## **Booher leaving for state job**

Nearly seven months after saying she would fulfill the remaining three years of her contract, Plymouth-Canton Schools Superintendent Kathleen Booher announced Tuesday afternoon she'll be leaving to accept a position with the Michigan Association of School Administrators in Lansing

The Board of Education, after an executive session to work out details of releasing Booher from her contract, accepted the resignation effective July

In reading a prepared statement, Booher said. "I have been fortunate to be able to serve the students of this community for the past 2-1/2 years I have had the pleasure of working alongside countless children, teens, parents and caring community members toward intensifying our focus on the over-arching goal of educating chil dren

"I have been warmly received by the members of all employee groups and am proud of the fact that together, we have been able to significantly improve labor management relations and morale during these years "

Booher's departure comes at a time when some community members are critical of the superintendent for not communicating with them concerning teacher layoffs and budget cutbacks There is speculation Booher **Kathleen Booher** wanted out before

next week's school board elections, anticipating additions to the Board of Education of candidates who will make

it harder for her to operate However, Booher said none of those reasons dictated her leaving

"I was definitely not looking, because in the months between October and now I have had at least three opportunities to apply for superintendent positions, which I have declined," she said

"This is an opportunity that emerged now It's very good timing for me to be able, at this point in my career, to make that kind of a switch," she said "It's a great time for me to move into a statewide role where I can be of help to

After receiving more than a dozen complaints from residents, Plymouth Township Supervisor Steve Mann will ask the board of trustees Tuesday if they want to open an ethics investiga tion into trustee Abe Munfakh

Munfakh has come under fire recent ly for his company's involvement in discussions between Salem Township and the Detroit Water and Sewerage 6 Department about adding Salem to the water system Munfakh's engineering firm, Ayres Lewis Norris & May, is consulting with Salem Township as it tries to figure out how to get water to a part of the township where Johnson Controls Inc is going to build its new facility

Plymouth Township already suffers from water pressure problems and Mann believes adding Salem Township to the system without considering the





### Teachers, district reach tentative agreement

An incentive-laden, four-year tentative contract agreement has been reached between Plymouth-Canton Schools and the Plymouth-Canton Education Association, the district's largest union with more than 1,000 members Both sides agree the contract is

unparalleled, containing incentives that could boost the annual pay increases each year of the agreement

According to Ray Bihun, the district's executive director of human resources, the contract calls for pay hikes of 2 75 the first year and 2 percent each of the next two years, with a wage reopener the fourth year

"It's a unique contract because some of the numbers are based on contingencies," he said "If we get a certain number of students in the district, the education association gets an additional quarter percent If we hold health care costs down, they get an extra quarter percent"

Chuck Portelli said the contract was reached three weeks ago during intense negotiations with facilitators The delay came in putting the settlement in writing

"We're recommending a 'yes' vote by our membership," said Portelli "I think, overall, the membership will be happy with the total package

Bihun added, "They're good numbers It's a good settlement "

Negotiations were held May 1-8 For the first time, negotiators used inter-

PCEA president and chief negotiator est-based bargaining, which allows for both sides to discuss topics at the negotiating table, with each side introducing solutions to outstanding issues

> The contract is a compliment to both sides, interest-based bargaining, and the two facilitators who helped us," said Portelli "It was helpful to have two impartial people throughout bar gaining to keep the process moving "

### Couple escapes injury as runaway garbage truck plows into house

Ila Marsee said she's felt a couple of small earthquakes during her years living at the corner of Penniman and Auburn in Plymouth

Monday morning, just before 9 a m, while getting out of the shower, Marsee, 78, again had thoughts of earthquakes


"I was absolutely hysterical, towels were flying everywhere and a truck was outside the window," she said "With my bad foot I could hardly walk, but I ran from the bathroom to the bed room

The loud bang outside Marsee's house, which pushed her bathtub away from the wall and damaged support beams, was actually from a garbage truck which drove into her house

According to Police Chief Wayne Carroll, the driver of the Republic Waste truck was standing in the vehicle driving east on Penniman while attempting a left turn onto Auburn

"The driver fell out of the truck and the vehicle continued on without him," said Carroll "It struck the house, but fortunately no one inside was injured, and neither was the driver "





### **Full circle** Avon walkers raise millions for cause

An empty circle formed at the beginning of the Avon 3-Day Breast Cancer Walk in Ann Arbor arrived in Farmington Hills Sunday, with nearly 3,500 walkers who joined family and friends at the Costick Activities Center on 11 Mile Road

One of the walkers was Darleen Prool of Plymouth Township

"It was an incredible spiritual experience for me,' Prool said "I feit privileged to be among the walkers and to walk next to survivors, their families and friends The support of the communities we walked through was overwhelming, cheering stations full of people holding up signs, thanking us for walking I was in tears most of the time Blisters, road rash, porta-potties, and sleeping on the ground seem pretty insignificant in the entire scheme of things"

Men and women from across the state participated in the 60 mile trek, which also moved them through Canton, Livonia and Plymouth, netted \$5 25 million The first-ever Michigan event was among 13 held across

the country, raising approximately \$115 million for breast cancer research, patient care, support services education and early detection programs

The empty circle, which held memories of loved ones lost to cancer, "now holds our memories of the past three days," said Nancy Mercurio, a walker who committed to all 13 events

Cars were parked in every available space along the shoulder and on sidestreets as sup porters poured onto the soccer fields around a large stage They carried posters, balloons, bouquets of roses and spring flowers and many wore t-shirts proudly proclaiming support for their "crew"

As music boomed from tall speakers, the walkers arrived, walking arm in arm They crowded in front of the stage, many taking off their sneakers and holding them high as they danced in celebration

But there were many somber reminders of the cause they sup-

#### ported

"At opening ceremonies, from when we took our first step on Friday morning to where we are now, somewhere in America, 244 lives were lost to breast cancer," said Jennifer Accord, who represented Avon

She also announced the Avon Foundation had awarded a \$500,000 grant to the Barbara Ann Karmanos Cancer Institute The Institute's chief operating officer Rosemary Gilchrist of Clarkston, also a walker, noted it had been 30 years since the National Cancer Act of 1971 declared war on cancer

Passed in December of that year, the legislation authorized the first cancer centers and established an international cancer research data bank She said the Institute, which already treats 10,000 women annually, would be able to do thousands more cancer screenings and enroll an additional 200 women in drug trial programs

"With the help of the Avon Foundation, we will, God-willing, save lives," Gilchrist said She thanked the volunteers, their families and support systems, adding, "You truly are our heroes"

Greene, the commission's OVDA haison, said none of her selections for the board were appointed, and she wasn't aware of the new appointments before the meeting


"I was surprised I wasn't informed about the appointments before the meeting," said Greene "It must have been an oversight or mix-up in communication"

### Township chief presents reorganization package

When the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees hired Tom Tiderington as their new police chief six months ago, they asked him to find a way for the depart ment to do more with less

On Tuesday night Tiderington sat before the board with a plan he believes accomplishes just that

Tiderington proposed adding two new lieutenants and reorganizing much of what the township does, and offered a new way to prove they're doing more with less a new coalition called the Western Wayne Community Response team

Tiderington believes the department needs more supervision and better facilities He said the township is already lower than the national average in terms of staffing, but that more can be done

The department is operating under bare minimums in terms of staffing " said Tiderington 'We only have two officers at to respond to multiple incidents While the national average is

2 1 officers for every 1 000 resi dent Plymouth Township oper ates with about one officer for every 1,000 residents Tidering ton still believes the township can better service its residents despite the manpower shortage

He proposed promoting two officers to heutenant, giving the department a total of three One would be appointed assistant chief and given duties ranging from records and communica tions to technology and grant writing

The other two would be dayand night shift command officers who would also be responsible for helping craft department strategies involving patrol activities, investigations and fleet management among other things

'I really believe there should be 24 hour a day supervision Tiderington said "This plan doesn't give it to us, but it does increase the level of supervision "

Tiderington also unveiled a night, and that makes it difficult plan for a new coalition --- the

Western Wayne Community Response Team — designed to cross jurisdictional boundaries and help departments in Ply mouth Northville and Canton prevent crime


The team would help do surveillance and other police work none of the departments has the funding for on their own

Right now we re reactive Tiderington said We want this team to be pro active We want them out there preventing crime

Tiderington said there will be no added cost to the township which hopes to fund its participation through grant money But the new chief left no doubt he feels potential funding problems shouldn t get in the way

Even if we don t (get grants) I think we need to do this ' Tider ington told the board In conver sations with other officers I ve found out that Plymouth Town ship has been using (county services) for a long time Its time for us to step up and be part of the solution instead of just taking from the system "





residents who elected him by representing Salem Township in a move that is against Plymouth's best interests Munfakh has acknowledged his company is consulting with Salem, but said he isn't personally taking part in any of the discussions

Munfakh's name does appear on the sign-in sheet for a meeting that took place back in February, but he has said he did not stay at the meeting and was only there for a short time to perform an introduction of parties at the meeting

Mann also believes Munfakh's

involvement violates the township's ethics policy Since the township board also serves as the ethics committee, Mann will present the option to board members at Tuesday's meeting

"I think we have a responsibility to look into it," Mann said "I'm not saying there's any wrong-doing at this point I'm saying there's an allegation, and there's some support that may show (Munfakh) had some involvement"

Munfakh thinks the supervisor's decision is an over-reaction

"I don't believe I've conducted

myself in an unethical way," Munfakh said "It's unfortunate that what's happening here is that people are trying to hurt me in a political way I think it also reflects on the administration When the new administration took over, Johnson Controls was happy Now they won't talk to us What does that tell you?"

But even if the township's ethics committee finds Munfakh violated the ethics policy, there's not much anyone can do about it According to officials at the Michigan Township Association, the board has no authority to remove Mun fakh

"That's why ethics policies are only as effective as the board members agreeing to comply with them," said Catherine Mullhaupt, member information haison for the MTA "No one can remove an elected board member, or someone appointed to an elected position, other than them resigning, or being recalled, or simply not being re-elected "

Apparently there is enough support for conducting an ethics investigation At least four of the seven trustees polled by the

Observer say they would support such a course of action

"I think it's necessary," trustee Chuck Curmi said "We need to clear the air and find out the truth We're getting a lot of citizen inquiries, and I don't know how to answer them This would provide those answers "

Clerk Marilyn Massengill said she'd support an investigation, which she believes could benefit Munfakh

"There should be one, if for no other reason than to clear up the situation so (Munfakh) is not left out in left field with

people discussing things that may or may not be true," Massengill said "I think it could help him "

Trustee Ron Griffith, however, said there's not enough evidence or information to warrant such an investigation





It's a modification of the old adage, but it holds true in the case of Kathleen Booher, who announced Tuesday she's found other employment The announcement came barely seven months after she decided to stay on the job following a groundswell of support from community leaders including Plymouth Township Supervisor Steve Mann and Canton Township Supervisor Tom Yack

Apparently, time flies quickly in Booher's world, because seven months later, she has turned her back on the people who came out in support of her

Surely, you remember the brouhaha Phony e mails Critics denigrating her every move The frustrated announcement that she'd seek work somewhere she could be more effective, where her every decision wasn't criticized within an inch of its life

Then came a meeting where many community and civic leaders pledged their sup port to Booher Residents showed up en masse at one city commission meeting to blame a former city commissioner for his part in Booher's decision to leave

The show of unity and support swayed Booher and persuaded her to stay

"With the support in place, where this community said resoundingly we want to continue to work with you, I took all that to heart and have no doubts now the silent majority is not going to be silent should we encounter the types of problems we encoun tered most recently " she said

At the time Booher gave her commit ment to remain in Plymouth Canton at least another three years Apparently that was in doggie years

The challenges of making things work in Plymouth-Canton, a huge school district with little state funding compared to other, smaller but richer districts are enormous Frankly, it takes a huge level of dedication. courage and strength to take them on Booher promised to give it all of that, then reneged

displayed their support and remained loyal to Booher, despite mounting concerns about her management style and her willingness to communicate, could have expressed their feelings about her departure

But in another move by a school board being increasingly dogged about the manner in which it communicates with its residents, this measure was taken in a hastily called closed session which we believe, by the way, violated the Open Meetings Act

There is no provision in the act that allows for the superintendent of a public school system to resign behind the cloak of a closed session The board can close the meeting to the public for a variety of reasons, including collective bargaining, personnel matters including discipline, termination or evaluation, or the discussion of settlement strategy in pending litigation


Booher's contract is a personal services contract, not one that fits under the collective bargaining provision of the Open Meetings Act

The decision to allow Booher to resign in secret could work against her loyalists on the board Two four year seats are up for grabs, and the two people leaving the board - former presidents Darwin Watts and Sue Davis — both were pretty solid in their support of Booher

Booher's decision could have a substan tial impact on who gets elected Monday, depending on how much change the com munity decides it wants from the way business is done now

We wish Booher well in her new position Someone who has dedicated her life to the education of children certainly has earned the right to pursue a career

But the people left to start over have rights too They have a right to a superin tendent who isn't going to flee, a CEO who relishes the challenge of providing the qual ity education Plymouth Canton kids get with an ever-restrictive budget We urge the school board to find a new superintendent who will pledge his or her efforts and loyalty to the district, one who will promise to stay and fight the good fight for the children of this community And mean it

\* Recent polls bore this out While twothirds of Americans are planning spring and summer vacations, an overwhelming 82 percent say they plan to take them in the continental United States, according to a survey by RoperASW, a market research consulting firm Some 69 percent of the people in the late-April survey expressed confidence in commercial airlines, up from 44 percent after the attacks But most said they would stay close to home, two-thirds said they hadn't made plans and wouldn't likely do so until the last minute

That's actually good news for the Michigan tourism industry, which relies heavily on people who travel by car, either from within the state's boundaries or our Midwestern neighbors From Mackinac Island to Monroe, there are enough summer hot spots to keep area residents busy well past Labor Day

### <sup>•</sup>U-M's selection of Coleman case study in search process

Last week, the board of regents picked Mary Sue Coleman to be the 13th (and first woman) president of the University of Michigan A nationally ranked biochemist and cancer researcher, Dr Coleman had been president of the University of Iowa

The story of the search is instructive The regents appointed a 16-member advisory committee, chaired by Graduate School Dean Earl Lewis, which included faculty, staff, students



and alumni Working confidentially, the committee winnowed a list of around 200 names down to less than 10, many already sitting presidents of other universities This list was presented to the regents, who met behind closed doors with their advisors

The regents then made their own background checks, privately calling around to get the skinny on the various

candidates Still working in secret, the regents interviewed Dr Coleman twice They consulted among themselves about Dr Coleman's credentials and record in office, evaluating it against the needs of the University of Michigan A subcommittee finally flew to Iowa City, where they unanimously offered her the job She accepted immediately and was warmly greeted by the university community

Sounds like the search proceeded in a sane, sensible and effective way

It was not always thus I served on the board of regents during the searches that resulted in the appointments as president of James Duderstadt and Lee Bollinger During both searches, the regents were sued by various newspapers for alleged violations of the Michigan Open Meetings Act, which appeared to require that whatever the regents did in picking a new president be done in public

The last time around, an Ann Arbor judge even ordered regents not to make telephone calls to check out candidates, not to consult in private with the advisory committee or each other, not to interview various candidates

Because the court ordered both searches to proceed in public, no — not one! — sitting president was willing to let their name go forward on the short list Presidents I talked with during both searches told me they would be thrilled to be con sidered for the U-M presidency, one of the prime jobs in higher education But they all said they would decline to let their name go forward for fear of creating troubles with their present universities

Hamstrung from carrying out their constitu

tional responsibility to find the best possible president for the U-M, the regents both times picked insiders with whom they had direct familiarity, Duderstadt was the sitting provost of the university, while Bollinger had been the longtime dean of the law school

Many worried that if the courts continued to interpret the Open Meetings Act strictly, public universities in Michigan would be systematically disadvantaged in competing with private universities for high quality talent to run the show Eventually, in 1999, the Michigan Supreme Court ruled that the Open Meetings Act did not apply to university boards making presidential searches Since then, both Eastern Michigan University and the U-M have chosen new presidents essentially in secret

grousing about the court's decision They continue to argue that the public has a "right" to inspect all details of presidential searches and that if university boards can't identify and recruit good candidates under those conditions it's their own fault

Dr Coleman, for one, offers evidence to the contrary Immediately after her selection was announced, she said that she would have not allowed her name to be considered for the job if the search had been in public Regent David Brandon told me that the U-M search "will be a case study about how to do a good search process We picked a great president We had available an incredibly talented pool of sitting presidents We protected the integrity of our university and the confidentiality of those who were interested "

It seems to me the evidence is conclusive The Supreme Court made the right choice back in 1999 Public universities in Michigan – not to mention kids, families, alumni and the entire state – are better off now that boards can carry out sane, sensible and effective searches for leadership talent

occasion that Plymouth is a funny place when it comes to its politics

It doesn't matter what race you look at, or who the candidates are If you could bottle and sell spin doctorin', you'd be a millionaire

Take the race for the state House in the 20th district, currently held by Rep John Stewart, (R-Plymouth Township) Stewart didn't get into the House the easy way He had a protracted, fairly nasty fight with Teresa Folino of Northville, who claimed victory no matter what anyone else (read official election counters) said She forced a recount, and actually went to the newcomers' breakfast they sponsor in Lansing for the newly elected representatives

So getting there wasn't all that simple for Stewart, and you couldn't have blamed him for figuring on being able to stay After all, Gerald Law, invisible in Plymouth for most of his tenure, got to stay six years

Then along comes Jonathon Grant of Plymouth, a Republican unhappy with the way Stewart is doing the job Stewart calls himself a "Milliken Republican," and to Grant that apparently means "Democrat in Republican clothing" It's not the first time Stewart has heard the charge, former Plymouth mayor Dave McDonald said the same thing two years ago, before finishing third in his own city and falling from the face of the Earth

Grant has tried a "go where he was, go where he is, and go where he is going to be" campaign strategy He's taken Stewart on at least once, at a Republican-sponsored forum, and last week challenged him to a series of three debates

Stewart politely declined, saying that they've already tangled once, and Stewart knows of at least one other forum at which they'll face off Probably the right move for Stewart, why give an opponent even more shots than he's already getting

The folks who are backing Stewart, though, aren't taking as calm an approach In addition to using the wrong name occasionally, they're putting out material that contains a nugget of truth while distorting everything else

For instance, a letter was sent to Wayne County Sheriff Robert Ficano containing material found on Grant's Web site, (www allplymouth com) The letter pointed out the graphic nature of the material, and certainly left the interpretation open that it was Grant who posted the material The letter also asked for a criminal investigation A lawyer for Ficano s office prepared a letter for Ficano, which the sheriff signed, that essentially agreed the material was offensive, but also not criminal

Using guilt by association and Ficano's letter, Stewart's supporters tried painting Grant as offensive What they failed to point out, however, is that Grant was *not* responsible for posting any of the material, although in an exercise of free speech he did allow it to be posted

A month later, the same Ficano staffer who drew up the original letter wrote a memo to Ficano, telling the sheriff he'd been, if not duped, misled by Stewart's supporters "It was my impression the correspondence was confidential in nature It was never my intent to engage in either support for, nor to provide negative material against, any candidate in a political race," wrote Jimmie Byrd

But that's what was done with the letter It was used in a fashion to lead voters to believe Ficano thought Grant offensive

It's a tactic the people backing Stewart have used before During the city commission race, published letters apparently written by former US Rep Carl Pursell and current State Sen Thaddeus McCotter, (R-Livonia) appeared to support certain candidates, when in fact both letters had been used to mislead

Of course, it didn't do the city commission candidate any good He finished dead last, perhaps an omen to which Stewart should pay attention

It must be said there's no direct evidence Stewart either knew about any of this, or condoned it And the funny thing is, there are other venues on which to attack Grant that should render personal attacks like this one irrelevant

Grant has never voted in a school board election, and his voting record in city elections isn't much better He favors charter schools, Stewart doesn't

There's plenty of grist there in the issues The candidates should go find it, rather than engage in these personal attacks Look how much good it did for former city commissioner Dave Byers Byers was backed by the same people now backing Stewart, and they attacked Byers' opponents in the same sordid fashion Byers, an incumbent with a bright political future, was not re-elected after finishing third in the primary, and hasn't been heard from since

### Annual river rescue gets people involved

A computer monitor, a stop sign, half of a grocery cart and the occasional tire were just a few of the pieces of man-made debris Plymouth and Canton residents extracted from the Rouge River on Saturday during the 16th Annual River Day/Rouge Rescue

Sponsored by Friends of the Rouge, the move to clean, preserve and beautify the river took place all across the Metro Detroit area In Plymouth and Canton, clean up efforts were just as much about maintaining clear waterways as they were about educating the community about the importance of conserv ing the crucial headwaters of the Rouge

"The main goal is just to get the public involved with the habitat," said Bob Belair, assis tant Canton Township engineer "Working out here to clean the river gives people a sense of self involvement and self pride "

Plymouth Building Official Jim Penn, who has organized the event in Plymouth for the last 16 years the city has participated, said River Day was about making people aware of the river that runs through the community's backyard

'Initially we did it (Rouge clean-up) to just try and make a difference Now it's a way to get people interested in the river," he said

According to Belair, the quality of the river in Western-Wayne County areas like Canton is "most definitely improving" He said officials in Canton regularly test the water for substances such as E coli, dissolved oxygen and nitrates, and results have improved over the last six to seven years

"The upper branch of the river is in fair condition," he said "We don't have a lot of residential run-off in this area "

At Flodin Park in Canton, about 25 volunteers from the local Yazakı Corp worked alongside more than 40 local homeowners, high school students and area Boy Scouts to free the river of obstructive natural debris and man-made garbage

Salem High School Student Kate Vining, 15, was part of an assembly line hauling branches and other refuse from the Flodin site, where five major log jams were obstructing water flow

"I think it's amazing what we find in here," she said as she tossed another piece of trash onto the five-foot pile of debris that had been accumulating since work efforts began at 8 a m "It's pretty disturbing to think people throw all this junk in the water when we need it to be clean "

At Lions Park in Plymouth, 8year-old Cub Scout Phillip Commissaris of Bird Elementary School Pack 293, was surprised by the rusty old stapler he found buried in the muddy banks of the river

"I think it's kinda bad that someone just threw this in the water," he said

Commissaris joined about 40 other scouts and their parents as well as workers from the 35th District Court in cleaning this section of the Rouge

Groups of people also spent time stenciling neighborhood storm drains with the warning, "Dump No Waste - Drains to

Rouge River "

According to Pack 293 Cub Master Tom Miller, the children were having a great time cleaning the river and hunting for foreign objects on the banks

'We (parents) didn't want any of the Cubs in the water because of health reasons but believe me, they all wanted to go in," Miller said "It was like a treasure hunt for them

Miller said he overheard one of the Cubs remark, "I'm glad we're saving the world," earlier in the day "You couldn't get them to clean

their rooms, but save the world? They're all for it," Miller said

Cub Scout Scott O'Connor, 10, said he was informed only the day before the event that his pack would be participating in **River** Day

"If I would have found out earher, I would have told all my friends," he said "I like cleaning up – I would do this almost every year"

Then the eye catches a glimpse of another facet of the artist Dozens of birds peck at a larger than life figure in the Gathering of Crows

"The figure behind the crows is sort of a self portrait," said Chatterley "I started doing crows because they've been hanging around the house They dive bomb you when you walk out of the house When I put the monster crow outside, it scared them all away'

Chatterley admits he probably should have given some thought to scale before attempting the bird As always his sense of humor is keen when speaking about the clay art

"The crow in the lobby it took two football players from the high school to help me load it into the kiln," said Chatterley "It takes 200 gallons of propane per piece to fire The clay is made in Detroit from my formula and doesn't shrink a lot

"The hard part for the dog was just getting it in the kiln which is the size of a small car The big blue dog is my studio dog Snoopy who watches me work hour after hour I had a model so I made him

Chatterley often draws on the situ ations surrounding him - that and his readings Spirit Form is reminiscent of totems, in this case stacked with bird-like figures Chatterley's work is recognizable by his signature brown and blue glazes He adds sihcon carbide and sand to the formula which makes it bubble like lava when fired The result is a crater like tex ture that makes the work look as if

"I'm inspired by elements of my life, quantum physics, and repeating forms, said Chatterley "I'm trying to explain what it is to be human, spiritually, emotionally The Spirit Form I was thinking about Shamanic practices, the dream world and spirit world and soul These figures are menacing with the beaks These things could protect themselves I like the duality, the nice and not so nice "

Birds return to Chatterley's work again and again Several years ago. he was selling wheel thrown birdzoid sculptures at the Ann Arbor Street Art Fairs, the most prestigious of the three shows Chatterley began his career as a potter creating large-scale

raku works with figures decorating the exteriors He will talk about the early as well as new work at an ArtReach Luncheon Friday, June 7, at the arts council

"People ask me, so once you've made the biggest crows what's next? I'll probably go back to stacking fig ures Why figures? When I was going to school Abstract Expression was at its height so you have to reject your teachers' work "

### Paul Revere and The Raiders and more rock Freedom Hill

raiding is his game Unlike the original Paul Revere who's life was about industry, politics, and community service, this one was about Rock n' Roll, entertaining, and helping heroes

Revere grew up in Caldwell, Idaho, the youngest of five children He taught himself to play the plano by listening to rhythm and blues songs on the family radio By age 19, Revere had formed Idaho's only rock n' roll band, The Downbeats, and began entertaining dance halls across the Pacific Northwest The Downbeats then became Paul Revere and The Raiders

In the summer of 1971 The Raiders' recording of Indian Reservation sold nearly 4 million

copies, making it the biggest selling record for Columbia Records in 10 years The song was written by a Cherokee Indian and personal friend of Revere's

Kicks, the band's first antidrug song, is also another favorite of Revere's

Though Revere has never had any professional singing or guitar lessons, he believes this is quite the norm for most musical talents

"I think most musicians are self taught," he said "Either you're born with it or not "

At 64, Revere lives with his wife of 23 years in Boise, Idaho They have a 40-year-old daughter and a son, 37, who was also in his band for six years Revere's wife often follows him and his gang across the country with their motor home to support the band and help transport

"We can't carry thousands of CD's on our motorcycles," Revere laughed

Revere and his raiders have presented concerts at least 200 days a year for the last 45 years

"When we started, we played music along the lines of rhythm and blues," he said

But then, in the mid 60s, when the Beatles brought in the English invasion, he said, "Our producers started molding the sound with the current trend,

such as Three Dog Night " "We've recorded everything

you can imagine " But the one song that truly "hits home" with him is Indian Reservation, written by a Cherokee Indian and personal friend of Revere's

"Ride to the Wall," is an annual event in which thousands of motorcyclists from all over the world take a ride up to The Vietnam Veteran's Memorial Wall in Washington D C with Revere on Memorial weekend to support a main cause The effort is to demonstrate for the full accounting of all POW-MIA's, veteran issues and honor the men and women who served in the Vietnam war It is especially held to remember those who gave their

STEPHANIE CASOLA on where the band has been and lives for their country

Just after the ride to Washington, the group does a free concert in front of the Lincoln Memorial All of the net proceeds from this concert and event goes to veteran outreach programs

"Its probably the most rewarding concert we've ever done," Revere said "It will remain my project till I die,"

Within the Ride to the Wall album, released about a year ago, there are three original songs that were written by actual veterans

In addition to being a legendary rock singer and active motorcyclist, Revere likes to ski with his wife in winter

Most of his band members, although not original, have been playing with Revere for a long time, including one of his guitar players, a Raider for 29 years

Revere says a variety of age groups attend his concerts

"In most markets, there's usually an oldies station, so kids are

exposed to it," he said

"There's a lot of kids who enjoy the original rock sound Most of the parents probably live in a time warp like me and listen to the stuff they grew up with "

The chemistry of Revere's fun loving personality has been a major force in the Raider's popularity Known as "The Last Madman of Rock n' Roll," Paul mixes up comedy with his high energy brand of Rock n' Roll music

"We just try to have a big party," he says

### Bluegrass, classical meet in **Beverly Hills DSO concert**

If you think classical and bluegrass music are on two separate ends of the musical spectrum, think again

The two genres actually get along very well and two legendary, "classical crossover" musical artists — double bass virtuoso Edgar Meyer and master will prove the point in a special presentation of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra

Scheduled for 8 p m, Thursday, June 13, at the Seligman Family Performing Arts Center in Beverly Hills, the DSO is calling the event an "informance" because it will combine an informal music performance and an informative discussion with the musicians

Meyer and Marshall are worldclass artists who have collaborated over the last several years on fusing classical, bluegrass and other traditional musical styles, to great critical and popular acclaim, most notably on the Grammy-nominated album Short Trip Home They will discuss the seemingly unlikely marriage of

classical and bluegrass music Larry McDaniel, host of the popular bluegrass program on WDET-FM, Arkansas Traveler, will be on hand to lead the discussion

The event will be presented in conjunction with the DSO's E-concert Initiative, a program that encourages enhanced understanding of music that is performed on the DSO's Classical Subscription Series The Meyer-Marshall Informance ties into the classical concerts that the DSO will perform on June 15-16 in which Meyer will be the featured soloist He will perform his own Double Bass Concerto which explores the intersection of other musical styles with classical music These concerts will take place at the Detroit Opera House while construction continues on the Orchestra Hall expansion project Meyer and Marshall, along with Bela Fleck on banjo, formed a trio in the late 1990s in which they performed original compositions that explored the relationship between classical and bluegrass music The trio released a

well-received CD in 1997 titled Uncommon Ritual That was followed by the creation of a quartet, comprise of Meyer, Marshall, violinist Joshua Bell and legendary bluegrass mandolinist and fiddler Sam Bush, that collaborated on a unique fusion of classical and bluegrass musical styles Their album, Short Trip Home, released in 1999, was nominated for a Grammy Award in the category of Best Classical Crossover album and the group was subsequently invited to perform live at the 42nd annual Grammy awards

Whet your appetite at home with The Hustler, The Verdict or Hombre

Two great Paul Newman movies and one good one can serve as a prelude to *Perdition*, Newman's first big, heavyweight drama in years, which pairs him with Tom Hanks

The 1961 classic The Hustler stars Newman as a pool shark who gets harsh life lessons (For the Tom Cruise-fixated, think prequel to The Color of Money) » Newman is electrifying in 1982's The Verdict as a boozy

lawyer with a shot at redemption

The 1967 Western Hombre stars Newman as a white man raised by Indians who becomes reluctant hero for a stagecoach full of bigots The Hustler has the best DVD bonuses, among them entertaining analyses of the film's trick pool shots and audio commentary with cast, crew and others, including the daughter of director

Robert Rossen and occasional remarks from Newman DVDs, \$19 98 each (20th Century Fox)

#### Victor/Victoria, S.O.B., The Great Race, Skin Deep

There's plenty of good and bad to be had (often within the same movie) in these comedies from director Blake Edwards Victor/Victoria is the crowd-pleaser, a delight that stars Edwards' wife, Julie Andrews, as a woman pretending to be a man pretending to be a female impersonator The underrated SOB features Andrews, William Holden and Richard Mulligan in a scathing Hollywood sature that boasts some of Edwards funniest moments Jack Lemmon, Tony Curtis and Natalie Wood lead the way in the 1960s chase flick The Great Race

In today's restaurant lingo, Baja Fresh service is called "fast casual" Meaning, you place an order, then receive a number When it's called, you pick up the made to order items to eat in at one of the 110 seats or take out The eat-in atmosphere is bright and contemporary with an exhibition kitchen, some high top tables and others that are standard size All elements stand out against black and white tiled floors

In an easy going style, food is served on sectioned black plastic plates with sturdy plastic flatware It's the same for take out items with the exception that they are covered with a plastic dome If your preference is take out, you can call ahead, then pay, grab it and go A serve yourself Salsa Bar has addition-



The best aspect of Baja Fresh is choice Adults can eat light or if they're hungry, order the huge Burrito "Dos Manos," so named because you need two hands to get it to your mouth It can be ordered as charbroiled chicken or steak with black or pinto beans, rice, grilled peppers, chilis, omions, cheese, sour cream with both Pico de Gallo and Salsa Baja Any Burrito can be ordered "Enchilado" style, that is topped with melted jack and cheddar cheeses and Enchilado (that s not spelled incorrectly, it's a trademarked name)Salsa Lettuce, tomato and sour cream are on the side



### Woman's experience points to need for lemon law

am about to show you an E mail I received from a homeowner but before I do so, I want to point out that I have received many like it or even more pronounced I have many times complained about the quality of major home appliances and I speak for the whole of the service industry when I make the regular statement, ' they don t build 'em like they used to

Karın writes I was wondering if you had any advice you could give me on getting action against a manufacture I purchased a certain refrigerator with ice maker/filter system in October of 1996 from a certain store This was one of their top- of- the- line refrigerators at the time (it was not cheap)

I have had in the past the compressor replaced In the past six weeks, I have had service come out to fix the refrigerator and now they are coming out for a fourth time tomorrow The repairmen have at times been at my house for over five hours trying to fix it, each time saying it is fixed I have lost hundreds of dollars worth of food

I have spoken to the company many times without getting any help. They did extend my warranty for another year and gave me a form to fill out pertaining to my loss of food, which would only cover up to \$50

When I spoke with them last week regarding the problem and asked the Customer Service person to please transfer me to someone that can help me, she put back to the main menu I spent another 10 minutes of pushing buttons and waiting on line for some one to answer Needless to say, I became frustrated I in turn E mailed the company and explained my frustration and problem with their product I have yet to receive a response and my three children are also becoming frustrated with this situation I m tired of the phone calls that get me no where and all the time waiting around for a repair person to come I was wondering if I am entitled to a new fridge ( lemon law )? Can you help? First of all, let me say that I wish I could help you, but I can't because I'm just one guy It is only recently that the manufacturers are beginning to pay notice of what I do and just maybe in time, I will be able to do something for consumers For now, I would like to point out the person that can help you and that is the store you purchase the appliance from With the purchasing power they have they are the ones who should talk to the company on your behalf Because they have failed to do so up to this point I would suggest that you spend your hard earned dollars someplace else the next time you need an appliance Isn't it a crying shame that a company can spend millions of dollars in advertising to bring you into their stores and then be so stupid as to alienate the very person who can enhance their end dollar figure I predict that consumers will some day do what is being done in Japan Go on the Internet and have chat rooms where everyone describes their horror story with an appliance company The strength of numbers might cause manufacturers to take a second look on how they do business Stay tuned

Yvonne and John Iuppenlatz s personal favorite plants can be seen throughout their mature, one- and a- half acre Franklin gar den

"My favorite plant is the hosta with hydrangeas a close second,' said Yvonne 'I probably have over 250 hostas and more than 50 hydrangeas John's favorite plant is the rhododendron and he has at least 50

Their garden is one of the stops on the June 12 Franklin Garden Walk The gardens visitors will see on the walk are very diverse and include a colorful cottage garden, wildlife gar den with all native species organic garden that both feeds and entertains a whole family of active gardeners, and the Iuppenlatzs gar den, which includes many plants, such as hostas, that flourish in the shade

The Iuppenlatz's garden began 37 years ago when John began planting along the then gravel road that runs in front of the house to block out road noise and dust Now the tall white spruce trees, a puiple beech and additional evergreens tower over that shady area Several varieties of small shrubs such as Leucothoe with pendulous clusters of small, fragrant white flowers holly ferns including Christmas and Japanese are also here Perennials such as astilbe plumonaria and wildflowers are tucked in appropriate places

An euvonomus grows along the front walk, which Yvonne prunes to keep a natural look At the corner of the driveway another pink dogwood catches the eye as does a stately Dawn redwood, which stands at the top of a sloping hill As the ground becomes level with the rest of the yard wide border gardens con tinue around the perimeter of the property Light pink deep red white and purple rho dodendrons make a colorful scene In fact rhododendrons azaleas hostas and hydrangens are repeated in many of the beds

Last year John added azaleas to the garden, with blooms of bright pink, deep red, yellow and orange Yvonne says "The key to growing these acid loving plants is to give them proper exposure, not a western exposure acidic soil and to fertilize as needed "

A variety of hydrangeas grow happily along with the above plants such as a lace cap with flat clusters of bluish violet blooms surrounded by white flowers The climbing specimens of hydrangeas, with lace like white flowers, scramble up and over an old brick grill that is no longer used and up several trees to add texture The couple purchases most of these from Oregon others locally They plant them



#### Arch support

In January I wrote about the vines growing in Jan Zikakis' garden in Troy Her husband, George has devised a method to

inhibit rust from forming on the metal arches "I purchased one 10-foot sec-

tion of electrical conduit just large enough in diameter to fit around the 'legs of the arches," he said

'I used a hacksaw to cut 24inch pieces and used four for each arch I hammered them into the ground leaving 1 foot out of the ground I then set the arch into the conduit

"The first rung of the arch keeps the legs' from going too far into the conduit, consequently the arch is a bit higher and the metal of the arch doesn't touch the ground, because it's encased in the conduit'





tall viburnum lantana Mohican.' and other evergreens make a tall privacy fence along the lot lines so a sense of serenity per meates the gardens


#### Patio view

At the back of the house one can look over the complete landscape A brand new patio, made of tan pavers, 1s placed between two flower beds One contains the pink dogwood, mentioned earlier, peonies, pine trees, and rhododendrons, while the opposite bed contains a very tall, White pines, tamarisk trees, a mature locust tree with both a

climbing hydrangea and clematis clinging to it This bed is devoted to hostas A small Japanese maple adds a deep color This bed is edged with Michigan sandstone

Nearby, a very long, low garage/storage building houses all the equipment needed to keep everything in tip top condition Along the front of this building another bed contains still more flowers, iris, day lilies, and regular lilies (a new inter est) On the far side of this building is the 'sick bay,' where plants that aren't doing well are put until they are ready to rejoin the other plants This area gets some sun and protected shade Speaking of this, several of the plants have been rescued from stores at the last minute and now thrive in this lovely garden

Several yards beyond the edge of the round patio, which they designed by using hoses to define its shape, is John's gar den It runs from the back of the lot and undulates directly up the middle of the yard It is edged with the same sandstone as

mentioned before Their son, Steve, laid the stones for both beds Their other son Mark lives out of state "Both, says Yvonne, "are big time gardeners"

This large bed, approximately 14 by 40 feet is a focal point and is filled with many of the same plants already mentioned A Stewartia is an attractive

accent with its white blooms A witch Hazel is a delight when its yellow blooms appear in late winter Rhus Sumach, an excellent filler plant, 1s also here Rhus is a large group of deciduous and evergreen shrubs and trees, most often grown for their spring and fall foliage

The couple designed their gar

dens together and they both enjoy working in them John says, "It's practically become an obsession "He edges all the beds, takes care of his special ones and mows and cares for the lawn He also makes his own compost Yvonne has free reign over the rest

When the ground is frozen, the beds are mulched with pine needles and/or oak leaves Burlap is wrapped around the more tender plants in the winter Wood fines (extra finely chopped wood) is used as much as a mulch to suppress weeds and add beauty

Because of the intense planting, the shade, and the hostas, Yvonne applies the product, Deadline, several times a year to eliminate slugs She warns, "It's very caustic and should be used with care "

The plants are labeled to help with identification Look for your favorites A bonus awaits when you arrive at the back area Yvonne plants many, many colorful hanging baskets near the door Don't miss the display

### Learning about bipolar disorder

Batric/psychological illness characterized by alternating extreme mood states At one end of the spectrum are severe depressive episodes and at the other end are drastic manic episodes

Many famous people are now thought to have suffered from this disorder, discovered through medical biographies These include the artist Vincent Van Gogh, the writer Ernest Hemingway, and the actor Patty Duke

Bipolar Disorder is a recurring disorder, which means that once it appears there is a high likelihood that it will return More than 90 percent of individuals who have had a single manic episode go on to have future episodes of mania and depression

Recent studies in the United States indicate that Bipolar Disorder is equally common in men and women, and there have no been reports of a differential incidence of the disorder based on race or ethnicity

The disorder is usually seen first in young adulthood but can certainly occur in adolescence Ten to 15 percent of adolescents with recurring depressive episodes will go on to develop Bipolar Disorder as adults

Also, Bipolar Disorder can coexist with other psychiatric/psychological disturbances and can be masked by alcoholism Many alcoholics who quit drinking in later life will show the emergence of extreme fluctuations of mood, characteristic of Bipolar Disor der within a year or two



tress or impairment in social, occupational or other important areas of functioning These symptoms can be

- Depressed mood most of the day nearly every day
- Markedly diminished interests or pleasure in activities
- Significant weight and sleep changes
- Fatigue or loss of energy
- Feelings of worthlessness or excessive inappropriate guilt
- Diminished ability to concentrate
- Increased indecisiveness
   Recurring thoughts of death with or without suicidal ideas

In contrast, criteria for a manic episode include

- A distinct period of abnormally and persistently elevated or irritable mood with an inflated self esteem or feelings of grandiosity
- A decreased need for sleep
- Being more talkative and giddy
- Having increased distractibility
- Involving oneself in excessive pleasurable activities that have a high potential for bad consequences, such as spending sprees, sexual indiscretions, and driving erratically This manic mood disturbance is sufficiently severe to cause marked impairment in occupational and social functioning

These types of depressive episodes usually last much longer (weeks or months) compared to the briefer manic episodes (hours, days or a week or so)

When individuals must be "committed" to a psychiatric hospital by relatives, it is usually because of manic depressive illness or schizophrenia, which represent the two classes of most severe mental illness

#### Treatment

Crude, early treatments for this disorder were seen in "asylums," with seclusion and rest for the depressed and shackling and containment for the manic

In the 1930s Lithium was discovered to have a calming effect on agitation in experimental studies on guinea pigs The first attempts at trying this compound were with manic individuals and marked calmness was induced



season, were pretty solid in the field against the Lions in Saturday's state district semifinal But the few mistakes they made were big ones


And Salem's inability to manufacture baserunners made those errors bulge in importance, eventually costing the Rocks in a 3-2 loss







# Warrior hurdler is 1st at state; Salem star 4th

Lutheran High Westland's Rob Greer thought he had his life all mapped out

Following graduation he was headed to culinary arts school in New York He worked nine months as a cook at Bamboozle's Restaurant in Farmington Hills Greer likes to prepare Italian dishes

But something changed his mind on Saturday

"Right now I'm second-guessing himself after going to the state meet," said the senior, who captured the 300-meter intermediate hurdles at the Division IV boys track finals Saturday at Grand Rapids Forest Hills Northern "Track 1s part of my life and I feel I still have a lot in me'

At the Division I boys finals at Rockford HS, Plymouth Salem's Justin Hajduk raced to a fourthplace finish in the 3,200-meter run Hajduk was clocked at 9 32 80 Novi's Tim Moore was first in 9 21 90

Greer, who is now considering going to Concordia University (Neb ), set the meet record at 392, breaking the Lower Peninsula Division IV mark of 39 3 established last year by Nick Ojle of Camden-Frontier

"The key was to keep running hard," said Greer, who was seeded fourth going into the finals "On the third, fourth and fifth hurdles, I tend to slow down a little I wanted to push hard through all eight hurdles

"Just briefly, I saw the guy who was ranked No 1 in lane No 4 I didn't see the other guys on the turn I just wanted to keep pushing myself"

Greer was naturally excited afterwards as he was congratulated by his coaches, Mike Unger and Dave Ruth

"Rob's always the last guy to come out of practice, he always ran hard," said Unger "He was sixth last year in the IMs He did a nice job this year In the winter he practiced hurdles

"He's a nice kid and a good student, a very modest kid '

After coming out of St Michael's Lutheran Grade School in Wayne, Greer decided to give track a try

My grandmother purchased 20 acres of land on land contract 36 years ago. She got a bill saying the land was paid in full, but never got a deed putting the land in her name. We have checked with the courts and they don't seem to do any-

thing to help us. What are the steps we need to go through to correct the situation, as the people she originally bought the property from have died?

Your grandmother should have received a deed to the land when she paid off the land contract Most real estate

lawyers will avoid this situation by requiring that an executed deed be placed in escrow, usually with a title insurance company, for delivery to the purchaser when the land contract is paid off

You should immediately contact an attorney who will, no doubt, first make certain that there isn't a deed being held in escrow

Assuming that this isn't the case, a title search will ensure that the property hasn't been deeded to someone else In any event, because the sellers of the property have died, a lawsuit to quit title or a proceeding in probate court, if the seller's estate 1sn't yet closed, will be required in order to establish that your grandmother is the rightful owner

## **Pre-qualifying** can seal the deal

Years ago, Realtors and home sellers began asking home buyers to acquire letters of mortgage pre-qualification prior to accepting a pur chase offer

The idea, of course, was to determine very early on whether or not the pending deal was viable While noble in theory, some lender letters fall short of this desired end In fact, mortgage pre-approval letters often are not worth the paper on which they are printed





Many people use the terms "pre-qualifi-cation" and "pre-approval' interchangeably That's fine Regardless of your word preference, properly prepared mort gage pre-approval letters can be very helpful Lousy ones can lead to disaster To properly 'pre

qualify' a mortgage TIM 'TIMBO' applicant, a loan offi-PHILLIPS cer should review the borrowers' credit If

the borrowers credit scores are impeccable and they would qualify for 100 percent financing without any sort of income verification, an immediate prequalification letter may be in order

However, most of the time, the loan officer will need to perform a debt-to-income analysis to determine the borrowers' eligibility

To do so, the loan officer must review the borrowers' paystubs, W2s and tax returns, as applicable A loan officer who writes a pre-approval letter without this step may be setting everybody up for failure

A well-written pre-approval letter also includes the borrowers names and current address, the type of mort gage for which they may qualify, their maximum purchase price, and any sale limitations such as a requirement to sell their existing home

As a technique, my pre-approval letters include my personal contact information and an invitation for any interested parties to phone me should the have questions related to my letter I also usually state whether or not I actually reviewed income documents

The best pre approval letters state that the borrowers have been approved through an automated underwriting system Such approvals which are usu ally based on a To Be Determined property address, place borrowers the strongest buying position

Today, I think the use of technology is critical," he added "If they do it correctly, it makes them more efficient We can provide information for clients quicker and easier

"I also look for the legal, ethical, moral thing," he said

Since real-estate is a commissiongenerated business, Moore said he's impressed by people who are motivated by financial rewards

"If they want to sell real estate because they like houses, that probably isn't a good reason to get in," he said "We shouldn't be ashamed that there's money in this"

Patti Mullen, associate broker with Remerica Hometown One in Plymouth, led all agents in the company last year with sales/listings of \$14 million

"I think it's really simple things communication and attention," she said. "I could be a drab personality and if I did those things, I would still be successful "

But you can't devote every waking moment to the job, he added "When you're off, you're off"

Margie Duncan is a multi-million dollar sales producer with Century 21 Town & Country in Birmingham and a sıx-year veteran

"I think the main quality is you have to really love people, meeting people from all different backgrounds," she said

"You're spending lots of time with them If they're buyers, you're in the car a lot Sellers, you're on the phone quite a bit giving feedback on marketing, holding houses open

"We have to have a good working relationship," Duncan said "If it's not there, I move on I have plenty of business'



# Home sales volume rises statewide

Sales of existing single-family homes for the first quarter of 2002 surpassed by almost 13 percent totals for the first three months of last year, according to Michigan Association of Realtors statistics

Home prices for the quarter showed a modest gain of 2-1/2 percent compared to a year ago

"Michigan's recent mild weather and favorable interest rates helped fuel housing sales this quarter, said Dave Ledebuhr, MAR president "Housing continues to be an excellent investment as home prices remain on the upswing'

Sales volume was up throughout Michigan January through March, with the largest gain of 17 percent posted in Central Michigan Both southeast Michigan and the Upper Peninsula showed almost a 12 percent gain over this same period last year

Here, specifically, sales volume was up across the board while selling price was mixed.

Metropolitan Consolidated Association of Realtors (Oakland) reported 1,735 sales last quarter compared to 1,561 the previous year Average sales price was \$251,824 compared to \$236,501

Western Wayne Oakland **County Association of Realtors** reported 2,224 sales compared to 1,964 Average sales price was \$211,544 compared to \$217,648

Metropolitan Consolidated Association of Realtors (Macomb) reported 5,253 sales compared to 4,807 Average sales price was \$156,678 compared to \$157,042

■ North Oakland County Board of Realtors reported 795 sales compared to 749 Average sales price was \$174,582 com pared to \$178,700

Detroit Board of Realtors reported 846 sales compared to 717 Average sales price was \$79,627 compared to \$75,564

Statewide, during the first quarter of this year, 25,439 sales were recorded compared to 22,557 in 2001, MAR reported Average sales price was \$129,087 compared to \$125,963 last year





# Some owners chafe at condo rules

(AP) - Steve Blaustein running afoul of the Blue Bell Country Club in suburban Philadelphia could provide a lesson for condominium owners everywhere

His condo has no curtains, and cardboard boxes fill his garage

Though the country club enforces very specific rules and regulations, Blaustein's house "looks like a warehouse inside," said Ed Gold, who lives down the street

"He signed the same document I did If you're an individual and this isn't for you, you don't move here " Gold said

Blaustein and his lawyer declined comment, but his bare windows are the subject of a court case that reflects an increasingly common conflict

Like planned communities nationwide, the Blue Bell Country Club is managed and run by

an elected board of homeowners that enforces a "covenant," or rules and restrictions At Blue Bell, gray shingles cap every roof, and wrought-iron lanterns hang next to every front door

In 1970, only about 1 percent of Americans lived in condos and planned developments

Today, about 17 percent do, according to Robert H Nelson, a public affairs professor at the University of Maryland who is writing a book on such developments

As planned developments mushroom, the courts are increasingly having to grapple with

- resident, Blue Bell Country Club

questions about how they are run, said Evan McKenzie, a political science professor at the University of Illinois and author of a book about planned communities

Examples abound One homeowner battles his development's board over a doghouse in the back yard A development sues a home owner because children scribbled hopscotch squares on the sidewalk

"Most of the time, associations have prevailed under the theory of contract, McKenzie said "Ultimately, judges say, 'Look, a deal is a deal' But as the phenomenon gets more and more

widespread, there's a little more questioning of this

One complex tried to force Gloria and Lee Tobak to move or cover the flag that hung inside their window as a memorial to Gloria's father, a World War II veteran The association cited its ban on window coverings that weren't white, cream or tan

That case prompted the Penn sylvania General Assembly in 1998 to give residents the clear right to fly the American flag

The head of the Community Associations Institute a national lobbying group based in Alexan dria, Va, said associations are beginning to rethink their roles

'There's starting to be some more sensitivity in thinking of the associations as more a community than a corporate entity, said Dave Ramsey, the groups president elect

It's a case of darned if you do and darned if you don't

Some Colorado residents vol untarily doing their part to save water because of a drought there in mid-May were warned by homeowner associations that brown lawns violate neighborhood rules

Associations in at least two subdivisions in Highlands Ranch and Westmin ster enforced their regula tions, which seek to main tain a neighborhood's neat appearance

Marılyn Geerdes sent a let ter to management company Management Specialists after receiving a note that said her thirsty lawn "creates an unsightly condition '

"I would say the entire state of Colorado is 'lacking in water' Perhaps you haven't heard, we are experiencing a drought," she said "As a conse quence of dry conditions, farm ers may have to sell their land and cattle, but we will have our lush, green lawns, by golly

Ken Hammack received a similar notice

"I was shocked," he said

Neither Westminster, nor Douglas County, which governs Highlands Ranch where they live, had imposed water

(AP) - File this little story restrictions when the notices were sent

Karen Becker, a community manager for Management Associates, said the drought doesn't let homeowners off the hook


"A certain amount of stressed lawn is going to be acceptable due to the condu tions," she said But 'to use water properly doesn't mean you'll have a dead lawn '

Carrie Hugus spokeswoman for the 25 000 home Highlands Ranch Com munity Association said they're asking homeowners to follow guidelines of water ing every three days for up to 15 minutes

"If homeowners follow those guidelines, their lawns will be properly maintained ' she said "Thats all we ask We don t want to waste water but we don't want dead lawns, either

The Western Slope towns of Parachute and Silt as well as Denver-area Aurora and Louisville imposed manda tory water conservation measures

Other communities such as Boulder and Lafayette, were preparing to pass restrictions Officials in Thornton and Brighton have said voluntary curbs could become mandatory if severe drought conditions continue
