Plymouth Township planning commissioners Wednesday pushed the township a baby step closer to a new township hall The planning commission voted unanimously to approve a special-use for land the township is negotiating to buy from Don Massey The nine-acre parcel is currently zoned for residential, and the

township wants to put a new township

complex there Granting of the specialuse designation was part of the deal before Massey and the township could put finishing touches on the purchase of the land

The action was taken at a public hearing before more than 50 residents at St Kenneth's Church on Haggerty The commission moved the meeting, generally held at township hall, to accommodate what figured to be a large crowd

Commissioners and residents listened

for nearly two hours as Jim Anulewicz, the township's director of municipal services, laid out the plan both for the township complex and the development of the other 17 acres owned by Massey that front Ann Arbor Road

The joint development is part of the agreement between Massey and the township Massey plans a commercial development in the front 17 acres, which is zoned for the Ann Arbor Road Corridor District, anchored by a Farmer

Jack grocery store The parties have been negotiating for some time on exactly what the commercial development will look like, with the township insisting it fit the design parameters of the Ann Arbor Road Corridor zoning preferences



After more than 18 months of wrangling over the language of the first contract between Plymouth Township and the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, the sides have finally worked out a deal

The township's AFSCME local Wednesday night voted 27-1 to ratify a contract with the township The township board is expected to take up the matter at its Oct 22 meeting

'There are areas that were discussed

that still need a lot of attention,' said Nichole Hunt, president of the local "There are issues (the township) is aware need to be addressed Overall, the document is a good base for us"

Most of the bones of contention, according to Hunt, deal with the areas of classification and job description

The five-year deal is retroactive to Jan 1, 2000 and expires Dec 31, 2004 The union includes 36 clerical positions, although some of them are currently unfilled

Because the board still has to vote on it, neither side was ready to disclose the

agreements parameters Township supervisor Steve Mann did say earlier that the contract is 'comparable to what our other union groups received' Township officials agreed to a contract with its police officers last year that included a 3 25 percent pay hike

While he couldn t comment on the specifics of the new deal, Mann said he was glad the protracted procedure, which included informational pickets of township meeting by union employees, was finished

'We're very pleased,' Mann Wednesday night "I think it's an equitable agreement It passed 27-1, so that's an outstanding indication it's fair and equitable We're very happy with that"

The clerical workers organized their union local in early 2000, but negotiations didn't start until Feb 14, 2001

"It took longer than we would have liked, but there were a lot of issues to be hammered out,' Mann said

Mann said he expects to have the contract on the agenda for board action at its Oct 22 meeting That meeting starts at 7 p m at Plymouth Township Hall

U.S. House hopefuls use forum to paint contrasts in election

The few shots fired during Wednesday's forum for local Congressional hopefuls were muffled - literally - by technical problems

"I'm going to go hoarse by the time this is all over,' shouted Republican Thaddeus McCotter, a state senator from Livonia, as he introduced himself, without a public address system and over noisy ventilation, to the crowd at the Canton High School cafeteria McCotter, Democrat Kevin Kelley and Green Party nominee William Boyd fielded 30 questions from the audience and made campaign pitches during the 90-minute program sponsored by the League of Women Voters of Northwest Wayne County and the Observer Newspapers

The three are vying to represent Michigan's new 11th Congressional District, which includes Livonia, Westland, Garden City, Plymouth, the townships of Redford, Canton and Plymouth, and other parts of western Wayne and Oakland counties Kelley, Redford's supervisor, repeatedly emphasized differences between himself and McCotter, especially on the issues of the economy, the federal budget and government spending

ECONOMY, TAXES

"For a politician to say, 'I will to business and special interests

never raise taxes, to me, is irre sponsible, Kelley said The elder George Bush had to reverse such a pledge, as president, to stem the tide of federal red ink, Kelley said

In a time of a slowed economy, a federal budget deficit and a war on terrorism, Kelley says, the tax cuts of last year should not be made permanent

"I don't think we need to go back to the bad old days where deficits overwhelm the economy,' Kelley said

McCotter said that not continuing the tax cuts would throw an "uncertain economy" into a recession Government spending causes only a short-term boost for the economy, he said, and the best thing is to let workers keep more of what they earn


"The government does not grow the economy The American people do,' McCotter said He blamed budget deficits of the 1980s on runaway spending by a Congress with a Democratic majority

BOYD DRAWS CONTRASTS

However, it was Boyd, a government teacher in Plymouth-Canton was on friendly turf, who set himself apart more than McCotter or Kelley He expressed skepticism about a possible war with Iraq, which President George W Bush says may be necessary, and blamed many of the nation's ills on politicians who, he said, are beholden

paign contributions

They re voting for what's best for the people who pay, and the first thing I would do is work on real campaign finance reform, Boyd said

Boyd called for an end to soft money and donations from businesses and political action committees, and a \$500 limit on individual contributions

He turned sarcastic when first Kelley and then McCotter said corporate officials should be held accountable for illegalities in their companies

Well, we all agree that its a bad thing to have corporate criminals, Boyd said He went on to cite the influence of cam paign contributions as key to the recent scandals 'Nothing is going to change, he said

WAR AT ISSUE

Many questions dealt with a possible war in Iraq, and both Kelley and McCotter said they would support President Bush if he decides to use force over that country's acquisition of weapons of mass destruction

Kelley, however, showed less enthusiasm for such a war, saying force should be used judiciously' and that he is concerned about the long term stability of the region and losing sight of the

m Iraq should be multilateral, he said, especially when it comes to financing it

McCotter was more certain, saying Iraq would be a battle ground in the war on terror

"Imagine what would happen were Iraq to obtain nuclear weapons," McCotter said He said the US should take a

lesson from the appeasement by European democracies of Hitler's Nazi Germany in the 1930s

In the end, millions of people were killed and economies were destroyed, he said

Boyd, who said he supports Sen Carl Levin's resolution that the US military take action only if United Nations weapons inspections fail, later was increasingly critical of a move toward war (The Senate later in the week approved a measure supporting the use of force)

Bush should publicize the evidence against Iraq, Boyd said 'We are now seeing an executive branch and a legislative branch that wishes to shoot first and look for evidence later," he said

because of those groups cam- broader war on terror Any war the National Rifle Association, parted company with Boyd and Kelley when he deflected a question about continuing a ban on assault weapons and having background checks and waiting periods for firearm purchases

The damage that is done by our society is done by the criminals with illegally owned guns, McCotter said

Kelley said he is pro Second Amendment but that measures such as background checks and waiting periods are 'commonsense legislation

"If this sniper (in Washington DC, and its suburbs) was performing a hit-and-run with an automobile, we would be able to track down that automobile," Boyd said

Kelley and Boyd both said they would vote to continue a ban on private ownership of assault weapons

On other issues

All three were in favor of a national prescription drug plan for senior citizens

We're the richest nation on Earth If we're prepared to spend 200 billion in Iraq, then surely we should try to find the the Congressional seat, did not resources to help older Americans with prescription McCotter, who is endorsed by drug benefits, Kelley said

Answering a question about help for working families, McCotter said the best way government can help them is to lower taxes

"We can't give you more time, but we can reduce the amount of time you spend working for government,' he said

The questioner had described himself or herself as 'an avid 'West Wing' watcher,' which sparked this quip from McCotter We could stop watch-ing West Wing and spend more time with our kids

Kelley and Boyd disagreed with McCotter's lower-taxes solution

"Working families don't want \$600 back," said Boyd, referring to the tax refund of last year 'They want help with medical insurance, they want help with prescription drug coverage, they want help with day-care issues they want quality of-life issues taken care of, like our crumbling environment '

Kelley said the war on ter rorism is "going to involve diminishment of civil liberties He added "I think we have to err on the side of caution"

Boyd, on the other hand, said he would work to repeal the Patriot Act, which, he said, gives the government too much power to spy on its citizens 'We can protect this country without taking away our civil rights, he said

McCotter, who supports the Patriot Act, agreed with Boyd philosophically In the end, security without liberty is false security, he said

Debate moderator AnneMarie Hudak said about 300 people showed up for the forum, which was taped for use by local cable television stations


Hudak said that the candidates had to strain to be heard brought more emotion to the forum and reminded her of political debates before the time of public address systems

"They didn't have microphones, and they had to scream," she said




Osborn recalled seeing Skelton in a performance at the Fox Theatre in Detroit several years ago, and was impressed "He wrote all the music for that per-







begun a program which honors privilege ' veterans at the polls Called 'My Vote Honors a Vet," it's a program that has been initiated in other states, and Langmesser is hoping it catches on in Plymouth

'It's a pilot program for honoring veterans at the November elections,' she said "The premise is to encourage voting at a time when there is so much concess about politics, and to honor veterans who

When voters go to the polls Nov 5, they will be given a lapel sticker that acknowledges a particular veteran The sticker, with an American flag, states "My Vote Honors a Vet." and has a line where the voter can write the name of a veteran their vote honors

Langmesser is hoping veterans' groups will also become involved in the program "I'm hoping veterans will

come forth and get involved in

this program, and participate by appearing at the polls to hand out stickers and make themselves known,' she said 'Because of the state of the country, and with so many of our military going to war, I think this is a good program to honor them '



zens and referrals from places like the Salvation Army and First Step," added Warkoczeski "They just have to live in the school district and prove they are receiving some sort of government assistance'

Warkoczeski said she receives referrals from principals, teachers, nurses, counselors and social workers

After eligibility is established, entire wardrobes are given to those in need

"They get to choose six pairs of pants, up to three pairs of shoes, a coat, snow pants, boots, new underwear and socks, pajamas just about everything they need," she said 'They can come once in the spring and

once in the fall We feel that it's very generous' Despite the economic status of western Wayne County, Warkoczeski said there is a need for the clothing bank in Plymouth, Plymouth Township

and Canton Township "We helped about 75 families last year, totaling more than 400 people," she said

"We've had families as large as 11-12 people here looking for

help "Some are one-time users Maybe they lost a job, or a fire wiped them out, or maybe an illness, They just need something to get them over the hump," said Warkoczeski "And, we have some people who come back every year No one, not even the school district, knows who comes here'

Warkoczeski said she also gets positive reaction from people who donate clothes "They are really glad to give them to people who live in their community, and they know people don't have to pay for it," she said

Warkoczeski also credits Visteon, the Plymouth Businesswoman's Club, Kiwanis and Canton Rotary with helping to make the clothing bank a success

The clothing bank was started in 1977 by Flossie Tonda, a Plymouth-Canton school board member from 1975-1984.

"She saw what it did to kids, having to wear the same clothes every day,' said Warkoczeski "If that's one worry you can take away from a kid, well, we all know how peer pressure is If they can go to school and concentrate on school work instead of how they look

The clothing bank is open


Monday, Wednesday and Thursday from 9 30 a.m -11 30 a m Because of the time it takes to pick out clothing, appointments are made in advance

Warkoczeski said she'd like to expand the clothing bank hours, but she needs more volunteers, like Jackie Gerbasi of Canton

"It's always a good feeling to help people who need help along the way," said Gerbasi "I think in any community there are people in need, no matter how wealthy a suburb 1s considered'

pered that effort

Police Chief Wayne Carroll has taken on the responsibility of enforcing parking in the two main business districts in the city

With the designation of a haison officer to specifically address needs downtown and in Old Village, Carroll believes the problems can be resolved

"Parking has always been an issue because there's not enough to go around," said Carroll

What we're trying to do is get some continuity and consistency to it That's one of the issues Brian will be addressing"

As a result of inconsistent enforcement, there has been an abandonment of parking rules which call for free parking on the top of the downtown parking deck, four-hour parking on the lower deck, and two-hour parking on the streets

"Areas that have been designated for customers have been used by merchants and their employees who don't want to park elsewhere," said Carroll "Many shop owners have complained there are overtime parking issues

"If employees park there, businesses are losing opportunities They want that turnover'

With consistent enforcement comes parking tickets Sue Gallas, who manages Frame Works on Penniman, likes the idea of a haison officer downtown, but isn't in favor of ticketing those who park too long

"Some of our customers may spend more than a couple of hours waiting for their framing and going to lunch," said

Gallas

"We don't want our customers ticketed and then see them go away We told him (Walker) our business would pay the (\$5) ticket."

Larry Bird, who owns Gabriala's on Main Street, said the practice of ticketing is to keep employees from parking in the prime spaces "If he chalks tires in the

morning and comes back about 9 a.m , he'll end up getting all employees, which is OK," said Bird

"If he marks tires at noon and comes back at 2 p m , he'll be ticketing customers, which is not good The whole idea of the program is to move employees'

DDA Director Bob Anderson supports having an officer dedicated to both downtown and Old Village

"I think some type of parking enforcement is really neces-

sary," said Anderson. ß "I've been asked by the DDA board, and folks like the mayor, to make parking and parking enforcement a priority"

Walker said he'll attempt to stop in each business he patrols at least once a week, not only talking about parking issues, but issues such as security measures for store owners and problems with shoplifters and individual customers

The plan is for the township to buy the nine acres from Massey, at a price of about \$1 6 million, and then sell the three acres on which the current complex rests According to Plymouth Township Supervisor Steve Mann, the township has already been offered more money for its current parcel than it would pay for the Massey property

The new township complex would include all departments of the township government, including the police department, to be house in one twostory structure. The new complex would also include a new Fire Station No 1

It was the location of the new fire station that drew the most concern from residents As the plan was presented Wednesday, emergency vehicles would exit the fire station onto Haggerty That idea was met with resistance from residents for several reasons, including objections about noisy sirens and bright headlights flashing into the homes across Haggerty, and also the safety of school children attending Allen Elementary, which is right down the road

Since maintenance of Haggerty is the responsibility of Wayne County, Anulewicz told residents he'd spoken to county officials

"We have indicated to the county they need to make improvements to that area," he said "That would include widening the road"

There was also considerable discussion about the commercial development, being handled by Arkan Jonah of West Bloomfield The development will consist of a 129,000square-foot building, 55,000 square feet of which will house the Farmer Jack

The presence of the grocer caused a bit of reaction, since it was Farmer Jack that vacated its Main Street store and left it vacant for years

'Farmer Jack has a very bad reputation in Plymouth because of what happened with that building on Main Street," Commissioner Bill Pratt told Jonah at the meeting "You have to be aware of that

Jonah, who said Farmer Jack hasn t yet made a firm commitment to the project, nevertheless vouched for the grocer, pointing out his company and "Farmer Jack and us have been working on this project for two years," Jonah said 'There's a mutual understanding and a mutual need for both of us to get this done"

The entire development will include a 65-foot setback from the residential neighborhood to the north, made up of the current vegetation (if it's strong enough, Anulewicz said) or some mounding with evergreen trees

"If what is there is simply undergrowth, we will involve all the neighbors," Anulewicz said The front of the commercial portion will be bordered by a 45-foot setback consisting of trees and water features Residents pointed out that past plans for that parcel have not been aesthetically pleasing

"We think we've accomplished that It will be a visual image I know we don't have in this township, and I think you'd be hard-pressed to find anywhere"

Concerns surrounding the

commercial portion of the development centered around environmental questions and traffic patterns Anulewicz said a traffic light, with a left-turn signal, will be installed at Gold Arbor and Ann Arbor Road, which will be the main entry to the commercial part of the development There will also be a lane added for west-bound traffic to turn right into the development, Anulewicz said Township resident James Barberet just bought his house a little more than a month ago His property backs up to the nine-acre parcel the township would be buying He said he's seen animals and other forms of nature back there, and thinks the complex will harm that

'We see deer and fawns and squirrels and even moles," Barberet said "I don't see the benefit to my kids of taking them and saying, 'Here's a building, or this is asphalt," Barberet said

Anulewicz said that, once construction starts, construction could last up to a year



Cakebread Cellars innovations lead to superb wines

ome things that you learn make you feel a tad old Like learning that Cakebread Cellars in the Napa Valley will celebrate its 30th anniversary next year

Yet this feeling of old quickly disappeared when we recently discussed with Dennis Cakebread, ongoing plans his parents, Jack and Dolores Cakebread, founders of the winery, have We believe that their commitment to ever higher quality, including their wines and life in general, has kept them young in spirit

Like so many wine pioneer families of the 1970s, the Cakebreads did not come to the wine industry with wealth, accumulated from a highly successful business unrelated to wine For many years



after they purchased the ranch that

became the vineyards and winery on

Highway 29, the Cakebreads continued to work at Jack s father s car repair business in Oakland, Calif Each Friday afternoon, the Cakebreads and their sons trekked to the Napa Valley to work on the winery project

As the vineyards were being planted, Dolores started her vegetable and flower garden, which led her to a separate

career in matching wine and food Although she has freely given her recipes to wine and food magazines and posted them on the winery's Web site, publication of her first cookbook will be part of the 30th year celebration

SOMETHING QUITE DIFFERENT

Most wineries that produce both white and red wines make them in the same facility Bruce, one of the Cakebread's three sons, who has been the winemaker since 1978, convinced his parents that there was a higher road to quality Over the years, separate facilities were built to make white and red wines

Dennis Cakebread, who manages sales

and marketing for the winery, pointed out the benefits "Because Bruce presses whole grape clusters for our white wines," he said, "we've installed special and gentle large-capacity presses to reduce skin contact time All the equipment used is engineered to reduce oxygen contact with the juice This creates overall fresher and fruitier white wines '

Workers in the 'white' winery remain focused on white wines Essentially, Cakebread is two small wineries This is only possible through separation "

In the red wine winery, it's easier and more beneficial to manage the cap formed during fermentation in short,

Select a ripe and firm medium pumpkin Larger pumpkins can be used, but they begin to take on a grainy texture Cut open the pumpkin and remove

the seeds and fibrous strings Cut the pumpkin into four to eight pieces

Line a large baking pan aluminum foil Place pumpkin pieces onto the baking pan

Bake in the oven at 375 degrees for one to 1/2 hours Remove the pulp from the rind with a spoon and discard the rind Blend the pulp until smooth using a blender or food processor

To create a thicker puree, put the pulp into a cheese cloth and squeeze out excess water

Leftover puree can be frozen for a short period of time Canning pumpkin puree is not recommended by the USDA

topping is just as satisfying A couple autumns ago, on a strange quest to make the perfect pumpkin pie, I made pumpkin pie every evening for nearly two weeks, sometimes trying two different recipes simultaneously The quest kept me awake and active through the wee hours



Use slide film on cloudy days to capture best fall colors in photos

n past columns, I've written about capturing the abundance of fall colors on film Today, I'd like to give you more tips on fall photography as the air chills, the leaves begin to change and colors creep gently southward

Contrary to what you may think, cloudy days are best Contrast and glare are reduced and colors will appear more vibrant And don't pass up rainy or foggy days Moistened autumn leaves after a rain or foggy morning provide good possibilities for your camera. Dark clouds formed by a receding storm also are an excellent backdrop for a stand of brilliant trees If nature doesn't cooperate, use a spray bottle of water to dampen a grouping of leaves

Use good composition Place your main subject, off center for a more dynamic appearance in your shot "Frame" your pictures with overhanging branches and place foreground subjects in the viewfinder Use roads, fences and streams to your advantage as "lead-in" lines

Use a small aperture The smaller the aperture, the greater the depth-of-field meaning everything will appear sharp and in focus in your finished print

For those of you with 'program' cameras, use an aperture priority mode with the smallest aperture on your lens For manual camera users, simply select an aperture/shutter speed combina-


tion to maximize depth-of-field Which lens to use Remember

that wide-angle lenses will give a greater expanse to your shot while more a telephoto will "move you in close" to isolate a particular tree or capture a splash of color in a cluster of fallen leaves A macro

lens or close-up filter will enable you to highlight the texture and details of an individual leaf

A wise man once said, "Find something you are passionate about, then find a way to make money at it" No, Oprah did not think of it first This is one of the secrets of a happy life






HORMONE REPLACEMEN

HRT has benefits, say doctors, but there are alternatives

As part of Breast Cancer Awareness Month, local health care providers are encouraging women to do two things – make sure to get mammograms if they're 40 and older, and explore their hormone replacement therapy options if they are approaching or experiencing menopause

A recent Women's Health Initiative study showed a possible link between breast cancer and hormone replacement therapy (HRT) The study, however, has been criticized by local physicians who maintain that the hormone therapy is still a good way to prevent osteoporosis and maintain quality of lıfe The five-year study involved 16,000 women using estrogen and progestin combination HRT The therapy has been widely used as a way to prevent coronary heart disease in postmenopausal women The study was to have ended in 2005 but was stopped at the end of May because of the risk for invasive breast cancer, as well as cardiac events and strokes The findings reported a 26 percent increase in invasive breast cancer over the placebo group (38 vs 30 per 10,000 person/years), but the absolute risk was just eight more incidents of invasive cancer The study involved women using Prempro, an oral HRT preparation manufactured by Wyeth Ayerst, which combines 0 625 mg of estrogen extracted from mare's urine and prog estin, in the form of 2 5 mg of medoroxyprogesterone acetate Some patients are at particular risk from HRT side effects Women with vaginal bleeding of unknown cause,



FACTS ABOUT BREAST CANCER

 One in eight women will develop breast cancer during her lifetime
 Mammograms can detect cancer up to two years before a lump can be felt

If all women 50 and over had mammograms at the recommended intervals, the mortality rate would be reduced by 30 percent -13 000 American lives would be saved per year Eighty percent of women who develop breast cancer have no family history of the disease An estimated 185 700 new cases of breast cancer will be diagnosed in the United States during 1996 making it the most frequently diagnosed cancer

colonoscopy an alternative to traditional colonoscopy for senior citizens with cer tain health conditions

Virtual colonoscopy is a newer minimally invasive technique for detecting polyps and cancer in the colon using a CT scan and specialized software As with a traditional colonoscopy virtual colonoscopy requires a one day preparation However unlike traditional colonoscopy patients hav ing virtual colonoscopy do not need to discontinue aspirin non steroid anti inflammatory medications or the blood thinner Coumadin prior to the test

Also important to seniors and other patients is that virtual colonoscopy does not risk perforation of the colon wall Because the colon is examined using a CT scan and virtual reality computer software there is no need to insert the traditional colonoscope a long tube into the rectum and colon

Additionally patients may not need a driver because there is no sedation and they are fully functional after the exam CO2 (carbon dioxide) which is used in insufflate the colon for vir tual colonoscopy is rapidly absorbed so the discomfort level is minimal to non exis tent Further the test takes only three minutes to per form

Many seniors find it hard to tolerate long periods of discomfort during medical tests especially if they are frail said Dr James Henderson medical director Virtual colonoscopy really eliminates the majority of perceived negatives associ ated with a colonoscopy

chronic disease of the liver, a family history of breast or uterine cancer or blood clots in the veins, legs, or lungs risk negative HRT side effects, according to the Web site, hormone-replacementtherapy-side-effects com

As for the recent study, Bingham Farms-based Dr Jerry Nosanchuk said that women have been unduly scared away from using HRT He has considered himself a "menopausalist" since 1984 and is a founding member of the North American Menopause Society

GETTING UNDER THE SKIN

Nosanchuk endorses a transdermal, rather than oral, approach to HRT Transdermal HRT is administered through a skin patch similar to a nicotine patch, and is considered superior to ingesting pills, though the pills are more popular, Nosanchuk said

"The most optimal hormone replacement therapy is never oral estrogen," he said "It doesn't mean oral estrogen is terrible – it's just not optimal"

"Bioidentical" alternatives, such as soy-derived HRT, are superior to the oral HRT products, including Prempro, which use female horse excretions, Nosanchuk said

Oral HRT, but not transderdmal HRT, raises the level of C-Reactive Protein, which is closely related to cardiac events Other negative effects of oral HRT are increased insulin resistance and raised levels of sex hormonebinding globulin, which binds to a woman's natural levels of testosterone

This hormonal condition generates the most complaints among his patients, a majority of whom started on oral HRT then switched to transdermal HRT That is because the symptoms are decreased sex drive, decreased energy, reduced muscle mass, weight gain and a "pot belly"

More than 90 percent of women whose breast cancer is found and treated early with no spreading beyond the breast, will survive

Cryosurgery: a new weapon against breast cancer

Women may soon have a new weapon to use in the fight against breast cancer It's minimally invasive and does not cause per manent disfigurement as with other procedures like a mastectomy, where the breast is entirely removed, or a lumpectomy, in which the cancer is removed from the breast and radiation therapy is often needed

This potentially new treatment, called cryosurgery, is currently being studied by the University of Michigan Comprehensive Cancer Center Researchers are investigating the possibility that in addition to destroying the tumor, cryosurgery may stimulate the immune system to attack any remaining cancer cells, providing a better chance for survival for the approximately 200,000 women diagnosed with breast cancer this year alone

Cryosurgery involves making a very small incision in the skin. Using an ultrasound, a probe is placed in the center of the tumor to freeze and kill the cancer cells, says Dr Michael Sabel, a surgical oncologist at the U-M Comprehensive Cancer Center

' The tip of the probe gets extremely cold and essentially forms an iceball around the tumor," he explains 'That, in effect, kills all of the cancer cells, which allows the body to reabsorb the tissue so there's not a large defect in the breast."

USES IMMUNE SYSTEM

In contrast to other techniques used to treat breast cancer, cryosurgery leaves the shell of the cancer cells intact This allows the immune system to clean up the area, exposing the tumor proteins to the white blood cells

And by exposing the immune system to the tumor, it may help prevent cancer from returning or spreading to other parts of the body – a common occurrence in breast cancer patients who are diagnosed after the cancer has already spread to the lymph nodes or beyond

"I'm hoping that by freezing the tumor, the immune system will learn to recognize cancer and go out and destroy cancer in other parts of the body, the same way it looks for bacteria or viruses with certain proteins," says Sabel

Cryosurgery is also used to destroy abnormal cervical cells and correct problems with inflammation or chronic discharge In addition, cryosurgery has been used to treat tumors in the liver and benign lesions in the breast

TRIAL UNDER WAY

However, the effectiveness of cryosurgery as a treatment for breast cancer is still being investigated by the U-M Comprehensive Cancer Center Currently, a trial is under way at the Center with women who are in the early stages of breast cancer

In the trial, participants undergo cryosurgery followed by the procedure they would have otherwise had – either a lumpectomy or mastectomy – three weeks later Using this process, researchers are able to find out if the cancer has been destroyed and if the immune system has been stimulated

'I believe cryosurgery will be very useful in the future for treatment in the early stages of breast cancer," Sabel says

Enhanced milk offerings improve student lunch

PRNewswire - In the face of disliked the traditional milk escalating rates of childhood obesity and heightened public concern about the nutrient quality of foods in schools, a recent school study shows that students' milk consumption and nutrition status can be significantly improved by enhanced milk offerings in schools

In a yearlong study co-sponsored by the American School Food Service Association and National Dairy Council involving more than 100,000 students in 146 schools, milk sales increased 22 percent in secondary test schools and 15 percent in elementary test schools after enhancements in milk packaging and merchandising, flavors, varieties and temperature were made These numbers are significant from a national public health perspective, given that only 12 and 30 percent of female and male teens, respectively, consume the recommended daily servings of dairy foods

'Based on research, we know that on average, only those children who choose milk during the noontime meal come close to meeting their recommended calcium intake," says Dr Rachel Johnson, professor of Nutrition and acting dean of the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences at the University of Vermont 'With the sharp rise in consumption of soft drinks and other beverages at the expense of milk, children may be at greater risk for bone fractures, as well as hypertension and osteoporosis later in hfe"

carton offered in schools That number was cut in half with the introduction of a new plastic package, new flavors and the handling improve ments that ensured a more consistent and colder temper ature for the milk In addition, more students reported choosing milk at lunch, and milk plate waste measure ments showed that in both eight and 10 ounce packaging children drank more of the milk they took

In the student survey 51 percent of respondents in 4th through 12th grade identify flavored milk as the type of milk most often drank at school lunch This represents a 10 percent increase over prepilot survey measures

Over the course of the study more students participated in the school meal program after the enhanced milk products were introduced Average daily participation in meals served in schools were almost 5 percent higher in secondary test schools versus control schools at lunch

An increase of this magnitude in school meal participation is significant for children - from both a nutritional and a performance standpoint, said Gaye Lynn MacDonald president of American School Food Service Association Research clearly shows us that children who participate in national meal programs have higher intakes of nutritious foods and specific nutrients - both at lunch and over the course of the entire day In addition, we know that children who are better nourished perform better in school

Specific factors enhanced in the milk product as part of the study included lowfat flavor varieties (at least one new flavor in addition to chocolate, usually strawberry), convenient packaging (plastic resealable in various sizes) and merchandising, better refrigeration and alternate sales points (a la carte and vending in addition to meal line) The study, called The School Milk Pilot Test, was conducted in 47 elementary schools and 99 secondary schools in 12 US markets Beverage Marketing Corporation managed data collection and three waves of student surveys They also coordinated product design and distribution with the nine participating dairy processors



Facts about kids, teens, healthy eating and obesity:

In 1999, 13 percent of American children aged 6 to 11 years were overweight, as were 14 percent of adolescents aged 12 to 19 years, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The percentage of teens who are overweight has nearly tripled in the last 25 years

A growing number of overweight children are being diagnosed with conditions associated with obesity, including type 2 ("adult") diabetes, high cholesterol and high blood pressure

• Overweight teens have a 70 percent chance of becoming overweight or obese adults If one of the teen's parents is also overweight, the chance is 80 percent

In the long run, overweight children, teens and adults have a much higher chance of developing heart disease, high blood pressure, stroke, asthma, sleep apnea, type 2 diabetes and some forms of cancer

Doctors and other health professionals can determine whether a child's weight is healthy, using the body mass index (BMI) that combines weight and height

Fortunately, overweight and obesity are highly preventable, through changes in eating and activity patterns

Parents can play a major role in making sure their children eat right and get enough exercise, especially by choosing better foods and activities for themselves and their kids

Children should get 60 minutes of activity most days of the week, and keep their television, video game and computer time down

For any overweight individual, weight loss should be gradual. Crash diets, diet pills and short-term changes in diet are not recommended

Any weight management program for children should be supervised by a physician

Keep kids eating healthy at Halloween

For kids, Halloween means sugary, gooey candy, collected by the bagful and just waiting to be gobbled down Forget healthy eating, it's trick-or-treat time!

Not quite, says a University of Michigan Health System children's nutrition expert In fact, she adds, Halloween is the perfect time of year for parents to teach kids about healthy eating And the lessons they learn now can help them eat better throughout the year – which can

help keep them from becoming overweight or obese "Kids should enjoy their holiday treats. They need to be oble-

day treats They need to be children and have fun activities in their lives,' says pediatric dietitian Michelle Cleland, R.D, who counsels kids and their families at the UMHS East Ann Arbor Health Center "But parents should provide guidelines to having fun foods, such as "This is a special occasion, you can have this many treats tonight,' and then providing a treat or two in their school lunches or after school"

Setting rules ahead of Halloween about how much candy children can eat each day, and providing healthy meals before they head out for trick-ortreating and in the days afterward, are important tips for parents to follow, says Cleland She also recommends that parents set a limit on how long kids can keep their Halloween loot

"My rule of thumb about keeping candy would be to the next holiday, such as Thanksgiving," she says "That's a good fourweek period that gives them time to enjoy candy and spread it out evenly throughout that time." Leftovers can then either be discarded, frozen for another time, or donated to a charity

All in all, she adds, "One day out of the year won't be detrimental to a child's diet, but if it keeps occurring and guidelines aren't set, it can lead to childhood obesity"

OBESITY

In the past few years, there's been a rapid increase in the number of overweight and obese kids and teens in the United States That number has nearly tripled in just over a generation In fact, a recent report by the US

Surgeon General noted that 13 percent of children aged six to 11 years and 14 percent of adolescents aged 12 to 19 years are overweight.

can lead to health problems now, such as diabetes and sleep problems, and later, such as heart disease, high blood pressure, stroke, joint problems and some forms of cancer African American, Hispanic American and Native American children and teens have particularly high rates of obesity Obesity can also be a major

ing childhood and adolescence

Obesity can also be a major social stigma for children and teens, when their peers tease them for being "fat' or they feel self-conscious And overweight kids tend to become overweight adults, making obesity a lifelong chronic condition that can greatly reduce overall health

But parents can help their children avoid the health and social problems that can come with being overweight, Cleland says

"Children tend to be obese because of a combination of both lifestyle and food choices," she notes "Most of the studies to date have shown it's high-calorie beverages, processed foods, and sitting still and not participating in sports or other physical activities"

SEEKING HELP

If you need help developing better habits for yourself and your children, ask your child's doctor about making an appointment with a nutritionist – preferably one with experience

with kids But parents can do a lot on their own, says Cleland Look at your child's diet over the course of a week, rather than focusing on making every meal and snack perfectly healthy It's all right to have candy once in a while, in small quantities, as long as the rest of the week they eat mostly lower-fat, lower-calorie choices

'One bad meal is not a big deal and it's part of being a child,' says Cleland "So if they balance out the rest of the week and make sure they're getting their servings of fruits, vegetables and dairy products along the way, occasional sweets aren't going to upset their diet"

The same goes for exercise and physical activity For example, parents can set limits on how long kids can be sedentary – sitting in front of the television, video games or computer, for example And for every half hour of TV they watch or games they play, Cleland recommends parents plan a half hour of physical activity, such as a family walk.

SETTING PATTERNS

Just as with food, a parent can set an example with exercise and activity Children will follow the pattern their parents establish

"Exercise doesn't have to be the treadmill three days a week for 45 minutes," Cleland advises "There are all sorts of different fun activities to add to your lifestyle, such as participating in different courses in the community" And, of course, walking through the neighborhood or the mall for trick-or-treating

Even while parents try to make healthy eating and physical activity a routine part of their children's lives, Cleland cautions that a child's weight should not become the focus when parents talk to them

Too much attention to weight alone, rather than diet and exercise habits, can set children and teens up for eating disorders And children's weight varies in relation to their height throughout their school years, as their body grows and develops

"If a child is going through a period where he or she is a little bit heavier, don't focus on that," says Cleland "Instead, focus on good healthy eating habits and being physically active Let's help them make healthier choices"

And that's good advice at Halloween and throughout the year

Monthly breast self-exams help detect lumps

Breast self-exam is still a good idea Why?

The American Cancer Society recommends that all women over the age of 20 examine their breasts once a month By examining your breasts regularly, you will know how your breasts normally feel If a change should happen in your breasts, you will be able to identify it and let your doctor know

Most lumps are found by women themselves If you find any lumps, thickenings or changes, tell your doctor right away Remember, most breast lumps are not cancerous, but you don't know if you don't ask Breast cancer may be successfully treated if you find it and treat it early Delaying the diagnosis of breast cancer does not change the diagnosis, it only worsens the outcome *When?*

You should do a Breast Self-Exam (BSE) every month two or three days after your period If you do not have regular periods, just do it the same day every month (Note just before your period or during pregnancy, your breasts may be somewhat lumpy or more tender) If

HERBAL ALTERNATIVES

Dr Kavita Rao, who practices both internal medicine and complementary medicine through Westland's Oakwood Health System, said that concern about side effects is the main reason some of her patients look to herbalism Rao's menopausal patients use herbs such as black cohosh, which can relieve hot flashes, and sage, which can reduce excess perspiration They also use herbal creams, purchased in vitamin stores

"Natural medicine, if used appropriately, is much safer," Rao said "Unfortunately, in the United States, (herbal medicine is) not as regulated as it is in Europe"

Germany, in particular, is one country where herbal medicine is widely used and prescribed, Rao said

As with conventional medicine, however, dosage is important with herbs Long-term use you are taking hormones, talk with your doctor about when to do BSE

How?

1 Lie down Flatten your right breast by placing a pillow under your right shoulder Place your right arm behind your head 2 Use the sensitive finger

2 Use the sensitive inger pads (where your fingerprints are, not the tips) of the middle three fingers on your left hand Feel for lumps using a circular, rubbing motion in small, dimesized circles without lifting the fingers Powder, oil or lotion can be applied to the breast to make it easier for the fingers to glide over the surface and feel changes

3 Press firmly enough to feel different breast tissues, using three different pressures First, light pressure to just move the skin without jostling the tissue beneath, then medium pressure pressing midway into the tissue, and finally deep pressure to probe more deeply down to the ribs or to the point just short of discomfort

4 Completely feel all of the breast and chest area up under your armpit, and up to the collarbone and all the way over to your shoulder to cover breast tissue that extends toward the shoulder

5 Use the same pattern to feel every part of the breast tissue Choose the method easiest for you

Lines Start in the underarm area and move your fingers downward little by little until they are below the breast Then move your fingers slightly toward the middle, and slowly move back up Go up and down until you cover the whole area

Circles Beginning at the outer edge of your breast, move

your fingers slowly around the breast in a circle Move around the breast in smaller and smaller circles, gradually working toward the nipple Don't forget to check the

underarm and upper chest areas, too

Wedges Starting at the outer edge of the breast, move your fingers toward the nipple and back to the edge Check your whole breast, covering one small wedge-shaped section at a time Be sure to check the underarm area and the upper chest

6 After you have completely

examined your right breast, then examine your left breast using the same method and your right hand, with a pillow under your left shoulder

7 You may want to examine your breasts or do an extra exam while showering It's easy to slide soapy hands over your skin, and to feel anything unusual

8 You should also check your breasts in a mirror looking for any change in size or contour, dimpling of the skin or spontaneous nipple discharge

of some herbs is not recommended, and Rao recommends tapering off their use in treating menopause within a few months

She does not steer patients away from HRT, however

"Hormone replacement therapy is not all bad," Rao said "For the right patient, if it is used correctly, it can be a good thing"

INDIVIDUAL APPROACH

Dr Luana Kyselka, a Beaumont Hospital reproductive endocrinologist working in Troy and Royal Oak, agreed with Nosanchuk and Rao about the importance of tailoring treatments to the woman, as well as taking the time to consult with them

"(Treatment) should be individualized," she said "It should be carefully explained to them."

Some women may do OK with oral HRT, but others may not The oral preparation distributes the hormones in one lump sum via the stomach, which may not be a good thing for women with a quick metabolism For them, the transdermal patch may be more effective because it delivers the hormones in a slow, steady trickle, Kyselka said

"If a women has liver disease, the (oral HRT) may be too taxing on the liver," she said.

Healthy lifestyle choices are extremely important. Menopausal women should not smoke, limit alcohol and caffeine intake, exercise at least every other day, maintain a normal body weight and alleviate stress

Dietary choices are also important Kyselka said that soybased foods – including tofu, soy milk and soy cheese – are thought to be especially good for menopausal women Soybeans contain phytoestrogen, which is enough like estrogen to stimulate estrogen receptors in the body It is also calcium-rich and contains no cholesterol

Vitamin supplements, especially those containing extra Vitamin E, Vitamin C and selenium, are a good idea.

"One thing for sure is that the best way to age gracefully is to exercise good eating habits," said Kyselka.

This condition is one that likely you have not heard of Dequervains tenosynovitis is a tendinitis of the thumb I present its proper name to give credit to the person who first described it He was Henri Dequervain a Frenchman and he made his observation in 1855 Experience


In Dequervains tenosynovitis you feel pain throughout the thumb The discomfort begins at the base of the joint and radiates to the forearm. However, over time, the whole digit huris Trying to hold objects can become an agony you see a doctor because the impairment can stop you from even caring for yourself. What has happened is that one or both muscles that help move your thumb out and over


have become strained The usual cause is injury either by a blow or from the repetitive strain of grasping objects that puts strain on the thumb such as would occur by repeatedly exerting pressure on a wrench

Your doctor can differentiate Dequervains from arthritis of the thumb by having you place your thumb in the palm of the hand and then giving your wrist a forceful twist if that maneuver hurts you then you have tendinitis not arthritis

Initial treatment consists of resting the hand and staying away from any work or recreation effort that strains the thumb injection of steroid into the thumb tendons involved is useful though getting the medicine in the right place is difficult in extreme cases hand

Tips for patching steps

AP -- No matter how well concrete steps are built, their edges are the weakest point of their construction Once edges start to break and crumble, the concrete will keep eroding until the steps pose a safety hazard For a quickfix, try the following steps Break out the loose material - down to solid concrete - with a hammer and cold chusel Runse clean with a garden hose Paint the raw patch area with a concrete bonding agent, and surround the location with form boards made from scrap plywood Support the forms with stakes or bricks In a mixing container, combine a concrete patch material with water Vinyl concrete patch or polymer cement works best. Use a wooden concrete float to force the patch material into the opening and to remove excess material Finish the patch with a metal concrete trowel and remove the forms the following day

Make sure chimneys and vents are clear of creosote buildup or obstructions

Clean out ashes from previous fires

Add a fire screen in front of the fireplace to protect against sparks

Open the damper

Make sure the area around the fireplace is clear of furniture, books, newspapers or other potentially flammable materials

Check the batteries in smoke and carbon monoxide detectors to ensure proper operation

Make sure all firewood 1s dry and

The HPBA offers additional fireplace safety advice that can help reduce the risk of unnecessary fires and prevent carbon monoxide poisonings

Make sure the fire is completely out before going to bed or leaving the house Make sure glass doors are installed properly

Don't use more than one manufactured firelog at a time

 \blacksquare Never burn garbage, charcoal or plastic in the fireplace

Never use gasoline or any liquid

accelerant to help start a fire Keep small children and pets away from the fireplace

Never leave a fire unattended

If building a wood fire, keep the fire proportionate to the size of the fireplace

Don't close the damper until the embers have completely stopped burn-

ıng When cleaning out the ashes, don't put them in paper or store them near the home until extinguished

■ Like any appliance, a fireplace requires regular maintenance to ensure its proper working order

Even if you have a gas fireplace, or any other hearth product, the HPBA recommends annual service by a hearth professional certified by the National Fireplace Institute (NFI)

solar power

(AP) - A team from the University of Colorado won a national competition for its design of a solar-powered house built with recycled and environmentally friendly materials

The roughly 800-squarefoot structure took top honors at the Solar Decathlon in Washington, D C

The 10-day competition was sponsored in part by the US Department of Energy

Fourteen teams of students competed to design, build and operate the most efficient solar-powered house

The University of Virginia captured second place, and Auburn University was third

The houses were judged in 10 different categories to determine which most efficiently used solar energy for heating, cooling, hot water, lighting, appliances, computers and charging an electric car

The team from CU used everything from compressed sunflower board to reclaimed bleacher seats for cabinet fac-

included soy adhesives in the countertops and bamboo flooring

To help make the home more energy efficient, the team installed thermally insulated blinds and limited the highest ceiling to 18 feet

For the competition, teams had to devise ways to harness the power of the sun to supply all the energy for an entire household, including a homebased business

Some 100 students and faculty from engineering, architecture and design programs at CU have worked on the project for the last two years, said Matthew Henry, the team's construction manager and design leader

Henry, 28, graduated from CU last spring with a degree in environmental design, but he said the project meant so much to him that he came back to help with the competition

Q. Anne asks: We added a garage to our house two years ago. The concrete floor of the garage is slanted slightly so that when we pull our cars in during snow season or during the rainy season the water that drips off the car pools in one spot.

Unfortunately, the place where it pools is right up against a horizontal piece of the wood framing for an inside wall. The framing board is sitting directly on the concrete, and it is sheetrocked.

ł

I am very fearful of this board rotting and subsequently having to be replaced. I'm feeling if I deal with the problem now, I will minimize any future disaster. My question is, should I drill a channel for the water to run out? I don't know how it would drain onto our new driveway effectively, without creating a whole new problem.

A You are correct Continued exposure to moisture and water will eventually rot the wood in the wall and

the wallboard The fix we suggest might do the trick

However, it should be noted that replacement of the portion of the floor that slopes improperly is the correct solution

First, trim the wallboard an inch or so away from the floor so that it cannot get wet from the puddling Next, drill quarter-inch

holes every few inches between the floor and the mudsill (the horizontal bottom piece of wood at the bottom of the wall) so that water can drain through it

Spray inside the holes with Copper Green or some other product that contains copper napthanate - a pesticide and wood preservative

It also might be a good idea to add ventilation to your garage

Air can help to evaporate the moisture in the summer If the holes don't clog with dirt or ice you should be fine

Also, don't drill the holes if the outside perimeter isn't somewhat lower than the ınsıde




