Hopefuls head down school stretch

Four candidates are vying for a chance to be on the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education the next four years And, if the past is any indication, a low

voter turnout will mean a minority of the district's residents will elect the two

eventual winners

Elections Clerk Elizabeth Adams said the number of absentee ballots were on par with last year That could signal that only 3-5 percent of the district's 76,000 registered voters will visit the polls on Monday

The four candidates include Richard Ham-Kucharski, who failed in his first

two bids to be elected, Roy McCutcheon, making his initial run for the board, incumbent Mark Slavens, who is completing his first four-year term on the Board of Education, and Roland Thomas, who previously served a total of 17 years as a trustee

Thomas believes it's that experience which is needed to pull PlymouthCanton Schools through its current budget crisis

"They've never been through a difficult financial situation like they're going through today," he said "It's a time where you have to be fair, consistent, and, direct to people, be honest with them and don t pull any punches You've got to

Plymouth passes budget

The Plymouth city commission, without much fanfare Monday night, passed a \$6 3 million general fund budget

After five study sessions, the commission whittled \$851,000 from the original budget presented by City Manager Paul Sincock It leaves the general fund with a slim \$137,000 balance

"There's not much margin for error," Commissioner Ron Losselle said of the less than two percent margin "Department heads will have to be very tight in their budgets and not overspend

"The big thing will be anything unexpected, like another cut in revenue sharing from the state, or tax money doesn't come in,' he added "We have quarterly budget reviews, so if we start running into trouble, we ll have to adjust expenses back"

City commissioners already know the 2004-05 budget could sult in deeper cuts. They plan





Final plans OK'd for AA Road condo project

If the rest of his plans break the right way, Tom Bohlander could see construction on his 80-unit at the old Sunshine Honda location on Ann Arbor Road begin some time in the next 90 days

The Plymouth Township board pretty much paved the way at its last meeting, approving the planned unit development contract and the final development plan for Plymouth Village

The board also approved rezoning of the last couple of lots in the area, a move that was required before construction could begin

Now, developers want to get the project ın gear

'We want to move forward as quickly as possible," said Steve Schafer, representing the developer "Hopefully, we'll get started in very short order, the next eight weeks or so"

Schafer said the next step involved sanitary sewer/water permits from Wayne County The county road commission has already recommended approval the vacation of roads connected to the project, a move that drew no objections from area residents Approval from the Wayne County Commission is expected, Schafer said

The project will average some 34 6 feet in height, although some points will be higher under the PUD The height was allowed under a revision of the township's height ordinance passed several months

According to Schafer, the condo units range from some 1,100 square feet to about 1,600 square feet and will sell for roughly \$200,000

"Typically, they appeal to young professionals and young empty-nesters," Schafer told the board

The condo development is the result of a compromise with Bohlander, who originally was going to expand his old Sunshine Honda auto dealership on the site Residents in the neighborhood voiced strong objections to that plan

Bohlander eventually sold Sunshine Honda and came through with plans for the condo development

Schafer told the board ground could be broken on the development 'within 90 days

Woman aims for beauty title

Plymouth psychologist wants national crown

With an attitude opposite the traditional perception of a beauty pageant contestant, Maureen Huebel of Plymouth 1s approaching her appearance in the national Ms and Mrs US Beauties contest with a different thought She just wants to have fun

Huebel, a 1993 graduate of Livonia Churchill High School and a veteran pageant contestant, heads to Aurora, Ill , for the June 22 national event after earning her title as Mrs Michigan US Beauties But, despite what people might think of beauty contestants, Huebel said her performance in Illinois won t be about winning

"There are people who take it seriously,' said Huebel, a clinical therapist for New Center Community Mental Health Services in Detroit 'For me, it's a chance to push my platform, and it's a chance to meet people"

As a psychologist, her platform centers around mental health and substance abuse awareness She's concerned about budget cuts Wayne County has made and hopes her appearances in pageants such as these give her avenues to explore

We have clients wandering the streets with no prescription coverage,' Huebel said 'My ultimate goal is to sit down with Gov (Jennifer) Granholm and

tell her what it's all about I want to increase awareness of what's going on "

She's already getting the chance The director of Brighton Hospital happened to catch Huebel during a local-access cable television show she was on, and invited her to do some speaking engagements at his hospital

Not bad for a beauty pageant contestant But it's part of why Huebel likes these US Beauties pageants, now in their third year, because they concentrate more on the whole person than just the looks


"They focus on who you are and what you are, rather than what you look like in a bathing suit, Huebel said "We have sportswear Basically, you can wear anything you want, as long as it *isn't* a bathing suit

Entering, and winning, pageants is nothing new to Huebel, who competed for the first time while still in high school She found them a solid source for college funding, paying for 18 months worth of schooling from scholarship money she won in pageants

volunteering with Meals On Wheels in both Ypsilanti and Plymouth

Students found the

Ypsilanti program not only has to deal with feeding needy seniors, but funding for the Meals On Wheels program

"They used to have two meals a day, but because of cutbacks in budgets they sometimes deliver a morning meal, and only a second meal for those who really need it,' said Reid

It makes you feel so bad because here we are living lives with all these benefits. and there are people down the road that don't have shelter and food, added Arastu

"It really breaks your heart ' Gorzalski spent time with her mother delivering meals in Plymouth, which she said

was a real eye-opener 'One man couldn't hear at all, and we had to help him read because he couldnt see well,' she said But, he was

so happy that we delivered his only meal of the day

I don t get to see my grandparents often, so it was a real blessing to see and interact with these older people, she said 'I think I'll continue to do this to be involved in the community'

Ott said she has a special place in her heart for Meals On Wheels because her grandmother started the same program in the Ontario, Canada town where she lives

If we didn't have this program, people would be hun gry and they wouldn't get the right nutrition, said Ott "Many people are helpless, and we need to help them

Some students tackled more controversial social issues Aimee Hutton, Lauren Reed and Kristina Zaumseil, all of Canton Township, didn't take the easy way out They volun teered for Right to Life Lifespan in Livonia

'We all came in pro-choice, and I don't know if it changed our positions completely, but I learned a lot about the other side of the issue, said Reed We learned about what abortion involves, and the mental, as well as physical, consequences of abortion

The project team identified their agency's issues as abortion and teen sex, with their solution being abstinence

Their basic message is to resist the pressures, keep your virginity, and if you do have a child take the responsibility and value the life you've created, whether you keep the baby or give it up for adoption," said Zaumseil

No matter if you are pro choice or pro life, you can relate to the issue of abstinence,' said Reed

As the project comes to an end, McVey would like to see her students continue to be involved in the community's they live

Hopefully, some kids will like the issue and remain with the agency by continuing to do community service because they feel it's a civic duty," she said

"If not, they at least know about the problems out there'







Elaine Donnelly's efforts to protect women from combat began years ago, when concerns about her daughter prompted her to join the battle against the proposed Equal **Rights** Amendment

"The reason I became involved in the Equal Rights Amendment was, I dıdn't want my daughter to be drafted,' she told an audience of some 75 Bloomfield Republican Women's Club members at a recent luncheon

While the Equal Rights Amendment was defeated, the

Livonia resident now has a related cause - reversing recent decisions that allow women to serve in front line combat positions

When in March, world headlines reported the three U S enlisted women captured or missing in Operation Iraqi Freedom, "People kept asking me, 'I thought there were laws against women in combat, she said "Well, guess what, thanks to the Clinton years, not only are there no laws against women in combat, there are few regulations"

Donnelly is president of the Center for Military Readiness, an independent, nonprofit educational organization specializing in promoting sound military personnel policies in the armed forces She founded it in 1993

Before that, in the 1980s, she had served a three-year term on the Pentagons Defense Advisory Committee on Women in the Services, and she served on the 1992 Presidential Commission on the Assignment of Women in the Armed Services

Her luncheon message, entitled Leadership, Morale and Morality in the US Military, was well-received by the audience of women and some men at the Forest Lake Country Club in Bloomfield Hills Of course I agree with

Elaine 100 percent,' said Violet Vestevich of Bloomfield Hills She provided us information that we really don't get to hear We are very proud of our military, and we want to keep it that way

Edith Simmons of Southfield said, 'Shes a very knowledgeable patriotic American She inspires us to become involved in the workings of our military



and our government"

DIFFERENCES EVIDENT

Donnelly said that in 1994, then-Secretary of Defense Les Aspin revised laws protecting women from combat with 1ittle notice or public understanding of the consequences" He did so because of 'feminist demands," she said

Abolished were the Defense Department's "risk rule, which spared women in support units from assignments close to the front line, and "substantial risk of capture' as a reason to exempt women from involuntary assignments in previously all-male positions

Evidence that women don't have equal opportunity to survive in fights, are more likely to be abused, and don't have equal opportunity to help fellow soldiers survive was disregarded, she said

As a result, the three US enlisted women were serving in a transportation unit supporting the 3rd infantry division near the front lines in Iraq

One thing we all agree on, they were brave women," she said "But the question is, can't they serve without being in units with a high risk of capture?'

Surveys show that enlisted women themselves do not want to go into combat on the same basis as men - in fact, only 10 percent do, Donnelly said

Spec Shoshana Johnson, a single mother who was later rescued, "wanted to join the Army and learn cooking skills,

but instead found herself serving in a very dangerous situation They are not to blame for the problem'

But feminist politicians say, We need an opportunity to break the glass ceiling That's the kind of logic I deal with every day"

Donnelly believes, however, 'If there is a conflict between career considerations and the

needs of the military, needs of the military must come first '

OTHER REASONS, TOO

Donnelly mentioned several other reasons she believes that women should not serve in combat

"There are many psychologists who say the loss of a mother is worse than if a man left them behind'

She also said that statistics show a spike in pregnancies before a military deployment, so the woman can stay behind "Men resent it," she said

Donnelly also criticized the military welfare system," which draws young single mothers Benefits include "kıddy hotels" with round the clock care "We need to support them, but we do not need to have 24/7 child care as an option'

President George Bush said he would leave it up to his generals as to whether to revisit Clinton era policies, she said But, "The problem is that generals respond to the president's leadership"

She urged signing of a petition that asks to restore the risk rules, and review other Clinton era gender policies

Doing so, to Donnelly, would make sense - especially as a Republican As she said while telling why she became a Republican, "I would say most of our principles are based on common sense and good morality"

Indeed it has Most new programs require a year or two to develop, not Canton Abraham's Chiefs posted a winning record their first season, and have had a winning record in three of their four years Last year, they were 15-10-0 and finished first in the Western Lakes Activities Association's Western Division

"The foundation of a quality program is in place," said Wheaton "Now we have to maintain it, tweak it

'I want to turn this into a perennial top-10 team, always up there in Division I Last year we got there, we got as high as No 9"

Wheaton, a 1991 Salem HS graduate who now teaches history there - he got his undergraduate degree at Western Michigan in '96, his masters at Madonna in '01 – met Abraham five years ago and, when Abraham took the Canton job, became his assistant. "I learned a lot from Dan," he said, adding he has coached in the junior ranks in Plymouth, but this "is my first real (head) coaching gig' The question that lingers is,

Why leave? It appears Canton is perhaps on the verge of becoming the kind of team Wheaton envisions So why would Abraham leave when the program he built is on the way up?

"There are some things I want to do outside of coaching, Abraham explained 'I don't live locally, and the travel was tough

Abraham, who lives in Allen Park and teaches physical education at Discovery Middle School, has been a head coach of a high school team for the past eight years, he was an assistant coach for the two years prior to that As Wheaton noted, next winter will be the first Abraham hasn't been coaching or playing hockey'since he was six years old "

Abraham made certain to point out his resignation had nothing to do with the people he worked with "The last four years have been real nice nonproblem years," he said "The parents and booster club were always very supportive It's such a positive thing, getting that type of support

The players were special, too "I'll always remember the great group of kids we had, all four years,' he said

"My goal was to get it off the

ground, to build a program that was well-recognized I did what I wanted to do, I did it for four years, and I had a great group of kids'

After a bit of reflection, Abraham added, "What a great way to go out, on top" Whether or not he'll coach again, he could only say it's 'impossible to tell " He will provide Wheaton with any assistance he requests

Although Wheaton has never * been a head coach at the high school level, the transition should be a smooth one In addition to a similar coaching style, he has the added advantage of being familiar with the players in the program

"I know their personalities, their strengths and weaknesses," he said Canton will remain a "strong forechecking team," one that's solid defensively "It all starts in your zone," Wheaton said

Asked if he will make any significant changes, he answered, "It's hard to say We'll go with the same basic system, then adjust things as the season goes on, according to the situation"

Anticipate some change, but not much — no sense tinkering with a winning formula

Take time to put life in a frame

Renee Skoglund died Monday fol lowing a long struggle with cancer She wrote this column a week before her death. It is a tribute to her strength and always positive spirit

Several years ago while in college, I fell in love with a Midwestern author, Wright Morris, who spent many years as a photographer, a calling that was often reflected in the way he set up scenes in his stories

Through Morris, my classmates and I viewed people through windows, landscapes through barn doors, and life in general through doorways

Morris' 72-year-old curmudgeon of a protagonist, Floyd Warner, was viewed more gently, more humanly through this literary technique

For most of us, Warner was just a reach through a window

I once wrote a short story, Saying Good-bye to Bernice, which to this day remains my favorite attempt at fiction. The story was inspired by my mother, who stood in her kitchen one day looking out the corner window into Bernice's yard


"You know, I still miss Bernice,' said my mom Bernice had been dead for 10 years


Three days later I had my story It went on to win first place in the now defunct Detroit Monthly's annual short story contest, and first prize statewide and nationally as the Michigan Press Women's entry in fiction writing Bernice's entire life, as sheltered as it was, came to life through a kitchen window The reader knew she sun dried her hair on summer mornings, smoked cigarettes while sucking in and blowing out the words to Patsy Cline songs on her porch at night And they knew that when a strong wind came along as Bernice was pinning her husband's work shirts on the line to dry, she wore bright pink nylon panties They also knew that Bernice was just too afraid to leave her back yard The point of this column. my last since I officially will have resigned for health reasons May 30, is simply this Take time to view life through a door frame once in a while First look at the contents of a room then go back and slowly scan See how the sun puddles on the floor then rises through a filtery fog of dust See the rocker piled high with discarded clothes or nothing Make connections and see things you haven't seen before These rooms contain the essence of people who once occupied them, or perhaps still do

ne, two, three and four'" "Where's my emotion? Where's my faces?" "When you're doing frappe, your knees have to stay in the same time and place!" It's early spring and, as any dancer in the Plymouth-Canton area knows, the sounds of recital and the upcoming summer season are in the air There are plenty of

places in the area where young and old, female and male, graceful and two-left-footed alike can participate in the artistry and activity

According to the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce, eight dance studios make Canton home, and two are in Plymouth. A little dancer with a bouquet of pink daisies runs up to Feasel and asks, 'Should we go to jazz now?'

Her teacher tells her that she may, if she is finished with her part Feasel, who has been teaching for more than 15 years, explains that her jazz dancers also are required to take ballet

"Ballet 15 the foundation for pretty much all types of dancing," says Feasel "They get their technique that's necessary, it just makes them a more wellrounded dancer"

Retiring rabbi faces new challenges

When Sherwin Wine retires next month after 40 years as founding rabbi of Birmingham Temple, he merely will transfer his energy to his other passions

"I'm shifting my work," says Wine, a dynamic, imposing, outspoken Birmingham resident who thinks outside the box

"I want to work on visiting more communities, training more rabbis and doing more writing" Wine, who at 75 operates at full throttle intellectually and physically, will continue to travel the world and to further develop the Birmingham-based Center for New Thinking, his take on community education

The visiting, training and writing all fit his goal of securing the religion he began — Humanistic Judaism — as the fifth branch of Judaism, alongside Orthodox, Conservative, Reform and Reconstructionist

'One of the big concerns a few years back was whether Humanistic Judaism would continue," Wine says "People were saying, 'What's going to happen when Sherwin goes?' I hated that"

MOVEMENT GROWS

Wine estimates that 30,000 members in 12 countries consider themselves part of the Humanistic Jewish movement, with the outreach larger than that They identify culturally, historically and traditionally with Judaism and with its ethical values, but they don't





believe in God

"For us, the heart of religion is not God, prayer or worship but human behavior," Wine said back in 1975 That was during the time when he was labeled "the atheist rabbi" and the subject of condemnation

Today, he says, "Our focus was not to deny God but to affirm people We're helping create something long lasting for the worlds of religion, philosophy and Judaism' Completing his fifth book, The Jews From a Humanistic Perspective, is a priority These and other writings preserve his work the way his talks never can That's because he speaks from a single, salmon-colored, 4-inch by 6-inch card, never writing out the full text of what he will say

"I think very carefully about my talks," he says "I consider the podium a barrier between the speaker and audience For me, talking to people is a very enjoyable experience"

Those who encounter him even once are impressed by his memory, which allows him to recall historical facts as easily as he inquires after each temple member's child by name

"It's not just his memory, it's his whole system of knowledge," explains Rabbi Adam Chalom, 27, who along with Rabbi Tamara Kolton, 32, will lead Birmingham Temple after Wine's retirement next month

'A GENIUS'

'He's clearly a genius," Kolton adds, citing his command of world events "But he understands it's not only the day that Napoleon conquered Europe that is important but the day that your daughter is born

"His humor is delicious and it's really part of enjoying him' Retirement also will allow

Wine to travel Antarctica and Cuba are two of the few places he hasn't been

"I like politically interesting trips," Wine says "I don't sleep a lot when I travel I walk, sometimes as much as 20 miles in a day I know what I want to see and I don t want to waste my time Next to philosophy my major interest has

been history Travel is my way of seeing history in the flesh It's my greatest recreation "

Connie Wolberg, a Southfield-based travel agent and temple member, has arranged many of his trips, accompanying him on some She is amazed at his energy, thirst for new adventure, and ability to take mishaps with humor Her favorite story involves an over-eager guide in West Africa who took Wine and his longtime partner Richard McMains to see a witch doctor supposedly renown for his supernatural powers

"This somehow involved the killing of a chicken," Wolberg says "But the chicken objected to being sacrificed and eventually Rabbi Wine and McMains joined the witch doctor, numerous family members and the guide in chasing this hysterical chicken all over the back yard It is a vision, totally lacking in rabbinical dignity, that I will cherish forever

Wine's wry comment "You can always learn from other clergy'

CHOOSING HIS PATH

Wine did not grow up in Detroit bent on founding a new religion

He came from an observant family, active in the conservative Shaarey Zedek synagogue, now in Southfield As a philosophy student at the University of Michigan, he thought he might want to become a college professor or an attorney

But the academic world "was less adventurous than I wanted my life to be,' he said And law

fell by the wayside when he decided, "I couldn't defend someone who was guilty'

"I was always very connected to Judaism," he said 'I wanted to combine philosophy and Judaism and the thing that seemed closest to that was the Reform Rabbinate

Even as he applied, he knew that he did not believe in God The philosophers that he regards as his mentors --Bertram Russell, John Dewey, Jean Paul Sartre, Albert Camus, Baruch Spinoza - had already helped him shape a humanistic philosophy

"They were my teachers," he savs "I didn't have anyone in the rabbinic world who was my mentor They didn't agree with me I liked being a rabbi But I didn't like the praying," he said "I decided I would explain to everyone what I meant by the word 'God"

A two-year stint as a Jewish chaplain in Korea further cemented that idea and his communication skills "The Jewish soldiers there weren't interested in praying," he said "They were farm boys from places like central Iowa and I learned how to talk to them They needed to be nurtured "

Returning home as assistant rabbi at Temple Beth El, now in Bloomfield Township, and then as rabbi of a new Reform congregation in Windsor, he grew increasingly uncomfortable with what he terms "God language" "Redefining a familiar word just so you can stay in the organization wasn t being honest

Thats when he left to form Birmingham Temple, which took its name from its initial

gathering in the home of a Birmingham couple

"I've always regarded myself as a philosopher- missionary," Wine says "I've provided people a new setting for what they believe"

Although the temple eventually moved to a permanent site in Farmington Hills, Wine himself chose to move to Birmingham, a city he loves He is a familiar figure walking its downtown and residential streets and having breakfast each morning at The Townsend Hotel

A NEW DIRECTION

Once he retires, residents will see him regularly take a new route - from his condominium with the walled garden on the west side of Birmingham to his new library office on the east side, at Adams Square That's where he and the faculty of the Center for New Thinking the Rev Harry Cook, art historian Michael Farrell and journalist Jack Lessenberry - hold some of their classes Others take place at the Birmingham Unitarian Church and The Community House

The nonprofit center, which he began in 1977, is another aspect of his original mind After teaching some adult education classes for Wayne State University, he got the idea that people might like to pay as you go for a single class on a particular subject, rather than commit to a whole semester

"It was all about interesting people in the world of ideas I thought I could create a forum in a more convenient place based on new books and new thinkers'

Last month, the American Humanist Society named Wine "Humanist of the Year" He joins a line up that includes philosophers, doctors, scientists and writers including Jonas Salk, Carl Sagan, Julian Huxley, Benjamin Spock, Linus Pauling, Margaret Sanger, Kurt Vonnegut, Alice Walker and Isaac Asimov

"I look at my life and I really like what's happened," says Wine, in a softer tone than usually characterizes his bold statements "I feel very fulfilled because my life's work has touched a lot of people in a very positive way"







Walkathon an emotional tribute for participants

Even in death, George and Betty Andrews of Plymouth are helping the estimated 35,000 people in Michigan who suffer with Parkinson's disease, a neurological disorder that causes slow movement, tremors, muscle rigidity and imbalance

More than 250 people participated in the recent George and Betty Andrews Memorial "I Gave My Sole for Parkinson's" Walkathon and 5K Run at Maybury State Park Together they raised more than \$15,000 for the Michigan Parkinson Foundation

Randy Lambertus, 23, of Ann Arbor was the overall 5K winner in 17 41 Sara Freatman, 41, of Ypsilanti was the female 5K winner in 24 00

George Andrews, 75, head of the physical therapy department at Farmington Hills' Botsford Hospital, died of leukemia last September His wife Betty - who had Parkinson's - died three weeks later Betty Andrews was retired from Schoolcraft College where she was assistant dean of community servic-

'A MIRACLE'


The mile was non-competitive But as Warren Oberlee, 47, of White Lake crossed the finish line, tears welled up in

the eyes of friends and family "Considering where Warren came from, it is really a mira cle to see him function the way he is now,' said Tom Richardson of Milford, who served as race director along with Dave Bartczak of Huntington Woods and Debby Orloff-Davidson of Farmington Hills Richardson is a physical therapist assistant at Botsford's Total Rehabilitation & Athletic Conditioning Center (TRACC), which helped put on the race

"If you would have seen Warren a short while ago, you wouldn't believe it was the same person He couldn't dress himself or drive He would tire out just trying to walk a short distance," Richardson said "He was just about incapacitated The guy is really a miracle - and a terrific guy and lots of fun to boot"

Oberlee, who with his wife Patricia and daughters Amanda and Katelyn also helped stage the race, has fought Parkinson's with surgery, medication and rehabilitative exercise at TRACC

"I felt good crossing the finish line. I was pleased I was able to make it,' said Oberlee, facilitator of the Waterford-West Bloomfield Parkinson support group, also known as the "Movers and Shakers" "I've been training and walking at TRACC, about two-and-a-half to three miles a week." Oberlee also raised \$875 in pledges for the walkathon



Now in its sixth year, Metro bases its classical ballet training upon the popular Cecchetti Method, a system based on the standards and methods of ballet master Enrico Cecchetti. which involves mastering various levels of the discipline and then taking exams

'I think the staff is exceptional, in their training and what they've been able to do," says Reitz, who has been dancing since age 4 We have just found a blend that has worked for us"


For instance, Hurley, who has been at Dancin' Feet since 1995, has been named Mr Dance of Michigan three times

He received his dance training at Joanne's Dance Extension in Plymouth and teaches there, as well


'All the teachers are professionals and they've been trained (by) good teachers,' many from the area, according to Hurley

CT scan is cutting-edge diagnostic technology

Imagine radiology technology so advanced it has the ability to stop all motion and produce such high resolution images it's as if you're looking inside the human body with a threedimensional view

Advanced Imaging of Michigan, located in Troy, was the first facility in the state to have the 16 slice Multi-Detector Siemens CT scanner According to Dr Roger Fenton, AIM medical director, he and his staff began offering this state of the art technology in March to physician-referred patients as well as individuals wanting wellness scans

The technology of a CT or CAT scan (computed tomography) allows radiologists to capture hundreds of X-rays taken from numerous angles in the body The integration of the images together creates an likeness so clear and realistic it

gives doctors a view of the body in the same way they would in an operating room"

'The technology is amazing,' said Fenton, medical director at AIM in Troy and the MRI Center of Oakland 'This will undoubtedly revolutionize diagnostic readings, the quality of the scans and the turn around time for a diagnosis Not only that but we're giving patients the opportunity to detect issues early enough, long before we could have seen things with traditional scans and X-rays, so that they can deal with the disease before it becomes a matter of life and death

"This gives us a lot more options and there are a lot more things we can see in just one exam

According to Fenton, CT was first offered in the early 1980s and it provided physicians with more definite images than Xrays provided of both bone structure and soft tissues This improvement in the quality of

the CT gave us a clearer picture of the body's organs but it had its drawbacks, too It was a lengthy process that could take almost an hour and we could only view the images in one dimension"

Fast forward 20 years and Fenton is looking at scans in three dimension with more accuracy than he could have ever imagined


"It's like you're driving through the body providing patients with the most accurate diagnosis possible in a fraction of the time it took two decades ago This is the latest and great in CT scan technology," he said "The frames are as thin as a pathology slice, about 1 mm. and can be viewed at any dimension We can manipulate the image any way we want in the highest quality possible with exquisite definition This is high-tech medicine'

TECHNOLOGICAL ADVANCES

The Multi-Detector Siemens CT Scanner captures 32 slices a second creating in excess of 1,200 images for a full body scan The frames or images can be viewed individually or together to see how an organ relates to other structures in the body

Most importantly, the technology turns many procedures that were previously invasive into non-invasive virtual scans, eliminating the risk associated with procedures such as a colonoscopy and diagnostic cardiac arteriogram

During a virtual colonoscopy, the CT technology captures images of surrounding organs that can provide early warning signs of gall bladder, kidney and pancreatic disease in addition to creating the most realistic and up-close view of the colon ever seen While doctors recommend individuals over 50 having the test done every three-four years physicians are



The scan of a patient's broken shoulder can be viewed in two and three dimensions in the highest resolution possible

aware that the preparation and discomfort many people feel before and during the exam create enough anxiety that they are willing to accept the risk and go without the test

Sixty-year-old Southfield attorney Richard J Maddin had a CT scan and virtual colonoscopy done earlier this year at Advanced Imaging of Michigan after striking up a conversation with Fenton at the facility where they both work out


"Ironically, I had a traditional colonoscopy already scheduled, because I have a concerned and loving wife, but I started talking with Dr Fenton and he was telling me about this new technology I had heard the traditional procedure for a colonoscopy wasn t too userfriendly I m not afraid of medi

cine or procedures but the idea of the anesthesia, missing a day's worth of work and the invasiveness of the scope didn't make me want to sign up, but I was going to do it anyway," said Maddın


The West Bloomfield resident made another appointment at AIM and says he was 'awestruck" by the definition of the images "They produced a winner with this one I was blown away at what the scan showed I think the benefits outweigh any cost issue They dıdn't sell me on thıs I sold myself"

Maddin's results were positive all around "It showed me what I wanted to see and took away the apprehension because it wasn t invasive," added Maddin

A CT Angiography is also less invasive thanks to the Multi-Detector scanner In the past if a cardiologist wanted to take a look at a patient's vascular system, he or she had to make an incision and insert a rubber catheter through the femoral artery in the groin up to the heart Today, with an intravenous injection for contrast dye, in a matter of seconds the clarity of a CT Angiography can supply the same diagnostic information without being invasive but with even more detail Cardiac Calcium Scoring helps doctors calculate your risk of heart attack. The scan is also noninvasive and clearly depicts early plaque buildup in the arteries

LESS TIME

Images of the lungs, head, heart, abdomen and pelvis can be viewed immediately in two and three dimensions, allowing doctors to "literally drive through a patient's body, looking for unexpected bumps in the road - polyps or growths that cannot be detected '

The virtual colonoscopy doesn't eliminate the need for a traditional procedure if something questionable is found during the exam Fenton said then a patient is referred back to his or her physician who schedules the traditional colonoscopy Another benefit of the scan is that the CT study of the colon also provides images of the entire abdomen, enabling doctors to identify underlying illnesses Viewing surrounding organs can be used as a problem-solving tool and help doctors better prepare for surgery

Not only does the Multi-**Detector CT Scanner produce** hundreds of images in a matter of seconds, it doesn't leave the patient feeling claustrophobic because you simply pass through a doughnut-shaped apparatus as opposed to being enclosed like that of an MRI machine

scans once a health-related issue arrives, there has been some debate as to whether "wellness" scans are necessary and how much added costs to insurance companies are



Having seen traditional X-rays it might be hard to believe this is an actual body scan of a patient's chest and abdomen area The technology of the Siemens scan offers a three dimensional view of the body for improved detection and diagnosis of illness

al most wellness exams are not covered by insurance but his office offers flexible payment plans and accepts all major credit cards Most insurance companies do cover diagnostic CT for patients referred by a physician but it varies greatly from provider to provider

Fenton says if you are 35 and older and have a history of family illness you might want to talk to your doctor about the benefits of a wellness scan Fenton says they "welcome patients who want to be proactive about their health care" and will take the time to find out if they are a candidate for a scan before making an appointment

Fenton has more than 25 years experience in the field of radiology and says this CT scanning technology is cutting edge Known as a leader in preventive health care, he established The Woman's Breast Centers in 1985 and was among the first in the country to recommend breast exams beginning at age 40

'The bottom line is this technology will undoubtedly change the way doctors and radiologists assess a patient's symptoms and improve the quality of care by making procedures less invasive, less timeconsuming and more importantly more beneficiary in

Luxury homes worry fire chief

(AP) – Luxury homes under construction in remote, fire-prone mountains of western Colorado worry a fire chief who wonders if he would have enough time and equipment to save them

Some of the construction is on land burned over by last summer's Panorama fire, a blaze authorities blamed on sparks from a saw used by a crew building a house The 1,700-acre fire destroyed two homes

"This growth is hurting the fire departments," Carbondale Fire Chief Ron Leach told Garfield County commissioners


Leach told commissioners the developers of one mountain subdivision were required to make roads and driveways wide enough to accommodate fire trucks and ensure adequate water for firefighters through hydrants or storage tanks Homeowners in the subdivision will be required to thin or remove vegetation from a safety zone around their houses and to install sprinkler systems inside

"I don't know what else to have them do," Leach said "We held them to a pretty

do," Leach said "We held them to a pretty high bar"

The development is nine miles up a steep, narrow road from Carbondale, where crews would start in the event of a fire It will eventually include 26 houses, all of them at least 8,000 square feet and two of them 12,000 square feet

County Commissioner Larry McGowan questioned how long the safety zones around the houses would remain clear of flammable growth

Mansion up for auction must go

(AP) - A 200-year-old historic estate made almost entirely of hand-cut stone and considered to be a sophisticated example of English Palladian architecture is on the auction block for as little as \$100,000

But there's a catch

The new owner of the Isaac Meason House in Dunbar Township, about 40 miles southeast of Pittsburgh, must remove each door, window and piece of woodwork, dismantle every stone and move the building to a new location

The current owners of the 2-1/2 story house, Terry and Diane Kriss, acknowledge it's unusual to sell a structure and not its land They know it's even more unusual for one of fewer than 2,500 National Historic Landmarks in the country to be up for auction on eBav

The problem, according to the Krisses, is that encroaching residential, commercial and industrial development is depreciating the sites value

The professional antique dealers say they can't afford to both renovate and maintain the mansion and fight Fayette County planning officials, who the Krisses say don't appreciate the site's historic significance

So the Meason House is now on sale online

'I love this home I cried for this home I fought for this home,' Terry Kriss said "There are no more avenues left for me to save this home It can only get worse, and I know it will"

Despite the site's status, and its place on the National Register of Historic Places, the Krisses can sell the property and the new owners can dismantle it because it's privately owned

But if the property is moved, it probably will lose its status because the National Park Service considers location when it places sites on the reg ister, said Beth Savage, an architecture historian with the register

The house was designed by English architect and stonemason Adam Wilson for Isaac

Completed in 1802, the mansion sits on the site where George Washington estabhshed the first permanent English settlement in the new frontier in 1753

Also known as Mount Braddock and the Dr Christopher Gist Plantation, the estate contains a 5,500square-foot main house, a smoke house and former slave quarters

"It's a 200-year-old time capsule It's in the same league as Monticello and Mount Vernon," Terry Kriss said

The Krisses acknowledge the estate didn't sit on a rambling, isolated plot when the family bought it in 1977, three homes and an autobody salvage yard sat just outside their plot

According to the Krisses and Tammy Shell, the executive director of the Fayette County office of Planning, Zoning and Community Development, the salvage yard has grown over the years and more development, including a shopping mall, have grown around the Meason House

The Krisses liken their property to a four-acre island in a sea of development and call their 1,000-foot driveway an "umbilical cord

The way they see it, just when they think the development can't inch any closer, it does

The couple unsuccessfully fought a strip mining company from harvesting coal within 800 feet of the main house They did, however, win the right to limit the company's blasting level as they mined from 1990 to 2002

But in 1999, the Krisses successfully stopped the construction of a cellular telephone tower within feet of their property

The county planning office has tried to work with the Krisses, Shell said, but can t give them special treatment just because they own a historic property

If the Meason House weren t a private property and was open to tourists like museums are, the county might consider

Small piece of land causes dispute

(AP) - A small piece of land is at the heart of a big dispute involving city officials and two local families

Each of the three sides says it is the rightful owner

At issue is property near Manoka Lake on the city's southwest side Greenville 18 about 35 miles northeast of Grand Rapids The land is next to the home of Gene and Holly Noble and across the street from the home of Earl and Polly Boatwright

Daniel Burns, the Nobles' attorney, said the triangular-shaped plot in dispute measures about 51 feet by 59 feet by 65 feet A trial to determine the land's rightful owner is scheduled July 21-22

Earl and Polly Boatwright bought their home in 1965 The couple say they took care of the disputed parcel for 38 years and own it by adverse possession

Adverse possession allows someone to obtain title to a property from the actual owner simply by openly and continuously using the land for a long time

It wasn't until the Nobles moved in five years ago that the Boatwrights' ownership claim was challenged, The

'We didn't know he owned it or cared to own it."

Polly Boatwright involved in lawsuit

Daily News reported

After a disagreement with the city over a zoning ordinance's effect on the Nobles' new garage and driveway, Gene Noble sought a quitclaim deed and deeded himself the parcel on Sept 29, 1998

With the land added to the Nobles' existing property, the city was temporarily satisfied that the couple did not need to remove the garage or driveway

After further review, the city wrote to Burns in November 2000 and questioned whether Noble had a proper claim to the property It says an assessor's plat of the area made in 1932 shows that the city owns the land

City Manager George Bosanic said if

residents' quitclaim deeds go unchallenged, the land becomes their private property

"So that's what we've done," Bosanic said "We're challenging the deed"

Public land cannot be adversely possessed But G R. "Pete" Frye, the Boatwrights' lawyer, said the parcel does not belong to the city or any other public entity

The Boatwrights sued the Nobles over ownership of the property in May 2001

It happened after Gene Noble chopped down a tree on the disputed plot - a tree that the Boatwrights had planted years ago

"We didn't know he owned it or cared to own it," Polly Boatwright said

In August 2001, the city's lawyers submitted a legal brief in support of Greenville's motion to intervene in the lawsuit

Permission to intervene was granted in April 2002, and the city claimed ownership of the land in a counterclaim against the Boatwrights and a crossclaim against the Nobles

Burns called the intervention "a real backdoor maneuver on the city's part"

Chimps calling house home upsetting to neighbors

(AP) - The University of Louisiana-Lafayette has a real animal house, and the neighbors are upset - not because of a fraternity, but because chimpanzees are living there

It's part of a psychology experiment studying relationships of primates and humans living together

The research is headed by Daniel Povinelli, director of the university's Child Studies Center, which focuses research on cognitive development, or knowledge and perception

Wendell Bares and other neighbors said the animals are an insult to the memory of the late Winn Hawkins and his wife, the former Mabel Roy, whose will left use of the house to the university

The current use of the home also violates terms of the Hawkins' wills, neighbors said

"The neighbors don't feel that this type of activity should be conducted in any residential neighborhood,' said Bares, an attorney who lives directly across the street "It violates the specific

restrictions under which the university accepted the (home) And it's an affront to the legacy of the Hawkinses," Bares said


University President Ray Authement, in a long written statement, said he agreed to let the home be used for research involving chimpanzees and humans

An out-of-town family who owns three young chimpanzees have agreed to allow the chimpanzees to work with researchers

"Opportunities like these in our home setting are too valuable to pass up," Authement said

The chimpanzees are kept in a large play area inside the home and are observed interacting with humans in the home and performing activities, such as eating at a table

Records show that that when the university accepted accepting the house in 1988, it agreed to oppose any change in its residential zoning classification It also agreed to use the home only for a faculty club or for faculty residential use

But the new Thunderbird takes subtle classic features to a new dimension with all the bells and whistles of the 21st century Look at the classic egg crate grille, the short front over-hang the non-functioning scoop that looks so much like the 61 Thunderbird Both the headlights are round too It has all the character and foundation of the classic model,

just with an updated and very cool look And in beautiful Torch Red its truly a head turner The 17 mch 21 spoke cast aluminum wheel have a center


mounted cap that sports the Thunderbird emblem There are curves on the exterior of the vehicle just about everywhere and all those curves are really appealing And the 67 cubic foot trunk -- fully lined of course is large

enough for golf clubs for both you and your significant other, or your buddy

I was really surprised with the comfort level of the Thunderbird Its not too low to the ground so getting in you don't fall in and when getting out you don't need a hand

Thunderbird has a whopping 437 inches of leg room Now that s comfy There s a carpeted shelf behind the seats that can hold anything from your local Observer & Eccentric to a purse to a small bag of groceries Standard interior color is black leather

A Jobs and Careers

Everything on the inside and the outside of the Thunderbird screams sports car Yet, this is a perfect car for a delicate and stately lady Seems like an oxymoron but it s the truth

A couple of other things available on the 21st century Thunderbird include fine tuned four wheel independent transmission variable assist rack and pinion steering all season tires four wheel anti lock brakes anti-theft system and all-speed traction control

All the safety issues are addressed, as well There are driver and passenger second generation air bags that can be deactivated with the ignition key if you need to place your baby or child in front There's even a small light alerting you that the air bag is off

Thunderbird also has combination head and chest side air bags These bags when deployed, explode from the seat bol ster heads toward the door and then upward to the chest and head areas Guess how fast that happens? Within 7 millisec onds of impact and fully deployed within 20 milliseconds Fast

Although many automakers have them this is the first time a Ford convertible is equipped with the advanced child seat anchor system called LATCH (lower anchors and tethers for PHOTO BY MARTY MAJCHRZAK

gle you - but it didn t happen in the Thunderbird once Its something that tightens your seatbelt to prevent you from bouncing around the cabin in the event of a crash

Fords also installed a glow in the dark trunk release handle, which allows you to open the trunk from the inside -- in case your wife stuffs you in there No, seriously, its a really great feature It doesn t happen with regularity, but you do hear of people being stuffed in trunks during hostage and kidnapping situations, or a kid playing around and accidentally closing the trunk on themselves. By the way, all cars have a similar feature, as mandated by the government last September Almost forgot The Thunderbird is powered by a 3 9-liter V-8

engine that provides 252 horsepower The reason I mention this so late is that it s an afterthought This car is so incredible in so many ways that the engine hardly matters Its powerful enough to get you where you have to go in a hurry

Remember, however, this convertible is a head turner, so you ll be under plenty of scrutiny from your local traffic officers

Great car, great fun Now go get you one




