around," said Bruce W. Sweet Jr., whose full-time job at Schoolcraft College is to help suburban companies do business with the United States government.

"I went through the Dun & Bradstreet listings and found 5,670 area businesses that could have a market in government. Less than 80 were doing any government work. Government really is an untapped source of revenue.

"Businesses can really diversify their revenue so they're not so subject to the ups and downs of the auto market," Sweet said. His rule of thumb: Don't have more than 40 percent of your revenue from government contracts. Few area firms are in danger of hitting that limit.

**SWEET'S OFFICE** is in the college library. The sign over the door says "Business Development Center."

Apparently the first community college to set up such a service, Schoolcraft has made outreach to business a top priority under President Richard McDowell.

Conway Jeffress, vice president for instruction says Sweet's job is to "help companies compete for access to federal and state agency bids. Some of those documents are difficult for a Ph.D. to interpret."

Sweet's shop — himself, a secretary, federal documents and microfilms — opened for business this month under a contract with the Wayne County Private Industry Corp. PIC's funds are 6 percent of the money in the Job Training and Partnership Act.

warehouse. The warehouse goes to the buying office, which develops a bid package.

"They must advertise in 1) the bidders' mailing list, 2) the Commerce Business Daily (CBD), which is the government's want ads, and 3) in their own lobby. Contractors are supposed to go to one of these sources and bid."

How does he help?  
"We enroll the business on the bidders' mailing list. We subscribe to the CBD and send them (local firms) sections. And we subscribe to newsletters."

Suppose your firm has received a bid package — what then?

"We'll sit down and see that they've bid properly. We can tell them the procurement history of that product so they'll know what the competitive bid process is," he answered.

**WITH SO** many companies around, how can Sweet remember that the XYZ Co. within the Schoolcraft College District produces (say) the floor waxes the feds want to buy?

"I talk to chambers of commerce. I recruit businesses. I pay them a two-hour visit and learn what products and production potential they have. And I create a file on them."

"For companies which do specific things like paint water towers, it's easy to remember."

"Companies tend to fall into categories," he went on, citing machine shops and metal fabricators common in the metropolitan suburbs. In time, he thinks the operation might be computerized, matching products with local producers.

**FEDERAL SPECIFICATIONS** can be complicated — there are 10 pages of "specs" for the common marshmallow. Sweet has the resources to get the specs.

"The contract you sign doesn't contain all the specs. It just refers to the specification numbers," he said. "A six-story building in Philadelphia has all the federal specifications for contracts. It would take you 12 weeks to get the specs from Philadelphia. By that time, your bidding deadline has passed."

How then does the little local businessperson get bid specifications in time to submit an intelligent bid?

Sweet pointed to a cabinet-sized file of microfilms. "That," he said, "contains all the specs that are in that six-story building in Philadelphia. We can look up the specs they need and put it on the screen. The company can review it. We can make them copies for a charge."

**IN THE** brief time he has been the Business Development Center, Sweet

**Bruce Sweet's office** in the Schoolcraft College library has microfilms full of federal product specifications.

has helped a few local firms.

He found a heat treating company in Livonia wasn't in contact with the right federal people. He aided an architectural firm seeking to become a subcontractor.

"I know how the bureaucracy works. We function like the contracting department for a large company," he said. Experience tells him a firm isn't often low bidder on the first try. Often it takes six months to get your first contract.

In a previous post in Harrison, he helped local firms generate \$14 million in contracts, create 126 new jobs and save 117 other jobs.

How did Bruce Sweet Jr., son of a General Motors foreman from the Flint-area hamlet of Columbiaville, get into the federal procurement line of work?

**WITH TWO** degrees from Central Michigan University — in English lit-

erature and secondary education — he started out teaching in community colleges in Benton Harbor, Dowagiac and Petoskey.

That led to a career development counselor post in Harrison for a consortium of nine county governments.

That led to working with federal contracts and schools. That led to helping mid-Michigan firms drum up business as second- and third-tier subcontractors.

That led to a job as training coordinator with the Michigan Employment Training Institute, a private, non-profit group which trains people to provide job training.

That led to a meeting with Schoolcraft College people and an invitation to come to western Wayne County to head their Business Development Center.

"With the industrial base you have here and the facilities of this college," he predicts, "I don't think this center can fail."

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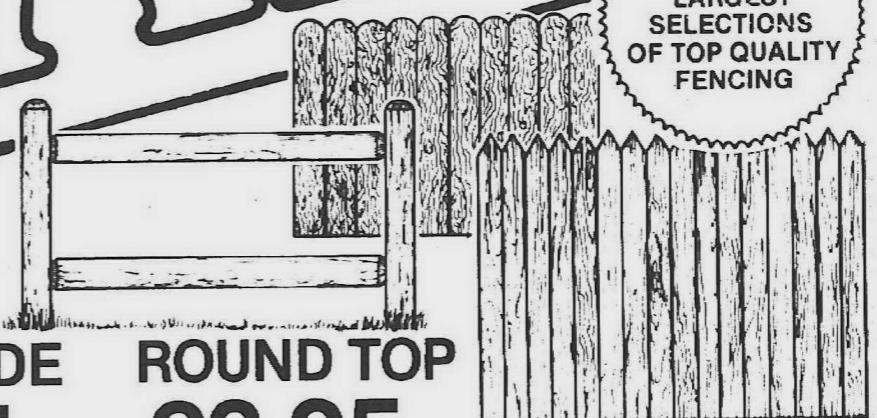


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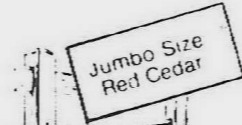

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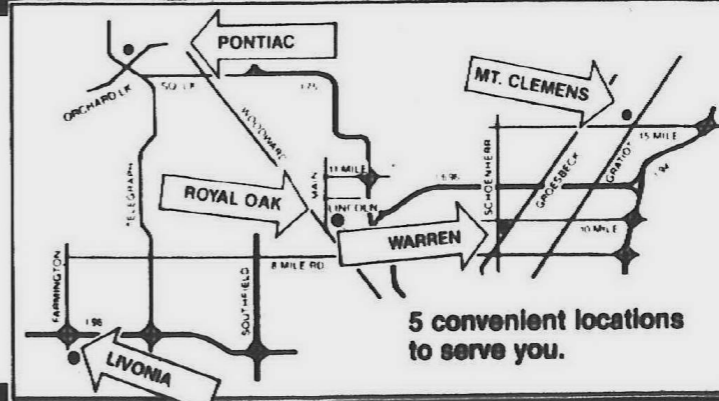
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# Judge OKs class action lawsuit on bad gas

A major hurdle in getting compensation for motorists stuck last year with car repair bills due to bad gas was passed recently in Wayne County Circuit Court.

Judge James A. Hathaway ruled all drivers who bought gas at a Livonia station last year and then paid for intake valve repairs caused by excess gumming could join in a class action suit against the station. To join the suit, motorists had to buy the gas at the Union 76 station at Plymouth and Levan roads.

"We're over a major hurdle," said Paul Hines, Southfield-based attorney representing motorists in the suit. "Now we want to let people know there is a class action suit and that their rights are being protected. It's not going to be 175 lawsuits, but one."

Hines said he has the names of some 40 drivers who had filed claims against the station and is waiting to get another 135 names from the station's insurance company, American States Insurance.

Michael Malloy, Troy-based attorney for the station, said it will be easier to settle the claims now that a class-action suit has been formalized.

Malloy said claims couldn't be settled earlier because they were coming in from motorists who apparently didn't buy gas at the Plymouth-Levan station.

"We can now deal with the right individuals," He said. "It will be simple to resolve now that the insurance company has identified the individuals. This should make it much easier to deal with them."

Hines asks that anyone who bought gas at the Union 76 station from March

4 to 14, 1984, and later paid for engine repairs because of the gas contact him at 355-0300.

THE SUIT charges Thrifty Stations, parent company of the gas station, and Corder Leasing, supplier for the station, with violation of the Consumer Protection Act, negligence and breach of warranty.

"It's crystal clear it's the fault of Thrifty," Hines said. "We can prove gas was stored at the Livonia station for a

long period. Then the owner ordered it pumped out of a holding tank and put in an underground tank for sale. The heavier ingredients had sunk to the bottom."

He said tests showed the gum residue in the gas to be 50-150 percent greater than those permitted by the Environmental Protection Agency. The excess gum, when burned, apparently damaged the car's fuel intake valves, leading to expensive valve jobs on the affected vehicles.

After complaints about the gas began surfacing, station operator Leon Stone called it a "human mistake." He said diesel fuel accidentally had been dropped into a tank.

Michael Maillard of the Wayne County Air Pollution Control unit said tests determined it was not diesel fuel but excess gumming which caused the engine breakdowns.

In the suit, Hines said he was seeking the repayment of both engine repair and car rental bills.

## It's weak but it's law: Wear your seat belt

LET THOSE who ride decide, motorcyclists opposed to wearing helmets tell us. As far as I know, the opposition to Michigan's watered-down seat belt law, which goes into effect July 1, hasn't come up with a slogan that captures their sentiment. But I suspect it would be in the same vein as the bikers'.

Unless you've had a lobotomy in the past year, you're aware of the Big Brother accusations hurled at the Michigan Legislature for passing even its toothless law.

NEXT MONTH, only drivers stopped for a primary traffic offense will be scrutinized for seatbelt usage. In other words, if you're a pretty good driver who doesn't speed, run red lights or ignore traffic signs, you probably don't have to worry about buckling up. Unless you're involved in a collision.

In each of the last few years, the U.S. has averaged about 40,000 traffic deaths. Three times as many die on our highways as are murdered, and car usage continues to climb.

Eighty percent of U.S. travel is logged in cars. It's estimated that 10,000 lives could be saved annually if all drivers were belted.

I know well the feeble arguments against wearing belts — that the government doesn't have the right to tell us what to do, that a seatbelt might trap us, preventing escape from fire or drowning; that seatbelts are uncomfortable; that so-and-so wore a belt and it didn't protect him. I even heard one person say she won't wear a seatbelt because it wrinkles her clothing.

ISN'T IT CURIOUS that these same folks who are so adamant about their "right" not to wear a seatbelt in their cars utter nary a word when they board a plane?

Yet statistics tell us that commercial

air travel is many times safer than that by car. The airlines have a 0.4-per-billion-passenger-mile fatality rate compared to 13.3 for autos. Of all means of passenger traffic, only private and corporate aircraft have a higher fatality rate than do autos.

But there's another side to the seatbelt story that neither statistics nor seatbelt detractors address. And that's the social cost of car accidents that kill or seriously injure.

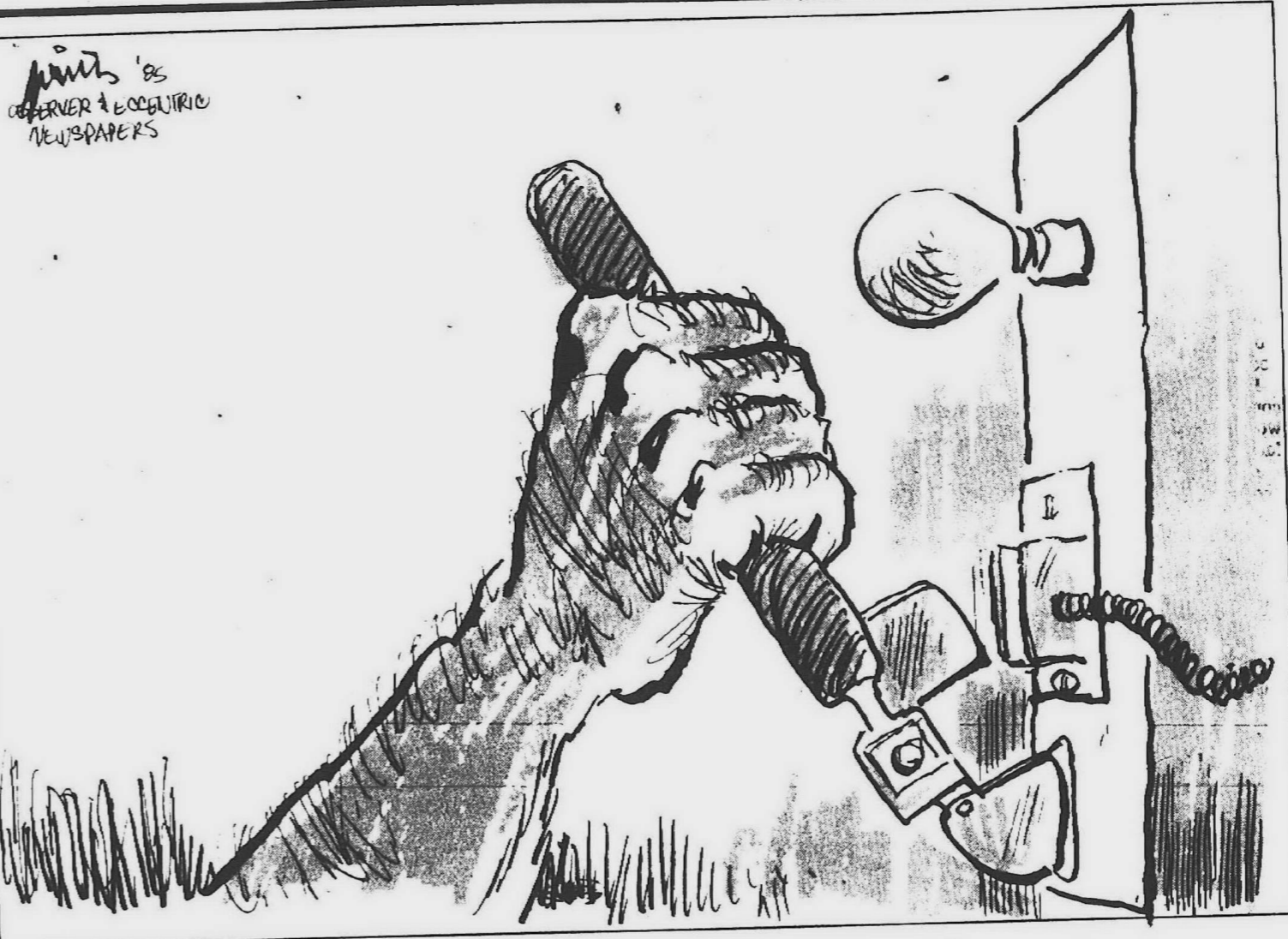
Who pays for the extended hospitalization and rehabilitation of victims? Who pays for the loss of income and support of a family when the family breadwinner dies or is incapacitated?

We all do. We pay with higher medical insurance, and we pay with higher taxes when entitlement programs such as Social Security run dry.

WHAT WE CAN'T measure are the emotional losses chalked up when a loved one is hurt or dies. Or the effect losing a parent has on a child. Or the sense of guilt a surviving driver feels knowing his insistence on buckling up could have saved his passenger from being thrown from the car.

If trumpets herald great news, let's break out the kazoo come July 1. Although the state's lawmakers didn't rise to the occasion and pass a strong seatbelt law, it's a small step forward.

Maybe in a few years the state won't have to mandate our personal safety.



## Down with death penalty

IF STATE Sen. Kirby Holmes, R-Utica, is correct, Michigan voters will have the chance to decide in November 1986 whether they want the state to be in the business of executing people.

Holmes, sponsor of an unsuccessful legislative effort to put the question on the ballot, says he is confident that a petition drive will succeed in putting the question on the '86 ballot.

The petition drive, spearheaded by Oakland County Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson, is aimed at getting the 301,000 signatures necessary to put a constitutional amendment before voters.

With at least a third of the signatures already in, death penalty proponents figure they will reach the requisite figure in time. Two previous drives by Patterson fell short.

MICHIGAN WAS the first jurisdiction in the English-speaking world to prohibit capital punishment more than 100 years ago after an execution which left many convinced that an innocent man had been hanged.

There has been little said, done or proved in the last 100 years that would indicate that capital punishment should be reinstated.

Proponents of capital punishment say it would be used only in cases of first-degree murder. Mostly that would mean homicides where premeditation is in-

involved. It would also mean persons convicted of homicide while committing a felony.

Death penalty advocates suggest that the only ones to suffer under such sentencing would be those who truly deserve to die because of their heinous crimes.

APPARENTLY THIS is a popular belief. Both the advocates and the opponents say public opinion polls show at least 70 percent favor the death penalty.

But those who are asked a simple question about whether they favor capital punishment are seldom given any accompanying information which would show that the death penalty is ineffective as a deterrent to crime.

Most studies show that capital punishment does nothing to deter homicides. Even capital punishment advocates will admit that the death penalty has been of little value in stopping murders or other crimes.

The simple fact is that people who kill rarely reflect on the consequences. And those who do seldom believe they will be caught.

Patterson, in his standard speech for capital punishment, doesn't make great claims for the deterrent value of the death penalty. His chief argument is that it is an "appropriate" penalty for first-degree murder.

TO SHOW THAT life is sacred, the proponents say, we must be able to demand the ultimate sacrifice from those who profane its sanctity.

It is basically an argument for revenge, for getting even, for somehow giving a murder victim's survivors the idea that somehow the scales have been balanced, one life for another.

It gives the people of a state the false notion that something final is being done about a certain kind of crime, that the guilty are being held accountable by having their lives brought to an end in some unequivocal and awesome sense of justice. For there will be new crimes and new outrages despite the death penalty. In the process, the state and its people become a perceptible amount less humane.

Retribution is a business that should be reserved for a higher power than state government. It is a business the state would do well to stay out of. The recent decision of the state Senate to turn down a proposal to put the death penalty on the ballot should be admired.

## How about Central as gambling casino?

(The following guest column was written by Clark Chapin, a longtime Plymouth resident who is a product of Plymouth-Canton Community Schools and a 1967 graduate of Plymouth High School (now Central Middle School).)

LAST WEDNESDAY a real estate developer named Patrick Mehan came to Plymouth to speak at the Kiwanis luncheon meeting on his current project, a proposal to establish casino gambling on Detroit's Belle Isle.

According to televised reports, Mehan believes that the tourist trade generated by the casino will benefit the outlying communities in the southeastern Michigan area as well as the City of Detroit itself.

The president of the Kiwanis club was quoted as saying that Plymouth has a lot to offer tourists who might be visiting the area and would make an interesting side trip.

I think that we may have an excellent idea here, but that Mehan should consider reversing his planned arrangement: Why not casino gambling in Plymouth with Belle Isle as the side attraction for the visiting tourists?

Despite denials by School Supt. John M. Hoben, recent rumors continue to persist that Central Middle School is about to be sold to real estate developers (like Mehan).

The time may be ripe to sell off the old school while guaranteeing a future source of income to Plymouth-Canton Community Schools. For the consideration of the residents of Plymouth, I offer the following proposal:

**CENTRAL CASINO:** Renovate Central Middle School as a gambling casino with a giant lighted marquee overlooking Main Street and City Hall. The gymnasium alone could contain more than 600 slot machines by my estimation, particularly with the removal of the bleachers.

By setting up two or three blackjack games in each of the former classrooms, a more relaxed, "down home" atmosphere could be provided for the visiting gamblers than the jammed "production line" operations seen in Las Vegas and Atlantic City.

This proposal will bring thousands of jobs in the rapidly expanding service industries to the Plymouth-Canton region. The Central Casino will provide income for our schools for years to come while making use of an antiquated landmark.

The people mover and entertainment

The present cafeteria facilities could be upgraded to establish a world class restaurant at the same site.

**PEOPLE MOVER:** The Central Casino would be merely the centerpiece of a development which would encompass the entire downtown area. The second mainstay of the project would be a people-mover elevated monorail that would transport guests from the Mayflower Hotel past Kellogg Park, down Main Street to the Casino, and continue on to the train station in Old Village.

Of course, Amtrak passenger rail service would be expanded. Displacement of local businesses and dwellings would be limited to about 50-60 homes and shops.

**ENTERTAINMENT COMPLEX:** The space currently wasted by the tennis courts, baseball fields, track, and football fields at Central would be completely revitalized as an entertainment and recreation complex featuring a concert auditorium complete with a rooftop heliport so that visiting stars such as Kenny Rogers, Liberace, and "Wierd Al" Yankovic can be flown directly to the concert site from the renovated and expanded Mettetal International Airport.

**BELLE ISLE:** Instituting casino gambling in Plymouth will free the Belle Isle site for development as a park and family recreation area which could be utilized by the entire tri-county population.

Facilities could include a large picnic area covering the entire southern third of the island, a large decorative fountain, a marine museum highlighting the history of the Great Lakes and a children's playground.

Other projects such as a zoo, canoe livery, aquarium, and botanical conservatory may be possible (barring further budget cutbacks by the Reagan administration). Additional funding may be raised by leasing of parcels of land to one or two yacht clubs or marinas on the island.

The U.S. Coast Guard could use space on the island for a station to assist boaters on Lake St. Clair and the Detroit River. Transportation to and from the mainland could be provided by a toll-free bridge for pedestrians, bicycles, and automobiles. complex will make Plymouth the envy of the nearby communities. I urge residents of Plymouth and Canton to write Mehan today voicing their support for this proposal.

## Does anyone want a prison?

SOMEWHERE IN a Michigan history book, I read a story about the early politics of statehood. The major institutions were to be divided among the major towns.

Kalamazoo drew the insane asylum, as it was then called. Marshall was to be state capital. Jackson and Ann Arbor were to choose between the prison and the university.

Jackson won and elected the prison, figuring it would provide more jobs than a university.

LAST WEEK the folks around Jackson were raising Cain with their state officials because 52 of the 800 or so inmates in minimum security have escaped this year, but only 16 have been caught. A suburban husband and wife were stabbed to death in their homes, and an escapee is suspected.

Last week, Gov. James J. Blanchard signed a bill authorizing a state prison in the former Detroit House of Correction, actually located in Plymouth Township. Plymouth and Northville townships have about three prison sites, a mental hospital and other institutions.

So terribly unhappy are the local politicians that they openly mutter about running someone against Sen. Bob Geake, R-Northville, in the next GOP primary on the theory they need more political muscle to stop being used as a "dumping ground."

Also last week, the Oakland County Board of Commissioners flexed its political savvy and refused to take a stand on where a state prison should be built.

The Pontiac folks and the mental health constituency would be sore if they opted for the Clinton Valley Center site.

The economic developers would be sore if they opted for Auburn Hills near the high-tech park. So the commissioners voted 18-9 to dump the decision back in the laps of Blanchard and the state Corrections Department.

WHAT HAPPENED in the last 149 years to make prisons so unpopular?

Michigan's official policy has changed. Once prisons were viewed as a place for punishment.

Today, as the title implies, the Corrections Department's official policy is one of rehabilitating those who have committed felonies. Except for the fencing, a new "prototype" prison in Muskegon County is more like a college dormitory than a place of punishment.

The policy of rehabilitation is out of

tune with public sentiment. The public wants criminals locked up good and tight.

Indeed, much of the sentiment for the death penalty is probably due to the fact that so many prisoners escape, are released too early or receive too short sentences.

WHAT, SHORT of cutting off the hands of burglars and mutilating rapists, will actually make convicts safe to return to society?

Jesse Pitts, Oakland University sociologist and criminal justice professor, put it rather succinctly in a series he wrote for us several years ago. In a nutshell, he thought all the theories were poppycock and that only two things would straighten out a convict:

● Age. Young men have a certain amount of chemical hell in their systems. As times passes, all but the worst grow out of it.

● The love of a woman. A parolee who fears losing his woman if he's sent back to prison has a powerful motivation to follow the straight road.

My own thought is that prisons should be on islands in the Great Lakes, and that ice-breaking ships should keep the water open in winter.

Trouble is, rich folks — and even the governor — have palatial homes on those islands, so developers would fight my plan.



# Tax plan has long-term benefits, economists say

Michigan would be both a big winner and a big loser under President Reagan's tax-reform proposal, according to a study by Manufacturers Bank economists David L. Littman and Patrick L. Anderson.

They said Reagan's tax-reform proposal would lower marginal tax rates and eliminate what they call "tax preferences."

"In the long run, the benefits of consumers' increased after-tax income and faster economic growth will more than outweigh short-term costs, making Michigan eventually one of the major winners under the plan," the bank economists said.

It would also result in increased incentives (more after-tax income for each dollar earned), they said, and improved neutrality (fewer tax-code distortions) would stimulate economic growth.

**BECAUSE MICHIGAN'S** economy is "pro-cyclical" — that is, it expands and contracts faster than the national economy — faster economic growth would normally give an extra boost to Michigan, according to Littman and Anderson.

However, the manufacturing industries that account for a large share of the Michigan economy would lose important investment incentives and face "windfall" taxes for the next few years.

As a result, Michigan would face both large gains and large losses in the first two years or so. After that, the faster growth would outweigh the short-term losses, significantly benefiting Michigan.

But the economists said the tax-reform plan fails to address growing federal spending, would not eliminate the deficit, could not prevent inflation or preclude later tax increases.

**KEY TAX** changes for Michigan under the Regan proposal would be:

- Lowering personal tax rates would result in increased after-tax income for consumers. That

would be good news for Michigan's retailers and durable-goods manufacturers, particularly auto makers, who would enjoy increased sales.

- State and local taxes could no longer be deducted from federal taxable income. This would hurt Michigan more than most states because Michigan residents pay high income, property and sales taxes.

However, the 60 percent of Michigan taxpayers who do not itemize would not be directly affected, and most of the remaining 40 percent would still pay reduced taxes because of lower rates.

- Unemployment compensation would be taxed. Because Michigan has a high unemployment rate and pays high unemployment benefits, it would be affected more than most states.

However, other features virtually would eliminate federal taxation of families below the poverty line and sharply reduce tax burdens for almost all low-income families.

- Corporate tax rates would be reduced to a top 33 percent and the capital gains tax rate would be cut to a top 17.5 percent. These changes would encourage business formation.

- The investment tax credit would be repealed and the current accelerated cost recovery system for depreciation of investments would be replaced. This would hurt many manufacturers, particularly auto companies and their suppliers.

"**TAXFLATION**" would be prevented by the new depreciation schedule and an available inventory valuation system which would be indexed to inflation. Michigan manufacturers were ravaged in the 1970s by having to pay taxes on fictitious, inflation-created profits.

The biggest losses to Michigan would be the repeal of the ITC and the imposition of "windfall" taxes on old investments. These two changes will sharply affect many manufacturers in the short run.

## Grant aids zoo in putting up exhibit signs

A \$50,000 Skillman Foundation grant to the Detroit Zoological Society will help the two Detroit zoos in putting new signs in front of animal exhibits.

Lawrence D. Buhl Jr., president of the Detroit Zoological Society, said the writing on present signs is "rather dull, with gray line drawings, making it especially difficult to identify animals in multiple-species exhibits like our birdhouse."

Steve Graham, director of the two zoos — in Royal Oak and on Belle Isle — said

the graphics will explain animal behaviors and relationships. "Combined with seeing the actual animal, it is one of the best ways of teaching all children to enjoy and respect the creatures who share this world," he said.

The grant, plus money from the Zoological Society's Education Fund, will help identify animals in the Royal Oak Birdhouse and Barnyard and the entire Belle Isle Zoo.

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## State Youth Corps seeks 15,000 for job

Young adults living in Wayne County outside of Detroit may apply for work this summer through the 1985 Michigan Youth Corps.

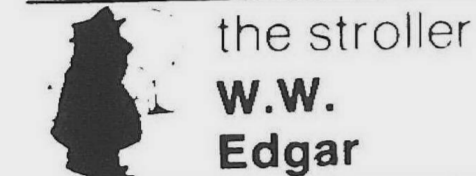
"The crowd went wild during the finale," Gillig said of Stonestreet's act.

## Summer school with coaches

ALL across the country these warm afternoons, there is some interesting planning going on in the quiet of college campuses.

It is the coming of the football season, and there are all sorts of methods being taught — not only how to win the big games, but to keep from losing them.

It would be most interesting to listen in on some of these plans because the legendary coaches had unusual lessons for their athletes.

FOR INSTANCE, at the University of Michigan, Fielding H. ("Hurry Up") Yost taught one of the most fascinating.

He taught his players never to keep the ball in their own territory. He told them it would be easier if they kicked the ball back deep and let the opponents make mistakes in their own territory.

One afternoon The Stroller had the chance to visit "Hurry Up" in his library, and he asked the coach the reason for his unusual plan.

Twisting the ever-present cigar in his mouth, Yost leaned forward very seriously and answered, "Isn't it rather silly to try to buck the ball over from Ypsilanti when the goal posts are in Ann Arbor?"

That was simple enough, and that plan carried Yost to the heights of his profession.

**KNUTE ROCKNE** at Notre Dame was another favorite. He taught his players a very simple lesson, but one most difficult to perform.

"If every man does his job," he

advised the players, "we can score on every play."

Rockne made this remark one afternoon in Yankee Stadium in New York. Playing against the Army in one of the big games, the Irish were trailing at halftime. As he talked to the players during intermission, Rockne repeated very seriously, "When you go out there and every man does his job, we can win the game."

And that is exactly what happened. His plan brought results.

**GUS DORAIS**, at the University of Detroit, was the man generally credited with putting the forward pass in football and made good use of the air battles. His U-D team won 22 games in a row in 1927-8 and was given some consideration for the Rose Bowl.

Gus had been told at Minnesota, where he attempted to enroll, that he was too small for college football. That irked him, and he left to enroll at Notre Dame.

There he met Rockne, and each summer they vacationed together — with a football. They worked hours each day and later became the best passing combination in football.

It was their belief that it was better to throw the ball over the line than to try to push their way through the line. It worked.

The forward pass is one of the key plays at U-M. You can always bet that Bo Schembechler will have a passer on his battle front.

If the fans could listen to some of these lessons, the games in the stadiums on autumn Saturdays could be much more interesting.



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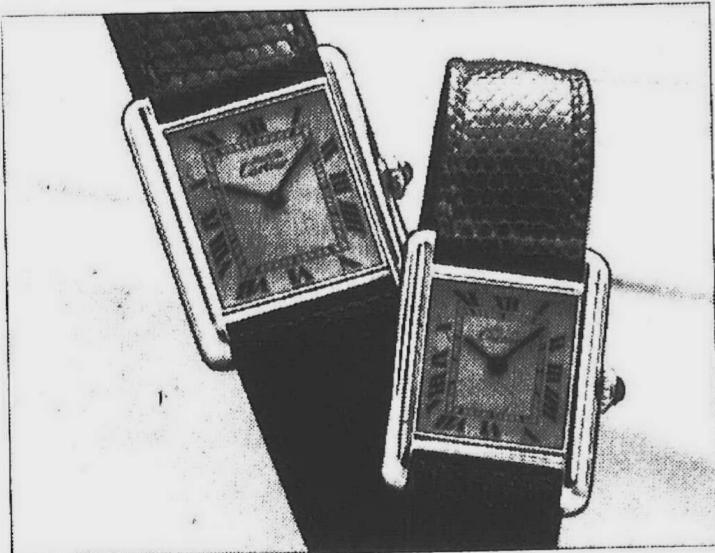
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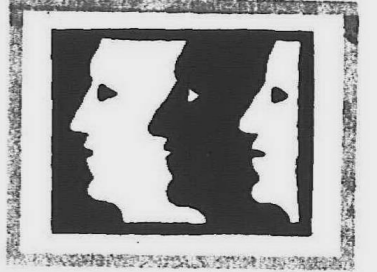


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## They're raiders of the lost time capsule

Somewhere, on the front lawn of Farrand Elementary School, there is a time capsule buried.

But to the 13 high school seniors who tried to find the capsule Tuesday, the only question is where.

The group was a part of a former Farrand fifth grade class of Ron Beier, which decided to bury a time capsule back in 1978.

The class made a vow that seven years later, in 1985, it would dig up the capsule and, after looking over the original contents, would add some 1985 memorabilia.

But as the saying goes, the best-laid plans of mice and men often go astray, especially when the plans call for the laying of a time capsule.

The students and Beier did a great job of burying the capsule.

"We were concerned that somebody was going to come by and dig it up after we buried it," said Beier. "We even considered surrounding it with concrete."

But not to worry, Mr. Beier. Not only did nobody come around to dig up the capsule, but the people who buried it in the first place couldn't even find it.

"We should have made a map," said Beier Tuesday during the "dig."

Beier and six girls and seven boys from the original fifth grade class arrived at Farrand at 11 a.m.

BEIER AND six girls and seven boys from the original fifth grade class were still digging at 2 p.m.

They came bearing pickaxes, shovels, rakes, hoes.

They left bearing pickaxes, shovels, rakes, hoes — but no time capsule.

Farrand custodial and office personnel watched from the office windows as the group began its attempt to unearth the capsule.

Although the group had no map, it was fairly certain where the capsule had been buried: about 10 or 12 feet in front of the building and near the center of the office, which faced the burial plot. Or so it was thought.

Instead of relying on chance, the group enlisted the aid of Joe Bida, the school's custodian, who fashioned a divining rod that was supposed to locate metal. The rod was similar to the forked wood divining rods used to find the presence of underground water. Apparently, a metal rod will find metal.

Bida's divining (or "dousing rod," as he called it) pulled downward as he walked in the area where the students thought they had buried the capsule.

This must be the place, was the consensus opinion, and they began to dig.

Five holes later, they were still digging.

Everything was tried — an electronic metal detector, poking the ground with narrow metal probes — but the capsule was nowhere to be found.

ONE FEMALE office employee yelled in horror as the students came perilously close to an evergreen.

"You'll disturb the roots," she complained.

"Haven't you heard that it was good for the tree to aerate the roots," yelled back Bida.

That being the case, the front lawn soil at Farrand Elementary School is now the best aerated soil in the neighborhood.

The lawn was beginning to look like Normandy Beach on D-Day.

Eventually, Ken Vogras, Plymouth director of public works, was contacted by Bida. Vogras brought a more powerful metal detector used by the city to locate water pipes.

The students, who by this time had returned with more shovels, dug about three feet down, when Beier hit something with one of the metal probes he was poking into the ground.

Ominously, the electronic metal detector indicated there was no metal there.

It turned out to be correct. The buried object that sounded like it might be the capsule was only a ceramic pipe.

"At 11:30, it was all enthusiasm. At 12:30, it was all frustration," said Beier. "I only budgeted about 10 minutes for this project."

Time, which the group had hoped to preserve in a round container three feet in diameter, proved to be its undoing.

Not only had most of the students and their teacher forgotten exactly where the capsule was buried, but time had also changed the landscape. Time had changed perception.

"I thought it was under the (building) overhang and even with that pipe," said Beier. "Was that shrub there?"

THE GROUP was sure of one thing. It knew the capsule was three feet under the ground because, when it was originally buried, one of the students had stood in the hole, which came to his shoulders.

The buried time capsule contained a 1978 Plymouth Observer newspaper, a class picture, a tape recording that included the voices of every student, a University of Michigan program and some coins.

It was sealed in plastic or, as one student put it, "wrapped in trash bags."

When — or if — the archeologists discover their lost time capsule, they plan to place such 1985 mementos as their senior pictures, commencement programs and a tape recording.

The recording will include statements from each of the seniors, projecting what they want to do and where they want to be in five years, when the group will once again try to unearth the elusive time capsule.

Again, if the students are lucky enough to find the capsule, Beier said there definitely would be a map this time, showing its location.

Plymouth-Canton Community School District seniors who took part in the dig included Amy Roman, Mary Saunders, Pat Phillips, Kim Rivard, Sue Ball, Margaret Gilligan, Steve Fedlow, Ken Freeman, Greg Wochuck, Bill Morley, Ernie Lefebvre, John Geddes and Tim Nichols.

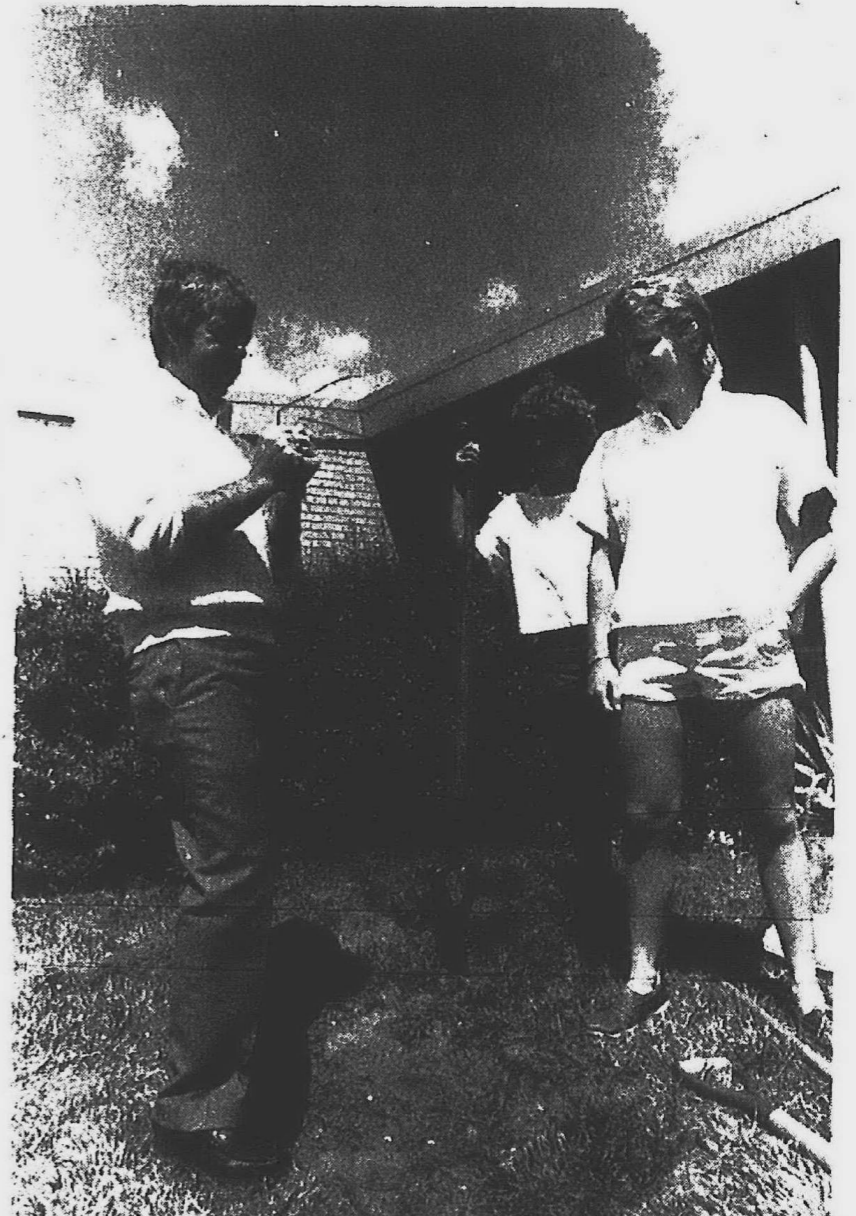
The group dispersed at 2 p.m. Tuesday for lunch and to decide whether to try again.

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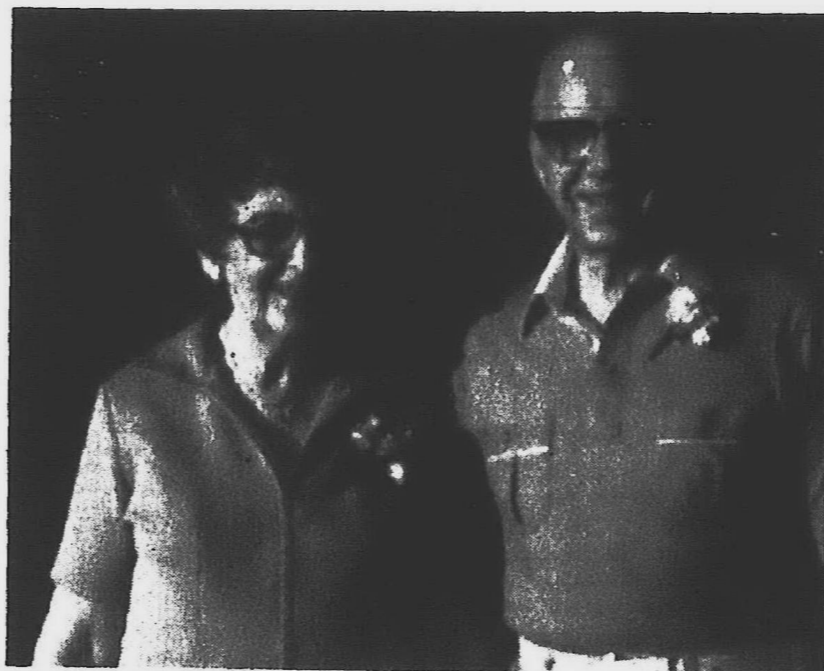

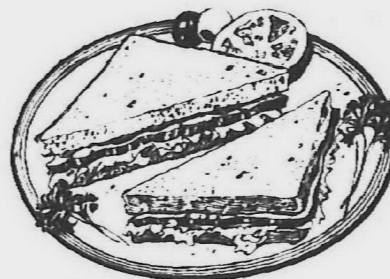

## Osteoporosis cause found

Nearly 20 million persons in the United States have osteoporosis or brittle bones, according to the National Institutes of Health panel on osteoporosis held last year.  
The condition is responsible for about 1.3 million fractures a year, especially of the spine, wrist and hip.

However, most Americans consume only about 450-550 milligrams daily. The current recommended daily allowance is 800 milligrams.  
A single eight-ounce serving of milk contains about 300 milligrams of calcium. An ounce and a half of cheese or cup and a half of ice cream provide the same amount.  
Vitamin D helps the body absorb Vitamin D from the intestine. Eggs, liver and milk contain large amounts of the vitamin.

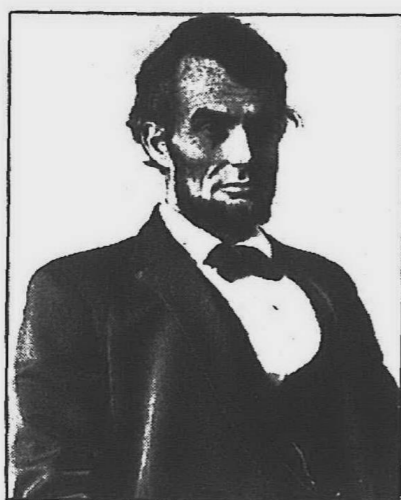

# Healthy conflict

## Verbal scrapping helps keep marriage vital

People marry for many reasons . . . for security, for a sense of identity, to love and be loved.

Very few people marry because they love a good fight.

Yet conflict is not only inevitable in an intimate relationship, it is essential to personal growth and development, argues Helen Weingarten, University of Michigan assistant professor of social work.

"There's truth in the statement that opposites attract. But the same differences that interest two people in each other in the first place often become the forces that drive them apart. Learning to live, and love, with difference on a day-to-day basis is a fundamental challenge for every couple," she observes.

"CONFLICT IS not a sign that a marriage is in trouble. It means that it is alive. It's the way you choose to handle the inescapable conflicts that signals whether the relationship will be hurt or strengthened as a result."

Differences that are left unresolved fester, Weingarten says; it is far healthier to confront them. If a marriage is to

remain vital, the partners must not only be trusted allies but worthy opponents.

As a teacher, researcher and therapist in private practice, Weingarten has observed the phases through which a simple disagreement, unresolved, can escalate to full scale war:

One: You have a real difference of opinion, goals or needs. This phase is not unusual or ominous. Conflict is viewed as a problem to be solved, a settlement can usually be reached.

Two: You are no longer willing to compromise. The issue becomes less important than maintaining self-esteem or winning the argument.

Three: You want to hurt your opponent. Winning matters less than seeing your partner suffer.

Four: Hurting is no longer sufficient. You want to destroy the other person.

PHASE FOUR often takes the form of a messy divorce hearing, with each partner out to "take the other for everything he (or she) has got." Communicating only through their lawyers, spouses may seek to destroy each other financially, demanding big property

settlements, or emotionally, through custody battles involving children.

"Passing into each successive phase signifies a lessening of hope," Weingarten says. A marriage counselor or some other neutral third party can help keep the lines of communication open and stop the relationship from heading downhill.

The first step in effective negotiation is establishing a balance of power. The best marriages, like the best tennis games, are between evenly matched players, Weingarten states. This doesn't mean each partner has the same skills and resources, but rather an equal number of necessary ones.

THE SECOND RULE is fight fair. This means not forcing your will arbitrarily and not harboring resentment if you're the one who gives in. If you can't convince the other person that your point of view is correct, aim for a new solution that takes the needs of both partners into account.

"Sometimes an appeal can be made on the basis of the relationship," Weingarten adds. "You can say to your spouse, 'I know you don't want to visit

my relatives, but it is very important to me. If you'll do it to please me, I will do you a favor in return. And then follow through, of course."

Fighting fair means sticking to the subject of the argument and not dredging up old failures and disappointments. Spouses know one another's weaknesses. Bringing up sensitive subjects like a person's job rejection or weight problem, for example, is "hitting below the belt." It is more likely to deepen the wounds and scar the relationship, she points out.

"You can never take back cruel things said in the heat of emotion. Often it's better to call time out and talk again after a cooling off period. Don't hesitate to make the first move."

AVOIDING THE conflict is usually the least desirable tactic, she adds. Consciously or unconsciously, many couples choose to deny aspects of themselves to each other that were not part of the original lover's compact. To assure stability, they sacrifice honesty, Weingarten says.

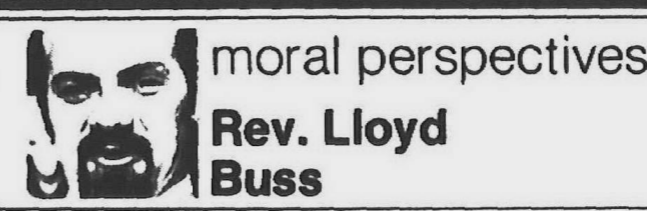

# We need to say what we mean

**NO PARKING!** Violators will be towed to Folly Road. "Help Fight Child Abuse!" "Don't Drink and Drive!" Three signs in a metropolitan area. What are we trying to say?

I like the one about towing violators to Folly Road. I assume that it meant cars parked in that restricted area would be towed to Folly Road, but then again, perhaps not. There are times where foolishness and stupidity are so obvious that drastic measures have to be taken.

I am concerned about the sign that asks the public to help fight child abuse. I am not opposed to all the efforts being made to intervene against all uses of violence in the rearing of children, but surely there is a better way to say what we have in mind. It won't be easy. Almost every word that I think of as a possible replacement for

"fight" is just as aggressive and violent.

I object to the slogan "Don't drink and drive" because it has been targeted to the high school student. To say that a high school student should not "drink and drive" suggests that drinking is unacceptable only when driving. We don't mean that, but that's what it says. Even the parade of public figures repeating the slogan on the air and in print cannot change its basic message

And it ought to be precise enough for student councils and student groups like SADD so that the potential abuses of alcoholic beverages can be carefully detailed.

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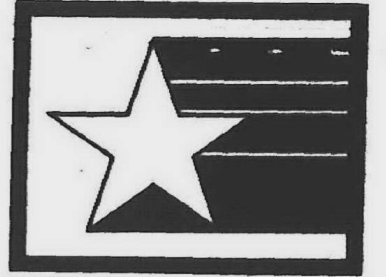

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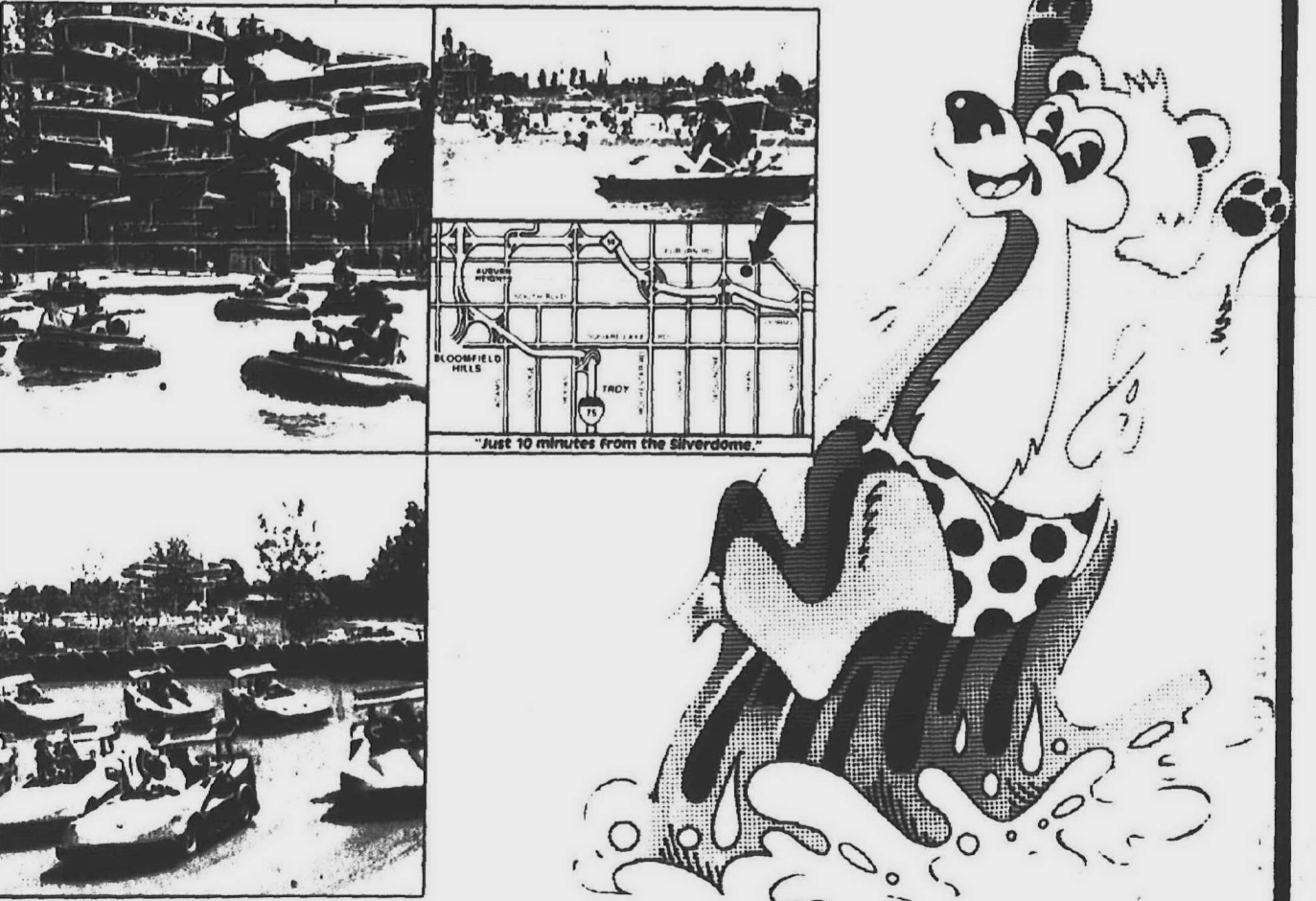
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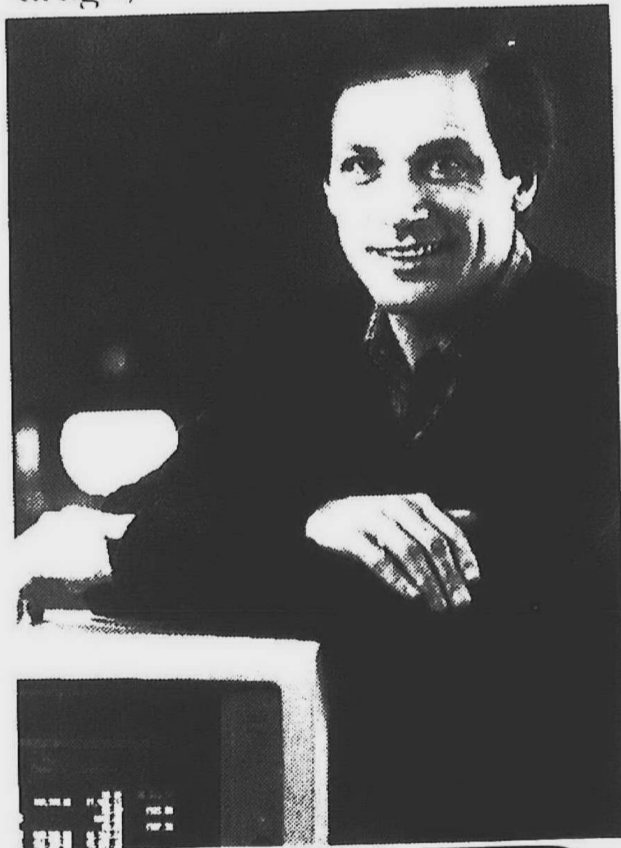

## Stars deserve spot in limelight

**T**HE EXPERIMENT enters its third year tomorrow evening. Tomorrow is the date for the high school girls all-star soccer classic. This is the third annual game sponsored by the Observer & Eccentric newspapers, featuring the best girls soccer players from the Eccentric coverage area against the best from Observerland.

It's truly quality competition because the O&E coverage area includes the best high school girls soccer talent in the state. Five of the six Class A state finalists over the past three years have come from the O&E area.

I think these athletes deserve the recognition such a contest provides. Not everyone shares that thought, however. There are those who firmly believe that all-star contests only benefit the promoters while exploiting the athletes.

**THE FATE** of high school all-star contests could be decided in the next few months. A committee has been designated to examine the issue. Its findings will weigh heavily on the future of such games because this committee has been appointed by the Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA).

"We do not approve or disapprove of all-star competition when school is out."

That's the official opinion of the MHSAA, as related by assistant director Lonnie Lowry. That doesn't mean members of the MHSAA don't have opinions regarding all-star games.

Vern Norris, the MHSAA's executive director, sees little benefit from such contests for prep athletes. Yet he is willing to go with the flow. If most schools belonging to the MHSAA backed a plan for all-star games, Norris would follow prevailing opinion.

**THAT'S WHERE** the danger lies — in prevailing opinion. Sure, the committee could uncover an outcry of support for all-star competition. But its investigation could just as easily reveal feelings slanted in the opposite direction, toward banning all such games for high school students.

First, it's necessary to understand just what the current MHSAA regulations are governing all-star games. They are really very simple:

- All high school coaches, athletic directors, teachers and officials are not allowed to associate in any manner with high school all-star games in football, basketball and ice hockey.

- All high school underclassmen cannot participate in high school all-star games in football, basketball or ice hockey during or after the school year.

- Any high school senior who participates in a football, basketball or ice hockey all-star game after that sport's prep season has concluded but before graduation will be ineligible to compete in any other interscholastic sports.

- A high school athlete who violates the above regulations faces a maximum penalty of one year's suspension from all interscholastic sports.

Those penalties may seem harsh, but the MHSAA has its reasons. "I hate to use Magic Johnson as an example, but he comes immediately to mind," said Lowry. "After his senior season in high school, he could have been gone all spring traveling from one all-star game to another and never completed his classes."

"It's difficult as a high school youngster when someone comes along and says, 'How would you like an all-expenses paid trip to California?'"

**THE REASON** football, basketball and ice hockey are strictly governed is that, according to Lowry, they "generate enough revenue to attract promoters." There are all-star games in these sports, but the participants have already graduated.

Limiting the ban on all-star games to the more "popular" sports has helped the O&E in its production of the girls soccer classic, even if it is a bit of a slap. But it seems more could be done.

In speaking with the Observer soccer stars, the consensus strongly favored the game's survival. Rivalries are budding between the two areas, and the girls felt the previous two games had been fun but intense.

As a witness to the first two games, I can testify that neither was boring. Play was spirited, and the athletic abilities on display were worth the price of admission (which the O&E takes no profit from).

**THE O&E** has discussed expanding its all-star sponsorship. Several sports have been mentioned, but the current MHSAA restrictions are far too limiting. Sponsoring an event that's played during the fall or winter after school is out for the summer is silly.

It seems a better method to bar the exploitation of high school athletes can be formulated. Limit the number of appearances an athlete can make in an all-star game; carefully scrutinize all-star promoters; restrict the number of all-star contests in each sport.

A combination — or all — of those suggestions could remedy the problem. Certainly it's better than making a football or female basketball player wait seven or eight months before competing in an event that's meant to praise their athletic talents.

## Observerland stikers gun for 3rd O&E crown

The Observerland soccer team is on a roll, and it would like to keep things that way Friday when it takes its 2-0 All-Star game record into Friday's clash with the Eccentric stars 6:30 p.m. Friday at Troy Athens High School.

In addition to its previous wins from the first two Observer & Eccentric All-Star Soccer Classic games, Observer representative Livonia Stevenson defeated the Eccentric's Troy Athens in this year's Class A state championship game.

Observer won the first meeting, 7-1, and the second, 5-2.

If history repeats, Norene Divens' Observer team will make it three straight, but Athens coach Tim Storch, who will direct the Eccentric team along with Troy's Mike Ruddy, hopes for a different outcome.

"I think from an experience factor, they have the advantage," said Storch, who will coach the Eccentric team for the first time. "They have players on their team that have won the last two all-star games, plus they have some players who were on a state championship team, so they are experienced in big games. We're a younger team."

"WE'VE BEEN working a lot using the width of the field," Storch added. "That could play an important role. We play on a wider field (65 yards). They've never seen one wider than 55-60. I'm hoping the added width will work in our favor."

When you examine the two teams, you find two of the state's soccer powerhouse communities are involved — Livonia from Wayne County and Troy from Oakland County. Both areas breed success, and both

have different styles of play, although the coaches may see things from a different perspective.

"The big difference is that Oakland County teams play more physically and aggressive than we do here," Divens said. "I know Tim Storch is probably saying, 'Oh my, how can she say that?' but it's true. Our kids won't back down. They won't be intimidated."

"We can play physically — and we do — but we do it to protect ourselves. We don't initiate it."

Storch's response wasn't "How can she say that?" He simply disagreed.

"Every time we've seen those three Livonia teams — Stevenson, Churchill and Bentley — against each other, Mike and I have felt they play a rough, physical game," Storch said. "I hope it doesn't become that way because they are bigger and stronger than we are. We have a small, finesse team, and I'd like to see a finesse game because it would be advantageous to us."

**DIVENS, WHOSE** teams at Stevenson run a four-forward attack, plans to use that offense in the All-Star game.

## It's a labor of love for Prix volunteers

Redford's Hugh Laird does it as a labor of love.

The chief starter at the Detroit Grand Prix, Laird donates his time and his money as one of the many volunteers throughout the area who work the Formula I race.

Laird, in his fourth year as chief starter, works the tower at the start-finish line for the Detroit race. Laird, who can be identified by the hounds-tooth jacket he wears, uses three different colored flags during the course of the race — green, red and checkered. As many as nine flags are used throughout the course.

"I'm in the tower assisting the Grand Prix official who actually starts the race," Laird explained. "But once the race starts, I take over."

"I'm the guy that you see in the upper right-hand box of your television set waving the checkered flag."

Laird, who has obtained his FISA Super License as a Formula I North American Grand Prix official, says things have run smoothly in Detroit.

"We really started our preparations for this race back in September of 1984," he said. "Each year we write a critique of our own area, and we've made only a few minor changes."

"LAST YEAR, for example, we moved the starting box back five feet. But things have been good since the first race in my specialty."

Laird, a principal at Bulman Elementary School in Redford Union, said he has travelled the midwest since 1973 working races for the Sports Car Club of America (SCCA), of which he is a member.

"I pay my own hotel bills and pay for my own meals when I work a race," he said. "I don't get a penny, but I really enjoy it."

Several other SCCA volunteers from the Observer and Eccentric coverage area have important tasks to perform during this weekend's event.

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# McIntyre lands Stevenson post

Livonia Stevenson's boys basketball program will have a different look. It was announced Tuesday that Franklin's Jim McIntyre is the school's new coach, replacing George Van Wagoner, who retired at the end of last season as one of the state's winningest coaches with a career record of 494-207.

"Mac's credentials are flawless and you'll see an exciting brand of basketball," said Stevenson athletic director Roger Frayer. "We feel he's the best choice right now for the job."

"We interviewed three solid candidates who are proven coaches and motivators. We're pleased to get somebody with as much experience as Jim to follow a legend like George Van Wagoner."

Frayer was part of a five-person search committee along with Stevenson principal Dale Collier, his two as-

sistants, Mary Breen and J. Stephen Smith, and Van Wagoner.

Also interviewed Monday were long-time Stevenson JV coach Jim George and former Bentley coach Jim Komula.

McINTYRE SPENT the past eight seasons as Franklin's varsity coach. His best season came in 1981-82 when Franklin won the Northwest Suburban League crown and posted a 16-5 record.

A fiery coach, McIntyre's Franklin teams used the fast-break and full-court pressing defenses almost exclusively during his reign.

McIntyre's son, John, is also well known throughout the area. He was a consensus all-state guard at Redford Catholic Central and will attend the University of Detroit this fall.

"I sure hope to meet the new challenges at Stevenson," said McIntyre. "George had good success there, and I

hope it continues."

With the closing this week of Bentley High School, teachers and administrators in the Livonia school district waited until last week to find out new building assignments.

McINTYRE, a health and physical education teacher, was bumped from Franklin's staff to Stevenson.

"I'm getting a full-time teaching position at Stevenson and that gave me an opportunity to apply," he said. "Everything kind of fell into place and knowing Dale (Collar was principal at Franklin) didn't hurt."

"But coaching is more than being there on Tuesday and Friday nights. Being in the building where you coach has a lot of benefits."

McIntyre, however, regrets leaving Franklin.

"I had some good years at Franklin and I had some good kids," McIntyre said. "We weren't always big, but we scrapped."

"And George Lovich was a super AD (athletic director) and I had all the support I needed. There were a lot of friends, and it's a good faculty, and I'll miss that."

"But this gave me an opportunity to stay in coaching and I hope to stay for years and build a program."

McINTYRE ADMITS there may be a period of adjustment for him and the players.

"George (Van Wagoner) is a different personality than me," McIntyre said. "My intensity level is different. But the thing George and I have in common is that we have the best interests in the kids."

The hiring of McIntyre by Stevenson means that Franklin is searching for a new coach.

With many summer basketball programs beginning Monday, Lovich will be pressed for time to find a new successor to McIntyre.

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# Smash hits

## Observer area yields record talent pool

**W**ITH A four-goal explosion in the first half of its state championship match against Troy Athens June 1, the Livonia Stevenson girls soccer team lifted a heavy, ugly monkey off its back. In fact, the Spartans' 5-2 state championship victory cleared a dark cloud from overtop the school's entire athletic program.

Stevenson athletic teams have reached the state finals more often than any other team in Observerland the past three years. But, the end results were too often frustrating.

Last year, a No. 1-ranked Spartan girls soccer team was upset in the state championship by Northville. The past two seasons, the No. 1-ranked Stevenson boys soccer team lost in the finals to Troy Athens. The Spartan volleyball team lost in the state finals in 1984 and in the state semifinals this past year.

But, with one powerful showing, all the negatives are forgotten. What will long be remembered is the string of powerful teams Norene Divens has put together at Stevenson (and that's not to suggest the string has ended). In the last three years the Spartans have won two state titles and have amassed a 53-5-3 record.

Four players off this year's 19-0-1 team were named first team all-state. Four made first-team all-conference in the Western Lakes — recognized as the toughest soccer conference in the state. Three more Spartans were named to the all-Lakes Division team.

And, fittingly, five of the 12 players selected to the Observerland All-Area first team come from Stevenson.

Here is the 1985 All-Area Soccer Team.

### FIRST TEAM

**Jennifer Huegli, forward, Livonia Churchill:** A first-team all-stater, Huegli scored 20 goals and added 10 assists. The junior has scored 53 goals in her career at Churchill. She also played some in goal for the Chargers this season. Area coaches fear her strong and accurate left foot.

**Dena Head, forward, Plymouth Salem:** It is rare that a freshman comes along with enough talent to turn a team into an immediate title contender — this is one of those rare freshmen. Lightning fast and strong, Head scored 24 goals this season — breaking Salem's single-season scoring mark of 23 set by Shelley Staszal. She possesses a punishing shot which she can deliver off both feet.

**Leasa Klux, forward, Livonia Stevenson:** Every team needs a clutch performer to be successful. Here is Stevenson's. She led the team with 17 goals and 10 assists, but more importantly, six of her goals were game-winners. She scored both

goals in Stevenson's narrow 2-1 win over Northville in the regional finals. She has scored 49 goals and added 18 assists in three seasons at Stevenson.

**Amy Weber, forward, Livonia Bentley:** Coach Paul Dugan termed Weber a spark plug. With an aggressive, determined style of play made effective by her quickness and pure athletic ability, Weber was a threat every time she touched the ball. She scored 11 goals and dished out 15 assists. The junior was also a solid defensive player off the front line.

**Mary Kay Hussey, midfield, Livonia Stevenson:** It would not be an overstatement to call this senior the consummate soccer player — she can do it all. She can score (16 goals this year, 98 in her career), she can pass (11 assists, 59 career), she can play defense. She's a two-time all-stater. "She's a tireless worker, dependable, responsible, determined," Divens said of Hussey. "She's got good size, excellent skills, positive attitude, she's a team leader, just everything you look for in a player." That about sums it up.

**Annette Ruggiero, midfield, Farmington Hills Mercy:** This senior is the premier goal scorer in Observerland. Mercy has played 33 matches in its two year soccer history and Ruggiero has scored 54 goals and added 41 assists. She is a two-time all-stater. This season she scored 32 goals in 16 games and posted 19 assists. She will attend Colorado State University next fall on a basketball scholarship.

**Kim Paterson, midfield, Livonia Bentley:** Inside 18 feet of the goal, area coaches feel this junior is one of the most dangerous players around. She led Bentley with 28 goals and 17 assists this season. "She has a terrific right foot," Dugan said. She is also an honor student carrying a 3.5 grade point average.

**Danielle Montroy, defense, Livonia Stevenson:** The key to the Spartans' success, Divens will tell you, has been an impenetrable back wall anchored by a pair of all-staters. Montroy is one of them. She is quick to the ball and has enough offensive skills to turn a defensive stop quickly into an offensive rush. She has scored 38 goals in her career.

## Rules different, but it's still called football

THE PERTURBED football fan drew in a great rush of air, he made a megaphone of his hands as he raised them to his mouth; then he let fly an earsplitting shout that ricocheted off the underpinnings of the ancient stadium.

"You rotten little germ," he roared. "You'll get yours!"

Content for the moment, he settled into his seat and gazed intently and with transcendent glee at the football action taking place 150 yards away. His missive most certainly had fallen short of its mark.

No matter. The nimble epithets rarely heard by players are as much a part of Australian Rules football as the bone-rattling tackles and acrobatic catches familiar to many Americans who follow the game on ESPN, the cable sports station.

Less familiar, perhaps, are the nuances of the game and the heady significance it has attained among sports-mad Australians.

AUSSIE RULES, as it's called for short in the land down under, is best played by the 12 teams of the Victorian Football League. All 12 come from suburbs of one city — Melbourne.

That means most games are contested by teams whose grounds are no farther apart than Troy and Livonia. And it's common for backers to follow their boys to cross-town "road" games.

Most matches resemble showdowns between American college rivals. The crowds are smaller — usually 20,000 to 30,000 — but as vocal as Michigan Stadium patrons on most fall Saturdays. And more entertaining.

Footie followers have a vocabulary all their own. Cries are more often punctuated with "germ" or "mongrel" than the obscenities that closed the bleachers in Tiger Stadium earlier this year.

And fans' attentiveness doesn't wane when the action wanders to the opposite side of the huge football

oval. The untrained eye cannot begin to discern what prompts most battle cries — or compliments, which flow with equally unrestrained vigor.

"ATTA BOY, Tommy. Nice pass, lad," rang out as the action continued, obscured by the 180 yards that separate ends of the playing oval.

And after a teammate distinguished himself came the ultimate Australian bouquet: "You're a bloody gentleman, Rod, you are."

The proximity of teams accounts for the exuberance. Imagine the furor if the Tigers played downtown and the Blue Jays occupied the Silverdome, while the Orioles summered in Rochester and the Yankees in Plymouth.

Yet team patronage down under is not solely determined by where one lives. There are 53 suburbs of Melbourne and only 12 teams.

One's allegiance is likely to have stemmed from where one grew up. Or from the team that one's father or grandfather supported.

And allegiances rarely abate. Once a Collingwood supporter, always a Collingwood supporter. So what if Carlton staged the greatest comeback in premiership history in 1970 to rob Collingwood of a championship — a match Collingwood and Carlton supporters replay in their minds (and aloud in pubs) to this day.

You'd be more likely to see kangaroos at the pub than a Magpie backer adorned in Carlton blue or any other opposing team colors.

THEY TAKE their football seriously in Australia — granted, no more seriously than American sports fans take their pastimes. But there's a difference.

In Australia — where the competition is more heated because the foes are neighbors, where team patronage often is passed from father to son as political allegiances are here, and where the football itself is a brutal, knockdown game marked by fights among players — the fans are gentlemen.

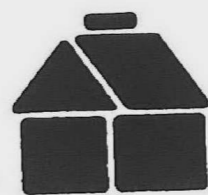

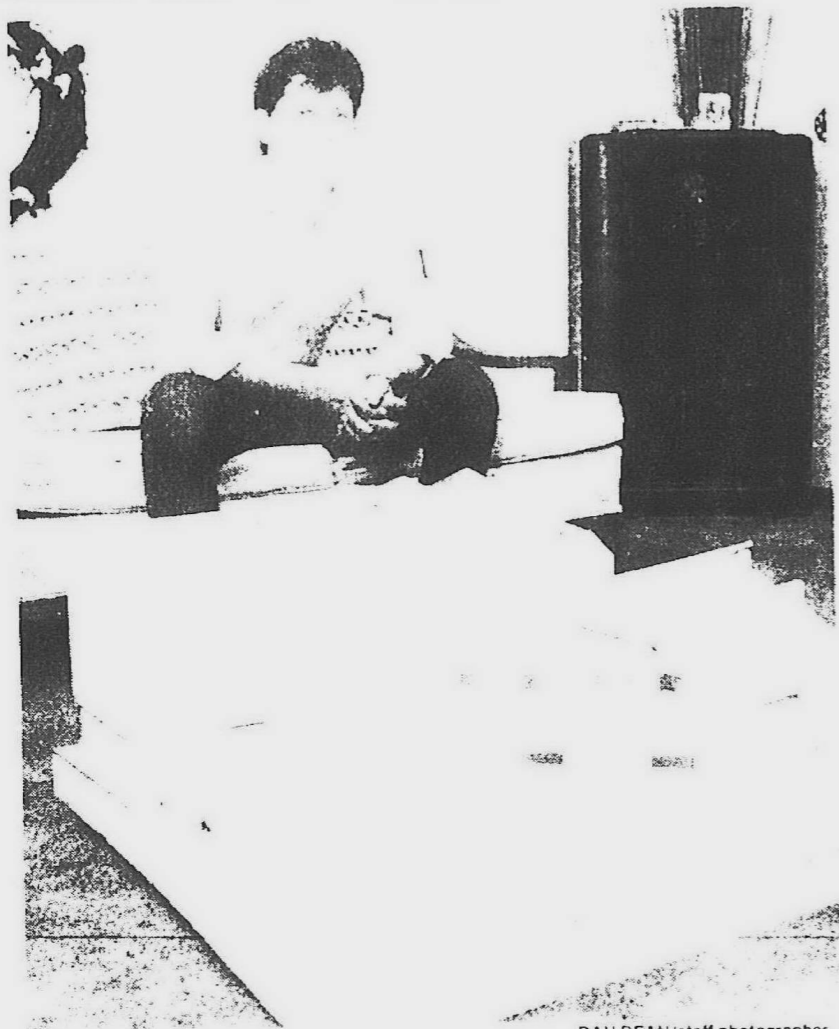




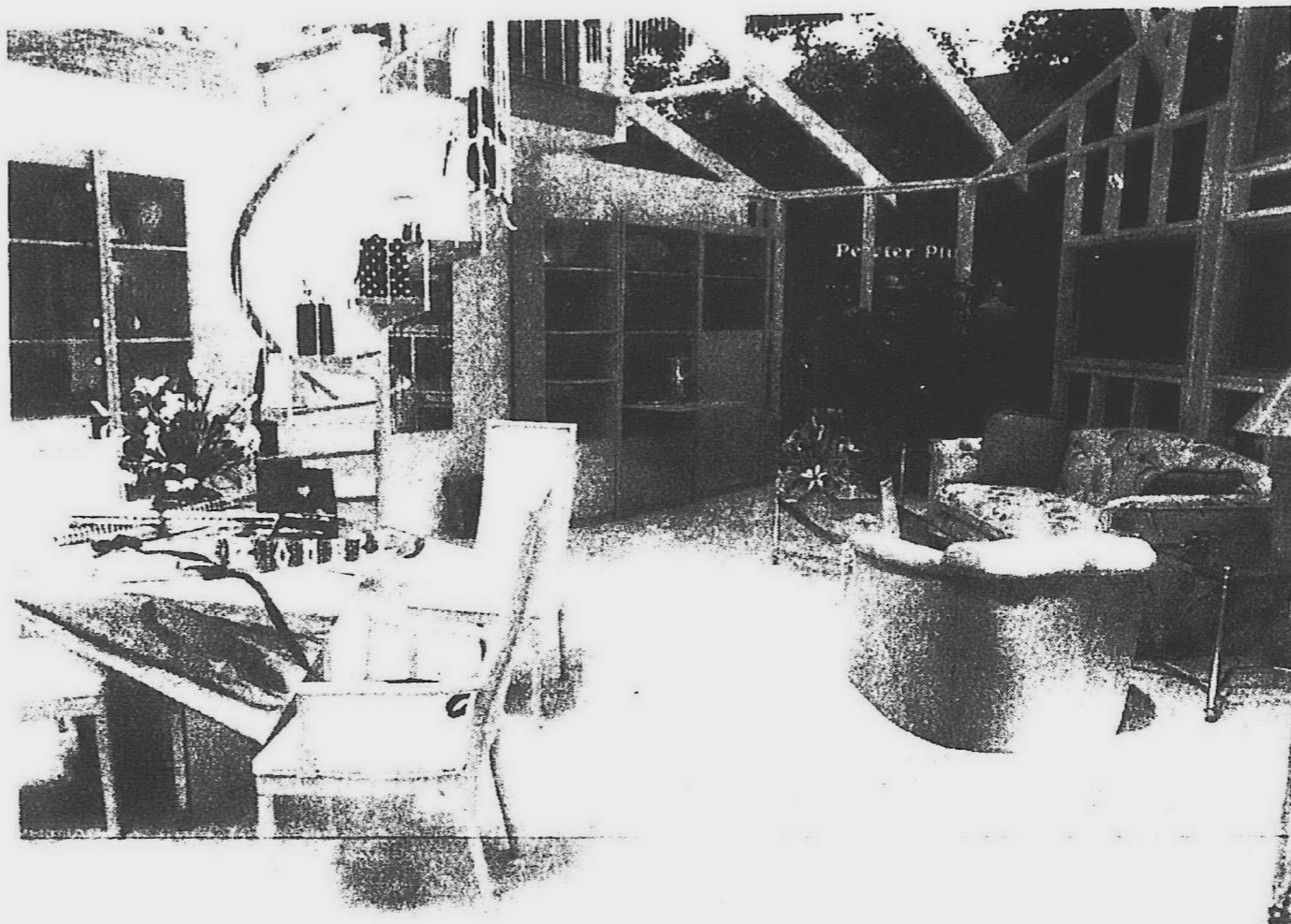

# Young designer builds 5-room mall house

The house designed and built by Livonia resident Brad Sharpe in Novi is a nice place to visit, but you probably wouldn't want to live there.

That's only because the 1,800-square-foot, five-room house is situated in the Center Court of Twelve Oaks Mall, on Novi Road.

A bustling shopping center isn't the place to live if you like privacy. And it could be inconvenient living in a house that will be taken down July 4. Otherwise, it's quite an attractive place.

The contemporary style house displays gift-giving and home decorating ideas. Made of wood and fireproof paint, it was furnished by stores in the mall.

"Everybody's been saying really nice things about it," said the 24-year-old

Sharpe, now between his second and third years at Lawrence Institute of Technology. "I haven't heard anything bad about it."

"We've had a wonderful reaction in the center," Twelve Oaks marketing director Sheila Armstrong said. "To our knowledge, it is one of the first in the country."

"INVITING, CASUAL and sophisti-

cated" is how Armstrong describes the house. Its features include a spiral staircase, study, loft, deck, skylight, glass walls and five-sided sitting room.

The house is similar to one that Sharpe built at the center last year, except it has a second story. Armstrong contacted Sharpe about the project.

"He had worked with us throughout his schooling in different projects," she said.

The young architect/builder didn't have a particular residence in mind when he designed the structure, first making a sketch, then a three-dimensional model. He kept in mind that each room had to be seen by the shoppers as they walked around the house and looked down at it from the upper level.

Sharpe was assisted by his brother and sister-in-law, and a friend, Lee Jobman of Livonia.

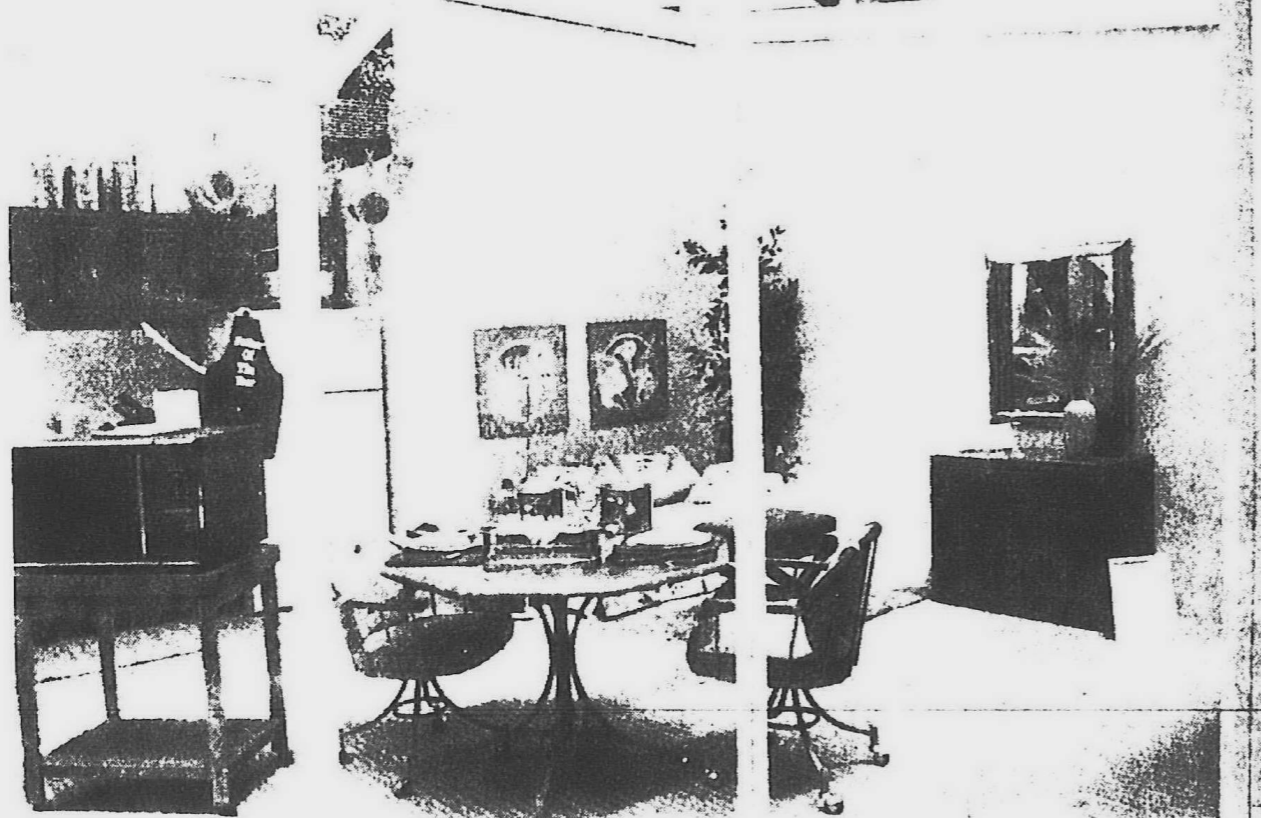
"It was a family project," said Sharpe, the son of Thomas and Donna Sharpe.

The field is one that the Livonia-Churchill High School graduate always has enjoyed.

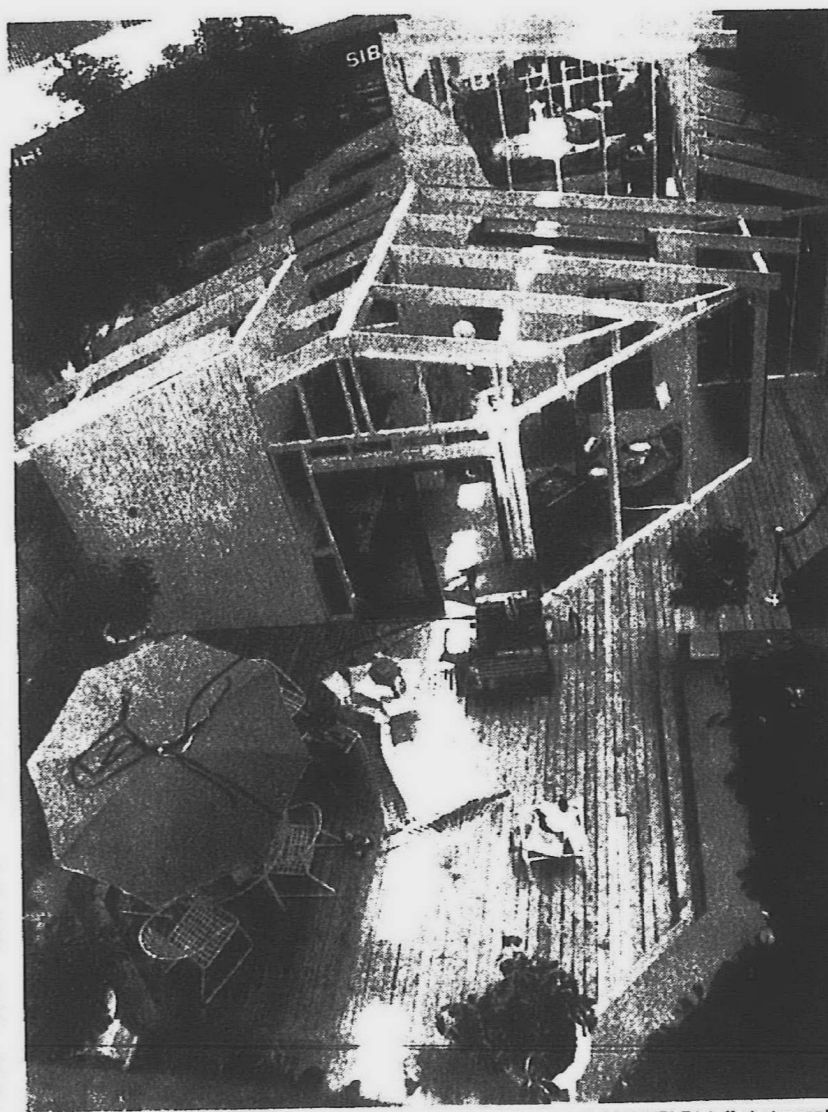
"I always was good at it at high school," he said. "The counselor suggested I go into it."

# Anatomy is people-watcher's favorite science

I was in college during the hottest part of the Vietnam War. My four years at Wayne State were the 18 to 21 "most likely to be drafted years." Uncle Sam would periodically send me little notes just to help me remember that I must maintain at least a "C" average and carry a full academic schedule.

## artifacts

As if I could ever forget my "physical" down at Fort Wayne. In general, among all the normal degradation, I remember three specific occurrences: a frail looking guy just ahead of me passed out when they took a blood test. No big deal, it happens all the time. But when the "doctor" or person attempted to put the blood sample in a test tube he missed the tube and squirted blood all over himself, the table and equipment. Without a moment's hesitation for cleanup the man covered with blood motioned to bring back the poor frail little guy who now looked like a thin "Casper the Ghost."

AS THEY helped the poor lad back for another blood sample, the look on his face reminded me of an old movie called "Death Row at the State Pen." Next, I remember the man who weighed me in and measured my height. He said, "Gee, son, you're lucky." When I asked why, he ex-

plained: "Well you are just a half inch too short to be deferred because of height. Also you're just 15 pounds too light to be deferred because of being too big. In disgust, I said, "You call that lucky? Why that makes me about the biggest target on the field." Finally, as I left to go to my car after a day of standing in my skivvies and being poked, prodded, pushed and pinned, I thought to myself, "I wonder if they stamped U.S.D.A. prime meat" on my hind quarters.

You would think that after an experience like an Army physical, I would have no trouble being inspired to study hard and long. But like "Walter Mitty," I always had trouble mentally sticking to my books. No, I wasn't a day dreamer, I was a people watcher.

Because of my love for anatomy, muscle, bone and proportion, I would drift from whatever I was studying to anatomy.

FOR EXAMPLE: I would be sitting in the study hall trying to memorize the hardness scale for geology. "Talc, gypsum, calcite . . . flouride . . . wow. Has that guy got long arms. Let's see the arms against the side, fingers extended, should line up half way between the knee and the pubic tubercles . . . or perhaps his legs are proportionately short? . . . Talc, gypsum . . . calcite . . . or maybe long hands?" Well, believe it or not I did graduate and for some reason, I was never draft-

ed. But I still am an anatomical "Walter Mitty" and it is a particular pleasure for me to share my interest with my anatomy and life drawing students and you readers.

Every artist must draw people sometime and most find great difficulty in the attempt. Because of their strange looking creatures, many artists shy away from drawing the body or "cop-out" by saying they like to "abstract" the human form.

But, as in all subjects I feel you have not the license to abstract a subject unless you can skillfully render it realistically. In attempting to draw the human body you should consider both proportion and alignment. Proportion is relating one feature to the whole. Alignment is comparing features in a line.

ONE POPULAR unit of measure in proportioning is "head height." They are 7 1/2 heads in the normal human body. So counting the head as one there should be 6 1/2 head heights between the chin and the feet. Regardless of whether the person is tall or short, head height proportions usually hold true.

Remember 7 1/2 heads is only for youths (approximately 18) through adults. Generally the head heights are seven heads for a 14-year-old, 6 1/2 heads for an 8-year-old, 4 1/2 heads for a 2-year-old and four heads for a newborn. Oh yes, remember that by the time you are 80 years old you are back down to just seven head heights.

You may learn to use head heights in proportioning much of the body. There are three heads in the spine, one head in the lower arm and in the wrist to finger tips. And, 1 1/2 heads from the shoulder to the elbow, all of which

should total about three heads from the shoulder to the finger tips.

In the upper leg, there are about two heads from the ball joint to the knee, and 1 1/2 heads from the knee to just above the ankle. Cubits are also helpful.

A CUBIT is the distance between the elbow and the finger tips. There are only four cubits in the human body heights — one from elbow to the finger tips, one from the elbow to the under side of the jaw.

In the standing figure, there is one cubit from the top of the head to the

breast nipples. Then, one cubit from the breast nipples to the pubic tubercles, one from the pubic tubercles to just below the knee cap and one from the knee to the bottom of the foot.

Alignment is even more helpful, but we will go into that later.

School is out for today. Next week more on anatomy. You might have a hard time getting me off the subject. Just a reminder to parents bringing their children to art classes; this is the last week before we start our summer schedule. The week of June 24 our summer classes will start.
