## Alternative school faces budget cuts

"I was kicked out of high school, because I was breaking into lockers."

The 16-year-old Plymouth-Canton high school student was in trouble a lot. So he was asked to take part in the Learning Options program conducted by Growth Works, Inc., a non-profit organization, operated in conjunction with the school district.

The program is offered as a last-ditch effort to kids headed toward expulsion or dropping out, but its future is unclear due to financial cutbacks.

LAST YEAR, the youth attended classes and was instructed by Growth Works employees in Plymouth. He's preparing to go back to the Centennial Education Park in the fall.

"I personally liked the high school program better because they offered me a larger variety of classes. But the program (Learning Options) helped me face up to how to deal with my feelings.

The youth's name is being withheld.

"I think I can make better choices and decide what to do. I think about what I do before I do it instead of going along with the crowd."

When he graduates from high school he plans to be a mechanic or a "cop."

The program — operated with district assistance since 1977 — is facing drastic financial cuts from federal, state, county and most recently, school district offices.

"Generally, those kinds of funds are going through a real evolution, plus we don't know the effect of the tax changes," said Dale Yagiela, Growth Works director.

Nic Cooper, program specialist for

alternative education, said he feels frustrated knowing the district is considering cutting its budget.

Cooper said statistics prove the program's a major success in keeping kids in school.

THE PLYMOUTH-CANTON school board has allocated \$70,000 for the program next year, half of the \$140,000 Growth Works hoped to get from the schools. The organization runs on a \$450,000 annual budget.

This would allow only enough money to finance the fall semester, leaving the winter budget unclear.

However, school board members said at Tuesday's meeting they are committed to the Learning Options program — also known as alternative program — and would review the budget for the remaining money.

## Battle looms over peace pole location

Recent happenings surrounding a six-foot wooden pole prove that even peace can provoke controversy in Plymouth.

The pole, inscribed with the phrase "May peace prevail on Earth" in Russian, German, Hebrew and English, was planted in Kellogg Park when the recent Michigan Peace March stopped there en route from Sault Ste. Marie to Detroit.

Nuclear disarmament rally organizers, including Plymouth residents Glenn Davis and Anne Reynolds, wanted the pole planted permanently.

DAVIS SAID he was told by Plymouth city manager Henry Graper the pole would be removed.

Graper said some city commissioners are opposed to putting objects in the park.

As Graper and Davis met Monday to discuss the issue, petitions circulated in Plymouth neighborhoods and area businesses.

"The purpose is to get a show of community support for the pole, and for it being kept in," said Reynolds.

"The only problem in the first place is that the pole would be vandalized because it's so prominent in that position," Graper said Tuesday. "I suggested a move to a location of their desire. Private property, or a site such as a church, would be better."

DAVIS AND Reynolds, who represent the local chapter of the Episcopal Peace Fellowship, a national group, opposed the idea.

"Most people like myself, who are individual citizens, feel that any action they take on an issue that is of such importance in the world is insignificant, so why bother?"

"But I believe that every person can have an effect, even if it is a very small effect," said Reynolds, a special education teacher in the Romulus school district.

"It's important for people to have a daily reminder in some form, whether it's a visual symbol like a peace pole, a prayer that they say, or words that they hear from a friend, to keep the goal of peace in their consciousness.

"World peace isn't something that happens because leaders of nations get together and decide it's important."

"It really is the responsibility of everyone to figure out ways to get along together in peace."

REYNOLDS AND Davis will attend Monday's city commission meeting "to try to get some sort of reassurance in a public way" that the pole can stay.

"I don't want to have a confrontation with anybody, especially if it's not necessary. But I'm a little bit leery, on the other hand, about accepting just a verbal assurance, since Mr. Graper indicated that the commission will not have an agenda item (to discuss the pole)," Reynolds said.

Graper sees no reason for the pole to be removed at this point, he said.

"Obviously the city commission can overrule me. I don't want anyone to think the commission is against peace. Not everybody is in favor of putting things in the park. That's why we have special event permits."

Larry Masteller, Plymouth-Canton Community Education director, is a composite personality.

A former Detroit Country Day elementary teacher and head varsity football coach, Masteller began his teaching career at Clio and Constantine schools.

He is an avid, seasonal sportsman with summer camp work experience at a private Indiana camp.

Masteller's experience makes him a director attuned to the educational needs of adults and the recreational course needs of the Plymouth-Canton community.

COMMUNITY education offerings have grown significantly in the school district as evidenced by the size of the brochures.

In Masteller's 14 years as direc-

tor he has transformed the 1969 eight-page brochure detailing the lifelong learning department, as it was once referred, into an impressive 24-page publication brimming with job training and career programs, high school completion and GED classes, classes for youths and senior citizens.

In one year 8,000 to 10,000 people take community education classes.

"Community education is a year-round kind of thing. The best advertisement is word of mouth," said Masteller. "Every day is different. During one day, I may speak to several different age

groups: a teacher in the preschool lab, an adult who wishes information or seniors at Tonquish Creek (apartments)."

A graduate of Albion College, Masteller holds a double major in biology and physical education and a minor in political science. He has a master's degree in physical education and recreation from the University of Illinois.

Raised in Adrian, Masteller has an identical twin brother, Jerry, who works as an athletic director in the Cleveland's Shaker Heights School District.

"We can still fool a lot of people," Masteller said, laughing.

AFTER HOURS, Masteller takes on the equally demanding role of homeowner, diligently intent on spiffing up the duplex and new home he owns in Canton. The sports enthusiast recently

finished camping at Interlochen State Park with his new wife, Dolores, a secretary for Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

"I like to get underneath a tent. I, myself, didn't start camping leisurely until two years ago. It beats paying \$50 a night for a motel room especially when we're out of the room all day doing things.

"There's a lot of good golf courses up north," he added.

Masteller's office is filled with outdoorsy scenes and a large four-foot padded illustration of a golfer teeing off.

Professionally, Masteller also is serving his second term as the Region 3 (Wayne and Monroe Counties) representative for the Michigan Association of Adult and Community Education. He also is a board member of the Michigan Alliance of Administrators for Public School Adult Education.

## Two administrators to miss first bell

Two administrators won't hear the first bell ring when school starts in the Plymouth-Canton district.

When Ronald South, principal at Eriksson Elementary School, retires this month he'll close a door in Michigan and open another in Germany.

South, 54, has 24 years of service with the district.

Beginning in 1966, he worked as a principal at Tanger, Fiegel, Eriksson and Smith elementary schools. South also taught fifth and sixth grades in the district.

From 1980 through 1982 he taught secondary and career education in Germany with the Department of Defense Dependent Schools. The schools are offered to dependents of

U.S. military employees.

THAT'S WHERE South plans to return.

But this time South will teach special education in a junior high school. His first time in Germany was a two-year Army stint beginning in 1954.

"I have mixed feelings," he said about leaving the district and starting a new career. "I've been with the district a good length of time and I feel good about the association. There's a lot of good in this district and sometimes people don't always recognize that."

South will end 29 years of employment in Michigan, including three years teaching in Inkster and buying two years retirement time for his Army service.

South's wife, Gloria, chairwoman

of the Livonia Stevenson High School guidance department, will also look for a job in Germany, he said.

Their twin sons, Mark and Paul, both students at Purdue University, attended Plymouth-Canton Community Schools. Mark's major is German and Paul's major is civil engineering.

ANOTHER FACE that won't be seen in the district is Andrew T. Melin, WSDP station manager.

Melin is leaving the area to work as sports information director and assistant basketball coach at Manchester College in Indiana.

Melin's involvement with the student-operated radio station housed in Plymouth Salem High reaches back to when he was a student from 1975 to 1978. He has worked as station manager since September 1982.

Melin also worked as assistant basketball coach for boys and girls teams. Most recently, he worked as varsity assistant and junior varsity coach at Salem High.

With the exception of four years at Michigan State University, Melin, 26, has either lived or worked in the community.

"It's a big move. But it's something I've been looking forward to for two or three years. When the opportunity presents itself you have to take advantage. But opportunities like that just don't come up very often."

"Without the opportunities that have been presented by the district over the past five years, I would not have been qualified for the current position, and for that I will always be grateful."

## 2 unions expect contract delays

It looks like Plymouth-Canton bus drivers and paraprofessionals will be without new contracts by the time school starts Sept. 1.

In their first bargaining session, negotiators for the school district and the 140-member Plymouth-Canton Paraprofessional Association exchanged proposed contracts Monday.

Bargainers for the Plymouth-Canton Transportation Employees Association were scheduled to meet with district negotiators for the first time today, said Norm Kee, assistant superintendent for employee relations.

No one has set any deadline. Contracts probably will continue to be

negotiated through the school year, said Kee.

MARYANN LIGATO, executive director of the Paraprofessional Association, MEA-NEA, said that while "we are hopeful that we will reach an amicable and equitable settlement," substantial gains need to be made.

The paraprofessionals aides are among the lowest paid in the area. "I don't know why I know this is the last group to unionize and bargain and that may be a factor."

Paraprofessionals, including full- and part-time supervisory personnel, special education aides, student supervision and instructional and playground aides, make \$4.61 to start and top out at \$6.17 after six years.

Ligato said the employees have "very poor insurance benefits. They don't get fully-paid health insurance as do other part-timers in the district. They get significantly less life insurance, and no dental plan."

Ligato said Tuesday the union planned to offer a contract extension in Wednesday's bargaining session. "We have made a verbal commitment to sign an extension so that when the school year begins, we will work under terms of the expired contract."

**THE BUS DRIVERS** and paraprofessionals are the only employee groups without signed contracts.

The remaining unions are working under contracts that grant 5 percent increases and expire in June 1988.

The district's 65 bus drivers and garage employees presently begin at \$7.75 and earn \$9.04, top of the scale after one year.

Kee says it's unfair to characterize Plymouth-Canton paraprofessionals as poorly paid.

"In looking at the metropolitan Detroit area, there are several districts that have comparable wages for educational aides. They compare in benefits, too, that's not to say some districts don't have higher pay and better benefits."

"If you look at the three-county area, I'm finding that we're about average. If you want to compare us to selected districts, we wouldn't look so good."

## CEP band gets new designer uniforms

The Centennial Educational Park Marching Band will be taking the field this fall in new uniforms designed by Michael Cesario and manufactured by the DeMoulin Uniform Co.

Cesario is an associate professor of costume design in the professional training program at the State University of New York.

Cesario's work has been seen on television in Broadway musicals and on repertory stages across the country.

He is active as a design clinician across the country and has served as a program and design consultant for marching bands throughout the east and Midwest as well as for many drum corps.

THE NEW UNIFORMS will feature a red, white and blue coat for football game performances and parades.

The competition coat will be yellow and white.

Both coats will be worn with black high-waisted trousers.

Cesario selected the red, white and blue combination to represent both Plymouth-Canton and Plymouth-Salem high schools.

The yellow was selected for its high visibility and visual impact during competition performances.

The Color Guard uniforms will add visual accent for both uniform coats. The jackets are red with white accents and the skirts are black. The Color Guard also uses a variety of flags to complement the marching band.

THE BAND'S first appearance in the new uniforms will be at the Plymouth-Canton/John Glenn football game on Friday, Sept. 11.

The band, under the direction of James R. Griffith, also will perform at the Plymouth Fall Festival from 1:45-2:45 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 13.

The 170-member marching band will begin rehearsals for the 1987 season on Tuesday, Aug. 18. The band will have marching and music rehearsals each day until it leaves for camp on Sunday, Aug. 23 at Camp Kohana near Northport, Mich.

The week at camp will be filled with sectional rehearsals for each instrument, marching rehearsals and music rehearsals. Parents serve as counselors at the camp and qualified instructors teach the music and marching.

The percussion section has been rehearsing since February with once-a-week rehearsals. Since June it has been having percussion rehearsals every Thursday evening and small group rehearsals on another day.

The percussion sectional includes the snare drums, bass drums, quad drums, keyboards and cymbals. During the 1986 season the percussion section was selected the best percussion section in every competition CEP Marching Band competed in.

The CEP Marching Band is the defending state of Michigan championship band, having won the championship in 1984, 1985 and 1986.

Last year the band was awarded 40 trophies.

The band's motto for this year is "Go 'Four' It In '87."

# Alternative school faces cuts

ent, said correcting problems faced by children in the program is "a community problem not a school problem." Dean Swartzwelder, trustee, agreed. He cited the need for more support from local governments, churches and other groups.

"I think we all know in our hearts that this program demonstrates value in homes and schools," said Michael Homes, assistant superintendent for instruction.

"It hasn't saved them all — no one project can. But it's the one single program that ties us to a community agency that allows kids to make progress," Homes said.

**GROWTH WORKS** is an agency of the Plymouth Community Fund, United Way and the United Foundation of Metropolitan Detroit. It also receives financial support from Plymouth and Canton townships, Wayne County and service groups.

About 70 students take part in Learning Options annually — cost-

ing the district \$3,500 for each student. Another \$700 for each student is allocated by Growth Works, Yagiela said.

Failure of the Headlee Amendment millage vote this summer spurred major cutbacks in the school district's budget.

And the unclear budget picture puts Growth Works employees — especially the five Learning Options workers — in an uncomfortable position.

Trying to work out a good relation between staff and clients is tough, Yagiela said. "It's kind of like building a contender for the pennant."

"We're asking them to take a fairly major risk" by not seeking new jobs, said Yagiela.

"They deal with children who are upset and parents who are upset. That's not always pleasant. The potential for burnout is always there."

**MOST OF THE** students in the program are in middle school.

"They're typically the kids who wind up over a period of time just

disappearing (out of the school system)," Yagiela said.

Behavior common to students in the program include failing grades, excessive tardiness and absences, suspected chemical misuse, misbehaving in class and bad peer relationships.

Some 78 percent have drug or alcohol related problems and 67 percent have difficulties with home life.

Only 18 percent of clients have both biological parents, 20 percent live in blended families and 62 percent are from single-parent homes.

Problems at home include divorce, death, physical abuse or neglect and sexual abuse.

A 16-year-old girl, who skipped class too many times and recently completed the program, said some of the work she was given to do during her stay was material she already knew.

"But it probably helped me attitude wise," she said. "If I hang around the wrong crowd then hey I'll have the wrong attitude."

"I can blend into the wrong crowd just like that," she said snapping her fingers.

Other Growth Works programs include youth development for juvenile offenders, youth and adult employment, and substance abuse.

## Plymouth youths similar on both sides of Atlantic

**PLYMOUTH, ENGLAND** — Keeping students occupied in their off time is a dilemma facing communities on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean.

Plymouth, England, really isn't that different from Plymouth, Mich.

Students need a place to gather and when none is available, they tend to "hang out," according to Terry Passmore, senior administrator of the West Devon Education Office, which includes this southwestern British city.

The problem isn't quite as major in Plymouth, England, as it has become lately in Plymouth, Mich.

A couple of main differences are that students don't learn to drive until they are 17, and the summer break is only six weeks long — from mid-July until the beginning of September.

"Students are required by law to attend class 190 days," said Passmore. Classes usually begin at 9 a.m. and end by 4 p.m.

**PLYMOUTH, ENGLAND**, is a city of about 250,000 residents.

According to Passmore, there are 17,173 pupils in secondary education (ages 11 to 18). There are seven educational centers throughout the city and each provides its own activities.

The educational authority provides a center and staff and takes great strides to provide programs for students, although Passmore admits that only a minority of the students participate.

"We can only attract those interested in something to do," said Passmore. "It's not just to keep them off the street, but it obviously does."

Many of the programs offered through the education authority are sports. Passmore explained that if a student is not interested in sports or has very little athletic ability, he or she will not want to participate in the program.

For those whose interest lies in another area — such as arts and crafts or music — trips are offered. Because Plymouth, England, is situated on the water, summertime sees a peaked interest in water related activities and classes such as sailing and canoeing are offered.

The educational authority isn't the only organization offering activities to Plymouth's youth. "Youth centers have an enormous amount of activities conducted by volunteer organizations such as scouts, guides and

the Boys Brigade (a uniformed musical band)," said Passmore.

"Youth clubs are organized by ordinary people who decide to get together and run activities. They can rent and some own premises. Some may raise money to buy, but the majority rent accommodations which may be a hall or a room in a school, and meet one, two or three times a week for whatever activity they want."

**IN ADDITION** to the volunteer youth centers and the educational authority, Plymouth has a YMCA and a YWCA that offer various activities, including basketball, boxing clubs, billiards and snooker. The latter has become popular in England because of television coverage, Passmore said.

Organized excursions, such as camping with organized groups and caving (exploring caves and digging with qualified leadership) in local and special places, are very popular with the young people in Plymouth, according to Passmore.

By far, the most popular activity with boys in Plymouth is soccer. It is the national sport in England, and unlike cricket, it is not dependent on the weather to play.

"On a Saturday afternoon there would be about 120 different teams playing in the Devon Junior Minor League," said Passmore. "Each team has about 20 players, so you've got about 2,000 kids occupied on a Saturday afternoon. A lot of kids are involved in soccer. You can easily organize teams and leagues. The match is over in 90 minutes and it is not dependent on weather."

**FOR GIRLS**, the most popular activity is majorettes (baton twirling), and field hockey is a favorite in the schools.

"Virtually every sport is offered year-round," said Passmore. "Water sports are obviously seasonal sports."

Walking and hiking are quite popular because we are surrounded by beautiful countryside, the moors. They are basically summer sports."

The only activity Passmore could think of that is not available in Plymouth is ice skating. He said there has been talk of building an ice rink, but it just hasn't happened yet.

"Theoretically, community education in Plymouth is organized on an area team basis," Passmore said. "The city is divided into five areas, each having a community education team working in the area."

"Each team has a person in charge with three to five professional community education tutors, and they organize community education in that patch. Some have specialist jobs, some gauge more on adult education and others are more in touch with youth and community works."

**IN PRACTICE**, however, he said there is not a satisfactory way for someone new to the city to know everything that is offered. "The list of activities is continuously changing. If it is not changing, something would be wrong, wouldn't it?"

This is a sample of organized activities offered to the youths of Plymouth, England, but it still does not suit the needs of all the youths. "There is nothing wrong in itself for someone to say 'I don't want to be organized,'" said Passmore.

"The problem comes when it gets out of hand. Plymouth has a growing problem with those who desire to be vandals. Plymouth has its own share of vandalism actually in itself, and part of what we do is extend community education toward that. It needs a sizable injection of cash."

"But when young people do not wish to be involved in an organized event, you are facing a large number of people who may get bored or are searching for something to do."

# Trustee seeks employee drug testing

Dean Swartzweiler, Plymouth-Canton school board trustee, wants all prospective district employees to be tested for drug use as part of a screening process.

Swartzweiler expressed his opinion during the board comments section of Monday's regular school board meeting.

Reportedly, his statement drew no reaction from other board members.

"I'll let everyone think about it for awhile," Swartzweiler said Tuesday. "It's my opinion that we should have drug testing of new employees. It's becoming a widespread practice."

SWARTZWELTER SAID he is not in favor of testing current employees because the district has a mechanism in place for problems — the Employee Assistance Program, which is conducted away from school sites.

Since the program started in October 1986, about 8.5 percent of the district's 1,400 employees and their families have seen counselors, according to Norm Kee, assistant superintendent for employee relations.

"I haven't formulated an opinion yet about Swartzweiler's idea," Kee said. "I would like to get an attorney's opinion before we make any decision. I would put it in the same category as 'Should we test for AIDS?'"

"If you deny someone employment because they test positive, are you

going to be sued by a civil rights group or an employment rights group?"

Swartzweiler said the school unions would support his proposal because the Employee Assistance Program "was supported by the union leaders."

He added that he has not done research into the mechanics of a drug testing program, nor has he discussed this previously with other board members.

CAROLE RUNDIO, president of the Plymouth-Canton Education As-

sociation and a second grade teacher at Fiegel Elementary, said she is opposed to any drug testing.

"This is the first I've heard of it. I've never heard the subject tossed around before. I believe the MEA (Michigan Education Association) has taken a stand against drug testing on the basis that it is an invasion of privacy."

MEA representatives in Lansing were not available for comment.

Jackie Taylor, president of the Plymouth-Canton Association of Educational Office Personnel, said she has no objection, but would not speak for 95 other employees.

"I don't want to work with anybody who's on drugs," she said.

Janet Bury, chairwoman of the Transportation Employees Association said she would have no objection to the proposal.

"I think it is a good idea and should be done. We deal with children."

"Television is another activity attracting young people. Right or wrong, television and video films attract young people. Some young people are quite satisfied with watching television. It's an activity and it's entertainment for them.

"When they don't want to stay indoors and they don't want to participate in an organized event, they resort to 'hanging out.' It happened when I was young," said Passmore.

"When you are young you want to meet with your friends and you end up meeting on the street corner. I don't know if it is different in the states, but it's not that uncommon here."

Plymouth, England, has never initiated a curfew or closed the streets because it's "not that sort of a problem," said Passmore.

"Young people just want to hang about. In itself, that is not a problem but it does tend to lead to difficulties."

**ONE PROBLEM** that concerns them is the under 18-year-olds who go into pubs. In England, you must be 18 before you can drink alcohol or go into a pub. "Music is a very important part of life to youngsters today," said Passmore. "The disco type is very popular, loud disco music."

Young people, he believes, are looking for a nightlife and the bulk of the entertainment is for adults, and it's in the pubs where those younger than 18 are prohibited.

"The truth is there aren't many places for young people to go. Discos are always very popular. A couple of big clubs do offer under 18 evenings with no alcohol provided, only soft drinks," said Passmore.

"Places are now looking at ways to provide non-alcoholic pubs for youngsters.

"The problem is providing a facility for young people to meet. There are plenty of places for adults to meet; the more popular is in the pubs, obviously.

"When I was a teen, the craze was to hang out in a coffee bar. Young people could get together here. These sorts of places don't exist today."

Regardless of which side of the Atlantic you're on, the problems facing the community of what to offer young people to keep them active and off the streets seems to be the same — funding and interest.

"We need to have a great deal more resources," said Passmore. "Participation can only be done by encouragement and willingness of the individual to participate. Having a program available is one thing. In the end, if people take advantage of it, it's up to them."




# Reps call hearings 'valuable'

Congressmen representing Western Wayne County agree — the recently concluded Iran/Contra hearings served a valid purpose and hold

"The Iran-Contra hearings were worth every nickel they cost and every day they convened," U.S. Rep. Sander Levin, D-Southfield, said.

Levin, who represents Redford Township, blasted the Reagan Administration for misleading Congress about the sale of arms to Iran and diversion of arms sale profits to the Nicaraguan contras.

"What became all to clear was the lack of control and accountability in the White House," Levin said in a prepared statement. "These hearings showed how the utter disregard for law can undermine a presidency."

U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, said the hearings were "a healthy process."

"THEY SHOWED no one is above the law," said Pursell, who represents northern Livonia, as well as Plymouth and Plymouth Township.

If there was a hero, Pursell said, it was Secretary of State George Schultz. Though Schultz has been criticized for going along with Reagan Administration policy he opposed, Pursell praised the secretary's testimony.

"I really was impressed," Pursell said. "He was candid, forthright and honest."

If there was a villain, Pursell said, it was former White House chief of

staff Donald Regan.

"The chief of staff has to serve as the link between the president and the NSC (National Security Council) and Donald Regan didn't do that," Pursell said. "He just wasn't a good communicator. I know I had a hard time getting him to return my telephone calls."

As for the popular controversial Oliver North, Pursell said "Ollie North is the kind of guy I would want next to me in a foxhole. But I think they strayed off the range in some of the things they did."

As for the president himself, Pursell said "I think President Reagan's motives were honorable. It started as an effort to get hostages back. But I'm very uncomfortable with covert operations coming out of the White House."

LEVIN SAID the hearings should teach future presidents that they ignore Congress at their own peril.

"The close of the public hearings left us with contradictory statements key witnesses on at least a dozen key issues," Levin said. "But the hearings did restore some accountability in a situation where Congressional checks and balances had been disdainfully ignored."





# Writer recalls Elvis in Memphis

Elvis Presley was a popular figure in his hometown of Memphis but not always visible to the citizenry.

While I was growing up in Roseville Michigan in the early '60s, Elvis Presley was already established as a hip-swinging, sexy star by the general public.

When my father was transferred to Memphis, Tenn., I could hardly believe my good luck. I envisioned bumping into Elvis, strumming wildly on his guitar, everywhere. (So much for being a kid.) But in Memphis, he was Elvis — a quiet, home-loving boy who adored his mother, worshiped his father and loved his family of aunts and uncles.

Elvis wasn't home much between 1960 and 1962 because he was busy making movies in Hollywood. But once in a while he would slip into town. Unfortunately, I was never in the right place at the right time.

We (myself and my family) became Elvis watchers. Since we had just moved to Memphis, family from Michigan would drive down to visit us and everyone wanted to see Elvis' famous musical gate. We would pile everyone in the car and go to Graceland.

MY SISTER and I would act nonchalant about the whole thing, as if seeing Elvis was an every day occurrence. Actually, we'd never been able to even catch a glimpse of him,

even though we lived just one-half mile from Graceland.

Elvis' Uncle Vester was on "guard duty" at the gate of Graceland. He was a very colorful person and a kind man. He could not allow anyone on the grounds alone, because of souvenir hunters and such, but Vester would do the next best thing.

He would drive the fans up to the front of the fabulous estate in the famous pink and white jeep which was a much a part of the friendly atmosphere as Uncle Vester. I remember the huge lion statues guarding the entrance of the house. Vester would then take everyone's cameras and snap pictures for them, then drive back to the gate, at no charge. It was obvious that he really loved his job.

When Elvis was home (which wasn't very often), he'd invite the neighborhood kids in to play touch football in his back yard, which was a large as a real football field.

AT CHRISTMAS time, Graceland was elaborately adorned with decorations. On the front lawn near the road sat a huge wooden Santa and sleigh being pulled by reindeer.

In the nearby trees hung a brightly lit sign large enough to illuminate the entire area. It read, "Merry Christmas Ya'll — Love Elvis." I still remember my father taking us

for a ride to see the enormous greeting card from Elvis to his adoring fans.

One summer morning, about 8 a.m., my mom and I were stopped at the signal light in front of Graceland. Pulling out of the Graceland gate was a white Cadillac convertible towing a boat. As it went past us a very good looking young man smiled at us and waved. He looked just like Elvis and he had a pretty girl at his side.

She was wearing sun glasses and a head scarf. Surely it wasn't Elvis pulling a boat.

We parked the car and went over to the guard hut. My mom said to Uncle Vester, "I thought that might have been Elvis pulling out a few minutes ago, but that man's hair was brown and Elvis has black hair."

Uncle Vester smiled and replied in his cool southern drawl, "Yep. It was Elvis all right. The studio just shoe blacks his hair for the movies."

He was headed for McKellar lake, accompanied by Stella Stevens.

That was the first and last time we saw Elvis.

Because Elvis was my neighbor and someone that was a large part of my childhood, I felt deep personal loss when he died. In this, the 10th year anniversary of the passing of a living legend, I remember "Elvis."

# is Bush backers foresee Kemp delegate plot

AP — The Jack Kemp presidential campaign is trying to take over the Michigan GOP delegate selection process by excluding elected officials and former candidates from next year's county conventions, backers of Vice President George Bush are claiming.

Kemp campaign officials deny the allegation. They say they haven't adopted an official position yet on who can be seated as delegates at the county conventions. County and congressional district conventions will elect delegates to the state convention. The state convention, in turn, selects 77 delegates to the party's national convention.

ONE BUSH supporter, Berrien County Prosecutor Paul Maloney, said the Kemp camp is trying to control the delegate selection process by excluding elected officials and unsuccessful GOP nominees for office.

Maloney is spearheading a letter-writing campaign aimed at blocking what he describes as an effort by Kemp backers "to lock party officials and nominees out of the presidential selection process." The letters were mailed earlier

this month to 1,200 elected GOP officeholders and past nominees to gain their support.

Maloney also has sent a letter to Kemp asking the New York congressman "to override your state leadership" on the delegate participation matter.

TRADITIONALLY, GOP officeholders and unsuccessful nominees for state and county offices automatically are included as at-large delegates at the county conventions, according to Maloney and other Bush backers.

He said Spencer Abraham, state Republican chairman, had advised those people last year that they were not required to run as precinct delegates because of their "at-large status under the party rules."

But the Kemp backers want to allow only those elected as delegates during the gubernatorial primary election last Aug. 5 to vote at the county conventions, said Maloney, who serves on the Republican State Committee.

He contends the Kemp backers want to exclude the at-large dele-

gates because the majority of them support Bush.

"MY POSITION is I recruited candidates (to run for office last year) and at the time I recruited them, I told them they did not have to run as delegates," said Larrain Thomas, co-chairman of Kemp's Michigan campaign and first vice chairman of the state Republican Committee.

Thomas, of Detroit, said the Kemp campaign hasn't adopted an official position, but believes it will be that at-large delegates should be seated

at the county conventions.

Jeff Evans, Kemp Michigan campaign regional field representative, echoed Thomas's comments. He added there is an unresolved question concerning interpretation of state law over who can legally attend the county conventions.

John Long, executive director of the George Bush for President Michigan campaign, charged that at a June meeting of representatives of the presidential candidates, the Kemp negotiators were emphatic that only the elected precinct delegates should participate at the coun-

ty conventions.

"If the Kemp campaign has reversed its decision, we would welcome that," Long said. "What it appears is that the Maloney letter has had a significant impact on the Kemp campaign."

BACKERS OF Pat Robertson, the television evangelist, also are involved in the dispute.

"We have an alliance with the

Kemp people, and depending on what state law says on the subject, my inclination is to support the alliance," said Harry Veryser of Mount Clemens.

Maloney said the Republican State Committee will decide in August or September who will be allowed to participate in the county conventions. Veryser said 70 percent of the state committee members are backers of Robertson or Kemp.

## Willow run will expand

Expansion is expected to begin this month at Willow Run Airport. Three new hangars, with space for 11 aircraft, will be added at the Wayne County-owned airport. Willow Run, in Van Buren Township, is used for cargo flights. The \$750,000 building project is

privately financed by Butler Aviation, which operates out of Willow Run and Detroit Metropolitan Wayne County Airport, is building the hangars.

Willow Run is also resurfacing its main airplane taxiway.

# Job, school training is offered

Two local anti-unemployment programs will soon begin fall classes. Wayne/Westland Schools has openings for 150 unemployed adults in job training classes at its William D. Ford Vocational/Technical Center, 36105 Marquette, Westland.

In another program, Schoolcraft College seeks 30 disadvantaged students for its skill-boosting "Operation: College" classes.

Both programs are free.

THE Wayne/Westland program is designed for laid-off workers, workers with limited job skills,

housewives entering the job market and welfare recipients.

"We look at two things to determine eligibility: income for the past six months and number of people in the family," job placement specialist Patricia Gresock said.

Participants are taught job skills, including how to develop a positive work attitude.

"We try to tell them what an employer will be looking for," Gresock said.

The state-financed program is open to people 18 and over who live in Livonia, Westland, Garden City,

Plymouth and Redford, Canton and Plymouth townships.

**JOB SPECIALISTS** help participants find jobs.

"It might not be exactly the job they're looking for, but we do try to find them something related," Gresock said. "If they're happy with the job, fine. But sometimes they want to continue attending classes to get a better job. And sometimes the employer tells them to continue the classes."

Some 80 percent of program participants find jobs, Gresock said.

Classes include: accounting and computing, auto body repair, auto mechanics, building maintenance, building trade skills, electronics, graphic arts, health occupations, heating and air conditioning repair, media productions, medical assistant training, photo-typesetting, print technology, restaurant occupations and secretarial skills. Openings in each class are limited.

Classes begin in early September. Persons interested in attending can call 595-2314.

**SCHOOLCRAFT COLLEGE'S** "Project: College Bound" is designed to help welfare recipients, persons who didn't complete high school and persons who earned a high school grade point average below 2.0 on a four-point scale. Applicants will be tested on their study skills before being admitted.

The program is open to area residents who meet qualifications. Classes will be offered at the main campus, 18600 Haggerty, Livonia and at the Radcliff Center, 1751 Radcliff, Garden City.

Persons interested in attending can call Eupizi at 591-6400, Ext. 494.

The program is a joint venture involving Schoolcraft and Growth Works Inc., a private consulting firm based in Plymouth. It is financed through a Michigan Department of Education grant.

# Joblessness drops

(AP) — Summer jobs contributed to a decline in Michigan's unemployment in July, when joblessness fell to 8.3 percent from 8.6 percent in June.

The number of unemployed workers seeking jobs fell by 15,000 in July, to 374,000, while the number of workers holding jobs rose by 5,000, to 4,129,000, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported. All figures are seasonally adjusted.

The Michigan Employment Security Commission attributed the increase in the number of employed largely to summer jobs. The decrease in the number of unemployed was the result of the departure from the job market of those who were unsuccessful in finding summer work, the MESC said.

While Michigan's unemployment rate was the lowest for July since 1979, when it was 7.2 percent, the rate equaled the state average for state's rate remained well above the national average of 6 percent, which was the lowest national rate in a

decade.

In fact, among the nation's most populous states Michigan and Texas tied for the No. 1 spot with the highest unemployment rate. Both states' unemployment rates were well above that of Illinois which ranked third with a 7.3 percent seasonally adjusted rate.

Numerous short-term auto factory layoffs for model changeovers during July were offset by job gains in other areas including the construction and service industries, the MESC reported.

Ohio where General Motors Corp. is closing plants, was fourth at 7.1 percent.

In Michigan, the number of people working in the state rose to its highest level since March, when there were 4,138,000 people with jobs.

Michigan's July unemployment rate equaled the state average for the year so far, but the number of unemployed workers was 2,833 above the year's average of 371,187.





## Let common sense and peace prevail

SOMETIMES the best resource a government has is common sense.

Common sense probably is the best approach that can be taken to the question of allowing or disallowing monuments in Kellogg Park.

The issue arose when some anti-nuke marchers (Michigan Peace March for Global Nuclear Disarmament) came into town to hold a peace rally in the park. The march and the rally was well organized and very worthwhile. The confusion came when the group decided to erect a peace monument in Kellogg Park.

Permission was given to put the monument up but it was not clear between the marchers/ralliers and city whether the peace pole was to be a permanent fixture or remain in place for a short time.

CONFUSION resulted. But that's all right.

Confusion is a healthy byproduct of a democracy. Once we become so efficient that confusion is eliminated we likely will find ourselves living in an autocratic society.

The city commission could turn the issue over to its lawyers and ask for establishment of a policy on handling requests for monuments in the park. Or bureaucracy could be expanded with creation of a monument review committee, which could screen appropriateness, aesthetics, size, maintenance requirements, etc. of all monument requests.

Or the city commission could leave the matter in the hands of its administration and suggest that common sense be exercised.

No one wants a number of monuments in the park. Without common sense, the park quickly will look like a cemetery. Yet there has not been that many requests for monuments in Kellogg Park. As Mayor William L. Robinson comments, "One pole certainly isn't going to destroy the city's image. It's a symbol of something everyone wants."

In fact, the Veterans Memorial

Monument is the only one in the park and has been for years. There are memorials. The memorial bricks in the sidewalk on the west side of the park have been there for years. The beautiful clock on the Main Street side of the park also stands as a memorial. A commemorative "landmark" plaque also is located in Kellogg Park. None of these memorials, though, are monuments and all were approved by city commission.

THE PEACE POLE is an impressive but simple monument with a universally accepted sentiment ("Let There Be Peace on Earth") expressed in four languages.

No one has objected to the monument's message.

The concern is that acceptance of the peace pole may set a precedent and the city won't be able to deny other requests for monuments.


That concern is a moot point because, so far, there are no other requests and the chance of a serious request being made in the near future doesn't seem great. A service club could ask to build a second flag pole, or another clock. Or maybe the C&O shouldn't operate a railroad line through town because someone else may want to.

Better not to be concerned.

The point is that the park, as public property, is there for the enjoyment of everyone. While it is for all, no single individual has a greater claim than another. As public property, it becomes the city's responsibility to decide what will and will not be located in Kellogg Park.

City government has the right to approve or deny requests for use of the park, whether it be for concerts, dinners, memorials or monuments. If the city has the right to approve use, it clearly has the right to deny. If there is no discrimination based on age, sex, nationality, race, belief, etc., then a problem does not exist and the city can defend its right to control public property.

The monument is a meaningful addition to Kellogg Park. Let reason prevail and common sense rule.



## Everything has changed, except for the challenge

So this is what an anniversary feels like.

You see, 15 years ago this month, I was hired as a reporter for this newspaper.

Many of you already know how quickly time passes. I'm just catching on. It's fascinating.

None of it is the same — the newspaper, the cities, the buildings, the neighborhoods, the highways.

People look, talk, live and eat differently. It's spooky. But it's fun, watching it all change.

In 1972, the Vietnam War was still the focus of American life. The Watergate scandal was yet to come. None of us ever had heard of Jimmy Carter. Gerald Ford was just another congressman contemplating retirement. And certainly, a movie actor never would become president, we told ourselves.

The kids rode their horses to downtown Farmington on warm summer evenings. Canton was a farm community; Schoolcraft was a tree-lined boulevard; and I-275 was just a rendering on a drawing board.

Rochester was a small community

"up north" someplace. The map of Troy told a story of open spaces and farms, and a shopper in downtown Birmingham could easily find a place to park.

And Sammy Lieberman hosted a thriving Raleigh House on Telegraph in Southfield.

The sites for the mega-shopping centers, Fairlane and Twelve Oaks, were wooded fields. You could drive the length of Northwestern Highway in Farmington Township and never see an office building.

The Detroit Lions called Tiger Stadium home; the Red Wings played in Olympia; and nobody associated with pizza owned a sports franchise.

The tallest building in downtown Detroit was the Penobscot.

Certainly, 15 years doesn't seem like a long time ago — but it is.

The Observer Newspapers Inc. was a fledgling corporation, and the Birmingham Eccentric was a long-held tradition. Molding the two into one was just a whispered rumor.

We all worked on manual typewriters, with paste pots at hand. The glassed-in, temperature-controlled

computer room stood nearly empty, a looming precursor.

The Observer's chief editor was a character out of "The Front Page," a gruff old fellow with a heart of gold. He would holler and rip your copy in two. Fifteen minutes later, he would give you a wink and loan you 20 bucks for the weekend.

And just about everybody smoked — cigars, cigarettes, pipes.

I had signed on for a year, I told myself. Then I'd move on to another challenge.

But the challenge was here. And, you know, the challenge still is here.

I love the changes the years bring. It's good, it's exciting, and it's us.

Now bring on the next 15 years.

## City skyscraper is falcon's crest

WE HAD a great Saturday morning in downtown Detroit. We saw the peregrine falcons and rode the new People Mover.

The young falcons were on top of one tower of the Guardian Building, the elegant orange bank building of the 1920s, overlooking Congress Street. From the ground, you can see the 2-by-4s that serve as their perches extending over the roof.

From the second tower, 40 stories up, you look down at their hacking box and perch. Behind them is the modern American Natural Resources Building, and beyond that are Cobo Hall and the swift-flowing Detroit River.

Jarrette, a veterinary technician student from Macomb Community College, was on the job, observing the young raptors and logging their activities by the minute.

NOW IS the time to observe them, said Paul Ganz, the PR guy from Michigan Consolidated Gas Co., because the birds are old enough to fly, but too young to hunt for themselves.

Once they can hunt, Jarrette said, they'll disperse, and it will be difficult to view them in any one spot. Audubon-type volunteers observe from other buildings and keep in touch with Jarrette by radio.

Meanwhile, they come back to the Guardian Building hacking box, where attendants feed them eight quail and cowbirds a day. Jarrette told us they really devour the quail.

MichCon owns the Guardian Building, and its brass kicked in heavily to the state's non-game wildlife fund, so Ganz, a Redford Township resident, acquired the delightful job of flacking for the falcons.

One day he saw two grappling falcons in mid-air, playing war games, as kids will, in preparation for the day when they will hunt for themselves.

I suspect Paul pays more visits to the tower than the job really requires. But this is a once-in-a-lifetime wildlife event, and it's rare that a guy gets to

Tom's \$2 win ticket at Ladbroke DRC returned \$38.60 and immediately I realized that here is a true scholar who reminds me of the late Paul Chandler, an extraordinary newspaperman and state legislator.

Any sensible handicapper likes to have some reason for betting a horse other than the colors of a jockey's silks or, as Tom put it, wagering on "Galaxian" because your favorite show is Star Trek."

CHANDLER USED to say to the

touts, "Tell me a story." If he thought the reasoning why a certain beast would win was any good, off to the windows he'd go. He understood the language of the racing form just as well as Henderson does, but like all race goers knew that sometimes Lady Luck would have her way and hunch bets should not be scorned.

Two true stories involving a character who was one of Paul's good friends will demonstrate how lightning occasionally strikes a race track gambler in mysterious ways.

This fellow was a daily patron of the

oval who believed in the inevitability of number combinations. Every day he clipped the results from the newspapers and pasted them into what he called his chart book. In due time, it dawned on him that the 9-5 daily double combination had not come up at any Detroit track in two years.

THE DISCOVERY was made when there were only three days remaining in the autumn thoroughbred meeting at Hazel Park. But he had a problem. For family reasons, he had to be out of town the entire period.

Selecting an honest friend among the turf regulars, he counted out the necessary funds to cover \$5 wagers on the 9-5 for each of those days and crossed his fingers.

When he returned from his trip there was a call from the errand boy who was absolutely aghast and more than a little teed off because the bettor had not shared his "inside information." You see, the 9-5 had scored, paying \$880 for \$2.

The same astute gentleman also confirmed in a supposedly true yarn, which neither Chandler nor I had any reason to question, how sentiment sometimes can be rewarding. This time the setting was at Aqueduct in New York City.

SIMPLY BECAUSE he felt a kinship to the horse's name, he decided to back Figueroa Bob although, as post time neared, the mount never was less than 35-1.

Hastening to make his contribution, he joined the line at the \$5 win window but had dallied at the bar so long the length of the line made it apparent he would be shut out — an unspeakable sin at any odds.

He did the only intelligent thing, sidling over where the traffic was thinner — to the \$50 window. To win, of course. Came the race and, you guessed it, there was Figueroa Bob out there winging all alone when they hit the wire.

THERE'S AN old adage which ad-

vises, "You can beat a race but you can't beat the races." Henderson put it succinctly in this one paragraph.

"If we really could synthesize the art of picking horses into a few paragraphs, do you think we'd be working on Street Scene? No, we'd be at the track, drinking a beer and hollering for the six horse. We wouldn't tell you how to win and lower our odds. In fact, we wouldn't tell you anything at all, we'd be out there winning."

The three largest payoffs in Michigan parimutuel history, ranging up to \$852,000 and change, have come this season at DRC in what's called the supertrifecta. This requires picking the first three finishers in proper order in the fourth race and the top four in proper order in the sixth.

I know exactly the winning numbers I'll play when the carryover pot hits a million, but will I share them with you? Of course not. I won't even tell Henderson.







## Fair offers fun for all

**T**HE CANTON Historical Museum will be the site of some old-fashioned summer fun this weekend.

The Canton Historical Society will present its fourth annual "Ice Cream Social and Arts and Crafts Show" from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 15-16. The festivities will be held at the museum, 1150 S. Canton Center Road at Proctor, next to the Township Administration Building.

The two-day event will include a spinning demonstration and a quilt display. A team of horses or a tractor with a hay wagon will be used to give rides to "kids" young, old and in between.

"We have around 30 craftspeople this year," said Melissa McLaughlin, fair director. Baskets, wood crafts, folk art, sweatshirt designs and "just the whole hall of wax" will be featured.

The Cloverdale ice cream at the fair will be used for cones, sundaes and "the best banana splits in the world," said McLaughlin, a Canton resident. Hot dogs and cold drinks will also be available. The food will be in a tent set up outside of the museum.

WORK ON the fair started last November; it takes almost a year to work out all the details. This is the fourth year for the event.

"A lot of our craftspeople do come back year after year because they do

have a good time," the fair director said.

The quilt display at the museum will include a number of colorful quilts, many of which belong to McLaughlin and her family.

One of the quilts, "Grandmother's Fan," is most likely the oldest one on display, dating back to the early 1900s, she said. A baby's quilt, "Sunbonnet Sue," is probably about 60 years old.

One of the quilts on display, "Colonial Sampler," was made for McLaughlin by her grandmother.

At the time the older quilts were made, they were designed to be functional, McLaughlin said.

"Today, they're considered an art form." There's a great deal of interest in quilts these days, both among men and among women, she said.

"So it's something I think everybody can enjoy." Quilts have also gone up rapidly in value.

The quilts will be left on display at the museum after the "Ice Cream Social and Arts and Crafts Show."

McLaughlin expects some 800 to 1,000 people to attend the weekend event. Each year, the fair's become more well-known and has attracted more people.

"We have something for everybody to enjoy," she said. "We do have a really nice time."

## Reading

### Programs expand kids' horizons

**I**F YOU were to stack up all of the books Plymouth-Canton children read in this summer's library reading programs, those tomes probably wouldn't reach all the way to the moon.

The stack of books would, however, cover a considerable distance closer to home. The books read during the summer have allowed area youngsters to travel to the ends of the earth — and even beyond.

The summer reading programs at the Canton Public Library and at the Dunning-Hough Library in Plymouth attracted plenty of readers this year.

In Canton, 803 youngsters participated in the summer reading club for children in first through eighth grades. An additional 293 preschool children participated in the "Read to Me" program.

"It went very well," said Judy Teachworth, department head for children's services at the Canton Public Library. "All the programs were well-attended."

"It ran smoothly and it was a lot of fun. There were a lot of kids here, so it was a success."

AT THE Dunning-Hough Library, 392 children participated in the program for children ages 6 to 14. That's an increase of 25 percent from last year.

"It was excellent," said Mary Lou Curtin, children's librarian. "I was more than pleased with that."

Children participating in the Dunning-Hough summer reading program signed contracts stating how many books they would read during the six-week program. They were required to read at least three books.

At the Dunning-Hough Library, 199 children fulfilled their contracts. More than 2,634 books were read by children participating in this summer's program, Curtin said.

"We were very pleased with it. It's difficult sometimes for the kids to get in and complete their contracts."

The summer reading programs for school-age youngsters included a variety of fun-filled activity sessions. At the Canton Public Library, a mime performance got things


At both libraries, staff members are already planning next year's program.

"Sports books, of course, are always popular," said Mary Lou Curtin, children's librarian. Mysteries were also popular choices, as were


the books written by Judy Blume.

"Anything she writes is very popular," Curtin said.


The Dunning-Hough Library program participants seemed to prefer paperbacks to hard-cover books, possibly because paperbacks are easier to carry, she said.

"That series is extremely popular," Curtin said.




Children's librarian Mary Lou Curtin admires the wall hanging on display at the Dunning-Hough Library.



## These two educators are trading places

Owein Ieuan Davies isn't impressed by the way of life displayed on such U.S. television shows as "Dynasty" and "Dallas."  
"It's hideous, absolutely hideous," Davies said in describing the antics of J.R. Ewing and his ilk.  
Davies, a sociology professor at Norwich City College in England, is impressed with the real-life people

he's met in the U.S. He's been particularly impressed by the kindness, hospitality and openness he's found among Americans.  
Davies, 49, is participating in the Fulbright Teacher Exchange Program during the 1987-88 school year. He's left his duties teaching sociology and philosophy at Norwich City College; for the next year, he'll be teaching psychology and philosophy at Plymouth Canton High School.  
Dr. Stephen Williams, a social

studies teacher at Plymouth Canton, is exchanging teaching duties with Davies. Williams will teach psychology and sociology courses at Norwich City College during the 1987-88 school year.

FOR WILLIAMS, the year-long program provides a great opportunity to experience another culture and another educational system. He's going over to England with certain assumptions about what he'll find.

"I expect to have those assumptions tested," Williams said.  
The two educators have also exchanged homes. Williams will live in Norwich and Davies will live in Detroit's Rosedale Park.  
The educators attended an orientation session held at Georgetown University in Washington, D.C. Davies felt as if he'd met a kindred spirit at the orientation; within 15 minutes, he and Williams were talking on the same wavelength.

"I really am incredibly surprised at the matching process," Davies said during an interview earlier this week.

Williams, 38, believes Davies will enjoy teaching American students.  
"I think he'll find them honest and hard-working," Davies will also benefit from working with the Plymouth Canton staff, Williams said.

Davies is familiar with the American educational system in theory, he's looking forward to experiencing it first-hand. His participation in the Fulbright program marks his first time in the U.S.

THE TEACHING profession has come under attack in England, Davies said. He's found a great deal of optimism in the U.S. educational system, including optimism among educators at the Georgetown University orientation session.

"And I became more and more excited at this prospect," Davies has met a few of the high school students here.

"And I thought the students were charming. I can see I'm going to enjoy this year."

Norwich City College is in some ways similar to a community college in the U.S., Davies said. The college offers a mixture of courses, including several degree programs in such areas as social work or catering and hotel management.

One of the aims of the college is to provide opportunities for people with an inadequate secondary education, Davies said. Among the students there are many women who have had their formal education interrupted by family responsibilities.

Attending school is compulsory in England up to the age of 16, Davies said. The students at Norwich City College range in age from 16 to 70, some attend evening classes.

Davies has generally found that the American educational system is more open and is more highly valued

as a part of the democratic system. He's here to test that assumption "and hopefully to learn from it I think that's going to be the case."

HE'S ALSO heard that U.S. students are very much concerned about getting good grades, but isn't convinced that's an accurate assessment.

"I actually don't believe this is the case."

Before Davies left England, some of his colleagues left newspaper clippings on his desk. Those clippings had to do with the problems of the U.S. schools and the Detroit schools in particular.

"Stephen (Williams) did in fact tell me that I should not worry so much," Davies said. During their year in the Fulbright Teacher Exchange Program, the two educators

intend to write to each other and to talk on the phone.

Plymouth Canton teacher Williams has taken two previous trips to England. He'll travel to Norwich with his wife, Susanne Spiegel. They're scheduled to leave for England this week.

The courses Williams will teach at Norwich City College are known as "A-levels." They're introductory level courses that are broad in scope and comprehensive. His psychology teaching will focus on behaviorism and cognitive development.

Williams received his Ph.D. from the University of Michigan in 1968. He did his dissertation on IQ testing and curriculum tracking and was honored by U-M's School of Education for having written an outstanding dissertation.

# Area Muslims provide insight on Mecca riots

MUSLIM LEADERS in metropolitan Detroit are "shocked" and "saddened" over recent riots in Mecca, Saudi Arabia, that claimed the lives of 402 religious pilgrims.

Why to argue? Why to fight? asked Dr. Syed S.A. Razvi about the incident. Razvi is founder of the Monotheistic Congregation of West-ern Suburbs in Farmington Hills.

The pilgrims were killed earlier this month during the annual religious pilgrimage (Hajj) to Islam's most holy city, Mecca, a journey all faithful Muslims attempt at least once in a lifetime.

Saudi authorities said the dead were trampled or killed by rioters during a political demonstration staged by Iranian Shiites that turned violent.

Tehran has charged that Iranians were gunned down by Saudi police during a peaceful demonstration that had been approved by Saudi authorities. Nearly 300 Iranians were killed and another 650 were hospitalized. Tehran also has charged that the incident was incited by the United States.

"There was no need to shed human blood or to sacrifice each other" regardless of what political motives might have been involved, Razvi said.


Imam Mohamad Jawad Chirri, leader of Detroit's largest Shiite Muslim sect, said the entire incident in Mecca could have been avoided if Saudi authorities had denied the "troublemakers" visas into the country or if a permit had not been issued allowing the demonstration.

Such permits, he added, have been issued during Hajj the past seven or so years, since the formation of the Iranian Islamic Republic.

"PEACEFUL DEMONSTRATIONS have been every year (since 1980). I was there. I saw it myself," said Joe Berry, a Shiite Muslim who is director of the Islamic Institute of Knowledge in Dearborn.

Berry performed Hajj or made his religious pilgrimage to Mecca in 1985. It was then he said he witnessed a peaceful demonstration by Iranian Shiites. He said the demonstrators had been issued a permit by Saudi authorities.

"America is the scapegoat. All over the world it is the same, making America the scapegoat," Razvi, of Southfield, said.



"To place blame is unscientific. I see things scientifically, not emotionally," Razvi added. Razvi is a medical researcher under the auspices of the federal government and Wayne State University.

As a Sunni Muslim, Razvi said he finds himself in a unique position to understand both the Saudis who are Sunni and the Iranians who are primarily Shiite.

He is the son of Arab parents from Dammam, a town in central Saudi Arabia, but for years he lived and worked in Iran. He is fluent in both Arabic and Farsi, the language spoken in Iran.

Historically, Sunni and Shiite Muslims have differed over the matter of religious leaders or imams. Shiite's believe imams are direct descendants of the Prophet Mohammed. Sunni religious leaders come from the community.

RAZVI HAS A long history of moderation. The Monotheistic Congregation he founded seven years ago in Westland brings Muslims, Christians and Jews together to discuss "mutually interesting topics."

"Our basic ideology is to minimize animosity and to produce understanding."

While interning at Harper Hospital in Detroit, Razvi founded the Muslim Student Association in 1963 and four years later he founded a branch of the group while conducting cancer research in New York.

"Right away when I came to the United States I noticed people did not understand Islam. So I started this group," he concluded.

Members of the local Muslim community meet at 7:30 p.m. Fridays at Bryant Elementary School in Livonia.

### People Mover has a personal touch

I RODE the People Mover in its first week of operation. I took a group of youths with me. A couple of the group decided not to go because we would have to travel into Detroit. I said that the experience would be fun and it would be safe, but this didn't overcome their and their parents' dislike of Detroit.

The ride was free, so the trains were packed. The best part of the ride was not just the views of the river and the streets, but the way the people acted.

People were helping each other in and out of cars. People were talking to each other. People were tolerant of the crowding, especially for those entering and leaving the trains. This is my lasting impression of this experience: that the people were helpful and caring towards each other.

THIS IS the first time I have used public transportation in Detroit in more than 20 years. I have just returned from Europe where we rode subways and buses and trams in three cities. Detroit and its satellite towns have suffered from this lack of rapid transit. We have paid the cost in terms of pollution and cost of vehicle use. The larger cost has been a spiritual and moral cost; separating people from people.

People get to know people in a different way in a large city than in a small town. I have lived in both. Part of the importance of living in a large city and its suburbs is to see people's faces. A city is a collection of many kinds and types. Without an effective mass transit system, we miss experiencing this fact.

In the suburbs, children grow up seeing only a few faces. They become uneasy with the unfamiliar. They have never experienced unfamiliar-looking people who show care and concern for others.

whole world. People who are quite different can be as loving as you and me. When we deal with people the world is not as bad as it sometimes seems.

I was traveling in Czechoslovakia this summer when a parent explained that most of the young people in that country do not mature according to their age because they are not allowed to travel.

"They do not easily form their own identities because they are not allowed to travel among people different from themselves," he explained.

We cannot appreciate either ourselves or others until we have mingled with a mixture of the world. A close friend lives in New York City. His children have traveled on mass transit all their lives. They understand the routes and the dangers to avoid.

Their world is one in which they constantly encounter diversity. They have learned to relate to people who are quite different from themselves. They have discovered that love, care and human dignity come irrespective of color, social status and language. This is a most valuable lesson.


Someone has coined the question: "If God is our Father, are we not all brothers and sisters?" It is a good question to contemplate. In a practical sense, we need to learn this from looking into the faces of people who are quite different from us.

**F**ROM 8:30 A.M. to 4:30 p.m. weekdays, Jerry McKenzie is a cop — a detective, to keep the facts straight. By day, he works for the Farmington Hills Police Department.

Nights and weekends he is a jazz drummer around town and plays backup when visiting artists come to Meadow Brook, Pine Knob and Ford Auditorium. He also plays an occasional wedding or bar mitzvah.

McKenzie has been with the Farmington Hills Police Department for 18 years and did a stint years ago with the Detroit police. On the job, he wears a business suit, what he calls "soft clothes."



### Store stocks tools for entrepreneurs

Almost everyone at one time or another has considered starting their own business. But there is a big gap between thinking about the perfect business and implementing the dream.

Ruth Probst, owner and founder of the Start a Business Store in Troy, tries to help aspiring business owners get started.

"The company was started out of a need that existed for people to know how to get started in business," Probst said. "There is a missing link between thinking about getting into business and actually doing it."

Probst founded the Start A Business Store in April 1986 and has a licensing agreement with Entrepreneur Magazine to sell its published material. The store, at 2080 W. Big Beaver, has manuals on just about every kind of business.

"Instead of going into consulting, I looked around for a tool for people," Probst said. "The manuals were perfect for that."

The manuals, which range from \$20 to \$60, deal with every facet of buying, starting or successfully operating an existing business. They address such concerns as choosing the best opportunity, market potential, business plans, taxes, insurance and available financing, to name a few.

gan with a licensing agreement from Entrepreneur," she said. "There are 18 other businesses with an agreement across the country."

In helping others start a business, Probst seems to have found her niche.

"We are having great success with the business," she said. "It is doing everything we projected it would do."

Probst has had plenty of business experience as the former owner of two restaurants and a liquor store. She also worked for a business broker selling businesses.

"I was in two of the toughest businesses, the liquor store and restaurant business," she said. "I made application of that experience. I have made mistakes and learned from them."

Probst says it is not by chance that she is in this business. She found the criteria she wanted for her own

business and then went about getting into it.

She read the generic manuals published by Entrepreneur and had a business plan prior to launching the project.

Everything was thought out and planned right down to the location she chose.

"I WANTED TO be in Troy because there are a lot of discontented people working for big business that would like to get out on their own," she said.

The store offers motivational tapes and books, weekly workshops and seminars, franchises and a bi-monthly newsletter that keeps people informed about the happenings in

the business community around them.

A full schedule of workshops, costing \$20-\$50, will start again in the fall, said Probst. There are workshops on start-up basics and in helping people choose the right business.

There is also an entrepreneurial test that helps people evaluate themselves as potential business owners. The test is offered as part of a workshop that costs \$20 or can be bought for at-home use for \$5.

Probst says a major problem with starting a business is that people only see the positive aspects of the business they are considering.

"THEY ARE idealistic, only looking at the good things," she said.

"They are making heart decisions."

Probst says one vital question to ask yourself when considering a particular business is "what is the worst thing that could happen" and then go from there in making a decision.

She says the failure rate for new businesses is 92 percent.

Probst advocates any kind of educational experience or tool regarding small business.

"I guess I would say to people that knowledge is power. The more you know, the better off you will be," she said.

"We sell franchises, and it developed from a need of the people looking at business opportunities," she said. "It is the perfect complement to the Start a Business Store."

## Planning is the key to success

Half the of all new businesses started will fail in one year.

Bryan A. Becker of Ernst & Whinney believes many businesses could avoid failure by following some basic guidelines.

"I regularly encounter people with a solid new business or product idea they believe will be a 'winner' on its own merits," Becker said. "All too often, though, the person lacks a thorough knowledge of the dynamics of the marketplace and ends up with a great product and no money."

1. Ensure that the venture is properly capitalized.

2. Develop a network of capable outside advisers such as accountants, lawyers and bankers.

3. Select a business with which you are familiar, at which you will enjoy working, and which has a reasonable likelihood of success.

4. Prepare a comprehensive business plan to guide you. Update it annually.

5. Identify the key management positions and quantify the attributes a likely candidate would possess.

6. Pay close attention to cash flow.

7. Select a business structure that will enable you to operate efficiently and minimize personal liability and taxes.

8. Pay close attention to the marketing side of your business.

9. Identify your competitive advantages and disadvantages.

10. Identify those areas where critical problems are most likely to occur and identify alternative strategies to prevent such problems — and minimize damage if they occur.

Becker's department assists new businesses sort through government regulations and elements of marketing to chart a successful future.

## 2-month wait for Stoddard sentence

Stanford C. Stoddard is awaiting sentencing — perhaps in October — after his conviction by a federal jury on a single count of misapplying \$175,000 in funds of the Michigan National Corp.

Stoddard, 56, of Birmingham was glum and silent as the jury Monday returned a guilty verdict after five days of deliberation in a criminal case involving his ownership of a downtown Jackson building leased to an MNC subsidiary bank.

"I pleaded not guilty to any of this," said Stoddard, who from 1971 to 1984 was chairman of MNC, the bank holding company founded by his father. "A lot of people are making a lot of suppositions," he said in an interview only hours prior to the jury verdict.

DEFENSE ATTORNEY Neil H. Fink couldn't be reached for comment or confirmation of the report that he intends to appeal.

Assistant U.S. attorney James C. Mitchell, who prosecuted the case, was out of his office. No one in the Justice Department or Federal Bureau of Investigation would talk about the celebrated case that brought down the state's most famous banker.

Stoddard faces up to five years in prison and a fine when sentenced by Judge Anna Diggs Taylor. Unless and until his conviction is overturned on appeal, he is barred from re-entering banking.

Meanwhile, Stoddard awaits the outcome — expected in another month — of an administrative law judge's hearing on whether he should be barred from banking for life for misusing bank funds on his homes, family weddings and Mormon church projects.

That case was brought by the Comptroller of the Currency, regulator of national banks, and was heard in Ann Arbor last fall. Presiding was Thomas Jones, an administrative law judge who normally heard Social Security cases in Grand Rapids. In June, Jones transferred to a position in Maine and is unavailable for comment.

IN THIS MONTH'S trial, Stoddard was accused of misapplying funds in a Jackson lease. A Southfield attorney, Raymond Zweig, in 1981 bought a three-story building at 105 E. Michigan from an estate and leased it to Michigan Bank-Midwest.

Zweig sold the building 14 months later to Amberly Properties, in which Stoddard was a partner. Meanwhile, MNC acquired Michigan Bank-Midwest.

In a telephone interview, Stoddard, who didn't testify in the trial, said prosecutors arrived at the \$175,000 number by extending "a lease which doesn't exist on a property no longer occupied." He said the partnership owned it 20 months and then gave it to the bank. "The lease disappeared when the bank took the property back," he said.

"The fairness of the rent is the issue," he said. "But it's not a misapplication of bank funds by Stanford Stoddard if it's a fair price." He said Zweig negotiated the lease, which Amberly Properties inherited when it bought the building from Zweig.

PROSECUTORS charged the rent amounted to \$7 a square foot for the ground floor vs. the going rate of \$2.50 to \$3.

Stoddard argued that it was a package deal for all three floors; that the rent on the nearly 10,000-square-foot building was \$27,000, which figures out to only \$2.70 per square foot; that the prosecution was wrong in concentrating on first-floor numbers; and that other ground floor rentals were \$5-\$8 a square foot.

Stoddard's witnesses calculated \$32,670, \$27,769 and \$24,750 as proper rents for such a building. He went into great detail to demonstrate that there were proper business judgments.

Stoddard said all leases involving directors were listed in a 1986 proxy statement to shareholders and weren't secret deals. "Is that a secret? I don't think so," he said.

The U.S. attorney said there was a lack of "arm's-length bargaining" over the lease and that Zweig was "a straw man" between the bank and Stoddard. Mitchell said Stoddard was in "an impossible conflict of interest" and out to enrich himself.

# Schlumberger should rebound

Could you tell me if Schlumberger Ltd. is a good stock and if I should continue to hold it? I received quite a few shares as an inheritance.

I know the family always talked about it as being an exceptional investment. I never paid much attention to it until it was put in my name late in 1984. Since then the company's earnings have dropped off along with the price of the stock.

I know my grandfather always said this was a stock he would hold forever, but now I wonder.

For many years Schlumberger has been both the biggest and most talented company providing drilling and computerized wireline services to the oil industry.

In its field it does at least half of the business in the United States. Overseas it has a much larger share of the business.

In 1980 the stock sold as high as 87, but since then it has been down hill. The tremendous boom in drilling for oil and gas that came in the late 1970s drove the company's business to record highs.

Schlumberger was in great demand because its ability to detect underground deposits of oil made it very popular. Its technology has been the most advanced.

**SCHLUMBERGER, LIKE** most all of the other oil drilling and services companies, had more business than it could handle.

In its great prosperity, Schlumberger decided to venture into another

industry, and it bought Fairchild Semiconductor. It has not been successful in that business and has been trying to dispose of Fairchild.

Schlumberger worked out a deal to sell Fairchild to Fujitsu Ltd., but our government has suggested it would not like this technology to come under the hands of foreign management and has persuaded Schlumberger to back off from that idea.

No one knows how long the oil drilling and oil services industries will remain in their present depression. There is still a current surplus of oil. While prices are up to the \$19 a barrel level from about half that figure, the whole industry remains depressed.

**THE HIGHER** price level has solved part of the problem, but the combination of the supply and the fairly low price level has kept new drilling at a low level. We all know that we are using more oil than we are finding, and the time will have to come when drilling is greatly increased, but few people are daring to predict when that will happen.

Schlumberger is a company that is very strong financially and consequently it can handle a long period of depression without the likelihood of getting into a dangerous position.

With its financial strength, superior talent and industry position, I would not worry about holding it. It would seem that a strong recovery is certain, although the timing is not yet clear.



## Timing works well in long run

In this final article of this series, I will present an updated and revised version of my column, "Timing Can Make Investment Grow," published Nov. 13, 1986.

I will present excerpts from the brochure of an established investment timer. For obvious reasons, the identity of this investment manager will not be disclosed. We will call it ABC Co.

Table I presents the results of timing ZZZ stock mutual fund by ABC Co. This record, established over 92 months covering both good and bad times, is compared with the untimed version of the performance of the ZZZ mutual fund. Chart I reveals that the record of ABC Co. is impressive.

The model used by ABC Co. to chalk up the impressive record presented in Table I is rather simple.

The ABC Co. first selects a good mutual fund family that offers full-time professional management, flexibility, diversification, liquidity and

convenience. Then it uses its proprietary timing model to reallocate the money according to Table II.

**INVESTMENT TIMING** works only in the long run. Success is never guaranteed. What's more, higher the return during a given time period, more aggressive is the timer's technique.

A timing service does not handle your investment for free. There is a charge, which must be assumed when comparing the results of timed and untimed investments. But a timing service that is able to "buy low, sell high" can achieve the objective of every investor who wants his money to grow.

Timing is primarily a defensive technique. It attempts to avoid a loss more than it tries to increase a return on an investment. Nevertheless, in these times when the market is extremely volatile, a competent professional timer with an impressive

## Beware out-of-state phone caller

Naperville, Ill. (along with two other corporations and two individual defendants) involved in such a scam, said Eileen Harrington, assistant director at the FTC.

The typical scenario works like this: A business or individual is contacted by telephone and congratulated on "winning" a bargain-rate luxury vacation.

For \$200-300, the prospective victim is told he can buy a club membership or vacation voucher that is active and transferable for a one-year period.

THE CALLER usually represents

an out-of-state telemarketing company or travel agency.

The caller often requires that a decision be made immediately (or by midnight that same day), does not provide complete information (such as additional vacation costs), and asks for a credit card to verify eligibility, Harrington said.

The credit card is then used to bill the unsuspecting party and, within days or weeks, the selling organization's telephone number has been disconnected.

THIS PARTICULAR scam has victimized thousands of companies

and individuals. Businesses are particularly good targets because a "package" of vacation certificates usually are bought as premium gift items for employees.

In this situation, employees are required to pay from \$100 on up in order to "activate" the certificate — stinging the business and its employees twice.

Harrington suggests that anyone receiving this type of offer get complete information and contact the state attorney general's office or Better Business Bureau.

She recommends that under no circumstances should a company or individual provide a credit card number over the telephone.



Where extra rooms such as a den or library are shown on the plans in addition to a living room and bedrooms, such extra rooms shall be counted as a bedroom for the purpose of computing land area per dwelling unit.

When a project is considered by the Planning Commission to be a redevelopment project, that is a project where removal of existing structures will be required in order to accomplish the development and said removal would be considered an upgrading of the area, the overall density of the project shall be determined by total number of dwelling units without consideration to number of bedrooms proposed. The overall density for such a project, shall not exceed 11 DU/AC overall density. 

# Cable access channels seek viewers

It's 6 p.m., the TV is on and you're flipping through the channels.

Which do you watch — network news or the local cable television program?

Odds are that it will be the former.

Therein lies one problem of local programming on cable TV and the frequent struggle program managers say they have getting subscribers to realize that local programming exists.

"This is true on a national level. It is not isolated on a local level," said Carol Gibson, general manager of MetroVision of Livonia. "We need to educate the subscribers. We have to get them to change the channel. Would you rather watch the six o'clock news or what is going on in the community?"

LAST YEAR, MetroVision of Livonia asked 1,000 randomly selected subscribers to evaluate channels they watch and enjoy most frequently. Metrovision then ranked their responses.

In a list of 38 channels, Channel 7 came in first, MetroVision of Livonia's Channel 13 came in 26th, beating out channels such as the UPI News Service and C-Span (cable television's public affairs network) which broadcasts congressional hearings, etc., said Tom Bjorklund, systems manager.

"People don't relate community access with cable. They relate it with the premium channels," said Gibson.

Local programming has a much different lure, however, when a subscriber has a son or daughter in a cablevised sports or music program.

Then, there's a request for reruns.

"The key is finding something people will forfeit watching the news for," said Maria Holmes, Omnicom program director. "I try to counter-program with something like a school sports program. This way a student that is in the program will say to his parents, 'Hey don't watch the news, watch me, I'm on TV,'" said Holmes.

AT METROVISION of Livonia, as well as at MetroVision of Redford; Continental Cablevision, Westland; Maclean Hunter, Garden City; and Omnicom, which has franchises in Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Northville, Northville Township, Canton and Belleville, franchise agreements call for community access channels.

Only two of these franchises speci-

fy the amount of local programming the cable company must provide, according to program managers interviewed. In Garden City the agreement specifies 20 hours and the Canton agreement calls for 10 hours.

Tim Carry, Maclean Hunter program manager, quoting the hour requirement from the cable application, said he interprets it as a goal to be achieved during the 15-year franchise.

He said that his company airs monthly about 30 hours of local origination (LO) programming that he describes as "the cable operator's attempt at a local channel," and about 10 hours of public access programming, which is programming done by the community.

LO, as it is called in the industry, is programming produced by paid staff, sometimes with the help of volunteers, which can include commercials and is of community interest. Public access programming is produced by people who live or work in a community and who have been specially trained via the cable company's workshops.

"It (a specified number of program hours) is a useless part of a franchise agreement to begin with. If you are given a franchise agreement, you should have that leverage. I can hook up a camera up front and call it local programming, but I won't do that," he said.

CARRY SAID that his company produces about 20 hours of new programming per month. He added that his company produces high quality programming and has been twice nominated for the ACE award, which is considered to be the cable industry's Oscar.

About 10 percent of the community watches local programming, one

percent participates in it, he said. "My view of access programming is different than other people's. Access to me is not a viewer medium. Public access is a medium for the producer who has something to express."

Federal law allows municipalities flexibility.

"The federal law (Cable Communication Policy Act of 1984) is a very limited rule in the regulation of cable," said Roger Holberg, supervisory attorney for the mass media bureau of the FCC in Washington, D.C. Holberg said that while the Cable Act requires cable companies to make channels available for the public, education and government, it is up to the individual franchising authority (municipality) to decide the terms and conditions with regard to the amount of channel capacity.

"I don't see anything in the cable Act that requires them to provide a certain amount of hours of local programming," he said.

How both are achieved depends primarily on the philosophy of each program manager and the community in which the cable company is located.

PROGRAM MANAGERS do keep track of how many times programs have been shown and help to teach public access classes.

Cable commissioners differ in their views of local programming.

"I'd say they (Continental Cablevi-

sion) is doing a good job," said Eric Radcliffe, president of the Westland Cable Commission. He is bothered by

the fact that Westland shares a channel with Dearborn Heights.

"A lot of people don't care what people in Dearborn Heights are doing," he said.

Jack Wilcox, a Plymouth cable commissioner, would like to see more commission meetings.

"I think the community could benefit by a more active municipal administration interest in cable," he said.

# House shoots down 2 percent spending cut

Here's how area House members and senators were recorded on major roll call votes before the 100th Congress began its ongoing summer recess, which ends Sept. 9

## HOUSE

**SPENDING CUT** — By a vote of 181 for and 245 against, the House refused to cut 2 percent from discretionary spending categories of a fiscal 1988 appropriations bill (HR 2058) for the departments of Labor and Health and Human Services.

The amendment sought to slice \$72.6 million from the legislation's \$36.3 billion outlay for non-entitlement programs. It was rejected after the House repeatedly refused to make larger cuts in the \$127-billion measure, the most expensive appropriations bill other than the Pentagon's.

The bill was sent to the Senate.

Members voting yes favored the 2 percent spending cut. Voting yes: William Broomfield, R-Birmingham.

Voting no: Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, Dennis Hertel, D-Harper Woods, William Ford, D-Taylor, and Sander Levin, D-Southfield.

**NUCLEAR POWER** — By a vote of 160 for and 261 against, the House rejected an amendment to block federal licensing of completed nuclear power plants at Shoreham, N.Y., and Seabrook, N.H., near the Massachusetts border.

A test of House sentiment on nuclear power, the amendment was attached to a Nuclear Regulatory Commission authorization bill (HR 1315) later sent to the Senate. Its effect was to preserve the power of the New York and Massachusetts governors to veto emergency evacuation plans required by the NRC as a condition of licensing.

Supporter Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., said, "Safety must be our paramount concern" in setting policy for nuclear power.

Opponent Ralph Hall, D-Texas, said the amendment would set a nationwide precedent for mothballing new nuclear plants.

Members voting yes wanted to block the Seabrook and Shoreham licensing. Voting yes: Democrats Hertel and Levin.

Voting no: Republicans Pursell and Broomfield.

Not voting: Ford.

**GRAMM-RUDMAN FIX** — By a vote of 71 for and 21 against, the Senate approved an amendment that could put the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings balanced-budget law back on course. It was attached to a measure (HJ Res 324) raising the national debt ceiling that was headed for the White House.

To remedy the Supreme Court's 1986 objection that the law enables Congress to usurp executive authority, the amendment gives the executive branch's Office of Management and Budget final say in determining when automatic spending cuts are to be triggered.

Supporter Carl Levin, D-Mich., called the repair "better than nothing."

Opponent Ralph Hall, D-Texas, said the amendment would set a nationwide precedent for mothballing new nuclear plants.



All sides agree that CRs undercut fiscal responsibility by making lawmakers less accountable for what goes into the bills and presidents less able to scrutinize congressional spending.

Sponsor Daniel Evans, R-Wash., called the amendment "a small step back toward fiscal sanity."

Opponents said the proposal created more constitutional and procedural problems than it solved.





## Bucking the trend Bronco ends slump in MSHL playoffs

His teammates had been racking up goals at a surprising pace, but Bronco forward Walt Bartels was a spectator for the most part.

That left-out feeling faded fast Monday night, as Bartels not only got a piece of the action but scored a hat trick in his team's biggest win to date in the Midwest Summer Hockey League.

Billy Tecos started in goal and played the first 1 1/2 periods, but Dave Cergunl came on a bit sooner than expected when Tecos injured his glove hand.

While his teammates handled the offense, Tecos made numerous saves but lost his glove during a scramble in front of the net. He was unable to recover the glove before the puck came back at him, forcing him to make another save without its protection.

"Awesome, awesome" was Baker's response. "That's the ultimate sacrifice," he said.

BARTELS WAS on the receiving end of some superb passing for his first two goals.

Paul Mitter broke in from the left side and shot the puck across to Bartels, who quickly dumped it into the open left half of the goal for a 1-0 score.

Mitter also assisted on the next one, centering the puck from behind the net just as Bartels came flying down the middle to fire the puck home at close range.

"We gave them two soft goals because we had a winger who wasn't back-checking," said Wolverines coach Bob Lemieux, a former coach of the Kalamazoo Wings.

"THAT'S ONE of the first basics of hockey. You have to look at hockey today and wonder who's coaching these kids."

The Broncos made it 3-0 with the prettiest play of the night. On a rush toward the net, Andrew Roy passed across to Dave McAuliffe, who then

# College coach does Tennessee waltz

Rich Zalenski's first season as basketball coach at St. Mary's College of Orchard Lake had not even started when he resigned, placing the future of the sport at the college in jeopardy.

On Monday, Zalenski accepted an offer to coach at Bristol College, located in Bristol, Tenn., a move that surprised everyone — especially Frank Anthonis, who is just entering his first year as president at St. Mary's.

"It was a shocker," an angered Anthonis said. "It wasn't even professional. We didn't even know about it until we read it in the paper Monday."

"It was the most unprofessional thing I've

ever seen in my life. Usually, you get 30 to 60 days."

Zalenski did not turn in his letter of resignation until Tuesday morning, Anthonis said. He departs immediately to start his new position at Bristol Monday, leaving the St. Mary's program in turmoil and its future in doubt.

Pup tents and lean-tos have all but been replaced.

Now don't get me wrong. Motor homes and RVs are great. They're fantastic. They definitely have a place in the outdoors. But it seems that far too many campers depend on all that luxury and convenience. Roughing it is strictly out of the question. For them, to camp without electricity and all the necessary appliances would be like building a house with wooden pegs. It just doesn't happen any more.

**WHAT'S HAPPENED** to our desire to experience the outdoors as our forefathers did? To pitch a tent, catch our breakfast and cook it over an open, hickory fire. To be lulled to sleep by the sound of a rolling stream or a chorus of chirping crickets.

You can't even find a coon skin hat in the department store anymore. Instead of using square knots and lashings to build a fort, kids now days use nails and Superglue.

We're missing an exciting opportunity to experience nature at its finest.

**THE TREND**, however, may be changing.

Sandy Graham, manager of The Benchmark in Farmington, a store that specializes in backpacking and hiking equipment, believes it will only be a matter of time before wilderness camping comes back into style.

"I see the cycle coming around again," said Graham. "The big increase (in motor home use) started when the gas prices came back down. I

think the gas prices will go up again and it won't be as practical to take a trip in a big motor home. When that happens we'll be very busy. It will send our business through the ceiling."

"The high price of a hotel room has also helped us out. We see a lot of people already who are rediscovering camping."

**AT THE** Oakland County Parks, which offer primitive and modern camping sites at both Addison Oaks (near Rochester) and Groveland Oaks (near Holly), rustic camping is alive and well. Of the 50 rustic sites at Addison Oaks, 35-40 are rented every weekend. At Groveland Oaks, one of the largest campgrounds in Michigan with better than 600 sites combined, there is also a steady flow of rustic campers.

"RVs definitely get you spoiled," said Dan Stencil, chief of parks operation at the Oakland County Parks. "The people that appreciate rustic camping are the people that like to rough it. The number one advantage is that you get much closer to nature. You're camping right there on the ground. A lot of people enjoy the fact that they can rough it. They get an appreciation of what our forefathers experienced when they were building this country."

Once again, RVs and motor homes are great. Take them on trips and enjoy the luxury and convenience. But set aside one weekend to get closer to nature. Plan a wilderness camping trip and really experience the wild freshness of the outdoors as it was meant to be enjoyed.







## Beach home—Michigan at its best

Anytime of the day, any month of the year, the view of Little Traverse Bay from living room windows of this L'Arbre Croche home, designed by Robert Saarinen Swanson of Bloomfield Hills, is spectacular.

The house is as close to the beach as rules allow, meaning the sand is at the edge of the lower level walk out.

The house is positioned so that the driveway entrance is about halfway between the two levels — the family room is a few steps down and the great room a few steps up. The mas-

ter bedroom suite is on the upper level along with the 24-by-26-foot great room.

The other bedrooms and family room on the lower level make an ideal guest suite and guests are as much a part of vacation homes like this as blue sky, sunsets, sailboats and sand.

The great room includes an attractive open kitchen with a counter/divider with Chinese red stools on the great room side. Not only do they add a dramatic splash of color, they provide seating for breakfast or quick snacks. A complete dining area at one side of the great room, makes this whole area ideal for the

kind of casual entertaining that goes with a vacation home.

Interior designer, Connie Lovell of Birmingham, kept the furnishings sleek and simple, so nothing would detract from the views — the enchanting woods from the window in the kitchen area, the beach and bay from the other sides of the room. The carpeting is off-white and the upholstered sectional is covered in off-white cotton. The large throw pillows on the sofas and those for seating on the built-ins under the windows have brush strokes of salmon, blue, aqua and gold — sunset, water and sky colors to reflect the surroundings.

THE chairs in a second conversational area are done in salmon cotton and the small table with these and the larger coffee table in the fireplace grouping are both white laminate with subtle touches of salmon (the inside of the legs of the small one and an indented strip around the other).

Another subtle, but truly elegant touch is the use of taupe formica to accent the more dominate white formica.

There are five large skylights in the great room, four at the roof's edge become an extension of the beach side window wall and there's a large one in the kitchen.

In this very private, natural setting, these make the bay, the sky and the woods an integral part of the interior. The owners like to live with original works. A painting by Johanna Haas hangs high on a section of wall opposite the entrance making it visible from several vantage points. There's also a selection of handmade pots displayed in the entry area. Not too much, just enough to provide interesting forms and shapes.

The six big pots of salmon geraniums in the planter area at the top of the stairway on the great room level are a delightful live accent.

To call this a California style atmosphere would be truthful but short-sighted. This is Michigan vacation living at its most exciting and beautiful.

**Q.** One of the co-owners in our condominium continues to be delinquent in her assessments. The balance of the board, of which I am member, says that since the co-owner is unemployed, we should give her time before taking any legal action. What is your opinion?  
**A.** Unfortunately, while co-owners may have valid excuses for not paying their assessment because of economic hardships, etc., that does not as a matter of law relieve them of their legal responsibility to pay the assessments or otherwise absolve the board of directors from potential liability in not pursuing the co-owners for these delinquent assessments.  
At the least, the association should record a lien against the unit to protest its security position and notify the co-owner of the fact that the association intends to seek whatever legal redress is necessary to collect the back assessments. Keep in mind that the other co-owners will not relish the fact of subsidizing the association for the failure of the delinquent co-owners to pay her assessments whatever the reason.  
**Q.** Does the developer of a proposed condominium in this state have to seek the approval of

the Department of Commerce before entering into purchase agreements?  
**A.** With the advent of deregulation in 1983, the Department of Commerce, Condominium Section, no longer assumed jurisdiction over the sale and development of condominiums in this state by a developer. Accordingly, a developer may enter into a purchase agreement so long as it comports with the requirements of the condominium statute and is provided to the purchaser together with the other necessary condominium buyer's handbook. If these documents are not provided to you by your condominium developer with the purchase agreement, you should inquire further of your attorney concerning these matters.

# WRITE IT AND REAP!

Writing a classified ad that gets results—whether it be for real estate, employment, the personals, transportation, or merchandise— is easy if you follow the guidelines below.




**1. Give the reader specific information.** Pretend you are someone reading the classifieds. What would you like to know about the item, service or job you are advertising? Be sure to add details such as color, size, condition, brand name, age, features and benefits. Be accurate! Don't embellish your ad with misleading information. Stick to the facts and reap the rewards!




**2. Include the price.** Don't waste your time or a potential buyer's time. If you advertise the price of the item or service you offer, the people who respond to your ad will be those who are genuinely interested. Surveys show that readers are more interested in those items and services they know are within their price range.



**3. Avoid abbreviations.** Don't make a potential customer work too hard! Although you may be tempted to cut down on the cost of your ad by using abbreviations, surveys indicate that many people don't understand such abbreviations as EIK (eat-in kitchen) or WSW (white side wall) tires and won't take the time to figure them out. A confused reader is a disinterested reader. Get the most for your money and use complete words.



**4. Include phone number and specify hours.** Be sure to let potential customers know when and where to call. Surveys show that even if a person is very interested in your item or service, he or she will not call back after the first attempt. Stay near the phone during the hours you indicate you will be available. Don't risk missing a sale!



**5. Run on consecutive days.** Your ad will not get results if people don't see it! Therefore, it is important to set up a consistent and consecutive ad schedule with your telephone salesperson or outside sales representative.
