

MEAP scholarships survive in final budget

The \$2,500 college scholarships awarded to high school students who pass the Michigan **Educational** Assessment Program (MEAP) tests have survived proposed state cuts, after a budget compromise between Gov Jennifer Granholm and legislative leaders on Tuesday

In a March 6 presentation

of her proposed budget to the state House and Senate appropriations committees, Granholm proposed to reduce the scholarships to \$500, while giving them only to students who financially qualified

State Republicans never liked that idea from the very beginning In fact. during the March session, Rep John Stewart, R-Plymouth Township, pubhely asked for Granholm to reconsider the MEAP

test cuts, reminding the governor she lived (at the time) in Northville Township and had a student in the Plymouth-Canton Schools, both areas where MEAP scholarship numbers are among the highest in the state

'Formal education has been a vital core value to Republicans," said Stewart "The scholarships were absolutely necessary to maintain

because we've forced upon our teachers and students the MEAP tests

The scholarship awards are an important funding source in the college education of hundreds of students in the Plymouth-Canton School district, to the tune of more than \$14 million Salem High School, this year, had 319 students receive the \$2,500 monetary award,

Drink company breezes into Plymouth

Breeze Freeze, Inc , a frozen specialty drink company that has helped whet slush appetites in Michigan and elsewhere for three years, is about to shift its world headquarters to Plymouth Township

Currently located on Canton Center Road in Canton, construction for the new facility broke ground off Haggerty Road just north of Plymouth Road on July 1 Located behind Unisys at what will soon be 41303 Concept Drive, the planned 15,000 square foot headquarters will benefit rapid expansion

"Business is growing so fast now we can't keep up with it," said owner, president and CEO Chester Mazzoni, explaining the need for the new building "We're actually turning business away We need more space to be able to fill the demand"

From gas stations, convenience stores and bars to dollar stores, ice arenas and health spas, more than 700 businesses throughout Michigan use Breeze Freezes services With 150 served locations in several other states and countries such as the Dominican Republic and Guam, the

frozen drink and equipment company even has plans to begin franchising m October

The new facility will draw together initial warehouses - which currently have to be leased out at two different locations - offices, and a training center where Breeze Freeze employees can learn everything from installing and fixing machines to selling and mixing drinks

"It's going to allow us probably to increase our business capabilities 10 times,' said Sandra Edwards, director of business operations 'We were working out of a very small office It snowballed"

Established in 2000 by Mazzoni and sales manager Patrick Janssen, the Breeze Freeze concept was based on the goal of improving service and providing products that surpassed

traditional "sugar and water" mixes in quality

"The problem that we found in the business that customers weren't satisfied with was service machines and equipment," explained Mazzoni, who previously owned several Coney Islands in the area "My goal was to give service Without service we have nothing'

With all-natural drinks made from 32 percent fruit pulp, top selling items include granita bases, ice slushes and smoothies, all in 30 flavors Cappuccino, hot chocolate, soups and nachos are among other offerings

A facility in New Jersey produces the actual 100-percent natural juices, which are then frozen by special machines serviced by Four Seasons Beverage and Equipment, Breeze Freeze's parent company

Plans have already taken off in Florida to provide fruit juices and slushes for nursery schools The company also hopes to soon feature different types of specialty drinks such as Caribbean mixes in bars

'It's going to give people a taste of paradise that might not be able to go to paradise," explained Mazzoni

Mazzoni works 12-15 hour days, but says the fun he has makes his work

easy He also anticipates further growth

"I can see it expanding," said Mazzoni of the new location He has already told construction workers to "get ready for the next building in 18 months'

The Breeze Freeze World Headquarters is slated to open around Thanksgiving



magnate Don Massey for just over \$1 58 million, paving the way for construction of a township complex and a public safety building that would consolidate offices and provide more adequate space for police and fire operations

Mann, Clerk Marılyn Massengill, Treasurer Ron Edwards and Trustee Kay Arnold voted in favor of the purchase Trustees Abe Munfakh, Ron Griffith and Charles Curmi voted against it

"We've been looking at this for 10 years or more," Arnold said "How many Band-Aids have we put on this place (the current complex)?" Board members wasted no time getting started, giving approval to Massengill to publish the notice of intent to issue capital improvement bonds, the first step in getting the financing for the \$12 million project under way That vote was also 4-3 along the same lines The project will be funded

The project will be funded through a \$1 8 million contribution from the water fund, the sale of DPW property on Port, the sale of the current property at Ann Arbor Road and Lilley, a \$1 6 million contribution from the general fund and the issuance of some \$6 million in bonds

Two buildings will be built on the site a 25,000-squarefoot township hall and a 27,000-square-foot public safety building that would house police and fire Those recommendations were made by Plante & Moran CRESA in a needs assessment

The plan has drawn criticism from the three dissenting trustees because they don't feel it's complete enough Griffith argued Tuesday that no plans have been done to deal with issues, for instance, such as parking for police He also doesn't believe Mann has made a case for spending such a large amount of money on such a project

'What advantage is there except for the idea of everyone being in one place?" Griffith said "What is the whole plan?"

Munfakh agreed "We're being asked to purchase the property before we've even discussed (the plan)," Munfakh said 'I think we're putting the cart before the horse"

The discussion drew roughly 100 spectators to the usually barren township meeting room, seemingly split evenly among supporters and critics of the plan Residents paraded to the podium to offer their opinions

'I understand there has been an ongoing desire to upgrade our facilities," resident Mark Spencer said "I'm concerned we're assuming a large, new \$12-13 million burden I want to see this decision handled with a lot

de more deliberation I'd like to see more deliberate, more detailed consideration of alternatives "

> Others disagreed 'Frankly, I don't know how you can continue to operate this township out of an ice cream parlor," resident Ray Sturdy said, referring to the fact one of the buildings used to be a Friendly's ice cream store "It's important to consolidate the operations I think you've done a pretty good job of investigating the issues I would encourage you to act on what you found"

The cost of the land was another issue raised, particularly by Curmi At \$1,583,333 33, the township is paying roughly \$168,000 per acre of land Critics, including Curmi, say it's worth closer to \$110,000 Curmi also said he thinks optimism about the economy may be exaggerated, making the project a dangerous one to enter into now

"The land 1s overpriced, and we should wait," Curmi told the board

"We should make sure we have a thorough plan Let's get things lined up better The money squeeze will be greater than we think" But Edwards defended the purchase price, saying he knows of at least one parcel that recently sold for some \$150,000 per acre

which later became Umsys, and retired — the first time in 1971

"When World War II came on, I worked at Kelsey Hayes for four years, making machine guns,' Dee said

After returning from Unisys, Dee worked until age 89 as a porter at Hines Park Lincoln-Mercury in Plymouth Township

Meanwhile, Pauline cared for their eight children, including two sets of twins

"Her looks and her appearance," Dee said when asked about what he noticed in Pauline when they met "She was nice and sweet and good to me We just fell in love" Pauline has the same good memories of their years together

'Hes always been good to me, a good husband," Pauline said "A nice person, good person, easy to get along with"

Despite the fact the two seemed destined for a lifetime together, Dee once had competition for his soon-to-be bride


"One day at church, there was a guy who said he was going to go with me, and Dee said he wasn't, Pauline said "So, when I walked out of church, Dee grabbed hold of my arm

Their son, Ron, said his parents filled their crowded home with love "We weren't rich, but we had the love from them," he said They were always there for us We still ask Dad for advice, and he gives it to us

'We learned to give a lot, not just money but time and your self, Ron added

Now, 22 grandchildren, 33 great-grandchildren and 16 great-great-grandchildren later, the McMullens reflect on how it all lasted this long







totaling \$797,500 Canton High School recorded 254 scholarship winners, totaling another \$635,000

"We made a commitment to youngsters they would earn a scholarship based on merit," said Sen Bruce Patterson, R-Canton Township 'We never intended it to be a needs-based scholarship I'm delighted we came up with a compromise with the governor"

The scholarship program will be funded by bad drivers, who will have significant penalty increases for accumulating six points or more

While the scholarships survived the chopping block, the arts did not Granholm's proposal to cut arts funding by 50 percent withstood changes in her proposed budget

For the Plymouth Community Arts Council, that will mean a reduction in the \$20,000 it receives in funding from the state

While the Plymouth Symphony doesn't depend on state funding for direct revenue, Executive Director Angel Bakos said the group has taken advantage of the state money in the form of grants

Granholm's arts cuts won't affect current construction of the new Performing Arts Center in Canton However, Coordinator Jennifer Tobin said any cuts "will affect us in the future, in programming and in outreach And, certainly a lot of the user groups we'll be depending on will be drastically affected"

A 3-percent reduction in revenue sharing funds to municipalities will also go into effect with the new budget The City of Plymouth will lose \$30,000, while Plymouth Township's share will be reduced by about \$60,000

"We will have revenue come in over what we've projected, so this will not impose a serious impact on the township budget," said Plymouth Township Supervisor Steve Mann

OUR VIEWS Policy should allow dialogue

Some residents in the Plymouth-Canton school district have become concerned about some policies dealing with public participation at meetings that have survived a first reading by school board members

After watching the administration of former Superintendent Kathleen Booher build a reputation for being uncommunicative and nonresponsive, they've earned the right to be wary

As currently recommended, the policy gives residents a five-minute window to talk to the board at Board of Education meetings, with extensions up to 15 minutes available when warranted There are some restrictions on how that time can be used - for instance, personal attacks against individual members of the district aren't allowed unless previously arranged so the subject can be there but in general it's enough time for people to state their case

The troubling part of the would-be policy is the part that says, "During this time, the Board listens to comments from the public but does not engage in dialogue or render decisions In general, such issues will be referred to the Superintendent for handling as appropriate The Superintendent shall advise the Board on the final disposition'

See why people are worried? Under the Booher administration, those comments frequently got lost in the shuffle, with many residents complaining they never heard from the administration again That complaint was heard ad nauseum during the previous administration, and board-watchers are worried this new policy would make that standard practice

Now, it can be argued that there's a new administration in place, and we'd be happy to join in the argument New Superintendent Jim Ryan has been extraordinarily candid and open with board members and residents alike, earning high marks in his first year on the job New board President Judy Mardigian has likewise been accessible in the past

But the Jim Ryans and Judy Mardigians aren't always going to be running the show, and the policy as it's currently worded is troublesome in that regard Should the board hire another administrator, one who isn't as resident-friendly as Ryan, and this new policy could put things right back where they were under Booher

School board meetings are not the appropriate place to resolve everyone's individual issues The purpose of the meeting is to conduct school business, not to be a problem-solving panacea for every resident with a gripe

However, many residents have legitimate issues, some of which can be resolved quickly There's no reason board members can't enter into dialogue with the people they're elected to serve, as long as that dialogue doesn't interfere with the conduct of business The policy should allow interchange and, when issues must be referred to the superintendent, a deadline should be imposed for action Residents lost a great deal of their voice under the previous administration While we hold the current regime in high regard, the policy should still be written to make sure that voice isn't silenced again

Combine education issues on one ballot

The Michigan Legislature is considering a series of bills that would consolidate elections in the state to just four times a year

The idea is to save money and get more people to vote, particularly in school elections School elections traditionally have low voter turnout. In the last school election in June, fewer than 5 percent of registered voters cast ballots statewide Some districts had less than 1 percent of registered voters go to the polls

The proposed legislation calls for elections to be held on the fourth Tuesday in February and on the first Tuesday in May, August and November

School elections would no longer be held on Mondays, which would lessen the confusion of voters who are used to going to the polls on Tuesdays for every other election

The bills passed the state House in June and have been referred to the Senate Committee on Government Operations

Before the Senate acts on the bills this fall, however, we urge lawmakers to consider combining all education races into one election, preferably in May

Lawmakers have the right idea for election consolidation. But with a little bit of tweaking, it will be an even better idea

Unlikely we'll get politicians' hands off district drawing

errymander To divide a geographic area into voting districts so as to give unfair advantage to one party in elections "The word arose in 1812, when Massachusetts Gov Elbridge Gerry devised a legislative map with very strangely shaped districts to benefit his party

Of all the instincts politicians possess, perhaps the strongest is the urge to gerrymander For elected officeholders, the process of defining and redefining one's district is tantamount to political life or death No decently ambitious politician will ever turn down even the slightest opportunity to fiddle the district boundary to yield electoral

Usually taking place once every 10 years following new census data, the process of redistricting has recently taken on the characteristics of a fullblown cottage industry, complete with "consultants" up for hire, computer wizards, even lobbyists Part of the complexity has come about as a result of the Supreme Court's 'one man, one vote" decision, which requires at least numerical

equivalency between districts Other laws mandate special treatment for minorities and discourage districts lines crossing obvious local government boundaries such as counties and city limits

In the hands of skilled practitioners of either party, gerrymandering can have a profound effect on the balance of political power Following the 1980 California census, the Democrat controlled Legislature turned a 22-21 congressional delegation into a 28-17 Democratic majority After the 1990 census, Georgia Republicans astonishingly succeeded in converting a 9-1 congressional minority into an 8-3 majority

We saw much the same thing in Michigan after the 2000 census Republican Gov John Engler and the GOP-controlled Legislature managed to liquidate by redistricting three sitting Democratic representatives in Congress Reps John Dingell and Lynn Rivers had their districts merged, Dingell wound up winning the primary Rep Dale Kildee's district was expanded to take much of Rep James Barcia's, Barcia retired And many Democratic voters in Rep David Bonior's old district in Macomb County were moved into Rep Sander Levins, thus creating a safe Republican district for Candace Miller

So what? Redistricting is intrinsically partisan Everyone does it when they have half a chance So why get excited about it?

The answer has to do with congressional redistricting's dirty little secret The technology of redistricting is now so accurate that virtually

every congressional district is either safely Republican or equally solid Democratic, experts estimate there are no more than 30 truly contested districts in the entire country This means that the decisive vote takes place in the August partisan primaries, not the general election in November Who votes in primary elections? The highly partisan, motivated party faithful In the Republican primaries, the faithful tend to be right-wing, Right To Life types, while in Democratic primaries the likely voters are liberals or union members

The result? The Republicans who win Republican primary elections tend to be more right wing than the average voter, while the Democrats who win primaries are more liberal than the population at large And the political center, which is where most Americans tend to be the most comfortable, gets squeezed out

The results? Increasing numbers of alienated voters who wonder why their representatives in Congress are either much more liberal or much more conservative than they are Worse, incumbents of both parties have no electoral incentive to move toward the center

- where most legislative compromises that make government work are made - because they originally gained office by being at the outer edge of their particular party That's the real reason why highly partisan rancor has become the distasteful and unconstructive standard operating procedure in the US House of Representatives

What to do about it? Some propose taking the power to redistrict away from partisan legislatures and creating independent redistricting commissions My old friend, Craig Ruff, a political expert who runs Public Sector Consultants in Lansing, snorts that, 'Anybody intellectually capable of drawing redistricting maps is almost certainly not a political eunuch" Besides, since most state legislators think that the summit of their own career is election to Congress, getting their grubby hands off the redistricting process is beyond unlikely

A better approach, according to Ruff, is to enact legislation applying to congressional redistricting the same strict criteria - generally recognized as reasonably fair — for drawing state legislative districts that the Michigan Legislature passed a few years back No districts crossing county lines, one man, one vote, and so forth

He's right, of course, but I'm not holding my breath until it happens

e was my best friend in the Air Force, one of the best ever, really We lost touch when I got out of the service in March



That thinking changed several weeks ago when Dave called the office, looking for me I was out, but he

talked to Brenda (our receptionist) to ascertain whether I was, in fact, the same person with whom he'd served Dave then got Brenda to leave a message on our home answering machine, and we later began e-mailing

We decided, since we were headed down the coast anyway, to stop in DC (Dave, an enlisted slob like me when we were in Omaha, is now a captain stationed at The Pentagon) to catch up on old times Dave also agreed to be our tour guide for a day in the nation's capital

CWW resolution sets rules for working with sheriff

The Conference of Western Wayne County Mayors and Supervisors (CWW), which represents 18 suburban communities, including Canton Township, Garden City, Livonia, Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Redford and Westland, and over 700,000 residents, recently passed a resolution to form a cooperative approach to law enforcement with the Wayne County Sheriff's Department

By having the Sheriff s Department conduct fugitive apprehension, Internet investigations and computer forensic services for the suburban departments, the resolution lays the groundwork for the county to become a vital support agency, rather than a competing police force, according to Sheriff Warren C Evans

"Since the Sheriff's Department does not have primary police duties in any of its

communities with the recent exception of Highland Park, we all recognize that the county's ideal role is as a support agency to 43 other departments,' Evans said The cooperative approach will make each agency more efficient and effective, said Canton Township Public Safety Director, John Santomauro

'This type of partnership makes perfect sense from a law enforcement perspective, said Santomauro Each agency can focus on what it does best, local departments can provide immediate response and the sheriff s department can provide various specialized support services"

When a local police department comes across a suspected case of child pornography or Internet identity theft, for example, the Sheriff's Internet Crimes Unit will perform forensics on any computers seized by the local officers



Bucks stumble against Stars

In the final analysis, no one lost this game

The New York/New Jersey MetroStars got what they wanted a 4-0 triumph over the Mid-Michigan Bucks Wednesday at Berkley's Hurley Field, which puts them into the fourth round of the US Open Cup opposite the Columbus Crew on Aug 6

Considering their status as one of the top sides in Major League Soccer, the outcome was hardly surprising The Bucks are 13-3-1, having already clinched the Premier Development League's Great Lakes Division championship The PDL is Division 4 The MetroStars play in Division 1, they are now 8-4-4, first in the MLS's Eastern Division.

While the MetroStars won on the scoreboard, the Bucks certainly got what they wanted - a perfect night weatherwise and an enthusiastic crowd of 4,010 Indeed, every seat was taken, including all those in the temporary bleachers brought in just for the occasion, and there were plenty more hning the field It certainly impressed the MLS officials who were present and are considering Detroit as a future MLS site

The Bucks did not disappoint the huge crowd, but they could not find the back of the net. And the MetroStars did, scoring their first goal four minutes in after a foul called against the Bucks on a takedown Amado Guevara, the Stars all-star midfielder, bent his direct kick from 25 yards out around the Bucks' wall and into the net to make it 1-0

However, they did nothing more for the next 80 minutes as play evened out. "We wanted to try not to let our opponent have any hope," MetroStars coach Bob Bradley said "Our first goal came early but it took a long time to fin-1sh the job

'The fact that it took so long to finish the game gave them hope You can't take them lightly - they have some good players'

If the Stars thought the victory would come easily, the Bucks frustrated them After an unsteady start, Mid-Michigan played the MetroStars evenly, matching them shot for shot.

Until the last eight minutes 'I don't think the scoreline indicated the game," said Bucks' coach Don Gemmell. "For 83 minutes, we played with the best team in the pros For 83 minutes we gave them a good game, But the game's 90 minutes long'

With his team down a goal, Gemmell made some lineup changes in an effort to find more offense, but it proved costly With 7 30 remaining, John Wolyniec found himself open on the right side as the Bucks tried to force an offside Wolymec beat Bucks' keeper Peter Dzubay and the Stars had the cushion they needed.

"One defender was playing the offside line and he didnt see another of our players who was farther back, explained Gemmell "He's just wasn't reading the game At this level, you make a mistake and they punish you"

Which the MetroStars, who were without keeper Tim Howard (he signed with Manchester United), defender Eddie Pope (out with fractured patella) and forward/midfielder Clint Mathis (playing with the US team at the CON-CACAF Gold Cup Tournament), all of them MLS all-stars, continued to do

They got another goal with 3 40 left from Michael Nugent after a cross from Mark Lisi, making it 3-0, and in added time Jose Galvan knocked in a shot off the crossbar following a Bucks' turnover

It was a bad ending for the Bucks, but by then they already had their victory







Beat the beetles

The Michigan Department of Agriculture says that the emerald ash borer - a wood boring beetle that kills ash trees probably invaded southeast Michigan in pieces of untreated wood from its



native home in Asia It can re infest ash trees hundreds of miles away from its cur rent location in the same way through movement of infested firewood

To prevent and control the spread of the emerald ash borer state officials issued a guarantine on all ash trees and ash wood products in Oakland Wayne Macomb Livingston Washtenaw and Monroe counties

Simply put it is illegal to move the trees branches logs and products including firewood out of these coun ties unless certified for movement by the MDA Firewood may appear healthy and not visibly infected but may carry the emerald ash borer larvae in its dormant stage

Don t be responsible for the spread of emerald ash borer by mo/ ng the tems out of the count es or by tak ng ash f rewood on vaca tion with you (If you don t know what type of firewood it is don't move it) Imagine how your neighborhood or favorite vacation spot would look with some or all of the ash trees gone

But don t totally ignore the lawn if you let it go dormant The grass still needs an inch or so of water every two or three weeks or it will die, Krauskopf

If you need to fertilize to obtain a lush green lawn like this one, don t do so until September

said And don't walk on it or mow if its dormant No need to fertilize now until early September, Krauskopf added

'Grass here is biologically active in cool weather," he said 'When it gets hot, it's not taking any nutrients If you fertilize then, it probably will just wash away"

If you had grubs last vear and see beetles hanging around this year, now is a good time to apply a






Here is an edited version of the winning letter (with a few selectively unedited sentences) in the Dear John contest from Barb and John Meade of Livonia





Strong prose, characters carry saga Extended warranties: Should you buy one?

THE WATER DANCERS by Terry Gamble

Imagine, if you will, a kind of vaguely Gothic romance played out against the shores of Lake Michigan

Imagine further a well-told tale, with prose containing more than a touch of poetry Picture a cast of characters all indelible enough to haunt us long after we have closed the covers of this book

There, you have Terry Gamble's debut novel, The Water Dancers Let's hope the University of Michigan alum is at work on yet another work of fiction Her way with words, as displayed on these pages, is more than a little promising In fact, at times, it simply dazzles

As the story opens, it is 1942, and Rachel Winnapee's grandmother is dying In the midst of a Michigan summer, "the sizzling cadence of heat bugs, the sullen slap of waves" provide a kind of background music to the drama that is about to begin

Soon after the old womans death, Rachel 1s packed away to live at a nearby convent with other girls abandoned like unked cars'

Her mother has disappeared, and other relatives are considered unfit to raise the young girl Considered "squatters' by the white community, they are members of the Horseshoe Band of the Odawa

Three years later, Rachel begins to work as a maid for the March family at their 12bedroom summer home on Beck's Point ('the best port between Grand Traverse and Mackinaw")

In this eccentrically designed house that is rumored to have been built on land sacred to the Odawa, she will meet Woody March, the warscarred, only surviving son of the wealthy family

Eventually, the two will fall in love, and their lives will become tied together, even though the drug-addicted Woody has little chance of going against his mother's plans for him - which most definitely do not include Rachel

CHARACTER

The Water Dancers touches on three generations, as members of each are changed or touched by the roiling world about them - from World War II to the Korean War to Vietnam and beyond Though most of the story focuses on Woody and Rachel, the kaleidoscopic set of players is all marvelously drawn, no matter how minor their roles

Here 1s Woody's vaguely pathetic (and moneyed) fiancée, Elizabeth, "a beautiful, messy angel,' as seen through Rachel's young eyes Here is the "weak-chinned,

pale-eyed Father Tom, who seems to derive a ghoulish pleasure from listening to sins recited in the confessional Here is Woody's homely

nurse, always reeking of gin, the cook, Ella Mae, with eyes

'dark as treacle", young Ben, who finds himself caught between the well-bred world of his father and the povertystricken community of his mother, his half-brother, Rory, as vivid as he is pale, seemingly out-of-place anywhere A host of others adds depth and nuance to The Water Dancers Looming over all 1s the

exquisitely painted character of this region of Michigan

From the luscious scent of cherries in July, to the lake in winter "flinty as mica, thickening into the hardness of stone, to the song of the chickadee, the clang of the breezy harbor, the grass clotted with Indian paintbrush, wild yarrow, thistle," right down to the gritty taste of the soil itself, this is life at the lakes

If the theme of star-crossed lovers from two different worlds sounds a brt stale, it doesn't feel that way in the reading

For one thing, Gamble's credible, sympathetic characters always add strength and texture to this work of fiction


For another, her powerful prose transcends most any weakness in the tale itself

extended warranty on purchases for a small fee that match whatever comes with the product and that can be a money saver Check your credit cards for free automatic extended insurance, which usually doubles the manufacturer's warranty up to one additional year, but one credit card company actually offers three years or less

As to the question of whether or not extended warranties are a ripoff, let me answer it this way I think they once were a big money maker for anyone selling them

Products produced not too long ago lasted much longer than today and required less service As a consequence, less money was paid out to service companies Some retailers actually made more money on extended contracts than they

did on appliances During those days I was the guy screaming, Dont buy them'

A CHANGE IN OPINION

Today my views have changed with the times Today's expensive products such as computers, televisions, high end appliances and other items can need expensive repairs I constantly hear sto ries about appliance repairs which nearly costs as much as the appliance's purchase price Without an extended warranty many consumers opt to simply throw it away and buy a new one

What happens if you have the same thing happen with the new one? These are the shoppers who are quick to purchase a contract on the third go-around On a product not covered by an extended warranty, it can be rather expensive just to have a technician tell vou what's wrong I can remember when \$14 was thought to be expensive and today we see service calls at the rate of up to \$80

The choice is up to the individual as to whether they should or not buy an extended warranty I strongly suggest that you do some research before you buy anything New products introduced may have bugs that still need to be worked out and there may be a lack of trained technicians Units from product lines produced for years may still be prime candidates for repairs

A 2001 Consumer Reports survey points out that 50 percent of desktop personal computers need repair within the first 5 years as do riding lawn mowers and full size vacuums

ASK QUESTIONS

One viewpoint that I haven't changed is the fact that the service industry is always someone you should consult with These people fix these things for a living and their viewpoint should be treasured by any shopper Some brand names have a reputation for a long life than others/ You need to investigate all methods available

Consumers Digest and Consumer Reports are sources available at any local library or book store My advice is to also check with your utility and find out what programs that company offers homeowners The extended service contracts are a way of life today - not necessarily to my liking, but to the way it has to be The peace of mind is less frustrating than the unexpected repair cost

Upon making up your mind to buy one, offer them less than what they re asking and read over the fine print such as, who pays for shipping on small products Look for a toll-free number and ask about the level of service provided such as who, how quick, and local

Will you be getting factorytrained technicians and does the warranty provide in-home repairs? Is there a no-lemon policy or in other words, if repeated calls need to be performed, will they give you a new product?







Adams poster In case you're not familiar with them, file-sharing services effectively throw open the doors to your computer's hard drive - designated areas of it, anyway - allowing users worldwide to download copies of your digital music files (better known as MP3s)

At the same time, you gain access to the hard drives of the world Even if you don't share any MP3s of your own, you can download nearly any song in the history of music

It's all very safe and secure It costs nothing

And it robs musicians and record companies of revenue that would normally come from CD sales

That's according to the Recording Industry Association of America, which reports that sales dropped to \$26 bilhon in 2002 from \$40 billion in 2000

Never mind the recession and the similar losses experienced by other industries - file sharers must be to blame

Maybe yes, maybe no I'm no economics expert, I'm more interested in the ethical side of the equation

I don t think anyone would argue that artists deserve to be paid for their work

If you're a huge fan of, say, Steely Dan and you download every track from their latest album, that's theft, plain and simple It doesn't matter how rich Walter Becker and Donald Fagen are already You want

CRABGRASS WOES

Crabgrass will be difficult to deal with now, Doppel said Probably best to pull out small swatches by hand, leave large tracts to be killed by autumn frost and apply a preventive herbicide next spring Grass seed and sod should

be planted now only if you're

willing to water daily and sometimes more than once every day, Doppel said Prime seed and sod growing season resumes in late August

Apply a slow release fertilizer high in nitrogen and potassum with no phosphorus around Labor Day, Halloween, Memorial Day and Fourth of July, he said



OK, but what if you're not sure you'll like the new album? Shouldn't you be entitled to sample the merchandise? It's not like Steely Dan is getting much airplay on the radıo

What if you bought the CD and then accidentally scratched ıt?

You paid for the music, shouldn't you should be allowed to replace it?

Here's a toughte suppose there's an Avril Lavigne song you kind of like, but you'd never buy the CD just to get it

No way is Ms Lavigne ever going to get your \$15

So technically you're not taking money out of her pocket by downloading that one song

If I own a stack of old LP records and 45s but no longer have a turntable, aren't I entitled to download digital versions of those songs and albums?

After all, the artists did get my money

The legalities of the issue are vague

It constitutes "fair use" to copy music for yourself and even your friends, you just can't sell it

No money changes hands when you use a file-sharing service, so technically there's no violation of the law

(Not yet, anyway - the courts will have to rule on this sooner or later)

I believe there are times when it's justifiable to download songs from filesharing services, but it's left to individual users to govern themselves

Please govern wisely


There are a few new faces About five beet plants have sprouted, just down the 10w from the eggplant Even a pumpkin plant sits at the edge of the garden

I hope Mr Woodchuck and Mr Raccoon will leave these guys alone

Then there are the herbs The cilantro and dill have grown into mini-torests, separated by a row of about five basil plants The rosemary is tucked in along the south edge of the garden with parsley paired next to one of the rosemary plants Nearby tarragon stands about 30 inches tall Spearmint (excellent snipped fresh for tabbouleh) and chocolate mint sit contained inside a plastic kiddle pool, with holes drilled in the pool and sand in the bottom to help with drainage Oregano crowds the chive and garlic chive in another pool Thyme plants rule the roost on the other side of the garden Creeping lemon thyme recently sprouted its purple flowers, a haven for the bees Sage greets visitors on the walkway, while horseradish stands tall about three feet behind it Chamomile and marjoram sit near more small basil plants The caraway seeds were snipped last night - maybe they ll be used in a rye bread, maybe they'll be stir-fried with cabbage The cilantro and dill also has been harvested Guacamole has been made three times this summer and a fruit salsa once for grilled fish, both with cilantro from the yard The dill sits in the sink as I write this, as plenty was clipped this morning The oregano has been dried Whenever I talk to vegetable and herb gardeners for stories, it's always the same thing They get in the yard and into gardening because it helps them relax Its work, but it is an escape Yes, weeding is a constant battle, and requires frequent attention and care, but the rewards are enormous The plants are just there, sitting quietly The soil beneath them accepts the nourishment of a compost or

'If we do pancakes, I ll use the propane stove, he said 'Pancakes are enhanced if you pick some fresh wild raspberries and drop them in We pack honey because it doesn't have to be refrigerated as syrup does

Dinner 1s a little different story 'Our favorite method is aluminum foil, Richard said "Chop up a potato, carrots, onion celery and meat onto a span of foil Add tomato sauce or tomato juice or ketchup and water to give it flavor Wrap tightly in a onemeal-sized package and place carefully on the fire Be careful a stick doesn't jab the foil and drain the juices,' he added A northern pike goes well in this kind of foil dinner," Richard said 'The fastidious turn up their noses at pike because its so

Manitou, the good god, made the pike boney so that man would eat it more slowly and savor the taste

"A foil dinner takes only 20-25 minutes," Richard said "Cook five minutes, turn, repeat and repeat It doesn't take as long as you'd think because the food is roasting, baking and stewing all at once'

Richard prefers fires made of deadfall oak branches instead of charcoal and uses fire starter sticks available in sporting goods stores rather than charcoal lighter fluid He sometimes uses a small portable grill on longer trips just the grid, itself - for cleaner cookıng

LUNCH

Saylor and his Scouts do much of their campfire cooking over charcoal in a Dutch oven, essentially a cast iron cooking pot with lid

For lunch, the boys enjoy making individual pizzas by placing English muffins in the pot, then covering with pizza sauce, mozzarella cheese and pepperoni

Cook for about a half hour directly on hot charcoals with some hot charcoals also on the lid

For dessert or a treat, there s no beating peach cobbler, Saylor said Drain the juice from a large can of sliced peaches into a bowl and mix with a large bag of cake mix that doesn't require eggs Place the peach slices in the Dutch oven, then pour the cake

mix/juice over the peaches Cover and cook on 18 red hot charcoal briquettes with nine briquettes on the lid After a half hour, move 10 of the briquettes from under the pot and add them to those already on the lid Then cook for an additional 30 minutes

Learn more about good bread and good nutrition

*his past week, I dropped by our local health food store It had expanded by taking over the store next door, and it now had enough space for a large collection of books on

diets, nutrition, and a vast array of health concerns As I browsed through books offering nutritional advice, it was apparent that conflicting views were everywhere And it doesn t take long to discover that bread doesn't always enjoy a good reputation Especially, in some of the books that deal with weight loss and the role of carbohydrates



At the risk of going where "angels fear to tread' and knowing that some of you dear readers will discount my views as coming from someone who is biased, here goes

Leading nutritionists are unanimous in recognizing that high quality bread has extraordinary qualities, and why bread is often called the "staff of life ' It is a complete food, balanced and easily digestible A multigrain loaf typically

contains approximately 40 percent water, 9 percent protein, 42 percent carbohydrate, along with iron, calcium, zinc, magnesium and potassium and vitamins B1, B2, and niacin And don't forget the 9 percent dietary fiber 'Ah, yes, but what about

those carbohydrates?" It's here that misunderstand-

ings abound Everybody understands that the human body needs carbohydrates and that a balanced diet requires them to provide fuel and energy But only rarely is it explained that there are fundamentally two types of carbohydrates The first type consists of

monosaccharides, such as

food, giving the plants nutrients they need to survive Meanwhile, you get your

hands dirty, deftly moving that young seedling into the loamy earth Frustrations of the day can be quelled by yanking out the roots of the weeds

Suddenly that computer terminal or desk seems like a milhon miles away

ON THIS HARVEST MOON

Then, as summer hums along, you start to harvest You might pick lettuce early to toss and sugar snap peas, which are sweet freshly picked and are absent of the starchy ones you find in the stores Hot pepper plants flourish better for me than the green ones, which I can't figure out Must be the clay soil

Tomatoes, well, you can t say enough great things about



sugar, honey, fruits, preserves and jams These cause the body to produce insulin rapidly As a consequence, feelings of hunger are stimulated rather than satisfied

The second type or group of carbohydrates consists of polysaccharides These complex carbohydrates are found in bread, pasta, rice and potatoes They reduce the body's desire for sugars and the reflex action to overeat Absorption of these carbohydrates occurs slowly

In the July 3 issue of the **Observer** and Eccentric Newspaper, there was an article on the American Institute for Cancer Research's recommendation to include whole grains ın our dıet

'Unlike refined grain products, whole grain foods are rich in many substances that are cancer-protective, like anti-oxi-

tomatoes It is the Most Valuable Vegetable, or 1s it a fruit? Uh-oh, here we go again

The herbs bring on a new taste as well It can be as simple as a pesto with the basil. oil, garlic, pine nuts and parmesan cheese, or a lemon dill butter for cod And, I'm sorry, but salsa isn t salsa unless it has fresh cilantro, fresh tomatoes and jalapenos, not that salty pasty swill you buy at the store for \$3 a jar

When you share your fresh homemade bounty with family, friends, neighbors and loved ones, it's hard to find a better labor of love you can give them - nourishing them with the harvest from your yard, your soil and your hands

Besides, these dishes are filled with delicious food and they are a heckuva lot of fun to create Enjoy this guacamole with fresh cilantro




Get advice before signing cable contract

We are entering into a cable contract and the cable company is imposing a limitation on liability clause which we think is unconscionable Do you have any comments?

Any contract which the Association signs regarding traversing on the common elements should be reviewed carefully by the Association's attorney to determine whether in fact there is authority to enter into that contract in the first instance under the condominium documents and whether the contract 1s a reasonable one Limitations on hability may be unreasonable given the circumstances and should be the subject of further negotiations before the contract is signed The Board of Directors will be hable should it not get any advice or bad advice concerning the contents of any cable contract

Take time to deal with a house you inherit

Grandma died and left her house to you What should you do about that house she lived in and loved?

Until everyone is certain about who now owns the house, do nothing

Oh, you might want to take someone else who is likely to inherit the house (sister brother) and make sure the house is OK – all the water taps are turned off, the furnace is on, all the windows and doors are closed

By taking someone else long with you there can be no using the state's 'default' will, if Grandma didn't have a will

If Grandma did have a will, the court will see that you get the house after several months have elapsed If Grandma dıdn t have a will, you probably will have to wait longer until the court gives its approval

Once you have legal posses sion of the house, you have whats called clear title There are several things you should do immediately

Contact the insurance company to make sure the house is insured and that the payments are up to date Make sure the polycy is large enough Grandma may not have realized how much a house is worth these days The policy number probably will be among Grandma s papers Call the mortgage company and make sure the mortgage payments are up to date The account number probably will be among Grandmas papers You will also find out if there's a reverse mortgage on the home

Meet with the Realtor you selected and explain the situation The Realtor will estimate the value of the house and property


The Realtor 15 in the market He deals with houses every day Hell make himself familiar with the market for houses in moms neighborhood, Judge said

Don t make changes to the house until you've talked with house, rent the house or let a friend or relative move into the house and pay rent to you

Each course of action has its own strengths and weaknesses

Selling the house is the simplest option, especially if more than one person inherits the house You just sell the house and divide the proceeds

Even if you are the only person who inherits the house selling it prevents your having to assume responsibility for upkeep of an additional house A Realtor will be happy to help you here It s just another house sale. Wood said You could leave your apartment or current house and move into Grandma's house You would continue to make the mortgage, insurance, tax and utility payments, just like Grandma was You can go ahead and decorate and change the house however vou see fit Renting the house can be fraught with problems, but it can have tax advantages, Judge said If you rent the house, you are now a landlord If you ve never been a landlord, you're going to have to do a lot of learning in a hurry Expect some late-night telephone calls when the furnace doesn't work or the kitchen faucet springs a leak There are many other possible complications Did Grandma own or rent a duplex? Is she living in a condominium? Do you know of others (a former husband or a child by a previous marriage) who might have an interest in her estate? Is someone contesting the will? What if there's a reverse mortgage?

question about what you did when you were in the house A house is the single largest investment most people have, and inheritances can bring out the unhappy side of people

Another reason to take your time in dealing with the house is to avoid the appearance of unseemly haste and greed There may be children who are emotionally sensitive about 'the house I grew up m "

ESTABLISHING OWNERSHIP

Ownership of the house usually is established in one of three ways

Your name is on the deed with Grandma If you are listed as a joint owner with right of survivorship, the world knows you own the house as soon as you record the death certificate, said Ed Pugh, a Bloomfield Township lawver

Recording the death certificate may take just a day or two

You are named as the inheritor of the house in Grandmas living trust "Remember, Grandma died, the trust didn't die,' Pugh said "So you get the house when the trustee deeds the house to you' This can be a matter of days

or a few weeks ■ The court decides, by probating Grandma's will or by

Call City Hall and make sure the property taxes are up to date Check with the utility

companies to make sure the bills have been paid

You may want to make sure the house looks lived in if ownership isn't going to change hands right away You don't want anyone to break into a house that looks abandoned

WORKING WITH A REALTOR

Once you have clear title, you may want to consult with a real estate professional

Take your time and interview a couple of people, said Michael Judge, a broker with Real Estate One in Livonia Find someone you can work with

'Realtors don't come into play until you have a clear title,' said Judy Wood, associate broker with Coldwell Banker Schweitzer in

a real estate professional Grandmas house may look old-fashioned to you, but there may be a market for classiclooking houses Your "improvements" might reduce its value

If two or more people have inherited title to the house, things are a bit more complex One of you could buy the other out or the two of you could sell the house and split the proceeds

If several people inherit a house, it's a good idea to have them elect a "point" person who has the power to work with a Realtor, Judge said Then use the Internet to keep everyone informed and to leave a paper trail so no one can later say, "You dıdn't tell me that," Judge said

If you want to sell the house, you may want to hire a real estate appraiser so everyone who will receive part of the proceeds has an idea of what to expect

The appraiser will sign his name to a statement of what he believes the house is worth That's what he does for a living An appraisal of the house will be five to 15 pages long and cost around \$500 With the guidance of your

real estate pro, it's time to decide what you are going to do with the house The most common choices are You can sell the house, move into the

A knowledgeable real estate pro or a real estate lawyer are your best bets here

Study: Landfills have greatest impact on property

(AP) - Nearby stores - but not too near - helped boost property values more than woods or fields in a new study of housing prices in Berks County, Penn State researchers have found

But the biggest drop in property values came from living near a landfill, according to the study of prices and other data on more than 8,000 homes sold between 1998 and 2002

Though that wasn't surprising, the Penn State agricultural economists who did the study were somewhat puzzled that hving near a sewage treatment plant apparently didn't hurt

property values

We did not find an effect for sewage treatment plants There are 27 of them in the county That's counterintuitive," said Charles Abdalla, an associate professor of agricultural and environmental economics "You would think that living near a sewage treatment plant would have some negatives'

Abdalla co-authored the study with assistant professor Richard Ready The research was paid for by the Northeast Center for Regional Development and by Citizens for Pennsylvania's Future, an

environmental group Citing increased attention to changing land use and urban sprawl, with its uneven devel-

opment patterns, the authors said local authorities need information on the desirability of different land use patterns as more residential development occurs in rural areas

IMPACT

In Berks County, between 1/4-mile and 1 mile from a house, the most positive impact on price was from commercial land, closely followed by single-family residences on large lots, the study indicated

But closer, at a distance of 1/4-mile or less, the most positive impact was from open space, followed by large-lot single-family residential use Landfills, high-traffic roads, the regional airport, mushroom production and largescale animal production facilities all had negative impacts on property values

A landfill 1/2-mile from a house decreased the sale price by an estimated 6 9 percent

'It's definitely so," said Glenn A Hoover, who lives across the road from one of Berks County's four landfills Despite improved monitoring and odor control in recent years, Hoover said, "You always have that constant fear

"You have the noise, you have the fear of what they're burying there, and you have the traffic," Hoover said "You show me a property that has increased in value that's within a certain area of a landfill "

The impact of landfills was greater than the 4 1-percent decrease due to large animal farms, such as dairy or beef cattle, hog and poultry facilities, at the same distance

And mushroom farms or high-traffic roads had impacts of only fractions of a percentage point on housing prices

Closer than 1/4-mile from a house, open space had the most positive impact on prices, though Abdalla said, "We did find that all open space is not necessarily created equal"

Forested open space had a slightly better impact than open space in grass, pasture and crops Open space with utility or other easements was less valued and vacant open space had the least positive

impact, the study said

DIVERSE USES

The professors said they chose Berks County for the study because of its diverse land uses and agricultural production

They urged more studies elsewhere to see if different population densities, types and amounts of open spaces and types of agricultural production would produce different results

'This kind of information can be used by local officials to evaluate the consequences of planning and zoning decisions and efforts to preserve open space in their communities," Ready said

Mortgage rates go up, but remain lower than last year

(AP) - Rates on 30-year and 15-year mortgages, which climbed to a nineweek high last week, are still lower than a year ago

The average rate on a 30year fixed-rate mortgage for the week ending July 12 was 5 52 percent, up from 5 40 percent the previous week, mortgage giant Freddie Mac reported in its weekly nationwide survey

Five weeks ago, rates on 30-year mortgages slid to a new weekly low of 5 21 percent, the lowest level since Freddie Mac began tracking this benchmark in 1971

Records that reach back earlier indicate that the rate is the lowest in more than four decades, economists said

For 15-year fixed-rate mortgages, a popular option for refinancing, rates rose to 4 85 percent last week, up from 4 75 percent

Last week's rates for both 30-year and 15-year mortgages were the highest since the week ending May 9, when they stood at 5 62 percent and 4 97 percent, respectively

Rates for one-year adjustable mortgages also moved higher, rising to 3 55 percent, compared with 3 49 percent

Mortgage rates reported by Freddie Mac don't include add-on fees known as points A point is 1 percent of the loan amount Points usually can be rolled into the mortgage or paid separately

Thirty- and 15-year loans last week each carried an average fee of 0 6 point,

while one-year adjustable mortgages had an average fee of 0 7 point

A year ago, rates on 30year mortgages averaged 6 54 percent, 15-year mortgages were 6 percent and one-year adjustable mortgages stood at 4 66 percent

"Although mortgage rates se they are still lower rose than they were at this time last year, which has led to the current frenzy of refinancing," said Frank Nothaft, Freddie Mac's chief economist

Stoked by low mortgage rates, home sales are expected to break another record this year and home-mortgage refinancing will remain healthy, economists said

The recent rise in mortgage rates, however, is slowing refinancing activity a bit

Refinancing is an important factor underpinning consumer spending, the main force keeping the economy going Extra cash or savings com-

ing from refinancing deals along with rising home values are helping to offset the worsening job market

Even if the economy stages a material rebound in the second half of this year, as economists hope, mortgage rates aren't expected to shoot up, analysts said Rates on the benchmark 30-

year mortgage could rise to 57 percent by the end of the year, but they probably won't top 6 percent, some economists said

Japanese car manufacturers got into the sport-utility vehicle market in this country, as they did the minivan segment, rather sideways. So it has taken some of them awhile to come up with entries that are worthy competitors to the Big Three, who have been fielding remarkable SUVs for many years

With the 2003 Montero, Mitsubishi has demonstrated that it is one more Japanese auto maker that must be taken seriously in the SUV derby The fullsized Montero presents a formidable combination of styling, performance and interior amenities, especially in the Limited model that I drove, which carries a suggested retail price of about \$36,000

The Montero line was redesigned for the 2001 model year as Mitsubishi learned more about the expectations of Twenty-first Century SUV buyers In the process, the vehicle gained four inches in width and two inches in length (both overall and the wheelbase) Designers also bumped up the roof a bit, which both adds nicely to Montero's stature and assures more than adequate headroom inside

Montero is fashioned out of a truck chassis, but it'll easily fool you into believing it's a car-based SUV, and styling is a big part of that Its rakish front end and organically styled side moldings and wheel wells around the entire vehicle lend Montero a substantive and assertive appearance

(Among other things, Montero's stature keeps the vehicle from being confused with the smaller Montero Sport That's fine, but what is Mitsubishi doing falling into such a confusing naming scheme?)

Attaching the spare tire to the rear end also adds to the impression of competence presented by Montero, although I don t care much for the look Montero's rear gate opens to the side like a door, which has its advan tages and disadvantages

Apparently the line always has been impressive in its off-road performance, though I didn t test that aspect very much on a recent trip to northwest Michigan The best I can attest to is Montero's relative ly tight turning ratio, which is handy.

On the road, however, the 3 5-liter, 24-valve, V-6 engine provided snappy acceleration and smooth cruising with its 200 horsepower, and plenty of oomph in reserve for passing on big hills Gas mileage is a passable 13 in the city and 18 on the highway The vehicle doesn t handle rutted dirt roads as effortlessly as I'd expected, but the suspension is forgiving and smooth on the highway Road-noise levels are accept able but not outstanding

Interior space is very ample The third row seat is comfortable for adults With that seat removed, and even with the second-row seats in a reclined position, there's plenty of luggage space in the rear as well as some nicely designed pockets for smaller items on the sides and in the rear door Because Mitsubishi resisted the temptation to round off the front of Montero, front-row space is very nice, and the center console with its variety of compartments and drink holders works well

Montero's climate controls are very simple and very easy to operate, which isn't nearly true of many of its competitors, in the Limited version, rear passengers control their own air The sunroof is huge, so that even on a day in which you don t want to open it, secondrow passengers get a nice view of the sky

Mitsubishi loaded up the Limited version with amenities including heated mirrors, cruise control, a power drivers seat, allow wheels, an in-dash liquidcrystal-display panel offering information such as the external temperature and the vehicle's directional bearing, leather upholstery, touches of dark wood on the interior

While I would have maybe loaded the vehicle up just a bit more to try to compete with SUVs in the near-luxury class, Limited offers just enough interior features to pull some amenity-oriented buyers toward Montero They aren't regretting their choice

This wasn't supposed to happen Janes Addiction was burning hot 12 years ago when they exited musics solar system Their extinction wasn't pretty



'Pirates of the Caribbean' no grand adventure

PIRATES OF THE CARIBBEAN: CURSE OF THE BLACK PEARL

espite the nearly simultaneous release of Pirates of the Caribbean Curse of the Black Pearl and Sinbad Legend of the Seven Seas, swashbucklers are a dying genre

Undaunted, Disney decided to transform its beloved Disney World ride, 'The Pirates of the Caribbean," into a liveaction extravaganza, replacing the ani-



matronic mannequins with the slightly more exciting Johnny Depp, Geoffrey Rush and Orlando Bloom Depp plays Captain Jack Sparrow, a swaggering, slurring, clumsy braggart of a buccaneer who also happens to be one of the world s most cunning pirate master-

one of the world's most cunning pirate masterminds Through a yo-hohorrible turn of events, Jack finds himself assisting lovelorn blacksmith Will Turner (Bloom) in

recovering his abducted love, Elizabeth Naturally, Jack has his own reasons for participating - Turner's paramour has been kidnapped by Jack's mutinous former first mate, the evil Captain Barbossa (Rush), and Jack wants revenge

There s also a curse involved, which gives the film an excuse to showboat its lone special effect Each time a beam of moonlight strikes one of the Black Pearl pirates, he is revealed to be a living skeleton, complete with tattered clothes, lolling eyeballs and big, toothy grins Its a neat (if overused) gimmick, and the sequence in which the skeletons are introduced is the film's best Elizabeth escapes onto the deck of the pirate ship only to be tossed around by legions of the undead moving in perfect danceteam synchronicity. It's simister, funny and creepy

The rest of *Pirates* progresses like a typical Disney film There's a rag-tag assembly of underdog heroes, each of whom magically fulfills one another's emotional needs After establishing their individual quirks, they unify to fight overwhelming odds Yes, like most Disney characters, Will grew up without a father, and Jack becomes his psychotic surrogate, slowly drawing forth the true pirate within him

The film s message - that even a filthy pirate can be a decent person - is a dubious one in the face of so many questionable characters The pirates are so goofy and lovable that it s easy to forget that, whoops - they re rapists and murderers! Meanwhile, the English army is so stuffy and aristocratic that it s easy to forget that they re supposed to be the good guys! Basing a motion picture on a theme park nde - rather than the other way around is obviously a lame idea.

In truth, though, *Pirates of the Caribbean* is much like what I imagine the Disney World ride to be some nervous excitement, a couple of vibrant characters and a handful of honest scares before the whole process starts over again, over and over and over Indeed, the plot is so repetitive it borders on hilarious





gridlock, with some hypnotic moments Matt Rhode, the new keyboard player mixed in some new spices "*Strays* is different from old Janes Addiction There are no sagas like Three *Days* from the *Ritual* album Navarro said writing shorter songs with as much power and emotion was harder to achieve

Navarro's motivated to feel the audience reaction to the new songs at Lollapalooza

'We haven't outgrown those old songs either," he said "I don't care how dark some of them might be, they re deep within us But now we've grown

The L.A. foursome influenced pop culture more than you realize

■ They brought you alternative music Some say Janes Addiction invented grunge, the backlash to early 90s boring bubble gum rock. But Jane's wasn't grunge, they were just alternative with a distinctively hard yet positive edge Sure, Jane's wasn't the first art/alternative rock band but they were the ones who plowed onto MTV with an original style and never attempted to imitate anything in mainstream music. Their videos Stop' and Been Caught Stealing slapped viewers in the face with a mix of humor, raw sexuality, art and music. They also kicked dead those big hair bands and paved the way for bands like Pearl Jam and Smashing Pumpkins


■ Credit today's body piercing to frontman Perry Farrell' Influenced by underground art and tribal culture, he pierced himself and then removed them years before you ever saw an eyebrow or navel ring on kids at the mall Farrell's a surfer and removed the nipple ring because the ocean waves were destroying it. He shed the nose ring when he saw others wearing it

White folks with dreadlocks: Arguably he's the first successful white musician to wear them. He cut them off 13 years ago

■ Music festivals. Hot dogs and nachos are usually served at concerts Lollapalooza

gave a manstream push to falafal sandwiches and fruit smoothies Farrell, who organized the festival, added games and cooling tents Plus he brings in at least eight of the moment's hottest emerging bands for the price of a single concert ticket. Then he realized he could influence Generation Xers to do some good — so he invited political and environmental activists to educate crowds Lollapalooza came before Ozzfest and all the rest.

Add to Lollapalloza Pearl Jam, Nine Inch Nails, Ice-T, Snoop Doggy Dog and Rage Against the Machine all played the festival and soon after nearly every suburban teen knew their names







The "lite music you hear on FM radio these days Is it smooth jazz, or just sickeningly sweet?

If you prefer ice milk to ice cream, krab to crab, or 7-Eleven burritos to the authentic Mexican variety, the ninth Michigan Jazz Festival at Schoolcraft College 1s not for you

But if you appreciate the real roots of Jazz, if you are moved by players slinging inspired note runs against swinging backing chords and beats, if you dig music that aims to move body and soul, clear your calendar for noon to 10 30 p m Sunday, July 20

"It's all straight-ahead jazz, no smooth jazz," said veteran promoter Midge Ellis "It's basically all bop and swing and Dixieland It's real jazz, what jazz was meant to be"

Nineteen bands are featured at festival venues, which include two indoor stages and a 500-seat outdoor tent The big band stage will feature the Schoolcraft College Jazz Band, Ed Nuccilli and Plural Circle, the Brookside Jazz Ensemble, the Wayne State University Jazz Lab I with a tribute to Count Basie, and the Johnny Trudell Big Band Each band will perform a 90minute set

At the two other venues, hourlong sets will spotlight quartets headed by George Benson, Bess Bonnier, Louis Smith and Barbara Ware, Tom Saunders and The Detroit All-Stars, the Naima Shamborguer, Larry Nozero, Dennis and April Arabian-Tini and Alma Smith

Ellis said the festival was founded by bandleaders Trudell and Emil Moro "because many of our local musicians are the best in the world but they were being ignored by the big festivals (Montreux Detroit)"

"We ve turned out some fairly good jazz musicians in this town," said the longtime local promoter They include Ron Carter, Kenny Burrell and Tommy Flannigan, for starters "They decided to showcase more local talent," Ellis said, adding she's noticed that Detroit jazz players can outplay those who perform for outside festivals

The free festival also has ample free parking at the college About 5,000 attended the festival last year

"This place has everything,' said Jim Esnault of A Night Out, music and event promotions

"It's a flexible environment and it's a beautiful building Marks idea to invite in musicians with little or no name recognition, and not much

money, 18 very pure The large space has acoustically altered ceilings, tile floors and dark woodwork It's plenty big enough for a party of 150 people with room to mingle A few drinks and the right mood can result in really good sounds,

Baykian said



Music High-energy saxophonist glad to be back

Kenny Garrett barely stops to take a breath The alto/soprano saxophonist's lifestyle mirrors his latest album *Standard* of *Language*

Garrett's music is high energy like the native Detroiter himself On the road eight months out of the year, he's on the way to Europe for two weeks before returning home to New Jersey for four days then heading back across the ocean until an appearance at Birmingham JazzFest on July 19 in Shain Park

Garrett was in town in May to play with his teacher and mentor Marcus Belgrave at Orchestra Hall

"Growing up in Detroit the city had all that kind of energy, that spontaneity going on," said Garrett "With Standard of Language I was trying to get more of a live feel People always ask when are you going to do a hve album


"The main idea behind the album was for hsteners to hear some real jazz and to get the energy As a composer and band we're growing People love to hear me play high energy music Others who aren't as famihar with my music should go back

and listen to the lineage – Happy People, Songbook "

Part of Standard of Language was recorded at the same time as Happy People, his previous album Garrett and his quartet were stranded in Los Angeles



during the tragic events of Sept 11 when they decided to 'just keep recording" Only 11 cuts were needed for *Happy People* but the quartet ended up with 18 Garrett wrote a couple more songs and the surplus became *Standard of Language*, released in March with band members Vernell Brown on piano, Charnett Moffett, bass, and Chris Dave, drums Eric Harland played drums on the title cut.

"All cuts have special meaning for me," said Garrett. "Standard of Language was the first suite I wrote instead of writing 32 bar tunes As a youngster coming up I was playing a lot of standards Now I'm starting to make my own standards I wrote Kurita Sensei when I went to Japan for two weeks to study Japanese My teacher Kurita motivated me to keep trying I learned enough that when I came back I was able to speak the language to people here.

"The cut *Native Tongue* sticks out the most. It was written on the road I came back with a melody We just went in and recorded it"

Garrett's spontaneity goes back to his high school days when he first entered the business In the 1970s he was working with Lyman Woodward at Cobb's Corner in Detroit while still a student at Mackenzie High School. Introduced to saxophone by his father who played tenor, Garrett began studying the instrument at age 9 but didn't become serious until high school

'I was putting in 7-8 hour days practicing," said Garrett "After graduation I had the summer off before leaving for Berklee School of Music That's when I just went on the road for the summer with the Duke Ellington Orchestra under Mercer Ellington playing with Cootie Williams and Johnny Hodges I never had the opportunity to play with musicians of this caliber"

In 1984 Garrett was so inspired he released his first album as leader at the same time he was recording with Art Blakey, Freddie Hubbard and Woody Shaw When Miles Davis called two years later he dropped everything for a five-year/four album association with the jazz legend But by 1992 he was back recording his own music after signing with Warner Bros Standard of Language is his eighth album with the company As much as he's traveled and been nominated for multiple Grammy Awards Garrett's never forgotten Detroit

'I'm excited to come back and play," said Garrett "I left so early not many people knew I came from Detroit I've traveled the world only to come back home There's nothing like coming home I want everybody in Detroit to come on out and enjoy the music We're going to play a combination of songs 'The main thing is for us to have fun and for the people to have fun"

'He's the pied piper of jazz," said Ellis 'His students follow him everywhere There's three people in the Schoolcraft College Jazz Band who had him for high school He's done a lot for jazz and the education of jazz That's why we're honoring him Part of our mission is jazz education "

I started belly dancing years ago, and in the past three years, have watched this exotic dance become quite trendy There are plenty of places in metro Detroit to watch belly dancers perform like Da Luna's or Prestige nightclubs in Detroit

There are also plenty of places to learn it

I teach in Macomb County and learned from instructors in Wayne and Oakland counties

My youngest student is 10, the oldest in her early 70s Mothers, students, attorneys, school teachers and grocery store clerks are my students – all looking to tone, explore their feminine side, laugh and learn more about the history of this dance Its all about personal exploration, creativity, exercise and fun

Belly dancing is more than shaking hips, although intricate hip work is its foundation The hands, feet, arms, hips, head, legs, and yes, stomach all play a part When a dancer is good, her body metaphorically becomes an instrument She moves her hips to the beat of a drum, snakelike arms to a violin, and softly flowing hands to the tone of a flute

BEST TEACHER

Aida Al Adawi of Pontiac has danced and taught for more than 33 years and is known nationwide for her talents She's the best dancer and teacher I've ever seen Al Adawi, also an accomplished musician, began dancing after she saw a troupe perform at a festival in North California where she was playing music. She studied under Jamila Salimpours, a big name in Middle Eastern dance

"My approach was like with my symphony and opera work, very serious so if someone studies from me it is because they want to be an artist not just kill time moving around, Al Adawi said

Arms gracefully arched over her head, 7year-old Brooke Williams practiced swirls and hip sways to the constant beat of Misldle Eastern music during a Salamat Sisters Lelly Dance Camp in June

"She's our theatrical one,' said her mother, Tracy Williams, who was watching from the sidelines

Williams also enrolled another daughter, 9-year-old Whitney, in the sessions

"We love the tribal part, where girls become friends, and the authenticity and the art of it,' said Williams "They learn control of their body and knowledge of other countries and cultures"

Brooke, who visited her mother during a break, had another reason for enjoying camp

"I get to show my belly button," she said

Costuming was a big part of the excitement Cierra Carlson, 6, picked out her own dress – a red and black outfit she paired with a friend's necklace.

It was the first taste of belly dancing for many campers, including Chloe Glenn, 12, who will be a seventh-grader this fall. She assembled her own costume and created a multicolored tassel belt featuring seashells and blue beads

'The culture is so interesting," Chloe said. "They take their dance steps from all around the world '

Between her eyebrows, Chloe wore a clear blue, teardrop-shaped, stick-on "bindi."

Chloe and others maintained that belly dancing has made them more physically graceful and coordinated

"I ve learned that everybody's perfect, no matter what shape they are," said Chloe 'Small, skinny or tall, everybody can dance no matter what size they are"

Shellece Swafford, assistant director of the Troupe Salamat group of adult belly dancers, is conducting the children's camp, which Salamat admirers had long requested

Wearing the traditional belly dance garb of colorful skirt, short-cropped top and flowered headpiece, Swafford led the dozen or so children through "American fusion" steps The day's lessons were basic Egyptian, basic Arabic and choo-choo dance steps, with appropriate hand gestures, performed before a mirrored wall She frequently punctuated instructions with "iawa, iawa "beautiful, beautiful" in Arabic

It s all in fun, Swafford maintained, and a bonus is that belly dancing increases girls self-esteem at an age when they re experiencing keen competition with other girls





The Beatles with 1221 times)

The goal of the site is create a chain of songs covered For example David Bowie's Heroes was covered by Blondie whose song Union City Blue was covered by Radiohead whose song Lucky was covered by REM and so on – a sort of a six degrees of musical influence

But visitors can also search for their favorite individual artists and add known covers to the database that includes over 42 000 songs and 16 000 artists By the way Freebird was only noted on the site as being covered 14 times If you must call for a Lynyrd Skynyrd song you d have much better luck calling for Sweet Home Alabama which has been covered 25 times



Bring what's bugging you to the experts

Imagine an "Antiques Roadshow" for bugs


In that popular TV show, people bring antiques before a group of experts to learn if the items are treasure or trash

It's kind of like that at Bring Us Your Bugs Day Sunday, July 20 at the University of Michigan Exhibit Museum of Natural History

"What we're hoping is people will bring us any kind of bug they're interested in," said George Hammond, one of three to five expert guests on hand to answer questions and identify bugs brought in, alive or dead

"We're excited and interested to see what comes in," Hammond said Staff ask that hve bugs be kept in secure containers Aquatic bugs are welcome There will be microscopes and magnifying glasses on hand for public use

Staff who work on the museum's

Animal Diversity Web site got the idea for the event from two sources

The university has presented earlier events where fossil and rock experts are on hand to examine samples brought in by the public.



"I know some other museums around country have done this with bugs and have had pretty good response," Hammond added "We'll have several etymologists, insect specialists, and at least one spider expert."

While some folks are just naturally curious about bugs, some get curious because of other interests Hammond said it's typical for some bird enthusiasts to get interested in butterflies, then dragonflies -- and both originate as bugs

In their bug or larval state, dragonflies crawl on the bottom of ponds on six legs and eat insects

Once they grow enough, the big-eyed, jutting-jaw grubs develop pads on their backs that turn into wings They crawl to the surface and out of their skins

Another popular bug is the firefly, which starts live in a larval state "The ones you see flying around flashing are the males They're trying to communicate with the female who is on the ground or hiding in the bushes somewhere," Hammond said,

In the larval state the firefly eats slugs and snails They do all their feeding in the larval stage, fly around to find a mate, and after he mates he dies After she lays the eggs she dies

There is no scientific definition for bug 'It could be an insect, it could be a spider," Hammond said

Scientists say true bugs have a sucking mouth and a certain wing structure By this definition, beetles are not truly bugs,

as they chew with their mouths

Bugs that pose some danger to humans include mosquitos which carry West Nile virus, ticks which carry Lyme disease, and bees and wasps, particularly for people allergic to their stings

There are two venomous spider species found in Michigan, the northern widow spider and the more rare brown recluse spider

If bitten by either, the victim develops a large sore near the bite Hammond said several insect bites are misdiagnosed as spider bites


