If the state House substitute for the Senate's revenue sharing package passes the Senate and is signed by Gov Jennifer Granholm, it will provide for what has become an unusual sight lately money coming back to Plymouth

Ideas flowing for Central Middle School land

Several ideas from residents have been incorporated into designs for recreation improvements on the property behind Central Middle School

The city of Plymouth and Plymouth-Canton Schools have formed a partnership to refurbish and upgrade the facilities, which currently include a football field and track, baseball and soccer fields, plus tennis courts

On April 29, representatives from planning consultants Langworthy Strader LeBlanc & Associates, Inc of Royal Oak, and a landscaping architect from Russell Design in Northville, met with user groups of the athletic fields and nearly 50 residents who

gave their interpretations of what should be included on the site, which is owned by the school district.


"We received some preliminary ideas from the planners based on all the public input we received, said City Manager Paul Sincock 'We're looking at it, and will be refining the plans before having another public presentation related to the project'

Suggestions taken back to the drawing room by planners included walking/jogging path, upgrades of the athletic fields, an outdoor swimming pool and a dog park 'Some of the initial plans include a new entrance to the complex off Main Street, walking and inline skating paths around the whole site, a plaza concept that would tie the Cultural Center to Central

Middle School, new lights, bleachers and press box for the concession area for the football and soccer complex,' said Sincock There is a passive area, with potentially a dog park

One of the concepts has an outdoor pool, but we're also looking at a Phase 2 to incorporate the pool and gym at Central, he said Sincock at one time estimated the project could cost \$1 5 milhon The governmental entities, both dealing with projected budget deficits, would need to find benefactors to help pay for the project

'We haven t even talked about cost yet, said Sincock 'We don't have a funding source identified We first have to identify the plan before going forward to look for money


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

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

Eatery wants bar set high

Owners hope expansion attracts new customers by BRAD KADRICH

The Kyprianos brothers survived the traditionally treacherous first year of a restaurant's life after open ing Atlantis Restaurant in October 2001

The restaurant survived a blockade of orange cones and barriers as the state finished a construction project along the length of Ann Arbor Road, making it nearly impossible foi customers to find the driveway They re trying to make a go of a restaurant in a location where several others have failed

Now, the brothers are hoping renovations and improvements to Atlantis' bar area will put the final piece in place to a restaurant puzzle they're hoping is a successful one

"We want to make it more attrac tive,' said Tasos Kyprianos, one of the three owners of Atlantis We want it to be a new place for people to go The bar as it sits now is fairly small, with just over half-a-dozen stools It does feature several restaurant-style tables and booths, but only one television set

The brothers want to expand the bar, add a number of stools, and convert the seating into high-top tables that are more conducive to attracting the business crowd for happy hour

We want to get people in here who want to have cocktails after work, Tasos said 'We re also hoping to get more business people in here for lunch, and a late-night crowd coming in here to meet people"

The bar, which currently is more of an extension of Atlantis than an entity all its own, will be named 'Venue, and the brothers are hoping to use it to attract crowds that they re missing now

People who come in to Atlantis regularly already know the bar exists, and it's a popular waiting room for prospective diners But it's diminutive size makes it less attractive to newcomers, a problem the brothers are hoping the renovation will fix 'We want it to stand out, Tasos said The regulars already know about it, but we want to attract new people We want to give the bar its own identity"

The brothers will expand the bar's hours until 2 a m (it currently closes at 11 p m, along with the restaurant) The restaurant's hours won't change A couple of televisions will be added in an effort to draw the weekend sports crowd

The brothers think the bar is too small to accommodate the crowd, and they say customers are telling them so, asking them to expand the bar to give it more capacity

I ve got a bigger bar at home," said Kosta Kyprianos, tongue-incheek "It's constantly busy, we have to expand It's just too small

The brothers hope to start the project right after the Fourth of July holiday, and figure the new bar will be open by Labor Day They'll add piped-in music, higher tables, some fish tanks and more televisions While patrons will still be able to sit down and eat, that won t be the bar's main attraction

'We want to attract a younger crowd, and they like sitting at a more modern bar, Tasos Kyprianos said 'We also want to attract people who just want to come in, relax and have a drink'

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Local officials puzzled by Wayne County audit

Audits of more than \$100 million in no-bid contracts awarded by the Department of Children and Family Services have been ordered by Wayne County Executive Robert Ficano and at least one group of local officials is puzzled about being included in the list

The audits are focusing on nonprofit agencies contracted to provide counseling and other services, including the Care Management Organizations

Included in the list of contractors was the Conference of Western Wayne, which received \$355,778 But executive director Marsha Biancom points out the organization doesn't have a CMO contract and that money comes from the 10 mill for juvenile justice that's part of the county jail millage

"They're mixing apples and oranges There is not a no-bid contract — we receive that funding on a block grant basis," Bianconi said "The money is used to fund Youth Assistance Programs in local communities — it's a passthrough

The CWW board, which consists of chief elected officials from the member communities, has a millage committee which oversees the expenditures and makes recommendations to the entire body

'Our members range in size from Dearborn to Belleville — their juvenile issues are different," Bianconi said 'Our communities create programs that are unique for their needs — it has nothing to do with the CMOs"

Biancom has sent a letter to Ficano and to *The Detroit News*, which published the list of contractors, including CWW — to clear up the confusion

"The letter is basically saying there are inaccuracies and explaining it," Biancom said "The letter is clarifying and providing accurate information."

County Auditor General David Esper said the contracts for the entire department are being reviewed without targeting any particular agency or contract

"We're not getting into this with any objective but a general review to make sure we re following procurement procedures set by ordinance, Esper said 'Substantial money goes through the department We're taking a general look at the practices — everything that you want good government to do" With the exception of Dearborn Heights, the CWW member communities are served by Growth Works Inc of Plymouth under the CMO contract with the county A range of services dealing with at risk youths are offered, including counseling and residential placements

While CWW has a juvenile justice committee that includes its board members, police chiefs and other officials, the local communities have teams that meet with youngsters whose offenses have been adjudicated and are returning to the community

We've been working with Growth Works since 2000 and it has the support of CWW," Bianconi said "We don't handle the funding" CWW doesn't have a problem with an

CWW doesn't have a problem with an audit, Bianconi said, and in fact welcomes it "We've been in compliance An audit will show we've done all that we're supposed to," she said

Those comments were echoed by Growth Works spokeswoman Tina Bassett, who said an audit could help the new county administration understand how the CMO process is working

'The program saves taxpayers money and rebuilds lives It's taken years to put it together, so it works,' Bassett said 'We're trying to find out what is going on We do what we said we were going to do and we're doing it better" The issue of no-bid contracts was

The issue of no-bid contracts was questioned by Bassett, who noted the county sets the rate that the nonprofit groups will be paid — it's not negotiated While agreeing that there are set serv-

While agreeing that there are set service rates to some extent, Esper said the Ficano administration didn't negotiate those rates, which were established by the McNamara administration

"We want to look at the rate structure in the service end of it And we want to look at administrative salaries, etc," Esper said "There might be an area of cost-cutting'

The audits look like a political maneuver, Bassett said, noting CMOs like Growth Works are doing a better job at lower cost than the previous county-run programs

"If there's anything we've failed at in any way, it's not communicating what we've accomplished,' Bassett said 'We're saving the taxpayers money and creating new taxpayers' Esper said he didn't have a time frame for the audits to be completed

ready to do it again "Oh, definitely, I would do it again," said Jiminez-Brown, who agreed to host the child as part of a medical journey arranged by a Plymouth doctor I think it would be a lot better with an older child With a baby they get attached, because they're dependent on you But I could do it again, because it's for a good cause What better way to help children?"

GIVING SPIRIT

That was the attitude of the entire team of people helping Imanol, brought here by Health Help Project Inc , the nonprofit group headed by Dr Frank Patino of Plymouth Imanol was the third child sponsored by the group, incorporated three years ago to help children in Latin American countries get access to ade-quate medical care

Patino, also a researcher for the pharmaceutical giant Pfizer, enlisted the aid of his company, and of Oakwood

Health Care System, to get surgery for these children Imanol's surgery to correct severe club foot, was performed by Dr Larry Fallat of Oakwood-Canton, at Oakwood Hospital Annapolis in Wayne, back in February

Fallat performed what is technically called correction of congenital talipes equinovarus bilaterally - club feet in both feet The Achilles tendon was so tight, Fallat said, that Imanol's feet couldn't be brought up to 90 degrees of the leg Club feet, Fallat explained, caused the child to literally walk on the tops of his feet

After a three-hour surgery, Fallat and Patino were confident of success When Imanol had his casts removed in late June, those hopes were confirmed

"We had great correction," said Fallat, who has an office at the Oakwood Medical Center in Canton "We put him in a straight-lash shoe to maintain correction, and he'll wear that kind of shoe until he outgrows it in maybe four to six months' Imanol also had some inter-



"Imanol will always be a part of us," she said

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
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

some people might think,' Patterson said "If the governor gets that version on her desk, and she vetoes it, some negative things could happen Townships could have ultimately an adverse effect if the amount of revenue exceeds the forecast Clearly counties would have an adverse effect'

The House plan, according to Stansell, reduces funding to counties by 3 percent, "the same as any other plan floating around" All other municipalities would receive a 3-percent cut only in the statutory payment Stansell said there figures to be some \$724 million in statutory revenue sharing to be divvied up in 2004

The House plan still reduces total revenue sharing by 3 percent, according to Stansell

"Total funding overall is reduced, but it gives you a very different distribution," he said

Since Plymouth and Plymouth Township rely heavily on constitutional entitlements, the combination results in the increase for both of them

While the plan doesn't bode well for revenue sharing to the city of Detroit, it was a pretty easy one for local legislators to

support "Obviously the significant reductions are going to the county and to Detroit with this plan," said Rep John Stewart (R-Plymouth Township) "But I had to vote my district It financially benefitted every one of the municipalities in the district"

Stewart's district, the 20th, covers Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Northville, Northville Township and part of Canton

Pumford's substitute would send \$981,254 to the city of Plymouth, \$2,434,923 to the township, and \$6,873,381 to Canton Township

'It doesn't include assumptions there may be growth in the economy, and the effects of the brownfield (Daisy) and Bathey properties," he said "Nobody has a crystal ball, and maybe they're trying to take a conservative approach, but it's

not fair to increase revenue 2-3 percent and expenditures in double digits

"I would have thought that instead of painting a picture 75-80 percent complete, they would have contemplated those things,' he said

On the other side of the com is Dwyer, who said he'll vote to keep Plymouth intact

"I moved to Plymouth for services, and they are a lot of what makes Plymouth a great place to live, he said "I ve got kids, and I want a good police department, safe streets and recreation

"For me, this isn't a tax increase, but a return to a previous level," he added "Everything else goes up 3 per-

cent a year, but the city is trying to operate on less revenue every year The cost of picking up leaves goes up, as does the cost of labor and machinery" According to figures released

by Christiansen, even with the millage rate increase from the current 11 mills to the city charter-capped 15 mills, there will still be budget shortfalls four out of the five years 'It's (the tax increase) not

going to solve the long-term problem," Pursell said "Besides, people are tapped out' Potter believes there's still




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
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Tax hike could be a tough sell

Bill Graham voted with the majority on the question of whether to ask for a rollback of the Headlee Amendment to raise Plymouth's taxes, but he isn't convinced the city administration's numbers add up

And if commissioners advocating the move can't convince their own mayor, they better find a plan that will convince voters

The commission voted 5-2 last week to ask voters for the Headlee rollback in an effort to raise the city's millage rate to nearly 15 mills The move is necessary, its proponents say, to stave off deficits that reach a projected \$2.4 million by 2008-09

A subcommittee of four city commissioners came up with four options to erase the deficit, ranging from making cuts to current services and staff to a charter amendment allowing the commission to raise the millage rate all the way to 20

The Headlee rollback got the support of five of the seven commissioners – Michele Potter and Phil Pursell voted against it – but it isn't exactly staunch support Graham said the only reason he supported it was because he thinks the voters should decide the question, and that he would have to see more analytical data than he's seen before he could support the move

The question should be asked Why is the commission voting when its own leader, an accomplished financial man, says he hasn't seen enough numbers to justify the move?

Commissioners have a few months to convince the voters – and, apparently, their own mayor – the numbers they're using are legitimate. They also need to tell voters what services will be cut, including layoffs, if the Headlee rollback fails

The plan is to use the city's Web site, public access television and resident forums to explain what cuts will come if voters turn down the request for the tax increase

We think there's an element equally important if the commission really wants the increase to pass Commissioners need to explain to their constituents how the city got into this mess to begin with As recently as 2000, commissioners were bragging about how solid the city's financial footing was

We know the state has been unkind in terms of state revenue sharing, the economy has been sluggish and the Headlee Amendment hurts municipalities to begin with

But putting the blame solely on those factors is a tough sell, because those are the rules under which everyone has to play So how did the city go from a strong fund balance to a financial wound so deep its drowning in red ink? Most importantly, why didn't anyone see it coming?

It's tough to ask voters who had nothing to do with creating this crisis to fix it, but that's the position in which commissioners find themselves And if they're going to have their hands out, they need to have some answers



Alternative energy key for Michigan's economy

t didn't seem particularly special at first glance — just a big room at the airport Westin Hotel, jam-packed with engineers, marketers and assorted business types But it just might be that the conference last Friday — "Striking Connections for the Alternative Energy Industry," sponsored by NextEnergy — could solidify Michigan's leading role in the automobile industry

It's been clear for a number of years that there are all kinds of drawbacks to basing our energy

economy on hydrocarbons, whether gasoline for the internal combustion engines that power our cars or coal for the power plants that generate our electricity When you burn hydrocarbons, you dump carbon (plus a bunch of other nasty stuff) into the atmosphere, which in turn generates the greenhouse gases that contribute to global warming Moreover, an increasing percentage of our oil comes from

abroad, which puts us into the charitable hands of various Middle Eastern regimes

The answer, of course, is to develop an alternative energy source The most likely candidate to date is hydrogen, whether in the form of fuel cells or used alone as fuel in an engine The great advantage of hydrogen, of course, is that when you burn it, you get water vapor instead of pollutants and greenhouse gases And if we could figure out how to generate the hydrogen domestically — a very big 'if," given present technology we'd eventually be independent of foreign energy sources

So the issue is how best to do this? And, more to the point for us in Michigan, how to do it right here at home? It was this question that led Doug Rothwell, who was the CEO of the Michigan Economic Development Corp (MEDC), to propose back in 2001 creating something called NextEnergy Its purpose was to promote the development of alternative energy technologies and provide tax incentives for business to do research, development and manufacturing

Ultimately, the MEDC put \$32 million into NextEnergy, which is now chartered as a nonprofit corporation Under the direction of COO Steve Arwood — a, well, high-energy type from Lansing — NextEnergy is busy building a building in a Smart Zone near the Wayne State University campus And it was NextEnergy that sponsored the conference I attended last week

The stakes are big for Michigan Currently, 35 percent of all engine manufacturing and 39 per-

cent of transmission building are located in Michigan If a new energy basis for automobile engines is developed and takes root outside Michigan, almost 200,000 of our best jobs would be at risk. If they go away, that could be a \$10 billion hit to our economy So there is some real urgency in the job Arwood and his colleagues have undertaken at NextEnergy

The conference was a real eye-opener Arwood led off by saying that NextEnergy's purpose was nothing less than the retention of Michigan's economic base Next came Anthony Earley, chairman and CEO of DTE Energy, the company that owns Detroit Edison and MichCon Earley pointed out that the utility industry has a big stake in alternative energy, partly to reduce pollution and partly to develop a distributed power generation system Just as distributed computing replaced the old centralized main frames, distributed power generation is the wave of the future It's cheaper, more flexible and more convenient for users

Jerry Mader wound up the plenary presentations An engineer who played football while he was getting his engineering degrees from U-M, Mader is the advanced energy technology consultant for the Center for Automotive Research, the leading outfit in the field

His point was simple There are a whole lot of people very interested in the alternative energy field — the Big Three, DTE, the federal government, the University of Michigan, NextEnergy, to name just a few The pressing issue is how best to bring all this interest together in such a way that the whole becomes more than the sum of the parts and that the whole remains in Michigan

"We have everything right here in Michigan to allow us to pull everything together," Mader said, 'but we need to develop a collaborative partnership for a badly-needed national agenda"

He got a big round of applause As the opening session wound up, it was interesting to watch the crowds of engineers and business types clustering around each speaker, excitedly asking questions and exchanging business cards

There's a long way to go and success 1s by no means certain, but outfits like NextEnergy deserve a lot of credit for getting the ball rolling

Phil Power was a member of the Executive Committee of the MEDC when NextEnergy was created and still serves in that position





The culmary arts portion of the \$27 million VisTaTech Center already has opened and is in full operation Now the business functions are fully available

VisTaTech is a technology-rich venue for training, business meetings, corporate events, certain community events, and innovative learning for business students in addition to the culinary arts component Businesses or community groups using the facility can arrange for catered meals or eat at the American Harvest restaurant

"We consider VisTaTech to be our economic development engine, promoting business in our service district," says John Walsh, executive director of development and government relations "It allows Schoolcraft to help businesses improve and that results in an improvement in the economy we serve The derivative effect is better paying jobs and more people living in the area"

"Schoolcraft is a service provider to small, medium and large businesses by providing customized training to their needs with our faculty or with a faculty that we retain, if needed"


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The business portion of VisTaTech includes meeting rooms for large and small groups, advanced telecommunications technology, conferences and teleconferences, training sessions and work meetings, product demonstrations, and industry expos.

Rooms for meeting and education include 3 bays, each accommodating 50-60 people, a classroom for up to 22 people, presentation room with theater-style seats for 294 The presentation room stage is six feet deep with a large projection screen behind it

The presentation room is designed for conference keynote speeches, award ceremonies, major presentations and even interactive meetings spanning continents Presentations

and teleconferences can be broadcast anywhere on campus and could be displayed on VisTaTech's video wall in the public area on Main Street

Everything that occurs in the presentation room can be recorded and transferred to CDs or DVDs The podium has an integrated laptop, allowing speakers to make PowerPoint, DVD or CD presentations

The multi-room is a 7,590-squarefoot room that can be used for major events such as expos and banquets, seating up to 600 for a conference and 432 dimers for a banquet such as the college's Culinary Extravaganza and the Women's Resource Center's Spaghetti Dinner

The room can be divided into four smaller areas

Presentations in the multi-room can be simulcast elsewhere in the building or to off-site locations or conversely broadcasts from off-site locations can be beamed into the multi-room

ENRICHED TECHNOLOGY

Technology for meetings and educational functions include video monitors throughout the building, large projection screens in the multiroom and presentation room, plasma screens in the bays, mobile digital whiteboards, touch-screen monitors outside the meeting rooms, and a four-monitor media wall in the plaza

Hallway video monitors allow persons to check on what function is presently occurring in the room, check for open dates, and make a reservation request

The digital whiteboards not only allows for simple erasure of notes but offers a way for the notes to be saved in digital form to be saved on disk or e-mailed – an advantage for several applications, especially brain-storming sessions

The center also has a prefunction area near the bays suited for corporate receptions or breaks between training or conference sessions This area has big leather chairs on castors, coffee tables with power and data sources for laptops, and other tables for food and drinks The prefunction room also has a curved work wall that can be used as a meeting facilitation tool, message wall, or advertising mural

Inside each Innovation Bay, everything is mobile and can be assembled according to the user's training or learning needs The Innovation Bay has six Smart Boards, each with a high definition plasma screen that can be used like a desktop computer, a writing surface, or link to the Internet The Learning Bay is the curved portion of the building most visible from Haggerty About 90 PCs will rest on mobile workstations The room has a podium, three ceiling data projectors, a digital whiteboard than can e-mail information to participants' work or home computers

The Strategic Bay, like the hub of a large corporation, can be used for instruction, corporate retreats, seminars, meetings and presentations

And there are "Small Harbor" areas that can be used for groups of two to four persons for private discussions and informal presentations

Mobile furniture and computers offer flexibility in room setup, both for instructional use and business functions

GROWING LOCAL BUSINESS

The Business Development Center offers customized training to business in almost any subject matter applicable to business Such training can occur at the company's site or here at Schoolcraft It can be a oneday seminary or a year-long certificate training program we design for employees

Business might ask us to create a leadership training seminar, offer procurement and technical assistance and help local businesses do

Gateway to campus

VisTaTech has been designed to become the new "gateway" to the campus from the north entrance near Seven Mile and Haggerty

A covered canopy at the entrance turns into a central corridor with skylight named "Main Street" that runs through the building and then empties into the main portion of the campus

"Once you reach the center of the cafeteria, your view is redirected to the student campus through the southern windows, and you are invited into the campus courtyard," explains Brion Boucher, senior design architect for the project

The center is attached to the Waterman Center which will be renamed the Waterman Wing and contain the main cafeteria for Schoolcraft students Besides the expanded culinary arts department, the American Harvest restaurant will be relocated to VisTaTech The Business Development Center also will be relocated to VisTaTech

business with the federal government In working to obtain federal business for local businesses, Schoolcraft has brought \$30 billion of federal business to this area in the past 20 years

"VisTaTech allows us to take our existing training program and incorporate the latest technology and enhance the learning environment by the way we use technology and furniture in a way to help small and large groups be more effective," said Walsh


"That's the biggest shock of my hfe," said Gadsby, a 35-year resident of Southfield "I never did find out" why then-owner Bruce Norris canned him



All of those blessings are recounted by the National Hockey League Hall of Famer in his new autobiography, The Grateful Gadsby (Immortal Investments Publishing, based in Wayne, Mich)

He decided to go ahead and write it after being urged by Red Wings legend and close friend Gordie Howe, and his wife Colleen 'Mr and Mrs Hockey" wrote the book's foreword

'Gordie and Colleen tried to talk me into it four or five years ago," explained Gadsby, relaxing on the patio of the home he and wife Edna have lived in since 1968, when Gadsby returned to Detroit to coach the Red Wings in 1968-69 "They said 'You've got a lot of stories and you've had quite a life Why don't you write a book?'

"They finally talked me into it I got excited about doing it because it started bringing back memories about the things that we did"

Perhaps with the help of Howe publicist Del Reddy (whose brother, Mike, is publisher of Immortal Investment Publishing), the book idea quickly blossomed into reality



returned to the finals in 1966, only to lose to Montreal on a controversial overtime goal by Henri Richard Gadsby said Richard slid into Detroit goalie Roger Crozier with the puck under his arm - and Richard, Crozier and the puck all wound up over the goal line

'You've got to get the breaks," Gadsby said quietly

As far as his October 1969 firing by Norris, the Red Wings had just defeated Chicago, and the owner and coach had some happy moments in the dressing room immediately after

"Bruce Norris loved to beat Chicago because his brother owned the club," Gadsby said "He had his arm around me after the game and said, 'Bill, you've really got these guys going' And I said, 'We're going to have a good year The next day,

Gadsby made a screeching sound, indicating he got the socalled ziggy

But he doesn't have any regrets - except for not winning a Cup, of course

"Just like it (book) says, I'm grateful," Gadsby said. "When you read it, you'll see You'll know why I am so grateful and that's why I named it that"

FAMILY PRIDE

He is especially grateful to still be happily married to his childhood sweetheart Edna, together raising daughters

Brenda, Judy, Sandy and Donna There are nine grandchildren, including some who have played hockey

He gets out to the golf course about four times a week and is now relatively pain free after hip-replacement surgery in the late 1990s

There also is involvement with the Red Wings Alumni (he doesn't skate) and occasional visits to the Joe for games

This winter, however, he had a scare when doctors found an ırregular heartbeat during a routine checkup Unlike Howe's recent hospitalization for chest pains, Gadsby did not experience that kind of discomfort But still, a pacemaker needed to be inserted, and the Gadsbys had to forego their annual twomonth trek to Mau, Hawan

These days, he's doing just fine, and they intend to make it back to their island retreat in early 2004

All four of his daughters contributed their personal insights into the book. Their participation is what Gadsby likes most about it

'If you knew them you'd say, 'What nice people," Gadsby noted "Everybody likes them They love each other"

The Gadsby sisters grew into adulthood living with their parents at the ranch Bill and Edna bought in 1968

"Gordie (Howe) got us a real estate agent," said Gadsby, noting that Howe then was a Lathrup Village resident "We looked at 60 homes over three days, and all were in Southfield This was the second house we looked at'

The Gadsby's were taken by the central location and the fact it was a quiet, well-treed oasis in the middle of a growing metropolis

Now, he putters in the garden, or he watches for birds from the patio But there's less time for that, with so many boxes of books to sign "It (the ranch) is too big for us now, but we're going to stay put"

Doing so is just another reason Bill Gadsby is grateful

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



WHAT DO THE COLORS MEAN?

The Continental Congress established general criteria for the first American flag June 14 1777 Several changes have been made over the years

The 13 horizontal stripes represent the original 13 colonies with one star for each of the 50 states The meaning of the flag s colors have been subject to speculation myth and oratorical interpretation over the years Perhaps the best explanation comes from Charles Thompson secretary of the Continental Congress, who referenced the flag

when explaining the meaning of colors in the Great Seal of the United States adopted in 1782 Red symbolizes hardiness and valor white purity and innocence blue vigilance perseverance and justice Thompson said





Making your own DVDs can be frustrating **Sunflowers sought for contest**


hen you sit down at the TV to watch the first DVD you've ever created, it's kind of a magical moment

After patiently copying hours of home video to your computer, carefully editing the footage into a cohesive movie, and recording it to that shiny blank disc in your spiffy new DVD burner, you can't help feeling a bit like Spielberg so this is what it's like to make movies


And when your masterpiece appears on the screen upsidedown, as mine did, you start feeling more like Alan Funt *Am I on Candid Camera?*

Upside-down How could a digitally recorded image end up upside-down? It wasn't like I threaded the film into the projector backwards I've seen plenty of computer weirdness in my day, but this was within arm's reach of taking the cake

Let me start at the beginning Now that so many of us own DVD players, it's only natural to want to create our own home-



You can take it with you Casio's remarkably svelte Exilim EX-S3 fits into even the tightest of pockets



movie DVDs What better way to archive all those old tapes or share precious moments with distant friends and family?

Of course, it's nothing new to be able to transfer video to your PC and spruce it up with titles, transitions, and other faux-Hollywood effects But as for actually copying the result to a DVD, one you can view on any DVD player, that's a fairly recent option Recordable DVD drives (or 'burners'') have finally become fast and affordable enough to be practical

Witness the Pioneer DVR-A05 (www pioneerelectronics com), an internal drive that's not only one of the fastest DVD burners to date, but also one of the least expensive at \$299 (less if you shop online) It comes with some great software, most notably a program called MyDVD, which allows you to easily assemble your video clips and produce fancy DVD menus

I decided to take the Pioneer drive and software for a spin, hoping to archive to DVD about 12 hours' worth of baby and toddler video

As you already know, the end result wasn't pretty Of the two movie clips I burned to that

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
fateful first DVD, one played upside-down The other looked fine when played on my PC,

but jerky on my DVD player Admittedly I may have messed things up by generating the wrong video format from my movie-editing program A subsequent effort with a different clip resulted in a flawless DVD But the whole exercise demonstrated that while DVD creation has come a long way in a short while, it's not yet as easy as it should be And with blank DVDs still selling for about two bucks apiece, mistakes are not only frustrating, but costly as well

I won't even bore you with the ridiculous standards war that continues to plague recordable DVD (it's like VHS versus Beta all over again) This drive supports DVD-R and DVD-RW, that drive supports DVD+R and DVD+RW – give me a break. Whittle it down to one or two universally acceptable standards and I'll break out the checkbook

Until then, I can live without the confusion, frustration, and expense of burning my own DVDs

My windows need replacing, what windows should I use?

There are many types and brands of windows from which to choose Window types include wood, wood clad, aluminum wood, vinyl vinyl composite and aluminum There are probably at least twenty brands for each type of window Which windows to choose depends on the look and the quality you want and your budget

Yessiree! The 2003 sunflower contest is on! If you have planted seeds, continue doing everything you can to keep them growing If you have decided to plant sunflower seeds this year and haven't quite gotten around to doing it, it's best to get started

As you can see by the photograph, we had some happy winners last year, and we hope to encourage more of you to participate

In the 2002 contest, the tallest sunflower in Oakland County was 12 feet 1-1/2 inches, and in Wayne County, the tallest was a whopping 14 feet 6 inches A tie in the counties for the largest seedhead was 17 inches

Sunflowers, the common name, are in the Compositae (daisy) family You can tell this by looking at the flower and seeing the resemblance

The botanical genus is Helianthus and it is an annual plant The common name is translated from the genus name, made up of two Greek words helios ("sun") and anthos (flower")

For fun you can say, 'I'm going to go out to the garden and see how my helianthus is doing"

The blossoms of original sunflowers are bright yellow and the disc in the center (the seeds) are reddish brown Now sunflowers have been bred so that they come in other colors that are quite interesting Original plants grew to a

height of 3 to 10 feet, now they grow taller, as we have learned from the contest, and there are miniature ones, too The Inca Indians of Peru wor-

shiped the sunflower as a symbol of the sun The priestesses in the temple wore necklaces of sunflowers made of gold

When Spanish explorers arrived they took the seeds back to their country, where they were cultivated and hybridized, and hundreds of years later they were reintroduced as cultivated plants in America Nineteenth century

American settlers planted the



The 2002 sunflower contest winners beam for the camera This photo was taken at English Gardens in West Bloomfield


seed near their homes as protection against malaria Leaves and stalks were used for fodder, fibers were used to make cloth, the leaves were dried and smoked like tobacco

The settlers also ate young sprouts and the seeds, the seed husks were ground to make a coffee-like drink. The oil from the seeds was used for cooking and for making soap So the sunflower was quite a valuable plant. It's interesting to learn about such an old plant But now it's



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Technology improves toilets

nly a few years ago many Detroit area residents were going to Windsor for something they couldn't get here

No. it wasn't a visit to the casino to gamble Instead they traveled to Canada to buy, of all things, toilets that would flush properly

In 1992, Congress passed the Energy Policy Act This law gave plumbing fixture manu facturers less than two years to convert from the standard 3 1/2-gallon flush to the mandated 1 6-gallon flush toilet

With such little time to reengineer, they modified existing products The results left a lot to be desired The modified units got a reputation of clogging and often requiring two or more flushes to clear the bowl The 3 1/2 gallon flush toilets could still be purchased ın Canada

Most of today's 1 6-gallon toilets perform as well or better than the 3 1/2-gallon units they replace Given the extra time, the fixture manufactures have been able to design units that are more efficient

TANKS AND TRAPS

The first major change was in the trap The trap is the part of the toilet that allows the waste to flow to the sewer but keep the sewage gasses from entering the home

Using computer-aided modeling techniques, they developed a freer flowing trap that provided optimum flow with less clogs while, of course, using less water Next, using very old toilet


redesigned to increase water flow velocity Early Victorian toilets had the tank mounted several feet above the bowl, providing a more forceful flush Modern bowl mounted tanks don t allow this extra head pressure By designing tanks that hold 3 or more gallons of water, but only use the required 1 6 gallons, the weight of the additional water creates a more forceful flush

lets is they tend to sweat less Since not all the water in the tank empties, the room temperature water left in the tank tempers the incoming water

OTHER OPTIONS

There are a wide variety of pressure-assisted toilets available for the residential market Some work with a sealed air tank that creates a cushion of compressed air This causes the flush water to have commerciallike pressure Pressure-assisted units typically cost about \$150 more than conventional toilets and tend to be much noisier than typical gravity-fed units



Eric Phipps is commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars DeWolfe-Dreon Post 4037 in Troy He's heartened to see the American flag fly from individual homes

'Its not just a piece of cloth," said Phipps, a Marine Corps veteran of the Persian Gulf War "It means something No other country has a flag with so much history sewn into it"

Forch kits with flag, staff and brackets start at about \$20, kits with a flag and 15-foot ground pole about \$110, Prud homme said of her store



According to federal law the American flag never should be used for advertising purposes When displayed on the same pole the American flag should always be higher than a state flag municipal banner or other pennants The American flag and the flag of another country should never be displayed on the same pole

The American flag should be at the highest point and centered when clustered with state or municipal flags and other banners on separate poles When clustered with flags of other countries all flags should be at the same level and the American flag should be displayed on the extreme left as most frequently viewed The American flag should be illuminated when displayed at night

A tattered flag should be turned over to a veterans organization for proper disposal

Be smart, simple in photography

s my photography students all know, I like to promote the idea of the KISS (keep it smartly simple) theory in my classes (And no, it doesn't mean smooching with the student next to you) KISS means to be smart and to maintain a simplicity in your photographs

A good writer, for example, doesn't clutter up his work with superfluous words They get right to heart of the matter which makes their writing easier to understand You ll also find a simplicity of style and content in many of the great paintings that we all enjoy

Similarly with our photography, keeping things simple will often result in impact shots that will capture our attention

One of the best ways to apply the KISS theory in photography is to simply move in close and express a single idea.

A close-up of a rusted latch on a weathered barn door can tell a lot about the barn as a whole A well-executed intimate shot of a single bud will usually have more impact than a picture of an entire garden of flowers

How about a simple photo of

a flower-laden window ledge in a small French village? Such a picture can convey the feeling and charm of all of Europe Even when photographing your pet, moving in close and keeping it simple can produce a terrific picture for you

As in all good photography, watch your backgrounds Simplifying your compositions also means simplifying the background Look for backgrounds that are uncluttered or select a background that complements the subject

Remember, a well done shot that utilizes the KISS theory and contains the essence of the whole will reward you with a photograph of which you'll be proud

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Dryer fires, forgotten pots can create dangers

ot summer days bring back memories of growing up in northern Canada.

It was a time of year when, as a young boy, I was taught the dangers of fire I was never allowed to go into the wilderness for two or three days after a lightning storm Lightning striking a forest causes what is called a "deep burn" and it may not surface or spread until the wind has died down

Picture a scout making a fire without matches and blowing on the little chips of wood Only when you stop blowing will you have the ignition you need

A similar ignition can take place inside your dryer

I spoke with Barry Novick who is a professional in the home construction industry He had just finished an \$82,000 job for a family who had a clothes dryer fire in their home This fire was caused by having plastic vent line hooked up to the drver which is against the state construction code in Michigan The fire was contained totally inside the dryer and did not spread to other areas of the room or house It was classified as smoke damage because the fire was inside the dryer drum

It's amazing how much damage can result from smoke alone My friend had a similar problem two years ago when during dinner time a transformer failed the neighborhood Everyone knew that the power would be off for several hours before repairs by the utility were completed The



family went to bed after the 11 p m news and they completely forgot about the pot of beans that was cooking on top of the stove during the electrical outage At 3 a m, power was restored and the stove burner was still in the "On" position The beans continued to cook until they were burnt and the pot reached such a high temperature that the handle of the pot and the knob on the hd slowly melted

Just these 2 little components alone caused over \$16,000 in smoke damage in their home When they awoke in the morning to the smell of smoke and came flying out of the bedroom, they considered themselves lucky to be alive

These examples I have given you in this column should point out that these things happen constantly across America If we go back to the day of invention for these products such as a kitchen range and a clothes dryer, can you imagine how many hundreds of thousands of fires have occurred in America's homes? The end result in many of these cases goes beyond just smoke damage and includes deaths and injuries Think also of the billions of dollars paid out by the insurance industry

in most of these claims The responsibility of all this should fall squarely on the shoulders of the manufacturers But it doesn t

These guys are so busy designing appliances of the future which will start from your office telephone and yet they care too little about your safety They are not afraid to jack up the product costs because they know how America loves to spend their money especially for new features and gadgets Couldn't they include just a little extra safety feature such as a canister of chemical inside a clothes dryer drum which releases during a fire and extinguishes the flame? How about a simple circuit switch on a kitchen range which you have to reset anytime the power is killed to the stove?

Here is a sample of a new kind of phone call I've been getting lately 'Mr Gagnon, my kitchen range came on without my touching anything on it It just started to cook by itself and I couldn't shut it off I had to go to the circuit breaker box and throw the switch Thank God I was home or what would have happened? There is more coming on this subject, as I am not done



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



There was a time when most salads consisted of a heap of iceberg lettuce and a wedge of tomato in exile off to the side of the dish Today, these varied offerings of taste and vitamins have moved to the center of the plate

Salads in summertime not only taste right, they make those skimpler clothes that go with the season fit a little less tightly (as long as you don't top these light plates of nutrient-packed greens and succulent fresh fruits with the wrong kind of dressings)

"The concept of a salad is a storehouse of nutrition, but not if we put dressing on it that is high in fat," said Dan Rowlson, instructor and registered dictitian at the Culinary Studies Institute of Oakland Community College

Get the best tasting dressings that suit your preferscratch,' he said The idea that you have to mix the dressing the day before you plan to serve it is eliminated if you steep your herbs in vinegar - the same way you steep tea in water That releases the tastes

immediately "The heat will reduce the oils from the herbs and spices and it's a vinaigrette that has a

beautifully strong flavor with taste right now," Rowlson said "Fresh herbs give you flavor that is much more mellow" The salads themselves come

in all kinds of varieties from multicolored greens salads to fruit, pasta and potato, Caesar salads and an endless assortment of choices once you start adding meats and fish to your salads

Simply explained, salads are anything that is served cold, explained Valerie Wilson, who teaches whole food and vegetarian cooking classes using organic ingredients in her

Add pieces of grilled tuna to a beautifully laid bed of greens and you've got a hearty and

impressive main dish More and more people are moving away from pasta salads toward the green salads, explained Karen Kierzkowski, Meal Solutions demonstration chef at Busch's Market Place with stores in Livonia, Farmington, Plymouth and nine other locations Demonstrations are held at various times throughout the day at each store

"I get more people who want a green salad compared to a pasta salad because they're watching their carbs," she said

ocated on the landmark Napa Valley estate, established in 1878 by San Francisco stained glass merchant Fritz Rosenbaum, St Clement has both historic and vinous intrigue

Rosenbaum created one of the earliest Napa Valley bonded wineries For more than a century, several different labels were produced on the property

The winery's rise to recognition began in 1975 when the St Clement label was christened

Today, the estate is a must stop on a trip to Napa Valley, for reflection on the grandeur of yesteryear, depicted by the Visitors Center located in the gothic Victorian Rosenbaum House, that has been fully restored There, one also finds the home of a modern wine-



making facility where winemaker Aaron Pott is crafting some of the best kept wine secrets in the Napa Valley in one of the few remaining fullyrestored 19th century facilities

Acquired in 1999, St Clement is the smallest of the wineries in the Beringer-Blass family of wineries, producing only 28,000 cases A few years ago, Beringer

CEO Walter Klenz told us, "We view the St. Clement wines as a stylistic complement to what winemaker Ed Sbragia does at Beringer and to what Robert Brittain does at Stags' Leap Winery St Clement wines come off slightly more elegant and accessible earlier, while the Beringer Reserve wines have a very distinct Ed Sbragia style And that's the point, we do not want all California wines from our various properties to taste like Beringer Vineyards"

"I always try to give customers ideas for delicious. nutritious but quick and easy salads,' Kierzkowski said "People are eating healthier and lighter I probably do salads four out of five days I do my demos

There's nothing wrong with using salad in a bag as a base and adding a few ingredients

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to make it special, she added The everyday cole slaw, for instance, can be brought up a couple of pegs by making broccoli slaw, which is also known as rainbow slaw Broccoh slaw's shredded broccoli and carrots have a high nutritional value, pack a big crunch and a lot of people think it tastes better than the traditional cole slaw made with cabbage, she added

Mix the broccoli slaw with spinach and a nice vinaigrette Adding blanched green beans or asparagus, sliced almonds or dried fruit on top of any salad is quick and adds variety, Kierzkowski said Sometimes she uses spinach

and field greens Don't be 💡 afraid to add cubed meat to the dish, she said

"Go ahead," she said "I try to load them up with nutritional stuff - nuts and seeds, mango salsa and fruit salsa'

Kierzkowski also steers customers toward healthier choices - like pasta salads with a vinaigrette dressing instead of a mayonnaise

"I try to put different things in so people will try different things,' Kierzkowski said With iceberg lettuce you might as well drink a glass of water

The darker the green is in the vegetable, the more vitamins and nutrients it has

A lot of people like to put in a little spinach or dandelion greens," Wilson said

Cleaning the greens properly is also essential, Rowlson said, explaining that cold water is best for washing

There's nothing worse than dirt in a salad, he added 'I love a salad spinner," he said "You get all the water off

of it and you have a nice dry salad There's a crispiness to the greens and they hold so much better '

Rowlson said he builds salads like a florist would design

Take two leaves as a backdrop to set your greens on." he said It really makes a statement There's movement to it Some things are fanned, some are sprinkled and some are architectural and everything is bite size, so there's ease in eating and there's set colors' Nuts and seeds provide good

quality fat and they've got that

crunchy texture that a lot of people like, Wilson said

Some of Wilson's favorite salads are tabboult made with quinoa, which is a small grain that's packed with protein Other top picks, she said, are garlic kidney bean salad and colorful vegetable salad with zucchim, yellow squash and radishes seasoned with fresh basıl She also lıkes usıng sauteed or broiled portabella mushrooms in her salads Try adding walnuts and

pecans that are high in essential fatty acids, Wilson said "The main question I get is

'How do you make it flavorful?" she said "It takes practice You have to know your seasonings, so your end product is flavorful

"You probably wouldn't want to add too many things of the same taste You start with leafy greens that are bitter, so you probably wouldn't want to put anymore bitter tasting things ın'

Add sweetness with vegetables like cucumbers and a pungent flavor with onions

'There's a mixture of flavors instead of a salad being all one flavor - that would be boring," Wilson said

Key to consider when you're building salads, said Rowlson, is to use seasonal and regional products for freshness, better taste and the most nutrients at the best prices

Using fresh rather than processed foods offer lower sodium and higher potassium levels, he said, adding that studies show eating a diet high in potassium reduces the risk of high blood pressure

"By using things that have no processing in them you'll get higher vitamins and higher minerals that will lead to more health advantages," Rowlson said "That's not just for salads but for everything"

Peel cucumbers, cut in half, remove seeds Cut into half again, thinly slice on a diagonal

Wash mushrooms well, drain, toss with/2 cup dressing Broil, cook, quarter, slice into a fan

Remove tough ends from asparagus or broccoli, peel the bottom 2 inches, blanch and shock

Remove stems from spinach, tear into bite-sized pieces Immerse spinach in sink of cold water, drain well in a colander

Separate red-tipped lettuce leaves from stem, immerse in cold water, then wash well Remove from water, wash leaves a second time, drain

To Assemble Place 1-2 redtipped leaf lettuce leaves on a salad plate, place spinach (1 ounce) on center of leaf lettuce Combine vegetables in a large bowl, add dressing, toss to combine Allow to marinate for 30 minutes

To Serve Top greens with3/4 cup (approximate) of marinated vegetables, sprinkle with parmesan cheese (1 teaspoon), parsley (1/2 teaspoon), and a few slices of green onion

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





Swallow pride to save deal

We are in the process of selling our home and have entered into a purchase agreement whereby the purchaser has the right to an inspection of the premises as well as radon testing.

The inspection resulted in us having to commit as seliers to fix the roof, well pressure tank, and pay for some of the purchaser's closing costs. Now the purchaser wants us to install a radon reduction system which will cost us \$700 more.

We don't believe the radon reduction system is reasonable since the test that was conducted would not yield 100 percent accuracy, but we hate to lose the deal. What are your thoughts?

It would appear that this all boils down to a matter of dollars and cents in terms of how much you are willing to pay in order to save the deal

Whether or not the radon reduction system is necessary is not the issue since the buyer is apparently demanding it as a condition preceding to

the purchase The other items which you have agreed to fix would be necessary to fix, in any event should you wish to sell the property and now

sell the property and now that you are on notice of these defects, they should be fixed The radon reduction

The radon reduction system is more of a nebulous issue, but if it comes up again and your sale is dependent upon it, you may be well advised to swallow your pride and hit your pocketbook for the cost of the system

Buyers want bigger rooms, more privacy

Dagwood and Blondie probably wouldn't recognize the place Nor would Ozzie and Harriet And Donna Reed, high heels and all, would be hanging her curtains in different kinds of rooms

And father most likely would know best that today's typical American home isn't like the house he used to live in

The "average" house used to include a living room, dining room or area, serviceable kitchen, three minimally functional bedrooms, a bathroom, maybe also a half-bath, maybe a utilitarian basement, maybe a garage You know, the house where millions of Americans grew up for most of the 20th century

If you ask Lana Byrne about the changes she's seen in houses which now are in the used-home market – brought innovations that further changed the concept of the family home

Along with the family rooms popularized in the 1960s, "we started seeing jetted tubs and showers in new construction, which motivated some homeowners into adding on a master bedroom over the attached garage if they didn't want to move," she said

'In some of our traditional three-bedroom homes of the 50s, people would knock out a wall, making it a two-bedroom and giving them room for a king-size bed

A major change shes seen in family hfe Byrne said is the privacy issue People started demanding to not share a bathroom When I grew up everybody shared one

A first-floor laundry – sometimes even a second-floor laundry – Byrne said, became a requirement, not just a convenience

from a reading area or a piano area," she said "Now it's changing again because we need places for computers The living room is changing Kids take online courses and need to have the Internet My home is networked with four computers throughout "Homes had been designed

in fundamental compartments and we accommodated ourselves to them," Byrne said "Now we require the building to accommodate us"

And even if it seems that today's Americans spend less time cooking at home than previous generations did, "we want larger kitchens with built-in grills and other appliances – a large area with an island and bar stools, she said Meanwhile, outside the

Meanwhile, outside the house, Byrne said, the one-car garage is passé, two is acceptable, three or more is desirable


We're seeing more Jack-and-Jill baths between two bedrooms, sometimes sectioned off so someone can shower while someone else is using the sink.

"And families are looking for separate play areas for kids, maybe a playroom or living room on the second floor," Phaup said

In his 32 years of selling, John Hannett has seen that buyers often have to choose between "the traditional, charming house and the newer one" with all the updated features

Hannett, broker/owner, Hannett, Wilson & Whitehouse, Birmingham said he knows that older houses didn t have the extravagant master suites and kitchens and the absence of such elements can affect used home sales

And in Westland, Mike Mangold, sales-associate with Real Estate One, said he finds "everyone wants bigger ' While the standard house in his area is about 900 square feet, he said, his buyers seem to prefer 1,500 to 2,000 "They want bigger bedrooms, bigger kitchens The family room has become the living room, and with the kitchen, it's the heart of the house There are fewer formal areas More space is needed for TVs and computers" But reality still controls the choice, Mangold said, and features are sacrificed because of cost



Rates reflect Fed's cut

Reserve Bank dropped interest rates yet another // percent last week for the 13th time in a couple years, and that's supposed to be great news for mortgage interest rates Right? Not always

People often ask, "Why do mortgage interest rates sometimes rise when Mr Greenspan cuts rates?' After all, doesn't "The Fed" call the shots on where mortgage rates are going? The answer Not exactly

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The Federal Reserve Bank does not loan money directly to you It loans its money to lending institutions who, in turn, loan that money to you That "wholesale" money is loaned to major banks at a deeply discounted rate called the Federal Funds Rate When Greenspan "cuts interest rates," he is actually discounting the money that's available for member banks of the Federal Reserve He is not cutting mortgage rates Mortgage lenders determine mortgage interest rates

Mortgage lenders mark up the Fed money by a small percent, then loan it to you while keeping a margin as their profit They price each loan based on several factors including the length of the mortgage, the terms of the note, and the sum of the mortgages risk factors, to name just a few To remain competitive, they must select rates that will be profitable while slightly undercutting other lenders This often calls for a speculation They sometimes guess wrong

Two weeks ago, many lenders reduced their mortgage interest rates in anticipation of a Federal Funds Rate decrease of /2 percent They did not wait for Greenspan to announce the change Instead, they made their interest rate decisions fully expecting the larger reduction When the decrease was not as large as they hoped it would be, they had to readjust interest rates slightly upward to compensate What you, the consumer, saw was the Federal Reserve announcing a rate cut and mortgage interest rates rise slightly





Daughters Kathryn, 13. and Cecelia, 12, even won the "hustle" award at camp the first day, Mulhern said The couple also have a son, Jack, 5

"They're meeting new people They're meeting new friends," Mulhern said "We told them that we'll

Manufactured homes make a comeback

anufactured homes - a far evolution from the old-style single "trailers" customarily sought out by low-income singles and families - have attracted the upscale and middle class Manufactured home communities or mobile home parks, no

longer called trailer parks, have developed into a multi-billion dollar industry in Michigan Newer

housing industry are

sound, solid homes These newer homes aren't only installed in these parks, but also in communities all over the state

Manufactured home quality is top rate – the homes are built in factory warehouses, using the same state and federal uniform building codes, without exposing the building materials to the outside weather, so there is less chance of warping, mold and other building pitfalls

These homes are far less expensive than traditional homes a three-bedroom, 2-1/2-bath, 2,000square foot manufactured home starts pricing at about \$40,000 Manufactured homes include carpet, flooring and most kitchen appliances There is a variety of floor plans and features – the selections are awesome

The land choices for manufactured homes can be a bit overwhelming Forty-five percent of manufactured homes are placed in park communities - you lease a lot from a community The other 55 percent are installed on private land, adding a basement or garage

In Michigan, manufactured home regulation falls under the jurisdiction of the Mobile Home Commission, a state commission formed to regulate the various aspects of the sale, installation and business practices of broker/dealers, retailers, installers and park communities

The commission regulations, formed under Public Act 96, follow the basic uniform construction codes and incorporate other federal and state laws, acts and statutes

related to the industry

A state-produced booklet, The Manufactured Home Buyer's and Resident's Handbook, is a guide to the specifics of buying a manufactured home and leasing land in a park All retailers and communities are required to give this booklet to prospective buyers

All manufactured communities built in Michigan must meet or exceed the standard building codes, the same as residential communities, apartment or condominium complexes, with plans, blueprints, inspections and approvals specific to state codes and the cities and municipalities where they are built

Retailers, brokers and dealers must have a license to sell. installers and services must have a hcense to install and service Communities must have a license to operate, as do utility installers

Many low-income singles and families can afford to buy a manufactured home for a price within a budget and lease a lot in a park With the usual government regulatory processes, there are glitches in the system, and due to lack of produceable tax income from the lower priced homes and rentals, the systems put in place for these communities don't get the same regulatory checks and balances as a \$200,000 per home condominium complex

Actually, condominium regulations were included in the same statutes and class as mobile or manufactured homes, until those hômeowners formed associations and coalitions to enforce laws, and lobby for better laws that give them the same rights and protections as "regular homeowners"

Most of the manufactured home and community standards fall under the local jurisdiction, as regulated by the Mobile Home Commission and PA 96 Unfortunately, most local building departments don't know or realize that they have jurisdiction

Most city service departments, when asked, will state emphatically that a manufactured home park is private property, and they aren't allowed to respond to complaints

from residents, they refer everyone to the Mobile Home Commission

(*) **F3**

Most local jurisdictions have the responsibility to issue the utility and occupancy permits for all home and building construction - the same standards that apply to manufactured home installation and occupancy standards

Some local service departments balk and ignore complainants when presented with the commission's documentation that they have jurisdiction

The sale and resale of manufactured homes is poorly regulated as are the communities and practices. Homeowners find that banks and finance companies are willing to finance new homes, yet refuse to refinance at standard industry rates or not at all Homeowners' insurance policies are priced higher than other sectors Manufactured homes, unlike the old-style "trailers" of the past, are still regulated and titled by the Secretary of State Motor Vehicle Division, not registered as regular real estate

If a manufactured home is placed on private land, finance options are plentiful, the home appreciates in value, as does the land The same home placed in a leased community has few options, only a few finance companies fund leased land purchases and the homes depreciate

The Mobile Home Commission has a complaint process Each year hundreds of consumers file complaints against retailers, installers, services and communities for breaches in the system Most complaints take months to get response and resolution

Michigan state and local agencies need to reassess and refocus on servicing the communities' needs. New laws might make things better, but enforcement of the existing laws is a given The retailers, installers and community owners and managers need to clean up and revisit the integrity of their business practices and follow the laws

Its a simple but telling thing I love the clearly labeled, easy-to-use climate controls in the 2003 Toyota 4Runner When an auto maker can get the simple things so right, it's a good sign that the rest of the vehicle is just as well thought out

That's certainly the case with the 4Runner, which with this year's model now is in its fourth generation as Toyota's workhorse truck-based SUV This new model is bigger, wider, longer and stronger than its predecessors, and in the \$40,000 Limited version that I drove, 4Runner offers a wide range of utility that makes it ideal for a single-SUV household

The 4Runners appeal begins with its redesigned exterior, which is both stylish as well as obviously functional, with a hint of the up-class styling that Toyota uses so well in its line of Lexus luxury SUVs, in fact, 4Runner shares its basic design with the new GX470 from Lexus The all-new chassis design of 4Runner features a wide, rounded front end with a thick-barred horizontal grille that is complemented with a front bumper and skid plate and wide head lamps In back, large tail lamps complete the look

For 2003, 4Runner gained 4 5 inches in its wheelbase, 57 inches in its body length, and 200 pounds But not surprising for Toyota, its engineers have found a way for 4Runner to seem to haul the extra load effortlessly The 47 liter, dual-overhead-cam, V8 Force engine that powers the Limited, along with the automatic five-speed transmission, gave me easy acceleration and cruising power in that remarkable Toyota way that, unfortunately, is too easy to take for granted

While the ride isn't as smooth as, say, in the Lexus line, 4Runner handled small bumps and significant potholes in stride and not nearly as much in the jostling, 'aftershock' manner of many of its truckbased counterparts I imagine the ride is a tad better in

the Toyota Highlander, the much newer car-based SUV that appeals to a similar market as 4Runner Mileage for the four-wheel-drive Limited is a cred-Itable 15 in the city and 19 on the highway

The new 4Runner also sports extensive safety technology, with four-channel anti-lock brakes and helpful technology known as brake assist and electronic brakeforce distribution all standard, resulting in dependable, quick and even stopping Vehicle skid control and traction control also are in place on all models, along with advanced air bag and belt-restraint systems The side air bags on the 2003 models are a first for 4Runner There's even a new set of two convex mirrors on the rear pillars near the top which, when viewed through the rear-view mirror, give the driver a great view of what's behind the vehicle in the blind spot

It's evident in how the ample cargo space is arranged that Toyota hasn't forgotten that 4Runner which has been around in some form since the mid-Eighties - still has substantial appeal as a "working" SUV For one thing, Toyota designers didn't cut rear cargo space by angling off the hatch The split-rear seat folds without the head rests having to be removed And they've included plenty of handy tie-downs, nets and cubby holes

My favorite nifty cargo innovation is a double-deck

cargo shelf, standard on Limited and available on other models, that unfolds from the floor with varioussized compartments It has a weight capacity of 66 pounds When I didn't need the shelf, it easily folded flat with the floor

The Limited, of course, offers a variety of luxury touches including leather upholstery, heated power § seating, rear radio controls with wireless headphones, a universal garage-door opener and more But I didn't like the gray trim that we had with our Pacific Blue Metallic exterior

And the things I liked best about the interior of ' 4Runner are common to the whole line One of them was the inclusion of many various-sized compartments in the center console plus a huge, and very flexible, drink-holding compartment

Then, of course, there were the controls for the dual-zone climate control A simple control for "fan" was on the far left, "temperature" in the middle and "zone" on the far right It's amazing how much more complex - and confusing - that most other vehicles can make climate controls Yet 4Runner was plenty comfortable, and it was easy for me to figure out how to make it so

All of which helps make 4Runner an easy purchase decision

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



CHARLIE'S ANGELS: FULL THROTTLE ** (out of four)

Charlie's Angels Full Throttle is a big ball of bouncing, jiggling nonsense. It has all the acrobatics, naughty jokes and skin of the first film, but incorporates it together in a more seamless package, for example, the action no longer feels clumsily grafted in from *The Matrix*

Consequently, I hked *Full Throttle* better than its predecessor Sadly, that really isn't saying much

Secret-agent success hasn t changed Natahe (Cameron Diaz), Dylan (Drew Barrymore) or Alex (Lucy Luu) – they are still lethal (and horny) ass-kickers who somehow manage to be as intelligent as rocket scientists and as ditzy as low-I Q cheerleaders

Along with the Reese Witherspoon character in *Legally Blonde*, they seem to represent the new female ideal intelligent and sexy but completely unaware that they look like yummy little pieces of candy

Their supervisor Bosley (Bernie Mac, filling in as Bill Murrays 'brother') has a new case for the Angels Recover two stolen titanium rings that contain the identities of all those protected by the



Witness Protection Program

Bypassing such obvious questions as 'Why would the US government put such important information on two pieces of jewelry?" the Angels begin a haphazard but energetic campaign to find the real criminal while fending off the attention of ex-Angel Madison Lee (40-year old Demi Moore, who doesn t even look old enough to drive)

The Angels dress up in an endless pro cession of cute outfits – each one skimpler than the last – while making naive double entendres that crank up the sexual tension to an almost unbearable level

Full Throttle (the title alone seems to promise a release of sorts) takes us further than ever before – the girls even appear nude, although strategically covered – but the film still manages to conclude with its chastity intact

There's even a subplot involving Natalies impending engagement to boyfriend Pete (Luke Wilson) that, at the last second, neutralizes itself by replacing sex with dogs (I



don't want to spoil it You'll see)

I can't think of a film more obsessed with sex that doesn't even include, to my recollection, so much as a kiss But this is the appeal of *Charlies Angels* It's an NC-17 whorehouse mistress concealed inside a PG-rated halter top


The Angels may be in their 30s, but they come off like high school jailbait They make girlish comments to each other like, God, I miss stakeouts' and worry about the day when one of them will graduate and leave their circle of friends The message is sexually infuriating but crystal clear It's permissible to look at the Angels, but no touching, OK?

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Small Screen **'Born on the Fourth of July' has both joy and sadness, a must-see**

Born on the Fourth of July is a hard movie to swallow It's depressing, frustrating and a challenge to sit through "Entertaining' isn't a word I'd use to describe this film and I surely wasn't filled with American pride while watching it.

Yet no movie was more deserving of a 1989 'Best Picture" nomination, and no performance merited a nomination for 'Best Actor" better than Tom Cruise's portrayal of war veteran Ron Kovic

Arguably one of Oliver Stone's greatest works, *Born on the Fourth of July* chronicles Kovic's life as a bright-eyed young teen in love with his country, to his trials and tribulations as a paraplegic war veteran and finally a triumphant war protester and author

Though it lacks entertainment value and warm fuzzies, few films are as symbolically powerful and emotionally stirring The directing is superb and acting is equally impressive

Kovic is a fresh-faced, small-town high school student growing up during the mid-1960s in Long Island. The embodiment of an All-American boy, his bedroom walls are filled with Marilyn Monroe pin-ups and Yankees pennants. He works hard at his grocery store job and as the high school wrestling star, but his main passion is his country and he dreams of joining the Marines. His life is like something out of The Wonder Years, only Kevin Arnold could only hope to be as wholesome as this kid Kovic was born on the fourth of July, afterall

Young, innocent and anxious to serve his country, he joins the Marines and finds himself in Vietnam where he's surrounded by death and tragedy— a stark contrast to the previous wholesome images of American hfe Yet Kovic's pas-



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Plunge into cool fun at local waterparks

Mike Boyd, recreation supervisor of Waterford Oaks Waterpark, can always count on the first two weekends of the swimming season to be pretty slow for Oakland County's two water parks But by the first week in June, only 98 people had braved the cold and rainy weather at Red Oaks in Madison Heights and at Waterford Oaks, between Dixie Highway and Pontiac Lake Road

Boyd said typically 1500 to 2000 people visit the parks by the first week in June But low attendance can have an upside "We do a lot of staff training, and it is much easier for them to learn when there is not a huge crowd," said Boyd

Even with the unseasonably cold start, Boyd said the parks are still on goal to reach nearly 100,000 visitors this year

RIVER RAFTING

And if you haven't been to the parks in a few years, you're in for some new surprises Last July, Red Oaks opened River Ride, a 990-foot long lazy river, and also added two new children s areas – a soak station with 68 features including water jets, curtains and slides for children 56 inches and under, and a spray and play area for toddlers that has 15 water jets and bubblers at zero depth

Boyd said the park, which opened in 1986, is designed so that as children get older, they can venture further into the water structure The toddler area is around the perimeter, and the deepest point for the younger kids is 18 inches deep

Red Oaks also includes three body shdes and one of the largest wave action pools with barrier-free access

Inner tubes are offered on a first-come, first-serve basis for the pool and river rides, and patrons are not allowed to bring any flotation device into the water that is not US Coast Guard approved That means no noodles, water wings, baby boats, beach balls, squirt guns, snorkels or other water toys

Opened in 1976, Waterford Oaks features Michigan s first wave pool that was recently upgraded with new wave-mak ing equipment A popular attraction is the Ragin Rapids, a group raft ride that carriers riders 515 feet through drops and turns There is also a wave-action pool and a dual flume waterslide For the little ones the Big Bucket offers 60 interactive features including a giant tipping bucket

While the Great Wolf Lodge in Traverse City has been making waves with its new 38,000 square-foot indoor waterpark, those who don't want to spend hours on Interstate 75 can head east to 15 Mile Road and Van Dyke, where the Best Western Sterling Inn Waterpark is open all year

"We slow down when the outdoor parks heat up," said Susan Bullotta, director of marketing

And that can translate into lots of special offers for those wanting to get away for a night or weekend

"If you re in Farmington Hills, you can jump on I-696 and be here in 28 minutes," said Bullotta, "This is more of a spontaneous destination"


With a waterpark that includes a 110foot water slide, a lazy river, a zero-depth entry for smaller kids and a huge waterspurting pool, the Sterling Inn waterpark is fun without the sun

And while the hotel sells out every weekend, there are far fewer families Sunday through Friday Bullotta said that lots of local families take advantage of a day off and stay during the week A \$30 per person birthday party package, which is available Sunday through Thursday between 1 p m and 9 p m, is popular for groups, and overnight stay is not required Other than that, all waterpark patrons must be hotel guests

The metro Detroit area is also home to Four Bears Water Park in Utica, and Metro Beach in Mt Clemens has a watershide and Squirt Zone If you want to travel a hitle, Soak City is next door to Cedar Point in Sandusky, Ohio, and Six Flags Worlds of Adventure in Aurora Ohio offers wave pools and water 11des





Old for a change

Purple Rose Theatre Co. takes fresh look at Noel Coward's 'Blithe Spirit'

New plays are old news at The Purple Rose Theatre, which Hollywood film actor Jeff Daniels founded in 1991 to promote new works by Midwestern playwrights

The latest play to open at the Chelsea theater is a frequently produced, classic comedy, Noel Coward's *Blithe Spirit*.

'Its a show that's been done a lot But its a good play, and it's very funny,' said Guy Sanville, the theater company's artistic director 'Most of the work that we do is new It's nice for us to take a break and take a fresh look at a classic play'

Blithe Spirit takes place in the living room of successful British novelist Charles Condomine and his second wife, Ruth Another couple, the Bradmans, Join them in a seance with a psychic All are skeptical, but play along to humor Charles, who is researching a book Everybody, including the psychic, is surprised when the ghost of Charles' first wife Elvira appears and then later refuses to return to the spirit world

"It's fun to see really mature, attractive grown-ups do this sort of stuff, and that's as good a reason as any," said Sanville, who co-directed the farce "We're getting back into the comedy business"

The Purple Rose's upcoming season includes an evening of short comedies by Jeff Daniels, a comedy by Detroit Free Press sports columnist Mitch Albom and the Michigan premiere of Steve Martins The Underpants, which was originally penned in 1991 by German playwright Carl Sternheim

The Purple Rose's *Blithe Spirit* stays true to the original play with a few exceptions A cello replaces the piano, and there are two intermissions

"We just raised the stakes and tried to play it as real as possible," said Sanville

The cast includes Ann Arbor residents Terry Heck (Mrs Bradman), a stage veteran, Janet Maylie (Ruth), a University of Michigan Theatre Department faculty member with numerous regional theater credits, and Malcolm Tulip (Charles), an actor, director, playwright and assistant professor of theater at University of Michigan

"We have probably one of the best groups of actors we've ever pulled together," said Sanville

The theater's set for *Blithe Spirit* sounds just as impressive About \$200,000 worth of mounted animal heads – on loan from Ted Nugent – dress the stage

"You could drop the set right down in Broadway," said Sanville And, no one would bat an eye



Although she'll spend two days working her fan club booth, she'll take time to dance to her favorite songs Jailhouse Rock and Are You Lonesome Tonight


I don't think he ever did a bad song Mary Decker, co-director of Elvisfest, says her favorites are his gospel tunes

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

The juried fair features works by artists and crafts people representing 35 states, Canada and Argentina. The fair draws 250,000 visitors By art fair time, organizers anticipate completion of a downtown streetscape renovation project featuring new streets, sidewalks and more pedestrian benches

Also new this year is a Detroit Pistonssponsored Summer Hoops interactive basketball shooting game and a *Charlie's Angels Full Throttle* Tour mobile trailer where kids and adults can download free computer games, take and e-mail photos using wireless handsets and more

The state's second-largest fair offers 20 food concessions and a beer area, as local merchants convert sidewalks into a giant outdoor market Live music is presented throughout the fair on various stages

The fair is on Biddle Avenue in downtown Wyandotte, along four blocks between Oak and Eureka Hours are 10 a m. to 9 p m Wednesday-Saturday, July 9-12 From western suburbs, take Southfield south to West Jefferson Avenue and turn south on Jefferson, go 3 miles and you'll come to the art fair as Jefferson turns into Biddle From northern suburbs, take I-75 south to Eureka, then go east 4 miles on Eureka. sion for his country never fades, even as he adjusts to life as a paraplegic

Over time, he becomes bitter over his fate, loses his faith in God and retreats to Mexico in search of happiness, only to find he can't escape his inner demons no matter how far he travels

After what seems to be an endless jour-

ney through Kovic's unlucky reality, he eventually triumphs as an author and activist against the war

Watching Kovic's transformation from a strapping young boy to a paralyzed veteran is a moving, but depressing, journey This movie gives us a glimpse into something most of us will never fully understand, but it helps us to sympathize and reflect

The underlying message in this film is that the Vietnam war had extreme flaws, and the government makes mistakes, but there is still beauty in this country and America is worthy of admiration

Perhaps the most powerful movie I have ever seen, Born on the Fourth of July is loaded with symbolism and meaning, unlike the majority of Hollywood films today

So for this fourth of July, if you're hoping to sip some lemonade, eat some barbecue and relax to a fun, patriotic movie, this may not be the best choice But it's a must-see, nevertheless It'll take you on a uniquely bittersweet roller coaster ride

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

Diamond David Lee Roth says his tinted window tour bus is a giant pair of wrap-around sunglasses he wears to see America

I travel the highways and bi-ways of the US and play everywhere from truck stops, to whorehouses to Las Vegas casinos and the amphitheaters of America

Roth's words are expectedly unexpected The former Van Halen lead singer is currently traveling much of the country on his solo tour He'll perform at Freedom Hill Amphitheater on Sunday, July 6

Later this summer he'll stop back in Michigan for a show at the Michigan State Fair

Hilberry Theatre puts modern spin on fairy tale

Wayne State's University's Hilberry Theatre is presenting Jackie and the Beanstalk- an updated 2003-meetsfairytale children's play with classic elements and a modern twist This time the hero is a heroine, and the music is inspired by today's pop icons

"There's a lot of pop culture in this show,' said Nancy Lipshultz, professor of voice at Wayne State University and firsttime director at the Hilberry Theatre 'By making the main character female, I wanted to create a positive role model for girls I also made some other fun, modern changes using pop culture that will make the show more accessible for kids now There's a lot of Madonna, Donna Summer - eclectic pop music to sort of engage them right away on a musical level

Lipschultz describes the play as a nontraditional telling of the fairytale Jack and the Beanstalk starring Jackie, the spunky kid who loves to daydream This rendition, she says, is more positive than the classic There's no death or derogatory comments in the play

The cast is comprised of undergraduate acting majors from Wayne States theatre department Senior Sarah Korson, 20, has the lead role this summer as Jackie

"I did the summer show last year and I had a great time with it,' she said. "Kids are one of the best audiences ever because they're so excited and they're not shy about getting up and clapping They give such great energy to us as actors and we feed off that'

Julie Smelser plays Brunhilde, the singing harp she describes as a mix between "Mariah Carey and Britney Spears'

"I love playing my character," said the 20-year-old "She's hilarious and funny and foolish I'm a pop diva, so I sing a lot of pop songs during the show"

Smelser has been involved in shows hke Sweet Charity and Grease but says


she too particularly loves participating in shows for children

You have to be on your toes as an actor in order to be in children's theater," she said 'There's always improvisation involved and you never know what's going to happen The audiences are usually real big because we get a lot of kids groups It's fun to see all the kids

Although Jackie and the Beanstalk is specially tailored for children, Lipshultz says anyone can enjoy it.

'I think good children's theatre has to be good adult theater first. This play has a lot of action, but it's filled with irony and fun that adults can appreciate as well as children'

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It's really hard to avoid a Flaming Lips reference when talking about California based Grandaddy's "Sumday." So let s just get this



standby/ Out of order sort of/ Unaligned/ Power down for redesign According to the work order that you signed/11 be done for sometime / 1 m down for redesign

What is different here is that Grandaddy's quirky neo psychedelia is a lot more accessible to anyone who may not like The Flaming Lips or were unable to get into their last album. Sumday is a lot more sunny and upbeat than previous Grandaddy releases and the result is something perfect for lazy summer days Available at most local record dealers

Nick Hornbys High Fidelity is

a cult classic among music geeks who find joy in knowing every obscure band reference made in both the book and the film In his latest book a compilation of essays entitled Songbook Hornby shares his music geek itude Hornby's essays cover everyone from Patti Smith to Van Morrison to Ben Folds Five to Gregory Isaacs



Despite its somewhat elitist outward appearance this book is good for both music geek and casual listener alike as Hornby also addresses perfect melodies guitar solos and the personal stories that draw people to music

The book also includes a CD with 11 tracks (a sort of mix tape from the book s subjects) featuring songs from Badly Drawn Boy Paul Westerberg and Teenage Fanclub. This one isn't to be missed by anyone who enjoys music and the stories it provides us. Available at local bookstores



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






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
