# Community recalls fallen friend

■ Homer Elias played professional football, he coached high school football and cut an imposing figure as a security guard, but after his passing this week, the biggest thing anyone could remember about him can be summed up in one word: Friend.

To those who saw Homer Elias walk the halls of Salem High School, the 6-foot-3-inch security guard was a formidable sight.

"Homer was an imposing figure. He could clear the hallways with the sound of his voice," said Tom George, head of security at Plymouth-Canton Educational Park.

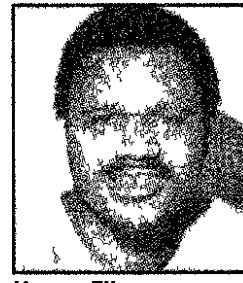
But, to those who really knew the former Detroit Lions football player, Elias was kind, respectful, humorous and a loyal friend.

"Homer was a role model on how to respect people and the rules," said Tim Baechler, Canton High School football coach.

Elias, 46, died from a heart attack shortly before midnight Wednesday while hospitalized at Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit. According to George,

Elias was found unconscious at his home after he didn't show up for work on Friday, Sept. 28. He was taken to Garden City Hospital and later transferred. While doctors found bleeding in his brain, reports of an aneurysm or a stroke were unfounded, according to George. The fatal heart attack was reportedly the second Elias attack suffered while hospitalized.

"He was a very likable guy, and he interacted well with the kids," said

George. "While he was an imposing figure, he used his personality and wit with them."

"He always had a smile on his face, and enjoyed a good joke," added George. "He loved the kids and he loved to coach."

Elias was the second of three second-round draft picks of the Detroit Lions in 1978. Reported as the biggest and strongest offensive guard to come out of Tennessee State, the 260-pound Elias started every game for the Lions in his rookie season. He played extensively for the Lions before retiring in 1984.

Elias joined the P-CEP security staff.

## Down, but not out

### Nursing home fights rumors of demise

Barbara Post wants to dispel the rumors about Plymouth's West Trails Nursing Home.

Since she began as an administrator at West Trails 16 months ago, Post said she has heard whispers in the community that the home, which has been a fixture in the city on Ann Arbor Trail since 1969, is closing.

Although she is not sure about the source of the rumors, she thinks they may have something to do with the fact that the home was purchased about two years ago by a corporation called Medilodge, which owns 16 other nursing homes in the area.

In a recent newsletter, Post made sure everyone associated with West Trails knows the rumors are simply rumors.

"I think when Medilodge bought this place, people thought they would suck it dry of money and then close it down. But we are not closing our doors. That is a definite," she said.

That's not to say everything is fine. In fact, Post says it is far from it. The aging facility is in dire need of major renovation. The roof leaks, walls need painting, bathroom equipment needs to be replaced, and the exterior of the building needs attention.

Back in May, the building's antiquated telephone system finally died. A new system cost \$8,000, which is the reason it took nearly two months

to repair.

"We went almost two months with crippled communications. That was the frosting on the cake. I think that's when people really started to talk about our demise," Post said.

To make matters worse, Post feels the rumors have started to eat away at the home's financial viability. Referrals from hospitals have dried up, and so have the number of residents. The home currently has 33 residents, which is well short of its capacity of 46. Post said she needs at least 42 residents to break even.

"Currently I have such a financial hemorrhaging, it's not even funny. It's a serious problem," she said.

## City ready to sign Sincock contract

More than six months after naming Paul Sincock as Plymouth city manager, commissioners appear ready to finally ink a contract with the city's top appointed official.

On March 22, commissioners voted unanimously to make Sincock the city's CEO, and expected to sign a contract within a few weeks. However, following delays involving lawyers on both sides tweaking the details, it appears commissioners will vote on a new contract next Tuesday.

The contract reportedly gives Sincock what he requested in an agreement in principle last March. Commissioner Colleen Pobur, who was designated by her colleagues to oversee negotiations, said Sincock will receive \$80,000 a year, retain his current medical and retirement benefits, and have an unprecedented fall back position in case he is fired by a future commission. That clause will allow Sincock to return to his former position as director of municipal services for one year, after which he would become an at-will employee and could be let go at any time.

"Paul wants to continue to work in the city, even if the political winds change, and we felt the fall back position was appropriate given his long record of dedicated service to the city," said Pobur. "Despite the delay, there were never any problems with the contract. Both sides were very professional."

## Campaign heats up as city candidates square off in forum

Lines in the sand were drawn during the Plymouth Observer League of Women Voters forum for city commission candidates Thursday night.

With nearly a month to go before the Nov. 6 general election, the gloves were taken off between several of the candidates. The most notable encounters were between two current commission members, David Byers and Colleen Pobur, as the two challenged each other on numerous topics during the 90-minute forum.

There are eight candidates on the ballot seeking election to four seats on the Plymouth city commission, with

one write-in candidate. The top three vote-getters will receive four-year terms. The candidate with the fourth highest vote total will be seated to a two-year term.

Among the topics that brought the most discussion included the prospects for Central Middle School, the city's plans to repair its aging infrastructure, the proposed Ann Arbor corridor streetscape project with Plymouth Township, and the future of the city's police department.

On Central Middle School:  
■ Colleen Pobur: "It became a campaign issued because certain candidates couldn't find anything else to use as a campaign platform. This was an emotional issue that could get a lot of people stirred up."

■ Jerry Vorva: "People want the

in October 1992. During that span, he coached football at Martin Luther King in Detroit and Wayne Memorial before being hired as a Canton junior varsity coach two years ago. This year he was elevated to the varsity as a defensive coach.

"Homer always had an idea to improve the program," said Baechler. "It wasn't all just X's and O's, but his personality and attitude. He was someone the players could look up to, a role

model."

Baechler said he told his players about Elias Thursday morning at the gym in Phase III, "and there wasn't a dry eye in the place."

Baechler said it hasn't been decided what kind of tribute will be made long term for Elias. However, fans will notice a Honolulu Blue and Silver sticker, with his Lions jersey number 61, on the back of their football helmets. Many students wore the

stickers at school on Friday, while others began wearing ribbons with the number 61 as a tribute on Thursday.

Elias also worked security at the Canton Public Library the past seven years. Jean Tabor, executive director, said Elias handled his job very professionally.

"Homer was a giant in size but he was a sweet and gentle person," Tabor fondly remembers. "He was liked by many of the kids who visited the library."

Mike Steckel, who worked as a member of the P CEP security team before becoming a Canton police officer, said he and Elias became best friends while coaching at the high school.

"He was tough as nails, and a man of great character," said Steckel. "Yet, he was very approachable with the kids. They respected him because he

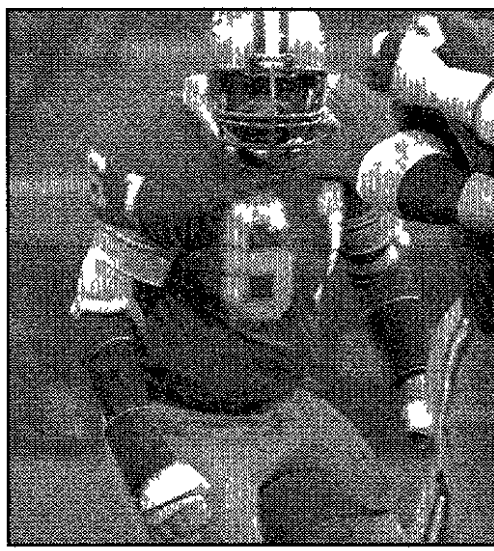

was a straight shooter. "He had high expectations for kids, and they tried to meet them," said Steckel. "He knew what it took to be a champion, and it rubbed off on the kids."

As of Friday afternoon, funeral services for Elias were incomplete.

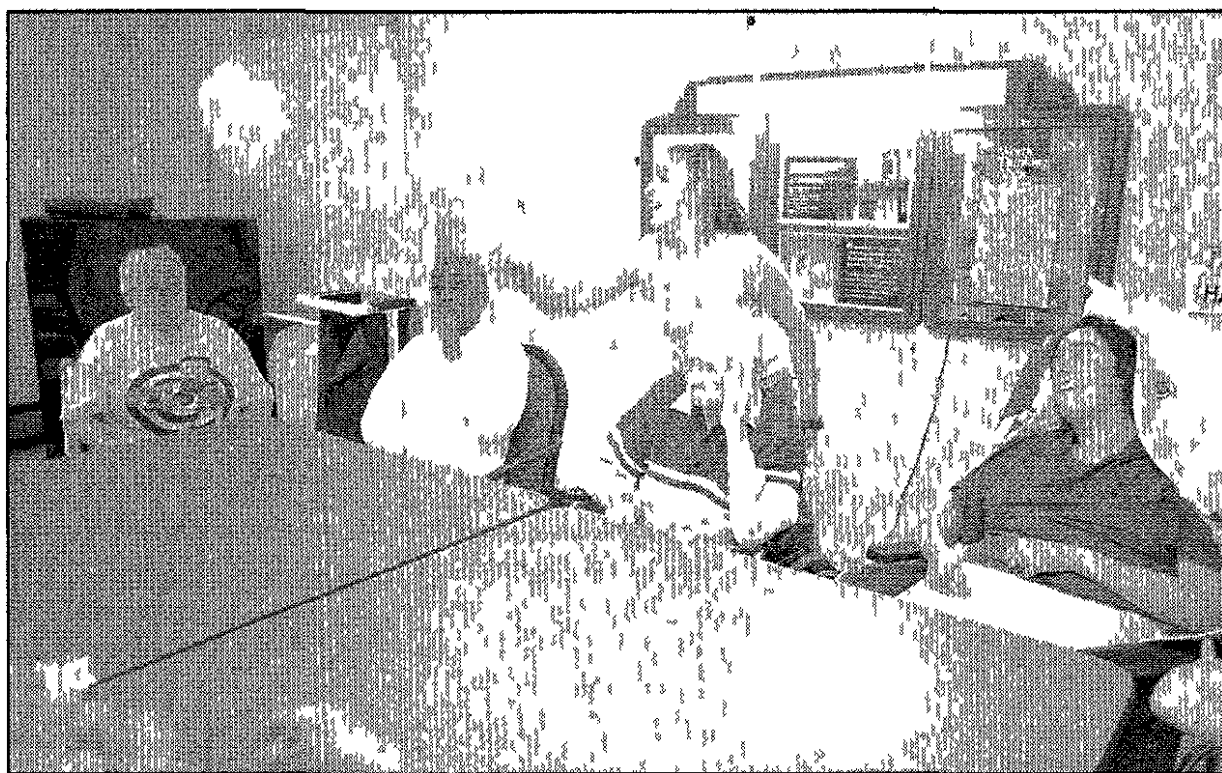

Still, Post says the Medlodge ownership is pushing forward with renovations to the building. She said it has taken so long because Medlodge was trying to build a new facility, but didn't get the financing for the project.

"My families have started to become frustrated. But I have never hidden the truth from them. This is an old facility and it needs work. We are starting to move in that direction. We've replaced the roof, the phone system, heaters, and wiring. Our goal for next year is to paint the outside of the building and do some landscaping. We really want to improve our image," she said.

The one thing Post says hasn't been lacking is the quality of care residents receive at the home. The staff of 42 employees works hard to maintain the best quality of life possible for residents. The facility is clean. Meals are regular. And social activity is a primary focus, according to Post.

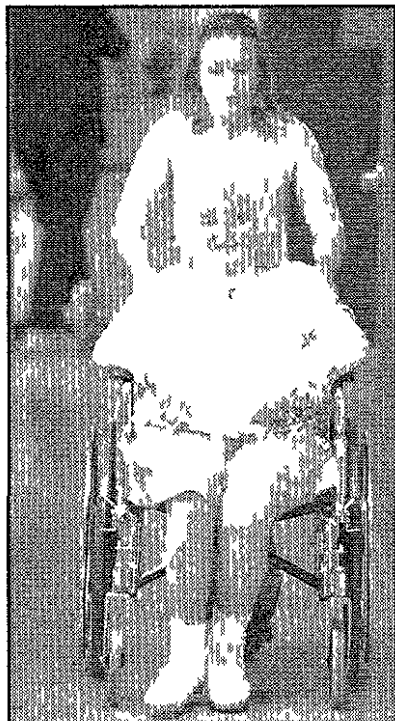
Like other nursing homes in the state, West Trails is inspected by the state at least once a year. According to Maura Campbell of the Michigan Department of Consumer and Industry Services, the home was cited for 12 deficiencies during its last inspection, which is higher than the state average of eight deficiencies. However, she said people shouldn't be alarmed by the results.

"It is very rare for a nursing home not to be cited for any deficiencies. The system is set up to find fault. Based on the inspection, it is not one that I see any eminent concern, because the deficiencies aren't of a severe nature," she said.

### A dreaded decision

Colleen Johnson, a Garden City resident, had to find a nursing home for her mother several years ago. Her mother, Margaret Quinn, was suffering from Alzheimer's disease and needed constant care, which Johnson and her two sisters could not provide. Although the sisters argued bitterly, they finally made the dreaded decision to place her in a home.

Johnson says they looked around, but West Trails was about all they could afford, largely because the facility accepts Medicare and Medicaid. She said West Trails was also less expensive than most places they looked at. Although she was concerned that would mean less

quality she was pleasantly surprised.

The staff really works with the residents. They do a lot of different things. The residents are not just living in their beds rotting away. They have a lot of activities to get families involved. Very seldom are residents sitting there with nothing to do," she said.

Quinn lived at West Trails for about five years before passing away in July at the age of 81.

Despite her death, Johnson still cares about the future of West Trails. She has heard about the rumors and hopes they don't lead to the home's demise.

"It just seems there is a need for more nursing homes these days, not less," she said.

One person who hasn't heard the rumors is Plymouth City Manager Paul Sincock. He said he hopes they are untrue, because many people in the city have spent their final days at West Trails.

That facility has been here a very very long time and provided an important service to this community," he said.

Post said she and her staff continue to stay up on the latest studies and trends in nursing home care, which she feels is too often maligned. However, she realizes people often dread putting parents or loved ones in a nursing home.

Nobody wants to come here or any other nursing home for that matter. That's just the way it is. My goal is to make these golden years for all our residents. I want them to enjoy their life during this short time before they meet God," she said.

# Observer wins in state contest

The Plymouth Observer captured four awards, helping its parent subsidiary, Observer & Eccentric Newspapers, earn an impressive 40 awards in the Michigan Press Association's annual Better Newspapers Contest, results of which were announced today.

The awards in 19 categories for class B weeklies are the most for any newspaper group in the state. The Eccentric Newspapers won 26 awards, the Observer Newspapers won 14.

The Plymouth Observer earned a first-place award for its Hometown Life section, edited by Kim Mortson, second-place honors for its editorial writing and editorial page design, and an honorable mention for staff writer Tony Bruscatto's story on the now defunct Plymouth Community Foundation.

In picking the editorial and editorial page awards, judges wrote, "Good letters participation, some hard hitting editorials." Judges said the Observer's editorials, "unlike some others, had courage to take stands on issues. I also liked the mix of topics submitted in the entry."

Kim Mortson, editor of the Wayne County Observer Home-

town Life Section, took Second Place for Lifestyle Section. The judges cited, "Good use of photos to tell story first - then walk-athon. Good use of map on first page. Good jump layouts."

Paul Hurschmann took Second Place in Sports Picture for his photo "Foiled Dreams." The judges cited "The shot of those faces gave the reader exactly what the story said. These girls had a TOUGH loss. Way to capture the essence of the game in one shot."

C. J. Risak of the Plymouth and Canton Observer took Honorable Mention for Sports Column.

The Redford Observer took Second Place for General Excellence. The judges cited "Good use of photos and headlines, body type. Great local news coverage."

Stacy Jenkins took First Place for her West Bloomfield Eccentric story "Still Searching." Judges cited "Good, thorough work. By the second story, makes it sound like she was in wonderful graces with the cops. Obviously a writer who's done her homework and kept up the camaraderie with the locals."

Jenkins is now a reporter for the Redford Observer.

Darrell Clem of the Westland Observer took Honorable Mention for Spot News for his coverage of George Bush on the campaign trail.

Matt Jachman of the Livonia Observer took Second Place in Local News Reporting for the story "Down the road." Judges wrote "Does an excellent job of making what could be an ordinary construction series quite extraordinary, with good quotes and clear descriptions. Nice job of following an issue to its conclusion. Good use of humor."

Barry Jensen won Second Place in Enterprise reporting for his Observer story "Sprawl affects us all." Judges said "Well written and researched piece. Very informative and reader friendly."

Tom Hawley took First Place for Picture Story for the Redford Observer for his "Dean Hamrick Story." Judges said "It's rare that a subject allows a photographer to become in essence his shadow. Hawley accomplished that with Hamrick, and the readers of the Observer benefited from the experience."

property rezoned for a purpose and that purpose is for intensive development. They want to tear down the school and build something else there."

The future of the city's police department

■ David Byers "Everyone I talk to favors maintaining the police department. We need to have police officers in this community walking the streets riding bikes, being available and being interconnected with residents in this community. I don't support the transfer of the police department out of the city of Plymouth."

■ Stella Greene "We have a valuable police department in the city. I haven't seen anything, thus far, that's convinced me there would be any financial savings or benefit to doing otherwise."

■ Ron Lonselle "I'm not in favor of getting rid of our police department. Our citizens demand a higher level of service and visibility of their police."

The city budget

■ Peter Bunting "I have a problem with the way the budget is spent. One hundred and one percent of the money was spent in recreation, but in Old Village last budget it was only 43 percent. It doesn't seem to add up to me. I want to see how much money is spent, not necessarily how it's budgeted."

■ Phil Pursell "I think the budget process the city has gone through works very well. We have been very fortunate with property values in the city, but I don't think that will always be the case. We have to look at diverse economic development as a way to bolster our tax base so we don't have (budget) shortcomings in the future."

Two candidates, Dennis Shrewsbury and writer-in-hopeful Tom Prose, did not attend the forum.

Sincock, who began his career with the city as a rink guard at the Cultural Center, is a 23-year employee of the city. He made it well known that he wants to finish his career with the city of Plymouth.

"I'm excited about getting this completed, although I was never worried about obtaining a contract," said Sincock. "I knew we would eventually agree on the terms. I just want to serve the city in the best manner possible."

As of Friday, Commissioner Bill Graham said he hadn't read the contract in depth, but his first perusal didn't find anything objectionable.

"It looks to me to be an acceptable contract, and I'm glad it's done," he said. "I don't think the lack of a contract has hindered the city. Paul has done a good job managing city affairs, and the contract issue hasn't affected his performance or the way the

city commission has viewed him.

Sincock's attorney, Cameron Miller, said he's pleased with the outcome. Miller said he did propose to the commission that Sincock, 44, sign a personal services contract that would allow him to be employed through age 55, at which time Sincock could retire. However, that idea was rejected because a personal services contract conflicted with the city charter, according to Pobur.



# 3 airlines resume curbside check-in; Guard helps out

Baby steps toward normalcy are being taken at Detroit Metropolitan Wayne County Airport, as customers again can have their bags checked at the curb.

The Romulus airport remains at an "unprecedented" level of heightened security, said Metro Airport spokesman Michael Conway.

But some level of comfort and convenience is back because three major airlines met strict security criteria established by the Federal Aviation Administration and were given approval to resume curbside check-ins - which had been jettisoned following the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

As a result, customers of Northwest Airlines Monday

morning were undoubtedly pleased to see Sky Cap personnel back on the job, checking in suitcases and bags. United and Continental were the other carriers resuming curbside check-ins at Metro Airport, Conway said. He was unable to say whether other carriers would soon be given the go-ahead.

"We're very happy to offer curbside service again to our customers," Northwest spokeswoman Mary Beth Schubert said Monday. "It's pretty close to what it was before."

Schubert said both the day and night shifts for Sky Cap

were expected to be on hand Monday, providing curbside check-ins from approximately 6 a.m. until 9 or 10 p.m.

"Ultimately, demand will dictate" availability of the service, continued Schubert - adding that there was a limited return of curbside check-ins on Friday, when the FAA announced the softening of restrictions.

According to Conway, a good sign is that passengers finally are returning to Metro. For example, Northwest, the airport's main carrier, reported its morning flights on Friday, Sept. 28 and last Sunday evening were

at about 67 percent, flights were at less than 50 percent capacity following the attacks on the U.S. World Trade Center and Pentagon.

The FAA then banned the curbside check-ins, in order to prevent security threats. Subsequently, for that and other reasons, the air transportation business has taken a major hit with about 100,000 jobs trimmed by airlines. The federal government has promised a \$15 billion cash infusion to help lift struggling airlines back onto their feet.

## On patrol

Conway said the heightened security measures are continuing at Metro, despite the resumption of curbside check-ins by some airlines. "There are additional (security) procedures the airlines go through that are probably transparent to the customer."

More visible to Metro patrons as of Friday morning, following a welcoming ceremony, Michigan National Guard members began observing passenger screening and assisting airport officials. They join U.S. Marshals officers and recently deputized Border Patrol agents in security respon-

sibilities. The National Guard is now having a presence at commercial airports throughout the country, at the behest of President George W. Bush.

Meanwhile, Conway emphasized that passengers continue giving themselves plenty of extra time if they are scheduled to board a flight. They are urged to arrive about two hours prior to a domestic flight and three hours prior to an international flight, in order to make their way through various security checkpoints.

## Hearing set on managing emergencies

In the aftermath of terrorist attacks on America, the Wayne County Commission's Public Safety and Judiciary Committee has scheduled a public hearing to address the safety concerns of Wayne County residents.

The program will be held 2 p.m. Thursday in the 13th Floor auditorium of the Coleman A. Young Municipal Center, 2 Woodward Ave., in downtown Detroit.

It is designed to share information about emergency management and response plans in place to protect residents. Also provided will be details about key public safety developments that have taken place locally as a result of the New York World Trade Center, Pentagon and Pennsylvania tragedies.

"Ever since the Sept. 11 attack on America, important questions have been raised and continue to surface concerning public health and safety and emergency preparedness," said Wayne County Commissioner Bernard Parker, D-Detroit, chairman of the Public Safety and Judiciary Committee. This hearing is geared to provide metro Detroit residents with valuable information on these important issues.

The committee is also made up of Commissioners John J. Sullivan, Kay Beard, Joseph Palamara and Willie D. Hall.

Topics to be addressed include terrorist attacks, evacuation plans, airport security, emergency transportation and emergency services. A panel of representatives from Wayne County and City of Detroit Departments will discuss concerns and answer questions.

The hearing is expected to last three hours. Due to increased security measures at the Coleman A. Young Municipal Center, the public must enter through the Larned or Woodward entrances only.

Individuals will not be allowed admittance with items such as cologne bottles, mirrors of any kind, glass items, nail files, fingernail polish, lighters, tweezers, cameras or video cameras. A complete list of prohibited items is posted at the building.

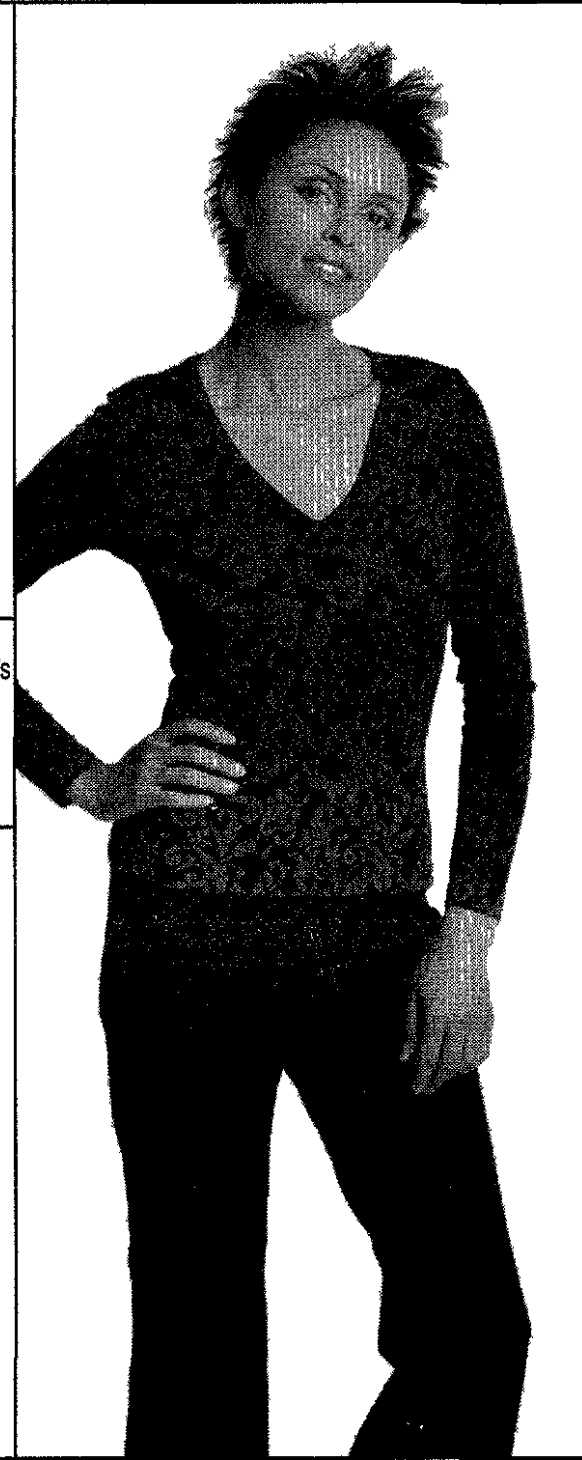

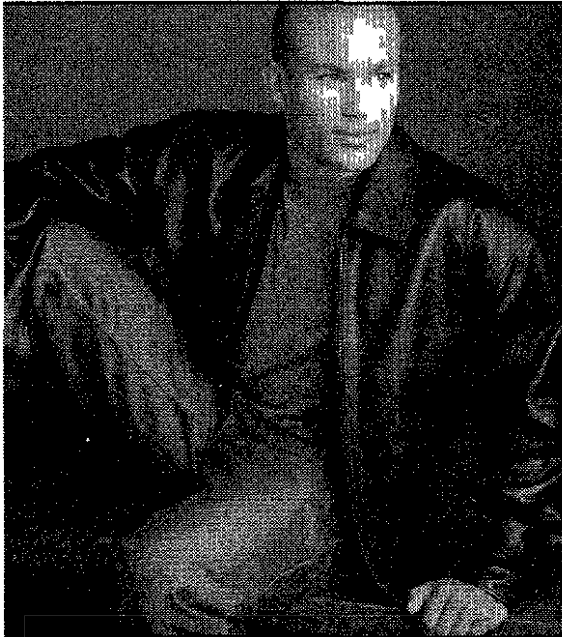

# We believe these are the 4 best choices for city commission

Any election is an important one in the history of a city, and the 2001 race for Plymouth City Commission is no different.

There are important issues facing the city finding a permanent police chief who will stay on the job longer than six months, an aging infrastructure, continued fiscal success in the face of recessionary times, development, recreation, and a review of the city charter.

There are definitely going to be at least two new faces on the city commission, since Mayor Dave McDonald and Commissioner Sean FitzGerald decided not to seek re-election. Since the remaining members — Michele Potter, Bill Graham and Dan Dwyer — were just elected in 1999, it's possible the commission could have as many as five people with two years or less experience after voters cast their ballots Nov. 6.

While we are generally in favor of infusing government bodies with new blood on a continuing basis, having five mem-

bers with so little experience at a time when important issues confront the city isn't a good idea.

A balance of experience and fresh ideas is necessary and we think voting for the following four candidates would provide that balance.

**Stella Greene** brings integrity and class to the race, and should be a no-brainer choice for voters. She's a mainstay at the Plymouth Community Arts Council and one of the biggest boosters of the arts in this city.

Greene was term-limited out and couldn't seek re-election in 1999, but we heartily support her candidacy in 2001. Some of her ideas are, well, idealistic, for instance, the suggestion candidates shouldn't use campaign signs, a staple of any political race. Although we agreed with her in principle, we weren't surprised no one joined her on that bandwagon.

But she's also been one of the strongest voices for not getting bogged down in such minutiae.

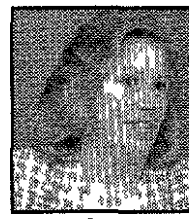
She wants to keep her eye on the ball of fiscal responsibility, infrastructure improvement and management of the city. She's also a team player, and bent on focusing on issues rather than personalities.

She's completely devoted to the city, and her prior experience would balance well with what could be a relatively inexperienced panel. She would be a fine choice.

**Colleen Pobur** has served on the commission four years, including the last two as mayor pro-tem. She's chair of the Plymouth Economic Development Corp., a member of the city-township joint services committee and a graduate of Leadership Plymouth, the chamber of commerce program designed to foster community leaders.

Pobur has strong opinions on a variety of topics and isn't afraid to share them. She's an ambassador for the city, trumpeting its positives whenever she gets the chance.

She was part of a commission

that, after four failed attempts, finally landed the right man, Paul Sincock, for the city manager's position. The city is in a better financial position, with a large surplus and well-run programs. The same commission oversaw the development of a recreation master plan envied by many.

She's gotten the backing not only of the local police, but also of the Police Officers Association of Michigan and Michigan Attorney General Jennifer Granholm.

**Phil Pursell** is a local business owner (Main Street Auto Wash) getting into the political arena for the first time. He's got a good bloodline, his father is longtime politician and former U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell.

Pursell has been a leader in talking about stopping the acrimony that so often crops up at city commission meetings, and his laid-back, easy-listening style should help.

Pursell has also been quick to point out the city needs to pay attention to its aging infrastructure. Pursell has been a member of the planning commission, which forced the developers of the Wilcox property to scale their original seven-story plan down to its current five-floor project.

We believe Pursell will listen to a variety of voices and opinions, will be a good team player and will bring a fresh approach to a city commission that could use one.

Like Greene, **Ron Loiselle** is a veteran commissioner whose experience would be a plus, depending on the mix of candidates elected. He's been the mayor before, and he's kept up with the issues. He acknowledges past commissions haven't paid enough attention to the infrastructure, and isn't afraid to take opposing viewpoints on tough issues.

Loiselle is chairman of the planning commission, which in recent months has passed a height ordinance restricting development to 55 feet in most cases, as well as shaving the Wilcox property from seven stories to five.

Loiselle has kept up on the issues, and his learning curve would be shorter than a newcomer's.

The Plymouth City Commission needs a balance of experience and fresh blood. The selection of Stella Greene, Colleen Pobur, Phil Pursell and Ron Loiselle will accomplish that.

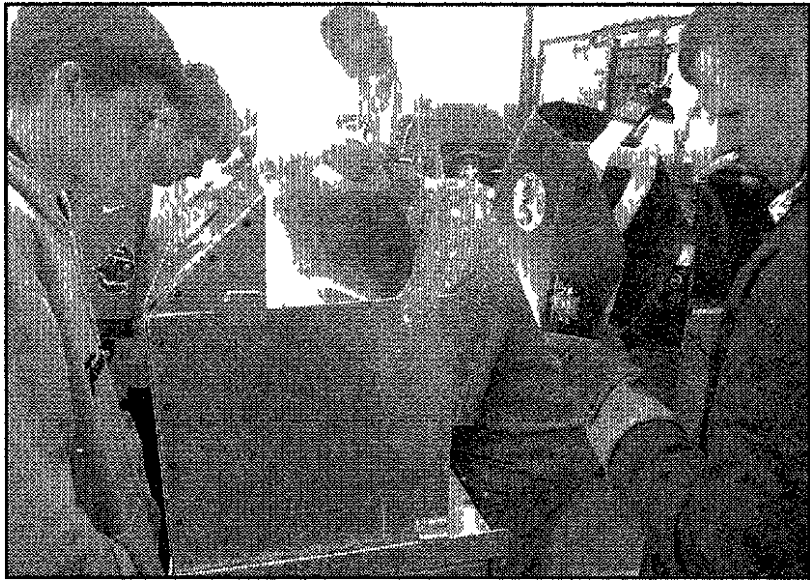
It made perfect sense to Tim Ervin of Plymouth Wayne Inc for Schoolcraft College to host last week's Welding, Education and Technology Tour 2001.

Not only does Schoolcraft have a complete welding education program that is beneficial to prospective employees and businesses looking to hire them, but Ervin said southeastern Michigan is considered one of "focal points for the (welding) industry."

Moreover, the college's fledgling VisTaTech Center promises to be a future showcase of such programs and events, said Schoolcraft President Conway Jeffress.

"One of the things we hope to do with the VisTaTech Center is do a lot of business-to-business kinds of development," Jeffress said. "We will try to bring businesses together that are related, and sometimes unrelated, to have opportunities for potential students. Other businesses can also see what they do, and we can have the college gain from that relationship."

The Sept. 24 program linked welding professionals, educators and students to the latest in welding technology - and

spurred connections between those who employ welders and those who train them.

About 300 people, primarily high school students and those from the welding industry, came out on a dreary day to the event, which featured the Miller Road Show - a welding lab on wheels

- and career expo.

"One of our focuses in being so involved with Schoolcraft is trying something different," said Plymouth Wayne president and CEO Ervin, whose company was among the event sponsors. "This provides an opportunity to showcase welding products and tech-

nology and also showcases the training programs available to put that technology to work."

Through such programs, particularly the Miller Road Show, Jeffress said it is hoped that more young people will begin to see welding as a vocation worth pursuing.

"The road show was a trailer with lots of state-of-the-art welding devices present there to attract people to that profession," Jeffress explained. "What the welding industry has is a problem getting young people interested. The average student doesn't see it as high tech or that they can make a lot of money in that field and that's not so."

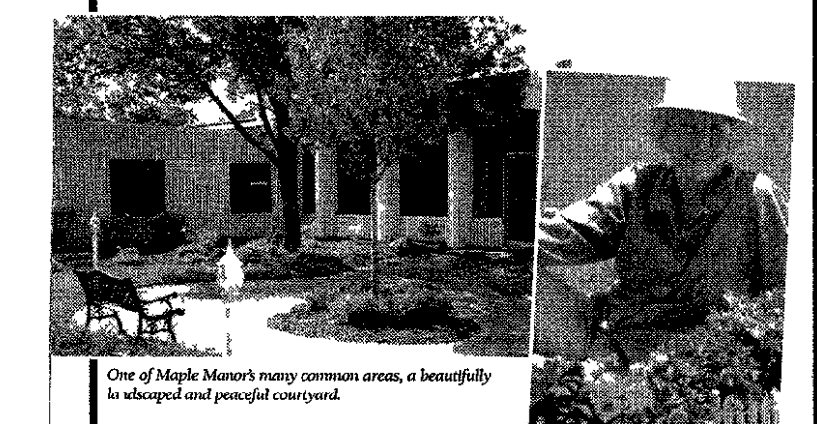

# Gov. Engler's veto restores \$28 million in school funding

Gov. John Engler wielded his line item veto pen, crossing out a number of specific items, when Michigan's K-12 education budget bill, passed just last week by lawmakers, crossed his desk Friday, Sept. 28.

And the effect may be surprising. For this year, Engler vetoed two "negative supplemental appropriations" before signing the bill.

"That's a double negative, so it becomes a positive," explained Brian Whiston, legislative liaison for Oakland Schools.

The result was that Engler restored \$28 million in spending for schools that had been earlier crossed out by lawmakers — \$8 million to fund the Golden Apple Awards and \$20 million to fund the Partnership for Adult Learning program.

"I want to continue to reward elementary schools for outstanding and improved student academic performance," Engler said,

explaining his action. "I also want to continue to support adult education programs."

Whiston, who said schools should be quite happy with the K-12 bill passed by the legislature, said districts "still probably are celebrating" the bill.

Engler however was much tougher on the spending plan for 2003.

"Due to world events beyond our control, I am increasingly concerned about the fiscal year 2003 revenue picture. For that reason, I have vetoed all discretionary items in the school aid budget for fiscal year 2003 pending the development of a comprehensive fiscal 2003 state budget resolution," Engler stated.

That veto crossed off an estimated \$3.5 billion from the state's \$11.4 billion annual education budget.

Sue Shafer, spokesperson for Engler, explained the purpose was to take a wait-and-see approach to the softening economy.

"We don't have concrete numbers," Shafer said. "Instead of later saying these numbers don't

look so good and pulling back on this or that, we are trying to take a fiscally responsible approach and wait until we have more concrete figures available."

Whiston said he saw it as a cautious approach to weakening economic indicators, but he was unsure what Engler hoped to accomplish.

"This could lead to a good public debate over school funding and what we should be spending, so it could be a good thing," he said. "But it makes us all nervous until we understand what the governor's really trying to accomplish."

Whiston said he hoped it would not be an attempt to move money away from education to other state programming.

"Remember, education continues to be the governor's number one priority."

Shafer responded "Schools received a 5-percent increase in funding this year, which works out to an increase of about \$546 million. And this comes at a time when other state departments and agencies have had their budgets cut 2 percent."

# New Head Start director named

Wayne County Executive Edward H. McNamara has named Michael Johnson the new director of Wayne County's Head Start program.

Johnson worked as the program's assistant director for the past two years. Prior to that, he was a mental health coordinator and the assistant director with the City of Detroit's Head Start Program.

There he assisted in planning and implementing the Head Start program that served more than 7,200 children and families. His background also included development of the Fatherhood Initiative Project.

His duties as the director of Head Start include implementing and developing administrative policies and procedures, overseeing day-to-day management, strategic planning, and marketing of the various programs.

A graduate of the National Head Start Association Credentialing Academy, Johnson has a master's degree in social work from Wayne State University. He resides in Detroit.

Wayne County's Head Start program operates 27 sites, including Ecorse, River Rouge, Flat Rock, Sumpter Township,

Romulus, Dearborn/Dearborn Heights, Garden City, Taylor, Van Buren Township, Woodhaven, Lincoln Park, Melvindale, Inkster, Plymouth, Redford, Westland, Hamtramck and Highland Park.

Children participating in Head Start receive no-cost assistance with education, health, nutrition and mental health services. Children with disabilities are also encouraged to enroll. This free program is for children who will be 3 or 4 before Dec. 1.

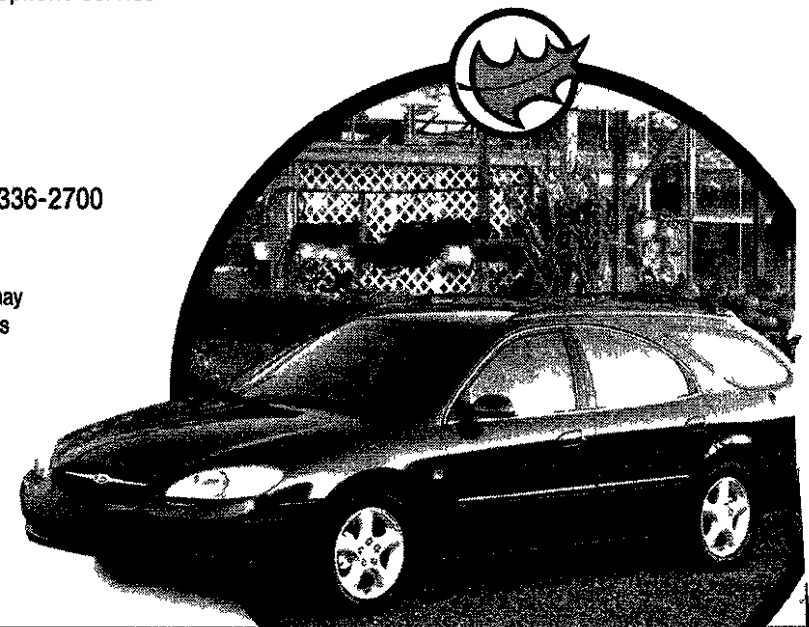

# Canton crushes Western

Moments after Plymouth Canton steamrolled Walled Lake Western, 18-0, Friday night, Chiefs' coach Tim Baechler was approached by a fan, who asked the fourth-year coach the secret of the Chiefs' recent success.

"My son played here back in the early 90s," the man said. "They would only get about 35 kids out for the team and they didn't win much. What are you doing differently?"

Baechler paused, then gave the man an answer as simple, straight forward and effective as the Chiefs' punishing, grind it out offense.

"We work our tails off," he said.

Friday's win which improved Canton to 6-1 overall and 4-1 in the Western Lakes Activities Association Western Conference was special considering it came just two days after popular defensive line coach Homer Elias died of a heart attack. Elias, who joined the Canton coaching staff in 1999, had been hospitalized a week earlier with an undisclosed brain injury.

"I think the word that best describes our team the past few days is resolve," Baechler said. "They were going to do anything it took to win this game. The kids weren't real emotional. They were loose and determined to get the job done."

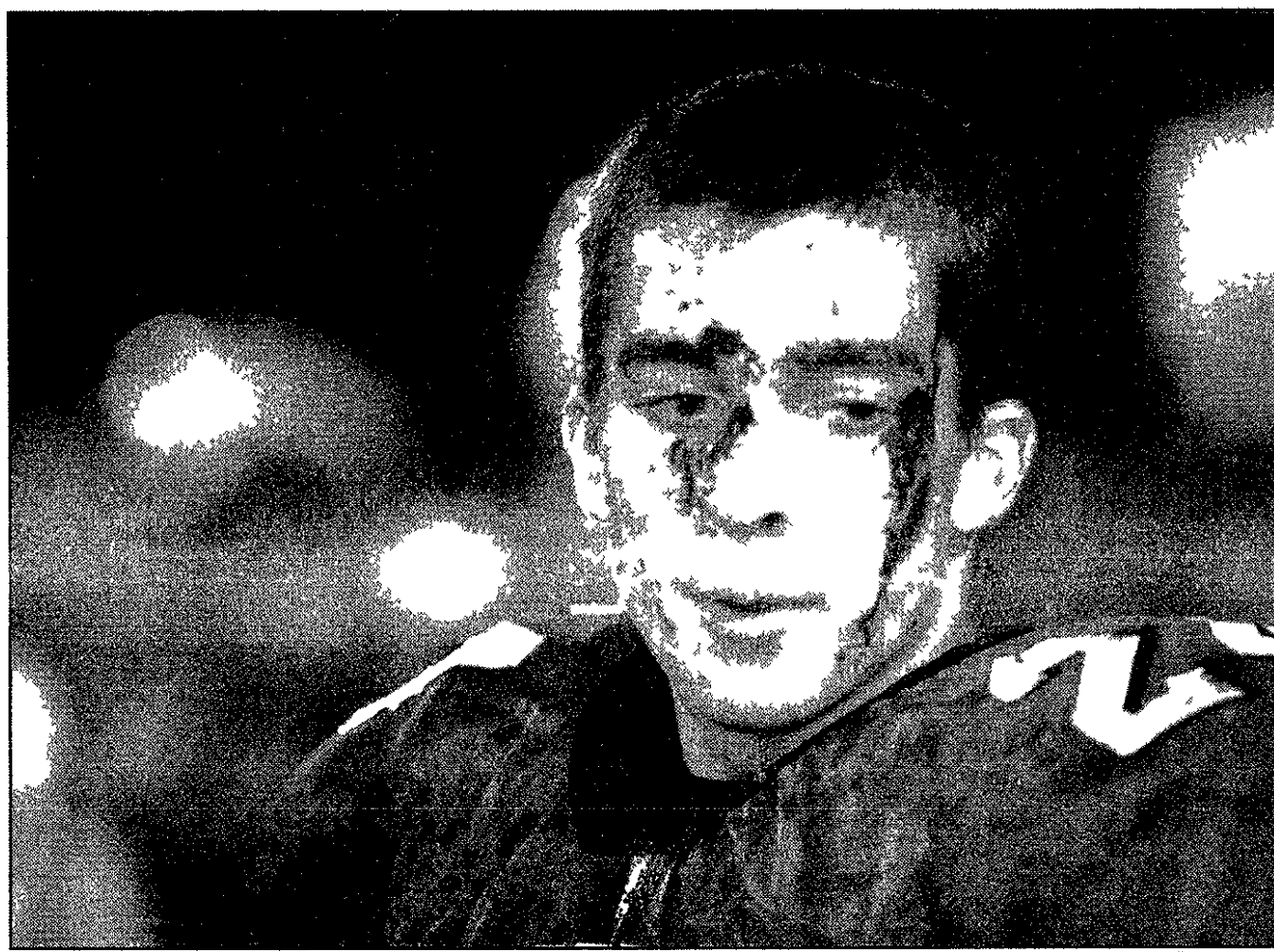
The Chiefs' fourth shutout of the season was clearly its most impressive, since it came against a Western team that came in with a 5-1 record (3-1 in the WLAAs). The Warriors usually potent spread offense was handcuffed by the Chiefs' swarming defensive front seven, which yielded just three first downs and 89 total yards.

Canton defensive linemen Dan Farkas, Will Stinson and Mike Tolhurst stuffed Western's inside running game while linebackers Dane Kobus and Todd Shirkin contained the Warriors' sweeps and outside pitches.

Offensively, Canton used a steady diet of runs between the tackles to wear out the Warriors' defensive front five. The Chiefs attempted just two passes — both incomplete — and ran the ball 58 times for 262 yards.

The game was played in a steady, chilling rain that left the field muddy and the ball slick.

"On a night when it was hard to get any footing, I thought our offensive linemen did a great job of getting off the ball and mov-

ing forward," Baechler said. "And our running backs and quarterback did a nice job of hanging onto the ball."

Kobus led a balanced Chief ground attack with 118 yards on 22 carries. Reggie Joyner chipped in with 76 yards on 18 attempts while Brandon Wilcox high-stepped to a season-high 83 yards on 17 rushes.

"We almost had a mutiny on our coaching staff about how to use Brandon," Baechler joked. "He's coming off an ankle injury last season and he plays a lot of defense for us, so I didn't want him running the ball too much and risk getting him injured again. But he did a nice job tonight."

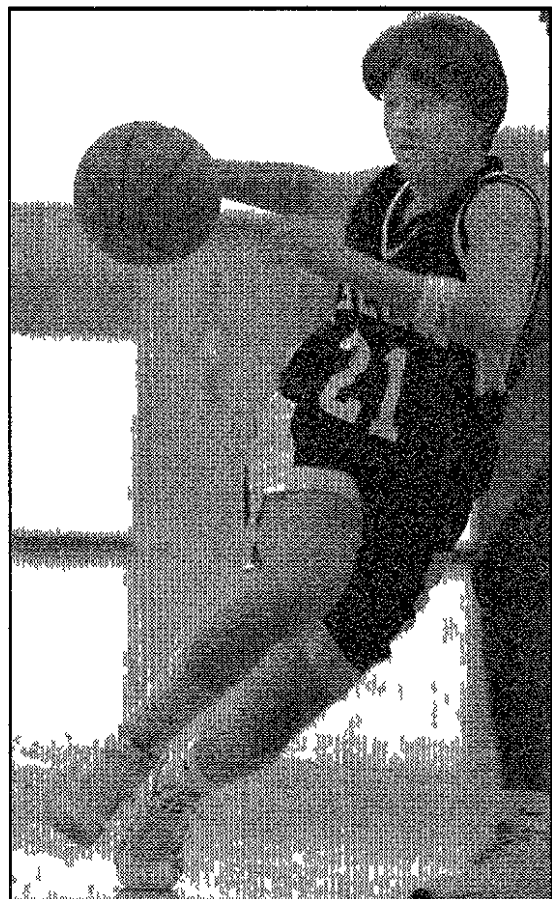

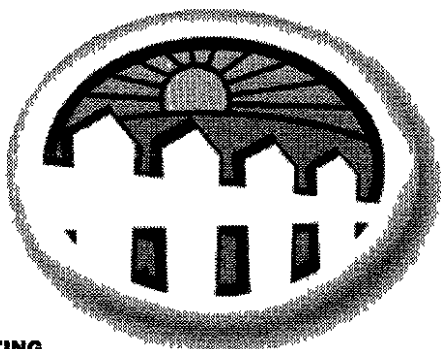

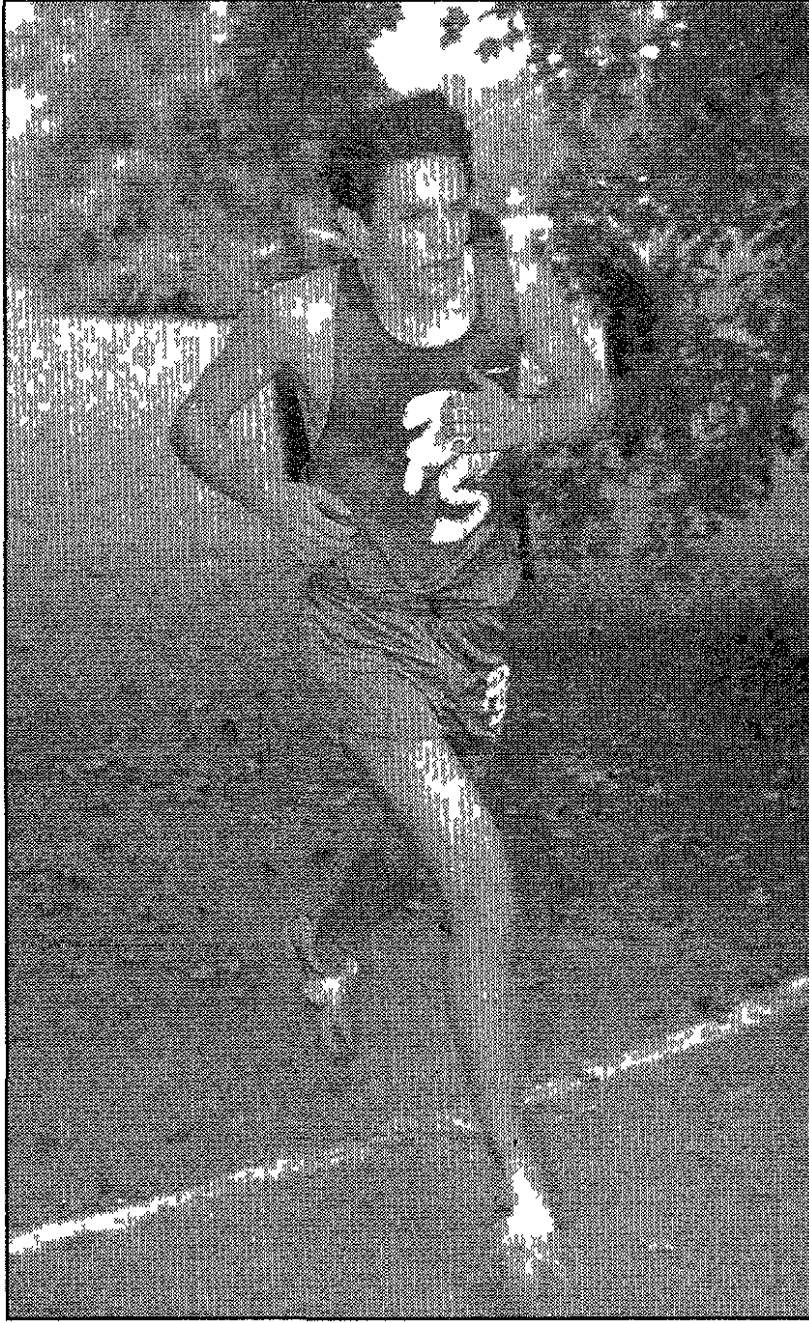

**Canton ties for title**

It was a major double-dual meet facing Plymouth Canton's boys cross country team, and the Chiefs rose to the occasion.

Going up against Western Lakes Activities Association rivals Walled Lake Western and Northville, Canton needed to win both to earn a share of the Western Division title. The Chiefs did just that, and by the narrowest of margins, beating Western 27-30 and Northville 25-30 Thursday at Cass Benton.

Pat Pruitt nearly matched that, beating his former best clocking by 15 seconds. Pruitt finished sixth in 16:45.

All of the Chiefs were at their best. Aaron Lanning was eighth

(16:53) and Jon Western took ninth (16:56). Canton's fifth scorer was Brandon McClellan in 12th (17:08).

Boyd was quick to point out, however, that it took more than his top five to assure the Chiefs' victory. Matt Rymond, who was 16th (17:37), and Steve Cheek, who was 17th (17:52), both finished ahead of Western's fifth man, Alex Cleland (18:00), and that gave Canton the win.

The Warriors' Kevin Naughton was the overall winner (16:20), his brother Neal was third (16:41). Northville's Nick Moroz (16:44) and Clark Pacoriek (16:45) placed fourth and fifth.

The result creates a lot of doubt concerning the WLAA Championship Meet, scheduled for Oct. 19 at Kensington Park.

"Right now, it's a five-team race," said Boyd. "Any of these three teams (Canton, Northville and Western) can win it, as well as Livonia Stevenson and Plymouth Salem."

Stevenson, the Lakes Division champ, is a slight favorite. Churchill has a strong first three runners, but the rest of its lineup may not be strong enough to win a big meet.

**Salem finishes 4-1**

Plymouth Salem had the same kind of meet. Plymouth Canton had Thursday at Cass Benton, but there were distinct differences.

The Rocks won both ends of its double dual, edging Farmington 27-28 and North Farmington 27-29. In the third dual, the Falcons topped North 25-32.

The two wins gave Salem a 4-1 dual-meet record in the WLAA's Lakes Division, second to Livonia Stevenson.

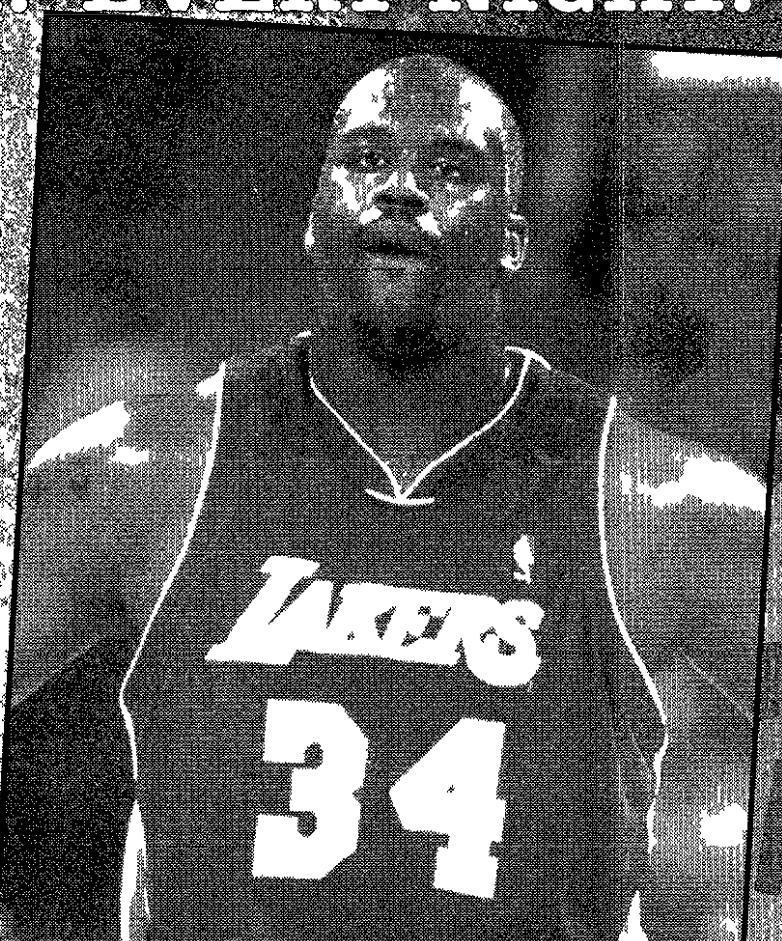
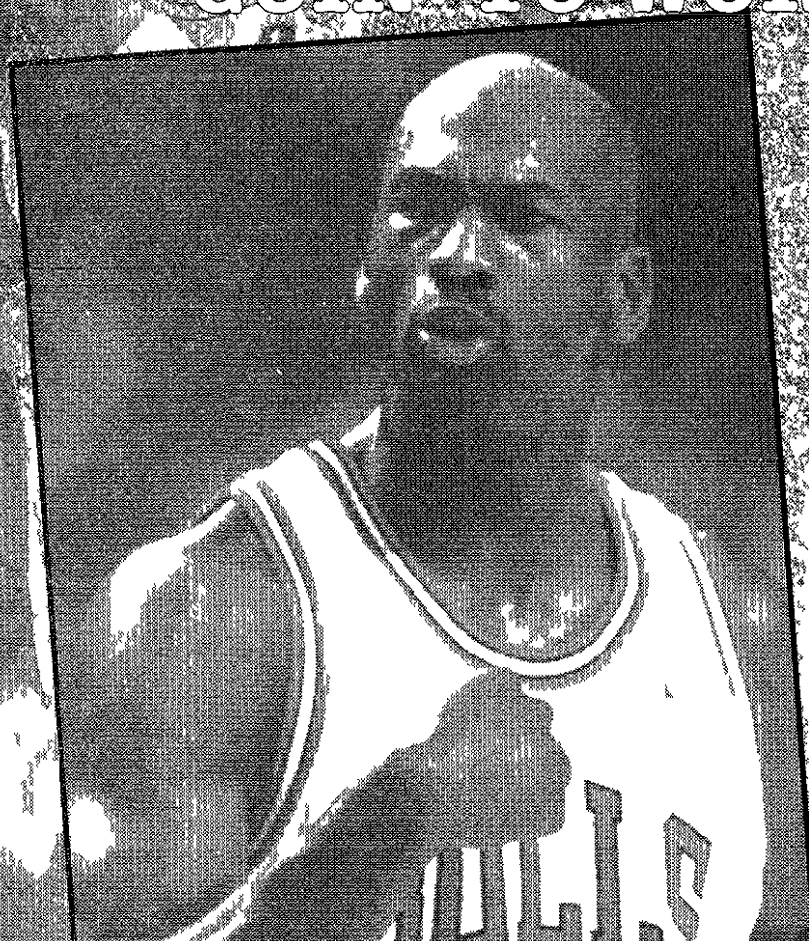

## Geese not migrating as in years' past

When I was a young man growing up in Dearborn, my parents would take me to Jack Miners near Kingston, Ontario in the fall to see migratory Canada Geese.

This time of year geese from several breeding areas of northern Canada migrate south and stop periodically along their journey to refuel.

Today, I don't have to wait until fall to see Canada Geese, they are here all year. Migratory geese temporarily join flocks of resident geese, but they do not stay long.

The giant race of Canada Geese that are residents here in summer typically do not migrate in the usual sense of the word.

If there is no open water during winter, birds will move south to places with open water.

Southeastern Michigan's resident geese do not migrate like the smaller races of birds that nest in northern Canada and winter in Louisiana.

But one of the things about the natural world, is that there is always something to learn and new things to discover.

A collaborative study by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and Michigan State University recently documented new information about "molt migrations" of Canada Geese.

Researchers captured and attached radio collars to a total of 134 birds during the spring seasons of 2000 and 2001.

Some birds were captured in northwestern Wayne County others near Ann Arbor and some farther north in Oakland County and near Lansing.

Two types of transmitters were used. One type is a conventional transmitter that requires a researcher to use an antenna and a receiver to locate the particular frequency of an individual bird. The other is a satellite transmitter that can be monitored via a computer.

Ah! The advances of technology can be useful in many different disciplines.

Geese that are too young to breed, or those that nested unsuccessfully often leave southeastern Michigan in May or June and fly north to molt.

Molting in waterfowl is different than molting in most birds. Waterfowl, including geese, molt all their flight feathers at the same time.

This process renders them flightless for about three weeks. During this time they are vulnerable to predators and seek sheltered areas.

This study demonstrated that those birds that fly north to molt head to the eastern shore of Hudson Bay and the western shore of James Bay where it meets Hudson Bay. One bird flew 2,500 miles to South Hampton Island but that is an isolated incident.

During their molt they probably flock with resident nesting birds creating large groups. Large groups are safer for birds because there is less chance of an individual bird being taken by a predator. There are probably fewer predators up there, too.

After their molt is complete and new feathers have hardened, they remain in Canada until about the beginning of September. That is when the molt migrants move back to Michigan.

This information will be helpful to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources when they set hunting seasons. They have an informative web site that provides maps and other information about this study.

# Keep eyes out for deer while driving

Eighteen year old Ken Bazman was driving home down Beck Road in Canton Township last Nov. 1.

It was 10 p.m. - a clear night - when Bazman noticed a deer crossing the road ahead of him. Moments later a second deer would cross directly in front of him.

There was no time to react. The impact was head-on. Canton police said it was the third deer vehicle crash they investigated that evening. Bazman was uninjured. The deer wasn't as lucky. The car - five months old - had \$5,300 worth of damage.

The story is typical of deer-vehicle crashes. There were 6,270 of them in southeast Michigan in 2000 according to the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments based on data received from the Michigan State Police Criminal Justice Information Center.

The number - from Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, St. Clair, Washtenaw and Wayne counties - represented 32 of all crashes in the area. There were 6,465 crashes in 1999 and 6,380 in 1998.

The greatest number of overall crashes occurs between 3 p.m. - the greatest number of crashes involving deer occurred between 3 a.m. followed by 9 p.m. - midnight.

Oakland County had the most deer-vehicle crashes in the region at 1,638



and fourth most in the state in 2000. Wayne County had 407 crashes and Washtenaw County had 1,244. While Livingston County had 1,145 deer-vehicle crashes, it was nearly 19 percent of the total accidents in the county.

If a crash was unavoidable, would you know what to do?

One third of state residents in a poll conducted in June by the Michigan Deer Crash Coalition wouldn't know what to do or would take wrong action.

If a crash with a deer is unavoidable, take these steps as soon as you can:

- Don't swerve (few people are injured in a head-on crash, but are injured when they swerve out of control and hit a fixed object, crash with an oncoming car

or roll over),

- Brake firmly,
- Hold on to the steering wheel,
- Come to a controlled stop,
- Pull well off the road, turn on emergency flashers and be cautious of passing traffic,
- Do not attempt to remove a deer from the roadway unless you are convinced it's dead. An injured deer's sharp hooves can easily hurt you.

In 2000, eight motorists were killed in these crashes - four of them motorcyclists. Car-deer crashes account for an estimated \$130 million in repairs, injuries and other expenses each year with an average crash causing \$2,000 to a vehicle.

Remember that the best course of action is to drive defensively and remember these tips:

- Fasten your safety belts
- Drive with caution all-year round in deer habitat, especially on rural two-lane roads,
- Deer can dart out from any direction without warning. Deer often travel in single file. If you see one whitetail cross the road, chances are there are more nearby,
- Deer are most active near dawn and dusk, and especially during the fall mating season and in spring, when they are

on the move to find food, often near roads, where the grass greens up first,

- Be especially alert near deer warning signs. They are placed at known deer crossing areas and alert drivers of the possible presence of whitetails.

The MDCC has a video, "Stay Clear of Deer All Year," and is being distributed to more than 500 public and private driver education schools in Michigan. Additional copies are available from the Michigan Resource Center at (800) 626-4636 or at [www.michiganresourcecenter.org](http://www.michiganresourcecenter.org).

Produced with the help of AAA Michigan, the Michigan State Police, the Michigan Sheriff's Association, the Michigan Department of Transportation and the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, the video defines the scope of the problem in Michigan and what motorists should do if they encounter deer in the road.

Based on the numbers cited in the study, with 65,006 reported car-deer crashes and about another 15,000 believed to be unreported every year, there is an average of one car deer crash in Michigan every eight minutes.

One in seven of all reported crashes involves a deer and 80 percent of all car-deer crashes occur between dawn and dusk on two-lane roads. The study also found that the public ranks car deer crashes just below drunk driving, road rage and speeding in overall importance.

# 'Mo' better bowling' with a new ball

How to get "Mo" high scores would be a good topic for today.

Last weekend a steady flow of bowlers came to Merri Bowl Lanes in Livonia to see first hand what the highly regarded ball designer, Mo Pinel had to say about anything and everything to do with bowling balls.

Pinel has designed dozens of various balls over the years and almost everyone who reads this column may have bowled with some of his designed balls at one time or another.

Now under the 'MoRich' label, Pinel has his own product line on the market. These are named the Labyrinth, Minotaur and the newer Colossus. I asked Mo for pertinent information that you readers can use now and for future reference when buying your next bowling ball.

There are several key factors to consider and Pinel has broken it down to terms we in the Motor City can all understand, an analogy to automobiles. The core of the ball is like the engine. This is what drives the ball and gives it energy.

The coverstock is similar to tires. This becomes a limiting factor. The very important "layout" of the holes is like a chassis adjustment. Surface texture is related to the tread pattern on the tires, like icy road conditions and only lane conditions.

Start with the core. The size and shape of the core determines motion of the rolling ball. An average competitive bowler will rev up from 250 to 400 R.P.M.s on delivery and the type of core (weight block) can determine where the break point will be. A taller block will delay the break, while a short core will rev up sooner and start hooking earlier (generally better on oilier conditions). The pin position shows the driller where the weight block is located in relation to the center of gravity.

A pin position near the finger holes will delay the hook, whereas a pin away from the holes will help the ball to rev up sooner with an earlier break point. As for pitches and spans when drilling the holes, stretching out the span will not get more pin action, as some believe, but will make the release more erratic and possibly cause soreness or irritation.

A way to tell: When the thumb is all the way in the fingernails should not touch the back of the finger holes. Mo simply says, "When a ball fits you properly, it lets go of you, rather than you letting go of it."

He cannot over-emphasize the importance of pitches (Fore-aft and side-to-side angles) the holes are to be drilled. Practically all pro shops in our area are expert in how to set pitches and you can rely on their expertise. It is good to know how your ball is set up pitchwise, so when you get another ball it will work the same.

Different lane conditions come into play as well, so as a general rule, a ball with a shorter core will hook earlier to compensate whereas a taller, straight up core will give more length with a

later break point, better on drier lanes. Thanks to Mo Pinel for taking time out to pass this information along to those bowlers who did not get a chance to see him at Merri Bowl. Observerland ties — all starters — along with assistant coach Walt Barrett, who guided Livonia Stevenson High to two state titles (1991 and 1996) and one runner-up finish (1993).

Starting goalkeeper Joe Zawacki and stopper Mike White, both Stevenson grads, have played key roles in U-M's early season success along with senior defender Dave George (Livonia Churchill), a transfer from Eastern Michigan University, and freshman forward Karl Lopata (Farmington High).

U-M's only loss occurred Sept. 9 against Big Ten foe Penn State (a 4-0 setback). Last Thursday, U-M and Oakland University battled to a 2-2 draw. The Wolverines played the entire second half with only 10 players after George was ejected for receiving two suc-

sive yellow cards. Zawacki, one of Michigan's original scholarship players, missed the entire 2000 season with a knee injury but has bounced back impressively this fall. In nine games he has a goals-against average of 1.08 with four shutouts. "At times Joe looks like an All-Big Ten keeper," U-M coach Steve Burns said. "He's doing things to keep us in games. He's always in position and has been sure-handed."

Another original U-M recruit was White — who like Zawacki, George and Lopata — is a former first-team All-Observer selection. White, a sophomore, has played stopper in U-M's 4-4-2 attack.

"Mike has to be on the field for us because he's a guy you can always count on, whether he's on the attacking half of the field or the defensive half of the field," Burns said. "He has quick feet and has the potential of becoming a complete player in the Big Ten."

Lopata, an attacking midfielder, recently cracked the starting lineup and has appeared in Michigan's last four games.

Burns foresees a good future for the former Falcon standout. "Karl helps us go from the middle third of the field to the front third of the field," Burns said. "He has a great first touch and holds the ball well. He's good at coming back to get the ball from his teammates. He knows how to bring the other guys into the game."

"He's a good player even though he doesn't possess the goal-scoring mentality yet. But he's getting better at it."

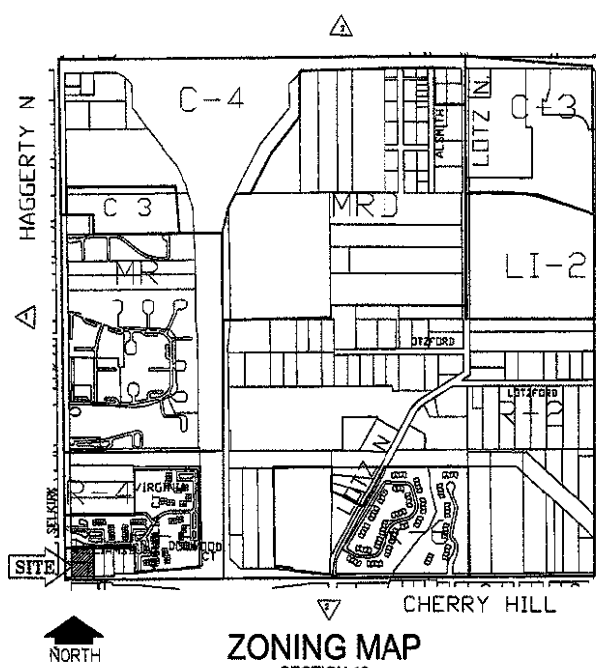

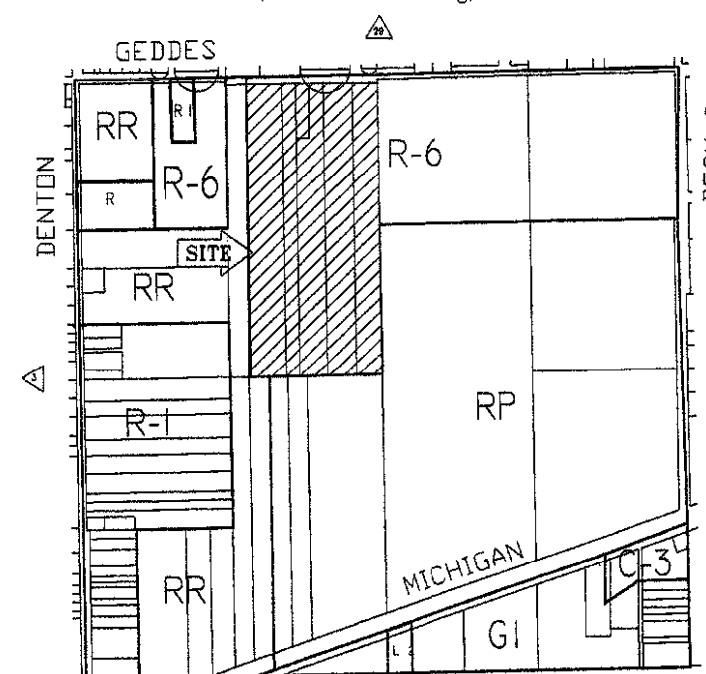

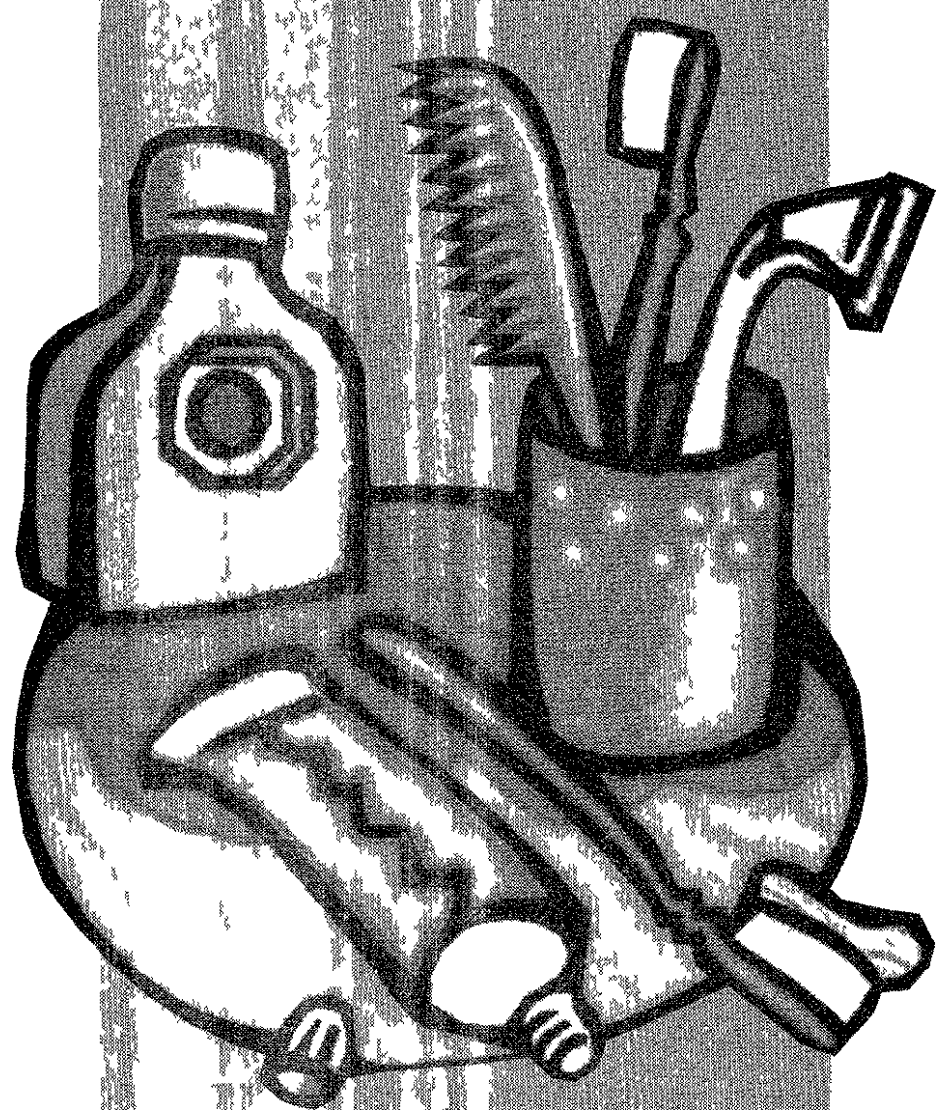

Nan Washburn's reserved demeanor and tiredness fades as she begins talking about Beethoven's Ninth Symphony. She programmed the powerful choral piece as a finale for the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra's 2001-2002 season. Washburn begins and ends the 56th year with 18th century classical masters.

Mozart's joyful Overture to his opera *The Marriage of Figaro* opens the season that spotlights a rainbow of musical color Saturday, Oct. 13, at Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic Church in Plymouth Township.

It's been a busy month for Washburn who returned from guest conducting the Wyoming Symphony Orchestra on Sunday only to

rehearse the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra 24 hours later. Two weeks earlier she traveled to California to conduct the West Hollywood Orchestra.

"Beethoven's Ninth is the highlight of the season," said Washburn before the first rehearsal of the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra season. Washburn is entering her third season as conductor of the orchestra. It's been quite a few years since the orchestra has done it. It's a wonderful celebration to do such a big piece.

"But I'm also excited about featuring concertmaster Juliana Athayde in Corigliano's *Red Violin* for the first concert. Juliana's a phenomenal talent. The violinist who was to solo with the Wyoming Symphony cut her finger so I called Juliana. In two days she had the whole thing memorized and flew out. Every concert is really exciting."

Washburn's programming promises another stimulating season for audiences. Little known repertoire such as Dame Ethel Smyth's *Overture to the Wreckers* (Oct. 13) and Lecuona's *Rapsodia Negra for Piano and Orchestra* (Nov. 10) offer the opportunity to experience music from around the world. An English suffragette composer, Smyth wrote *Overture to the Wreckers* in a lush, romantic style for full orchestra. Lecuona's rhapsody is part of a Latin American program featuring music by Alice Gomez and Gershwin, who was inspired by a trip to Cuba.

Gomez is one of three conductors, including Hilary Tann, who will work with the orchestra before per-

forming Copland's *A Lincoln Portrait*. The concert is in conjunction with month long festivities to celebrate installation of a permanent Lincoln exhibit at the Plymouth Historical Museum. # Local 'Carmen' holds international talent

Intermittent sniffles clouded Irina Mishura's mellifluous voice late last month as she was preparing to rehearse *Carmen*, which has become a signature role for the Bloomfield Hills mezzo soprano.

Mishura was nursing a cold and taking it easy on her day off—a rarity in itself this past year.

In addition to making a triumphant debut with the Metropolitan Opera in *Samson and Delilah* opposite Placido Domingo, she also performed with Luciano Pavarotti in *Aida* when he was at the Detroit Opera House.

"I think he was impressed because he invited me back to his hometown in Italy for the 40th anniversary of his opera career, and I sang with Jose Carreras," said Mishura. "I sang with all three tenors in the past year."

But from Oct. 13-21, the Russian

native will be performing a role that many opera critics concede she owns.

*Carmen*, that voluptuous gypsy from Georges Bizet's opera, is a role that Mishura has performed at the Met and in San Francisco, Miami, Baltimore, Vienna, Munich and in Detroit in 1996.

"People ask if I ever get bored of playing the same role and I say 'Never.' It only gets more and more beautiful and interesting," she said. "I'm changing, my *Carmen* is changing. It's never the same performance twice."

But Mishura, like everyone else in

the nation, is still grappling with what role the arts can fill in a country still mourning from the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

"My mom died on opening night in 1996, and I knew I had to perform," said Mishura. "This is so much deeper and painful. It's almost easier to take the personal loss."

But in these troubling times, Mishura said she's found music to be a healing salve. "It helps people — not to forget — but to soothe, and Bizet's music is beautiful."

Indeed, even those without a penchant for opera are able to hum the *Habanera* and the *Toreador Song*—they're practically folk music.

Performed in French with English surtitle translation, this production of *Carmen* also features Nicolle Folland in the role of Micaela, tenor Hugh Smith and Gerard Powers alternating as Don

John Corigliano but he couldn't make it for the performance of *The Red Violin*," said Washburn. "He's taking a year off after winning the 2001 Pulitzer Prize in Music."

"The audience response to having the composers here is tremendous. The composer works with the orchestra and get to hear his or her ideas for the composition as does the audience during the pre-concert talks."

Also back by popular demand are three performances of *The Nutcracker* with the Plymouth Canton Ballet Company, the annual Pops concert showcasing Oscar-winning music from the movies, and chamber concerts featuring everything from Irish fiddle music to folk from the Middle East. But it's Beethoven's Ninth that has orchestra members talking. More than 100-voices strong the Plymouth Oratorio Society, Eastern Michigan University Choir and the Plymouth Counsellors Chorale, combined with the orchestra, should make for a moving performance.

"I'm especially excited about Beethoven. I've never played that before," said David Demorest of Canton, principal French horn. "There's a lot of really nice music. *The Red Violin*, Corigliano's a wonderful contemporary composer and I'm looking forward to Tchaikovsky (*Symphony No. 2* "Little Russian") because it features French horn and is hardly every played."

The orchestra's community involvement is one of the reasons Darlene Dreyer is happy to be back as executive director for a second season. Several of the programs include guest artists from the community.

"I'm excited because we have a wonderful color program that involves many people in the community," Dreyer said.

First performed in Paris in 1875, Carmen tells the story of a saucy cigarette girl and her uneasy—and eventually fatal—relationship with a Spanish Officer.

The new production will feature sets by Riccardo Hernandez and is directed by Ron Daniels with John DeMan conducting.

After this production of *Carmen* is completed, Mishura may be heading for Argentina for an opera production, but with such a busy schedule last year, she's looking forward to the holidays at home with her husband and daughter, who just started her first year at Western Michigan University.

After missing her 18th birthday and graduation, "I'm ready to be home," said Mishura.

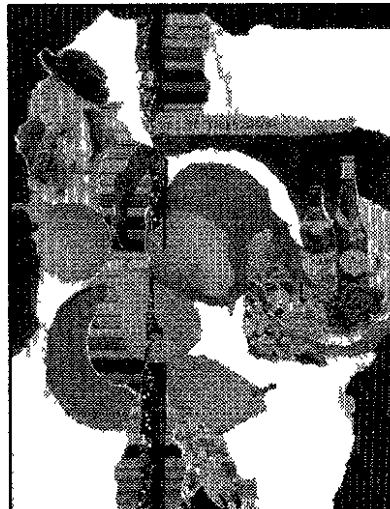

Even though summer is gone, your sunscreen shouldn't go away.

That's because protection is needed even in cooler weather.

Today, there's wide awareness that sunscreen is good for skin and essential year-round. The question that many people

An SPF describes a sunscreen's ability to shield you from harmful UVB rays that cause painful sunburns and some kinds of skin cancer. However, an SPF says nothing about protection from UVA rays, which age skin and cause wrinkles.

Keep in mind there are everyday - not just summer - sunscreens and age-prevention moisturizers on the market. Some are all-natural. Some are full-spectrum. Some are waterproof.

To begin, take a few minutes to read labels. Try to determine which products might work best for you and your daily routine.

### Reading the labels

When a label reads full spectrum, you're pretty much covered. That means it protects you from the UVA end to the UVB end of the spectrum.

Labels without a full spectrum disclaimer may have the same effective ingredients. However, most sunscreens protect only against UVB damage.

The ingredients that shield against UVA are oxybenzone, titanium dioxide, parsol 1789 (avobenzone) and zinc oxide.

If it's full spectrum coverage you're looking for these are the ingredients you should be looking for in a moisturizer.

Cellex C Sun Care SPF 30, \$35, which contains micro titanium dioxide and zinc is one such product. It's perfect for outdoor athletes because it won't drip or sweat into eyes.

Estee Lauder Sunblock for Face, \$18.50, blocks sun with a mix of oxybenzone, zinc oxide, titanium dioxide, vitamins C and E, moisturizers and a natural collagen booster. Allowing easy, smooth make-up application, it's an excellent moisturizer.

Clinique and Lancome also make several moisturizers that act as sun blocks, which are perfect for everyday wear under make-up.

Generally speaking, the amount of protection you require depends on your daily activities and how much time you spend in the sun. If you have concerns about the sun's effect on your particular skin type, consult a dermatologist.

Regardless of your requirements, make sure you wear some type of sunscreen.

The sun is the most damaging and wrinkle-causing agent for skin. So take advantage of being able to protect yourself with a sunscreen and layer one on every single day.

## Fear not the mall

### Shopping centers are unlikely target of terrorism

Is it safe to go to the mall?

More than three weeks since the Sept 11 terrorist attacks and for many that question still hangs in the air.

As if the line between caution and panic weren't easy enough to cross in the shadow of the tragedy, media speculation about future terrorist targets feeds public alarm.

And, in the suburban Detroit landscape shopping malls loom large as structures with size and large populations of people.

In West Bloomfield, local police called the state's bomb squad and evacuated the Orchard Mall on Sept 21 after a woman failed to pick up two pieces of luggage she had deliberately left at the small center.

But local experts on terrorism and the Middle East agree shopping malls, all of which have heightened their security, are an unlikely target for an attack.

"If you're talking about the terrorism of Islamic fundamentalists in terms of targeting shopping malls, I would really think there is a very slim possibility," said Imad Salamey, a Wayne State University political science lecturer who specializes in Middle East politics and Islamic fundamentalism.

That's good news for mall stores who have been experiencing lower-than-normal shopping traffic and, like all retailers, worry about the economy's future.

The primary reason all forms of terrorism aim at making a political statement. And sending a message back home is the main motive of the terrorist organization that crashed commercial jets into the Pentagon and World Trade Center towers, according to Salamey.

"If they wanted to take some kind of (additional) military action in the United States, they would want the action to make them heroes, they would want it to have a political statement to the greatest degree," said Salamey, adding terrorists rarely attack purely civilian targets.

"It's hard sometimes to understand what these extremists think," Salamey said. "His (Osama bin Laden's) main objectives are political, so his targets will be more political."

Sending a suicide bomber into a shopping mall, even attacking 20 shopping malls across the country on a single day, simply put, would fail to deliver the desired political message.

But if the Pentagon represents American military might and the World Trade Center, American financial power, where do shopping malls stand? Aren't they obvious symbols of American materialism and consumerism?

"In terms of risk, your local shopping mall is going to be very, very low down on the scale,"

insisted Professor Matthew Connelly, Department of History & Public Policy at the University of Michigan. "The terrorists would be looking for a target that is more symbolic of America than your average shopping mall. If they were going after a mall they would probably go after the Mall of America or something like that."

Well-known terrorist expert University of Michigan Professor Emeritus Raymond Tanter drew the same conclusion. "They would want something like the Mall of America."

However, ordinary shopping centers have been targets in other nations, namely Israel and Russia. In 1999, for instance, Chechen terrorists, some of whom were Islamic fundamentalists, apparently bombed a shopping center near the Kremlin.

But there's a big difference, said Connelly. The context of terrorism aimed at the United States is much different, he explained.

"It's often been suggested that the reason why (terrorists) would go after a shopping mall or pizza place is to convey the message that people in their everyday life are not safe, and you can't really escape the danger."

Islamic fundamentalists, at least at the moment, aren't engaged in day to day combat within the United States like they are in Israel and Russia, said Connelly. "The target is not the American public, but symbols of America," he said, adding, "The drive to the mall is going to be infinitely more dangerous."

# Beyond the border: London, Ontario has lots to see and do

Names like Piccadilly, Trafalgar, York, Oxford and Queens Street are just a few reminders of the ties to London much farther away.

London, Ontario is situated on the meandering Thames (pronounced tems) River just like the other London, and is a delightful place to spend a weekend or a week.

And though for the first time in decades, Americans and Canadians are realizing that there is a border between them, London is still just a short drive away. You may just have to be a little more patient getting there and back.

**Kid's stuff**

Water, history, toys, museums, sports and archeology are some of the things for children to experience in London. Wally World claims "Twenty-four reasons to get wet and wild." At Pioneer Village, weavers, blacksmiths and printmakers demonstrate their crafts. The Toy Shop of London is a hands-on play store. They also have pony rides, jugglers and other traveling shows.

There is a Children's Museum where kids can dig for dinosaurs, crawl through caves or journey into space. Try five pin bowling. It should be easier with fewer pins, but it isn't. If bowling isn't your style, how about Cosmo City for high tech laser games, rock climbing and virtual reality.

The Lawson Prehistoric Indian Village is an interesting site to visit at the London Museum of Archeology.

**For Mom and Dad**

Wineries, museums, double decker bus tours, plays, gardens and parks are some of the more adult attractions.

Bellamere Country Wines specialize in fruit wines, made from 100% real fruit, not grapes. They offer tours, tastings and a casual tearoom overlooking the vineyard.

Visit the Regimental Museum and see the Canadian uniforms, weapons and personal items displayed from 1883 to present.

London boasts everything from typical English style pubs to African, Mexican, Mediterranean, Italian, Chinese, Japanese, East Indian and maybe even some American cuisine. One restaurant called the Honest Lawyer got my attention, but we never made it there.

**Jeux du Canada**

Alliance London hosted the Summer Canadian Olympic Games in the summer. The alliance consists of Woodstock, St. Thomas, the Village of Grand Bend, the University of Western Ontario and, of course, London. Five thousand athletes, coaches, managers and officials attended this year's games from 650 different Canadian towns.

**Artsy stuff**

The art scene is continuing to emerge as we speak. There are some wonderful galleries, museums and stores sprinkled

through town. Innuitt Gallery has native and Innuitt stone carvings. The smooth feel and modern look of a traditional soapstone bear shows the simplicity and power of the creature.

There are many galleries showcasing local artists in all types of media from Celtic and native art to contemporary artists.

**The music scene**

The concerts and artists in London are as diverse as the food offerings.

For those who still remember him, visit the Guy Lombardo Museum Music Centre. It has been open since 1984 displaying documentaries on his life, photographs, song sheets and other mementos of a long successful career. If you remember Guy Lombardo and the Royal Canadians big band sound, then you may recognize these titles, *Red Roses for a Blue Lady*, *Harbor Lights*, *Red Sails in the Sunset* or the *Tennessee Waltz*. They bring back memories from the '50s and good feelings (for me) when life seemed simpler.

The concert stage offers everything from postwar swing and classic rock to new country original stars from the '70s - like

**R**iesling is one of the world's premier grape varieties. Surprised? The great grape of Germany, is also a stellar performer in the Alsace region of France, where dry-style rieslings are at their best.

Because many California rieslings are not particularly good, especially when grapes are grown in warm regions, and because most people mistakenly believe that all rieslings are sweet, Alsace wines have not been all that popular in the U.S. Until now. They've been rediscovered and are on a popularity roll.

According to the Alsace Wine Council, sales of Alsace rieslings (Please don't say Alsatian that's a breed of dog) in the U.S. were up by 36 percent in the year 2000. In addition, sales of all Alsace wines increased 22 percent.

**Alsace wines?**

The best Alsace wines come from 50 designated Grand Cru vineyards, where only gewurztraminer, pinot gris, muscat, and riesling, all harvested by hand, are allowed to grow. Unlike other French wine regions, Alsace wines are labeled with the grape name, so they're easy for Americans to understand.

According to Jean Louis Vezer, director of the Alsace Wine Council, "The riesling varietal has reached its peak in Alsace." These wines have become such sought-after exports that the total acreage planted to riesling has almost doubled in the last 30 years.

Part of the appeal of Alsace rieslings is the price. Another is their versatility with food. And while we prefer to drink most white wines three to five years from harvest, good vintages of Alsace riesling age beautifully for 10 years or more. Riesling typically has fresh, green apple aromas and flavors with a crisp acidity, which helps it pair well with fish, seafood, poultry, and white meats. The citrus character of the wines cool the palate after tasting a spicy curry or Thai dish and make a great choice with Asian cuisine including sushi.

**F.E. Trimbach**

F. E. Trimbach is one of our favorite producers of Alsace wines. This is principally due to the fact that Trimbach emphasizes dry wines, even in years when a warmer growing season would allow production of a preponderance of sweet, dessert styles. Over the last few years, Alsace has enjoyed a series of very good to excellent vintages. In a recent tasting of Trimbach's very classy whites from 1999, 1997, and 1996, we were not

# INDIAN COOKING

## Fresh spices heat up dishes

**W**hen food lovers think of Indian cooking, they think of curry powder. And when true Indian food aficionados think of curry, nothing beats a fresh homemade spice blend of coriander, cumin, pepper, ginger and turmeric to add a richer, fuller flavor to vegetables and other dishes.

**Just not hot enough**

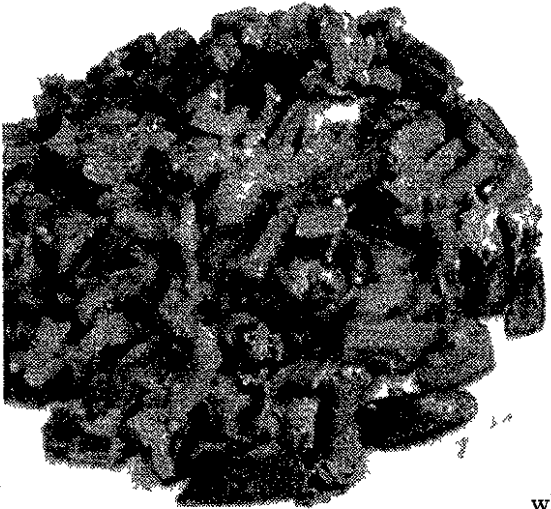
Sumathi Kumar of Canton doesn't use the curry powder from the grocery store. The other curry "isn't hot enough for us," Kumar said. "The spices are different in it," says Kumar. She likes to grind a chili powder into her spice blend to create a hotter curry powder for her and her husband, Anand, who both are originally from Madras, India.

Suresh Valsangkar of Westland does the same in making his own spice blend. He makes a blend of garam masala by roasting seeds of cinnamon, cumin, cardamom, cloves and peppercorns, then grinds them. "It gives you extra flavor," said Valsangkar. "Freshness is the key thing."

"I like it spicy, and the chicken curry is my favorite."

Valsangkar says Indian food has a unique taste not found in other cultures. "I like to make the spices from scratch because at the store, all they do is sit on the shelf. Generally many Indian vegetarian dishes are stir-fried. Valsangkar enjoys cauliflower potatoes and tomatoes in his Alu Goby Curry dish.

Eggplant and okra, which are both grown in India, cauliflower and potatoes are also popular stir-fried dishes. Sautéed onions are in many dishes and then tomatoes are added. Kumar



said

**Similar to other ethnicities**

Dishes featuring coconut and curry powder also are popular. Prominent ingredients in dishes are cumin, coriander, ginger and garlic, which all sounds a lot like a Thai dish.

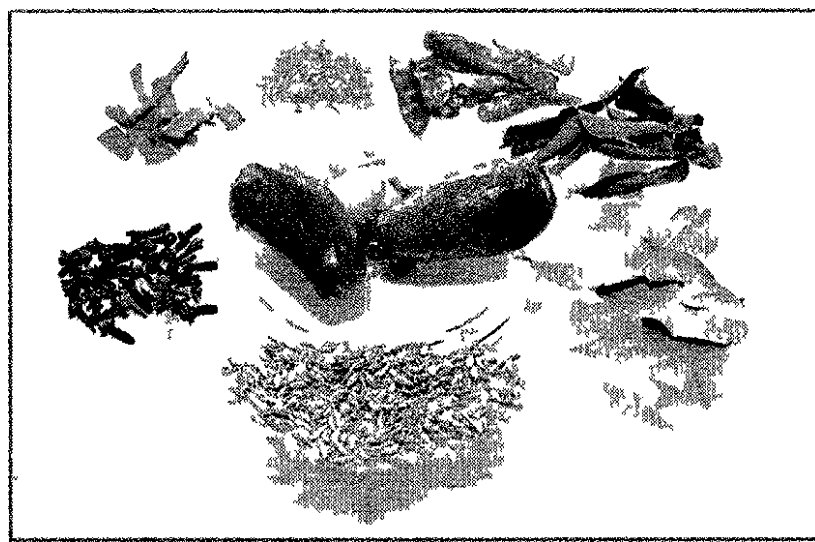
"I like to put cilantro in basically any dish," Kumar said. "We like the flavor. I chop it and use it in most dishes."

Cinnamon and cloves also are used in main dishes. Indians use a variety of lentils, seasoned of course with curry powder. It is also flavored with tamarind, a fruit that tastes like lemon juice that is sold as a sour flavored paste. A drop is usually put in a dish of Sambar, a blend of lentils and vegetables.

"Usually we have lentils," Kumar said. "Lentils have a lot of nutritional value with rice. Then a stir fry of vegetables can be served as a side dish with bread."

Bread consists of whole wheat flour with a little bit of salt and water. Pulavos are a dish of Basmati rice, with garlic, ginger, cinnamon and cloves, ground in a paste.

Indian cooking may not be associated with hot weather, but just like foods originating from other hot climates, the dishes themselves

are spicy. There are cooler dishes to cut the heat of the spices. A cucumber dressing for the Pulavos features cucumbers seeded and shredded with yogurt, cilantro and salt.

Cooks also make a mint chutney with coconut, tamarind and dried red chilies. Chutney is generally served with curries in India, not with rice. The tomato looks a lot like salsa, but it's cooked. Kumar's Amosa is a pastry filled with vegetables, all purpose flour and potatoes with curry powder, which is deep fried.

We use only fresh ingredients. We don't like to use anything from a can, Kumar said.

Kumar opens the windows even when she's cooking, even when the temperatures soared into the 90s this summer. The house gets filled with the smell of flavors and odor, she said. "It sticks around. We have to open the windows to get the smell out. But the taste is well worth it."

**RICE PILAF**

- 1 cup Basmati rice
- 2 cups water
- 1 teaspoon cumin seed
- 1 teaspoon curry powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 tablespoon butter

Cook 1 cup rice with 2 cups water and set aside.

In a skillet over medium heat, heat olive oil and butter. Then add cumin, curry powder and salt. When cumin seeds splatter, add the cooked rice. Stir until all ingredients are mixed well with rice. Serve hot.

**OKRA STIR FRY**

- 1 pound okra, cut into small pieces
- 1 small onion, finely chopped
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 4 tablespoons cooking oil
- 2 teaspoons chili powder

Preheat oven to 400° F. Coat okra with 2 tablespoons cooking oil and bake uncovered at 400° F for 45 minutes.

■ Cook pasta separately and add into soup just before serving to avoid "mushiness." Drain and add cans of beans or chickpeas for a richer soup that makes an entire meal.

# Heat chicken up with Indian spices

## CHICKEN CURRY

- 2 pounds chicken drum sticks unskinned rinsed and drained
- 3 large onions finely chopped
- 2 jalapenos finely chopped
- 6 ounces tomato paste
- 1/2 teaspoon garam masala
- 1/4 teaspoon cumin powder
- Salt for taste
- 1/8 teaspoon cumin seeds
- 4 tablespoons cooking oil
- 2 cloves garlic minced
- 1/4 teaspoon ginger finely chopped
- turmeric a pinch
- 2 cardamom pods crushed
- 3 cloves
- 1 inch cinnamon stick

Heat oil in a deep medium saucepan, add cumin seeds, garlic ginger turmeric, cardamom, cloves, cinnamon stick, onions and sauté onions Add tomato paste, mix well add chicken, garam masala, jalapeno, salt, cumin powder and cook for 2 minutes Add one cup cold water mix well cook chicken on a low heat Add more water if your want more curry Cook chicken for 15 minutes Before serving remove cloves and cinnamon stick

# Columbus' voyages laid a path for a worldwide food exchange

Because he was born in Genoa, we often eat Italian foods on Columbus Day, which is Monday, to honor the man who officially, if not technically, discovered America (he got as far as the West Indies) But the dietary influence of Christopher Columbus is bigger than that

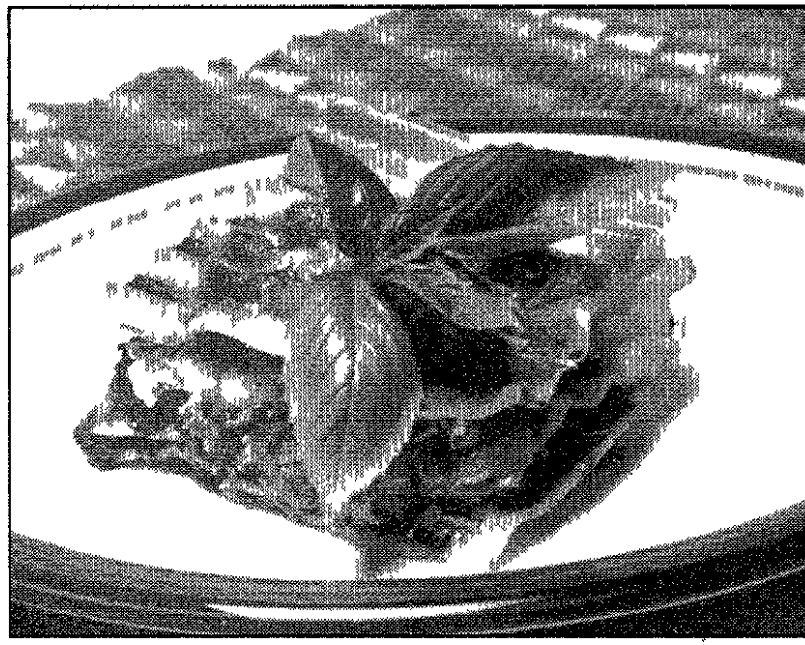
Columbus was responsible for the beginning of the Columbian Exchange, a massive crossing over between the Old World and the New, of plants, animals and more That exchange, which followed Columbus's two voyages across the Atlantic, truly changed the world

Traveling from west to east, chocolate, potatoes, tomatoes, peppers, squashes, many kinds of beans, turkey, avocados and other tropical fruits first became known in the Old World after Columbus's travels Equally important was the movement from east to west, introducing to the New World wheat, citrus fruits, grapes, sugar, cabbage, lettuce, beef cattle, pigs and sheep

Europe before Columbus set sail perhaps by the 13th century according to The Oxford Companion to Food It was a dish layered with strips made with wheat flour, interlaced with a savory filling and baked in the oven It was not however until well after the Columbian Exchange that the dish was bathed in tomato sauce

Making lasagna used to be as daunting as voyaging into unknown territory For years I avoided making lasagna al forno with its homemade tomato and bechemel sauces meats, cheeses and cooked ribbons of pasta Then versions slanted toward New World sensibilities emerged

An instant, no-boil version of pasta is a major convenience These corrugated sheets produce a fine lasagna when paired with the right combination of other ingredients In this version tomato sauce enriched with roasted red peppers makes a robust, red sauce It is layered with ricotta, mozzarella and ideally, authentic Parmigiano-Reggiano cheeses, plus spinach The result is memorably intense yet light It freezes beautifully, so

**LASAGNA WITH SPINACH AND RED PEPPER SAUCE**

sionally Meanwhile combine ricotta and mozzarella cheeses in a bowl  
Spoon 1/4 sauce to cover bottom of 9x13x2 inch baking dish Arrange 3 sheets pasta over sauce Cover with 1/3 spinach Spread over 1/3 cheese mixture Sprinkle on 1 tablespoon Parmesan Repeat process twice more Top with remaining pasta sauce and Parmesan

Cover with foil and bake 45 minutes Remove from oven and let sit uncovered, 15 minutes before serving

### SHORTCUT VEGETARIAN MINISTRONE

Minestrone is one word for soup in Italian and minestrone means big soup

There are probably as many minestrone soup recipes as there are Italians This one is easy, fast and vegetarian, and feeds a crowd For variation, you could add some green cabbage or diced potatoes

- 1/4 cup olive oil (not extra virgin)
- 2 cups chopped onions
- 1 teaspoon minced garlic
- 8 cups vegetable broth stock or water
- 1 15 ounce can white beans

- (such as cannellini) drained
- 1 15 ounce can garbanzo beans or chick peas drained
- 2 cups diced carrots
- 1 28 ounce can (approximately) diced tomatoes with juice
- 1 10 ounce package frozen spinach not defrosted
- 1 teaspoon fresh rosemary leaves or dried
- 1 teaspoon fresh or dried oregano
- 2 tablespoons dried parsley
- Freshly ground pepper to taste
- Salt to taste
- 4 cups cooked small pasta such as shells
- Freshly grated Parmesan cheese to taste

Heat oil in a large soup pot over medium-high heat Add onions and garlic and saute until softened, about 5 minutes Add remaining ingredients except pasta and cheese Bring to a boil Reduce heat to a slow boil and cook uncovered for 1 hour Remove from heat and ladle out about one third of the soup Let the third of soup cool to warm and puree in a blender or bowl of a food processor until smooth Return the pureed soup to the pot of soup and stir until completely incorporated

Heat the soup until very hot and adjust seasonings to taste About 5 minutes before serving add pasta so that it doesn't become mushy Add Parmesan cheese and more fresh ground pepper if you'd like Makes 16-20 servings

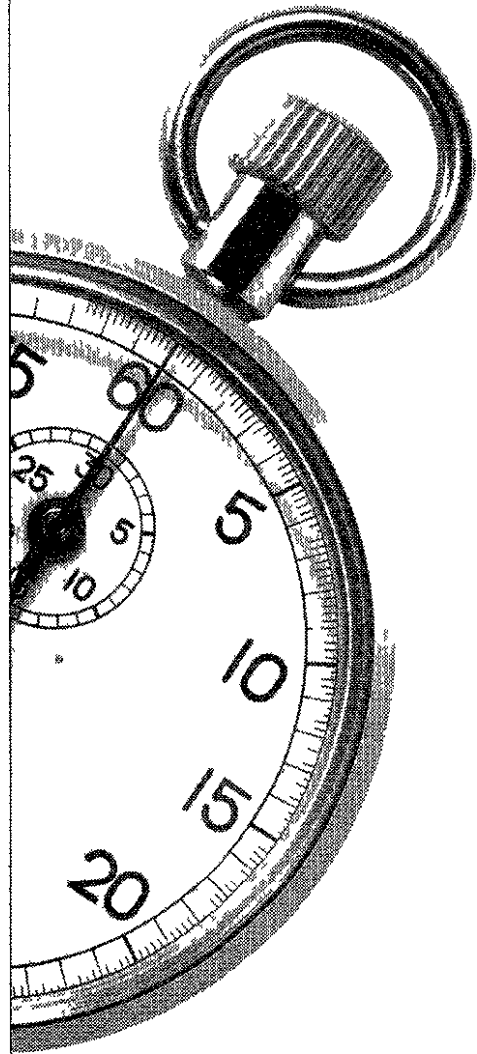

### Mobility loss study

Forty-nine million Americans have limited ability to perform an activity basic to daily life. Mobility loss — difficulty walking — is the leading cause. While the physical aspect of new disabilities get much attention, less is given to the social and long-term experiences. A new National Institutes of Health study seeks to learn about the meaning and experiences of mobility loss in order to better understand, manage and treat this problem. Volunteers are needed age 45-65 who use a cane, walker, brace, wheelchair or scooter. Participants receive \$35 for completing interviews. There are no invasive tests. All information is kept strictly confidential.

### It's apple cider time

With 200 cider mills in Michigan, chances are you'll enjoy some tasty apple cider this fall.

"People should keep in mind that sweet cider is often unpasteurized," says Henry Ford Heart Smart dietitian Beth Thayer.

While the risk of foodborne illness from unpasteurized juice is small, there is still the potential for people to become sick. Children, pregnant women, the elderly and those with an already weakened immune system are especially susceptible. Thayer notes that cider mills take measures to thoroughly clean their apples before making cider to ensure as safe a beverage possible. ### Spine care

October is Spinal Health Care Month in Michigan. Dr. Barry Hobbs of Michigan Specific Chiropractic Clinic in Canton suggests the following tips for keeping your spine in alignment and free of pain.

- While at the office, take frequent stretch breaks from working on your computer.
- While working on your computer, sit with your knees at approximately a 90- to 120-degree angle. Using an angled footrest to support your feet may help you sit more comfortably.
- Make sure your chair fits correctly. Allow for two inches between the front edge of the seat and the back of your knees.
- Avoid twisting and turning motions. Always bend from the knees, not your waist, when lifting anything heavier than 10 percent of your body weight, such as a child or heavy box.
- Warm up and stretch before any physical activity, including sports, raking, gardening and shoveling snow. Allow your body and muscles time to cool down after such an activity.
- Remember to get a good night's rest. Choose a comfortable supportive mattress as well as a pillow that supports the weight of your head, reducing the risk of back or neck pain.

## In tune

# Music therapy for the mind, body

*Hope is the thing with feathers — That perches in the soul — And sings the tune without the words — And never stops — at all —*

Every three weeks, Diana Knoll gathers herself to spend what amounts to an entire workday at Oakwood Hospital's Cancer Center in Dearborn.

Fighting the good fight to outwit, overwhelm and outlive ovarian cancer, she settles into a comfortable easy chair to take her "cocktail" of Taxol and Carboplatin. Undergoing infusion, she endures physical and mental side effects of this standard treatment as she works through myriad thoughts and feelings about the sudden detour she has been forced to take.

It's not easy, but Knoll, 55, of Canton is not with out hope. Diagnosed in January, she remains humbled, not by her illness, but because of the tremendous ongoing support shown by her fiancée, family, friends and even the kindness of a stranger who likes to make music.

Helping to bolster hope among cancer patients like Knoll is volunteer Ron Cieri of Dearborn. Each Wednesday near lunchtime, he leaves his desk at Young & Rubicam, drives to the center and plays his acoustic guitar for an hour or so in support of those taking chemotherapy.

Agreeing to give his time and talent to Oakwood's Tree of Life program came easily to Cieri, a classical guitarist whose gigs include mass at St. Thomas Aquinas Church as well as social settings. But even reassurance from his wife, a nurse, didn't prepare Cieri for the impact of the medical setting where people are fighting for their health.

"I was taken aback at first," Cieri said. "After playing there, and my wife said this would happen, the sense of appreciation was just tremendous. It wasn't even necessarily what people said or did, but I sensed people felt comforted. When you reach people like that, it's a tremendous reward."

### Healing power

Known through the ages for its healing power, music has been integrated with outpatient cancer treatment. It lends a new dimension to traditional care at Oakwood and other area cancer centers.

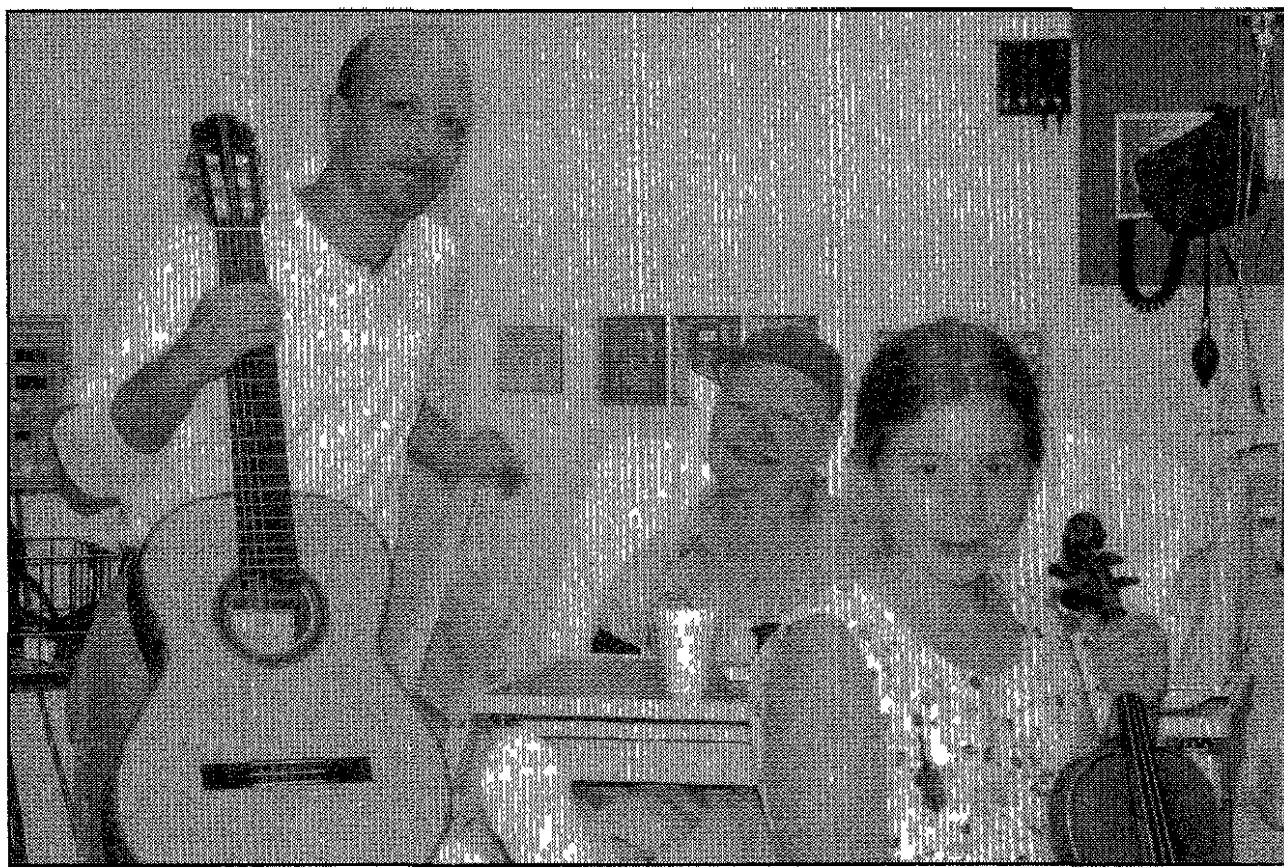
"It was so beautiful to be able to listen to them play," said Knoll, who also heard Cieri's 11-year-old daughter, Veronica, play her violin. "It's very calming and very peaceful. It takes your mind off things. I can understand why it's used for many different illnesses. It's very soothing."

"We all know that if we look at a piece of art or hear some music, it elicits some kind of a feeling or inner experience," said Dr. Clinton Greenstone of Oakwood's Complementary and Alternative Medicine Center in Westland. "Illness is associated very closely with what we think, feel and believe. Our inner lives can be disrupted in a setting of illness. Music has a potential capacity to bring some calm, some ease, some harmony, some balance into disrupted inner life."

Greenstone also encourages his patients to play a musical instrument or sing as a way to re-order the disruption of inner life.

Music is also an essential healing tool at Angela Hospice in Livonia. A range of instruments — harp, monica, harp and keyboard — help to comfort terminally ill adults at the hospice or in their homes.

"I use my harmonica quite often as a vehicle to get close to the patients and their families," said the Rev. David Bevington of Livonia, Protestant chaplain at Angela Hospice. "I ask them what type of music they like, secular or religious. Many like

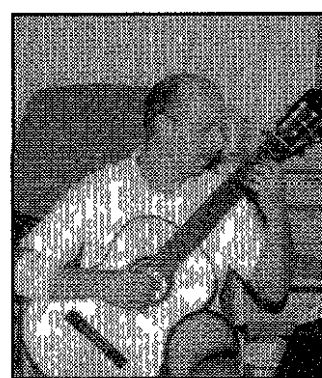

Justice, a board-certified music therapist and faculty member at Eastern Michigan University. "She'll talk about how music helps relieve anxiety, reduces nausea and vomiting and promotes relaxation," said Ann Arbor resident Suzanne Mahler, M.A., who directs the Mind, Body, Spirit Program. "My dream is to bring in a music therapist to work one-on-one with patients. I think people need to have music written specifically for them."

The free lecture begins at 6 p.m. and is open to the public and will be held in the McAuley Cancer Care Center at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital's second-floor Community Room, 5301 East Huron River Drive in Ypsilanti. "Amazing Grace" and tunes of that nature. For others, Stephen Foster is just great."

Every Thursday, he plays keyboard and harmonica during the hospice's weekly tea given for patients and their guests. A retired minister, he has been at Angela Hospice for four and a half years.

"Music soothes the families and friends in preparation of the service," said Bevington. "We include all faiths in this service."

### Benefits

Patient feedback shows that music and complementary medicine approaches not only round out treatment for cancer patients at the University of Michigan's Comprehensive Cancer Center in Ann Arbor, but also reduce anxiety in the outpatient setting.

Ann Arbor resident Suzanne Mahler directs the center's Mind, Body, Spirit Program, now starting its second year. "The program integrates healing of the mind, body and spirit," she said. "Patients feel less tense. If you read about what music therapy does for people, studies have shown it helps to reduce anxiety and pain as well as nausea and vomiting. It also helps with compliance in taking medication and following through with treatment."

There doesn't seem to be any one particular type of music that has more power than another, she said. "I've seen some 14-year-olds listening to hip-hop. It seems to provide an opportunity for self-expression and self-esteem." She also noted that drumming circles boosted patient self-esteem.

The Mind, Body, Spirit Program is held in conjunction with St. Joseph Mercy Hospital's McAuley Cancer Care Center in Ypsilanti. It addresses emo-

tional healing through courses in art therapy, life transitions, journaling and reading, as well as a family retreat.

"It's a supportive reading group," Mahler said. "We read other peoples' stories about character and coping and what they teach us about life and ourselves. It's an opportunity for discussion and self-reflection."

Working on the physical plane, patients engage in healing and prevention through guided imagery, pain management, diet and nutrition forums, and gentle movement class called qi do.

"We offer music as a healing therapy," Mahler said. "We have a baby grand piano by the pharmacy. We bring music to our patients. They're captive in the sense that people who come to have an examination, diagnosis or check-up are pretty tense. People who are in the Infusion Center receiving their chemotherapy are hooked up to their drugs, and they so appreciate our bringing music directly to them. It allows them to relax and to find some emotional relief."

Volunteer musicians include Julie Hussar, who plays harpichord and harp. Dr. Joe Graziano, a pediatric cardiology fellow, plays piano. Scientist Rod McDonald, who works in a U-M lab, provides music on guitar.

Hussar is one among a group of Midwest professionals who've taken special training to work with patients in an outpatient cancer care setting.

"There are others who are professional musicians who feel they get so much pleasure from performing for cancer patients," she said. "They interact with patients. Some come over to sit down and talk with them or move their seats around so they can be closer."

## Therapy program took root in Michigan

### What is Music Therapy?

Historically, Michigan — particularly Michigan State University — put the profession of music therapy on the national map in 1950.

Today, Eastern Michigan University and Western Michigan University also offer degree programs that help music majors cut a professional path to board certification.

According to the American Music Therapy Association, music therapy is an allied health profession similar to occupational therapy and physical therapy. Among its nearly 5,000 members nationwide, 150 work in various settings in Michigan and belong to the Great Lakes Region chapter. Music therapy, as practiced by board-certified music therapists, uses many types of music to help people with physical and mental challenges.

"Music is a form of sensory stimulation that pro-

duces responses due to the familiarity, predictability and feelings of security associated with it. Research results and clinical experiences attest to the viability of music therapy even in those who are resistant to other treatment approaches," says the AMTA.

"Music therapists literally work with every aspect of life from birth to death," said Roberta Justice, a board-certified music therapist with 30 years of clinical experience. She also teaches at Eastern Michigan University in Ypsilanti.

"My work has been in psychiatry, developmental disabilities and geriatrics. I do advanced music psychotherapy and guided imagery, stress and pain management and relaxation work. There's lots of different reasons why a person would seek out a music therapist."

Music therapy aids patients with needs related to respiration, chronic pain, cancer treatment, physical rehabilitation, diabetes, headaches, cardiac conditions, surgery and obstetrics. It also supports healing among those suffering from mental illness.

"We like to work in conjunction with other therapies to support and enhance them, although sometimes music therapy can be a primary mode," Justice said. "There's a process called guided imagery in music. It's a specific type of music therapy intervention. It's different from other forms of music and imagery which are generally for relaxation purposes."

Guided imagery is an in-depth psychotherapy. That aspect brings self-awareness and self-expression and can be extremely helpful in the medical arena.

providing comfort, solace, hope, those kinds of non-tangible things that are often hard to find in the medical setting," Justice said. "Using music taps into emotions so well, as well as our subconscious and the non-verbal areas of our lives. It can really facilitate those healthy aspects of hope."

**PRESSURE POINTS AND TRIGGER POINTS**  
Pressure points and trigger points: what are they and what do they matter? Pressure points are a feature of fibromyalgia and represent areas where firm palpation elicits a response of discomfort. Trigger points are sites which either spontaneously or when lightly touched, create pain that radiates like a wave across the body.

In fibromyalgia, the location of pressure points is similar from person to person. The pattern provides a basis for the diagnosis of the condition. Usually pressure points are present at the elbows, shoulders, neck, back, thighs, and knees. The cause of pressure points is unclear. The location does not correspond to sites of nerve endings or a tele-analyzing. Studies have failed to uncover any chemical or structural change in the tissue of patients with fibromyalgia that could account for pressure points.

The same lack of an explanation holds for trigger points. Investigations are difficult because the essence of a trigger point is individual. A patient has extensive trigger points in fibromyalgia does not occur. An individual with trigger points may have only one and it can be present anywhere in the back or limbs. The reason the discomfort radiates is also not explained by present concepts of pain.

Making a distinction between pressure and trigger points is important. Your doctor can treat trigger points with injection. Pressure points are not helped by this procedure or by the use of heat, cold, or creams. Resolution requires therapy for fibromyalgia itself.

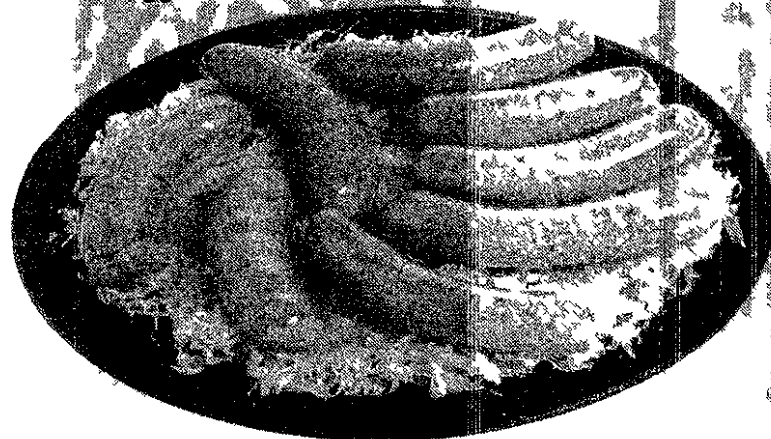

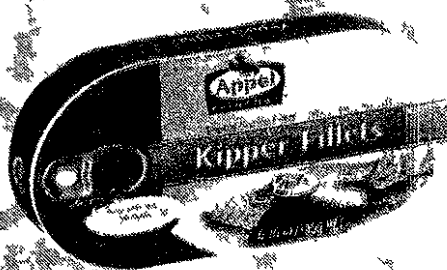

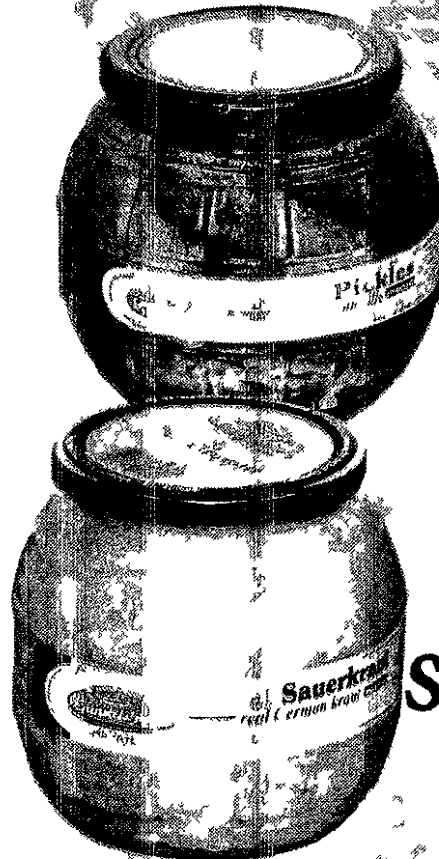

## Mortgage jobs boom with low interest rates

In spite of a downturn in the general economy, the housing market in southeast Michigan is still growing at a record pace, according to area lenders. That's good news for job-seekers in the mortgage industry, where new jobs are being created to fill the gap between the demand for mortgages and the industry's ability to process them.

"When the rates are low, the housing market is the best thing in the economy," said Edan King, co-founder and chief operating officer of Southfield-based Franklin Mortgage Funding.

"Right now, people are buying houses at a very healthy rate," King said. As Michigan's largest wholesale non-conforming lender, Franklin serves a network of more than 1,000 mortgage brokers and lenders throughout Michigan and several other states.

Non-conforming mortgages are generally granted to people with credit or employment histories that don't meet the requirements for conventional loans. King said that with its broad scope, Franklin Mortgage Funding is able to gauge the state of the mortgage industry and the state of the job market.

Prospects for the future are excellent, King said. "It looks great," King said. "We have been fortunate to experience continual growth. This is a wonderful time for the mortgage business."

### Demand increases jobs

The demand for mortgages has enabled Franklin Mortgage Funding to more than double its size in the past year - going from 30 to 70 employees - and King said the company is still looking for quality employees.

The company is looking for underwriters, post-closers, account executives and quality control people.

Underwriters review loan files and check the credit worthiness, credit history and job history of the buyer. Account executives are sales people who call upon mortgage brokers to bring in files.

Quality control personnel review documents and check for compliance with state regulations. Post-closers package and ship loans to secondary markets or end investors.

"It's not for the novice," King said. "We would usually want three years' experience in the industry. We're fortunately running around too fast to take someone and train them from scratch."

There are also opportunities for people who want to get into the primary mortgage business, where mortgage brokers currently have their hands full refinancing existing loans and working on conventional mortgages.

### Now is the time

Maura Robinson is the Novi branch manager of Allied Mortgage Capital Corp., a Houston-based corporation that combines banking and brokering and has about 700 branches in the United States, Puerto Rico and Guam.

Robinson said that now is the time to get a foot in the door of the mortgage industry, even if it means taking a job answering phones.

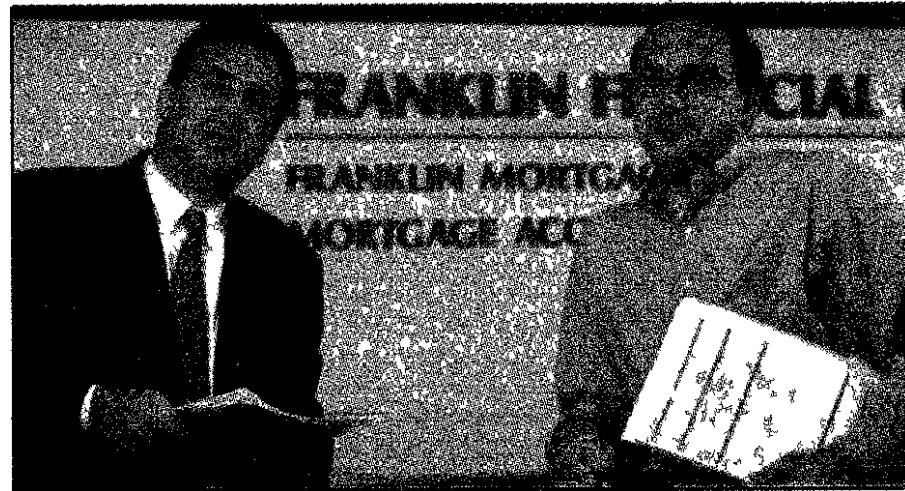
"It's kind of a double-edged sword, though," Robinson said. "A boom is the only time you're going to get into the business, but when the market is really busy, it might be hard to find people that will actually train you."

Robinson said that on-the-job training is the best avenue for advancement for those without experience, but finding a company willing to do that can be a trick.

Robinson had experience selling advertising for a real estate company before she was hired for loan sales in 1995 by Southfield-based Tranex Financial, where she became one of the company's top producers.

In 1999, she took over as branch manager at Allied, where she works with another loan officer and two staff members.

She said she enjoys the business because it gives

her a chance to get out from behind a desk. "I love working with people, and the social aspect of the business," Robinson said. "The business itself is never boring. There's always something new."

Answering phones is exactly the way Sally Denha LaFave got her foot in the door of the mortgage industry.

LaFave now owns and operates West Bloomfield-based York Financial, a mortgage brokerage company she established in 1996 that now employs four loan officers and a support staff of three.

Between 1990 and 1996, LaFave didn't get a lot of formal training, but working with mortgage processors, closers and loan officers taught her the language of the industry, and convinced her that she could become a loan officer herself.

She made the decision to become a loan officer during the refinancing boom of 1993 and went knocking door-to-door, soliciting referrals from area realtors.

Michigan Mortgage Brokers Association Education Committee Chairman David Pearson said the mortgage industry is currently in the midst of a boom but warned that the industry is cyclical in nature and fluctuates with the rise and fall of interest rates.

"The trend now seems to be that new people are joining our industry every day, even when the stock market slips," Pearson said.

Pearson said that although most brokerages don't have formal training programs, there is training available through some of the larger mortgage companies, and through trade organizations like the MMBA.

Learning the basics of the industry is a key component to success, Pearson said.

"Education is power. Training is power," Pearson said. "The more you can learn from an experienced person, the better off you are."

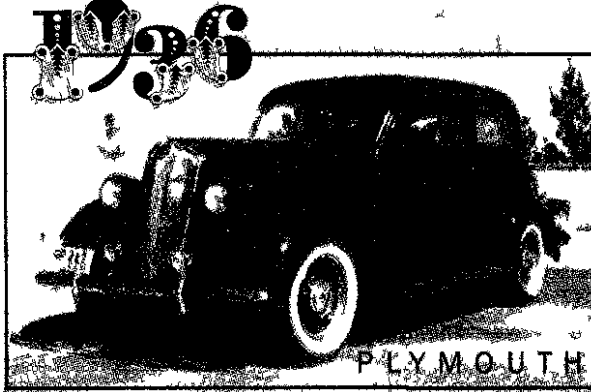

Solid & Dependable

While the Great Depression was devastating to most American auto companies, Chrysler Corp. seemed to be living through it better than most. Despite the market crash of 1929, Plymouth sales were booming by the early '30s.

This was partly because Chrysler was technologically ahead of the competition, and starting in 1930 all Chrysler, Dodge, and DeSoto dealerships were given Plymouth franchises. This made a Plymouth agency almost as easy to find as a Ford store.

Although Ford wowed the public in 1932 with its V8 answer to Chevrolet's OHV six, the Chrysler products offered all-steel bodies and hydraulic brakes. These features were not yet available on Fords or Chevys.

The Plymouth also could be ordered with an economical and somewhat tricky "fire wheeling" feature. Once the freewheeling is engaged, any slowing action that could be derived from compression "wind-down" is eliminated and once the brakes have heated to the point of fading, you're on your own!

This writer well remembers frantically trying to disengage this wear- and gas-saving device while flying down a steep San Francisco hill in a friend's 1931 Plymouth coupe back in the '60s. Though I finally regained control of the car, I almost died of fright!

The year 1934 saw both the production of the millionth Plymouth and the ill-fated yet well-ahead-of-its-time Airflow models.

While the Airflows, with their art-deco-cum Buck Rodgers-Rocket-Ship styling and "interlocked" unitized body and frame, were too advanced for the general public, they set the pace for the rest of the

decade's auto styling at Chrysler and had a considerable influence on car design around the world.

In 1935, Chrysler Corp. exceeded its 1929 sales record though the actual numbers were still well below both Ford and GM.

The 1936 Plymouth was basically a restyle of the 1935 model. The grille was a bit more rounded, and many of the details were Airflow-ized. Though Ford was still careening through its with Henry's old buggy spring suspension and mechanical brakes, it's V8 power sparkled when compared to Plymouth's plodding 217 cubic-inch six. Plymouth developed the image of the solid, dependable and understressed family car.

It was a good piece of transportation for civil servants, traveling salesmen and prudent motorists. Styling could be considered conservative and utilitarian rather than sleek and sporty.

John Rossi, a former Detroit area resident, built his clean, dark blue 1936 Plymouth. It's what we refer to as a "show car."

The car was painted and reupholstered. Rossi says he would force the owner to keep the car in a bag and trailer if from show to show John rebuilt the car to drive on a daily basis. It's been featured in an ABC news special in a simulation of early postwar small town life and was driven to and from Hot August Nights in Reno, Nev. a day after these pictures were shot.

John found the car years ago at a crusty used-car lot. The styling, with the two-door "trunkback" body appealed to him and the \$900 price seemed more than fair.

This was not the first collector car in the Rossi household. John had bought and sold a Jag 3 8 Mark II and a 1925 Dodge roadster and still owns a 1934 Caddy that was purchased and restored since the work on the Plymouth.

The mechanical work was farmed, while John tackled the body and dark blue paint at home in his garage. Burke's Upholstery did the interior. Anyone that has restored anything other than a Ford, Chevy or one of the more popular collector cars can appreciate how time consuming and expensive it is to find the "proper" parts and how creative one can get when faced with a quest for the impossible.

For instance, the car was missing some now extinct (and probably never to be reproduced) trunk lid hinges. A trip to the marine supply store provided

hatch cover hinges with a similar action that were reshaped a bit then replaced. Points off at the Concours for sure, but just right for a street cruiser.

The Classic Drive

Come along and we'll take a drive around town. The large doors on the two-door sedan offer easy entry to both the front and back seat. I had almost forgotten that at one time in the 'old days' a passenger could enter the back seat. The outside was built as if it were a truck. The front end is built tall and wide, with a hump in the front seat. The rear window is narrow.

It never fails to amaze me that Chrysler product dates far, especially from this era, with art deco flourishes and a dash of plastic. The plastic dash board and the entire world like silver.

It was strange enough to be part of Dr. Rossi's laboratory in a Flash Gordon serial.

Crack the starter and the little six comes to life. It has that characteristic Chrysler deep whurring that brings to mind a forklift or stationary engine. John's '36 has a floor mounted shifter with a non-stock crystal knob. Slide it into low, let out the clutch and we're off onto the street. While these engines produce bags of torque at the low end, they run out of poop early in the RPM range, forcing early upshifts. Once one gets used to this and understands that the car is supposed to be in high gear most of the time, it all does fall into perspective.

A simple downshift to second is all that's needed to climb any hill. No need to worry about keeping the revs up, as this 'ol Plymouth has torque like an electric trolley at the bottom end. You just can't rush it!

The handling is pretty good by contemporary standards — not as darting or prone to lean as a Ford or as loose as a "knee action" suspended Chevrolet. The brakes stop the little sedan in plenty of time. The all-steel body seems solid and strong with few squeaks and moans. It's easy to see why these cars were so popular with salesmen and government agencies.

John has since sold the Plymouth in order to finance a move to the country. Hopefully the new owner will use it regularly and derive as much pleasure out of it as John Rossi did.
