



After nearly a year of planning a joint outdoor recreation project for Isbister Elementary, Plymouth Town ship and Plymouth-Canton Schools officials agreed last week on a final plan, including how it would be fund ed

However, just as those officials were ready to take the plan to the township board of trustees and school board for final approval, it hit a roadblock and is now in jeopardy

Rowe, George whose property bor-III 'His refusal just ders school property doesn't make sense.' on Canton Center Road, has refused to allow the township to hook up to a storm drain that runs through his back vard

According to Plymouth Township Supervisor Steve Mann, one of the main components of the project is to improve the drainage in the field that sits south of Isbister To do that, the township needs to hook into a storm draın

Officials say the easiest and cheapest avenue is to connect to the one that runs through Rowe's back yard Town ship officials asked him to grant them an easement, but he refused, even though officials promised to restore his property to its current state He would also maintain ownership of the proper

The next closest easement the town-

ship has to a storm drain is one that runs through the back yards of two homes on Mayflower Court, to the east of the school

When contacted, Rowe didn't have much to say about the issue, except to suggest the township should use the existing easement

"I'm not opposed to the project I'm just opposed to them going through my backyard There's an existing ease ment, they should use it," he said

Rowe's decision could derail much of the project that includes improved



## Expert: Tree doing well despite lengthy move delay

It's been two months since a Shelby

Township tree moving company said it would take a day or two to slide a half million pound copper beech tree out of harm's way

The Wilcox Family Foundation hired Worldwide Tree Moving to move the 150 year old copper beech tree behind the Wilcox House more than 100 feet to make way for a five story condominium project The move has been delayed several times because the job, according to Bryan Williams, proved to be tougher than expected

Since then, the tree has endured 90 degree heat and a drought, and remains standing in the same spot it has since the turn of the century

And, despite rumors that Williams has quit the job and the tree is dying, Williams said he plans on finishing the job, and a Michigan State University professor agrees the tree is in excellent shape

"The last time I looked at the tree it was alive and well," said Jim Kielbaso, a professor of urban forestry at MSU, who last saw the tree about two weeks

Kielbaso has had ample opportunity to see the tree as his son, Jim, lives in Plymouth He also knows of Williams' work, having watched him move several trees on the MSU campus

I'm glad to see the tree looks as good as it does, considering the horren dous dry spell we had," said Kielbaso

## Township moves on DDA plan despite commission's reluctance

With or without the city, Plymouth Township is moving forward with creating a Downtown Development Authority to help pay for major improvements along the Ann Arbor Road corridor from I-275 to Sheldon Road

On Wednesday, the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees approved the intent to establish a DDA, despite the fact Plymouth city officials haven't approved the details of a joint DDA The board's approval opens the way for a public hearing about the DDA on Oct 9 at township hall

According to Sally Hodges of McKenna Associates, the township's planning firm, the city has until that date to approve an agreement under Public Act 425, a state law that allows intergovernmental agreements If not, the city property within the proposed DDA, which runs on the north side of Ann Arbor Road between Lilley and Sheldon, will be eliminated from the district

Despite his hopes the city will approve the 425 agreement before it is too late, Plymouth Township Supervisor Steve Mann said the township must move ahead

"We've kept the door open as long as we can," he said

City Commissioner Bill Gra-

ham, a member of the joint ser vices committee that has worked on forming the DDA, said he is in favor of an agreement because it is the only way the city will be able to afford burying its share of utility lines along Ann Arbor Road

"I'm basically a proponent of the project, because there is no way the city would ever be able to afford this on its own The main course of action for the city is putting utilities underground, which is very, very costly Estimates are between \$6-8 million The city will never be able to come up with that kind of money," he said

Graham said he expects the commission to take action on the issue either at Monday's meeting or a special meeting to be held at a later date However, he is unsure if the commission is going to support an agreement with the township, because some commissioners are unhappy with previous joint agreements for fire and dispatch services

"There is some support on the commission for the DDA, but I don't know if there is adequate support I think some commissioners question the propriety of the 425 agreement, and wonder if we are being snookered in some way I understand the township has to move along on its schedule, but they need to understand we have our own

timeline," he said

Township Trustee Ron Edwards said he is no longer in favor of involving the city in the DDA, because he feels the township pays more than its share for the fire and dispatch services, and he doesn't want to see the same thing happen with the DDA

"I want the city eliminated from this project There are just too many township tax dollars being used for services to the city with past agreements I'm in no way in favor of partnering with the city on this I'd rather leave the city on their own, and we take care of what we have to do," he saıd

Trustee Abe Munfakh disagreed

"The city has to be involved with this project if it is going to be done right," he said

workers must remove the dirt to go there (Rowe's property)," from the work site to move forward on that project

"We have a lot of dirt out there that we have to remove from the site anyway We are into final grading in some areas That dirt is going to have to go someplace," he said

Noting that window of opportunity is only about two weeks, Anulewicz said it is much more difficult to use the existing easement because it runs through two residential properties and there are several trees around which to maneuver He said it would be much easier to hook into the drain at Rowe's, because he has a large, open lot

"The existing easement is in the rear of two separate properties There are several trees to deal with, and the work would have to be done much closer to those homes, which means it would be disruptive to those residents It just makes good sense

he said

#### **Selfish decision?**

The township has \$350,000 budgeted to improve the recreational facilities at all seven Plymouth-Canton schools within the township, as a way to increase recreational opportunities for residents Isbister is the pilot project

Township Supervisor Steve Mann called Rowe's decision 'selfish," because it may kill a project meant to benefit not only Isbister students, but also others in the surrounding neighborhood

"More than 600 students at the school use the playground every day In the evening, all sorts of children use it His refusal just doesn't make sense," he saıd

Mann said the field's poor drainage makes it useless during wet periods


"The drainage in that field is horrendous In the spring and fall, the field 1s literally mush They have what they call 'blacktop recess' at the school, where the children have to play on the black top because the field is too muddy," he said

Mann said the township has. the option of condemning Rowe's land so it can get the easement, but it would be a lengthy legal process that would eliminate the possibility of using the fill dirt from the high school site He said the school district doesn't have the money in its budget to pay for the fill

"We could move forward and condemn the property, but it would take time And we are, very pressed for time right now," he said





## Metro Airport open again under strict new security

Detroit Metropolitan Airport is one of 17 airports across the United States where armed federal marshals will be posted at passenger check points operated by airlines

Limited service at the airport was resumed Thursday following the nationwide Federal Aviation Administration ban on air traffic following terrorist attacks on New York's World Trade Center and the Pentagon

Metro Airport was allowed to reopen after meeting new security regulations ordered by the FAA

These new rules include ■ No curbside check-in for baggåge

■ Only ticketed passengers will be allowed beyond the security screening checkpoints

Additional random screening of passengers

No knives, including small pocket knives, will be allowed to be carried beyond the passenger screening check points

■ All parked vehicles must be at least 300 feet from the terminal

Airport spokeswoman Barbara Hogan said Friday that Northwest Airlines, which handles about 70 percent of the flights out of Metro, and other airlines have resumed service on a limited schedule She said that fliers should expect long lines and need to be patient and understanding and allow themselves plenty of time

Those planning to fly are being asked to contact their airline to check on flight schedules

The airport hopes to resume a normal schedule as early as Monday

Wayne County Executive Ed McNamara traveled by train Wednesday to return to Detroit after attending an airport confer ence in Montreal with Airport Director Lester Robinson

Robinson said security workers at the airport have been working 12-hour shifts since the attack Airport security and fed eral agents, using bomb sniffing dogs, made complete search of the airport prior to reopening


#### **Emergency measures**

Wayne County officials set up an emergency management team, putting security on heightened alert Tuesday, after the World Trade Center was destroyed and Pentagon damaged from terrorist attacks

Sheriff Robert Ficano said the attack "changes the American landscape forever"

Wayne County closed Tuesday the Wayne County Building in Detroit, county offices and courts inside the City-County Building and Frank Murphy Hall of Justice The Ambassador Bridge and Windsor tunnel were closed, but re-opened Wednesday Traffic was delayed three to four hours coming from Windsor to Detroit, so on Thursday, sheriffs deputies assisted U S Customs agents with vehicle checks and inspections, Ficano said

The Wayne County Jail was closed to visitors Prisoners who were of Arabic descent were monitored closely to ensure that there was no "misplaced reac tion" against them or other prisoners Ficano said



Parked cars were towed Tuesday from in front of the public buildings in Detroit Public buildings were re-opened Wednesday

Ficano met with the US Marshals, FBI and ATF periodically Tuesday, and planned to continue meetings throughout the week

"It's outrageous what's happened and you certainly feel sympathy for the victims," Ficano said "We're going to remain on heightened awareness"



Ficano put together a group of about 50 sheriffs to provide technical assistance to the cities of New York and Washington D C if needed Officials in New York issued a message to put that assistance on hold Thursday

"We have at least one club member who knew someone who died, and that impacts all of us,' said Sincock


Meanwhile, at Plymouth Marketplace, co-owner Jim Tanski said the response by his customers "has been unbelievable "

Meredith Whalen is among the World Trade Center's missing Back at home in Canton, her mother, Patricia isn't expecting to hear from her

"I'm really convinced we've lost her," Whalen said Meredith Whalen, 23, was

working on the 93rd floor of the north tower, the first to be hit by a hijacked plane

"I saw that on the news, and I was about 90 percent sure, she was there," Whalen said "I held out hope for a little while, thinking she may have gone into work late that day But her roommate told me she left for work at 7 30 a m That's my Meredith

Whalen's fears were confirmed when she heard from a friend of Meredith's who received an e-mail that was dated and timed Sept 11.820 a m Meredith had e-mailed her friend from her desk at work


"I knew she was indeed in the office then," Whalen said

Whalen is trying now to get through each moment as they come

"I go up and down, but I've got a lot of support I'm OK now, but sometimes I'm afraid I'm just going to snap," she said

Staying connected with Meredith's friends and other survivors via e-mail is helping a bit, as are her family and close circle of friends

"I was so very proud of

Meredith Both my girls are so good," Whalen said, adding Meredith's younger sister, Kristen is surrounded by supportive friends at the University of North Carolina

There were 55 people working on the 93rd floor Tuesday morning

"There are 38 still unaccounted for Everybody that was working that day is missing They're all gone," Whalen said "I wonder if anyone in the building ever saw the plane coming Can you imagine? I'm sure my Meredith never knew what hit her "

Whalen said alongside shock and disbelief came anger

"I was angry immediately I knew that was no accident, and then when the second plane hit, I was beside myself How could they?"

Whalen and her daughter were scheduled to fly to Barcelona yesterday, where they were to board a cruise ship for a 12-day tour of Europe

This was going to be the first trip Meredith was going to pay for all herself," she said Whalen is also coping by

keeping in touch with Mered-1th's friends from all over the country and the world

"They're just heartbroken," she said of her daughter's friends



## Granholm charges 9 gas sellers with price gouging

Attorney General Jennifer Granholm charged three more Michigan gas stations with price gouging Thursday, bringing the total to nine

The charges resulted from the price spike seen at the pumps immediately after Tuesday's terrorist tragedies at the World Trade Center and the Pentagon While prices jumped generally, the stations charged had raised their prices to between \$2 91 and \$5 per gallon

None of the stations served so far with "notices of intended action" are local, but Granholm has indicated more charges are likely to be filed. She said she plans to take action against any station that hiked prices higher than \$2.50 per gallon

As of Thursday afternoon, 1,500 complaints had been logged by the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division

Granholm noted that is the largest number of complaints her office has fielded on a single issue in such a short period of time On Wednesday, the office logged its highest number of calls in its history, she said



mean per transaction? Typically, judges have not looked at it in that way You know, most of these stations are going to be

small businesses," he said Before going to court, DeWitt said station owners will have a chance to work out a resolution with the Attorney General, but such agreements will have to include discontinuation of the practice, restitution and payment of penalties

"Price gouging in the face of such a colossal national tragedy is immoral, un-American, and clearly illegal My office will continue to take action against retailers who are blatantly exploiting our national pain in the name of profit," Granholm said "Consumers are outraged – and they have every right to be"

According to the Michigan Petroleum Retailers Association and the American Petroleum Institute, the terrorist attacks did not result in an increase in wholesale prices of gasoline or in a decrease of supplies

Granholm also said consumers should not partic over potential shortages

"Consumers need to know that there is no reason to horde gasoline or to race to the pump to fill up their cars There is no shortage of gasoline in Michigan," she

#### Wins support

Granholm's actions continued to win support from state lawmakers

"I am pleased to say," said State Rep Judith Scranton, R-Brighton, "that the majority of the gas stations in Livingston County have acted in a wise and prudent manner by not trying to take advantage of this terrible tragedy"

She also promised to push for legislative hearings on the practice when lawmakers return to session in Lansing

"My wife and I were watching when the news interviewed the gas station owner who so arrogantly increased his prices to \$5 per gallon," said state Rep Mike Bishop, R-Rochester "I was amazed that any human being could so shamefully and opportunistically gouge the public "



## **Speaker says Plymouth is 'prime area'**

Western Wayne County is a growing, healthy and vibrant area

That's the word from Doug Rothwell, the chief executive officer of the Michigan Economic Development Corporation

"The Plymouth-Canton area 1s a very hot area one of the prime areas that companies we work with look at," said Rothwell "The challenge for this area is what kind of growth do you want, not whether it's going to happen "

Rothwell heads the MEDC, a public corporation that's funded in part by the state His job is to attract business to the Michigan, as well as work with communities to create an environment that is supportive for business growth

"I think Plymouth and Canton

"Plymouth and Canton are great towns, there are good neighborhoods, and good schools There are a lot of nice, natural amenities, lots of things to do," he said "People like to be in

are fun to be in Plymouth is one of those towns in Michigan that has those characteristics

Rothwell, speaking at the Plymouth Historical Museum to nearly 100 people from the Colonial Kiwanis Club of Plymouth last week, admitted the economy has changed, but not necessarily for the worse

"Today we are in a slowdown in the national economy, the manufacturing sector is in a near recession, and the Big 3 (automakers) market share is at an all-time low," Rothwell told the group "But, with all that, the Michigan unemployment rate is only 4.6 percent If you had told that story 10 years ago, they would have thought Michigan's unemployment rate was at least double digit "

To magnify his point. Rothwell indicated there have been nearly 800,000 jobs created during the

towns, regardless of size, that last 10 years in Michigan, with 60,000 of those in manufacturıng

"We're creating manufacturing jobs while the rest of the country has lost 600,000 jobs in the last decade," said Rothwell

Rothwell said most of the job growth has been in the nonmanufacturing, high-end research and development, engineering, information technology and health care sectors of the economy, which he said is good news

One of the biggest challenges for Michigan, according to Rothwell, will be to change the image of Detroit and the auto industry

"Detroit is portrayed as one of our worst cities in America on the national news, and the auto industry as one whose best times are over," said Rothwell "People want to be in places that are cutting edge "

## Canton battles, but can't catch up to Harrison





# Schoolcraft earns 1st All-Sports Trophy

Set your goals, put in the time and effort, and you can accomplish just about anything - however improbable

Indeed, witnessing Schoolcraft College become a powerhouse in athletics, at least a decade ago, was about as likely as a pro wrestler becoming a major political figure (00000)

But things can change

SC went from the doormat in the Michigan Community College Athletic Associa tion to the top level That was so noted in the 34th annual MCCAA Year End Report for the 2000 2001 school year

On page four of the report at the top of the all time list of all-sports trophy win ners for the MCCAA, is a school that had not appeared in the 43 previous years Schoolcraft College

While a school like Lansing CC or Grand Rapids CC (each a winner of 12 previous trophies) might shrug such an accomplishment off, SC will not This is

something special for members of Ocelot sports teams

'This is the first time in school history," said SC athletic director Ed Kavanaugh 'We're pretty proud of it "

Was it something the coaches on staff was shooting for? 'It wasn't a goal per se," answered Kavanaugh "But we knew it was there and attainable "

A total of 10 sports were competed in the fall, winter and spring sessions some only on a statewide basis, others both statewide and in Eastern and Western conferences

Last school year, SC finished first in the state in women's cross country and men's soccer in the fall (women's soccer is not a sport sponsored by the MCCAA), and first in the state and Eastern Confer ence in men's basketball, and first in the conference in women's basketball last winter

In the six MCCAA sports SC competed





## College expands music program, sets its sight on the future

onald Morelock looks like a kid with a new toy as he trues out one of the new 7-foot Steinway grand planos in the music department at Schoolcraft College Morelock never stops smiling all the while his hands race across the keyboard in an energetic performance of Brahms Rhapsody in B minor

As chairman of the music department, Morelock has a lot to smile about these days In the last sev eral months, the college doubled the space where students take lessons, practice and learn theory and history as well as the latest in music technolo-

"I'm excited about the changes," said Morelock, as he led a tour of the department Morelock's seen steady growth in the music program since he first began teaching plano at the college in 1967 "We have new studios, new practice rooms We have more than 200 students taking private music lessons in voice, classical guitar, piano, band and orchestra instruments We're expanding our plano teachers certification program Everything is growing because we have more space

"We want a quality program There's a lot more performing opportunities - an internal honors program recital in addition to a public series of recitals in spring And we have audio visual to tape lessons and master classes so students can take them home to study"

Monthly master classes for all the students encourage them not only to advance their performing skills but to listen to each other play Also once a month they're encouraged to learn from profes sional musicians by attending a free recital series

More than two dozen planos are available for students as young as 6 to begin learning the basics of music Morelock recommends children begin piano lessons at age 6 or 7

Over the last six years, Morelock's Russian trips with students taught him "the importance of exposing children to music at an early age "The summer American-Russian Piano Institute and Shostakovich Competition are but two of the oppor-

tunities available to music students at Schoolcraft College The Institute is one of Morelock's favorites because it offers students the chance to study plano at the St Petersburg Conservatory

Sanjay Mody who grew up in Birmingham won first place in the Shostakovich Competition in Ris sia this year Even though the 15 year o'd Mody now lives in Paris he still studies with Morelock

who's preparing him for a performance with the Livonia Symphony Orchestra in April

'We also have a summer program here at the col lege for the last 12 years with the first two weeks focusing on solos and duets, the second two weeks on concertos with professional musicians' said Morelock

"I have a philosophy about teaching community college with emphasis on community and college There's certain things we can introduce to the com munity like the recital series which begins in late October and is open to st dents as v tr con munity It's a good ime to sudy plano It beer proved that plano studies increase learning skill-It s also enjoyable

Morelock is always looking for new ways to intro duce children to music New this year is an early childhood class for ages birth to 6 Morelock came up with the idea for the sessions after attending a national pedagogy conference where one of the speakers recommended more creative approaches for teaching music



That's exactly what Rosalia Emanuele tries to do as instructor for children and parents attending the classes

"We're introducing music through the environ ment," said Emanuele "We're doing a lot of singing and dancing, getting the children involved in hear ing music and imitating sounds, singing back what they hear Too many times when they start at 6 or 7, they cannot tell the difference between hearing wrong or right

Once students advance to taking private music lessons at the college, they then have the opportunity to study with professional musicians such as Eugene Bossart, the college's artist in-residence who accompanies and coaches voice students, and coloratura soprano Elizabeth Parcells, vocal artistin residence A wind ensemble, jazz band and vocal jazz group round out the offerings

Especially exciting is the expansion of music technology at the college Barton Polot recently joined the faculty to teach students about compos ing with computers He takes over where Bradley Bloom left off Bloom, who recently retired after 30 years of teaching at the college, instituted the musical arts and technology studio where students

'In 1970 I didn't know what a computer was, said Polot At U of M it occupied an entire building I fell in love with it even though I had to submit cards to a machine and wait 45 minutes to get an answer

By 1978, Polot became interested in using technology as a creative tool while teaching music in Ann Arbor Schools He's also taught at the Univer sity of Toledo and University of Michigan in Ann Arbor

"Mozart didn't know what a symphony would sound like until he passed out the parts at rehearsal," said Polot

"With the advent of music technology, composers have complete control They're not only the composer but conductor, performer, audio engineer If I'm writing a string quartet the musicians are imposing their interpretation on my music Picasso or Pollack got to see a finished product without anyone interfering with their work With music technology, we have the opportunity to hear a finished product as we composed it "

Using a PC, keyboard and Cakewalk Pro Audio program, a handful of students in the MIDI Lab lay down a rhythm track It's evident musical technology also referred to as MIDI or Musical Instrument Digital Interface, has advanced greatly since stan dards or conventions were first set up in 1983 One thing that hasn't changed, though is the ability to understand the basics of creating music Polot also teaches music theory and history He plans to coor

Nancy Hurd expresses herself not in words but colored pencil Delicate compositions tell a story of life and death

Hurd says she isn't trying to be depressing She's just suggesting maybe there's a few things we should think about


Emotional content is what sets Hurd's art apart There are the usual portraits of grandchildren, a series on magnificent birds and pets, but it's the images of the elderly vegetating in a nursery home that reach out and grab

the viewer Entering the gallery, the first work prods the onlooker to make sense of a little boy with fishing pole and an angel above his head The work speaks of Hurd's brother John Davis who died in March of lung cancer but it could touch anyone who's lost a loved one

Another work, *Fleeting* focuses on her dying grandfather Hurd incorpo rates a butterfly and portrait of her four children into the collage of memories

Like a puzzle, Hurd pieces together teeth and bones to symbolize death and eternity in yet another colored pencil drawing where vicious dogs seem to be lunging toward the viewer

"Everybody likes the cats and condor Some are mystified by the symbolic

"It's been fun to live with." said Hurd, who began drawing with colored pencil 10 years ago "It was a challenge to start with red paper and work it out" You have to manipulate the colors differently I'm learning more about color than I used to

Hurd's also learning to deal with life's challenges Ten years ago Parkinson's forced her to retire from a graphic artist position with Wayne RESA Since then she's had a lot of time to think about the tremors wrest-

reflects on Hurd's past and ing away the control of her The prescriptions hands Sinemet and Mirapex help ease the tremors and she's drawing again but doesn't know for how long

"It makes my art more precious, said Hurd, whos a member of the Farmington Artists Club and Artifacts Art Club Hurd, through the Farmington Artists Club, helps teach the Senior Painters at the Costick Activities Center in Farmington Hills

"I get up and work as if it's a job, but I love it I feel fortunate that I have time to do my art "

## New Alex McKnight mystery takes in many Michigan sites

#### The Hunting Wind by Steve Hamilton (Thomas Dunne Books, \$23 95)

Maybe it's all those fast balls that hit him upside the head when he was catching for the Toledo Mud Hens Maybe it's all that Canadıan beer he drinks Or maybe he was just born that

way

Whatever the cause, in this new mystery by Steve Hamilton, you may get the feeling that excop Alex McKnight, now retired and living in the UP, is operating just a few sandwiches short of a full picnic

It's not that he's crazy — it's simply that he seems vulnerable, bumbling and naive (He's also a bit blurry here, in comparison to some secondary characters, but more about that later.) Imagine Forrest Gump morphing into a detective of sorts, and you've pretty much got the picture.

Still, he's not unlikable Somehow, on these pages, we keep caring what happens to this guy who calls the town of Paradise home

For that, of course, Michigan native Hamilton deserves full credit As our story begins, we find Alex at his usual Paradise hangout The Glasgow Inn, a place of little pretension, with a big fireplace, Scottish overtones. and plenty of that Canadian beer he likes so well

The season is spring-one of those edge of-winter April nights, "cold enough to hurt" Suddenly, through the door swaggers the guy Alex calls "the left hander " Alex hasn't seen Randy Wilkins in 30 years - in the days when they both played for Toledo - but he's still got 'that look in his eye "

twinkle, other days, you'd call it insanity," remembers Alex

It appears that the divorced Randy has traveled all the way from California because he's learned through an Internet Web site that his old pal Alex is a private investigator, specializing in missing persons (This is not exactly true, but Alex can't seem to convince Randy) The person Randy wants to find 1s a woman named Maria, the love of his life, last seen in Detroit No, he hasn't laid eyes on her or heard from her in all that time, but little matters like that do not deter Randy Wilkins

#### **Off to Detroit**

Alex protests weakly, but he's no match for Randy's stubborn charm, and soon, the two are off. headed for the Motown area There, they encounter problems aplenty, including a bloody and momentous event on a lovely, tree-lined street in Farmington Hills They visit Dearborn, get misty-eyed at the sight of Tiger Stadium (and a mite critical as they cruise past Comerica Park), drop in at the Lindell AC, take a hilarious turn at a Westland "Senior Community," nose around a bit at the Detroit Public Library and do some snooping at the City-County Building

Though they don't find Maria, they do turn up various members of her family, some of whom work exceedingly hard to dis courage their search

Although Alex is willing to give up the chase, Randy isn't, and his tenacity lands him not only in a heap of trouble, but in

"Some days, you'd call it a a Grand Rapids hospital, clinging to life

In this twisty story, it also leaves Alex feeling compelled to act as the avenger for his buddy And even though the information he uncovers reveals that perhaps Randy 1s not so trustworthy himself, Alex sticks to the trail, traveling from Grand Rapids to Muskegon to Whitehall to Manistee National Forest to other points along the Lake Michigan shore and, finally, back to Paradise in the UP

About half the action of this story occurs while the southpaw is lying, comatose, in an ICU, and we definitely miss this lively, offbeat character when he's not around

#### Out of action

Why Hamilton chose to eliminate him from so much of the tale is anyone's guess, but the adventure definitely sags in his absence, and loses a good bit of its fun (unlike Hamilton's previous, always-edgy novels, "Winter of the Wolf Moon" and "A Cold Day in Paradise")

In addition, Alex's "partner," Leon Prudell, even though he's a minor character in this uneven novel, often provides more punch than does Alex

You'll learn something about sleuthing on these pages, though, especially if you're hankering to look up a lost love of your own For instance, should you plan to obtain a copy of your old love's birth certificate, better have Plan B at the ready In the State of Michigan, this is no easy task

Karen Daskas, owner of Tender in Birmingham, said that her sister, Cheryl, had an extensive line-up for the show, but had to retrieve the clothing from the Townsend Hotel when told the event was canceled Tender's fall focus 1s on tall boots, fur wraps, lots of belts, and textured and colored tights

The Daskases said that many customers came into the store to hug and linger when they heard about the terrorist attack on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon

"I think they just wanted to be with people they knew," said Karen And a company Tender does business with in Japan offered its condolences via fax "They speak barely ten words of English, but they wrote that they hoped that people we know are safe," said Karen

Act of buying Old Glory brings people together

Behind the Main Street storefront of American Flag and Banner, a business that has been selling and making flags in metropolitan Detroit since 1917, strangers become friends

Clutching flagpoles and star-spangled boxes containing nylon and cotton versions of Old Glory, they patiently wait in the Clawson store's check-out line - a queue that has spilled out the front doors, circled the building and reached into the back parking lot more than once during the last two days

As they wait in line, they cannot help but con verse with one another, it has only been two days since terrorists crashed planes into the World Trade Center in New York and Pentagon in the nation's capital

They share thoughts on the tragedy Tell stories to New York I can't push the rubble around This is about today's search for an American flag something I can do"

Exchange plans for the one they are about to purchase

One man cradles an enormous flag that was passed down to him by family He carefully opens the ensign to show the woman standing next in line

"It's beautiful," the woman says

The line of waiting customers bond for the same reason a steady flow of people continue to rush into the store It's the same reason retailers across metropolitan Detroit are selling out of American flags as fast as they can get them in stock Hundreds of miles away from the crash sites, local residents are grasping for a way to pitch in show support and stand up for their country

"You feel helpless You want to do something positive," says Jim Stewart, a Troy resident who's carrying a 3-by-5-foot American flag and two flagpoles "After the shock, I thought what can I do I can't go

Stewart says flying the flag fosters solidarity "You want to unite the country and that starts with uniting the neighborhood "

In line, Tracey Eckenrod clutches her 16-monthold daughter Brieana, and waits to pay for a flag windsock and five small American flags to place in her front yard Most of Eckenrod's Royal Oak neighbors have put up flags, she says "I think it hit me yesterday, it was time to show a little pride and say we're American "

Bobbi Beckett of Bloomfield Hills carries two poles having purchased two flags earlier in the day one set for herself and another for a neighbor, she tells others in line "I told my neighbor 'you need a flag' and she said thank you

'It's the American thing to do," she adds, her eyes suddenly watering "Now, I'll start crying It's just the simplest thing we can do They can't use our blood This is something that we can do"

Cheryl Hall, the store's public relations/special events specialist said the events of last week, including the closing of Somerset Collection in the wake of Tuesday's tragedy, did not pose a deterrent

"We called the charity to see what the feeling was," said Hall And when the sentiment was "let's go forward, let's move on," Hall said her group was in it 100 percent

The show featured works by Michael Kors, Gucci, Dana Buchman and Eileen Fisher, among others

Karen Daskas said that she had just returned from New York earlier in the month, and was planning a buying trip there again next week The hesitation in her voice spoke to the fact that no one knows when New York will be ready to accept visitors again

flags," says co-owner Bill Miles

"But I have a truck coming out from Newark tonight He'll be here at about five tomorrow morning'

Miles says he can't predict how long the supply will last - he's gone through two months worth of inventory in two days He will extend hours of operation and open for business on Saturday as long as he has flags to sell

"Never have we seen that many people standing in the showroom like that," says Miles, referring not only to the sheer number of customers he's seen but also to their behavior

"I couldn't believe it, really Because of the wait, friendships were being made in line," he says, a lump in his throat "They would come up and pay and then turn to the person behind them and say 'good to meet you' People were joining with strangers"






## **MICHAEL TROMBLEY** Here are quick cooking tips to sauces, potatoes

art of training to become a pro-fessional chef or cook is learn-ing the "tricks of the trade " In every kitchen I have ever worked, there has always been some different way of doing something To become successful as a chef, it is important to learn as many of these tricks as possible Solving the mysteries of a kitchen has always fascinated me Often these methods cut the preparation time or improve the taste or presentation

#### Tenderizing

One neat trick that quickly comes to mind is the use of cling wrap to tenderize meat We use it to pound meats and fish thinly You may want to try this if grilling rib eye, New York strip or top round steaks It's also great for pounding veal for scaloppini Place a sheet under and over meat and pound evenly with a flat surface, such as the smooth side of a meat mallet or a flat bottom pot or pan

#### Marvelous mashed potatoes

Making perfect mashed potatoes is an art that many people never seem to master The secret is to cut the potatoes evenly into 2-inch cubes, place in cold water to bring to a boil and then simmer Cool through and strain well

While still warm, add cream or half-and-half, warm butter, salt and pepper Mash well, but not too long or it will make the potatoes starchy The key is uniform cuts for the pota toes and simmer rather than boil

#### Super sauces

Producing good sauces and gravies also eludes many cooks but once you solve the mystery of making a good roux, you can produce great gravy every time!

With Rosh Hashana, or the Jewish New Year

#### Sounding the shofar

The shofar is a ram's horn which is blown somewhat like a trumpet One of the most important observances of this holiday is hearing the sounding of the shofar in the synagogue

No work is permitted on Rosh Hashana Much of the day 15 spent in synagogue, where the regular daily liturgy is somewhat expanded In fact there is a special prayerbook called the machzor used for Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur because of the extensive liturgical changes for these holidays

Another popular observance during this holiday is eating apples dipped in honey a symbol of the wish for a sweet new year

Jews celebrate Yom Kippur, on Thursday Sept 27 this year, which is probably the most important holiday of the Jewish year Many Jews who do not observe any other Jewish custom will refrain from work, fast and/or attend synagogue services on this day Yom Kippur occurs on the 10th day of Tishri

#### **CHALLAH**

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 envelopes dry yeast

tnickening always taste and reduce (or boil down) if not flavorful enough To thicken, add a roux, which is a cooked paste made of flour and but ter Mix the flour and water together to make a paste and then cook at a simmer, stirring continuously The longer you cook the roux, the more flavorful it will become and deeper in color

When your roux is ready, slowly whip it into your sauce The key points are to add the roux slowly to the sauce so as not to over-thicken Then, continue cooking at a low heat for about 1/2 hour, so that no starch flavor is left Strain before serving

#### Using oil sprays

In the old days, using a pastry brush was customary to oil meats and spread butter on sliced croutons We are now moving to spraying oils out of clean spray bottles to make an even coating and also so not to create bacterial growth on pastry brushes that may sit at room temperature for hours

#### Stick-free cooking

Here is a remedy for the age-old problem of food sticking to your pans or even on your barbecue grill I have seen so many beautiful pieces of fish mangled and ripped apart by so many people I have to admit that I myself may have done this, but only once There is an easy fix, provided you aren't using a non-stick pan preheat and pre-oil – this is the ticket

Do you want to brown a chicken breast in a skillet? Turn heat on medium high for a few minutes, place oil in the pan and wait until oil crackles when you drop a few droplets of water Then place the chicken in, being careful not to over fill the pan This is the other key to the success of a great meal

Do not put too much in the pan Overloading will cool your pan and make your food stick As for the grill, whether charcoal or gas, heat until the grates are hot

Scrape all the old particles away

coming up on Tuesday, about 100 members of the Sisterhood of Adat Shalom Synagogue in Farmington Hills recently got into the holiday spirit at the 2nd annual Hiddur Mitzvah

Setting the tone for the day was Lynn Scheele Nevins, wife of Rabbi Daniel Nevins, with an explanation of the 10-day period between Rosh Hashana and Yom Kıppur, or Day of Atonement "We're called upon for extra introspection," she

said about the traditional period of repentance "To turn away from sin and toward righteousness

In Hebrew, Rosh Hashana means, literally, "head of the year" or "first of the year " Rosh Hashana is commonly known as the Jewish New Year This name is somewhat deceptive, because Rosh Hashana is considered one of the holiest days of the year For most Americans, mention New Year's Day and they think of parties and football

But there is one important similarity between the Jewish New Year and the American one Many Americans use the New Year as a time to make resolutions Likewise, the Jewish New Year is a time to begin introspection, looking back at the mistakes of the past year and planning changes for the new year

The name "Rosh Hashana" is not used in the Bible to discuss this holiday The Bible refers to the holiday as Yom Ha-Zikkaron (the day of remembrance) or Yom Teruah (the day of the sounding of the shofar)

The name "Yom Kippur" means 'Day of Atonement " It is a day set aside to "afflict the soul," to atone for the sins of the past year

Yom Kippur is a complete Sabbath, no work can be performed on that day It is well-known that Jews are supposed to refrain from eating and drinking, even water, on Yom Kippur It is a com plete, 25-hour fast beginning before sunset on the evening before Yom Kippur and ending after night fall on the day of Yom Kippur

The Talmud also specifies additional restrictions that are less well-known washing and bathing. anointing one's body, wearing leather shoes and engaging in sexual relations are all prohibited on Yom Kippur

Children under the age of nine and women in childbirth (from the time labor begins until three days after birth) are not permitted to fast, even if they want to Older children and women from the third to the seventh day after childbirth are permitted to fast, but are permitted to break the fast if they feel the need to do so

Most of the holiday is spent in the synagogue, in prayer In Orthodox synagogues, services begin early in the morning (8 or 9 a m ) and continue until about 3 p m People then usually go home for



## German tradition grows, extends to Wisconsin

Many of us know the history of Okto-TRUE berfest, which began in Munich, Germany with The Royal Wedding celebration of

Prince Ludwig on October 12, 1810 But few of us know how Oktoberfest came to be an annual celebration here in America



1961, in Lacrosse, Wisconsin It originally stemmed from the G Heileman Brewing Companies discussions of an annual festival to promote their own beer Two malt house workers of German descent suggested an Oktoberfest celebration

BREW

The idea was quickly accepted due to the fact that October 1s the time for color Just as in our fine state of Michi-

gan, the leaves change from summer green to brilliant fall crimsons and golds in early October (or sooner) A celebration in October would be the perfect way of marking the end of the harvest season in preparation for win-

Everyone at Heileman agreed that an Oktoberfest celebration was the perfect venue to promote the brewery It soon became apparent by the growing size of the festival there would be much more to do than their brewery could handle alone The idea was presented to the Lacrosse Chamber of Commerce and was quickly adopted as a complete civic enterprise to promote the town of Lacrosse itself

Some of the primary objectives in making Oktoberfest a community-wide celebration were to promote local pride in Lacrosse, involve large numbers of people in the area, and to break even financially, while remaining a nonprofit organization The almost unbehevable growth of the Lacrosse festival

since that first year has been astounding

Lacrosse eventually adopted this celebration as a holiday for the community

In 1962 the name Oktoberfest, USA was listed and registered as a trade mark by the City of Lacrosse For over 40 years this celebration of beer, bratwurst, music and parades has made Lacrosse, Wisconsin's Oktoberfest the finest in the nation

Here in the US, we now celebrate Oktoberfest for the entire first week of October, but back in Germany, the Oktoberfest celebration carries on for a full two weeks - the last week of September and the first week of October That's a lot of celebrating

It never ceases to amaze me the historic and economic impact breweries have made here in our fine country

So the next time you're out for a relaxing evening, stop by your local brew pub as a way of supporting your community It just may put our town

back on the map

Here's a terrific German appetizer, also called Kohlrouladen, that goes great with a fresh, malty Oktoberfest lager You will not be disappointed As always, never trust a skinny Brewmaster







ur national psyche has been shaken to the core by Tuesday morning's terrorist attacks that destroyed the World Trade Center Tow ers in New York City and damaged the Pentagon in Arlington, Va

Our homes have been invaded with 24 hour, Technicolor coverage of the tragedy We feel horrified angry, vulnerable and numb with disbelief

A few of us will suffer some form of psychological stress but most of us will recover and discover a new resolve

I m not the way I thought I would be said Con nie Graye 49 of Plymouth who works in the fami ly owned Graye s Greenhouse

'I see the damage, but I see most of New York | Disorder terms this dose response City still standing I see the Pentagon\* and know there has been loss of lives, but I see life still going on I see everything different now I look at my gar den and it looks so beautiful ' The term Post Traumatic Stress Disorder is a familiar one We associate it with survivors of mili tary conflict, natural disasters, violent crime and now, terrorist attacks It's a definite psychotic con dition resulting from personally experiencing or witnessing a life-threatening encounter

Also the type and intensity of each survivors reaction to the same tragedy will vary greatly Fac tors contributing to a predisposition to PTSD include biology genetics mental factors and previ ous trauma Long term stressors compounding PTSD include marital and family discord, medical illness, or chronic health problems Victims aren't the only ones at risk Rescue work ers experience direct or indirect traumatization and victim's families often suffer vicarious" traumatization, reliving again and again the suffering of their loved ones while enduring their own loss



But can a nation suffer from a collective form of post-traumatic stress?

In a clinical sense, experts say, not really As a short term emotional response? Perhaps

"I think that you can certainly have a lot more exposure to disturbing imagery than before with this 24-hour coverage," said Dr John Campbell, medical director of Kingswood Hospital, Henry Ford Health System "I'm still sorting this out in my head "


Constant replay of the planes slicing through buildings and people jumping from windows could either build up a resistance to the imagery or "open up all kinds of new anxieties,' said Campbell, a for mer member of the US Air Force's Rapid Response Team, which provides stress manage ment to disaster survivors

Unresolved psychological issues may rise to surface "Anybody who has had some kind of traumatic loss and never had closure on it can have that loss reactivated, the sense of doom and grief said Campbell

And for those people with anxiety, depression, or other mental illnesses, Tuesday's events could result in serious consequences, he added "We had some people admitted to our hospital because of this They've struggled with paranoia, and their illness relapsed "

#### Severity

The greater the perceived life threat, and the greater the sensory exposure - the distressing sights, smells, sounds - or the extent of personal injury the more likely post-traumatic stress will

Campbell, who spent two weeks on the site of the Oklahoma City federal building following the April 19, 1995 bombing said everybody has a certain threshold that can be exceeded by what they see at a disaster scene Rescuers are involved in prolonged recovery efforts that often require extricat ing bodies in pieces

"It's beyond the bubble of normality outside the envelope of our comfort zone he said

However the human spirit is resilient Of the approximately 17 million people living in North America who are exposed annually to trauma and disaster, only 25 percent may suffer from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder said Dr Israel Liber zon Department of Psychiatry, University of Michigan Health System

The continuum for those who may suffer from PTSD is quite wide 1.3 percent for automobile accident victims and 40 50 percent for victims of catastrophes such as the atomic blasts and concen tration camp experiences of World War II Liberzon said Those survivors suffered years of "continuous trauma with no support, he added

'The vast majority (of those exposed to traumatic events) will recover Even those people who develop PTSD will recover independently within the first year," he said

#### Normal

The anger, sadness emotional malaise and desire for revenge many Americans are experienc ing are not primers for PTSD

'I think its a normal response and not a disor der " said Liberzon We should respond to horrific events We have to have a response to change our behaviors Our emotional response is not a by product of certain behaviors but a predisposition to particular actions '

Those actions will lead us to 'seek justice seek solutions 'he added

Like Campbell Liberzon believes the round the clock often repetitive media coverage could nega tively impact susceptible people People who already have problems could be affected in a bad way because it is continuously stimulating he said

Liberzon takes issue with the 'allness' state ments used by some news commentators - "Our lives will never be the same again and 'Our coun try will never be without fear anymore

For some feelings of anger and anxiety may linger or get worse over time Dr Israel Liberzon a post trauma expert with the Department of Psychiatry, University of Michigan Health System recommends seeking professional help if the following symptoms persist

- Excessive fear
  - Difficulty in controlling emotions
- Sleep disturbances
- Outbursts of anger
- Increased use of alcohol or drugs
- Intrusive memories

Age is not a factor in handling post-traumatic stress Children are more susceptible to the reaction of their parents than images they see on television," said Liberzon "Children can handle situations and endure a lot It is a matter of security provided by the immediate caregivers'

First of all, they simply are not true," he said We've never lived without fear, and we will live The media exaggerates the with more fear 1mpact

#### The future

Television sets in every classroom at Canton High School continuously played out Tuesday's attack Katherine Keim, 16, of Canton and most of her fellow students couldn't believe what they were seeing

'People said it seemed like something from a movie No one showed any horrible emotions about it ' said Keim, a senior "What scared me was everybody else's reaction They didn't seem to realize why it happened "

It bothered her that some students talked about retaliation without understanding the consequences The most intelligent conversations about the terrorist attacks occurred in her humanities class on Thursday, she said "Our teacher said on the whole you don't judge Christianity by the Ku Klux Klan and you don't judge Islam by the actions of these terrorists "

Keim hopes Tuesday's events will change students' thinking 'I think it's a horrible thing, but maybe its a wake-up call that we're not invincible Teenagers think they're invincible to everything "

Barb Lehmann, a Canton guidance counselor, believes the students' reactions were quite normal Other than the Oklahoma City bombing, few of them had a reference point for assimilating the attacks Yet, they seemed to handle the situation without undo stress

"I thought they were very much the same kids,

Evidence gathered by mental health clinicians shows there is a "normative post-dis aster biopsychosocial reaction" occurring in individuals and communities affected by a dis aster, according to the National Center for Post Traumatic Stress Disorder This pattern begins at the onset of the disaster and may last through the following 18-36 months It is delineated by four separate phases

1 *Heroic* Individuals and the community direct inordinate levels of energy into rescuing, helping, sheltering, repairing and cleaning up The increased physiological arousal and behavioral activity lasts for a few hours or for a few days

2 Honeymoon Community and survivor optimism remains high Survivors and rescue workers witness the influx of resources, media attention and visiting VIPS who reassure them their community will be restored, justice upheld and investigation conducted Generally, by the third week resources have diminished and media attention waned The complexity of rebuilding becomes apparent, and fatigue sets in

but their discussions were different Some of the discussions were quite intelligent I don't think they overreacted It's not like some of the adults here who may have undergone a different experience," she said

"These kids did not experience John F Kennedy being shot They did not see the Challenger going down This is the first situation they have not been able to relate People who served in the Vietnam War have a different experience "

Today's students will be the ones who carry the story and its eventual meaning into the future, said Lehmann "They will be the ones impacted, but they will be the ones who will make the changes "

YOUR CREDIT AND BUYING A HOME

Will bad credit two years ago keep you out of the housing mar-ket? Does a real estate agent have a right to see your credit application? Today The Meyers Report gets answers to readers questions from the experts

Q. We are purchasing a home The seller's real estate agent asked my bank for a copy of the mortgage loan application Do they have a right to see that? Why would they want to look at it?

A. Usually the seller's agent asks for a pre-approval letter, not the application itself. It's against the law for a lender to disclose debt to a third party without the borrower's approval Your loan application has information about your debt

"We, as bankers, know how private this information is," Tom Drozdz, residential mortgage originator for Archer Bank, said "If I was the borrower, I would say no and tell them to call my banker My banker will tell the real estate agent whether or not he thinks the loan will go through "

Q. When I was a college student my credit rating went from good to bad During the last two years, since I have been out of school, I have tried to keep current with all of my bills, such as telephone, rent and utilities I want to buy a house in the next two to three years and was wondering if I continued my path of keeping my bills current, will my past credit problems have a big effect when I go looking for a mortgage? The credit card bills I got in school, I haven't paid in five years thus far

A. You will have to pay off all your outstanding collections, Rick Deleon, branch manager for Allied Mortgage Capital Corporation, said Most lenders look for 24 months of a clean hislook for 24 months of a clean history, providing you have no bankruptcies or foreclosures in


your past That is time enough to re-establish your good credit If you have cleaned up your bills, you may qualify for an FHA loan For more details, check out Allied Mortgage's web site www.nolandlord.com

Q. My wife and I had a bank-ruptcy that was discharged two and a half years ago It was only on credit card debt We reaffirmed our house and two car loans We want to start looking at a new house, but are unsure how this will affect getting a new

mortgage A. "The bankruptcy does not prevent you from getting a new mortgage," Jeff Bock, retail man-ager for North American Mortgage, said "Your rate and loan to value will fluctuate depending on how the rest of your credit report looks" Lenders will be looking for sta-bility — how you have repaid other creditors, your earnings, and if your mortgage has been and if your mortgage has been paid on time

Most lenders will not process a loan less than two years after a Chapter 7 bankruptcy is dis-charged A few will take an application as little as one day later, but require the borrower have at least 20 percent down If some one has filed for a Chapter 13 bankruptcy, the borrower will be required to pay off his/her debts out of the loan first

Q. My husband and I are trying to get a mortgage to buy a new home in the Plainfield, IL area We already own a home and plan on selling it The money we make from the sale will be used toward a down payment on a new home We have had credit problems — been late on our mortgage and car payment, but not all the time My husband has been at his job for 23 years and earned \$74,000 last year I have been at my job for four years and earned



\$10,000 last year We know we can afford a house, but our credit problems are holding us back

A. There is some good news A. Inere is some good news for you, said Michael Niecestro, sales manager at Midwest Funding and a 20 year veteran of the mortgage business Your job stability and the location in which you are house hunting are on your side Plainfield is an "FHA Municipality" If you are planning to borrow at least \$209,000 you may qualify for an FHA new construction mort-

gage "FHA is more liberal when it comes to underwriting guide-lines and doesn't look at credit scores," Niecestro said Instead it puts more emphasis


on whether the buyer is current on credit debt, ability to pay back the mortgage, and the down payment

You already know that your late payments can be a problem for other conventional loans. When lenders run a credit report, they look for a credit score of at least 620, Niecestro said The score will take into account such things as the amount of open credit, as well as past judgments, bankruptcies, and collections You said you were sometimes late on your mortgage payments Lenders do not like to see 30 to 60 day late payments unless the borrower has had a clean history for the last 12 months Credit scores do fluctuate month to month Therefore, if for some reason you have a lower score, you can raise it fairly quickly by bringing credit balances down and keeping payments current





## Looking for studs? Pick your method

Installing shelves? Hanging a mirror? You'll need more than drywall to hang them on You need the solid backing of studs - the vertical 2x4s behind finished walls Here are ways (from high-tech to what-the-heck) to find them


Most reliable is the high-tech electronic stud finder that detects changes in density Pass it over a wall and lights and tones tell when you've found a stud Some give a signal for pipes, cable and wires

Low-tech magnetic finders locate screws and nails but they also find wiring, pipes and air ducts that might be nowhere near a stud

**m** No-tech methods include tapping and listening or noting where switches and outlets are installed, and "eyeball" techniques such as holding a light close to a wall and looking for nailheads and seams

A "what-the-heck" method involves drilling a hole and either being lucky enough to hit a stud or (if not) inserting a coat hanger and fishing around inside for a stud

# Protectors guard against surges, spikes

Back in the '80s we built a 4.200-plus square-foot home for our cousin It had every imaginable feature and convenience - multiple furnaces, a 400-amp main electrical service, a builtin intercom system, built-in ice maker, indoor barbecue. upscale everything

You name it, this house had it About five years ago lightning struck, and everything in this magnificent home got cooked - televisions, radios, the computer and apphances, even the built-in intercom system

There are things that you can do to help prevent the same thing from happening to you Lightning isn't the only form of electricity that can damage appliances and electromes

Blackouts, brownouts and surges of power associated with them can be equally dev-

spikes eventually can destroy or affect the performance of expensive electronic equipment such as computers, phones, faxes, television sets, VCRs, stereos and microwaves

Damage can occur instantaneously or over time, smaller surges cause the gradual deterioration of sensitive circuitry The common use of microprocessor chips has increased the need for surge protection because these chips generally are highly susceptible to voltage fluctuations

Surges and spikes result from an increase in "normal" electrical line voltage This often is caused by a sudden change in or demand for more electricity, such as turning on a large appliance, garbage disposal, air conditioninjg, washer/dryer, etc

A surge typically measures less than 500 volts and lasts

astating Even small surges or less than two seconds A spike, on the other hand, is much shorter in duration – less than one-thousandth of a second – but can measure into thousands of volts

Either event can damage electronics beyond repair Besides change in demand for electricity, everyday electric utility company switching and maintenance can produce damaging electrical surges on your power line Lighting, blackouts and brownouts are only part of the problem

Surge protectors act like an electrical sponge, absorbing dangerous excess voltage and preventing most of it from reaching your sensitive equipment

And like a sponge, surge protectors have a limited capacity Once the capacity is reached, the unit no longer is protecting your equipment and it should be replaced

Underwriters Laboratories (UL) rates surge protectors by amount of voltage protection The lower the rating, the better the protection The lowest UL rating for this voltage known as "clamping voltage" is 330  $\mathbf{volts}$ 

A few things to look for – and look out for - when purchasing a surge protector

Three-line protection -Surges can occur between hot, neutral and ground lines Choose a unit that protects along all three lines

🖬 A fuse or circuit breaker – Stops the flow of electricity when a circuit is overloaded and is not related to surges or spikes

Cheaper surge protectors are not designed to handle the higher voltage variety of spikes

Response time – Find out how fast the surge suppressor can react The faster the better

■ Cable line protection -Coaxial cable lines can carry surges and spikes For complete protection of your television/VCR, you should protect the cable line as well as the power line To protect this equipment, select a surge protector with coax line protection

Digital satellite line protection – Digital satellite lines can also carry surges and spikes These lines, however, cannot be connected to standard coax cable jacks Choose a surge protector with specially

designed digital satellite jacks Phone line protection -Surges can occur on telephone lines Phones, answering machines, fax machines and modems can be damaged from surges on phone lines To protect this equipment, select a surge protector with phone-line protection

A joule is a measurement of energy The joule rating on a

surge protector indicates the amount of energy or "over voltage" that that device is capable of handling

The higher the joule rating, the better the unit and the longer it will last The joule rating is determined by the total number of MOVs (metal oxide varistor) An MOV is a component in surge protectors that absorbs excess electrical energy and holds the voltage to a safe level The more MOVs the better

As computers get smaller and electronics become more pervasive in our homes, the need for spike and surge protection increases exponentially

Whether it's lighting or a glitch at the power plant, you don't want outside forces damaging your property

Purple comforts, spiritualizes, creates mystery and draws out intuition



# Chrysler introduces unique personal transportation with retro styling

hrysler is credited with "inventing" the tall car short truck minivan in the mid 1980s Now it has

introduced another unique vehicle with the PT Cruiser that is part car, part truck for the 2001 model year

PT stands for Personal Transportation and it is basically the same vehicle that debuted as the Pron

to Cruizer at the 1998 Geneva Auto Show With rave reviews from the public, Chrysler wisely decided to put it into production

Of course, the PT Cruiser's most noticeable feature is its retro, street rod styling that recalls a 1937 sedan delivery

Retro styling cues include the fat fenders, 1930s style grille, bullet shaped taillights, a slant back tailgate and a windshield that gives the appearance of being flat like those used before curved ones became practical

Whether you like the styling or not, it definitely

will elicit lots of second glances The PT Cruiser's uniqueness will last since Chrysler plans to sell 90,000 of them in the US and another 40,000 worldwide in model year 2001 This will jump to 235,000 in 2002, with 185,000 slated for the US market alone

If the favorable comments I received while testdriving a black PT Cruiser are any indication, Chrysler should not have any problems meeting these sales goals In fact the backlog of dealer orders would indicate they could be at a 250,000 sales rate

now, and for the next three years if they can build the cars It seems everybody, and I mean everybody, regardless of age, wants one The PT Cruiser would then be Chrysler's volume leader for the entire broduct line and would increase their market share considerably

Only one engine is currently offered, a four-cylinder, 2.4 liter one that features a dual overhead camshaft (DOHC) and four-valves-per cylinder The smooth and quiet running engine produces 150-horse power at 5600 rpm and 162 ft-lb of torque at 4000 rpm

Either a five-speed manual or four-speed automatic transmission, both with overdrive, are available While offering adequate perfor mance in an urban setting, the engine is definitely on the slow side when asked to lug up over two tons (about 3200 pounds for the PT Cruiser plus up to 900 pounds of payload) in hilly terrain, especially when fitted with the automatic transmission

The 5-speed stick trans makes the PT Cruiser a bit more fun to drive, plus you get a neat cue ball shifter knob to play with

The DaimlerChrysler engineers did an outstanding job in putting lots of carrying capacity in a small package While only about 169 inches long, about six inches less than the Dodge Neon on which the PT Cruiser is loosely based, it can carry 64 cubic feet of cargo with the rear seats removed This is only about two cubic feet less than a much larger Jeep Cherokee SUV and the PT Cruiser also comes with

#### a 1000 pound towing capacity

As innovative as the styling is, the versatile interior design is the key to the PT Crusser The seats can be arranged into no less that 25 different configurations for seating one to five people The rear seats are both foldable and removable If you order the optional folding front seat you can carry 8 foot lengths of lumber

The floor is completely flat when the rear seats are removed, just like an old panel truck The split 35/65 rear seat can be removed in two parts and both are fitted with small rollers for easy movement There is also a multi-position removable shelf panel The large rear slant back door means easy loading and unloading and has a cool look to it too

The PT Cruiser is not only fun to look at it is also fun to drive Steering is precise, the ride is very good, and handling on twisty roads is great, while the braking provides quick, controlled stops Indeed, it feels like a much larger vehicle And as in a small truck or SUV you sit high up for very good visibility The PT Cruiser has a rugged, built-to last feel and high quality materials appear to be used throughout the retro-look interior

The PT Cruiser is priced right starting with a MSRP figure of \$16,000 and with the "Limited Edition" Option a PT cruiser can reach past the \$21,000 mark The base price includes items like air conditioning, tilt steering wheel, AM/FM/cassette, dual outside power mirrors and power steering, windows and brakes The Antilock brakes with traction control at \$595 are definitely a worthwhile investment

The PT Cruiser is not without faults, albeit small ones For instance, the three deeply recessed and rather smallish instrument pods are somewhat difficult to read in the daylight The switches for the power front windows are conveniently located on the center of the dashboard, but those for rear windows are located on the back of the center console, where they are difficult to reach from the front seats

And while the PT Cruiser is easy to park, the turning diameter seems excessive for such a short vehicle Minor gripes for sure All in all, this is the Retro vehicle that will be taking the new car market by storm for the next three years, if production can keep up with the demand

The bottom line is that the PT Cruiser is a serious hauler whose utility will last years after its unique looks have grown old It represents a very affordable alternative for those considering a small SUV and want the convenience, but not the looks, of a small minivan




