Letter home details schools' readiness

Plymouth-Canton Schools is notifying parents and staff of the procedures that will be taken in school buildings should the US and Iraq go to war

When 9/11 happened, we were reactive, and we reacted all day," Superintendent Jim Ryan said "Now, with the thought of war, we're trying to be proactive, remembering what we learned from 9/11"

The district is in the process of sending nearly 17,000 letters, describing what the district will do if a conflict breaks out during school hours

"We're going to try to have business as usual unless it's a national emergency and we're shut down," Ryan said "Students will only be released to parents, or those listed on the emergency card

"There will be no live radio or television in K-12 classrooms," Ryan added "That's going to make some of our staff at the (high school) park angry, because they believe it would be very appropriate for their curriculum to be showing it

"However, I believe TV has become very graphic How many times does a student

need to see a plane go into a tower?" he said "As a 54year-old man, that shook me up We believe the parents can best make that decision '

Ryan said classes will always be held "unless a national emergency dictates otherwise" At that point, school officials will use local radio and television stations to broadcast the information "We will never close early unless directed by emergency officials," Ryan said

School officials believe they've learned important lessons from the Sept 11 terrorist attacks



Heide's Flower's enjoying new Plymouth location

Anyone who made a mad dash to Heide's Flowers & Gifts on Valentine's Day to buy flowers for that special person may have been shocked to see an empty store

In this case, the empty store is not a bad sign Last month, Heide's moved from its longtime spot on Ann Arbor Trail at Harvey

Business is doing well at Heide's new location on 217 N Main – thanks to more than a little help from neighbors, said owner Steven Mansfield The new location is north of downtown, just south of the railroad tracks

"Main Street Car Wash put up a sign saying where we moved," Mansfield said

Other businesses have helped out by pointing customers to the new location, he said

"People are finding out where

were are real easily We have a little bit more visibility"

The nearby CSX railroad crossing, just north of the new shop location, may be an annoyance now, but Mansfield said he is confident it won't be for long

"I knew the railroad (crossing) wouldn't be a problem because of the plans to build the underpass (on Sheldon Road)," he said

The biggest money-making days of the year for Heide's, and any florist, are Valentine's Day, Mother's Day, Easter and the December holidays

Heide's has been in Plymouth 104 years, and was in Old Village before moving to Ann Arbor Trail and Harvey

Mansfield said he credits the business's success to its service

"We do everything it takes to help a customer get or do what they want"

Even with the sagging economy,

Heide's business has been good, Mansfield said But sales of silk flowers took a hit, because of competition from larger retailers such as Sam's Club and Meyer

For that reason, Heide's sells custom silk flower arrangements at its new location

Parking was a big reason behind the decision to move The old location, on 995 W Ann Arbor Trail at Harvey, only had eight spots available on site At the new location, there are more than 20 parking spots available

For now, Heide's old location, 995 W Ann Arbor Trail at Harvey, 18 still vacant

Bob Anderson, Plymouth's Downtown Development Authority director, said he doesn't think the spot will be vacant long Downtown Plymouth's vacancy rate for businesses is very low

The big drawback of the building, at least for some businesses, is the large windows However, the abundance of natural light might be good for some businesses, such as art studios, Anderson said

"It seems like every time (a business) leaves, we get something as strong or stronger coming into the spot," Anderson said

A used children's clothing store on Main Street, across from the Penn Theatre, has packed up, but coming soon to its place will be a shoe store specializing in orthopedic footwear

An upscale salon is also coming soon to downtown Plymouth, and a new Subway restaurant on Ann Arbor Trail near Harvey is thriving Becoming Subway's neighbor soon will be an upscale kitchen store

"I'm confident that someone will come into Heide's old location," he said

Drafty senior center headed for major fixup

Plymouth Township's senior center is on the list for a variety of improvements, once all the bureaucratic hurdles have been scaled

A total of \$135,590 has tentatively been slated for improvements at the Friendship Center, located on Schoolcraft at Bradner, north of M-14 Installing new energy-efficient windows, making restrooms handicapped accessible and removing a stage are the main things on the to-do list, said Jim Anulewicz, township public services director

Many Friendship Station users have complained that the building gets drafty and cold

"The seniors indicated to us that there were some problems with cold air coming in through the windows," Anulewicz said

"The seniors just don't use it," he said of the stage If removed, more people would be able to use the building

Community development block grants would be used to fund the project Plymouth Township trustees held a public hearing last week and approved allocating the block grant funds for the project

Wayne County and the federal government will ultimately have to give approval to Plymouth Township to use the block grant funds

The biggest portion of funds, \$88,000, will be used to make improvements at the Friendship Center, if approved

The Friendship Station building was first used as a church, and still has the original stained-glass windows

Next, it was used as a Michigan Department of Transportation field office until the late 1970s, when the state sold the building to Plymouth Township The field office was used by workers building M-14

While the stained glass windows might be pretty, they're not very good at keeping out the cold winds

With the recent chilly temperatures, the problem has become more pronounced, said Bob Lipmyer The 69-year-old self-proclaimed "baby" of the senior center said the problem is especially noticeable near the stage, which at one time was used as a church altar

'It's worse than drafty," Lipmyer said

"We have people in their 90s who use the center and they get extremely cold back near the stage area"

The Friendship Station is utilized by an estimated 100 seniors from Plymouth and Plymouth Township The building is used for weekly card games, occasional dinner events and for fitness classes

"It was a challenging time for the PCAC," Tobin said "We had no home facility, with an office over Wiltse's drugstore (in downtown Plymouth) Our programs were held all over the

community Then we got an old church and converted it to the facility we have today The PCAC is in good shape now'

Stella Greene, the PCAC's development director, will also hold the title of interim director until the PCAC board finds a replacement for Tobin Greene agrees that the PCAC is in good shape

Jennifer has done an outstanding job," Greene said "Her energy, vitality and instincts have been a great benefit to the arts council during a time of tremendous change

We certainly don t like losing her, but there are so many positives,' said Greene "With Jennifer at the new arts center, rt will only strengthen the linkage between the two communities We should feel flattered that Canton came to the arts council to get the energy they need for new programming And, for Tobin, who is a Canton resident, it means a dream come true

"This is as good as it gets Opening a real live theater that just doesn't happen," she said "This is the chance of a lifetime





"The kids did very well with understanding the story, even though it was an upper-level story," Kozub said

Nearly every child has had some experience with bullying Some are victims of bullying by classmates, neighborhood kids or siblings Others may be bullies themselves


Rumble features two cat bullies, named Raja and Malcolm, who taunt other students, in elephant teacher Ms Ivory's class

In *Rumble in the Jungle*, the bullying takes place on the school playground at recess In retaliation, the victimized third-grade children decide to take a nonviolent stand against the bullies – by photographing their misdeeds and showing the photos to Ms Ivory

"The message is to treat others the way you want to be treated," Kozub said "I thought that was valuable"







Lusa, along with Kay Paupore as assistant director, has been taking the staff through their lines on the stage of O'Leary Auditorium

The group rents the backdrop, which will be the inside of the dwarfs' cottage, and graphic artist and AAUW member Wendy Harless will provide the scenery for the royal court Kay Koch is handling the props and costuming for the cast, coming up with oversized ears for Dopey (Sandy Iannucci) and bejeweled crowns for the wicked Queen Braggamore (Sharon Belobraidich of Plymouth) and Prince Michael (Elaine Luther of Saline)

"Her basement is full of props," said Paupore, who retired from Garden City High School almost two years ago "She has some stuff from previous shows and brought some tonight to see what was needed

Sheriff takes action on deadbeat parents

Wayne County Sheriff's deputies, working closely with county prosecutors, have identified and arrested 67 of Wayne County's 115 worst child support deadbeats as part of a new effort being spearheaded by Sheriff Warren C Evans and Prosecutor Michael E Duggan

The Felony Friend of the Court Unit was created in early January to identify, secure warrants for, then track and apprehend the very worst offenders among Wayne County's 28,000 men and women who owe a collective \$3 7 billion in back child support.

For these individuals, Duggan is issuing felony warrants, as opposed to civil warrants. The maximum penalty for a felony conviction for non-payment of child support is four years in prison 'The non-payment of child support is one of the most heartless crimes we see every day because of who it affects," said Evans "These people are not only letting innocent children go without life's bare necessities, they are thumbing their nose at the system This new approach should send a clear message that neither of those behaviors will go unpunished"

Since early January, sheriff's deputies and prosecutors have identified more than 100 people they have classified as the most egregious violators and have been executing felony warrants According to Evans, these are individuals who are employed and have a high likelihood of making good on their payments In just the first month of operation, 67 of the violators, who collectively owe more than \$2.3 million in back child support, have been arrested So far, more than \$1 million of that money has been collected or ordered to be paid as a condition of probation

"This is just the first round," said Evans "We expect that prosecutors will identify additional deadbeats on a regular basis and add them to our felony list"

Because of the efficiency of Sheriff's Department Friend of the Court officers, Evans said that between an average of 700 civil FOC arrests are made each month Approximately 100 of those are as a result of an aggressive identification and apprehension effort by deputies Others are arrested when individuals encounter a police officer for unrelated reasons and are found, through the Law Enforcement Information Network (LEIN)

system, to be wanted for nonpayment of child support

According to Duggan, in order for a person to be charged with a felony for non-payment of child support, their case must meet the following criteria


Must owe at least \$10,000 in back child support

Has been identified as having the ability to pay, but refuses
The ex-spouse must be will-

ing to press charges against them "As word gets out to these scofflaws that they may face felony charges, we believe many of them suddenly will be inspired to make good on their responsibility to their kids," Evans said





The pads, sold individually, should have a glossy green skin and be about % inches thick. If the pad is too thick and dull, the insides might be too pithy Wrapped in plastic and refrigerated, it can last up to two weeks Add to salsa, eggs, chili, burritos or fry or grill alone

The primary rule before cooking, of course, is to remove the pickers Some other tips

Using gloves to clean pads, take an ordinary kitchen peeler and remove spines and eyes Wash well Trim edge to remove bruised and dry parts and wash well again, washing off some of the sticky liquid the plant releases Make certain the pickers and eyes are removed

If you just want to taste it, dice to the size of small green beans, and simmer in water or saute in butter for a few minutes Salt to taste and enjoy Try these easy recipes

FRIED CACTUS LEAVES

2 fresh pads 1 cup cornmeal

dash of salt Oil for frying

De-pick as described in article Slice into¹/2-inch squares

Sprinkle with water and then salt Set aside for about half an hour to allow the juice to come out

It will be rather slick and sticky

The best way to coat the nopalitos is to shake them with the cornmeal in a paper

In hot oil, almost smoking, fry only as many of the nopalitos at a time as will cook without stacking on top of one another

As soon as they brown, remove and drain on a paper towel

They taste almost exactly like fried okra and green beans



Heat the oil in a large saucepan over medium heat Add the onion, garlic and cook for about three to four minutes, stirring occasionally, until slightly soft Add the tomatoes, carrots, celeriac, pumpkin, water and stock Bring to a boil and stir occasionally Stir in the beans and cabbage Season lightly with salt and pepper Reduce the heat and simmer for 50 minutes until all the vegetables are tender

Bring salt water to a boil in a



saucepan Add the pasta and cook until just tender Drain and add to the soup Taste the soup and adjust the seasoning Ladle into warm bowls and sprinkle with freshly grated cheese Serves 6-8

SPICY KIDNEY BEAN, PUMPKIN AND TOMATO SOUP

Pumpkin is a greatly underrated vegetable It balances the spicy heat in this soup and gives it a splash of color, too

> 1/2 cup dried kidney beans 1 tablespoon olive oil 2 onions finely chopped 1 stalk of celery thinly sliced 1 carrot halved and thinly sliced 2 teaspoons tomato paste 1/8 teaspoon dried thyme 1/8 teaspoon dried oregano 1/8 teaspoon ground cumin 5 cups water I bay leaf

Fresh cilantro to garnish

water and let soak for 6 hours or overnight

Drain the beans and put in a saucepan and add enough cold water to cover by 2 inches Bring to a boil for 10 minutes Drain and rinse well

Heat the oil in a large saucepan over a medium heat Add the onion and cook covered for 3-4 minutes until they are just softened

Add the garlic, celery, and carrot and continue to cook for 2 minutes

Add the water, drained beans, tomato paste, thyme, oregano, cumin, water and bay leaf When the mixture begins to bubble, reduce to a low heat and cover Summer gently for 1 hour, sturring occasionally

Stir in the tomatoes, pumpkin and chili paste and continue simmering for about 1 hour more, or until the beans and pumpkin are tender, sturring from time to time

Taste and season the soup Stir in a little more chili paste if desired

Garnish the soup with fresh chopped cilantro

CURRIED LENTIL SOUP WITH FRIED **ONIONS**

everywhere and with the cold weather it makes the idea of walking even less attractive"

Also, many people also mistake hunger for thirst for hunger We consume excessive calories when all we might need is just a glass of water

Change is slow Improve eating habits with a happy attitude Don't try to change your whole hfestyle immediately Start small

Don't try going from two glasses of water each day to eight, increase it slowly with just one or two more glasses

And don't compare yourself to others, Beznos said

"On a daily basis, overweight individuals compare themselves in size to others and sometimes feel out of place with those who are thin," Beznos said "Everyone needs to find their own logic and understanding or 'matter of taste' of what they eat "

Beznos said a high fiber diet of fruits, vegetables, beans, grains, and nonfat dairy products improves insulin and glycemic levels which can lead to weight loss She recommends the following meal in place of a fatty one

■ 1 cup spaghetti with tomato sauce

■ 2 kinds of vegetables or mixed salad

If a ship sunk in 1913, underwater it looks just as it did then It's a cool thing to see, and one of the reasons Dennis Bosak joined the Ford Seahorses Scuba Diving Club

The club is hosting a Great Lakes Shipwreck Festival on Saturday at the Ford Community and Performing Arts Center in Dearborn Bosak said anyone who's interested in history, archeology, boaters and water enthusiasts should attend

"Over 4,000 ships sank in the Great Lakes and to date they've only found half of them," said Bosak 'It's history underwater The Great Lakes area is full of wrecks and artifacts "

Try taking a second look through the viewfinder

ave you ever taken a family through the viewfinder before shot only to discover to your chagrin when you pick up the photos at the lab that there's a telephone pole "growing" out of your motherin-law's head?

Have you ever gone to the zoo, taken what you thought was a terrific shot of the hon, and decided to impress your friends into thinking you just came back from Africa?


But, lo and behold, you pick up your prints only to find out there's a refreshment stand in the background'

Well, don't jump in despair into the lion's den

There's a simple way to avoid these mistakes in your pictures The solution is what I call the "hard, second look"

you snap the shutter

It's true most people don't look closely through the

But by taking that second, hard look through the viewfinder, you

can eliminate all these problems Once you see the distraction, all that's required is simply moving yourself or moving your subject just enough to remove it

Understanding depth-offield can eliminate a distraction, too Using a large aperture will significantly reduce depth-of-field so that an unwanted object in the background or even the background itself will be blurred out in the finished print

Taking a second, hard look through the viewfinder can also cause you to see something that will enhance your photo

Say you're photographing a family member at the edge of a lake and just before you trip

the shutter, you see the majestic mountain across the lake

You think, "What a great backdrop for the picture!" And by simply moving you and your subject slightly, you can include the mountain in the composition for a much stronger photograph

Are you beginning to see the value of taking that second, hard look through the viewfinder before you snap the shutter?

If so, your photographs will be greatly improved and you won't have to throw yourself into the lion's den!







Dialogue brings story of Sapphire's Grave alive

SAPPHIRE'S GRAVE, BY **HILDA GURLEY-HIGHGATE** (DOUBLEDAY, \$23.95).

apphire's Grave is a historical romance which marks the literary debut of Detroit attorney Hilda Gurley-Highgate

Among the noble descendants of the blue-black, fiery Sapphire is Sister, who is driven mad, suffering visions of her forebears and their unspeakable suffering and humiliation Her daughter, Lilly, caring for her mother at an early age, "learned to control, gently, with the unassuming wisdom of one who knew what was best for others"

The "fatherless," sensuous, Vyda Rose, also part of Sapphire's "bloodline of heroines," meets with harrowing tragedy Jewell shares a deep love with her white employer The artistically gifted Amber creates with her hands the "generations old" images she sees in her mind's eye And, at story's end, we meet the charismatic minister named Rae'ven

The kaleidoscopic novel encompasses more than 200 years, countless generations, and numerous players in less than 250 pages

Readers may come away from Sapphire's Grave a little dizzied, feeling that Gurley-Highgate has attempted what so many first-time authors attempt That is to say, she has tried to include too much in too little space, and her reach though certainly commendable - may have exceeded her grasp It strikes me that the story of any one of these leading characters would have made for an intriguing novel

But trying to write about them all, as she does here, threatens to turn them into rather sketchy "types," not fully dimensional characters

Along with this, Gurley-Highgate's prose sometimes careens toward the awkward 'Tears had been waiting for their cue, which they had known would come Nodding at each other, they stepped out from behind Queen Marie's eves")

And, perhaps because she includes so many characters here, she occasionally appears even to lose track of some of them herself (For example, I counted four daughters born to Sapphire, though the author says three)

Flashbacks - some brief, some extended (and interspersed throughout) - further add to the confusion

In spite of the confusion, though, Sapphire's Grave has a way of holding a reader's attention much of the time

Perhaps Gurley-Highgate will get back to her characters some day, giving each of them more attention, nuance, and texture, and, in the process, bringing readers a more rewarding and meaty story

An added thought One wonders if this author has ever tried her hand at playwriting Her dialogue consistently rings true and alive, vivifying her characters more than anything else by far

I found myself wanting to hear more of it all the time, and wondering why relatively little can be found on these pages

Young actor jumps at chance to play Daredevil hero

Scott Terra wasn't familiar with Daredevil when he got the role of the character's alter-ego as a young man in the movie

When I learned Daredevil was a super hero, I thought it would be cool to play one," said Terra, 15 "I enjoyed being the cornerstone for Daredevil's story' Daredevil, which opens Friday, is the first of three movies based on Marvel Comics charac-Terra ters to come out this year Academy Award winner Ben Affleck (Good Will Hunting, The Sum of All Fears) plays the title character as an adult Terra, who was in last year's Eight-Legged Freaks, appears in the beginning and in flashbacks as young Matt Murdock in his pre-hero days. He is blinded and has to come to grips with his handicap, and train in the martial arts Terra's part in the movie, which he auditioned for three times, is 20-25 minutes long "Daredevil is more of a real person He has no super-powers per se like Spiderman He doesn't have all the money and technology like Batman He's on his own," said Terra "Not only that, he's fearless, he has nothing to lose and that makes him even more fearless Plus, he's blind and that makes his character more interesting and challenging '

To prepare for the role, Terra did not read any Daredevil comics Instead, he learned martial arts and gymnastics Additionally, he worked with Tom Sullivan, a blind man hired by the movie company to coach both Terra and Affleck in their respective performances to make it look believable According to Terra, playing someone who's blind was the biggest challenge of making this movie

"(Sullivan) showed me to keep my eyes focused without making them look focused I had special contacts on (in some scenes) to make my eyes look cloudy, I saw only bright light," said Terra "When I had my eyes covered, it seemed like my hearing was more sensitive "

Terra worked closely with veteran actor David Keith (Firestarter), who plays Daredevil's father, Jack Murdock, a washed-up boxer controlled by the mob He makes his son promise to

the same character, they had no scenes together However, Terra met Affleck twice – at a round table script-reading and on the set

"We only spoke a few sentences to one another," he said of Affleck "He's very nice, cool, and quiet"

Terra enjoyed working with Daredevil writer/director Mark Steven Johnson (Simon Birch), whom he said gave him a lot of freedom to play his character

"He's a great director," said Terra "You know he's a director - he's in charge He's calling the shots, but he's nice on a personal level, he'll joke with you and tell you what he wants done without being abrupt"

Terra says Daredevil can't really be compared to Spiderman "Daredevil is more gritty than Spiderman, he said. It's in a darker setting but it's not dreary I think it'll do real well (at the box office) It has great actors, great special effects, and the fight scenes are cool"

"People respond to Van Gogh so strongly because of the physical power of his work," Berkowitz said "The thick strong brush strokes, the textured paint and incredible composition And because of the letters that he wrote to his brother we have a sense of the personality behind the artist whose career only spanned 10 years'

The Toledo Museum of Art is the only place on the continent to view Van Gogh Fields If you miss its Feb 23-March 18 run you'll have to travel to the Kunsthalle Breman museum in Germany to see it

The exhibit is the result of a collaboration between both museums

The Fields exhibit is a stark

A new series will tell the story of four world-recognized shipwrecks, their meeting with fate. and how technology was used to help find the wrecks and try to explain what caused

episode Shipwreck Society executive director Tom Farnquist has led three separate expeditions to the wreck site

Additionally, the production team interviewed five staff and board members of the Shipwreck Museum who were part of the crew for these expeditions and research projects to appear during the program Filming was done in January on location at the Shipwreck Museum







Pete Mazzoni and Carlin go back to 1980 when they were both in the sixth grade They went to Stevenson High School together, stayed close through college, became coaches through their love of athletics and have been best friends since Day One

"He's always been the guy to make you laugh," said Mazzoni, the hockey coach at Livonia Churchill "We went golfing one day and he was driving the cart over a bridge His hand slipped off the steering wheel and we didn't make it over the bridge The front wheels were torn up He looked at me and asked, 'Do you think they are going to be

Truth 15, you couldn't stay mad at him How can you get ticked at someone who lives life to its fullest? 'You can't," said Franklin wrestling coach Dave Chiola, who witnessed it firsthand when Carlın coached under hım at Garden Cıty "That kıd pulled the glove out and just freaked out But that's typical of Carlin He would always laugh at things, at life And he would never, ever complain about what he was going through'

Maybe it was part of the wrestling mentality Most wrestling coaches will tell you they aren't like normal people, certainly not like normal coaches 'We're not," Chiola said "Other coaches don't understand it We'll be at the same tournament and I may see something in a match and try to help him We'll practice together We've been at meets where he's had two kids wrestling at the same time and hed go coach one kid and I'd coach the other Other coaches don't understand that They don't see how we can go out on the mat and try to beat the others' brains out, then hook up for beers after that'

THURSDAYS

Every Thursday during the season, the strange group of coaches would do just that at the Ground Round Carlin went, Chiola 1s always there Stevenson's Bob Moreau too, as is Churchill's Marty Altounian, Garden City's Aaron Davis, RU assistant Jim Gourlay and maybe some oth-

"And we sit there and just talk about wrestling," Altounian said "We'd wrestle each other a couple hours

before, then go out afterward We talk about the meets and Jim always, always tries to pull a prank on someone It might be the waitress, it might be the last one there, but he always trues to make us laugh'

Carlin got into wrestling when he was a freshman at Stevenson Moreau was his coach for the first two years, Don Berg after that After he graduated from Stevenson in 1987 and started taking classes at Eastern Michigan, then Schoolcraft, he'd help out Berg at Stevenson and teach clinics for Livonia adult education From there, he coached with Chiola at Garden City In 1998 he got his head coaching job at RU

"He really got into it,' Moreau said "He's got such a passion for wrestling He puts all kinds of time and effort into it He helped Don Berg when Stevenson was nothing and turned it into one of the top four in the state for years And he went to RU and turned them from one of the worst in the state to a team that could be in the top eight in Division 2 He just puts 150 percent into it"

CANCER STRIKES

But while he was taking classes and helping coach, he also learned what the cause of a lump on his hand was lymph node cancer In 1991, he lost a couple of fingers A couple of years later, he lost his whole hand A lump near the elbow cost him his arm up to the joint In 2001, he lost it up to his shoulder And 10 days later, Carlin was back helping coach football at RU without missing a beat

"But he never, ever complained about it, never said it wasn't fair, never griped,' Mazzoni said "Occasionally, if we went to a reunion or saw some people who didn't know, he'd tuck his sleeve in his pants He didn't share it with

people he didn't see all of the time

And sometimes, he didn't share it with the people he saw all the time

"One day he was leaving practice (at Garden City), and he turned to me and said, 'Oh, meant to tell you I won't be at practice for a couple of weeks I m having chemotherapy," Chiola said 'And he said it like it was no big deal He'd be back two weeks later wearing a hat and ready to go'

At the beginning of this season, things started to get worse He was tiring more easily and missing meets on occasion Ask him how he was doing and things couldn't be better

He went to Beaumont Hospital in the beginning of January and found out there were problems Big problems Enough to force him to miss his father's funeral This time, the cancer was going to claim ıt all

"Even when you saw him at the hospital he said he was going to be around for months, even though the doctors would say days," Gourlay said "He's always been very private about it"

The doctors planned on sending him home Feb 3, but not before one last piece of business remained – a party the night before Not a big one, but considering he was still in a hospital room it was big enough Room size be damned, his wrestlers, his coaches, his friends and his family piled into his room at Beaumont – 15, 20 at a time, telling stories and laughing There was pizza, frozen Cokes, jawbreakers - all the things he craved, he could have

"He asked for a chew (of tobacco) and someone gave it to him,' Chiola said "The nurse went to give him medication and busted him She looked in his mouth and went, What is that?

They took him to his sister

Kım's the next day, because the house that she and husband Ken have was a little more accomodating to his needs But any of the Carlin clan - Frank, Kelly or John would have gladly put him up

On the way home from the hospital – typical Jim – he wanted the ambulance to turn on the siren, and was surprised when they told him no But once the ambulance turned the corner, the lights were flashing and the siren was on He'd won out and was laughing the whole way

And on Feb 6, he watched his team wrestle one last time He was a little doped up and a little out of it, but the fire was inside and the passion was there And no one in the gym was happier than Carlin to see his team - a team which Carlin's cronies think could go to the state finals – beat Lincoln Park

ALWAYS REMEMBER

When he came home from the hospital, he had a steady stream of visitors at his sister Kim's house Old wrestlers, old coaches, all of them friends Some knew for a while, some just found out, all wanted to be with him

Over his last few days, his system shut down, but never his spirit On Thursday at 7 10 p m, his spirit was overwhelmed

"He knew it was the end, but in the last week and a half, he decided he's going to go out strong," Laura said "I firmly believe Jim was put on this earth for a reason He's a learning lesson for all of us. I think he was brought into our lives so we all know how to be so strong"

Schoolcraft secures a conference title with OT win

Chalk up another Eastern Conference men's basketball championship for Schoolcraft College

The Ocelots were able to survive a severe test Wednesday night before pulling out a thrilling 97-95 overtime win at Flint Mott

Freshman guard James Holmes of Belleville came off the bench to score a gamehigh 29 points, while 6-foot-6 center Torvoris Baker and UNC-Charlotte signee Marcus Bennett each added 22 for the Ocelots, ranked No 4 in the latest NJCAA Division I poll

With just two games to go, Schoolcraft, 24-1 overall, clinched its fourth straight conference title (11-0 record) Mott, meanwhile, falls to 17-8 and 8-3

Schoolcraft shot a blistering 66 6 percent from the field (36-of-54), but had trouble shaking the pesky Bears, who made a total of 15 three-point shots

The Ocelots, who led by only two at halftime, 36-34, took 70-61 lead on a Gary Johnson basket with 5 12 left But Mott stormed back to send the game into overtime on a three-pointer by Darrell Evans with 19 seconds to play to make it 79all

Schoolcraft had two chances to win the game in the final seconds as Holmes' short jumper rimmed inand-out as well as Baker's tip-in attempt

In the overtime, Mott took an 87-83 advantage with 2 23 to go on a basket by Jay Youngblood

The Ocelots regained the lead, 90-88, on a big threepointer by Holmes with 1 12 left, but Youngblood tied it again at 90-all just 16 seconds later, only to have Baker score inside Schoolcraft then came up with a big steal (by Bennett) and Baker nailed 3-of-4 free throws to close out the win

"We made basketball plays tonight, it was our execution down the stretch that did it for us," Schoolcraft coach Carlos Briggs said "We had a stretch after getting that nine-point lead where we didn't handle their pressure very well Mott fought and clawed the whole game, but we never gave up

"Gary Johnson, down the stretch defensively, made some big deflections and got his hands on a lot of balls And Baker was a warrior out there Andre Scott came up with a big block for us (in OT) Both Bennett and Holmes knocked down shots and that's what you have to do to win championships on the road"

Kris Krzyminski paced Mott with 22 points, while DeMarcus Ishmeal added 21 Youngblood contributed 19 and Evans finished with 16

"We broke down defensive ly a few times — that was key," Mott coach Steve Schmidt said "You can't fault our kids' effort They gave everything they had

"You won't see a better basketball game and we have a lot of respect for Schoolcraft and how well they prepare"



Now a volunteer with the non-profit Isha Foundation, Rajdev says she recommends Isha yoga to her patients, but also finds time every day to do the practices herself

"I have a lot more energy than I used to," she said, and I'm happier I'm having fun every day"

The program is also said to enhance memory, concentration and decision-making capacity

Dr Dorrie Rosenblatt, a retired geriatric physician from the University of Michigan, also attended the event Rosenblatt was once unable to walk more than 150 feet and qualified for a handicapped-parking permit due to a heart ailment that required three surgeries At night she slept attached to a breathing machine

Her health was so poor that she considered herself a "cardiac cripple'



niques to control breathing and mental function

This is not meant to be an anatomical representation of the layers of the human body, but rather a metaphorical chart of the self

"If physical body, energy body and mental body begin to function consciously, then you will see that health and wellbeing is very naturally taken care of, said Sadhguru


Controlling arthritis often involves more than taking your anti inflammatory medicines If you have another condition care of that problem is likely as important to your joints as your arthritis

CONTROLLING ARTHRITIS

For instance consider diabetes For the health of your joints it is important that your diabetes is under optimum control. One reason is because diabetes has many effects on joints. For instance, diabetes can thicken the skin around tendons so the tendons lose their ability to freely move The result is strain on the muscles of the hand and difficulty in holding keys and grasping cups and dishes Diabetes causes adhesive capsulitis of the shoulder In this condition the shoulder joint shrinks and you cannot move the arm through its usual motion. Diabetes can impair nerve ending and this in turn, can place sufficient strain on your joints to cause an inapparent fracture medically called a Chargot Joint Diabetes creates a problem when arthritis therapy requires either a cortisone injection

or taking steroids orally on a daily basis Cortisone causes a rise in blood sugar if you need steroids for your joints and your blood sugar is already uncontrolled cortisone therapy can accelerate diabetic complications to the eye heart and kidney and make you prone to infection

In short good arthritis therapy requires good attention to your other medical conditions and to your total health





Study finds mental gains after damage

CHICAGO (AP) -Neurological damage in very

small premature babies may decrease over time, according to research that tracked children through age 8 and found substantial mental gains

Many youngsters once considered retarded ended up scoring in the nearly normal range on tests of verbal function and IQ, the study found

Children who received early intervention such as speech therapy, those from two-parent families, and those whose mothers had high levels of education were found to experience the greatest improvement in mental function

The findings are surprising because previous research has found negative long-term results for very small preemies, and conventional thinking says that IQ doesn't change – at least in people born at a normal weight

We were thrilled by the findings and surprised because previous reports suggested that there's an adverse outcome for very low birthweight babies," said lead researcher Dr Laura Ment, a Yale University pediatric neurologist

We found children progressively getting better between 3 and 8 years of age," Ment said

The study involved 296 children born at 28 weeks and weighing just over 2 pounds (one kilogram) on average Results appear in Wednesday's Journal of the American Medical Association

Children born extremely prematurely are at risk for a variety of neurological problems, ranging from cerebral palsy, mental retardation and vision trouble to more subtle learning and behavior difficulties

BRAIN CAN REPAIR

Ment said the study results echo recent research in animals showing that the developing brain can repair itself

A JAMA editorial suggests that broader tests of mental function would have had poorer results and notes that IQ improvements were still in the average to low-average range

"Despite improvements in scores, such low average functioning can place a child at significant academic disadvantage," said editorial author Glen Aylward, a developmental specialist at Southern Illinois University's medical school

The youngsters were given a test of verbal abilities and three different IQ tests starting at age 3 The average IQ scores

increased from 90 to 95 The average score on the verbal test increased from 88 points at age 3 to 99 points at age 8 Data from normal

average verbal scores improve by about 4 5 points over time, the authors said

Nearly half of the children with verbal scores in the mental retardation range below 70 - at 3 years of age scored at least in the borderline range - 70 to 80 - at age 8 And about two-thirds of the children with borderline scores on both tests at age 3 had scores in the normal range at age 8

A score of 100 would be average on both the IQ and verbal tests for a normal birth-weight 8-year-old


Less significant improvements were found in children born with bleeding in the brain - a common complication in very low birth-weight babies

Prominent preemie researcher Dr Maureen Hack was skeptical of the results and said the children studied were not given tests designed to measure problems usually linked with prematurity, such as attention deficits and visual-motor impairments

Hack also faulted the researchers for not comparing the prematurely born children with youngsters born at normal weight and said the preemies likely would have fared worse if such a comparison had been made

"I personally feel that basically, the functional problems persist," said Hack, of Rambow Babies and Children s Hospital in birth-weight children suggest Cleveland





asting energy because of inadequate attic insulation is the least of your problems when you consider worstcase scenarios, which became reality for many Michiganders a couple of winters ago

For those with short, optimistic memories, I'm talking about the potential structural damage to your home from ice dams, the byproduct of insulation allowing heat loss through the roof

The ice dams that hang from gutters are actually created in your attic, where poor ventilation and improperly installed insulation work together to allow your roof to heat up in the winter

The peak of your roof 1s probably warm and clear of snow (because hot air rises), while the eaves at the bottom remain cold and snowy When the snow melts off the top of the roof and the water runs down to the eaves, the water freezes and forms an ice dam

In some cases, those ice dams can get so big and heavy they can tear off your gutter and overhang

But even if that type of damage doesn't occur, the gallons of water behind the dam can and will do major damage to your roof, attic, drywall and your home's interior wiring

What to do to prevent ice dams? There are two things you can do to keep warm air from seeping out of your home's interior living space and into the attic, thereby keeping your roof cool - improve the insulation and maintain proper ventilation

Improving the ventilation, meanwhile, can be as easy as cleaning or replacing soffit vents blocked with insulation, painted over or just plain dirty Soffit vents are on the underside of your home's eaves The idea of soffit vents is that air enters them and flows through the attic

Styrofoam, plastic or cardboard air baffles can help prevent the blocking of airflow from insulation stuffed between the sheathing and top plate If all goes as planned, your attic should always be the same temperature as the outside air - cool in the winter and warm in the summer

What you should know if you're ready to lease a car or truck

This week I want to do more than just tell you about a new car I want to explain why it still makes sense to lease a car or truck.

Anne Fracassa

Not only is it a good idea in some cases, but also it s good to do your homework. I'll get into that today, too, by explaining what common lease terms actually mean

Remember, when leasing a new vehicle -- like, say, the 2003 Pontiac Vibe, which is a popular choice, you should always read -- and reread -- the lease to be certain you know and understand all the obligations and commitments of the lease agreement.

Most times, the leasing dealer will explain all the commitments before you sign the agreement But just to be certain, you should have a professional take a look at it Hiring a lawyer to read the lease agreement could save you money down the road when you decide to turn in, or purchase your leased vehicle

To help you understand some of the terminology you ll find in the lease agreement, we've defined some of them These terms are defined by Ford Motor Co literature and other industry sources

These lease-term definitions should help you make a wise choice when leasing -- or buying -- your next new car, truck, minivan or sport utility vehicle **RESIDUAL VALUE**

Also known as lease-end value or guaranteed future value All three of these terms are used to let you know what the leasing company feels your vehicle will be worth at the end of the lease agreement This value is always determined at the start of the lease It will vary according to the terms of the lease, how much mileage is allowed and the make and model of the vehicle you lease **RECONDITIONING RESERVE**

This is your refundable security deposit You will have to pay a security deposit in cash at the beginning of your lease It will be held until the lease's end The leasing dealer uses this money as leverage that you will meet all lease obligations and commitments This security deposit is usually refunded to you unless there is exessive wear and tear on the vehicle or the mileage has exceeded what you agreed to at the beginning of the lease If this

applies in your case, money is subtracted from the secu rity deposit and you ll receive the remaining amount EXCESS MILEAGE

The standard mileage allowed on a leased vehicle is 15,000 miles per year That's about what the average person drives in a given year If you think you ll be driving more than 15,000 a year, you can add more mileage options to your lease Ford Credit charges 8 cents per mile and allows it to be added to your monthly lease payment This also lowers the lease-end value of the vehicle by the same amount, so it's very important for you to determine how much mileage you ll put on the vehicle If you prepay the mileage and don t use it, the lease company will refund your 8 cents per mile unused The total must be greater than a dollar and applies only if you don t buy the car If, by chance, you drive more than 15,000 per year and don t prepay the mileage, the lease company will charge you more than a dime per mile If you decide to purchase your car at the end of the lease, you wont be charged for any excess miles

PURCHASE OPTION

It's a clause written into your lease that allows you to purchase the leased vehicle at the end of the lease for a predetermined price

PURCHASE OPTION PRICE

The purchase option price is negotiable Some dealers may write leases with a purchase option price higher than the guaranteed future value, but in most cases the guaranteed future value is the same amount as the purchase option price

LESSEE

leasing company LESSOR

The dealer or leasing company that leases a vehicle to the customer

CAPITALIZED COST REDUCTION

A down payment on a lease that can reduce your monthly payments Some lessors will agree to take a trade-in instead of asking for a cash down payment. WEAR AND TEAR

If you keep your car in good operating condition and follow the lessor s scheduled maintenance recommendations, you shouldn't have any problems with excess wear and tear Some of the things you can do include washing and waxing your car regularly, repairing any major dents or body damage and chips and cracks in the windshield, rotating the tires at regular intervals and keeping them properly inflated and replacing any items that have been lost or damaged (including outside mirrors, hubcaps or antennas)

CLOSED-END VS OPEN-END LEASES

Closed-end and open-end leases refer to who bears the risk of the vehicles worth at the end end of the agreement In a closed-end lease, the leasing company bears the risk (the market risk is closed to the lessee) In an open-end lease, the lessee shares responsibility for how much the vehicle is worth at the end of the lease If the car is worth more than anticipated at the end of the lease, the lessee shares the profit If the car is worth less, the lessee pays the difference
