Chiefs study emergency exchange change

How western Wayne County residents call for emergency help could be changed in the future.

A recently formed group of police chiefs, meeting informally to discuss common problems and efforts, is exploring the possibilities of installing the Enhanced 911 system.

"It's a good system, it would just take a lot of work to get it in place if that's what the chiefs want to go to,' said Plymouth Township Police Chief Carl Berry, a member of the group.

Enhanced 911, referred to as E911, is an emergency dialing system offered through Michigan Bell. E911 offers

more features than Basic 911 (B911) service and requires less phone trans-

"We're putting E911 before the group to make a conclusion among ourselves," said Berry, who is coordinating

"If this is the way they want to go, we'll then have to determine what our next step is. But you have to remember that it will be two years before the implementation could take place," he

"THERE'S A lot of advantages to E911, most of which fall within the police and fire department's ability to

handle emergency calls," Berry said. The biggest advantage with the enE911, emergency calls are directed to dispatch centers based on the location low boundaries). of the caller, rather than by phone ex-

Call routing is one of the problems with the current B911 service in Plymouth. Anyone dialing 911 in this area, including residents in Plymouth and Canton townships, are connected with the City of Plymouth dispatch.

Because of that, residents in the two townships are encouraged to dial separate seven-digit numbers for emergen-

An enhanced system would allow residents to dial 911 and have their call routed to their own dispatch center without transfers because the calls are

hanced system is 911 call routing. With routed by community boundary rather than phone exchanges (which don't fol-

With the basic service, a Plymouth dispatcher has to forward any 911 call coming from outside the city.

For example: a Plymouth Township resident dials 911. The call rings at the City of Plymouth dispatch center and the caller is asked for his/her location. Once it's determined the call is coming from Canton or Plymouth Township, the dispatcher forwards the call to the township dispatch center.

BESIDES ELIMINATING the time consuming step in transferring, the E911 system has other advantages,

Incoming 911 calls on the enhanced ternate routing, allows emergency system are accompanied by a video readout which can identify the calling phone number and street address. In the case of a business dialing 911, the enhanced system also displays the busi-

Other features include forced disconnect, to free 911 lines; default routing, for emergency backup; and speed call-

The forced disconnect feature is important in the event someone deliberately ties up the 911 lines. With this feature a dispatcher can clear the

Default routing would work in the event the computer routing system failed or garbled. Another feature, al-

calls to be sent to another close-by center in the event all lines are tied up.

Speed calling would allow dispatcher to forward or place a call to other emergency numbers by hitting one button. This could be used for contacting the poison control center or hospital.

Berry said the one drawback to the E911 system is the cost of putting it in place. Like basic, a community would have to pay for installing the enhanced

The chiefs will attempt to determine if the costs would be worth the advantages the system offers, according to

An attempt to sell the old Plymouth Center for Human Development property on Sheldon Road apparently has backfired on state officials.

Instead of signing off on a "reverter clause" in the deed, as requested by the state, Wayne County has demanded possession of the land.

"We have asked the state to turn the land back over to the county," said Bill Johnson, press secretary to County Executive William Lucas.

"This really is a legal matter . . . all we are telling the state right now is that we want the land back because they are not using it for the intended purpose," Johnson said Friday.

"I don't anticipate going to court; it's all pretty clear cut."

The land in question, 250 acres north of Five Mile on both sides of Sheldon,

was deeded to the state in 1956. Although the county gave the Northdeed contained a clause which requires the land be returned in the event it is not used for "treating mentally diseased or mentally deficient children," Johnson said.

DEPARTMENT OF Mental Health officials reportedly asked the county to sign off on the clause in an attempt to

prepare the property for sale. 'The county never knew about the reverter clause until we told them about it," said Rep. Gerald Law, R-Plymouth Township. Law has been working with state officials trying to

sell the land. Johnson wouldn't confirm that the county learned of the clause through attempts at having officials sign off on it. He did say the matter has been turned over to attorneys for both governments.

"The state is using it for some other purpose than it was deeded for and it was brought to our attention," he said.

Law said sale of the land probably will be held up if the clause isn't resolved. The lawmaker believes a clear title can't be transferred until the county signs off or the state returns the

"The county has written a letter back now to the department saying they want the land back," Law said. "The county gave the state the property for a specific purpose and they don't want someone else or the state to make money off of it.

a small portion of the property for mental health," he said.

A small portion of the land, at the northeast corner of Sheldon and Five Mile, is used for mental health administrative offices. That corner hasn't been included in discussions of what would be sold.

"But the county is looking at it as an entire parcel, that you don't split it up," Law said. "They got a pretty good argument. The state hasn't been using the property for the mentally ill for a long

SALE OF the property has been rumored for several months by state officials. An appraisal recently was done for the state and pegged the property value at \$4.3 million.

Northville Township officials have been keeping a close eye on the discussions and reportedly have lined up private developers to purchase the land. The parcel has been rezoned for industrial (west of Sheldon) and multiple family (east of Sheldon) uses

Johnson refused to comment on what the county would do with the land in the event the state returns it.

"There are no specific plans to use the property at this point," he said, adding that sale to a private developer hasn't been ruled out.

Law believes the county would be easier to deal with, in terms of a sale.

"The county owns the property all around it. It would be easier to put together all of the surplus land out there and deal with one governmental unit,"

Also. Law believes a lower buying price could be generated with the county - making the land more attractive to developers. (The land is across the street from Plymouth Township's Metro West Industrial Park and Northville Township officials hope to use it for continuing industrial development.)

The \$4.5 million appraisal assumed a buyer would use the existing buildings on the land.

"The intended use of the building makes the estimate too high," Law said. "There's no way those buildings can be used, so why should somebody pay for them just to buildoze them?"

Law believes the county will sell the land at a good price for two reasons.

"Number one, they don't want to take care of it, and number two, it will bring in money for the county, both from the sale and then on the tax roll," he said.

False alarms top changes in code

Plymouth City Commissioners took action on several ordinances last week in an attempt to stiffen penalties and bolster the prosecutor's hand.

First reading approval was given to four city code amendments - dealing with false fire and police alarms, "attempted" offenses, illegal alcohol consumption and possession, and sidewalk snow removal.

Each of the amendments requires second-reading approval before taking

THE FALSE alarm changes were requested by the acting fire chief, Al

"Matthews has requested that we increase the fine and in light of the costs to prosecute a violation, I must concur," said Ron Lowe, city attorney.

Last year the fire department re-

Under the amendment, the fine for false alarms would rise from \$25 to

sponded to 28 false alarms, Matthews "Anytime we receive an alarm from

a building we are obligated to respond," he said, adding that each response costs at least \$250.

"It is not our intention to recoup our costs with the higher fine but to make people realize the importance of maintaining their alarm system." Of the 28 false alarms firefighters

responded to last year, 13 were repeat offenders, he said. In 1983, one business was responsible for 10 false runs. Under the proposed ordinance, a business would be allowed one false

alarm per calendar year. Subsequent offenses would result in \$50 fines.

Matthews said malfunctioning alarms are not exempt from the definition of a false alarm. Likewise, repair work which sets off an alarm is not exempt unless the city is notified before-

The ordinance also applies to burglar alarms which feed into the police deak.

ATTEMPTING TO reduce the city's liability for "slip and fall" lawsuits, changes have been proposed for the or-dinance addressing sidewalk mainte-

"While our current sidewalk ordinance addresses the maintenance of the sidewalks by the owner, these amendments specifically provide that the owner of the property shall be liable to the city for any damages recovered against the city," Lowe said.

The ordinance peing amended already requires property owners to keep sidewalks free of snow, dirt and debris. The change would require an owner to repay the city for any costs incurred from a lawsuit due to lack of mainte-

The change was requested by the City Manager Henry Graper and the city's self-insurance municipal risk management group.

The alcohol amendments were a housekeeping matter, according to

The city recently enacted several ordinances aimed at reducing alcohol usage and possession by minors and others in the park areas. Apparently the



House passes nerve gas funding

Here's how area congress were recorded on major roll call votes June 13-19.

NERVE GAS - The House approved, 229-196, an amendment to redin \$124.5 million in nerve-gas funding in the fiscal 1986 Defense Department

Because it followed Senate approval of new funding for chemical weaponry, the vote indicated the U.S. will end its 16-year moratorium on nerve gas pro-

However, the House stipulated that production cannot be resumed until fiscal 1987 and that certain conditions will have to be met.

The new gas would be binary, consisting of relatively impotent chemicals that become lethal only when combined during warfare. Existing nerve gas stocks already are toxic.

The vote occurred during debate on the 1986 defense authorization bill (HR

Supporter Richard Ray, D-Ga., said "failure to modernize our offensive chemical warefare capability amounts to unilateral disarmament.' Foe John Porter, R-Ill., said Ameri-

ca's existing nerve gas stockpile already is "a sufficient chemical deterrent" against Soviet use of the weapon. Members voting yes wanted the U.S.

to resume nerve gas production. Voting yes: Republicans Carl Pursell of Plymouth and William Broomfield of Bir-

Voting no: Democrats Dennis Hertel of Harper Woods, William Ford of Taylor and Sander Levin of Southfield.

MX — By a tally of 233 for and 184 against, the House defied President Reagan and voted to limit to 40 the number of MX missiles that can be ultimately deployed. The vote occurred as the House debated the 1986 Pentagon budget (HR 1872).

Reagan originally wanted 100 MX's for basing in existing, though reinforced, Minuteman siles in western states. He reluctantly agreed earlier this year to a Senate-approved limit of 50 copies, which will have to be reconciled in conference with the House's

The 10-warhead MX is America's next-generation land-based missile, replacing the Minuteman. Early next decade, it is to be supplanted by the more mobile, single-warhead Midget-

Members voting yes wanted to limit MX production to 40 missiles.

FAMILY PLANNING - By a vote of 214 for and 197 against, the House failed to pass a bill extending for three years a program that provides family planning advice and services to the

A two-thirds vote was needed for passage because the bill was debated under a short-cut parliamentary procedure that limited discussion and prevented amendments.

None of the \$454 million authorized by the bill (HR 2369) was to have been spent on abortions. The 15-year-old program is administered by state and





School house here doubled in size in 1907

(Part 11)

Board minutes show that architect's plans and specifications for the brick school to be built in 1884 were to cost

The builder was to be paid \$10,104; heating and ventilating was to cost \$1,500; and the blackboards \$48. In addition, the contractor, Walter Fairbairn, was to charge \$825 for a privy.

The total of \$12,677 was more than the \$10,000 that committee chairman George Starkweather had proposed. And there is some question as to whether the building actually came in at even the higher figure.

Writing in 1907, Margaret Ableson said the total cost was \$18,000. She also wrote: "At the time, this building was considered large enough for all time, but such has not proved to be the case, and it was found necessary to put on a large, up-to-date addition during the present year, 1907."

School classrooms seem to have been crowded well before 1907. An entry in 1893 indicates that the number of children in the primary department were so great that it was impossible for one teacher to handle them.

The board decided to hire an additional teacher and to rent the hall then occupied by the Women's Christian Temperance Union, with the approval of that organization and of Mr. Safford who owned the hall.

In 1901, the board authorized an expenditure of \$2,000 to purchase the Palmer house and lot which adjoined the school house. The property was acquired despite a question as to its clear title, and the Palmer house was put into use as part of the school.

In 1902, the year P.V. Whitbeck succeeded L.C. Hough as president of the school board, it was decided to erect a four-room addition to the east side of the schoolhouse. The Detroit firm of.

A.C. Varney and Co. was engaged to draw up the necessary plans.

In his notice in the Plymouth Mail, urging a large turnout of voters at a special election, V.E. Hill, the school director, indicated that the proposed addition would accommodate the kindergarten, then being housed in the cellar of the school; Miss Rupert's grade, then occupying the old Palmer House; and Miss Hawthorne's grade. In addition, the school library would be enlarged

At the election, held on April 2, 1902, the board's proposal that the district borrow \$9,000 to erect the addition was

defeated

Like many school boards, before and since, the members came back with another proposal. In December 1903 it asked the electorate to approve a district bond in a lesser amount — this time \$7,000 — and the proposal was put to a vote on Jan. 5, 1904. Again it was rejected, this time by a vote of 84 to 48.

Among the supporters of the proposal was air rifle manufacturer W.F. Markham; among the opponents was Marcus Miller who owned the farm at the corner of Sheldon Road and N. Territorial which was later purchased by

the Cassadys.

MEANTIME, USE OF the Palmer house as part of the school was discontinued and Ed Hough, who had been elected to replace his father on the board, was asked to dispose of it. The Palmer house was sold in 1903 for \$35.

In 1904, the year Ed Hough was elected to succeed himself as president of the board and W.N. Isbell was school superintendent, a committee was appointed to see that electric lights were installed in the school building — an event that must have been welcomed by the teachers and pupils.

It was not until 1907 that the school board managed to obtain sufficent funds to build the much-needed addition to the school. In that year voters passed a bond issue of \$8,000 by a vote of 138 to 25. Either the need was more evident at the time, or a new batch of voters had moved to town.

Although the board had estimated that the addition would cost \$12,000, it accepted a bid from Cole Brothers in the amount of \$13,675.

Among other bidders for the contract to construct the addition was the firm of Smith, Hinchman and Grylls of Detroit. When the addition was completed in 1907, Ed Hough still was president and Paul Voorhies, the well-known local lawyer, had just been re-elected to a seat on the board.

THE CORPS OF administrators and teachers in 1907 included:

W.N. Isbell, superintendent; Inez Cole, preceptress; Isabelle Hanford and Martha Williams, assistants in the high school; Minerva Hall, music; Francis Cole, drawing and kindergarten Mary Thompson, Hazel Huffman, Makel Hull, Florence Caster, Anna Smith and Mabel Childs:

The members of the school board were: Edward C. Hough, president; Paul W. Voorhies, secretary; Fred A. Bogert, treasurer; Mrs. E.W. Chaffee and John E. Wilcox.

In 1914, seven years after the addition was completed, Superintendent Isbell was succeeded by C.F., Reebs. Shortly after he took over the position, Reebs had an inventory made of the school property. "It will be useful in case of fire," he told the school board.

Neither the superintendent nor the board members had any way of knowing that such an eventuality was only two years away. On March 30, 1916, the brick school, built in 1884, and doubled in size in 1907, was destroyed by fire.

The entertainment across the ocean came when the English enjoyed a rest on the benches on the lawn of the main governmen building that were donated by a Plymouth group 18 years ago.

The gift was made when the Lord Mayor of Plymouth, England, surprised everyone at the local centennial banquet in the Mayflower Meeting House when he presented the "bit of the rock" that was taken from the dock from which the Mayflower sailed to America in 1620.

When the Michigan group, with the late James Houk as mayor, planned the centennial program in 1967, plans were

laid for a permanent symbol.

The 17 mayors of cities named Playmouth in the United States were invited and it was suggested in open meeting that the Lord Mayor of Plymouth, England, be invited. He was and he ac-

pted. When Lord Mayor Frank Chapman arrived, he had three members of his administration with him and they remained for a week.

ON THURSDAY evening they were guests at an international dinner at which the late Phil Hart, then a U.S Senator, was the main speaker. When he called upon Chapman, a quiet smile spread over the visitors' faces. Then, at the proper moment, he reached under the table and brought out the "bit of rock" and donated it to the people of Plymouth, Michigan, as an everlasting token of friendship.

It took everyone by surprise, especially the committee. So a hurried trip was made to gather four locust trees to give them as gifts for their City Hall

The trees were placed along with colorful benches with an invitation to sit down and enjoy a rest as gifts of their American cousins.

This has happened every year since.
As a further token of friendship the Stars and Stripes are flown over there on July 4th. It is one of the main features of the sister cities program.

Later they invited the Michigan folks to attend the 350th anniversary of the sailing of the Mayflower, and more than 50 of from here crossed the ocean as their guests for a week.

Many times when veteran newspaper folks get together over coffee the question is asked, "What was your toughest assignment?"


When The Stroller was asked the other day he had no trouble recalling an assignment he never can forget. Perhaps, it was because the annual speedboat races were on over the Detroit River course. But it was an assignment to cover a race in front of the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club that is the toughest he ever had.

It was in the early '30s and Kaye Don, the British challenger for the famed Harmsworth trophy, who had capsized the year before, had the river course condemned. When he succeeded in that move he challenged Gar Wood

again.

This time Gar, who never missed a trick, asked the government to select a

He was told that the water at the east side club was the smoothest at about 8 o'clock in the morning. So, that's when he decided to accept the challenge on the new course.



It sounded odd at the time. And the newspaper folks started to figure out how they could get there and be settled in time for the race.

So, here is what happened. The Stroller wrote his last advance story late in the afternoon before the race. It was for the first morning edition.

THAT DONE he went home and went to bed. To get the writers together, a press breakfast was scheduled at the Book Cadillac Hotel at 2 a.m. We were to have our coffee and then be taken with a special police escort out to

the course.

Everything went fine until the breakfast was finished. Then we started with

the police escort. We hadn't gone very far when it was seen that we were in trouble. The traffic was jammed as the spectators headed for the course.

When we got to Alter Road, out East Jefferson, the police decided they could take us no further. So, they made a right turn and we wound up at a small boat club. It was pitch dark. But they put us in 16-foot pleasure boats and we started the most fearful trip The Stroller ever had.

Our little boats were battling cruisers and freighters in the dark and there was no telling when we would be struck and possibly sent to the bottom

of the river.

The late Dave Wilkie, then head of

the Associated Press office in Detroit, had his typewriter on his lap and couldn't hold back the tears. He sobbed and prayed all the way.

And The Stroller was too scared to do anything but sit there and hope for the best. We were fortunate in that we got to the course at daybreak — a stunned group if ever there was one.


During the week prior to the race, we had covered the trial runs and the course seemed fine. But we never figured that we were going to be there in the dark with big freighters weaving in and out and endangering our lives.

Then to top things off, when the race got under way Gar Wood was forced to trail, lap after lap. Finally came the final lap and we had visions of Gar losing the trophy. But he ordered his mechanic to give her more gas, saying, he told us afterword, "Let's win the race or go to hell trying."

The move decided the race. The Miss America shot to the front at a speed above 100 miles an hour and the famed trophy was kept in America.

What exactly are "barbecued" ribs? Barbecue, according to the U.S.D.A., is a cooking method. They state that barbecue "shall be cooked by the direct action of dry heat resulting from the burning of hard wood or the coals there

Whether you eat them indoors at your favorite restaurant or outdoors in your backyard, ribs can be enjoyed all year. "Barbecued" ribs are a basic American food - simple and fun to

But there are as many variations as there are chefs and home cooks. Each two inches wide.

Hickory-smoked ribs, hot 'n' spicy cook has their unique way to prepare the ribs and their own "secret" ingredients in their sauce. But there is nothing secret about the most essential

> Wholesome, high-quality pork is the most popular meat for tender, tangy tantalizing barbecued ribs. The two most popular pork rib cuts are pork back ribs and spareribs. The pork back ribs are cut from the blade and center section of the pork loin. They contain rib bones and meat betwen the ribs called finger meat. A whole back rib

> MANY RESTAURANTS serve whole-slabs and half-slabs of ribs. They make a half-slab by cutting the whole slab lengthwise, through the rib bones. The result is two half-slabs, each about

A growing number of restaurants offer customers a portion of the back ribs which is not commonly available at your local meat market - baby back rib. To located the baby back ribs, start at the shoulder of the whole slab of back ribs. Ribs one through four are wide; ribs five through 12 are the thin baby ribs.

Two restaurants that serve these "Cadillac of ribs" are Carson's, Chicago, and the 1984 National Rib Cook-Off winner - Calhoun's, Knoxville, Tenn.

Some restaurants also serve spareribs, which are not as meaty but just as tasty, as the baby back ribs. They come from the pork belly or side. A slab of spareribs is about six inches wide and contains long rib cartilage and portions of the breast bone and diaphragm. Some retailers and restaurants, such as Leon's in Chicago, trim the breast bone

off the spareribs. They are commonly sold or labeled as "St. Louis-style" in the supermarket.

RIB SALES across the country are booming. Carson's sells 35,000 pounds of baby back ribs every week in its five restaurants. Calhoun's increased its ribs sales by 30 to 40 percent after it won the National Rib Cook-Off last August. They sell 11,000 pounds of baby back ribs each week in their single outlet. And Leon's sells 18,000 pounds of the spareribs (St. Louis-style) in four Chicago outlets every week.

Once you've selected your favorite cut of pork ribs, it's time to get started cooking. Restaurants may choose from six different cooking methods for their ribs, but none is any better than another. There's the conventional oven method, the moist/dry method, smoking, pressure barbecue, recooking of pre-

The methods that use moist heat pro-vide cooked ribs with meat that "falls off the bones." Ribs cooked by dry-heat methods stick to the bone more readily and make a chewier rib. It's important not to overcook ribs, but they all should be cooked to an internal temperature of 170 degrees F.

THE VARIETY of sauces for ribs is even greater than the number of different cooking methods used to prepare them. Every region in the U.S. has their own taste preference. For example, in the Southwest they prefer a hickorysmoke flavored sauce. Then in the South they like their ribs hot 'n' spicy. The Midwest, however, leans toward the more traditional catsup-based sauce, sometimes flavored with onions. In the North and Northeast, their conservative tastes are for a milder, sweet, but not tangy sauce.

It's difficult to pin down a chef as to the ingredients in his or her sauce. Calhoun's, for example, claims to have 21 to 22 different ingredients in their nottoo-hot, not-too-thick, not-too-sweet

Whatever basic ingredients are used, the sauce is not basted on the ribs until ccoking cycle. And for those rib connoisseurs who prefer a heavy dose of sauce, an extra bowl of this tasty condiment is always served at the table.

To prepare award-winning ribs under your own broiler, or in your backyard, try the following recipes for All-American Pork Ribs or Smokey Molas- 1 medium onion, finely chopped ses-Flavored Spareribs. To get the popular heavy smoke flavor for your ribs, the All-American Pork Ribs can be cooked in a water smoker. The Smokey Molasses-Flavored Spareribs get their flavor with the addition of liquid hickory seasoning to the sauce.

And to make your barbecuing even easier, the ribs can be pre-cooked in the microwave oven, and then basted with the sauce and finished under the broiler or on the grill.

Reduce size, not taste

A nutritionist at Pennsylvania State University has an unusual recommendation for dieters: Don't give up your favorite high-calorie foods.

"If you're on a diet, it's good to eat fatty or high-calorie foods less often," said Mary Rowan. "But there aren't many foods you'd want to eliminate altogether.

'Foods which are high in fat - red meats, for example - are still a major source of nutrients. Variety is important to a healthy balanced diet, so it's not a good idea to eliminate a lot of foods from your diet entirely."

Rowan is a staff member at the Nutrition Information and Resource Center in Penn State's College of Human Development. She suggests that dieters can continue to eat many of their favorite foods by making recipe changes

to reduce the number of calories. "For example, when making beef stroganoff, you can use low-fat yogurt instead of sour cream," she suggests. "The yogurt has only 140 calories per cup, while a cup of sour cream has 420 calories. Similarly, instead of using ricotta cheese in lasagna, try substituting low-fat cottage cheese, or tofu."





Over at the VFW Post on Mill Street, the chicken barbecue was a huge success. Members and auxiliary sold out


the 550 dinners. There were patio parties, backyard barbecues and picnics all in the best July 4th tradition.

'We tried to get the word out. But we probably made a mistake, limiting the service to Plymouth. We did that, to see how it worked here. We thought we would start small, but maybe that was a mistake," said Hillquist.

'Back to the Future' cleverly transports teenager into past

Stop and think: What would you do if modern technology flung you back 30 years in time where you met your father-to-be as he is (was?) about to be smeared by the school bully?

If you don't save soon-to-be dear old Dad, your father and mother may never marry. That leaves you without a future. Like

zero, friend, so you'd better get cracking.
In "Back to the Future" Marty McFly (Michael J. Fox) is a capable young teenager, circa 1985. His mother, Lorraine (Lea Thompson), specializes in nipping and nagging. She hits the bottle before, during and after she scolds father George (Crispin Glover), who is the king of the wimps.

Then, there's brother Dave (Marc McClure), barely able to hold his fast-food restaurant job and sister Linda (Wendie Jo Sperber), about whom the less said the better, unless you like whining, in-

HOW DID MARTY wind up as the only nifty character in this misfit family?

Time travel and the unconventional scientific genius of Dr. Em-

met Brown (Christopher Lloyd) did it all. Traveling back in time with Marty is a trip you'll like. "Back to

the Future" is a well-crafted vehicle with accomplished travelers who make the voyage enjoyable.

One of the most striking element of this production is its relative simplicity. While there are some rather conventional glowing blue spots, thunder, lightening and a good deal of screeching tires, the now obligatory multi-million-dollar special-effects extrava is happily absent.

"Back to the Future" relies instead on a thoughtful script, effec-

tive settings and excellent performances. Time travel has been the subject of many stories, sometimes

clever and thought-provoking, sometimes dull and pedestrian, because of the ways in which the stories are told.

"BACK TO THE FUTURE" is a simple but clever rendition of a basic time-travel dilemma: How do you get home without destroying your own future? The answer in this script, while cleverly playing on 1955 cultural trends from a 1985 perspective, is the crux of the film's dramatic action.

The 1955 settings are effectively authentic and the nifty-Fifty cars are very convincing. The persuasive small-town American environment of 30 years backdrops well-written lines — but that's only half the battle. Excellent performances by everyone in sight, particularly the principals, make "Back to the Future" a potential challenger to "E.T.'s" box-office supremacy.

For performers in their 20s, roles of 17-year-old high school students are not all that taxing. But playing those same two characters 30 years later is no mean achievement. As mom and pop

McFly, Thompson and Glover perform with great flair.

Emphasizing those two actors should not slight the other excellent performances including the first mad scientist I've ever seen with depth to his character. Christopher Lloyd's Dr. Brown is a warm, humorous, funny human being and not just another crasy, tinkering in the basement.

Bigger producers may be better

I generally have a hard time reading the winery newsletters that are sent to me. They tend to be highly self-serving, promotional and, perhaps above all, rather dull. And there are a lot of them.

Often I get two or three in a day in the mail. I have no idea how many there are now in all. Today, for example, I received Quail Ridge and one from Caswell Winter Creek Farm and Vineyard. Yesterday it was Hop Kiln.

I did a column about three years ago, promoting the things, and gave out the addresses of all that I knew about at that time. There were then about a dozen being printed regularly. Today it seems that most of the major producers have one, and many of the smaller ones as well (Caswell Winter Creek Farm?). I am also sure that there are many that I do not receive.

A few of them are pretty good, but not many. Bob Travers of Mayacamas is most entertaining, and Sebastiani's is excellent, the latter showing a real attempt to inform us. Sini's is getting to be that way, too, to its credit. And sometimes Domaine Chandon's is good, though terribly chatty. (I won't name all the dull ones.)

ALL OF THIS by way of introducing the recent Chandon newsletter (Summer 1985) as the inspiration for this column. It develops an idea that has a great deal of merit, one that I had never thought of before, one worth report-

The opening point of the article reviews our fascination with, and belief in, the virtue of smallness in the wine industry. (It is called "With Apologies to E.F. Schumacher.") We cherish small wineries, small barrels and little old winemakers. The 5,000-case-a-year winery, by definition, makes better wine than the industrial giant, or so the thinking goes.

The Chandon article endeavors to refute this in the world of sparkling wines. Here, a point is made that I be-

lieve to be true: The large-scale producer, whether in France or California, has the advantage because the best of the world's sparkling wines are from blends of different kinds of grapes. Further, these are blends of different batches of the same grape. The small producer will have only so

much pinot noir available, so much chardonnay or pinot blanc. There may be one or two batches of each, but rarely more. Blending is restricted to a small handful of choices.


Further, there will be no wine held back from previous vintages to add complexity. The small producer, however fine his wine and skills may be, has fewer blending options.

THE GIANT, on the other hand, will have tank after tank from which to choose to make the final blend. There is an advantage to volume.

What the Chandon article fails to develop, however, is why blending in the making of sparkling wine especially is essential. Its grapes are harvested much earlier than those of table wines (usually at about 18 brix rather than 22 or 23), well before intense sugars and fruit flavors are well developed

The resultant wine is extremely tart, light, delicate and unidimensional. Such simplicity and delicacy cries out for enhancement, both from yeast and from the flavors from other grapes. Three kinds of grapes may be used, and different batches are employed as well as younger and older wines.


Because the blended and basic wine is so delicate and light, the impact of any added wine on the total will have greater impact than, say, it would with a rich, full, highly fruity chardonnay or zinfandel harvested full and mature with assertive flavors. Without blending, good sparkling wine is less interesting and the winemaker is more dependent on the quality of that cuvee and/or that vintage.



The more blending choices, the better potential the blend has, presuming that it is done with skill and knowledge. The basic blend can be changed time and time again until it exactly meets the intended specifications of its

Big also brings the unit cost to the consumer down as well, but that is another column, one that probably will not be written. Schumacher may need a little rethinking in winemaking of the sparkling kind. However, when applied to cars he's still on safe ground.
