

Recovery system

Center helps addicts kick old habits

The kids — on this day there are six of them — sit in a semi-circle, gathered around Ed Spitsbergen, eyes cast mostly on the floor Members of a support group at Growth Works, they've encountered the day's toughest question so far Who's going to start?

Lee, a 17-year-old from Livonia. fidgets with his hands He wants to "take time," group lingo for talking about his problems Justin, seated next to Spitsbergen, nibbles on his gernails The others in the group including Stephanie, the only girl, are quiet Finally, Lee starts, and the group visibly relaxes It's another step on the road to recovery, perhaps the biggest step for these young people, all enrolled at Growth Works, the Plymouth-based center for drug and alcohol counseling "It's probably one of the most

important supports," Lee said "It's a better environment to talk about things that might not be talked about at other support groups, like AA

That's the basic idea behind Growth Works, founded in 1971 to deal with children — the bulk of their clients are between 14 and 18 years old - with drug or alcohol problems Most of the clients are referred to the center either by parents at the end of their rope or by the court system

Growth Works draws clients fi all over western Wayne County The center offers a variety of programs designed for early intervention for kids at risk Groups meet after school or in the early evening, times conven ient to the youngsters seeking help Joe's drug and alcohol problem was bad enough he'd dropped out of high



Salem **OKs** rezone for JCI


Johnson Controls Inc won a 4-2 split decision from the Salem Township Planning Commission Thursday night

Saying that this was "a step forward" for Salem, commission chairwoman Paula Hornback was joined by three others voting yes on rezoning 367 acres of land at Ann Arbor Road and Napier

Also voting yes were Michael Skin ner, Merce Kaericher and Pam Sebert Jim Kress and Sue Bejin voted no

Kress and Bejin were critical of the plan during the four-hour meeting where the commissioners grilled JCI officials on everything from corporate ethics to pending cases with the Environmental Protection Agency


JCI wants to build a research campus on the site just west of Plymouth Township's border The plan does not

Prevention, recovery begin at home

Much like watching a curious toddler's every move, parents of teenagers need to be just as aware and just as protective

"Parents need to ask and watch, they need to be aware of everything their kid is doing," sa d Maryellen Rehse, director of youth services for Starfish Family Services "They need to be supportive, but watchful Parents should not be afraid to be too intrusive, they may save a child's life by doing that "

The signs of alcohol abuse in teens

are sometimes sub TEENS tle and gradual, but knowing what to look for can promote early intervention and treat ment, according to area counselors and social workers Parents often do

not recognize or admit their child has a drinking problem for about two years, explained Dale Yagiela, executive director of Growth Works in Plymouth By that time, the emotional, social and physical damage has progressed Dependency and addiction acceler ates faster in young people than in adults

Teens can become dependent on alcohol and drugs within six months of continued use, where it typically takes 10 20 years for adults to reach full dependency, according to information from a publication entitled, "Pride Parent to Parent," distributed by Hegi ra Programs

Prose suit new life

The Michigan Court of Appeals has ruled that a \$100 million civil rights lawsuit filed against the City of Plymouth by Plymouth businessman Tom Prose does have merit and should go to trial

According to Juan Mateo, attorney for Prose, the May 9 ruling eliminated former Plymouth mayors Don Dismuke and Joe Koch, as well as former city manager Steve Walters, as defen-dants However, Plymouth police Lt Ed Ochal, former police chief Bob Scog gins, former Community Crier owner W Édward Wendover and his wife, Sally Repeck, remain as co-defendants

The state portion of the lawsuit, as well as a similar suit filed in federal court, contends the city, along with the members of the police department and others, conspired to falsely arrest

Salvation Army honors Caviston at dinner

For years, Tom Caviston worked behind the scenes to get things done for the Plymouth Salvation Army and other civic groups in town

At the Salvation Army's annual dinner Wednesday night, Caviston's memory will be front-and-center

Caviston, who passed away in November after suffering a heart attack while returning from the Michigan-Michigan State football game, will receive the Others Award, one of the Salvation Army's highest honors His wife, Nancy, will be on hand to accept it

It'll be the first Others Award handed out by the Plymouth contingent since Carl Lampton in 1984

"Tom was my go-to guy in terms of special projects," said Maj Stephen Hull, commander of the Plymouth Salvation Army, which also serves Canton, Northville and Belleville "He'd always say, 'Tell me what you need, and I'll get it ' It wasn't about him getting the

recognition It was about getting the job done That's one of the things I appreciated most about Tom '


That's how Caviston, who was 62 when he died, operated all over town - behind the scenes He was instrumental as a member of the Plymouth Ice Festival board in making that event international, getting Russian and Chinese carvers to attend

He was a key member of the Colonial Kiwanis Club, helped out the American Cancer Society and frequently entertained residents at Opportunity House, the home for develop mentally disabled adults

Caviston was so instrumental in helping others that the Plymouth Salvation Army on Wednesday will unveil its first Tom Caviston Award to honor civic involvement

"I'm so proud and overwhelmed by the thought that he'll be remembered that way,' Nancy Caviston said "He was not the type to see kudos, so I think he would be embar rassed But he'd also be honored and he would love it "

Teachers endorse candidates

The Plymouth Canton Education Association is attempting to be a major force in getting three candidates elected to the Board of Education June 10

"We have 2,000 MEA (Michigan Education Association) members who live in the district," said Chuck Portelli, president of the PCEA "If our members come out and vote, we can get the candidates we endorsed elected "

The PCEA, which represents more than a thousand Plymouth-Canton teachers, 1s part of the MEA 2A Coordinating Council, which also includes employee groups representing paraprofessionals and the custodial-maintenance workers

On Wednesday, the council voted to endorse Joanne Lamar and Carol Saunders, both of Plymouth Township, for the two, four-year seats being vacated by trustees Susan Davis and Darwin Watts The council is also endorsing Marcy Staley of Canton Township, who is seeking election to the one-year term Staley has held the position since December, when she was appointed by the Board of Education when Steve Guile resigned after moving out of the district

"We felt Lamar is a good supporter of the schools and will give a whole new perspective to the board," said Portelli "We don't want the Board of Education to be a cookie-cutter board, in which they look and act the same

"Saunders brings 40 years of public education experience," said Portelli of the former teacher and Starkweather Education Center adult education coordinator "She knows the business end of education, and will be able to make educational decisions alongside educators

"From an employee point of view, we felt comfortable with Marcy's (interview) answers, and she doesn't have an agenda," added Portelli

All but one of the 11 candidates attended 20-minute interview sessions with members of the council, plus filled out written questionnaires, on issues such as board policies, tenure, charter schools, the district's budget and employee rights

It's obvious the PCEA considers this an important election because of the all-out effort to get its membership to vote for its candidates

"We believe it's an important election, and we'll send out mailers to the 2,000 MEA members who live in Plymouth and Canton," said Portelli "We will also set up a phone bank to call our members on the Saturday before the election, and on Monday (June 10), the day of the election, reminding them to get out and vote

"The PCEA relationship with central administration is a good one, and we don't want to go back to when Chuck Little was superintendent and we couldn't get information and answers We were always battling," added Portelli "We think these three candidates will help us get there"

Other candidates seeking election to the four-year seats include Richard Ham-Kucharski, Clifford Hill, Mark Horvath, Robert Nelson, Sailesh Patel, William Pratt and Phillip Sugg Also seeking the one-year term is Debra Madonna

Wanted: Election Day help

The surge of growth in Canton has the township clerk's office scrambling for additional election workers

There's no such worry, however, in Plymouth

While Canton is scrambling to find about 50 more election inspectors for the August and November elections, the City of Plymouth is ready to handle the load

"Actually, were in pretty good shape right now," said deputy clerk Deborah Panagiotides "We normally put about 10 people per precinct "

She said the city always has sign-up sheets available for people who are interested in serving as election judges

In Plymouth, precinct chairs earn \$145 for their service, and election inspectors are paid \$110

"We would like to get that increased," Panagiotides said Sandy Groth, Deputy Clerk for

Plymouth Township said she is always on the lookout election workers

"Right now we have a list of about 150 inspectors, but the reality is that we are always looking for new inspectors," she said

The township even has an application for inspectors posted

on their website www.plymouthtwp.org

Groth said the job is ideal for retirees, stay-at-home moms and students who are age 16 and older

Plymouth Township pays their election judges \$130 per day, and the precinct chairperson receives an additional \$25 and a co-chair earns an additional \$15 per day

"I would like to encourage people to become election judges," Groth said "It's a good learning experience and a great way to serve your community"

Under a change in election laws, inspectors are not required to live in the community in which they serve, but must reside in the same county as the community," Groth said

Canton Township find itself looking for a lot more election workers To qualify to be an election inspector, you must be 18 years of age, a registered voter in Wayne County, able to fluently speak and write English, and perform simple math calculations Students that are age 16 and older are also able to serve, but they must be supervised by other inspectors

"We're in need of about 50 more election inspectors for the August and November elections," said Terry Bennett, Canton Township clerk "We have seven new precincts, and need

35 individuals for the August (primary) election and 42 for the November (general) election "

The job also requires a sense of dedication "It's a long day," Bennett said Election workers typically start their day at 6 30 a m and may work as late as 10 30 p m

An election inspector in Canton will make \$125 per day, while a precinct chairperson, who has supervisory duties, is paid \$145 per day

Training for the job is required by all municipalities

"In Canton Township we pay \$20 to attend training," Bennett said "Several classes are scheduled between now and the elections "

Plymouth Township pays \$15 for training

"We generally train the week before the election, one in the day and one in the evening to accommodate everyone's schedule," Groth said

Bennett offered words of praise for Canton's election workers

"We have a lot of dedicated workers we depend on They provide a great service "



OVDA passes resolution dispelling annexation talk

The Old Village Development Authority, in an effort to make peace with city commissioners, unanimously passed a resolution Thursday night indicating it has never discussed Old Village being annexed by Plymouth Township, and doesn't the support the idea

However, despite their support for the resolution, there are indications OVDA board members Matt Cardwell and Peter Bunting may be removed from

the board to which they were appointed The two caused a stir last week when they discussed with township officials the idea Old Village being annexed by the township because of what they consider the lack of attention by the city commission to Old Village Mayor Pro-Tem Colleen Pobur,

along with commissioner and former OVDA haison Michele Potter, attended the meeting in an attempt to dispel the notion that Old Village has been forgotten

"For any resident of the city to suggest the city is neglecting the

neighborhood known as Old Village is preposterous," said Pobur, after reading a list of Old Village improvements since 1998 "Every neighborhood in this city is important to us, and we continue to maintain that posture We've been very concerned about some of these remarks that have been made We consider them to be very confusing This is a disruptive thing for the whole community "

Both Bunting and Cardwell insisted they weren't representing the OVDA in their conversa tions of annexation

"For me personally, it's some-

as long as it seems like there's anything there," said Cardwell "Right now, I see a commitment out of the commission to Old Village, and that's what we're really looking for here Nobody really wants to leave the city

"This is just an option Nobody is saying we're doing it," said Bunting

OVDA board member Avis said the talk of annexation has harmed "this group, Old Village, and our relationship with the administration and city commission not knowing what their vote really means when they

really like to pick up and move out of the city into the township'

Board member Catherine Doughty said that as representa tives of the OVDA, when Bunting and Cardwell expressed opinions that are "at cross purposes with the goals and objectives of the board, and ultimately the City of Plymouth, then you either need to reconcile those views with the board, or resign your appointment "

There are no indications either Bunting or Cardwell will resign from the OVDA board However,


thing that I'll continue to look at have an attitude that they would commissioners have voiced their concerns, both publicly and privately, about the lack of cohesiveness on the OVDA board There are hints the pair might be replaced before next month's OVDA meeting

> As she left Thursday's session, Pobur indicated there will be evaluations of the city's boards and commissions, and those who are appointed to serve on them

> "It's important that the people who represent the city on boards and commissions have the city's best interest at heart," she said



school, preferring getting high to learning

He came to Growth Works the same way a lot of kids do, after his parents got tired of his drug or alcohol use and his attitude, and issued an ultimatum They told him to clean up his act, or be on his own

Joe chose the former Now 23 and a graduate of Western Michigan University, ask him if he'd be on that doorstep to success without Growth Works, and Joe's answer comes easily, and quickly

"No," he said "My drug and alcohol use got to the point where I had dropped out of high school If I had continued, I'd never have re-enrolled My parents said come (to Growth Works) or be on my own I wasn't capable of doing that I was a drug addict and an alcoholic I didn't have the skills to do anything "

"Get help or get out" is a pretty typical way parents deal with drug abuse by their children At least, Dale Yagiela has found that to be true in 30 years of dealing with the consequences That's why most of the kids come through the door, resistant though they might be to the idea, at least at first According to Yagiela, most of them start the program figuring they'll find a way to beat the system

Resistant and recalcitrant at first, kids act out and try to disrupt the program The more mil-

clients to follow their lead, an act counselors quickly put to \mathbf{rest}

All about image

"It's important to get kids to recognize they aren't going to run the program," said Yagiela, Growth Works' first employee when the doors opened 30 years ago "It's about their image They have to decide early on whether they want the image of a recovering addict or the image of a thug "

According to Joe, there is a little part of every addıct who recognizes they need help and want to change

"What this place did, and what recovery does, is nurture that part of you," Joe said "It's a rare case that someone does that on their own Usually, it has to be some outside force that shows the addict how rotten life has become "

In group, the addicts get a chance to be with, and talk to, their peers There's no single person really any different They're all addicted to drugs and/or alcohol, and they all are struggling with recovery They've worked hard on setting up a support system, changing friends and habits

Growth Works is a voluntary program — even those referred by the legal system can leave designed to get addicts to start changing their ways They learn

itant ones will try to get meeker they can't still hang around friends with whom they "used," can't do the same things they did to get to that point to start with

"They come initially guardedly and grudgingly," said Spitsber-gen, the center's program director "They think they can find a way around it, and we know that We have to get a sense of how the kids think (Then) You begin to change their associations '

A new path


And get them to make new ones In group session on this day, the six clients are all new friends They do things together, they talk to each other One offers another a place to stay if his mother moves Others talk about sharing phone calls and internet messages

It's a key asset of the group

"I think it helps because we're all kids here." said Justin Dean of Garden City "I have people to hang out with and talk with who are going through the same things It just feels good "

Not always, though On this day. Lee has said something that angered Jeremiah, a 16-year-old from Garden City Jeremiah had wanted to take time, and something Lee said upset him, almost to the point of not talking

Almost But the support system worked, and Jeremiah and his group-mates wound up getting Jeremiah's problem out in the open He's able to express his

feelings and, though he wasn't looking for it, got an apology from Lee

"You have to really work at getting them in touch with their feelings," Yagiela said "When you start getting remorse about the losses in their life - school. athletics, relationships — then you're moving forward '

They move forward pretty well, if statistics mean anything Somewhere near 75 percent of Growth Works clients leave sober, and stay that way

"It was real hard at first, because of course I didn't think I had a problem and I didn't want to be here," said Lindsay, a 19year-old about to start her jumor year at Eastern Michigan University who went through the program at age 15 "I realized it's not ever going to work my way I finally got scared of where my life was at

Joe recalls the daunting task facing him once he decided to get sober It hasn't been all moonlight and roses He credits

Growth Works with helping him learn some of life's hardest lessons

"At first it's hard, because there are a lot of changes you need to make," Joe said "Friends, places you hang out, you have to rebuild the relationships you've broken with family and friends

"It's pretty hard to do at first," he added "Getting sober is a lot harder than staying sober (But) after you do that, it's a lot easi- \mathbf{er}



There are five steps to dependency for teenagers experimental or fun use, regular use, rebelhous use, uncontrolled use and full addiction

As teens progress through the stages of addiction, the warning signs become more apparent school grades drop

hanging around different friends

defiance to rules and responsibilities

defensive attitude toward authority

problems at school

mood swings

loss of energy and initiative

disguising substance abuse decreased interest in normal

leisure activities change in physical appear

ance and hygiene ■ becoming more secretive and less communicative

missing curfew, making excuses

■ increased dishonesty

■ isolation from old friends and famılv

weight changes

abusive behavior

getting into trouble with the law

family possessions missing ■ old friends, family and school

staff noticing the changes Believing that kids will go to

treatment programs on their own is a complete myth, Yagiela, of Growth Works, one of the largest teen substance abuse treatment programs in the state

"They end up here because they're crashing and burning and their parents are recognizing it," he said

About half of the clients at

Growth Works are referred by the juvenile justice system or the schools

Who is at risk?

Kids who are most at risk for turning to alcohol are those who spend a lot of time unsupervised spend most of their time "hanging out," rather than participating in constructive activities, those who receive little affection, attention and encouragement from their parents and those who have incon sistent, abusive or permissive dis cipline at home

Low self esteem, lack of social skills and family history of alco holism are also factors that put a child at risk for alcohol dependen cy, according to information from "Pride Parent to Parent '

Parents aid prevention

Parents can help prevent alcohol abuse in their children by foster ing a warm, open relationship with their child Spending time together, talking about issues con fronting their teen, setting and enforcing clear rules about drugs and drinking and teaching by example are ways parents can help steer their teens away from the dangers of alcohol

Teenagers will often show they do not want their parents to ask questions, enforce rules or be involved in their lives, but Rehse, from Starfish Family Services, said they actually do want those things

Firm rules and discipline can ease the peer pressure, said Rehse

"It helps keep them out of trou ble," she said 'And, it helps give them a way out (When turning down alcohol, drugs or tobacco)

Prose three times for crimes he dıdn't commit

"I'm not surprised at the Court of Appeals ruling," said Prose, a Northville Township resident "We think the federal case will go forward at the same time, too'

In the first ruling, Wayne County Circuit Court Judge William Giovan ordered the two

sides to proceed to trial, while denying a motion for summary disposition by attorneys representing the defendants, which would have blocked the lawsuit The Court of Appeals obviously agreed with Giovan "The trial judge said there was

significant evidence and the lawsuit should go to trial since a jury could find that the police

and the others could have conspired to falsely charge Dr Prose," said Mateo "We're very pleased, and confident the federal court will appreciate what two other courts have discovered " No trial date has been set in

Wayne County Circuit Attorney Gus Morris, of Cox, Hodgman & Giarmarco in Troy, who is representing the city, was unavailable to comment on the ruling and whether the city will appeal the ruling In March, Morris filed a motion to dismiss the state lawsuit

In the \$100 million federal lawsuit, US District Court Judge John Corbett O'Meara denied Prose's motion for summary judgment in March, dismissing all claims by Prose

Instead, O'Meara granted all the defendants in the lawsuit summary judgment, which cleared them of any damages

However, Mateo filed a motion to reconsider, and O'Meara has ordered both sides to present their cases The next step in the federal case, should O'Meara rule against Prose, would be an appeal to the US Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals in Cincinnation which Prose said earlier he would do

In the lawsuit filed Sept 18, 1999, Prose claimed there was a violation of his civil rights when he was charged with disorderly conduct by Plymouth police in connection with his legal battle with Wendover

"There will be no 'wet' processes on this site," JCI attorney Todd Fink said "We will meet or exceed all rules We will take every precaution

"We must assess the environmental impact of this plan " Kress said, noting the JCI operation will sit at the headwaters of the Rouge watershed Commissioner Bejin said she

was not happy with any aspect of the plan

"I have a huge concern about the waste water plant," she said "I'm not convinced it is the right thing to do We're just not ready

When told that the planned private sewage disposal plant was reliable and safe she responded sharply





When the occasional, experi mental beer at a wedding recep tion has progressed to sneaking around for a shot of alcohol every day, it s time to get help

Teens who are heading down the road to alcohol dependency have many options for preven tion, intervention and treatment ın western Wayne County

Experts remind teenagers and their families that drinking alco hol is often more serious than it being "just a phase" during the high school years Recognizing the signs of abuse and knowing about the treatment options is critical in stopping the down ward spiral

Where to go for help

A separate program is tailored especially for parents, said Yagiela The program entails group therapy for parents of chemically-dependent teenagers The basics of addiction and ways to deal with it are topics addressed

Treatment and rehabilitation is a timely process that can take up to two years, said Yagiela The sustained sobriety rate for Growth Works clients is 55 to 75 percent, he noted







The world is his dandelion

Vegetarian author/forager has no problem finding food

The only time most people forage for food is when the cupboards are bare and they find themselves scrounging through the refrigerator, struggling to turn a can of peas, moldy bread and ketchup into dinner

"Wildman" Steve Brill prefers to do it the real way

This self-taught foraging expert heads backs to nature daily to find his food And when he goes out to eat, he ısn't bringing back burgers and fries

He's feasting on plants most people Parmesan) consider weeds

Now he's ready to teach you to do it, too His new book, The Wild Vegetarian Cookbook (Harvard Common Press, 2002, \$29 95), contains more than 500 recipes using plants you're not likely to find in a grocer's produce section He lists more than 150 of such wild plants ın detail

Brill is talking about milkweed (tossing it with pasta), acorns (serving them refried, similar to beans), and purplespore puffball (a type of mushroom he

For Brill, the world is full of food Most people don't realize that many of the plants they try so hard to rid their yards of not only are edible, but can be turned into delicacies with little effort

Foraging for food may not be common in the United States, but Brill says people around the world rely on it for stocking their pantry with seasonal greens and other goodies


"Anywhere but America," he said recently, talking by phone from his home in Mamaroneck, NY "The Germans, the Italians, the Chinese, the

Indians Any culture where TV and entertainment aren't the only ways to live, foraging is still common

Brill, who has been vegan since 1990, got turned on to foraging back in 1979

"I was bicycling, riding past a park in Queens, New York, near where I lived, and there were these ethnic Greek women picking something in the park,' he said "I asked them what they were doing and it was all Greek to me But I came home with grape leaves and I was excited to have something I could



From there, Brill's fascination with found food flourished But grazing on public property wasn't always easy

In 1982 he began giving foraging tours in downtown New York Four years later, he made national headlines when he was arrested for eating a dandelion in Central Park The charge? Removing vegetation

A month later the city dropped the charges and, instead of prosecuting, offered Brill a job as a naturalist, to lead teaching tours showing other New Yorkers the bounty that grows around them

Brill acknowledges that not everyone will be comfortable foraging That probably has to do with the fear of eating something that will cause a slow, painful

death But, he said, common sense and a good field guide are all that are needed for safe and succulent foraging

"Learn a small number of easy-to-recognize plants really well and you will build up your knowledge and do this safely,' he said "Don't pick near heavy traffic or near railway rights of way where they spray, and always wash everything first "

There is one area where Brill's book, chock-full of tempting and unusual recipes, is lacking _ there are no illustrations to help the novice forager differentiate between the yummy and the deadly

Coincidentally, he has written a field guide, Identifying and Harvesting Edible and Medicinal Plants in Wild (and Not so Wild) Places (Morrow, 1994, \$21 95), which he recommends for this purpose

Not everything in Brill's book, which is organized by season, is unusual Some of the recipes call for

ingredients such as berries that can be found just as easily in grocery stores as in the backyard

For an easy early-spring dish that doubles as great weed control for the lawn, try Brills curried dandelions Be certain not to use dandelions from lawns or fields that have been sprayed with herbicides or insecticides

For another wild spring edible, Dandelion leaves are best try cattails, which grow in Press, 2002, \$29 95)

marshes and wetlands and look hke, well, cats' tails

Brill said the immature flower heads on cattails can be harvested when green in the early spring and cooked like corn on the cob Because this comes out a little dry, he suggests serving it with a sauce

Try eating the tender white shoots in the following recipe,

- 1 tablespoon toasted sesame oil
- 1/2 cup peeled and chopped cattail shoots
- 1 cup shallots chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, chopped



Jong tells Planned Parenthood audience women's rights are being taken away

Feminist author Erica Jong remembers girls who disappeared from her New York City high school class into the wilds of New Jersey, \$250 and a hidden pregnancy in hand

"Sometimes they came back bleeding Sometimes they were hospitalized "

'That's why we must tell our daughters and our granddaughters what those days were like," she implored the more than 350 people attending Thursday's eighth annual Planned Parenthood fundraising luncheon at the Ambassador Hotel in Southfield

"One of the saddest things for our daughters is the amnesia of history they suffer from We face the problem of undoing the ignorance of our own history

The fund-raiser, held under tight security, comes at a critical time for Planned Parenthood of Southeast Michigan A bill that threatens state funding for Planned Parenthood clinics has been passed by both houses of the Michigan Legislature and sits on Gov John Engler's desk

attack,' said Planned Parenthood CEO George Stokes, a Rochester Hills resident "Let your voices be heard and urge our governor to do the right thing and veto it "

Four politicians in Planned Parenthood's very tight corner were introduced They were For mer Gov Jim Blanchard running for the Democratic nomination for governor, state Rep Pan Godchaux running for the Michigan Senate, Birmingham school board trustee Shelli Weisberg, running for Godchaux's seat, and David Fink, challenging U S Congressman Joe Knollenberg

Jong is no Jon(g)ny come late ly to Planned Parenthood "Speaking for Planned Parent hood is a no-brainer," she explained "I started donating to Planned Parenthood when I got out of college " She has also served on its advisory council

She made literary and social history 30 years ago with her first novel, Fear of Flying Writ ten in 1973 at the height of the women's movement it was an explicit account of a woman exploring the full range of her sexuality She is the author of

eight other books and seven volumes of poetry

Today, it looks as if women have sexual freedom, but they don't, she told the audience "We have an overt display of sexuality but behind it is deep sexual hypocrisy Programs like Sex and the City and girls bearing their midriffs and wearing rings in their belly buttons give the cosmetic feeling of freedom But the underpinnings are being snatched away

"It's the unfinished revolution," she said "All of you in this room are courageous pioneers It's hard to fight for a cause that people think has already been won Girls think they are already free They don't understand that great forces are conspiring to take away the rights they already have "

She urged women who care about reproductive rights "to recapture the language" that Right to Life has stolen away "You are the most pro-family people on the planet," she said "You are advocating that a child come into the world as a miracle for parents who are prepared to be parents '

Jong described her own diffi cult decision to have a baby at 36 as a life-altering experience


"Reproductive rights made me able to have a child when I was ready " Daughter, Molly Jong, 24, has written her own first novel, Normal Girl It describes the battle of a young New York City woman to overcome too much money promiscuity and drugs

Although she was fighting a cold, Jong graciously stayed to chat with anyone who approached her and to auto graph copies of her latest work What do women want? Bread Roses Sex Power

Planned Parenthood public affairs director Sandra Gillis found it "refreshing" that Jong gave "a hardball message at what she could have considered 'a women's luncheon

"I thought she did a wonderful job," said Naomi Foa from West Bloomfield





Haunting story grabs you like nightmares do

The Life Before Her Eyes by each other s arms when a boy Laura Kasischke (Harcourt Inc \$24)

The Life Before Her Eyes is the kind of book that rivets you to its pages as you read, then haunts you after you have closed its covers

> Its language and BOOK Chelsea author BEAT Kasıschke's powerful prose are perhaps the main attraction (This is evident not just on each page, but in almost every paragraph or sentence) VICTORIA In addition

DIAZ her ability to tell a briskly

paced story, her talent for paint ing arresting characters, and her sensitive perceptions of the human condition all combine beautifully to make Kasischke's book a literary jewel

The story begins in a rather unlikely spot - the ladies room of a Midwestern high school Two best friends, Maureen and Diana, are doing the things that best friends often do together giggling, gabbing sharing a mir ror

Suddenly, they hear strange sounds outside in the hallway Horrified as they realize that a massacre is taking place in their own high school, the girls are in

anyway named Michael Patrick pushes open the door of the room and swaggers in, brandishing a gun

Kasıschke makes us experi ence that gun We can see it, up close and personal And before this scene is concluded, we know its sulfur and oil scent, too

Which one of you girls should I kill?" the boy asks, pointing the gun at each by turns " I'm going to kill one of you which one should it be?'

Their responses not only tell us a good deal about who these best friends are, but also serve to set the main part of the story in motion

Soon, we find ourselves in a small town not unlike Ann Arbor

Diana is living in a storybookpretty house on a street called Maiden Lane Living with her are her loving husband, a college professor, and their small and lively daughter, Emma

Diana is a fit, fine, 40-year old 'soccer mom " She 1s also an artist of sorts who teaches at a local community college On the surface, her life seems to be just about as good as it gets

But it isn't long before we are reminded that surfaces can be highly misleading Underneath, something is very wrong and strange here The perfection itself seems odd and wrong somehow We can feel that in our bones Diana seems to feel it in her bones, too Only she's not altogether sure why And neither are we - not in the beginning,

Kasıschke s format twists, moving us from the present day to 20 years earlier to the present day and then back again And because of her exquisitely careful attention to detail, each turn feels vaguely dreamlike and reflective, though utterly convincing In fact, each seems to grab at us in the way that night-

mares or visions reach out and

grab Here are Blue Moon ice cream, school cafeterias smelling of pizza and steamed carrots, class rooms scented by 'the humid, private alcoves of the human body," the water in the school drinking fountain nauseatingly warm, like human fluids " houses trimmed in 'gingerbread' and adorned with pretty wicker fur niture, the skeleton in a biology classroom wearing a green biki

Here is a nun, wearing a tradi tional black habit "Only her small pale hands and her powder white face could be glimpsed underneath it The illusion was of bodilessness '

Though this is a serious story about the nature of evil and death, The Life Before Her Eyes is ultimately, and in a very real sense a celebration of life It's a fine book to read during any season but most especially the present one

In addition to soaking in the natural beauty of the island, there are a number of other activities to enjoy Take for example golf


"It's a golfer's paradise," said Tom "Every hole you're on 1s like a signature hole There are whales jumping in the background on one hole There's a

movie star on the next hole It's just a crazy place "

Speaking of whales jumping whale watching is one of Maui's biggest attractions Excursion boats take tourists out into the ocean and stop near mating prides However, the Sparkman's witnessed a full breach, (a whale jumps entirely out of the water, does a complete flip and splashes in, backside down) while walking along a private beach

"We just got off the road, and sat on a tree that had fallen down to watch the whales," said Tom, grateful for the experience "Some people go there all the time to see whales, and never see a full breach "

However, if parasailing is your passion, skip the whale season (late December through early April), because parasailing



isn't done during whale watching season

"You can't be going with the boat and then have to stop for a whale," explained Wendi, who was hesitant to parasail at first but now considers it one of her fondest memories "I was petrified The only reason I went up was because they let us go tandem (together) It was awe some '

The island is home to some of the most famous restaurants in the world, including Longhi's, recommended by Al Michaels, of ABC Sports, as the place to request your last meal from, if you ever wind up on death row


In addition to fish so fresh, "they'll tell you the name of the guy that just caught it," the Sparkmans urge travelers to try

Longhi's Chocolate Soufflé "It's to die for!" said Wendi


"You have to order soufflé a half hour before you want it, because it takes that long to prepare," said Tom

"Good" cholesterol

After only four weeks into a 12 week study people who took an investigational drug were able to increase their HDL cholesterol (the "good cholesterol) levels by 34 per cent, according to a recent report in Circulation Journal of the American Heart Association Also 198 people lowered their LDL cholesterol (the 'bad' cholesterol) by 7 percent

The drug, called a CETP inhibitor, works by blocking the action of the cholesteryl ester transfer protein, which is known to lower HDL

"CETP represents an important target because this protein plays a key role in HDL metabolism In fact a genetic deficiency of CETP is the main reason for high HDL in Asian populations," says study author Dr John Kastelein, from the Academic Medical Center in Amsterdam, The Netherlands

Except for some mild gastrointesti nal side effects there were no major adverse effects from the new drug

"Although these results hold prom ise, further studies are needed to investigate whether the increase in HDL cholesterol translates into a reduction in coronary artery disease risk, says Kastelein

Early onset drinking predisposes teens to injury, addiction

Holly Bair a trauma nurse coordinator at Beaumont Hospital, has seen her share of seriously injured teens and young adults in the emergency room, patients with "multi-system" injuries that involve long-bone fractures, spleen and liver damage, and devastating head trauma

"It tends to be alcohol-related," she saıd

But it's not always car accidents that cause the devastation, she added "There's skateboarding off the backs of cars and falling off balalarming correlation between early onset drinking and likelihood of injury later in life when under the influence of alcohol In general, teens who start drinking before age 14 are 12 times more likely to be injured than those who begin drinking at or after age 21

"This analysis shows that for each year under age 21 that drinking onset 1s delayed, risk for later life injury diminishes," said Dr Enoch Gordis, director, National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism

Research by the National Institutes of Health further indicates the use and abuse of alcohol by ado-


According to NIA statistics, in 1999. 31 percent of 12th grade students, 26 percent of 10th graders, and 15 percent of 8th graders reported highrisk alcohol use (five or more drinks on a single occasion) within the previous two weeks As a member of the national organization ENCARE (Emergency Nurses Cancel Alcohol Related Emergencies), Bair often visits high schools to speak about the dangers of alcohol She tells students they're not invincible Drinking can put you into the emergency room and change your life forever Think before you drink, she warns "This is just one moment in your life Make a smart decision and do it with a clear head "

Society's willingness to confront the issue is not what it should be, said Logan "We look askance, but we don't see the carnage, the destroyed lives, the suicides, the pregnancies ' The problem is complicated First of all, there's easy access to alcohol in our affluent society, said Logan "Teens can go down to the village corner and give \$10 to a college kid and say, 'Buy me a six-pack' Second, parents are almost "a stage behind" in guessing their adolescent's alcohol use "If you think your kid is a weekend user, he's probably using all week If you think they rejust on cigarettes, they're usually on alcohol and marijuana also,' said Logan His advice 'Search the kids room " Binge-drinking especially has dan gerous behavioral associations The 2000 National Household Survey on Drug Abuse, an annual survey spon sored by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, concluded ■ Underage persons who reported binge drinking (43 percent) were more likely to report past-month use of any illicit drug than were their peers who did not binge drink (6 per cent)

Urinary incontinence

E Teenagers whose parents talk to them regularly about the dangers of drugs are 42 percent less likely to use drugs than those who don't, yet only one in four teens report having these conversations.

Community awareness

Dr David Logan, psychiatrist and long-time consultant to Growth Works in Plymouth, had a one word answer when asked if alcohol use by teens is more of a problem than school districts and the community perceive "Absolutely!"

"It isn't a coincidence that there are more fatal accidents involving teens around graduation time,' he said "But six months later we forget it was alcohol-related We just miss the kids '

Parents have more influence than they may think

The Teens Today study results released today reveal that, contrary to the popular "myth of inevitability." such behaviors are not unavoidable

rites of passage in teen life The Teens Today report also suggests strategies that parents can employ to help keep their children safe

The original research reveals profiles reflecting behavioral rends among teens Three specific decision types emerged among the 500 teens surveyed, reflecting the degree to which they choose to engage in destructive and potentially destructive activities These decision types, "avoiders," "experimenters," and "repeaters," were heavily influenced

by parental attitudes and behavior Avoiders tend to avoid destructive decision-making Experimenters tend to occasionally engage in destructive

decision-making and repeaters regu larly engage in destructive decision making

"These findings offer encouragement to parents to continue to talk to their teens about good decision-making," said Stephen Wallace, chairman and chief executive officer of the national SADD organization "We've shattered the 'myth of inevitability" that so often mirrors parents' attitudes about teen behavior and their uncertainty about being able to influ ence decision-making

According to the study, many parents either do not believe that their teen participates in destructive behaviors or think that such behav

iors are a normal part of rowing up Many also believe that there is little, if anything, they can do to influence teen choices

Yet, the data suggests that parents can take an active role in determin ing which decision type their teen is likely to resemble Specifically the Teens Today findings include

Avoiders are more likely than repeaters to say they have open and honest communication with their parents

Teens who have open and honest communication with their parents are more likely than those who do

Underage persons who reported binge drinking were almost nine times more likely to have used marijuana/hashish and six times more likely to have used any illicit drug other than marijuana during the past month compared with underage persons who did not binge drink


■ Underage binge drinkers were 11 times more likely to have used hallucinogens and six times more likely to have used psychotherapeutic drugs during the past month nonmedically than underage persons who did not binge drink

Parents' naivete about their children's drinking habits isn't the only factor that makes them enablers Many parents believe that drinking in a controlled situation, or drinking "just beer," is okay, said Logan

"Parents who have graduation parties with only beer often find vodka bottles or noxious oxide bottles the next morning

influencers of a child s attitudes ' Genetics also plays a role Alcoholism is a "polygenetic" disease, meaning there is not one gene that can be isolated and indicted as the cause, said Brooks "There are no tests, nothing as simple as a blood test, that says this person will be an alcoholic The only thing that prevents a genetically disposed person to use alcohol is not to use alcohol '

Brooks warns that smoking is a gateway drug "Especially at an early age Probably the next thing they will do is smoke marijuana and drink alcohol

Both Logan and Brooks indict insurance companies for the loss of in-house treatment beds in hospitals and treatment centers

"Insurance companies believe alcohol-related problems in teens can easily be treated on an outpatient basis," said Logan "Inpatient is just no longer available unless you are extraordinarily sick '

Brighton Hospital is an addiction hospital with 63 in-patient beds located in Brighton It recently closed its in-patient adolescent treatment ward "We were the last bastion in the area Now it's more of a challenge to garner resources and get treatment," said Brooks

Lack of treatment centers for those teens with serious alcohol problems, peer pressures to "fit in," and a society that accepts teen drinking as a rite of passage is all the more reason for parents to monitor their own behavior as well as their children's

"That's where it all starts," said Brooks

Teens who have open and honest communication with their parents are more likely than those who do not, to say their parents influence their decisions about sexual activity

Teens who have open communication with their parents are significantly more likely than those who do not, to say that punishment has kept them from doing the same thing again

"The important message for parents is that 'you do make a difference," said John Conners, executive vice president and manager of Liberty Mutual s personal insurance operations "In the face of media and peer pressure, many parents feel their role in influencing their children's choices is marginalized Clearly, this is not the case

The Teen Today report amplifies other SADD and Liberty Mutual research indicating the importance of parent-child com munication in teen decisionmaking and reinforces the influence parents can have by conveying their expectations for teen behavior This new data reveals that ■ Repeaters are significantly less likely than experimenters or avoiders to say that it is important to them to live up to their parents' expectations regarding drinking, sex and drugs

ents are significantly more likely than those who, do to say that they wish their communication with parents were different

The Teens Today research also suggests that parents who adopt "zero-tolerance" attitudes about destructive decision-making by their teens may be more effective in helping their children avoid trouble

Teens themselves offered specific advice for parents as to how they might best help their chil-

- Staying up until teens return home
- Enforcing curfews
- Requiring that teens sleep
- at home Calling friends' parents to







Sun damage

Protect your eyes this summer with a good pair of shades

out for your eyes as well as your skin

While most of us know that it's important to protect our skin from the sun, we might not as readily think about our eyes Yet the same ultraviolet rays that damage the skin can harm your eyes as well, says Dr Michael Smith-Wheelock, ophthalmologist at the University of Michigan Kellogg Eye Center He advises adults and children to wear sunglasses with UV protection to block harmful rays

Prolonged exposure to the sun has a direct link to some eye conditions, including the formation of cataracts, and is suspected of contributing to others, says Smith-Wheelock "We have good evidence that the incidence of cataracts relates to the 'dosage' or exposure to ultraviolet rays," he

Soaking up the sun? Look says "The more exposure to sun you have, the more likely you are to have cataracts And the effect intensifies the closer you move to the equator "

Smith-Wheelock notes that intense UV rays can actually burn the surface of the cornea The condition, called photokeratitis, is similar to sunburn and is more likely to occur in areas where the sun is highly reflected, for example, off of water, snow, the desert, and in tanning booths

Most eye disorders from the sun tend to affect the front the cornea and lens - rather than the back of the eye, says Smith-Wheelock Nonetheless you can do severe damage to the retina, which lines the back of the eye, by staring directly at the sun The resulting condition is called solar retinopathy, and welders wear goggles to protect their eyes Prolonged exposure to the sun has a direct link to some eye conditions, including the formation of cataracts, and is suspected of contributing to others, says Smith-Wheelock.



SECTION 1. REVIEW AND DETERMINATION OF PUBLIC PURPOSE.

Following the recommendation of the Charter Township of Plymouth Downtown Development Authority (the "Authority") from March 11, 2002, and having conducted a duly noticed public hearing on the Development Plan and Tax Increment Financing Plan (Exhibit "A") on April 9, 2002, the Township Board of Trustees, upon its review, finds that these plans meet the following standards and criteria as set forth in Section 19 (1) of Act 197, Public Acts of Michigan, 1975, as amended ("Act 197")

- The Development Plan for the Authority's Development Area meets the requirements set forth in Section 17(2) of Act 197 in that it contains all of the requirements of Act 197 enumerated in the Ordinance as subparagraphs (a) (p)
- The Tax Increment Financing Plan for the Development Area meets 2 the requirements as set forth in Sections 14 and 15 of Act 197
 - (a) This section provides for an explanation of what is required to be included in the Development Plan and what is included in the Tax Increment Financing Plan as well as the obligations of the Township Treasurer regarding the transmitting of tax increment revenues. This subsection also includes the requirements of the reporting obligation of the DDA to the Township Board and the State Tax Commission as well as publication of the annual report in a newspaper of general circulation in the Township

Technology helps keep everything on the level

We learned as apprentice carpenters that a strong back, ambition and energy were necessary to survive in this grueling trade

We also learned our tools were of equal or greater importance Time is money, and having the right tools well maintained makes a job easier and safer

Except for tools for specialized tasks, our basic battery of tools has remained the same for the nearly 30 years that we have been in construction

Those include properly weighted framing and finish hammers, a circular saw, hand saws, framing square, combination square, nail sets, plumb bob, chalk line tape measure and carpenter's level

Although the contents of our toolbox haven't changed much over the years, the tools don't look much like the ones we began with Today's tools have evolved into highly engineered objects that act as extensions of one's anatomy

They are lighter, more powerful and more ergonomically sensitive This provides better productivity, less wear and tear on muscles and joints and superior results

Improvements in leveling tools are many A level is one of our favorite tools. We like our work to be straight, plumb (true vertical) and level

There are many uses for a level, including building a fence, installing a chair rail, wainscot or other trim and hanging pictures Levels are available in various shapes and sizes, depending upon the job

The most common style 1s the carpenter's level It comes in various lengths and has two or more fluid-filled vials that are used to establish plumb and level It's often called a bubble level When the bubble in the fluidfilled vial is situated between lines on the vial, the object is plumb (or level)

There are several variations of the carpenter's level

A torpedo level 1s a short one (about a foot long) that is easy to handle It is used for jobs where space is tight and where a longer level isn't required

A line level is another It attaches to a string line that is held taut It is small, convenient and easy to use The line level is suited for fence-building and other outdoor projects

Be forewarned that it becomes less accurate as the length of the string increases, and begins to sag

The oldest of them all is the water level It consists of a clear plastic hose filled with water This style of level is useful for establishing level between two distant points such as when setting forms for a foundation It has all but been replaced by more a

sophisticated means of establishing level - a transit or builder's level A level 1sn't just for leveling a surface It

also is used for establishing plumb, a straight vertical line This comes into play when installing a door, paneling, wallpaper or other finishes that require a plumb line

Another means of establishing plumb is by using a nifty tool called a plumb bob It consists simply of a weight with a point at one end that is attached to a string The origin of the string can be high on a wall or from a point on the ceiling, while the point at the end of the weight dangles slightly above the surface of the floor

A plumb bob is an excellent means of transferring a point from a ceiling to the floor, and vice versa

Another tool we keep in our pouches that can also be used as a plumb bob is a chalk line or snap line As its name implies, it is used primarily for transferring a straight line onto a surface with chalk as the medium

The chalk box consists of a plastic or metal container filled with pigmented chalk String is wound on a reel completely enveloped by the chalk

When the string is extended and held taut from one point to another, the line is lifted and snaps back against the surface leaving a straight line This is useful in installing floor tile, wallpaper and chair rail







more tools now can be performed with one tool that is a fraction of their size and significantly more accurate

For example, in the past when installing wainscot, chair rail or wallpaper, it took a level, a plumb bob 💩 🔍 and a chalk line , .

Now you can have * all three in one with a laser level, also known as a laser-line generator This tool can cast a continuous straight line on any surface without leaving a mark

Laser technology has been around for a while, but in recent years has become more compact, affordable and functional Some models have a laser that will skip over moldings and uneven surfaces

So, if you're installing wallpaper above an existing chair rail, place a laser-line generator on the floor, use the bubble to establish plumb and watch the laser line jump right over the molding to cast a plumb line where you need it with no permanent marks

One manufacturer has come up with a laser-line generator that has spring-loaded pushpins that will allow you to temporarily anchor the device to wallboard or plaster to align objects with one hand

This tool is as close, as it gets to using a television remote control when making home improvements

"RELOCATING THE WORKING SPOUSE"

The buying and selling of real estate always involves a human dimension This week, we focus on one of the consequences of relocation When a family relocates to a new city because of a job transfer, the spouse who is also employed faces a difficult challenge to find acceptable job opportunities This dilemma is actually very common in today's family with two wage earners If you or someone you know is in this situation, I hope the ideas listed below may be helpful in finding new employment

- 1 Prepare your resume as soon as you and your spouse have made the decision to relocate
- 2 Begin your job search while still employed, if possible
- Check to see if your present employer has a facility, or a customer, or supplier in your new city who would value a referral from your company

Subscribe to newspapers in the new city before you move Most papers will mail to out-of-town subscribers This will enable you to become acquainted with the kinds of job opportunities that exist

- Ask the personnel department of your spouse's firm for the 5 names of search firms and employment agencies who may be able to help you
- Ask for a testimonial letter from your employer on company stationery
- If you are in a licensed profession, check with the appropriate state office in your new state to see what requirements are necessary in order to become licensed If you investigate early, you may be able to cut down the lead time needed to become re-established
- 8 Notify potential employers that your relocation expenses are covered This will help you compete with local applicants
