The idea is to make the holidays special for everybody, not just the lucky families where people have plenty to spend


So if you're out doing your Christmas shopping and have a few minutes to look for another toy or maybe a gift of warm clothing, your thoughtfulness will be appreciated

Guided tour New high school on schedule for '02

Will the new high school be ready next fall? "Absolutely," says Plymouth

High School Principal Michael Bee Ground was broken a little

more than a year ago for the multi-million dollar project that will finally end overcrowding at the district's two other high schools, Salem and Can-

 ton The cost of the building, site, technology and equipment has been set at about \$50 million The district has been successful in getting multiple bids on many items, and the final cost

Recently Bee hosted the Plymouth-Canton school board at the building and updated them on construction progress

Among the visitors was board trustee Tom Wysocki, who called the new school "expansive space that will open your mind up "

Drivers: Fleet in bad shape

Plymouth-Canton school bus drivers are warning school officials the buses they drive to transport students are in extremely poor condition

"The Plymouth-Canton school district transportation bus fleet is currently in a state of disrepair," said bus driver Del Templeton "We have buses that have well in excess of 100,000 miles, and some are approaching 200,000 hard-driven miles on them The overall integrity of our bus fleet is in question "

It's not the first time bus drivers have warned the Board of Education Two years ago, operators gave the same kinds of alarms about the age and safety of the buses they drive

The district needs about 100 buses on the road each day to handle all the elementary, middle and high school routes The fleet has a handful of stand-by buses available in case some don't start, are being inspected by the state, or remain in the garage for needed repairs by the district's eight full-time mechanics

Economy forces shift in Wilcox plans

Wilcox house gets a tenant — A3

The events surrounding the terrorist attacks of Sept 11 have had a deep-felt economic impact that's been experienced nationwide, including locally by the developers of the Wilcox project in downtown Plymouth

D&P Ventures of Detroit have revised its plans for a 5-story condominium project on the 25 acres across from Kellogg Park

"Our decision to come in for revision was quite frankly the events of 9-11 It had a profound effect on us," said Tom Pomarolli of D&P Ventures "We just felt we were in harm's way with the project being so large We wanted to take a step back and make sure we're doing the right things at the right time

The original plan, presented to the planning commission and passed by the city commission last year, included a two-phase project, one building with 35 condominiums and a future building housing an additional 10 condos

Pomarolli said the number of condos will remain approximately the same, but the project will now be developed in three phases, and scaled down about 8 percent, meaning more landscaping and ground view and less concrete

Phase 1 will include four condos on each of the first four floors, with two penthouse units on the fifth floor

"Depending on approval, we're targeting May to sink the shovel," said Pomarolli "We're already into preliminary designing, and the building will be all steel

"The rate of sales for Phase 1 will determine when we'll start on Phase 2." he said "Indications are we may be

Since a mediator was assigned to oversee contract negotiations between Plymouth Township and its clerical union, both sides say there has been some progress toward a resolution to the nearly two-year dispute

Independent mediator Jim Amar, appointed by the Michigan Employment Relations Commission to help end the sometimes bitter dispute, sat in on two recent negotiation sessions - Nov 7 and Nov 14

The township's clerical workers formed a union in March 2000 and are represented by the American Federation of State and County Municipal Employees The union, which has more than 30 members, still hasn't agreed to an initial contract with township officials

Salvation Army kicks off annual kettle campaign

The Plymouth Salvation Army doesn't have to ask for whom the bell tolls Beginning Friday, it shall toll for charity

The Salvation Army kicks off its annual Red Kettle Campaign with an opening ceremony at noon Tuesday at the Army headquarters on Main Street, just south of Ann Arbor Road The ceremony will feature the Plymouth Township Police Color Guard and the West Middle School Choir, as well as lunch for anyone who attends The ceremony is open to the public

The Red Kettle Campaign, which is the Army's primary fund-raiser for the Christmas holiday, hopes to raise \$115,000 in 27 days of bell-ringing at nearly 30 sites in Plymouth, Canton, Northville and Belleville The bells are silent on Sundays, the campaign runs through Christmas Eve

"The ceremony is designed to make people aware and get them fired up,²

said Maj Steve Hull, the Salvation Army commander in Plymouth "We're very excited about our presence in Belleville, especially We got in there at the tail end of last year, so we're in much better position there this year"

The Salvation Army still has plenty of opportunities for volunteers to man bell-ringing stations Particularly diffi cult to fill, Hull said, are daytime hours on weekdays Hull said he hopes a program started last year - where businesses adopt a certain site and man it with employees for a day catches on even better this year

"It was something we really started pushing last year, and we're really trying to encourage it again this year," Hull said "Those who have taken us up on it have had a really good time with it "

However, many times those backup buses are pressed into service, leaving no reserve vehicles available And, in the winter when many buses won't start, the lack of reserve buses forces drivers to double-up on routes, which results in students being picked up late and being • tardy for class

"We're working extremely hard to address the problem, said Melvin Latnie, the district's transportation director We need to replace some buses in the fleet, that's for sure We're addressing the shortage '

"In the short term, we have the ability to rent buses from other districts," said Latnie "We have a contingency plan for winter, and in case we get hit unexpectedly with state inspections'

Latnie said he's submitted a report to the Board of Education "giving a clear indication where we're at right now, and detailing the needs of the future "

The 1999 bond, which was used to build Discovery Middle School, contributed \$3.4 million to purchase 43 buses, according to figures from school board president Elizabeth Givens She also noted there is a three-member committee which is preparing information for the board concerning immediate bus replacement

"In the past, our buses were almost always bought out of bond money, and we're trying to analyze the alternatives," she said "It's very difficult to raise capital funds

for bonds to be used for buses So, we're looking at other ways increase our Melvin Latnie bus fleet ' ---Transportation director Many school

Despite the physical condition of the buses, Latnie is insistent they are safe for children to ride

"Absolutely, the buses are safe, without question," he said "We wouldn't put a bus out there that wasn't safe "

Athletic facilities outside will be done by fall, except some tennis courts near Joy Road where the old barn stands The barn will be needed for at least one more year for storage

A survey of staff has produced a "nice mix" of people willing to transfer over to Plymouth High, Bee said All core classes for ninth and 10th grades will be offered at the new building Some courses are "room-bound" Bee said, and will stay in Salem or Canton

There will likely be a few empty classrooms in each building, and the dreaded "teacher on a cart" --- that 1s, teachers with no permanent classroom --- will be minimal or nonexistent

"In designing this building teachers had a lot of input Architects listened to what they had to say," Bee said

"The building was designed for efficiency and for supervision It will be a building that is very, very staff- and student-friendly And there is a functional layout to it, with state of the art technology Kids have a nice opportunity to take classes they've never had before

"And space We are going to have space here again on campus, finally That's the big thing"

Plymouth-Canton school board treasurer Steve Guile made it official Tuesday night he'll be step ping down from his post Nov 30

Guile, who had been Westland's downtown development director, will become city manager in Beaverton, Mich

"I'd like to thank Superintendent (Kathleen) Booher for her vision and leadership during some very difficult times, the Core Team and the teaching staff for their dedication and commitment to change, and board members for their personal dedication to the community and their commitment to creating a quality educational atmosphere," said Guile "Most of all, I would like to thank the community for providing me with the opportunity to help, in some small way, shape the future of the community

Guile was elected to the board in June 1999, and will be leaving with 15 years left in his four-year term Board President Elizabeth Givens said nominations to fill Guile's seat through June will be posted for 20 days from the resignation date The trustees then will interview those interested in the board position and select a replacement

The departure of Guile means there will be three board seats to fill in June The four-year terms of Susan Davis and Darwin Watts will end Davis, who will have served eight years on the school board, has already announced she will not seek re-election Watts has yet to indicate if he will run for a second term The election to fill Guile's board seat will be for the remaining one year of his term

Board members were complimentary of Guile's tour on the Board of Education

"You brought a unique perspective to the board, and it's always been very helpful and valuable to You'll really be missed," she us said

Township getting new Web site

Plymouth Township will soon have a more

prominent presence on the World Wide Web On Tuesday, the board of trustees approved spending \$19,850 to have the township's current Web site redesigned The township has hired Birmingham-based Municipal Web Services, which specializes in Web site design and development for municipal governments, to do the job

The cities of Livonia, Novi and Northville are among the company's clients

"This will be our 20th municipal Web site, and that includes 10 in Michigan We feel each of our Web sites has a distinct feel and that's what we're after when we design them," said Curt Anderson of MWS

Bob Janks, the township's information service specialist, said the township chose MWS over five other companies that bid for the contract because

of its expertise working with other municipalities

"They have the professional look we're looking for I've talked with representatives from the cities they have served, and they come highly recommended," he said

When the redesign is completed, which should take about two months, the township's Web site address will still be www plymouthtwp org

Supervisor Steve Mann said redesigning the Web site has been one of his main priorities since being elected He said navigating the current site is like "driving through Detroit in the dark," and that the new site will be much more user-friend-

According to Mann, the new site will be updated regularly and list upcoming events and meetings, as well as the minutes of the various board meetings Residents will also be able to obtain tax information and contact department heads and staff through e-mail links

Plymouth Township police officers arrested two adults and a juvenile for a home invasion that occurred Nov 6 at a home on the 1000 block of East Side

Police have charged an 18-year-old male from Plymouth and a 19year-old female from Wayne with second-degree home invasion for stealing several items from the home, including a purse, necklace and Gameboy toy Both were arranged on the felony Nov 7 at 35th District Court and released on \$500 bond Both face a Nov 19 preliminary examination

Police may also charge a 14-year-old Plymouth boy, who allegedly accompanied the two adults during the crime

According to the police report, police officers allegedly found some of the stolen items when they searched the home of one of the suspects All three suspects were friends of the homeowner's daughter

A witness told police she saw the three enter the house through a back door around 2 p m , and then leave about 20 minutes later She told police she recognized one of the suspects because he lived on the same block Her tip led to the arrests







Ban on meeters and greeters shouldn't hurt concessionaires

If concessionaires must build on the other side of security checkpoints at Detroit Metropolitan Wayne County Airport's new midfield terminal, will enough business come their way? Apparently yes, potential airport businesses were assured Monday

At the new Edward H McNamara Terminal, the loss of socalled "meeters and greeters" will not have a significant impact, according to officials from Northwest Airlines and the airport, who last week met with businesses looking to land valuable retail space inside the soonto-open facility

The terminal – being built by Northwest Airlines, the airport's hub carrier – will feature 12 security checkpoints, with all restaurants, bars and retail shops to be located beyond those stations

That means only ticketed passengers will have the chance to shop or dine at the myriad concessionaires expected to fill up 12,000 square feet of available space The Federal Aviation Administration, in a decision made following the Sept 11 terrorist attacks, ruled that only ticket holders may venture past the checkpoints into areas where family and friends traditionally went to send off or welcome travelers Still, the loss of sales generat-


ed by the "meeters and greeters" will be minimal and be more than offset by passengers getting to the airport much earlier and therefore having "dwell time," additional minutes and hours waiting for departures

"Most money is spent postsecurity," said Judy Byrd, a consultant for Chicago-based Unison-Maximus, a company that traces national airport trends "If there has been a dip in sales (since Sept 11), it has been more on the pre-security side than the post-security side People are nervous to get clearance before they can really relax and dine"

Byrd, talking to a number of prospective retailers looking to open businesses at the midfield terminal, added that the initial worry about losing sales from the meeters and greeters is easily being dispelled She said the meeters and greeters make up about 10 percent of the overall market at airports, but only 3-4 percent of sales

The FAA mandate also is not worrisome to Metro's hub carrier, Northwest Airlines, which is in charge of building the new terminal

During Monday's Local Outreach Forum at the Crowne Plaza Hotel, Northwest's Director of Design Tom Gunn said it made better sense to keep the



because the larger percentage of Northwest passengers flying into Metro will stay inside the terminal while awaiting connecting flights elsewhere

"For a hub operation," Gunn said, "leaving it exactly where it is now is the only thing that makes sense "


Soccer champs utilize local talent



During flight the hardened

wings must be raised high

enough to allow the one pair of

flight wings to propel it

through the air They do not

aide in flight, in fact they cre

ate resistance and drag while

Despite this negative aspect

of their wings, beetles are the most successful group of insects in the world, Fully onequarter of all insects are beetles Even though they do not help flight, they do not hinder it enough to counter act the protection they provide when not used in flight

Birds are well adapted for flight yet some new findings seem to fly in the face of logic. Scientists have calculated that 30 pounds is as heavy as a flying bird can practically be in today s world

If a bird weighed more than 30 pounds, its wings would have to be too long and wide to be practical Trumpeter swans weigh close to that 30 pound limit

Light weight feathers, hollow bones, fused bones, fewer bones and air sacs are all features that reduce the weight of birds so they can fly So it seems logıcal that the less a bird weighs, the better it can fly, Right?

Well not according to a recent study which demonstrated birds with more than normal amounts of fat flew more efficiently

Logic would dietate that a heavier bird would be harder to keep in the air and require a greater expenditure of energy. At least the way I think of it,

but that is not the case. Incidentally, the "V" formation of flying geese has been proven to be a beneficial formation Scientists have explained the formation as an energy saver for the geese flying behind the leader

Updrafts created by the lead goose aides those following. The savings to those following has now been shown to be about 18 percent

And if you were wondering, the lead bird does not lead all the time Since they fire more quickly, other adult birds of the flock rotate into that position and set the course a

It may at times seem silly for scientists to experiment and test things that seem obvious to us but there are many times when an intuitive "logical" explanation is not the correct one

Regional champion Stevenson also made its presence known by placing three on the first-team







> ohn Glick steadily moves the treadle of the potter's wheel back and forth with his foot as he's done for the last 37 years at Plum Tree Pottery in Farmington Hills. His excitement over winning the Governor's Michigan Artist Award from Art Serve Michigan appears muted but that's simply the internationally known ceramist's style

Glick calmly and philosophically responds to life events and his craft. In his acceptance speech, Glick

revealed a long-held idealism that an artist's journey is about discov ery, creation hope, and possibility Glick trea sures the fact he's touched so many people with his work — that through the simple act of forming clay he brings happiness to others

Looking around the showroom at Glick's functional and sculptural ceramics, it's easy to see the beauty in owning hand-made wares Built on the site of a working farm from the 1850s, the space features platters, tea pots, bowls, tiles, cake plates,

platters, mugs, stoneware jugs — objects to soothe the bumps in life Glick believes it's more important now than ever to add a little joy to people's days

"I was in New York the week of the tragedy giving a seminar and was traumatized and scared afterward even when I came home," said Glick who received the award Tuesday, Nov 13, at the Detroit Institute of Arts "People are emotionally shocked, spiritually shocked They're buying a cup because it's about hope, the possible, the real The human connecting part is the most enduring A part of myself goes into all of my work

"I'm very excited about the award but I've had enough rewards over the years I have a diverse community of supporters who come here anytime for a personal special gift for someone or themselves It's a wonderful connection with people loving what you do "

Glick tells stories about people he's affected over the years One of his favorites is 22 years old Glick was giving a tour of his studio to a group of Brownies and before they left he gave them all something to remember their day by One of the girls' mother, who'd never heard of the pottery, came in and became a regular customer because of her daughters stories

"The girls grew up loving handmade work because of those experiences," said Glick "Now they have children They come here, three generations It's a family tradition Their biggest treat is giving each other my work What touches me is the fact it knits their family together"


Just like his customers, Glick is moved by owning clay works His home is filled with dozens of pieces by other artists He says it puts him in touch with "all those different voices every day"

Glick never dreamed as a student that like them he could make a living creating utilitarian objects He'd read about folk potters in Korea and Japan passing on their skills from one generation to the next Nearly 40 years later he's running a successful business and eager to tell yourg artists that it is possible to make a living doing what he does As a student at Wayne State University in the late 1950s, he was inspired to become a potter by teachers, students and family

"It was my parents believing in me, people believing in me," said Glick "My parents never said this

Former resident has a good 'Point'

Point Deception

by Marcıa Muller (Mysterious Press / Warner

Books, \$23 95)

"Things look different when you're scared "

Thus begins this new mystery novel by former Ann Arborite Marcia Muller, creator of the popular series charac-Sharon ters McCone, Joanna VICTORIA Stark and Elena DIAZ Oliverez Don't expect

to meet them in "Point Deception," however We are introduced, instead, to Northern California sheriff deputy Rhoda Swift, who lives and works in a strange spot haunted by its past Rhoda 1s haunted, too, although she's trying to make a "normal" life for herself as the story opens In Soledad County, 13 years

earlier, six people (including two children) were massacred, and the crime remains unsolved thanks, in part, to snafus committed by Rhoda Now it appears that a serial killer has begun to strike again A beautiful stranded motorist is found strangled, and shortly thereafter, two long-time citizens of the area are found dead in remote parts of Cascada Canyon, where the original murders took place As Rhoda tries to unravel the mystery, it looks as if the killer is no passing stranger The residents of the fictional county entertain "fears and suspicions that a monster (lives) among them " And so do

Enter Guy Newberry, a New York journalist, who comes to Soledad County in order to write of the earlier massacres And, ironically, Guy is haunted too He soon becomes involved in solving the murders and begins to begins to develop more than just friendly feelings for Rhoda

Suspects seem to emerge from behind every rock or tangled stand of pampas grass along this section of the fog-shrouded coast As readers, we begin to look askance at almost everybody, including the violent-tempered cop, Wayne Gilardi, abalone poacher Alex Ngo, the eccentric Basque named Gregory Cordova, and even Rhoda's reclusive father, Jack Antolini

Muller does her usual bang-up job of keeping us enthralled with her story of a community that has been scarred and changed by terrible violence and tragedy She imparts a strange feeling of ghostliness to the place and its inhabitants, illustrating how evil might affect the behavior of everyone it touches-even the innocent This not only adds punch to the impact of the story overall, but 1s ultimately the book's main, thought-provoking strength (Her exceptionally well-informed word pictures of this place also keep us engaged in the story)

Though not highly dimensional yet (maybe this will develop in future novels), Rhoda 1s empathetic and likable enough, with her mixed feelings toward her hard-drinking father and her coworkers, her devotion toward her canine pal, and her bravery in the face of hideous terror

If the same can be said for the haunted and lonely, but evercapable and talented, Guy Newberry, therein lies one of the problems with the novel It's as if Muller never quite makes up her mind who has the lead role here Consequently, the effectiveness of each character seems really less than it might have been

This is certainly not enough to write things off, however "Point Deception" will leave many readers hoping they'll see more of this pair in the future





is what you should do So I started thinking is it possible to do this? Then I heard about Wayne State having a student exhibition in the basement of the DIA and went running over to see if I could help install the show It's pretty powerful your school having a show in the basement of the DIA'

Glick was hooked on becoming a ceramist Today he's well known for plate-shaped wall pieces which are colorful landscape paintings on clay Many of them can be found in the permanent collection of not only the Detroit Institute of Arts but Renwick Gallery of the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D C , Cranbrook Art Muse um in Bloomfield Hills and numerous places around the world But he's never forgotten what it was to be a struggling young artist For many years now Glick's given a one-year assistantship to under grad and gradu ate students

"I teach by example," said Ghck who frequently puts in 10 hour days "It's a wonderful relation ship that happens The assistants see evidence of community when they're in the showroom

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



Many people particularly children habitually bite or suck their upper or lower lips As a chronic or constant problem this leaves lip biters with dry chapped swollen lips and often a

characteristic red ring around their mouths This habit can also result in the upper front teeth not making proper contact with the lower teeth creating a space between them As a consequence of biting or sucking the top lip the front teeth may even be pushed in When the condition becomes severe orthodontic intervention may be called for

First however as with thumb or finger sucking the habit which led to the poor bite must be corrected The orthodontist may provide some helpful options for remedying the habit In the meantime parents should keep a lookout for this (and other) problems in an effort to correct them early Many times an inappropriate







Urban elements

Palladium symbolizes downtown Birmingham's new direction

A decade ago, downtown Birmingham went to bed at sundown on most nights

Today, there's a hustle and-bustle on mid-week nights

The cafe crowd flips through newspapers and surfs the Internet on lap tops

Teenagers gather on the sidewalk to hold court and gossip before catching an early flick

Couples stroll by shop windows to work off calo ries from an in town dinner

Families pack the Coney Island restaurants to grab a speedy meal

There's no question downtown Birmingham has changed But last week's opening of the Uptown Palladium Theater at the corner of North Old Woodward and Hamilton, marks a turning point for the shopping district

Jacobson's spokesman Fred Marx probably put it best while conversing with patrons at the theater's grand opening benefit 'This is no small town'

Like most downtown districts and metropolitan cities, Birmingham hasn't lost all its small town character It's just that in today's increasingly com petitive and more global marketplace, a more urban atmosphere appears to be the best way for Birmingham to survive

Looks aren't everything


The mere physical presence of the three story 73,500-square-foot Palladium complex awakens urban sensibilities The Willits condominium pro ject, just around the corner from the new 12-screen theater, only amplifies the emerging metropolitan ambiance

Of course the impact of both projects is more than physical

Downtown entertainment and in-town housing are hallmarks of the urban experience both of which tend to increase the level and time span of foot traffic And at least one downtown business, Java Hutt Cafe, at 207 South Old Woodward, foresees the future The coffee house is open 24 hours a day

Add to the pot a balance of retail, restaurant, entertainment and residential uses and "what you've got 1s a town that's being used 24 hours a day," says John Heiney, Birmingham Principal

The principal shopping district also recently announced plans to link its Internet site, www.enjoybirmingham.com, with CitySearch.com

Retail perspective

Most downtown retailers embrace the idea of endowing Birmingham with urban characteristics Many insist its a matter of survival That's partly because the target customer for

Shopping District executive director, adding, "I downtown merchants is a cosmopolitan one "From a retail point of view, our customers are getting on planes and going to urban cities to shop," says Cheryl Daskas, a local retailer and principal shopping district board member

Merchants need to attract shoppers from outside the community, too, says Geoffrey Hockman, local businessman and principal shopping district board chair "We cannot live on our immediate market We also need a regional draw"

Ultimately, Birmingham's evolution doesn't and shouldn't - hinge on labels like urban and cosmopolitan, but rather on market conditions, adds Hockman "Yes, the town 1s evolving to what one would say has a more urban feel Are we a large city? No Do we want to evolve into a down town that offers retail, entertainment, restaurants, professional services and residential? Yes'

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

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A Michigan ghost town for all seasons



While not as instantly evoca tive as Saugatuck or Grand Haven State Parks on Lake Michigan, Lake Huron's Port Crescent State Park, near the tip of Michigan's Thumb, is worthy of being counted among the state's great travel destinations During the summer, three miles of fine sandy beach and the largest sand dunes on Michi gan's Lake Huron shoreline await the visitor

The fall season brings a blaze of color across the maple and oak forested dunes and possible glimpses of migrating raptors overhead Walking and crosscountry skiing reward winter visitors with solitude and reflec tion time Spring is celebrated when shades of green emerge while winter's white melts away

Port Crescent State Park occupies the site of an old sawmill town In the mid 1800s Port

Crescent thrived as a lumber and salt town situated near the mouth of the Pinnebog River Steam powered saw mills lined the riverbank, employing hundreds of residents Others worked in salt blockhouses, evaporating water from brine and filling barrels with salt

As the lumber and salt busi ness grew, families moved in A two story wooden school, Luther an church, company store hotel and tavern lined the town's sev eral streets

The Pack Woods Saw Mill added a 120 foot brick chimney to the main mill, and increased production by salvaging thou sands of trees burned by a fire that swept the Thumb in 1871 It was a boomtown period People thought Port Crescent would continue to prosper and grow until 1881, that is

On Sept 5 of that year, the townspeople witnessed a fireball lighting up the afternoon sky A one hundred foot wall of flame blazed across the peninsula destroying all the Thumb's timber resources The lumber mill, forced to close, was dismantled, and along with the 800 foot dock, shipped to Oscoda The salt factories closed because the process of evaporating water from salt brine required firewood — and there was none People left, taking their houses with them to neighboring communities

In 1894, the last building was moved to a nearby town Only the old steel bridge, a brick chimney, and nearby cemetery remained Port Crescent became a ghost town

In the 1950's, the state of Michigan purchased the abandoned town site and razed the crumbling chimney, leaving the lower section as an eight-foot high monument This landmark is the beginning point of a walk ing tour through old Port Cres cent

To reach Chimney Monument, turn off M-25 five miles south of Port Austin, and enter Port Crescent State Park Campground Ahead, you will see the red brick chimney, a sand mining cart, and the Old Pinnebog **River** Channel

Abandoned homestead sites dot the forested dunes on the other side of the river channel To get there, walk past three docks extending from the riverbank, and continue to the lakeshore where the meager flow of the Old Pinnebog River enters Lake Huron To avoid confusion, the original town switched its name from Pinnepog to Port Crescent and the other town switched from Pinnepog to Pin nebog

A crescent shaped bay curves between Flat Rock Point to the east and Hat Point to the west In 1844, Walter Hume built a trading post here and called his settlement Pinnebog

Exploration on foot

From the lakeshore, take the trail going up the side of the dune through the dune grass After another dune climb, you will reach a bluff overlooking the Port Crescent town-site During the town's heyday, children gathered here to watch workers on the river struggle to free up spring's enormous logjams or

hning the riverbank


In the mid-1930s, the flood swollen Pinnebog River overflowed into a sand mining pit up stream from Port Crescent A torrent of water cut through the mining pit, creating a new river channel to Lake Huron It was from this sand pit that Henry is a chance to walk through a *land teacher*



Holiday foods can comfort us *during these* troubled times

he holiday season brings with it the most traditional and endearing American comfort foods In these times of stress and conflict, these are foods that we rely on to bring us a sense of satisfaction


The fall harvest brings us the great winter squashes, fruits, nuts and berries eaten in North America for hundreds of years The ubiquitous pumpkin serves as a symbol of the Thanksgiving table The piquant tartness of cranberries acting as an acidic counterpoint to the luxurious richness of roasted turkey with gravy is a joy to the taste buds

Traditional favorites

Traditional American holiday foods are my favorite foods to both cook and to consume There is a certain virtue in the straightforward nature of this annual cuisine Some folks like to stick with the strict tradition al menus featuring the bird, stuffing, gravy, yams and brussels sprouts Those cooks seeking the less mundane may try variations of this theme or create their own holiday foods For instance, this year I am preparing a "tofurkey" (tofu turkey) for my vegetarian daughter

Certainly members of different nationalities may add their own traditional ethnic dishes to the mix There is certainly nothing wrong with a couple of large steamed lobsters and a nice oyster dressing to celebrate the holidays Whether it is Mom's famous lasagna or beans and greens, it is all part of our American food heritage Somehow it always tastes better when we are among our friends and family

Thanksgiving evolved from a Purian religious observance, which transcended into a sort of harvest festival The first national Thanksgiving was declared by the Continental Congress in 1777 and then occurred intermittently in the ensuing years In fact, the whole Puritan story about the settlers and the first Thanksgiving was not popularized until the middle of the 19th century In 1863, Abraham Lincoln declared that there be a national day of Thanksgiving It was not an official national holiday until Franklin Roosevelt enacted a law

Adventurous cooks may be tempted to spice or fla vor up the turkey on Thanksgiving but odds are they will rein in their imagination when it comes to roast ing the turkey After all, nobody wants to hear a sib ling say, "We NEVER prepare a turkey like THAT!'

Traditionalists win

Chef Kevin Enright, instructor at Oakland Commu nity College, thinks tradition generally wins out

"It's kind of funny," Enright said "It's a day when people really don't change their methods People gen erally say, 'It's how we've always done it When it comes to roasting a turkey, most people just don't change what they do " Most people may change a dressing or gravy first before they change the way they cook the turkey


In The Dean & DeLuca Cookbook, authors David Rosengarten with Joel Dean and Giorgio DeLuca indi cate that there's little indication that Americans will ever give up their roast turkey on Thanksgiving, yet millions "grumble' about turkey's inferiority to other birds

"Because the turkey's dark meat takes longer to cook than the turkey's white meat, most roast turkeys in the United States, we dare say, come to the table with dry, stringy white meat that has been overcooked while the chef's been waiting for the dark meat to cook


"It's a great shame because the white meat - when cooked just past pink (at about 150°), when it still retains a great deal of juice can be delicious indeed Many cooks swear by fresh turkeys but they too

need to be careful not to be too far ahead of them selves

"A common problem is that people will buy a fresh turkey so it tastes better, but will buy it too much ahead of time," says Sylvia Treitman, educator of food nutrition and food safety for the Michigan State Uni



Time for tradition: Most cooks and holiday hosts do not change any of their cooking strategies on Thanksgiving Day and stick with the traditional roasted turkey they fix year after year



Turkey dominates

Turkey may not have been the primary meat eaten during that first Thanksgiving feast, but it certainly is the dominant center of the plate item today Ben Franklin was a big supporter of the turkey "I wish that the bald eagle had not been chosen as the representative of our country," Franklin said "He is a bird of bad moral character Like those men who live by sharping and robbing, he is generally poor and very often lousy The turkey is a much more respectable bird and withal a true original native of North America " (If it were up to Franklin, we might be eating eagle each November)

Wild turkeys were plentiful in the states, and part of the tremendous bounty of wild game duck and shellfish Our tradition of celebrating this holiday is really our connection to the first observance declared by the first governor of Massachusetts, who commemorated that first, horrible winter endured by settlers and probably celebrated it in the spring or summer

It's often hard to separate fact and fiction about Thanksgiving In any case, it is a great excuse to get the family together to share good fortune, good food and the chance to express our gratitude and humility for the bounty of our table

Here are some traditional recipes for you to try Don't be afraid to change them according to your

versity Extension Services Fresh turkeys can be stored in a refrigerator for no more than two days before freezing becomes necessary, she says

When working with a frozen turkey, planning is essential to safe preparation because proper thawing ensures thorough cooking Thawing, which should be done on a platter in the bottom portion of the refriger ator, takes 24 hours for every five pounds of turkey, says Treitman 'The problem is many people buy their frozen turkey too late or a few days ahead of time

Basting time

Many cooks generally stick with the traditional butter baste every 15 minutes on the turkey, then baste with fat after the first hour of cooking Some just leave it alone

And then there are those who are working on their first bird Enright has some tips that may seem obvi ous, but for those who don't have a clue, they will

help "You have to make sure the packages are out of "the sure the packages are out of check of the cavity for any loose neck or turkey parts that may be floating around then a thorough rinse of the cavity

"Season the inside of the cavity with chopped omons, celery, carrots and apple core or orange rinds,'

Enright said "That will flavor it from the inside '

And what herbs can be used on the outside? "Most people like the standard sage, oregano or marjoram Enright said "Or you can use a mixture of mixed herb butter, using whole butter, fresh basil, oregano and parsley and place it between the skin and the meat of the breast " The herbs will infuse more flavors into the breast

Larger turkeys (over 15 pounds) should be cooked 12-15 minutes a pound, and at a lower temperature at 325° F A smaller turkey can be cooked at 350° F To check it, put a thermometer into the thickest part of the thigh Digital thermometers 'work great 'Enright said

When the turkey is about 75 percent done, place loose foil tents on the breast and wings to prevent the skin from overbrowning

Dean and DeLuca suggest cutting up the breast and consider serving it as a first course with a light gravy and white wine, then serve the dark meat later once it is cooked with a red wine and a darker gravy as a sec ond course The book also suggests brining the turkey for 12 hours or so, to keep the white meat juicy

Irma Rombauer and Marion Rombauer Becker rec ommend in their cookbook, The Joy of Cooking, heat ing the oven temperature first to 450° F, then reduc ing the heat to 350° F, or 325° F for large turkevs They also recommend wrapping the bird in a coarse woven cloth, soaked in melted unsalted butter or veg etable oil, to resolve the problem of cooking moist ten derness into two different kinds of meat

Many chefs, including Enright, do not stuff the turkey before roasting the bird, so the raw turkey does not contaminate the stuffing. "One of the things we tell people is to prepare it separately," Enright said

If you don't want to anger the family traditionalists by changing your preparation of the turkey, then tweak the side dishes a little. Or a lot

Enright likes a stuffing made with almonds, apples and walnuts Want a sweet gravy? Go ahead and add cranberries to it. I like sweet potatoes baked with salt and pepper,

but you can cook them in a maple syrup with a brown sugar glaze," Enright suggests. The meal should include a green vegetable and

green salads with perhaps a cranberry vinaigrette, Enright said "For dessert, you can try something different, like a pumpkin cheesecake, or an apple strudel which is excellent in the fall," Poached pears or apple or pear cobblers also are nice changes of pace

After dinner, finish carving your turkey "It should be carved in full rather than storing the carcass in the refrigerator," Treitman said, "And it should not be left out for more than two hours before it's refrigerated That's a common mistake. People will leave the turkey out until midnight to let people nibble '

Children who routinely eat meals with their families tend to have a healthier overall diet In fact, these kids eat more fruits, vegetables and calciumcontaining foods Less fried foods, saturated fat and soda pop is consumed compared to the children who don't often eat with the rest of the family

Just because your child is not overweight doesn't mean he or she is healthy Blood cholesterol levels can be at an unhealthy level at an early age, laying the foundation for poor adult heart health Lack of plant foods (fruits, vegetables and whole grains) can lead to health problems

tastes The recipe for stuffing can be used to make a sausage stuffing as well

Certified master chef Dan Hugelier likes to add some applesauce (for flavor and moistness) and a few whole eggs (for binding and the leavening effect) This recipe calls for dried herbs, but if you can get fresh, use double the amount and add them in the last part of the cooking process Use this same recipe for vegetarian stuffing by substituting sauteed portabello mush rooms for any meat, and veg etable stock in place of turkey or chicken stock (By the way, it is safer to cook your stuffing separately rather than stuffing it in the cavity of the bird If you must stuff the bird, then pack it lightly and make sure that the internal temperature of the stuffing reaches at least 180 degrees)

If you do not like chestnuts, try using some toasted walnuts or pecans The recipe for cranberry chutney belongs to Helen Orloff, the dining room manager for Schoolcraft College's Ameri-



THE BALANCING ACT Healthy holiday food choices

K, let's be reasonable Just how much weight do you think you can lose before the holidays five or 10 pounds? Think again Thanksgiving is just days away, and all that gravy and pumpkin pie can adhere to your mid-section like a double roll of bubble wrap

The answer? Relax Indulge on some days and cut back on others, say nutrition experts It's a matter of moderation and balance

"I don't recommend losing weight ahead of time as a buffer zone," said Beth Thayer, a registered dietitian and coordinator of Henry Ford Hospital's Heart Smart program "Just try to maintain your weight'

Social stress makes dieting during the holiday season difficult, she added "There's a kind of self-forgiveness in the air Family and friends keep saying you can start your diet in January

Whatever you do, forget the fad diets that promise miracle weight losses, said Thayer "Fad diets in general can restrict whole food groups The first question to ask about these diets is how are you getting all your nutrients?'

Health risks

Unfortunately, come January, many postholiday indulgers will be tempted to go on a high protein diet While such diets may produce a quick weight loss, they have no proven effectiveness in long-term weight reduction What's more, they pose potential health threats for those who adhere to them for more than a short time, according to an advisory from the American Heart Association's Nutrition Committee in Circulation Journal of the American Heart Association

The advisory specifically targets such popular "quick weight loss" regimens as Dr Atkins' New Diet Revolution, The Zone, Protein Power, Sugar Busters and Dr Stillman's Quick Weight Loss Diet

"High-protein items may also be high in fat Some of the diets increase fat intake and reduce nutritionally rich foods such as fruits and vegetables, which is not a good approach to meeting a person's long-term dietary needs," said Dr Robert H Eckel, immediate past chairman of the AHA Nutrition Committee and co-author of the advisory "Many of these diets fail to provide essential vitamins, minerals, fiber and other nutritional elements, in addition to their high fat con-

no scientific evidence supports the claim that highprotein diets enable people to maintain their initial weight loss," said Eckel "In general, quick weightloss diets don't work for most people

Sherri Isaak, registered dietitian and diabetes educator at St Mary Mercy Hospital in Livonia, says high-protein diets – which are often high insaturated, animal-based fats - increase the risk of coronary disease, diabetes, stroke and several types of cancer

"One of my major concerns is that you are limiting your fruits, vegetables and whole grains You are not getting your phytochemicals, which are plant chemicals that actually have the capability of reducing the risk for cancer, diabetes and heart disease," she said

In addition, many people can't metabolize protein effectively, especially those with kidney disease, liver disorders and osteoporosis, said Isaak For diabetics, excessive amounts of protein could lead to kidney problems, for women, it increases the risk of osteoporosis by leaching calcium in the urine

Still not convinced that a high-protein diet is not the best way to lose weight? Here's another reason to avoid them Bad breath

"The ketones (an organic chemical compound) your body produces give a breath odor of a cross between nail polish and over-ripe pineapple," said Thaver

Common sense

If you throw away your common sense and go on a high-protein diet before the holidays, keep in mind it can drain you of much-needed energy Such diets induce quick weight loss primarily through the loss of body fluids due to the diuretic effect of eliminating most carbohydrates Glycogen, the form of sugar used by the body for energy, is lost in the muscles as well The result is fatigue

"At first people say they have more energy, but I

Serve the safest holiday turkey at your table

As the holiday season draws near, the Wayne County Environmental Health Department cautions home cooks to be aware that Salmonella, a diseasecausing bacteria, is sometimes found in raw poultry

"When raw turkey is stuffed, the bacteria from the turkey may be transferred to the stuffing," says Steve Tackitt, Wayne County Department of Public Health's Environmental Health Director "Proper cooking kills this harmful germ and helps to eliminate food poisoning, which causes flu-like symptoms, headaches, diarrhea, vomiting, stomach cramps and fever "

The appropriate temperature to kill Salmonella is 165 degrees F Because the stuffing is placed inside the turkey, extra cooking time may be required to reach this temperature

"Use a meat thermometer to measure the internal temperature of the stuffing in the turkey," adds

Thaw frozen foods in the refrigerator or under cold running water, says the Wayne county Health Department.

Tackitt "Pop-up thermometers that come with some turkeys only measure the temperature of the turkey, not the stuffing '

Tackitt recommends that if you do not own a meat thermometer, then cook the stuffing separately

The Environmental Health Division offers these other tips to prevent food-borne illness from striking your family during the holiday season

Prepare food on clean surfaces, using a diluted bleach mixture to sanitize food preparation areas (2 capfuls of household bleach per gallon of water)



think later on if you're not getting the carbohydrates, you're not as energetic," said Isaak

Fortunately, it is possible to survive the holidays with lots of energy, little guilt and without resorting to fad dieting

Nutritionists at Saint Joseph Mercy Health Stop offer the following tips

Don't skip meals This only sets you up for overeating later

Eat something small before going to a gathering so you're not starving when dinner is served

Circle the buffet table first and decide which food you really want Want something of everything? OK, but try to limit your portion size Try one spoonful of stuffing, not half a plate

Have that piece of Grandma's pumpkin pie, but take a smaller piece And try fat-free whipped topping

Load up on the high-fiber fruits, vegetables and whole grains Food low in fiber will leave you feeling less full and satisfied

Continue your exercise regimen It's difficult to get back on track once you stop

Lastly, keep your perspective One slice of pie at Aunt Mary's house didn't put the weight on As they say, the proof is in the plum pudding It was repeated overeating and lack of exercise that caused you to slowly but surely gain weight

■ Wash hands with soap and water before and after food handling

Thaw frozen foods in the refrigerator or under cold running water

Never thaw foods, marinate meat or leave leftovers out at room temperature

Holiday Turkey Preparation:

■ Keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold ■ Don't use the same knife to cut raw meat and poultry and chop vegetables

■ Wash cutting boards and knives with hot, soapy water between uses

Don't use the same plate for raw and cooked meat and poultry
