







Township eyes grant for corridor



Plymouth Township officials want to get started cleaning up the Ann Arbor Road cor-

ridor, and they're looking at the possibility of federal money to help them do it.

Plymouth Township officials are eyeing the area between Eckles and Haggerty roads as the first section of the \$12 million Ann Arbor Road corridor plan to be completed

On Tuesday the Board of Trustees approved joining with the Michigan Department of Transportation in trying to secure a federal transportation enhancement activity grant to help pay for streetscape improvements to the section, which is the eastern border of the township


According to township planners, the project will include welcome signs at Eckles and on the exit ramps from I-275, as well as landscaping, and decorative lighting and brick pavers The cost of the project is estimated at \$1,057,225 If the grant application is successful, the township will pay 25 percent, or \$264,306 MDOT will pay 16 percent, and the federal govern ment will pay the rest

According to Supervisor Steve Min MDOT is the actual Applicate for the grant, because it is the road agency with jurisdiction But the township's support and financial match is required to move forward. He also said it was important to have the

Developer makes pitch for Daisy redevelopment

The former Daisy Air Rifle factory site in downtown Plymouth contains some areas with significant contami nation, including lead concentrations in soil exceeding acceptable levels

But that doesn't make redeveloping the 10-acre parcel for condominiums out of the question, according to an attorney specializing in "brownfield" developments, who spoke during a Plymouth City Commission public hearing Monday

Brownfield areas are designated as abandoned, undeveloped or underused properties not being developed or fully used because of environmental contamination In this case, the former Daisy site also housed a foundry and a railroad depot The site is located downtown on Union Street

Developer Jim McKeon has owned the former Daisy property since 1967 He wants to use roughly one quarter of the three-story, 230,000-square-foot building to redevelop into condominiThere's absolutely no indication that this place is a toxic site.'


ums and tear down the rest The estimated project price tag is \$31 million

The remaining buildings on the property would be torn down to make room for more condominiums, bringing the total number of units up to 150, ranging in price from \$280,000 to \$300,000 No site plans have yet been presented to the city

Attorney Richard Barr said an environmental study showed contamina tion on the site


"There's absolutely no indication that this place is a toxic site," Barr said "It is perfectly safe to live there and to live down the street"

not a big issue because Plymouth taps into city water, not well water, according to Barr

In some cases, contamination sites may be paved over, limiting exposure risks, Barr said The Michigan Department of Environmental Quality has given its OK in such instances

Developing brownfields can be expensive because of environ mental cleanup costs With designated brownfield areas, developers must pay the clean up costs, then may be reimbursed for those costs by the respective Brownfield Redevelopment Authority, which can use increases in tax revenue from the site

Once the developer has paid for clean up and has been reimbursed, the brownfield authority

gets the increased tax revenues Fran Toney, executive director of the Plymouth Area Chamber of Commerce, said developing the brownfield area into condo


miniums is the way to go Toney said the proposed resi dential use would be good for Plymouth Downtown Plymouth has a surplus of office space for lease already, and because of the Daisy site's residential sur roundings, developing it for industry might be a bad idea and would most likely meet opposition from residents .

"After extensive research and study the chamber came out in very strong favor of brownfield (redevelopment)," Toney said, addressing the commission at its meeting Monday "It's a win-win situation for the community '

the beginning of the federal government's 2003 budget year That is the soonest this project could start In all likelihood, it will probably start the following construction season in 2004," he said

Even if the funds were available sooner, the project would have to wait for MDOT to finish its repaying project of Ann Arbor Road between General Drive in the township to Newburgh Road That project is expected to begin next summer

Mann said it is important to start the Ann Arbor Road plan with this stretch, because, being the boundary, it is gives a first impression of the community to visitors

"That is the main thoroughfare and gateway to the community I can't think of a more appropriate starting point for the Ann Arbor Road project It's

long overdue We have a beautiful community, and there's no reason we should have a gateway as poor as we have now," Mann said

Mann is hoping the township will be able to pay its share of the cost with funds from a proposed Downtown Development Authority The Board of Trustees recently approved the intent to establish a DDA, and the township is holding its first public hearing on the topic Oct 9 at township hall

If the DDA is approved, Jim Anulewicz, the township's public services director, said the area will also be maintained by using DDA funds, rather than rely on the property owners to do it themselves

"If were going to make this investment, it's important to keep the investment up," he said

Bill for 3rd judge gets through House

Legislation giving Plymouth's 35th District Court a third judge passed the state House on a vote of 106 1 Tuesday afternoon

Rep Bruce Patterson, R-Can ton Township, is the author of the bill seeking the third judge ship,

'I got it done like I said I would," said Patterson from the House floor, where he maneu vered the legislation "Except for one Democrat, nobody was in opposition to it '

The bill wasn't scheduled to go before the House until next month However, Patterson said he was able to get it through earlier, though he declined to reveal the circumstances that allowed the legislation to be brought before the House this week

The bill now goes to the state Senate

'It will be interesting to see who gets it through the Senate," said Patterson "It's out of my

control now "

The Canton lawmaker said he'll be meeting with William Van Regenmorter, R George town Township, chairman of the Senate judiciary committee, in an effort to get the piece of legislation through the upper chamber and onto Gov John Engler's desk

House lawmakers apparently put little stock in a recent report from the State Court Adminis trative Office which failed to rec ommend a third judge for the court that serves the cities of Plymouth and Northville, plus the townships of Canton, Ply mouth and Northville

For nearly a decade 35th District Court judges have been seeking a third judge to handle an increasing caseload in a district which is growing in popula tion Figures released by the court show judges John Mac Donald and Ron Lowe handle an average 22,389 cases per year That compares to the statewide average caseload of 12,735 for district court judges

Local company partners with court to help fight domestic violence

Just as wireless phones proved to be valuable tools in piecing together what happened on the hijacked aircraft on Sept 11, they can also be valuable for victims of domestic violence who need to call 911.

911. Plymonth's 35th District Court and Ann Arbor Wireless, 606 S. Main, have teamed up to make sureemergency situations involving domestic violence do not turn into tragedies.

In 2000, the court, w h i c h serves Plymouth, Plym o u t h Township, Canton and Northville, heard 160 domestic violence

cases Kerry Erdman, 35th District Court administrator, said the court will decide who gets the phones on a case-bycase basis. Court officials will interview domestic violence victims to determine their need and desire for mobile phones. The court will consider the victums' financial need

as well "To be completely honest, this is something we hope we never have to use," Erdman

said. "So many people have (mobile phones) nowadays this will give domestic violence victims some security. "I suspect in most cases there's a good possibility they'll have (mobile phones) already." he added Two Samsung digital phones which will be provided to the court and to the victims free of charge, will only be able to dial 911 and will not be able to receive incoming calls, said Bill Davidson, store manager at Ann Arbor Wireless. The business will initially provide the court with two phones and will pro-

The Plymouth-Canton Educa tional Park Marching Band's performance was as spectacular as the bright fall day at the 28th annual Michigan Invitational Marching Band Tournament held at Eastern Michigan University's Rynearson Stadium on Sept 30


The Flushing Raiders hosted 19 competing marching bands and sent the Governor's Trophy for the overall highest score back once again to rest in the P-CEP Marching Band's packed display case This year marks the 26th the trophy has been awarded and the 17th time to the Plymouth-Canton Band

"I thought we had a really good performance," said Salem junior Evan Reissenweber, who plays tuba "We kept in mind and did better on everything we worked on "

Emily Chalifoux, a flutist and Salem senior, agreed "I think we did the best we could have done," she said "We really worked hard over the past week and there have been challenges with the weather, but we pushed

through it all "We just went out there and laid down the best show that we

could " And it definitely paid off In addition to the Governor's Trophy, the 190 Plymouth Canton marchers captured the Flight I first place trophy and swept all three caption awards for Best Music, Best Marching and Best General Effect with a score of

80 55 Other Observer area bands at Sunday's competition included Farmington Harrison, first in Flight III with a score of 69 9, Farmington, fourth in Flight II with a score of 59 9, and both in Flight I, West Bloomfield, fifth with a score of 60 2, and Westland John Glenn, seventh with a score of 47 8

"This was clearly a much better performance than last week," said Band Director Clayton Wachholz of the Plymouth-Canton production "The tempos have been bumped up so, automatically, the show is much better But we know we have a lot to work on "

Michael Tarr, P-CEP Marching Band assistant director, was pleased "They really built up a strong performance this week," he said This year's show, he added, while difficult to compare to previous years, 'is probably just as hard if not harder, than anything we have put on the field so far"

Plymouth-Canton's past shows were typically built around a story line or popular show theme This show is more about an experience," said Tarr of this year's "Programme One," which weaves a tapestry of music, color and pageantry for the audience "We wanted to try something new and different"

And while the audience clearly appreciated the P-CEP performance, it's not quite done

"We haven't played the whole music score on the field yet and there is probably another good minute and a half of drill to add" said Wachholz "Right now the show ends awkwardly, but that's OK because everybody knows that this is not the final ending



Brick fund-raiser lays foundation for new band uniforms

Saxophonists, trumpeters, trombonists, percussionists, flutists, colorguard and all the others who have made the PCEP band a way of life in high school are getting a chance to have their names engraved onto bricks to be displayed at the new Plymouth High School

The Plymouth-Canton Music Boosters is attempting to raise \$45,000 to go toward purchasing new band uniforms, which haven't been replaced since 1993 To accomplish this, the group is selling bricks for \$120 each, which will include the engraved names of present and former band students Order forms are available at the school to all present band members and are being mailed to former band members

Each brick is capable of containing two lines of 20 characters each, including spaces

Plymouth's City Commission Monday approved transferring Americast's franchise agreement to Wide Open West, a cable/Internet service provider based in Denver The firm was founded in 1999 and recently purchased Ameritech New Media, Ameritech's cable branch for an undisclosed amount

The boosters will retain the surplus from the sale of the engraved commemorative bricks after the vendor and any incidental costs are paid

Future band members will be the focus of an upcoming fundraiser, which would allow band members to have their names engraved on bricks that would be laid into a walkway

The PCEP marching band has consistently won awards both in state and national competitions In 2000, the band won first place in a statewide competition held at the Pontiac Silverdome

Some of the fund-raising goals for the boosters are

Buying new uniforms for the marching band Repairing or replacing dam-

aged and worn-out instruments Funding additional instrumental instructors for marching band and day band students

The brick fund-raiser is just one of several fund-raisers the band holds throughout the year Other fund-raisers include selling Little Caesars pizza kits, the holiday fruit sale and a gift certificate sale program through Kroger and Meuer, where 4 to 15 percent of the certificate sales go back to the band

Fund-raising has been a way of life for the band for years, but has become increasingly important because of financial constraints facing school districts

"The level of regular funding doesn't come close to covering

the costs of a nationally known program like Plymouth-Canton's," Jackson said

Judy Evola, community relations director with Plymouth-Canton Schools, said fund-rais ing efforts by the band and other groups such as parent-teacher organizations do not go unnoticed

"The school district is very appreciative of the time and effort they put into these fundraisers," Evola said



The Canton 12-year-old was recently sought out by yo-yo maker, Duncan, and Maloney was recruited to the elite Team Duncan

"I was actually pretty excited about that," Maloney said, his hands in constant motion while he played with one yoyo, then two "I use Duncan yo-yos at all competitions and basically represent the company '

Maloney, a West Middle School sixth grader, began yoyo playing just three years ago

"I saw a bunch of kids playing with yo-yos and doing some really cool tricks, and thought I'd like to try it," Maloney said He admitted he had to plead with his mother to buy his first yo-yo Once she gave in, and he learned his first two tricks from his father, Mike, he was hooked

His mother, Gail, recalled it was shortly after her son turned off the television for good

"He hasn't watched television in three years," she said "No television, no Playstation, nothing" The family participated in a challenge to leave the television off for one week. and at the end of the week, Gail Maloney offered to dou ble her son's allowance if he renounced television permanently

Jake Maloney took her up on her offer Soon after, he picked up yo-yo, and now practices between two and four hours every day

Yo-yo has become more than just fun and games for Maloney He has collected more than 400 yo-yos in three years, and has learned some of the most difficult tricks being practiced in the coun-

"Walk the dog," or "rock the baby" are now just kid's stuff to Maloney He has mastered tricks that are as difficult as they sound, with names like double iron whip, double suicide and spirit bomb

"You can never have too many yo-yos," Maloney said with a grin, opening a large trunk, filled with yo-yos and strings, in the family living room







House approval of 3rd judgeship is right move

It's about time

Nearly a decade ago local officials began pushing the state for a third judgeship in the 35th District Court Now, it looks as if that could actually happen, with the first significant progress on the most recent proposal coming last week The Michigan House of Representatives voted 106-1 in favor of a bill authored by Rep Bruce Patterson, R-Canton, that would create the new judgeship along with other changes in the district court system

There are caveats of course The bill has to pass in the Senate, and it requires Gov John Engler's signature before the end of his term next year In these complicated economic times, when other state and international issues dominate the agenda, that's no sure thing The Senate has plenty of ammunition to shoot the bill down, should it choose that route A just-completed study from the state Court Administrative Office failed to recommend the additional judgeship as part of its review of several district courts

Then too, there's language in the bill that would require Westland's 18th District Court to absorb the 29th District in the city of Wayne, an idea that sparked opposition in both of those communities last spring

Even Patterson tacitly acknowledges those hurdles "It will be interesting to see who gets it through the Senate It's out of my control now," he said, reacting in rather low-key fashion to the bill's passage in the House

Still Patterson deserves credit for rightly picking up a cause few would have bothered with That he would cham pion the additional judgeship is com pletely in keeping with his character as a legislator who pays serious attention to constituent services


the issue has merit

Almost everything that affects the legal system in southeastern Michigan has changed since the district court system was put into place by the legislature 32 years ago Population has shifted, traffic patterns are different, as are trends in education, employment and technology Even our views on crime and the way society deals with it are radically different than they were in the 1960s

Recent changes in state law also play a role in how many people walk through the doors of the courthouse, just north of downtown Plymouth, each day The limit on civil cases handled at the district level went from \$10,000 to \$25,000 several years ago Also bumped up was the limit on property theft/ damage cases heard at the district level – from \$100 to \$1,000 Those changes, we note, were made by the same legislature that repeatedly turns a deaf ear toward allocating or shifting additional resources to cover the burdens it dumps on our local courts

Nowhere has there been more impact than the five communities covered by the 35th District Court Plymouth, Canton and Northville townships, along with the cities of Plymouth and Northville In fact, Judges Ron Lowe and John McDonald (along with help from a visiting judge several times a week) preside over criminal and civil matters for a geographic area that contains 84 square miles and nearly 140,000 people Figures compiled by court administrator Kerry Erdman indicate the court last year handled 44,778 cases an average of 22,389 for each judge That's nearly twice the 12 735 average handled by Michigan dis trict judges during the same 12 month period

The Michigan House of Representa tives has done its part The state Senate and Gov Engler have an obligation to provide judicial relief and adequate rep

Emotional time

My name is Erin Wysocki (daughter of school board member Tom Wysocki) and I am a senior at Hope College in Holland, Mich I believe my mother contacted you regarding your article on people's feelings about what happened on Sept 11th So I guess I'll just tell you about my day on the 11th

I always watch the Today Show in the morning while getting ready for classes and work Tuesday, Sept 11, began just like any other day I was in the bathroom to fix my hair and makeup when I suddenly heard the hosts interrupt the program with a special bulletin Seeing as my apartment is quite small, I merely popped my head out the bathroom door to see what all the hullabaloo was about

As soon as I saw the World Trade Center was on fire I grabbed my stuff and took it into the living room By this time my roommate was up and joined me there We watched the live broadcast as speculation went from a possible bomb exploding to rumors of a small commuter plane crashing into the tower As soon as they confirmed that it was a plane that crashed and exploded, I thought of a terrorist attack I mean really, it was a perfectly clear day and that building is not something that you would just happen to not see, you know? Then my fears were confirmed as Jill and I watched the second plane crash into the other tower live We continued to monitor the developments until we had to leave for class and work at 9 30 I had to sit through a 90-minute class wondering what on earth was going on So as soon as class was over, I rushed across the street to the library, where Jill was working Her boss informed me that she had left for a prayer vigil in the Pine Grove (an area in the center of campus where many campus events are held), so I took off to find her and see what the latest developments were Though I couldn't find Jill, I did find a group of my friends there, who informed me about the collapse of the buildings Quite a large number of people, including students, staff, and faculty, had gathered around the perimeter, where a small stage and sound system were being set up Though I had shed a few tears watching the second plane crash, I think I was still pretty much in a state of shock, unable to cry or do much of anything except console my friends whose emotions were running at full force As soon as the first song that we sang, On Christ the Solid Rock I Stand, my emotions caught up with me and I was completely and utterly unable to open my mouth to do anything but sob I regained my composure and was able to sing the rest of the song as well as the songs following After singing and some speeches by our president, Dr James Bultman, and Dean of the Chapel, Tim Brown, we organized ourselves into small groups and prayed This has been the most emotional (time) of my life I have poured my heart out in prayer for the victims and their families, for the rescuers, for our government, for the people of our country, for those who were involved in the planning and execution of the events which occurred on that somber day, and for the entire world As I reflect upon the events, I cannot help but think about the fact I am roughly the same age as my grandparents' generation was when Pearl Harbor was attacked I wonder what

caused the world to get to this point and what our futures will be as a result of what has happened

What worries me now is how our country is reacting to the idea of war Hearing people in the United States speak of wanting an all-out let's-justbomb-and-obliterate-everything-insight war, I get very afraid of what extreme steps people may take here in our homeland without thinking hard about it first I really hope and pray that it is not that type of war

I may be radical in what I am about to say, but I feel it deeply As a Christian, it is my hope to live a life as much like my saviour's life as I can and I really know that Jesus Christ would have forgiven them for their actions I forgive those people who carried out those kamikaze missions I truly feel a peace about this It is bad enough that they will spend the rest of eternity in Hell

I think that if the general public was able to calm down enough to resist jumping out of their seats and allow the government and armed forces to do industry will recover Because we are Americans and we pull together better than any group of people in the world

We certainly have a great task before us, mourning our dead, guarding against further attacks, rebuilding what was lost, both in lives and property But we will succeed because that's the American thing to do We need to realize that instead of only seeing the negative things, we need to look for the rebirth of the American spirit And when we do we will rise like the Phoenix from the ashes, and we will be stronger, more united and a better people

Believe in America, and support America Don't let fear and shortsightedness finish the terrorists' job Because to do any less is an insult to the men, women and children of all races of all nationalities and all creeds who perished in the terrorist attacks of Sept 11 2001

Metro oversight efforts fall well short of mark

bizarre moves coming out of Detroit Metropolitan Wayne County Airport – even on the airport's own supercharged zaniness scale - it now appears we'll be treated to dueling oversight committees to monitor construction and other contracts handed out by the county executive Much as we'd like to believe two such groups will provide an extra safeguard for taxpayers and double the integrity of the letting process, we're a tad skeptical

The Wayne County Commission announced its endeavor last week, calling the group a stakeholder's committee It will consist of Airport Director Lester Robinson (a county employee), representatives from Northwest Airlines, a smaller airline, concessionaires, employee unions, the Detroit Chamber of Commerce and the state Bureau of Aeronautics and could begin meeting in the next week or two

The Michigan Legislature, meanwhile, is set to trot out a similar effort by week's end Sen Glenn Steil, R-Grand Rapids, has said he will introduce legislation setting up a group to monitor and approve airport contracts Steil, you'll recall, is heading up the legislature's ongoing 18month "investigation" of airport practices

Let's not dwell on the political timing of these developments, except to note that intelligence efforts by both factions who seem to know exactly what the other is planning and when - seem far superior to anything cooked up of late by federal authorities Their potential effectiveness, however, is fair game And that's where we see some real problems

The set-up for the county's committee is lacking in key areas. To begin with, it doesn't have the power to award contracts or even change the way contracts are let All it can do is review proposals, suggest changes and hire auditors to do a little Monday morning quarterbacking This might be sufficient if recent contract history at the airport didn't include charges of favoritism, cronyism and plain old poor financial judgment

But even if the contracting process was

In what strikes us as one of the more a model of ethical behavior to this point, the idea that a so-called watchdog group made up almost exclusively of interested parties - whose members benefit both directly and indirectly from its decisions · can meet its stated goal is just asking for trouble

> Finally, there seems to be some confusion over how the stakeholders will reach consensus Namely, will they meet in private to hash out the good, bad and ugly on airport deals or will those actions be discussed under the full glare of the media - and public - spotlight? Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara said the committee would be encouraged to meet publicly and would in any case make minutes of its meetings public

> While the legislature is still hammer ing out the details of its contract over sight committee, there are signs of trouble there as well For example, we've seen nothing to indicate this latest effort will be free of the us vs them politics dominating the legislature's Metro agen-

> Also, there is real danger in removing contract decisions from the local level and sending them to Lansing Not only does it unnecessarily bog down the process, but in the end, it lessens accountability Just look at some of the recent school financing decisions for a clue as to what the effect might be on the airport and its primary users

> We'll give this much to the state com mittee At least it will be subject to the requirements of the Michigan Open Meetings Act

> The Observer believes both efforts are less than genuine and will ultimately come up short In particular, the Wayne County Commission should take a second look at its plan to broaden both the committee's membership and mission

> And it goes without saying that any effort to clean up questionable contracting practices at the airport must be wide open and fully accountable to the public A lack of timely public disclosure and scrutiny is responsible for much of the airport's contracting mess in the first place

Mind's image of New Yorkers changes with 1st visit to city

Sitting in a 48th-floor restaurant at the Marriott Marquis Hotel Saturday night during my first visit to New York, it disquieted me to look at the other high-rises I could imagine someone sitting in their window the morning of Sept 11, gazing at the 110-story World Trade Center when the first hyacked aircraft smashed into the north tower

My mind's eye quickly flashed on the memory of standing in the newsroom, watching live on TV as



the second plane crashed into the south tower, and I could empathize with someone watching out their own window In New York City right now, you can't escape the tragic

events of that awful morning I was in New York with my older brother, Bryan, who owns season tickets to the Jets and goes to New York frequently Naturally, I expected New Yorkers to

be absorbed in the effort to recover from the terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center But the manner in which they're approaching it – and the degree to which they've taken the effort – surprised me Pleasantly

From the relatively unaffected borders of Plymouth, Mich, it's easy to watch the news or read the papers and say, "Those poor people " The response to the rescue effort here has been nothing short of amazing But there's something about being in New York, watching as the natives try to rebuild, to reclaim some sort of normalcy in their lives that makes you sad and proud, all at once

It's sad when you walk in downtown Manhattan and can actually *feel* the pain the first time you see for yourself, as I got a chance to do Monday, the damage wrought on this city, on our country Standing some 400 yards away, you can see the mountains of debris, the nearby buildings with windows – and lives – shattered, the burned-out hulk of a once-teeming district

You can actually feel the difference in the footing, the slipperiness of the soot-covered sidewalks, when you've crossed into Ground Zero The stench gets to you even sooner than that

People are battling to recover, to not let their lives be consumed by the hell the terrorists inflicted on us That's why most of the people were on our flight from Detroit to New York in the first place Were they scared? Probably After all, only 50 or so passengers occupied a Northwest Airlines flight designed to carry 125

I was one of the 50, because I didn't want to let fear keep me from my first visit to the Big Apple I wanted to see the Jets, and I wanted to see Ground Zero I didn't want to let Osama bin Laden take that away from me

I expected security to be tighter at Metro Air port and it was Had to show my boarding pass and photo ID to get past the security checkpoint More uniformed people with badges

The biggest difference though, was the lack of passengers There were plenty of security people on hand, but the ratio was smaller than in most classrooms. They started bearding our flight at 3 p m, and had us seated and in the air before 3 30 "I've *never* checked in that fast," said my brother, the frequent flyer

Is the lack of passengers directly attributable to the tragic events of Sept 11? Almost certainly "We're on a four-day trip, and only one of the

legs is full," said flight attendant Doreen Leuthard, who hails from Minneapolis, Minn, Northwest's hub "I don't know if people are more afraid now, but they are more aware They're

watching a lot more " Aside from the fact we got pretzel sticks instead of peanuts, the flight was uneventful No one seemed scared People drank their complimentary beverages, read their books and magazines, or just slept One young woman played Spider Solitaire on her laptop computers

After landing in New York, we got tickets to Les Miserables', then had dinner in The View, the 48th-floor restaurant in the Marriott Marguis

Everywhere we went all weekend, there were reminders that New Yorkers are determined to pull themselves up, literally dust themselves off and get back to living

We walked around Shubert Alley at Broadway, buying souvenirs to support Broadway Cares Equity Fights Aids effort Lots of noise and hubbub, hustle and bustle, until a fire engine roars by Everything stops, and applause rings out for the firefighters, whose popularity in this city has rightfully skyrocketed

At Chelsea Jeans, a clothing store two blocks from the rubble, everything remains covered in dust as owners await decisions from the insurance company Opened just last year, Chelsea Jeans still needs a massive clean-up effort, and some structural repair, but they find themselves hamstrung by red tape, drowning in their own emotions

"Consider that everyone who works here has families, and a lot of our customers came from those buildings, and you don't know if they're alive or not," said Al Levy, the manager at Chelsea Jeans "It's hard"

The area is barricaded to keep pedestrians out, but they come anyway They stand at intersections, where you can see the destruction yards away They come and they stand for interminable periods of time, transfixed by the sight, transformed by the experience

But they aren't letting it get them down They are buoyed by the support they've gotten from around the country, but New Yorkers seem to be a special breed While appreciative of the help, they want to send a message to the terrorists New York is still open for business

With the support of people all over the country, New Yorkers haven't just adopted 'United We Stand" as a motto

For them in these dark days its a way of life

Next year's election will be the biggest in years With Gov John Engler leaving office, the governorship is up for grabs

Term limits will purge most sitting members of the state Senate

Ambitious House members are jostling to move up Poised to run for the state House are shoals of local politicians

Those contemplating the wonders of running would do well to remember the old adage Be careful in what you wish for, you just might get it

The fact is that the 10-year boom that made holding office so much fun – plenty of revenue to pay for both tax cuts and more spending – is over

Done Finished Instead, financial experts are predicting Michigan's economy is heading into a downturn comparable to the tough times in the 1970s and early 1980s produced by the Arab oil embargo and the Gulf War in 1991

Tax collections were headed south even before the terrorist attacks on Sept 11 With a fullblown recession almost certainly in the cards, the revenue picture looks very, very bleak It's clear the state budget that begins this week (on Oct 1) is based on wildly optimistic revenue estimates, and some in Lansing are saying the budget for next year could be out of balance by \$1 billion or more

That puts candidates who were looking forward to more fun and games while in office in a real bind The obvious financial policy remedy is to cut costs and – gasp' – raise revenue But advocating the obvious becomes tough in a competitive and uncertain election year

When it comes to cutting appropriations, most Democrats roll their eyes and look for ways to sidle out of the room Most Republicans are fixated on cutting taxes Both are utterly unprepared to answer the simplest questions about what they would do about the state's financial situation if elected

In an attempt to be helpful to those running for office, I offer two modest proposals

First, postpone the scheduled reduction in income and business taxes until the economy picks up Freezing the present rates at current levels would yield around \$200 million in revenue this fiscal year and almost \$600 million next year Although this isn't going to cure budget shortfalls of \$1 billion it ain't chicken feed

Second, stop burying our heads in the sand

Boom is over, and with it fun & games in state budget

about imposing sales taxes on purchases made over the Internet

There is no doubt that shopping on the 'Net is the wave of the future

Customers accustomed to pointing and clicking with their mouse are perfectly aware they aren't paying sales tax when the FedEx package arrives

The Michigan tax form has a line where taxpayers can enter the 6-percent sales tax owed on pur chases made from retailers who do not have a physical presence in Michigan Hands up, everybody who has meticulously kept records and entered the appropriate 6 cents on every dollar spent!

Treasury estimates that not taxing purchases made on the Internet will cost Michigan \$240 million this year With retail sales still surging on the Internet, the revenue lost is likely to increase substantially in years to come (While we're at it, consider that not taxing out of-state retailers is in fact a 6-percent penalty against companies that have stores in Michigan and provide jobs to our residents)

From his position as chairman of the National Governors Association, Gov Engler is leading an attempt to set up a collection system for taxes on Internet purchases Some 20 states have already signed up, not including Michigan, yet

The bill stalled in House Tax Policy Committee this spring, where conservatives assailed it as a new tax that will stifle the promise of e-commerce Leadership managed to bypass Tax Policy by running a new bill through House Commerce Once it reached the floor, representatives narrowly approved the measure in a 57-50 vote

I realize neither of my modest suggestions are as much fun as having it both ways, as we did in the 1990s But any candidate with even a shred of responsibility is going to have to come up with some plausible policy for resolving what, as of now, looks like a very tough economic dilemma

Legislature passes compromise education funding bill

Local school districts "are likely celebrating" the passage of a compromise education budget bill in the state Legislature Wednesday, Sept 25, according to Brian Whiston of Oakland Schools

The compromise avoided the worst of the cuts proposed earlier this year, restoring basic funding for districts to \$6,500 per pupil for the current school year

But the restored funding comes at the expense of "categoricals," specially earmarked accounts for programs like summer school for elementary students, reading recovery programs and professional development for teachers Some categoricals have been trimmed, others eliminated

For local districts, it means the cuts aren't as deep as they had feared

Urban schools affected

Those most likely to suffer cuts will be older, more urbanized school districts that are more heavily dependent on those categoricals, said Sen Gary Peters, D-Bloomfield

Even for them, the losses are "cuts to the increase," the administration is quick to point out All schools are getting more money than last year, when the basic allowance was \$6,300 per pupil

The state is in the second year of a three-year budget A slowing economy meant that lawmakers had to pare back, but when they failed to reach agreement in the spring, Gov John Engler ordered an across-the-board 5-percent cut

That could have been costly to some districts, although the amounts varied Walled Lake for instance, would have lost more than \$1 million

Another district hard hit would have been Rochester, los ing \$855,000

The compromise, worked out in conference committee and passed by the House Thursday, Sept 20, and in the Senate Wednesday, Sept 25, brought back the per pupil "foundation grants" to the level schools had originally anticipated

Taking the money instead from those special programs, lawmakers found a way to trim \$149 million from the budget for the current year, dropping the budget total from \$11 139 billion to \$10 989 billion Next year's budget of \$11.3 billion got trimmed \$302 million, said Whiston, who serves as legislative liaison for the Oakland Intermediate School District

It was the newest categorical programs that got cut first, said

Shulman, R-West Bloomfield Summer school for elementary students, a program intended to assure that youngsters get extra instruction if they still can't read by the time they leave third grade, was cut altogether

That could be a problem for some districts. Whiston said Waterford, as an example, had launched a summer school program for the first time last year Now with no funding, it will likely have to be cut immediately

Another reading program, reading recovery, got trimmed \$25 million this year and \$30 million next year, but was not eliminated altogether

Professional development programs for teachers were axed entirely, effective this year

One new categorical, Parent Involvement & Education grants, also known as PIE grants, was spared trimming for this year The \$45 million program is intended to teach parents how to work with their youngsters to improve school performance But the program gets cut altogether next year

Whiston said that poses a problem for school districts expected to gear up to start the new program this year only to have to cut it next year

Republicans for the most part were pleased with the final compromise Harcek explained dis

Todd Harcek, aid to Rep Marc tricts had lobbied lawmakers primarily saying they wanted to keep the "foundation grants," per pupil funding, at the previously set levels

> Aaron Keesler, spokesman for Sen Dan DeGrow, R Port Huron, agreed that the main goal was preservation of that basic school district funding

'Rainy Day Fund'

Democrats, on the other hand mostly objected Sens Alma Wheeler Smith, D-South Lyon, and Gary Peters, D-Bloomfield, both argued that the state should have been willing to dip into its budget stabilization fund, the "rainy day fund," to keep spending at anticipated levels

"We are talking out of one side our mouths when we say programs like 0-3 preschool, reading assessment, parenting education and professional development are critically important, and out of the other side when we say they are going to have to be delayed It's wrongheaded We are saying these things should be done, but not on our dime "

Smith argued the rainy day fund should be use, "that's what it's there for "

Peters said the state has already dipped into the rainy day fund, for more than \$70 mil lion And since education is supposed to be the state's priority, it

should have for schools, too

"That's the purpose of the fund, to smooth out dips in the revenues in our cyclical economy and make sure we have continuity in our programming This is a short-sighted approach to budgeting and education." Peters said

In the Senate, the education budget was approved in a 22-13 vote

In the House, the budget passed 62-44



Theater company opens season with 'Bodyland'

Imagine a world where death doesn t only encom pass funeral planning but also decisions about selling the deceased person's body parts and struggling with the moral and ethical issues that entails

It may not be too hard to fathom when we consider all the people on waiting lists for donated organs they may never receive

This futuristic possibility of buying and selling human body parts and advances in biotechnology is played out in Bodyland a production showing at the Furniture Factory, the old Weber Furniture Factory building on Third Street in Detroit which has been renovated as a performance space

Directed by Erika Block for the theater company Walk & Squawk Bodyland opens Thursday Oct 11 to anyone who wants to choose their own entry price

'It's up to people," Block said of the cost "We want them to come One person gave us a loaf of bread "

Closed since a brief opening last year in October flooding in December put the newly renovated factory back under construction Now Walk & Squawk Per formance Project, which has a long term lease of the building, is getting ready for it's first full season

"It's huge because we have this really packed sea son," Block said "We're now able to present other artists'

The idea was taken from a play Block wrote in 1987 Rewritten as a collaborative piece, a thread of

the former play was used as a springboard for the improvisation piece about a dad and daughter who must decide what to do with their wife/mother's body parts after she dies

Bodyland focuses on the impact the sales have on families and questions, " how much of who we are is wrapped up in our physicality," Block said "Do you take some of that person's being or identity with you? "It's about raising questions, not answering them"

Sip & Squawk

Talk backs after the show, called Sip & Squawk, allow performers and professionals to talk with audi ence members about their questions and differing perspectives

Everything we're doing is a new kind of work," Block said "It's not just going to the theater"

The name in itself, Walk & Squawk Performance Project 1s pretty unforgettable and that's what artis tic directors Erika Block and Hilary Ramsden were counting on With Ramsden's focus on movement and Blocks on writing, they wanted a name that conveyed the group's goal of combining movement, language and sounds and giving them equal play

'For most people, it's kind of unusual," Ramsden said "I guess it's the way we work We look at the issues and characters from a different perspective than most '



We have a wide open 15,000-square-foot building with this very cool mix of art deco 1920s retail space' Block said "We did as much as we could

(without) changing the basic features of the building They put up walls, moved a staircase and created a second floor lobby which overlooks the lower lobby A wall of glass, made of windows and French doors, allows division of the space without blocking natural sunlight New plumbing, electrical and modern bathrooms were added And the 100 seats inside the performance area are moveable, allowing for new set-

'For *Bodyland*, we're going to take the place apart and put seating all over the place," Block said

"It's an intimate space which is kind of raw," Ramsden said, adding that it's reminiscent of Chicago or New York theaters "It's a very different experience if you're sitting 5 feet from a performer or 10 feet from a performer as opposed to sitting 50 or even 100 feet away'

They also have plans to use the building's iron and steel awning for small outdoor performances

The Furniture Factory is open to other media to promote artists from around the nation and world It features space for a gallery, classes, theater, dance and musical productions

"It's unusual for here," said Block "It's not that it's such a unique concept outside this area "

Kimberly Johnson of Kimberly Consulting in Birmingham saw the Furniture Factory as a perfect oppor tunity to complete what wasn't done at the Detroit







Tiger-trainer takes circus to new heights

Sara Houcke's performance with the Ringling Bros and Barnum & Bailey Circus gives a whole new meaning to "Beauty and the Beast

The 5-foot-10 flaxen-haired stunner with a pierced tongue and navel looks more like a runway model than a tiger trainer She steps into the cage that she shares with her tigers and the ferocious animals melt at her feet

"The relationship, it's not the usual act you would see where the man comes into the ring, throws the chair, there's a lot of screaming and the cats are jumping everywhere," said Houcke, who appears with the circus at Joe Louis Arena now through Sunday, Oct 7

"I do a lot of petting I feed the meat from my hands There's one-on-one contact You see the tigers and the lions jumping everywhere Here it's a much smoother, easy-going act "

Her nickname, the Tiger Whisperer, a play on Robert Redford's character in the film The Horse Whisperer, comes from the way that she communicates with her tigers Houcke whispers - or "whuffles" as she calls it - to the cats, cuddles and caresses them

During this year's performances, Houcke works with four different kinds of tigers - standard, white with stripes, snow white and golden tabbies - all of whom stand at an average height of seven feet tall and weigh 400 pounds Houcke's interest in tigers is a relatively recent one, although the circus has always been in her blood

Houcke, born March 22, 1977, in Torquay, England, is a seventh-generation circus performer Her father, Sacha Houcke, is a famed French aniWho: Sara, "The Tiger Whisperer," and the rest of the Ringling Bros and Barnum & Bailey Circus When: Times vary, Thursday-Sunday, Oct 4-7 Where: Joe Louis Arena, 600 Civic Center Dr., Detroit Tickets: \$10, \$15, \$17 50 and a limited number of VIP tickets, call (248) 645-6666°

mal trainer while her mother, Judith Benson, 1s a former English professional dancer, turned trapeze artist Sacha Houcke and Sara's younger sister Kerin now also tour with **Ringling Bros**

"I grew up with it," Houcke said about the circus "I love it I wouldn't want it any different It seems so normal to a person now I've done it all my life It's in me '

She began her circus career at age 2 as a clown in Switzerland's Circus Knie At 17, she moved from her parents' home in Switzerland to Germany to work with another circus By that time, Houcke already had experience performing with camels, elephants, horses, rhinos, hippos and zebras

"It was harder than I thought it would be to leave home, to not have mom around you all the time It's not a piece of cake "

Her job wasn't easy, either Houcke was hired to run the animal department for the circus

"I had to get the feed, find veterinarians in every city, set up and set down, everything that belonged to taking care of the anımal," said Houcke, who speaks four languages

At the age of 19, she found tigers fascinating and soon thereafter "realized that they weren't very many female tiger trainers And there aren't all

that many tiger acts going on, either

Three years ago, she was able to bring that idea to fruition when she moved to the United States to work for Ringling Bros The cats' owner, Josif Marcan, taught her how to work with the animals Meanwhile, Houcke found it important to focus on creating a relationship with the cats, whom she watered, cleaned and fed so she could get to know them

She and the tigers know each other so well that they can read their moods, explained Houcke who enjoys clubbing in the towns in which she is performing

"Sometimes it'll work good, sometimes it won't I can't put my head into the head of the tigers to see what is going on that day If I'm nervous, the cats will be nervous that one day If I'm uptight about something, the cats will feel it and mess around with me'

"They totally feel my mood I have to be happy about going m there "

Conversely, Houcke respects the tigers' ever-changing moods

"They come up and you know that they want to be petted We stay out of conflict that way, too If he's in a bad mood, I won't push myself on him If the tigers' in a good mood, if they're doing all right, I'll go in and approach They're like human them beings If you're in a bad mood, you don't want someone nagging you about it "

Houcke remains close to the tigers outside of performances She parks her "home," a 45-foot RV that she pulls from city to city, next to their cages

Since Houcke joined the circus, she has become a media darling, the focal point of advertisements and commercials, as well as the



Searching for this summer s gritty police drama? Look no fur ther than Training Day, a fastpaced action thriller that explores the fine line between cops and criminals

Det Sgt Alonzo Harris (Den zel Washington) is a 13-year veteran with the Los Angeles Police Department He is a jaded cop, someone who lost sight of why he's carrying a badge and gun That tricky animal known as justice is no longer a question of right or wrong to him

'It's not what you know," he tells his new partner, rookie Jake Hoyt "It's what you can prove "

Officer Jake Hoyt (Ethan Hawke) wants to join Harris and his undercover unit so he can work his way up to detective and buy that nice house in the sub urbs Fresh from the academy, he still believes a good cop can make a difference

The movie stretches over a 24hour period in which Hoyt has a chance to impress Harris and

show he has the stuff to make a good undercover officer Harris, meanwhile, has other plans for his new partner

I liked this movie on many levels, starting with Denzel Wash ington He's created a complex character in Alonzo Harris, a detective who still believes somewhere in his heart that he's out there doing good for the community When Hoyt questions his tactics at one point, Harris explodes in his face and recites the number of arrests and convictions he's made over the years


At the same time, swaggering around in his black leather coat

and heavy gold chains, you know that Harris is anything but a good cop He believes he is a wolf among the sheep He might be there to protect the sheep, but he's still a wolf

Ethan Hawke also gives an edge to his performance It quickly becomes clear this man is willing to blur some lines if that's what it takes to earn his detective badge And when he finally turns on Harris, it's not because of justice



But when I called the fluffy-blonde musician last week, he didn't sound like he was in the mood to chat - nevermind dance He answered his cell phone

while traveling somewhere near Jacksonville, Fla, and all I could hear were the rumblings of his bandmates - his brother Clarke Baechle (drums), Jacob Theile (synthesizer), Joel Petersen (bass) and Mike Dappen (guitar) - who all must've been in that van too long It makes it hard to hold a conversation, still we managed And I learned all about this band I've just started to admire, though they've been around for quite some time

Faint memories

"We started playing together in 1994, basically it was the same band with some different members," said Baechle simply "In 1997 we decided to call ourselves The Faint It took a while for us to agree on a name '

You see, the band didn't want to limit itself by offering up the wrong moniker They sought a name that would describe the music, but not completely define it After all, a lot has changed in the past seven years

'When we first started out, we played in a folk setting where we would sit down," said Baechle "It was like low-fi folk music Our sound has just kind of evolved over the years'

Don't expect to unwrap a copy of *Danse Macabre*, and hear any-thing remotely folk-like These days the band sound more like a morose hybrid of 80s synth-heroes like Thomas Dolby or Duran Duran drenched in modern electronica

"We just got tired of the indie guitar sound," said Baechle While loud guitars are still paramount, its the synthesizer that's stealing



And so, punk rock mentality lives But the world surrounding this band sounds so much darker these days, as Danse Macabre comes across more like a collection of grim fables than mindless disco hits There is no real explanation for it, but the CD seems appropriately timed at this, the start of the spookiest season

"Well, we had been touring a lot on the last album, Blank Wave Arcade For a couple of years we'd been playing these songs We were trying to move forward and be more interesting with our electronics It turned out a little bit darker We still wanted it to be fun to play, fun to watch and fun to dance to "







Get your fill at Loving Spoonful

A Schoolcraft College graduate, Shawn Loving had his mind set on combining his cooking skills with the ability to give back to the community

After nine years away from Michigan, he has returned to do just that On Tuesday, Sept 18, Loving opened Loving Spoonful in Farmington Hills, his fifth restaurant venture and first in Michigan

Loving recruited his employees through Schoolcraft and his other alma mater, Golightly Vocational School in Detroit

"Largely because I was born and raised on the east side of Detroit, I'm a big fan of cultural progression here and a big fan of Schoolcraft College, which is my alma mater "

Located in the former Copper Creek restaurant, Loving Spoonful offers eclectic dishes such as rye and pistachio-encrused whitefish, herb and garlic pork tenderloin and napoleon potato tower

Loving prides himself on keeping up with adventurous ingredients

"I can take a very light herb and mix it with a strong fish and have it balance It challenges you to be able to (accomplish) what the customer needs," said Loving, who lives in Wixom


"I'm intrigued by quinoa, a new grain that's being used a lot I like the fact that guests ask me (about) the way it is being paired with a lamb dish The restaurant is involved that way '

He takes guinoa and blends it in lamb trilogy grilled loin chops, roasted lamb sausage and Moroccan spiced lamb patty

In keeping with his goal of maintaining customers' satisfaction, Loving prints his menus in house, allowing him to frequently change available dishes

"Having tasty food, not having food that is pretentious or not understandable (is the goal) It's very important that the customers understand what they're eating These days, it's an honor to have people come into your restaurant"

Cooking has long been an important part of Loving's fami ly He learned to cook from his mother, whom he considers "a home chef," and his father, a dietitian at a hospital



"I loved Thanksgiving and Christmas time when I could watch my friends and family smile and eat and do all those things," Loving said

Schoolcraft College gave him the opportunity to study and compete abroad His travels have taken him to Bangkok and Singapore, among other places

"As a chef, one of the most important things is to travel and share ideas with other chefs," Loving explained


He honed his craft at Chef Keith Famie's former Royal Oak venture, Les Auteurs, as well as the Ponchartrain Nine years ago he left Michigan to work for at Disney World in Orlando, Fla, where he opened the Garden Grill at Epcot Center's The Land There vegetables and herbs are grown hydroponically (in a nutrient solution rather than soil) He aided a cultural task force in EuroDisney and opened two Race Rock Cafes, one in Orlando and the other in Las Vegas, Nev His fourth restau rant venture is Fountainview Espresso

Loving hadn't necessarily planned on opening a restaurant in Michigan While he was searching for locations for his new venture, metro Detroit made the most sense

"I was trying to find a location We looked at Chicago, New York, cities with all the conventions of bigger cities There was a lot of talk about how this area could use another 'destination restaurant location 'he said

A building off the ninth hole of Farmington Hills Copper Creek Golf Course was a prime loca tion Loving Spoonful's spacious dining room and oversized win


"I always second guess myself I ve gone back to Schoolcraft and to have (students) call me chef I don't know how to take that, he said with a smile





"Every design isn't necessarily a universal code but it's something we've been doing since we bought the place from the Kemnitz family 30 years ago," said Cindy Smith

Cindy and her family marked the 50th year the small candy store has been in business in Plymouth the weekend of Sept 28 with free giveaways to customers and an anniversary cake

"I think we've been successful because we offer a quality that we feel is superior," said Cindy "Aside from still handmaking a majority of our chocolate candies we offer services like gift wrapping, shipping and special orders "

Cindy's mother, Audrey Hamlin and grandmother Marie Swain, purchased the downtown Plymouth store from George and Betty Kemnitz in 1969

"My grandfather was in real estate for years and knew my grandmother wanted to do something in business for herself He called her one day and said there was a store downtown for sale and did she want to go look at it He didn't even tell her on the phone what kind of business it was "recalls Cindy

Going strong

Thirty-two years later the Smith family still owns the Ann Arbor Trail business Cindy said they never changed the name from Kemnitz because they want ed a smooth transition and didn t want people to ini 'ially compare the two families and how they did business


In time people came to relize we bought the from George said Cindy who believes the original owner has since passed away



Then there's Erin, my wonderful wild-child Almost 2 years old, she revels in life's simple pleasures with gusto — eating spaghetti, for example, until she's left with an orange face that makes her look like Fred Flintstone Gargling her milk, screaming with delight, imploring me to read the same book over and over again, and wearing her big sister's ballerina tutu all day long

When she and I were alone one afternoon after the terrorist attacks, I turned on the TV for a minute to catch the latest news As I watched the rescue and recovery workers comb through the mountain of rubble that had once been the World Trade Center, I began to cry Erin, though not understanding why I was sad, patted my arm and said, "It's 'kay mom It's 'kay mom"

I looked at her and hugged her with all my might All the despair and hopelessness I felt at that moment melted away

So that's why this column will be called Squeeze the Day I hope to share some insights about family life and how we manage to discover life's httle pleasures in the midst of our hectic sched ules And how there are times, usually when you're ready to drop from sheer exhaustion, that you get to squeeze your kids and everything is OK once again

Although Audrey will be cutting down the time she spends in the kitchen because of recent knee surgery, her husband Merle has no plans of leaving "I have an investment here," said Merle, 73 "I'm here to make sure everything is how it's suppose to be Even though I've been making these recipes for 30 years I still get the book out every time This is work It takes me eight hours just to clean one machine and no matter what happens to us there has to be candy


Djokic was tripped inside the Salem penalty area and with 21 33 left he was awarded a penalty kick He converted, and it was a 2-0 game

Expanded business can be sued

We live in a sub-division and the neighbor across the street has been using his property for commercial use

in violation of the covenants of the subdivision for a long time. He recently changed the nature of his business, and he now has many cars parked in front of his house. Can he

claim that the association acquiesced to his commercial activity?

In a similar case, the court of appeals rejected the argument of the defendant that there was an unjustifiable delay in bringing suit or that the delay in doing so caused the defendant prejudice

There was also an argument brought by the defendant that the association had not enforced the restriction against all owners and was therefore barred by the doctrine of waiver However, the court said that while many other individuals were operating businesses in violation of the covenant against commercial use, these businesses were innocuous

The appellate court recognized that the trial court had had an opportunity to view the neighborhood and conclude that no other property came close to defendant's in terms of commercial activity

Therefore, you or your association may have a basis to bring an action against the commercial use, assuming that you have the legal ability and enough money to do so

"When my husband died (30 years ago), the insurance man said, 'Don't sell your house Think twice I have people sell (immediately) and they're sorry to this day"

Relatives help Jakubus take care of the home and her health 1s good

Oren and Jeryline Gilkey Jr moved next door to Jakubus about a year and a half ago They had lived in a house in Detroit for about 18 years, cashed out and tried apartment life for a couple of years They tired of the noise

Why'd they do it?

The Michigan Association of Real tors in June surveyed 400 people from around the state who had moved within the last year

Here is a breakdown on their main reason for a move

- 24% wanted newer/bigger home
- 15% business/job
- 13% purchase of first home
- 1 7% wanted better area

Did you ever see a magician shuffle three upside-down cups and ask a viewer to find a hidden ball? The illusionist can make the ball appear or disappear wherever he desires

Your loan officer can often so the same thing with costs You may not "see" the costs - and some may claim they do not exist - but be assured the expenses are real and you will pay for them

There are essentially three ways for borrowers to cover the essential costs associated with their mortgage pay cash out of pocket, use the equity in their home, or have somebody else pay for them That "somebody" could be a seller, if you find one willing It could also be your lender, who will usually put you in a loan product that will pro-duce a sufficient "yield" to cover your costs If a lender does cover a your costs, he will certainly recoup that money in some other way

If you have it, using your home's equity would be a good option because you would be using an unrealized gain to cover the expense, not the alreadytaxed cash that would be coming from your wallet Additionally, most of us find it easier to pay a few bucks extra per month for the slightly higher loan amount than we do forking out several hundred dollars or more up front

Taking a higher interest rate and asking your lender to cover your costs is a good idea if you have little or no cash or equity, or if you plan to be in the loan for only a few years You will have slightly higher monthly payments because of the higher interest rate, but only for relatively short duration

People move for all kinds of reasons

The need for less room, more space A job transfer Better educational opportunities for the kids Marriage, divorce or death

Then there's retirement Health concerns An inability or unwillingness to tackle maintenance chores Financial problems Discomfort with a changing neighborhood

On the move

"The general rule of thumb is that every seven years people tend to move nationally," said Gail Madziar, spokeswoman for the Michigan Association of Realtors

"Some people move mainly for financial gain every three to five years," said Stuart Baker, a counselor at Schoolcraft College in Livonia "I think most people move in times of transition of one kind or another"

"If they're relocating or buying a new home in the area, they usually need more space," said Mary Rettig, a Realtor with ERA Alliance in Farmington Hills "Or they want to get out of an apartment

"Or they want new surroundings They've been in the house for a while and they're just ready to go," Rettig added

The decision to move isn't always the right one, said Jeff Decker, an associate broker with Wilhelm & Associates in 3% – move to country

2% – divorce

1% each – convenience, wanted one level home, waterfront, handicap access, wanted condo, poor health, school, wanted less land, undecided/ don't know

Clarkston

"The financials have to be the bottom-line look on things," he said "My own parents were looking at selling their home I was looking at their current payments, location, quality of the home and looked at where they would be moving

"I told them, 'it's my opinion, you're better off staying where you are," Decker said

A couple of empty bedrooms and the constant up-and-down stairs prompted his folks to consider a move, Decker said For now, they're staying put

Rebecca Meisner, associate broker with Weir Manuel Snyder & Ranke in Birmingham, doesn't believe that the monetary decision to stay or go is controlling

"The financials have to be there – vou can't do it if you can't afford it, but people normally move for psychological reasons," she said

Emotional experience

Moving can be an emotional experience under the best of circumstances, Rettig said

"Usually for sellers in the home 10 years or more they have so many memories and

"I would want someone to slow down, take a pause and ask, 'What is this really about? Is there fear involved here or is this a good, well-thought out decision?" said Bari Berkowitz, MA, LLP

She's a psychotherapist and life coach in West Bloomfield specializing in adult life transitions

"That's what gets people in trouble – making decisions unconsciously without processing through," Berkowitz said "You have to slow down and take the emotion out of it "

A problem neighbor, for instance, isn't always a good reason to jump into a relocation There's no guarantee that you won't find a blockhead waiting for you in your new digs or a problem won't move next to you anyway

After the decision

Sellers and buyers - folks usually are on both ends of the spectrum during the moving process - can help themselves immeasurably once they decide to move

"If you're a seller, you must make it (house) as fresh, clean, open, bright and light as possible," Meisner said


"Ask a friend to go through the house, literally walk through as a purchasing person would and be honest about what they see," Decker said

Realtors generally speak with one voice about what buyer's can do

"Get pre-approved for a mortgage," Rettig said

"Those consultations are free," Decker added

Mortgage rates dip to lowest levels in 3 years

Mortgage rates around the country this week dropped to their lowest levels in nearly three years

The average interest rate on 30-year fixed-rate mortgages fell to 6 72 percent, down from 6 80 percent last week, according to the nationwide survey released by Freddie Mac

It marked the seventh week in a row that 30-year mortgages have been under 7 percent This week's rate marked the lowest level for 30-year mortgages since they averaged 6 69 percent the week of Dec 18, 1998

Fifteen-year mortgages, a popular option for refinancing, dipped to 6 23 percent this week, compared with 6 30 per-

cent the previous week, and is the lowest level since Oct 9, 1998

A year ago, rates for 30-year mortgages averaged 7 88 percent and rates for 15year mortgages averaged 7 53 percent

On one-year adjustable-rate mortgages, lenders were asking an average initial rate of 5 45 percent, down from 5 58 percent the previous week This week's rate was the lowest since Oct 30, 1998, when the rates on one-year ARMs averaged 5 42 percent Last year at this time, ARMs stood at 7 21 percent

These rates do not include add-on fees known as points, which averaged around 1 percent of the loan amount for all three types of mortgages

CAReport Lexus GS 430: People Like It

HOUGHTON LAKE, Mich – It turned heads It's a joy to drive on long, long trips

Great Trunk space Acceleration is phenomenal And it made people friendly



Located in the middle of Michi gan's mitten, Houghton Lake is the largest inland lake in the state It's known for its abundance of walleye, boating accessibility and

ANNE accessibility and **FRACASSA** also for its win tertime sports

like ice fishing and snowmobiling People don't generally see beautifully styled luxury cars of this kind of quality up here, so you can imagine it caused a bit of a stir at the local Wal-Mart and Marathon station People wanted to talk about it, look at it and ask a lot more questions than I want ed them to

Heck, all I wanted to do was get out of the parking lot and go back to the cottage, for Pete's sake

Lexus stomped on the mid lux ury market a couple of years back when it introduced the GS 400 sedan I drove it then and like the spunk it had

But this new GS 430 the only thing I can complain about 1s the 'in the-glovebox' multi CD changer I think you need a jet pilot s license to be able to operate it

I don't really ask for a lot out of the cars and trucks I test I only want to be able to operate nearly everything with out tearing through the massive manuals that come in every vehicle these days I played with the CD player for a while then just left it alone My husband did, too, and he couldn't figure it out, either

The styling of this vehicle is not only eye catching, but also slim and sleek It glides through the air with the greatest of ease, really Power is provided by a 4 3liter V8 with 300 horses that are quieter than a church mouse Lexus says it can accelerate from 0 60 mph in a hair under 6 sec onds

I didn't time it, but I can tell you that when you needed to move quickly, that power was there Whether pulling out of the subdivision, out of the school parking lot into a four lane, 50 mph speed limit road, or passing on the freeway, you would never have a worry

Lexus engineers helped the engine along through the use of Variable Valve Timing with intel ligence or VVT 1 What this system does is optimize valve overlap throughout the engines speed range in all operating conditions What that means to you and me is that power is there when you need it no matter whether it's summer or winter spring or fall The engine is married to a 4

speed automatic transmission that is outfitted with E Shift No it's not like e mail or anything



Lexus says it can accelerate from 0-60 mph in a hair under 6 seconds.

and it's not a dot com either E Shift allows you to let the transmission shift normally, or auto matically, or you can control the gear shifting through the use of buttons What that lets you do is have a more "spirited" driving experience if you want it

Let's go inside for a minute You'll find leather surfaces all around that are very, very, very comfortable Once strapped in, you'll feel very secure with the seating surfaces enveloping you in comfort It's a good three-hour drive to the lake, and never was I fatigued, tired, uncomfortable or cranky when I got out Hard to believe, I know, that I would ever get cranky

When the kids jumped in the back seat the first day of the test, they got all excited In the middle of the dash is a screen Sorry, chil dren, it's not a TV, I told them as they asked where the VCR was located

It's a touch screen navigation system that's one of the most accurate I've seen Available as an option, the system uses DVDbased technology to store the map data, rather than the way it was stored before, on a computer hard drive Also available on the touch screen are control functions for the stereo and climate control systems

Because it's located so strategically, both the driver and passenger can access the screen with ease Even in the brightest sun light, there weren't any problems seeing the data on the screen, either

Because Lexus is very safety

conscious, the safety protocol placed in the vehicle is more than adequate We're talking about stuff like the standard front and rear crumple zones, reinforced passenger compartment and three-point seatbelts for all five seating positions, of course

And it's even got the dual front airbags But this Lexus goes one no, two - further with front seatmounted side airbags and side curtain airbags for the driver and front passenger All five seating positions also have adjustable headrests And, of course, there are tether brackets in the rear for the child safety seats

On the techno side, you'll find standard ABS with a brake assist feature that determines if you're braking for an emergency and compensates for it The Vehicle Skid Control feature helps keep the GS 430 straight when detecting understeer or oversteer It controls the vehicle through torque intervention or by causing the car to brake individual wheels to keep you straight

Taking my daughter cross town to the doctor for a sudden sinus infection proved to be a task She wanted a McFlurry for the ride back (she, like most kids, dislikes visiting the kind doctor) and as we were waiting for the order in the drive-thru, a gentleman pulled around and informed me my rear tire was flat

Irritated as all get-out, I parked the Lexus on level ground and called AAA It would take at least 90 minutes to get to me Considering the other daughter was out of school in 45 minutes, I had to get out to change it myself, all the while mumbling that I didn't need this

Imagine my surprise to see a full-size spare in the trunk Everything went smoothly and I was on my way, albeit pretty dirty, in about 20 minutes No harm, no foul

It was an interesting week in the GS 430, to say the least If you can afford to pay \$50,000 for a luxury car, that is a vehicle well worth owning

Veneer or solid wood, the choice is up to style

It's a grainy business, but the difference between solid wood and veneer tables really isn't all that fuzzy

Depending on the style, it can be very difficult to tell the difference between modern veneers and solid wood, said Nori Rubin, interior designer at In Style, a furniture store in West Bloomfield

And quality veneers can be just as durable But you have to consider the function and style of the piece before choosing between solid wood and veneer

Veneer tables are made by placing a thin layer of the type of wood you desire - oak, maple, cherry, etc - over less expensive wood and laminating it to the surface

"The actual veneer is wood," Rubin said "The table is still constructed very well, but the cost is cheaper'

On average, with similar dining room tables at In Style, that cost difference is around \$200

"It's not a huge difference when you're spending over \$1,000," Rubin said

Eric Buzenberg of Walker/Buzenberg Furniture in Plymouth said the costs of veneers and solid wood tables at his store are very similar

"There really isn't that much of a difference," he said "Veneer can be an expensive process sometimes "

Choosing the right table, Buzenberg said. depends on the style you're looking for

"We can show them what veneer can do for them," Buzenberg said

Whether looking for something a little more formal or trying to find that perfect piece to fit the room, veneer can offer table tops that are unique and quite formal, he said

"When you have a veneer, the grains can be placed in different directions, the way you want it to be," Rubin said

"If they're looking more for a certain look," Buzenberg said, "that would be somebody who wants a veneer top '

Solid wood tables can have variations in color, due to wood being taken from more than one tree, and are planked, a series of pieces of wood put together

For some these characteristics are desirable, Buzenberg said For others, veneer creates the look they're seeking

"Almost all veneer surfaces are blemish free," Rubin said, adding that solids can have knots and other natural imperfections

About 80 percent of customers who buy their

Interiors (Livonia), Franks

pieces at In Style opt for veneers, Rubin said "Very often people would prefer it because the

price is lower," she said And. Rubin said, very few people ask whether or

not the table they are buying is made of solid wood "More and more people are so price conscious

right now," Rubin said You can get very high quality (veneer) "

In the 20 years she has worked in her field, Rubin said she has never seen any of the veneer pieces pull away from the table

Many veneers now are made with sheets 1/16inch to 1/32-inch in width as opposed to the 1/8inch of years past, although Rubin said, some manufacturers still make the thicker veneers

In some cases, veneers can be stronger than solid . wood when layers are used, she said

But because Rubin is an antique hunter, she would opt for solid wood when buying a non-functional piece that might serve as a family heirloom

"Years ago, that's how they were made," she said "(Solid wood) would signify something more antique I'd rather have something that was made the way it was years and years ago'

Solid wood and veneers require good care with wood polishing products that don't contain ammonia or silicone

"I think if you're using proper care with both a solid wood or veneer top you can expect lots of years of use," Buzenberg said





French antiques generally are "Provincial" - rustic country

pieces - or the classic Louis XV XVI, or Empire Louis pieces typically have curving lines, and decorative add ons, such as bouquets, baskets of flowers, swirls and scrolls Definitely luxurious, they're also delicately proportioned and airy in feeling

Empire pieces were a product of the Napoleonic era Napoleon wanted to disassociate himself from royalty, but he also wanted his regime to have historical antecedents Empire style draws on the Roman Empire for inspiration, and is characterized by clas sical lines, columns and laurel wreaths, and the Napoleonic bee Often, there are gold touches

Traditional 18th century English taste ran to large, chunky, dark furniture pieces designed by Adam, Chippendale and Sheraton during this era are orderly, symmetrical, and architectural Very classic and clean, they often feature columns, pedi ments, or fretwork Early in the 18th century, walnut was commonly used for furniture, but in mid-century, when trading with







the core of the home," Keeth said

When planning a new kitchen or making changes to an old one, it's important to identify the space that will be used and it's important to decide if you want an open or closed area, according to an Internet Web site, www homestore com

"Some serious cooks are appalled by the idea of a space where they can't concentrate in solitude, or where messy pots are in view," the Web site said

Oak cabinets popular

Start with work triangle

"I always start by trying to get the work triangle," he said "The triangle consists of the sink, stove and refrigerator We're looking for the most convenient set up for the person working in the kitchen '

Gail Fefkorn, sales manager for Kitchen Suppliers, Inc with showrooms all over metro-Detroit including Canton, Livonia and Waterford, has seen a lot more homeowners adding glass accents to their kitchens

"Your countertops – going to Corian or granite – really puts in a nice touch, too," Fefkorn said adding that moldings also play a big role in making the kitchen look stylish

Homeowners are looking for high end, rich effects

"In the past we used to sell far more entry level type cabinets in the showroom," she said "Cus tomers are taking their equity and putting it into their homes

They're going for custom and semi-custom cabinets

When homeowners want to truly add dynamic looks to their home, they often look down at the floor

Flooring options remain as varied as homes themselves, especially in the kitchen where wood, ceramic tile and laminates can be used In the dining room wood and carpet remain popular

The dining rooms is one of those rooms that can stand out in a home, says Mike Riley, owner of Dalley Carpet stores in Livonia and Canton

"The dining room, along with the bathroom, are places where people can get a little more daring with colors," said Rilev "It's not uncommon for homeowners to use dark green, dark red and dark blue on the wall, so they use colors in the carpet to match "

Textures are used often to conceal footprints, Riley said Borders also are used in a formal setting, said Riley "They might have a floral print in the center, then a solid color on the border," Riley said

Luanne Acevedo, a sales representative at the Tile Shop in Farmington Hills, said her company sells a lot of a natural stone tile for dinettes and kitchens, and it's even used in the dining room

"We're seeing a lot of limestone, used with a little bit of marble and granite," Acevedo said "It's very popular, because of its natural look It's kind of rustic looking and very elegant " Some limestone features traces of fossils and shells in the rocks

Kitchens

Customers also prefer the neu tral tones in the kitchen and porcelain tiles said Acevedo Porcelain is more durable and

flexible than ceramic " Acevedo said When ceramic tiles chip. you will see a red clay color When porcelain chips, you will see the (tile's) same color

Homeowners also place the tiles in a diagonal pattern for a change of pace, and often the floor contains granite and marble tiles for a change of pace, Acevedo said

Popular porcelain tiles are the Pietra Dorata, a grayish, natural toned tile, the Cairo Porcelain, containing pink and rose tones, and the Basalito Biacca, which has a rough finish with white tones and neutral colors, Acevedo said

Hardwoods, laminates, vinyl sheet goods and even cork are popular in the kitchen and dinette areas, Riley said

"The gloss level of the vinyl looks better than it did at one time," said Riley "Now they're making vinyl look like ceramic tile and hardwood The vinyls made by Armstrong and Congoleum now have a natural stain and natural tile look "

Get out wet mop

Laminate is popular because you can wet mop the floor "You can't wet mop hardwood, and they have a look of ceramic or wood," Riley said

Laminate floor is comprised of an inner core and an outer layer of wood or plastic veneer that can simulate wood, marble or granite

Gray and terra cotta are popular laminate colors, Riley said

Engineered hardwoods are different from the 3/4-inch hardwoods "When you put in the 3/4 inch wood, it's difficult to pull out your dishwasher to service it," Riley said "Engineered floors are not as thick '

Floors are pre-finished, but customers can order it unfinished

"Finishes contain aluminum oxide which makes a very hard finish on the floor said Riley That s where they are going with finishes performance and

durability'

Choices run the gamut with maple, oak, ash and hickory

With ceramic tile, customers want the larger tiles of 12-by-12inch and 24-by-24-inch "The" look is more natural and you" have less grout With a bigger". tile, you have less grout and less maintenance," Riley said

Then there's cork floors, comparable in price to ceramic tiles Cork floors are extremely durable, they are more forgiving and easier on your legs," Riley said

Homeowners are beginning to appreciate the special effects of glass, metal and tumbled stone on countertops and backsplash-

They are also opening their eyes to using two different materials together for a more interesting mix and, at the same time, a cost savings

"I don't think there's a rule of thumb to what you do with your countertop and backsplash mate rials," said Phyllis Schoenherr of Beaver Tile in Rochester "It's about what people like in color and texture

"Tumbled stone with glass and metal give your kitchen that mix of textures for excitement Some materials give off the look of fabric when mixed with simple surfaces '
