Township names DDA board

Plymouth Township has a new Downtown Development Authority, and now there are people to run it

The Plymouth Township Board of Trustees Tuesday night approved the appointment of eight people — four residents and four from the business sector — to join Supervisor Steve Mann on the DDA board of directors

And the new board isn't wasting any

time getting started It's first meeting is set for 4 30 p m Tuesday

It's the latest step in the township's crusade to establish the DDA to make improvements along the Ann Arbor Road corridor

"I looked for people who are active in the community and have shown interest in Ann Arbor Road in the past," said Mann "The business people are active participants"

One of the first orders of business at Tuesday's meeting will be to elect officers, and Mann said he hopes to be in the community and is a visible presnamed chairman ence at board meetings Her husband,

"I think it makes a certain amount of sense because of my position," Mann said "But if (board members) want to go a different way, I'll certainly honor that "

The four residents named to the board included

■ Arlene Karell, to a four year term Karell, a resident of the Green Meadows subdivision literally steps away from the Ann Arbor Road corridor, is active in the community and is a visible presence at board meetings Her husband, Jim, is a member of the township's planning commission



Bank set to build new HQ



New Liberty Bank will construct a new headquarters building on Ann Arbor Road in Plymouth Township

President and CEO Michael Weaver said the bank has an option on a oneacre site on the south side of Ann Arbor Road, just east of Sheldon, where an old Kentucky Fried Chicken building and another vacant structure currently sit

"We will tear down the buildings and construct a new headquarters," said Weaver, whose bank is currently located at 245 N Main Street in Plymouth, in Charlestown Square "The site has high visibility, high traffic volume, and will allow us to have amenities like drive up windows, a drive up ATM, safe deposit boxes and sufficient parking"

Weaver said bank officials will soon hire an architect to design the new

Student radio station marks 30 years of broadcasting

When the mike clicked open at noon that first day, the tiny, 10-watt station broadcasting live from the halls of Salem High School could barely be heard in the school's parking lot, let alone throughout Plymouth-Canton Not that the small core of students responsible for a full six hours of programming figured anybody was listening too closely

Today - 30 years to the day after WSDP-FM hit those *extremely* local airwaves - Internet listeners from around the world can hear music to suit nearly any taste and find out what's happening at "the Park" In that time, WSDP has changed frequencies, boosted its power and even embarked on marketing campaigns that resemble efforts staged by media giants - in every aspect but their budgets

More importantly, the station has maintained its two-tiered mission of opening career opportunities for dozens of young people and service to the com-

Hundreds cram vault for look at Lincoln display

Four years after the Plymouth Historical Museum purchased the state's largest collection of Abraham Lincoln memorabilia from Dr Weldon Petz of West Bloomfield, and months after the new addition to the museum was completed with a special vapor-lock room for the artifacts, nearly a thousand pieces of the Lincoln exhibit were put on public display for the first time Monday night as more than 400 people attended a special grand open

ing "This is really a thrill to see so many friendly faces to enjoy history, and the legacy of the life of a wonderful man, Abraham Lincoln," said Beth Stewart, director of the Plymouth Historical Museum "It's a little bittersweet for Weldon, because it's his life's work and passion that's exhibited We hope to continue that and share it with young people, which is what he wanted to do "



department's responsibilities And, if they can suggest better ways to do things, that's certainly something we'd take a look at "

The nine-week class will give participants a chance to do some hands on police work, such as fir ing in the Firearms Training Simulator, as well as hear from some of the professionals who do the work on a day-to-day basis

There will be sessions on the criminal justice system, the Freedom of Information Act, personal protection tactics and the use of force, the K-9 program and pursuit policy There will also be an optional program where participants are allowed to ride for part of a shift with a uniformed officer in a township squad car A certifi cate of completion will be award ed at the end of the course

"This is an opportunity for peo ple who may not understand the role of a police officer or someone who may have complaints about police procedures to see things from the police perspective,' Officer Jamie Senkbeil said "It's also an avenue for the police depart ment to learn about the concerns of the community members "

The class, which officials hope to make an annual event, will be limited to the first 25 applicants who pass a background check Sessions begin April 10 and will run every Wednesday from 7-9 30 p m Applications are available at the township police department 42350 Ann Arbor Road (in the township hall complex), and must be returned by March 13

Love story Even passing can't dull Cupid's arrow

E J McClendon had no idea what he was getting himself into when he accepted a blind date more than 50 years ago

More than fifty years later, though, he'd had a life he wouldn't trade for anything in the whole world

It's a Valentine's Day love story you see less and less of these days, with more than half of new marriages winding up in divorce It's a tribute to love, to life, to building a relationship and seeing it through until only death could break its bonds

E J and Ruby McClendon spent more than 50 years being each other's support system, each other's heartbeat, right up until hers stopped beating last April

And it all started on that blind date

See, E J had met a woman in a dance class while he was trying to squeeze in his last two PE credits at the University of Oklahoma But he got called into the service, and went off to war Four years later, the woman called him and asked him to a dance, not as her partner, but as the date of a friend who needed one

E J had the same reaction many people have to a blind date This is going to be ugly Eau contraire

"I got there, the door opened, and this utterly magnificent creature stood there," J remembers now "I just figured she was going to take me to my date, but after a few minutes I thought, 'My god, she's going to go with me!'

The couple went to the dance, then to a party afterward Neither wanted to say so, but both were tired and wanting to go home Finally, one of them broached the subject, they agreed it was time to go, and E J drove Ruby home They sat for a minute, and E J asked her if she was going to give him her telephone number She told him she'd just been waiting to see if he asked The rest, as they say, 18 history

"We belonged to the same church, we had the same political views, felt the same way about education," E J said "The more we talked, the more we seemed like twins

The pair went out on half-a-dozen dates in the next few weeks - "It got to be habit forming," EJ says with a laugh After about six weeks, he asked her to marry him Five weeks later he gave her a ring, and they married June 6, 1950

While E J traveled heavily in his public health career, Ruby became a teacher After getting interested in helping handicapped children with the Girl Scouts, she took cours es at Eastern Michigan University to learn how to handle them She parlayed that into a job teaching special education in the Waterford school district

They wanted her in Plymouth-Canton, where the couple had settled, but E J was president of the school board at the time, and Ruby simply wouldn't hear of it She got the Waterford job, then moved to Plymouth when E J got off the board She stayed there the last seven or eight years of her career

Meanwhile, they went about raising a family Eldest daughter Melody was "the best chemistry student they had" when she graduated from Plymouth High School Son Edwin Jr works for an automotive software firm in Northville and is a Scout leader Youngest daughter Joy 1s global director for information technology for Pharmacia Corp Edwin Jr remembers the support system his parents set up for each other

"She was support to him," he said "They were both into education, teaching was just about everything to them They came here and put a little bit of Oklahoma here in Plymouth They could always relate back to where they came from "

The kids — and then their four grandchildren - became everything

"Both of us tended to drop what we were doing when it came to the kids," E J said

He did the same for Ruby, and quit working when she got sick He was almost 80 anyway, and figured his place was with her They made sure to go out, especially when Ruby felt up to it They attended two ship's reunions - "She knew I liked those," he said — with E J's Navy pals He stayed home with her for two years, doing the laundry and the cooking

Last year, around Valentine's Day, several people brought some food over "I'm a terrible cook, and that was all she got," E J said Ruby decided to fight off her ills and cook a meal, news that was welcome to E J She made a stew he called "delicious," but in return wanted the marmalade she loved so much While he was getting it for her, he noticed she wasn't returning the banter they'd so long enjoyed

She'd suffered a stroke, and her husband of 50 years dialed 911 As they loaded her into the ambulance, he said, tears streamed down her face as she said, "Go with me"

"I told her I couldn't, because I'd need a car to get home later," E J remembered "She just sighed, and those were the last things she ever said '

He spent the bulk of his time over her last few weeks at her side "I knew it wasn't going to be long, and that's where I belonged," he said

It's where he belonged for more than 50 years, all of it born of a blind date

Julie Maxwell, a 1984 Canton High School graduate and now marketing director at WMGC FM 105 1, said she spent her first two years in radio at WSDP - or "wiz-dip" as she affectionately recalled - and "I've not been out of the industry since "

It's the same story for Curtis Paul, marketing director at CIDR-FM 93 9 "Effectively, my involvement in that station ignited my interest in music and love for the genre of radio," he said

Paul worked at the school station 1985-87 and remembers it being among the first in the area to play "alternative" music in the evenings The station's popularity extended to local shops and restaurants that were student hangouts, he said

"Nearly 17 years later, I'm still in love with radio," Paul said "My involvement at WSDP opened the door to a career unlike anything I ever expected "

Three decades


When WSDP-FM 893 signed on the air Feb 14, 1972, it was one of only three high school stations in Michigan, said Bonny Dore, founding station manager

Dore, having just graduated from the University of Michigan with a degree in radio and TV production, was hired in 1969 by Plymouth-Canton Superintendent Mike Hoben and Bill Brown, principal at the brand new high school complex Her job was to plan the station from the ground up and get in on the air

"I didn't quite know what I was in for I was only 21," Dore recalled this week "The idea was to have a station run by students, not adults '

"So not only did we have to put the station together, we had to offer classes for the kids and make sure they got their third class license, which is no easy task "

Dore stayed on until 1973, when she took a job managing PBS television stations on the East Coast, from there, she returned briefly to metro Detroit to work at Channel 7, before moving on to ABC in Los Ange

Today she owns her own com pany, Bonny Dore Productions, which produces movies and other programming for network and cable television

There are now about 10-15 school district-owned broadcast outlets in the state, Keith estimated, with students from other districts learning to "work the board" on in-house systems

The station swapped frequencies with Eastern Michigan Uni versity, moving to 88 1, in 1977 and increased its broadcast sig

nal to 200 watts in 1979 The power boost means WSDP can be heard clearly in a 5-10-mile radius from the Plymouth-Canton Education Park

It's first stereo broadcast was May, 1, 1985

The station Web site was launched in February 2000 and has recently been upgraded

WSDP has been named Station of the Year by the Michigan Association of Educational Broadcasters in seven of the last 12 years, most recently in April 2001

Role in community

Throughout it's history, WSDP has served as a broadcast outlet for high school sports and activities, and as a community sounding board

"A commitment to the community was paramount," said Jeffrey Cardinal, who served as station general manager from 1974-83 He recalls WSDP as one of the first stations in the state to air girl's basketball games

In fact, radio heavyweight and former Detroit Tigers play-byplay/analyst Paul Carey once came out to broadcast a Canton-Salem baseball game, recalled former staffer George Manolias (Salem '88) in a posting on the station Web site 'The ballplay ers were shocked to hear such a famous voice calling their names' the posting said

The station also broadcasts Plymouth Canton Board of Edu and other public service pro-

typical to most college stations. with shows highlighting everything from speed metal to reggae to oldies Holding a limited license and being a non-profit station allows plenty of room for esoteric programming choices

"Most of the kids get involved because they really love music and their dedication to that aspect of their life really comes through on the air," Keith said

Not so commercial-free

But that doesn't mean the WSDP atmosphere is devoid of any commercialism, he added The station recently redesigned its logo and it holds an on-air auction every spring to raise money for new equipment and scholarships

"The last time we did a comprehensive phone survey was probably 1986, but we do get a lot of phone calls They are the front line for feedback," Keith said

The station's future will to some extent be tied up in digital broadcasting and other advances, as well as the school district budget, Keith said Detroit's classical music devo tees, who lost their fight to keep WQRS FM on the air a few years ago now have the Internet to turn to he noted

In the spirit of the Winter Olympics, that's what we award Gov John Engler for his proposal to keep Michigan public schools out of budgetary hot water and boost yearly per-student spending by \$200, keeping a previous promise

The Observer credits the governor for finding a creative solution to a delicate problem during tough economic times At the same time, we question its basic premise, prospects as a long-term solution and even its political fate once partisan legislators begin tearing meat from the budget bones during a highly-charged election year χ

In case you missed it, what Engler put forward last week is a one-time tax payment shift for the portion of your bill that goes to schools Beginning with July 2003 bills, all school property tax collections would be made in the summer, rather than on the winter tax bill or a 50-50 split as is the case in some districts As a sweetener, a 1-mill school property tax reduction (from 6 to 5 mills) would take effect for 2003 only

The payment shuffle would fill in a gap created by declining sales tax revenues and pave the way for the expected \$200 bump in the state Foundation Grant to \$6,700 per pupil The boost would temporarily take the heat off many southeastern Michigan school districts, where officials were planning cuts for next fall in light of projected deficits ranging from a few hundred thousand dollars to more than \$6 million Most will now deal with much smaller shortfalls

If reaction from local superintendents is an indication, Engler is making the right moves if he wants "Education Governor" as part of his legacy "It blew everybody away It's welcome news assuming the legislature passes it," said Farmington Public Schools Superintendent Bob Maxfield

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools Superintendent Kathleen Booher said any cuts for next year "would be nothing on a scale of what we would have to do if we didn't get the \$200 "

As a feel-good bonus, residents in many metro Detroit school districts will hardly notice the change Residents in the Plymouth-Canton and Wayne-Westland districts already pay the school portion of their taxes on summer bills School districts in Livonia and Farmington split the taxes between summer and winter bills and Garden City, after collecting in the winter for 2001, moves to a summerwinter split for 2002

Of course, the Engler plan doesn't address what will happen if sales tax rev enues don't bounce back by late 2003 That winter tax bill - with no portion dedicated to schools - could look mighty austere to local school board members dealing with rising health care costs, teacher contracts and the like

(We) credit the governor for finding a creative solution to a delicate problem during tough economic times. At the same time. we question its basic premise. prospects as a long-term solution and even its political fate once partisan legislators begin tearing meat from the budget bones during a highly charged election year.

That, as the saying goes, is the next governor's problem

But that's also characteristic of much of Engler's - and Lansing's - approach to school funding issues And if all this sounds familiar, remember that Proposal A itself was nothing more than a tax shift that temporarily cut skyrocketing property tax bills (a bad thing) caused primarily by rising home values (a good thing)

While Proposal A worked like a charm on the homeowner side, its record on the education side is decidedly more mixed Its approach to balancing out funding inequities has primarily helped poor urban and rural districts It took eight years, but the economic "doomsavers" who dared to question what would hap pen when the economy soured can now have their field day

Like Proposal A before it, the great budget shift of '03 does nothing to address the long-term issues facing local schools For example, how do we replace aging education infrastructure and prepare for technology upgrades in districts that are no longer growing? How do we keep and attract quality teachers as pressure intensifies to hold the line on salaries and benefits?

It's good to see that education has become such a priority around the state Capitol Maybe someday some governor and legislature will look at real solutions rather than quick fixes



Is Engler's budget a booby trap for the next governor?

remark seemed especially apt after I spent several hours reading the fine print of the budget state submitted last week by Gov John Engler There are so many accounting tricks, fund transfers and accelerated tax payments involved in confecting a "bal-

anced" budget for fiscal 2003 that I pity the poor slob who has to face the deluge of red ink and balance the state's books in 2004 Consider

■ Property tax collections for 2003 get a onetime acceleration to get per-pupil K-12 spending up to \$6,700 By the time the tax bills hit next July, this November's elections will be but a memory

The state school and fund looks as though it's getting a 12 percent increase, mainly because Engler's budget credits to it federal payments that usually go to the Department of Education

Around \$80 million in an unemployment compensation contingency fund will get trans ferred to the schools

■ Another contingency fund, around \$250 million for Medicaid, will be cut in half, with the balance used for other purposes

■ The state's rainy day fund, which had a \$1 3 billion balance just two years ago, will be drained to just above \$250 million Anything less would have caused an automatic halt to the cuts in the state's single business tax, something tax-cutter Engler doesn't want on his record as he leaves office

The \$35 million originally budgeted to pay for the Build Michigan road bonds will go instead to fund the Department of Transportation

A bit more than half of the \$14 million in an environmental emergency cleanup fund will prop up the Department of Environmental Quality After 12 years in office, the governor has had plenty of time to learn about all the nocks and crannies in the state's financial accounting system He sure used them all this time around!

One hopes the school aid fund, which depends on a combination of property, sales and income taxes, will recover as the Michigan economy improves after the recession But the general fund depends on income and business taxes, which typically lag after a recession And changes in the federal estate tax will cost the state more than \$50 million in 2003, not to mention the cuts in money for road construction that President Bush, ants in his own federal budget

One hopes the school aid iund, which depends on a combination of property, sales and income taxes, will recover as the Michigan economy improves after the recession. But the general fund depends on income and business taxes, which typically lag after a recession.

The worry is that Michigan's recovery from the recession will be low and slow, especially given weakness in the automobile industry and in manufacturing generally The hope is that there won't be a big, unexpected emergency that requires big time state spending

In any event, I expect the Republican-dominated state legislature to pass the Engler budget with a minimum of fuss, thereby preserving the governor's legacy as a tax cutter and budget bal ancer

But in the back of my mind is another more cynical and utterly unprovable suspicion Could it be that in preparing his last budget, Gov Engler has all but written off the chances a Republican will be elected his successor? Otherwise, why prepare a budget that so recklessly risks pushing off the awful day of financial reckoning onto the administration of some Democratic governor?

Over the years, many outgoing governors and presidents have delighted in laying booby traps for their unwary successors, and Engler always shrewd and partisan — just might be looking forward to a last laugh

Candidates share Lincoln stage

Monday night's ceremonies at the Plymouth Histor ical Museum for the grand opening of the Abraham Lincoln exhibit drew several hundred people, including two who may be facing off in November to become Michigan's next governor

Republican Lt Gov Richard Posthumus and Attorney General Jennifer Granholm, a Democrat, each spoke as part of the program Both stayed away from politics in their remarks, and politely applauded each other It may be the last time the two are on the same stage, graciously smiling at each other instead of debating issues

However, afterwards, the gloves were back off as each spoke to the Observer about the upcoming battle Historic chat: Beth Stewart chats with for governor of Michigan

Granholm's popularity is hard to challenge, as she's raised more money thus far than her two main primary challengers, James Blanchard and David Bonior, and Posthumus combined

"We have more people who have invested in this campaign, contributed small and big amounts, than ever before in the history of Michigan at this point in the cycle," said Granholm, who lives in Northville "It's certainly testimony to the desire for change in Michigan They want to see someone in the governor's office who can uphft people, and can cause people who would otherwise be fighting old battles to come together '

Granholm is quick to point out her priorities as the state's top elected official will be much different than those of Gov John Engler

"I am different in that I'm a big supporter of public education And the fact is teachers in this state have felt they've been kicked in the teeth, which altogether is the wrong message," she said "I think it will be great to have a governor who really cares not only about the substance of public education, and those workers who haven't been invited to the table in the past, but also raising unemployment benefits and the environment, which has been kicked to the curb'

Granholm doesn't believe that being a Democrat living and campaigning in mostly Republican western Wayne County is a detriment to her campaign

"The area is full of people who are independent

thinkers, and I think there's a real opportunity for moderate Democrats to take back a larger portion of that independent and moderate Republican vote," she said "I think it's going to be a battle to the very end I'm the newcomer talking about the future, battling against people who have 30 years of name recognition and organization The reason people adopted term limits is because they think new, fresh perspective in government is a good thing If you're looking for a career politician, I'm not your man "

While the Democrats are getting most of the publicity because there will be an August primary to determine their gubernatorial candidate, Posthumus waits in the wings for his chance to get into the fray

"My first goal was to unite the Republican Party for my candidacy, and I think I've done that," said Posthumus "The Democratic primary will work to my advantage, because while they are working on their democratic base, I have the advantage of going out and reaching independent voters "

Despite polls showing he'd have a hard time beating any of the three top Democratic candidates, Posthumus said he isn't too concerned

"No poll in January is going to determine who will win in November The average working citizen starts paying attention in August, that's when we have to begin to pay attention," he said

"My view is not to talk about the politics, but the issues that will carry Michigan forward in the next 10 years," said Posthumus "If I continue to talk about what we're going to do to make our schools the best in America, what we're going to do to rekindle jobs in urban communities, and to preserve and protect our natural resources, people understand that "

Riding on the coat tails of the Engler administration, Posthumus wants it known he's his own man with his own ideas

"The Engler administration will end next year and my priorities will be very different as people are demanding a new kind of leader today " he said "They want someone who is a unifier, and that's been my history They're demanding that our kids have the best schools in America We've brought Michigan back by creating jobs but now its time to turn our attention to the city of Detion because we need to rebuild it And we need new energy in protecting our natural resources Those are the new priorities for the next governor



Toby Booker isn't really a lion he just plays the bullying feline in the Plymouth Theatre Guild's production of L Frank Baum's classic tale about a young girl whose only wish is to return home to Kansas The show opens Friday Feb 15, at the Water Tower Theatre in Northville

I'll fight you with one hand tied behind my back the hon taunts Ill fight you with my eyes closed

But when the Cowardly Lion picks on Toto Dorothy's little dog it's more than the girl can stand Shame on you! she exclaims as she swats his big nose

bond," said Guberinich who plays the Scarecrow but originally auditioned for the Cowardly Lion role "I'm joking around at rehearsals with Sarah It helps create a rapport that we can take to the stage

Playing a man of straw is no easy task though Guber nich thinks his size alone frightens the nearly 30 children in the cast when they're back stage let alone when hes falling all over the place as Scarecrow The 6 foot 2 inch Ann

Arbor resident is a former offen sive linesman for Dennison University in Ohio

Director C J Nodus believes Baum's writing is what made the story a classic Lyrics and music by Harold Arlen and E Y Harburg ensured audiences would carry the melodies with them after leaving theaters

Evelyn Orbach and the rest of The Laramie Project cast seem eager to hear every last detail Jeffrey Montgomery reveals about the murder of Matthew Shepard

A hate crime is a hate crime no matter the ethnicity, religion or sexual orientation of the victim, but this one hit close to home for the executive director of the Triangle Foundation, a gay

rights organization providing services for victims and survivors of hate crimes

Montgomery was there in Laramie, Wyo immediately after Shepard was brutally beaten then tied to a fence post and left to die He was there for the trial of Aaron McKinney, one of the two murderers Russell Henderson pleaded guilty to avoid the death penalty Who better than Montgomery to educate the Jewish Ensemble Theatre cast as they prepare to perform

The Laramie Project Feb 20 to March 24 in the Aaron DeRoy Theatre in West Bloomfield?

As artistic director, Orbach always strives to present professional productions but this play is special It's part of a season devoted to stopping hate wherever it happens

"What playwright Moises Kaufman and the Tectonic Theater Project have done is give you a sense of what the people of Laramie went through," said Orbach 'The point is this was a uni-

versity town surrounded by ranches, an agricultural community What happened in Laramie is even more scary because the people are like people anywhere

"You begin to garner the different perspectives that people right here in West Bloomfield, Southfield or Dearborn might have as well It comes down to two kids murdered another kid, the idea that this person is gay and it's all right It's a hate crime "

Kaufman and the Tectonic Theater Project spent 18 months interviewing 200 residents of Laramie before committing words to paper Orbach plays several of the townspeople including a rancher a woman whose daugh ter cut Matthew Shepard off the fence a Baptist minister, wife of a patrolmen, and a doctor

"It is a truly unique treatment," said Orbach "Instead of breaking it up into scenes, Moises breaks it up into moments It's the closest it comes to a docudrama The names and information are real It brings an audience an experience you don't get from a news reel It brings things you don't get from a drama It brings attention to the issue that no matter what your religion or sexual orientation, it's about people's right to live

"Matthew Shepard was 5-feet 2-inches tall and weighed 105

pounds and they beat him merci lessly If we're going to stop hate we've got to find where it happens and snuff it out We have to make the alien not alien any more We have to take the strangeness out of the stranger"

Kelly Pino agrees whole-heartedly with Orbach that something has to be done to stop hate crimes The Plymouth resident plays the role of the first officer on the scene, Reggie Fluty, a 39year old mother of two The experience opened Pino's eyes She wasn't ready to read the script telling about the condition of Shephard when found She was sheltered from violence, spending her early years as a student at Kingswood School in Bloomfield Hills and later Birmingham Groves High School before gradu ating from the American Academy of Dramatic Art in New York City

"She discovered the young boy," said Pino, who's performed with Meadow Brook Theatre, Perfor mance Network in Ann Arbor and Detroit Repertory Theatre "The things I have to describe are very hard to describe You don't want to visualize There was an overwhelming amount of blood on the scene She owns llamas and was building a pen and had lots of cuts on her hands She tried to do mouth-to mouth There were no gloves because the sheriff was too cheap and then found out the next day Matthew Shepard had HIV and she was the one trying to cut him down So she went through an agony of her own just wondering if she would develop ATDS

"It's very moving You're just a sheriff in Laramie, Wyo If had seen something like that I'd be crying for years She's a police officer and can't cry '

ECLENTRIC

Director Pat Ansuini knows first hand the cruelty gays, lesbians, bi-sexuals and transgenders face That's why she's doing everything she can to make this powerful play a success

"I come at it from the point of view as a lesbian," said Ansuini of Royal Oak "I can provide a certain insight When I came out it was a dark world Now the tolerance in some cases, in some areas of the country is wonderful but until we get into the statues of this country there is nothing but capricious goodwill That will be a great day when it becomes law, when a hate crime bill that includes us is passed Acceptance is different than tolerance How precious a phenomena freedom is - that someone can't come up and bat you on the back of the head "

Like Ansumi, Orbach is working to change perceptions and halt the violence in celebration of







The Fags prove there's more to power pop than you've heard

, I wasn't the first to question The motive behind a name like The Fags And I won't be the last

'It's British slang for cigarette,' said a friend, of the power pop trio soon to headline Ferndale's Magic Bag

I was still curious I headed to Woodward Avenue Brewers last November to see this spectacle for myself The place was flooded with curious scenesters doing the same And what enveloped that pint sized stage looked like nothing less than Detroit rock history in the making

John Speck (vocals guitars), Jimmy Paluzzi (drums, vocals) and Tim Patalan (bass, vocals) strutted to the stage wearing white shirts and black ties as the audience looked on in eager anticipation And it turned out to be one of those nights you talk about endlessly

I couldn't guess that this supergroup came together prac tically by accident

Speck and Paluzzi were members of Hoarse, and gained national attention in the mid '90s signing to RCA Meanwhile, Patalan made a name for him self as a producer and met Paluzzi while working with Sponge

I was working on songs I was writing after Hoarse," said Speck, an Ann Arbor resident He drew in Paluzzi and Patalan and the project just snowballed "Tim became the bass player by default '

Patalan didn't seem to mind "I'm kind of a fan of these guys he said with a smile

The trio debuted in Ohio in January 2000 They later played an opening slot at Jacobys under the suggested moniker Smokin Fags and it stuck

Whatever you call it it all comes down to the music

While Speck pens most lyrics the band works on music collec tively We kind of gravitate toward what we like ' he said "Things we all have in common Those 'things" tend to fall some where between genres of rock punk and pop Think Steely Dan or The Cars, and hooks you can t get out of your head

Looking back

Each bandmate traces his interest in music back to child hood They all grew up surrounded by music For Speck its summed up best in a snapshot He remembers sitting on his father's lap, in the back yard, just 3 years old They both strum a guitar

Similarly, Paluzzi remembers his father singing songs to him when he was little 'They were songs he would make up like Mr Moon," he said, offering a few lyrics "He used to sing songs and play harmonica

As different as these musi cians might seem, they share a common ground and respect for one another And it all comes out onstage

"If you're going to go to a show you go to have a good time, said Paluzzi, who lives in Detroit "It's called entertain ment It's a social event

The Fags are not fazed by the recent success of Detroit's garage rock duo the White Stripes




The questions I answered ran along the same lines as most other years, with refrigerator water and ice dispensers leading the way That water valve where the water line hooks up is still the major component to fail



ommon cream and bourgeoisie beige seem safe, but move over Martha Stewart because not everyone seeks subtlety in home decor In the spirit of Valentine's Day, we explored the color red and its growing popularity

From bold color, on big walls to subtle touches of crimson on the rubber end of a spatula, daring homeowners are welcoming red into their homes Tim Robinson, of West Bloomfield, not only embraces it, but knows how to use it A red gazebo gives an Asian feeling to this backyard Tomato red oversize leather wing chairs evoke a 1940s feeling to his living room

And then there's his bedroom

To achieve the perfect shade of red Robinson used 14 coats of glaze, eight of them were cream and gold and the others are reddish-pink and brown The result is a red with brilliant magenta and orange hues instead of one flat color

Robinson created the shade because he liked it, it's fresh and rich and far from the bordello reds of the 1970s Connie Lovell, of Lovell Interior Designs in Birmingham, said the reds with a hint of cinnamon or orange are more current than blue-red

Perk up a room

"It really perks up a room," Robinson said "People who see the room truly like it, but I think might be intimidated to use it in their own house'

No color, however, is safer than another, Lovell said

"When using red, keep it in context with the rest of its color palette," she said For example, in a room with a shade of warm cinnamon add splashes of yellow With blue-red, add blue or even violet for a cooler effect If used correctly, the red will appear to fall in with the other colors, if it's not it will seem to sit on top of it, Lovell said

Mahogany pods contain beauty inside

We spent some time in the Florida Keys last month and brought GARDEN SPOT back mahogany tree seeds

According to the encyclopedia, mahogany was the name applied originally to trees of the genus Swietenia, commonly known as true mahogany, the most important of which is the West Indies mahogany, S mahogany, of extreme southern Florida and the West Indies

There are others, but we are only concerned with the tree growing in Florida As far as I know, they are growing on Cudjoe and Big Pine Keys The attractive seedpods that hang

from the tree are fascinating After we picked

the pods from the tree (using a boat hook and a net to catch them), my brother-in-law, Jim, and husband, Lew, drilled holes around the bottom of each pod and tapped a very small nail into each hole

As the pods (outer sections)

begin to open, the nails hold them in place Inside an intricate series of layered brown seeds are revealed A spray of clear acrylic preserves the seeds and keeps them intact

I display them on a small candlestick (or you could use a small, clear container, or napkin ring to hold them upright)

The tree that provided our pods has growth that resembles an old apple tree Although mahogany is a premier cabinet wood, it looks as though it would be very hard to find many

Roses can provide the ultimate in indoor blooms

For growing indoor blooms in winter, why not try for the ultimate roses?

Miniature roses are a good choice for windowsills, a variety such as Lyn Gold, for example, which grows only 6 inches tall and sports lemon yellow blossoms each the size of a nickel

Miniature roses trace their lineage back to a plant found about a century ago by a Col Roulet in Switzerland, a miniature variety of China rose This Singles Better fill the air with their deldainty find was crossed with hybrid tea and other roses, and the rest, as they say, is history

The color range of miniature roses now embraces shades and combinations of whites, yellows and reds On some varieties, the petals are knit into a tight bud like those of hybrid teas, blossoms shape might be like a miniature hybrid tea, or loose and floppy like wild roses Original miniature roses were scentless. but newer hybrids such as Sachet and

icate scents

Plans for indoor rose blooms should begin in autumn If you have miniature roses planted in the ground, dig up a plant and pot it up A 6 inch pot is adequate for a rose as small as Lyn Gold, along with any standard potting mix A purchased plant will already be in a pot, but may need to be shifted to a slightly larger one

After giving the potted plant a thorough watering, keep it cool to hold back top growth while roots take hold in the potting soil A sunny window in a cool room or a garage could provide temperatures close to the ideal 50 degrees Fahrenheit for this stage of growth

After a few weeks of cool tempera tures, the plant is ready for some warmth to stimulate growth of new shoots and leaves Put the plant in the sunniest window you have, and in no time you should see shoots capped by fat flower buds, which soon open

Keep on the lookout for pests Indoor

roses are particularly attractive to aphids, red spider mites, and powdery mildew Hand crushing, sprays of water or insecticidal soap, and equable tem peratures should avert any of these problems before they turn into disas

Even if roses are not the easiest of plants to grow indoors, consider giving a try to "the queen of flowers" Your miniature rose might be more appropriately called "a princess of flowers

The horse chestnut, A hip pocastanum, is one of the best known and the 1- to 2-inch fruits are held in a shell covered with very sharp spines When the shell splits open, the appealing chestnut brown, shiny nuts are revealed This tree is a native of Greece and adjacent mountainous areas

The buckeye tree, the official tree of Ohio, produces smooth, dark brown seedpods

As with the horse chestnut, there are many species of buckeyes that grow very large, or are shrubby plants A low parviflora, or bottlebrush buckeye, is a popular shrub here

Buckeyes are often found in woods from Georgia through the Carolinas and into Ohio




Getting organized: Follow lead set of ants, be determined







Local railroader shares his story in lecture series

The first thing you notice when you step into Richard Borsos' Farmington Hills home is the train on the welcome mat

It's the first step on a journey back in time, into a house whose walls are lined with posters and photographs of railroad's glory days, a house lit with modified train lanterns and full of memories from his 48 years as a railroad man

'I've had, I think, the most interesting life of anyone on the railroad," Borsos said as he settled back into a comfortable couch in his family room

The son of a New York City telegrapher, Borsos decided at age 18 that was

not the career for him Instead, he hired out as a steam locomotive fireman, a job that is not for the weak or faint of heart

He recalls his first experience shoveling coal on a train that ran from Niles, Michigan to Chicago, after just two hours spent watching another fireman As the train swayed, Borsos' job was to shovel coal into the firebox, which involved opening its doors with a foot pedal and then depositing the load into an opening not much larger than the shovel's blade

Of course, to create the steam that powered the engine, he also had to continuously pump water

Just keeping his balance was a real challenge But Borsos will never forget his first experience on a steam engine,

which he describes in a voice filled with awe

"There's no way to describe getting on one of those huge monsters, seeing those big rods moving and the syncopation of the steam coming out of the stack with every stroke," he said His love of trains will be the focus of

a March 5 presentation, "Michigan's Rich Railroad History," part of the Trains, Planes & Automobiles historical lecture series sponsored by the Blue Circle and Farmington Big Apple Bagels, with support from Books Abound The series kicks off February 19, with a presentation on local trolley history by Brian Golden, followed by the story of World War II bombers built in Ypsilanti February 26 with guest speaker Todd Hackbarth from The

Yankee Air Museum and on March 12, "How Automobile Touring Created the Diner," a presentation by Daniel Herschberger that will be highlighted by an evening meal of typical diner fare

Borsos' presentation will tie in some Michigan history, labor history and railroad operations up until World War II He worked as a fireman until 1952, when he got into management after qualifying as a locomotive engineer and obtaining a degree in mechanical engineering from Northwestern University

Over the years, railroads fell out of favor, but in their heyday provided a transportation network valuable enough that railroad workers were prohibited from changing jobs in time of



an optimist or a realist? Once you have that response, then define *predicament*, as in its previous usage 'Cause you see, some coaches insist that what the WLAA has is parity They also believe that the top eight teams aren't just equal in strength, but they're all pretty

darn good That's an optimist's view A realist sees the WLAA for what it truly is - not very good Let's put it this way I'll be very surprised if any one of the 12 conference teams enters into the state tournament saddled with fewer than six losses

I'll be even more surprised if any of them survive a state regional game

So we're back to our original question How could this happen?

You could start with the loss of

a lot of outstanding players from last season, but that's a cop out Players are lost to graduation every year

There just aren't as many good players this season Not that there aren't any, just not as many And no single team boasts

more than two I guess that's parity, if every

team has a couple of pretty decent players That doesn't mean these teams are any good, however

Face it — there are no powerhouses in the WLAA Brodie would agree But he

draws the line at a lack of talent level

"It is all balanced," he said The reasons? "There's more talent, No 1 And there's better coaching, No 2

"No 3, the three-point shot is starting to make a bigger difference It took a while, but now

teams can't just pack (their defenses) inside

What lies ahead

This can accurately be termed is a transition season for the league Because many of the WLAA's best players are under classmen

Salem's Dave Hoskins, Westland John Glenn's Darnell Wil son, Northville's Dave Oljace and Adam Konst to name but a few All three teams are in the league's top eight, they could be among the leaders again next season

The transition, however, goes beyond a few young players coming of age Next year there will be a new WLAA, without Farmington, Farmington Harrison or North Farmington and with Wayne Memorial Ten teams, two divisions of five, playing a round-robin schedule against divisional rivals and one game

against teams in the other division

And no league tournament Instead there will be a one-game playoff, the division champs playing each other, second against second, etc

The WLAA is changing, and we might as well get used to it It won't be better, at least not for awhile Think the talent level is watered down now? What will it be like when third schools are opened in Plymouth/Canton and Walled Lake?

No, it may be quite a while before any great basketball teams emerge from the WLAA But at least we'll have parity

more than 1,500 pounds when filled. There is a 220 volt wire encased in a waterproof housing Robert M. from the hot tub to MEISNER the electrical box

that was installed on the deck. The electrical box is connected to a fuse panel in the coowner's unit through the exterior wall of the unit at the condo.

Our bylaws don't specifically prohibit hot tubs, but require permission from the association board of directors regarding any changes to the common elements, limited or general.

The co-owner said the hot tub is portable, not permanently attached, so he doesn't need approval. Do you think we can prevail?

While I would have to look at the specific provisions of your condominium documents, I can tell you that a recent unpublished decision of the Michigan Court of Appeals on substantially similar facts concluded that the installation of a hot tub wasn't necessarily different from alterations such as exterior painting, erection of lights, aerials, awnings, door shutters or other exterior attachments or modifications for which language is typically found in the condominium restrictions

The court determined that because the hot tub was situated on the deck year round with a separate box with a dedicated 220 volt circuit which had to be installed to power the hot tub, that under the condominium documents that existed at that condominium, installation of the hot tub constituted a change in a common element and reasonably could be prohibited by the board of direc tors

Of course enforcement consistency is always an issue in any bylaw enforcement case
