The Plymouth Community Council on Aging has been around s nce 1978 but the mis sion statement has remained the same "to coordinate programs public and private, which promote and safeguard the independence and well being of senior citizens of the greater Plymouth community" And in 2003, as the PCCA celebrates its 25th anniversary, the mission is still the same as the Council on Aging continues to support 20 percent of the population in both the city and township who are over 55, with

police and fire services are delivered City Manager Paul Sincock is investigating alternatives to police dispatch and firefighting services, which are currently contracted with Plymouth Township at a cost of more than \$11

million annually - one-sixth of the citys annual \$6 million budget

We are always looking at ways to provide the best service we can in the most cost-effective manner possible,' said Sincock "Right now, we're just investigating alternatives

Sincock is evaluating costs for every department as the city faces a \$11 milhon budget deficit next year, and even

larger shortfalls in each of the next four years And, if voters reject a Headlee override proposal in November to increase property taxes, major cuts in personnel and services are expected Sincock said hes talked with



Chamber of commerce retools leadership class

The Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce's Leadership Plymouth program has become a fixture in town in the last several years, with many of the community's leaders taking part

However, a downturn in participation has led chamber officials to take a look at revitalizing the program The committee that oversees the program, chaired by Judge Mike Gerou, a 2001 graduate, is in the process of soliciting ideas to make the program a more effective tool for developing leaders in Plymouth

Leadership Plymouth has been one of our best programs," chamber director Fran Toney said "We want to make sure the program continues to turn out the kind of leaders Plymouth can be proud of

Established in 1999, Leadership Plymouth is a seven-month class designed to give students a varied education about the community The class begins with an overnight retreat designed to help the students bond, students then meet for daylong sessions once a month

Each session focuses on a specific aspect of the Plymouth community Topics covered include municipal government, the legal system, business, leadership, human relations and labor unions, education, and human needs and services

The idea, according to Toney, is to give students 'the opportunity to participate in a thought-provoking educational program'







John Folino had no idea who the chef would be when he signed up for the cooking class sponsored by Bella Cucina, the specialty food store in downtown Plymouth

So, when he arrived at the class and discovered hed be cooking with renowned Farmington chef Keith Famie he was pleasantly surprised

I happened to be in the store and (owner Beth Savastano) mentioned they were doing a cooking class, said Folino the owner of American Transmissions in Plymouth I just like to cook and the bonus turned out to be I d be cooking with (Famie)

It was a bonus of which some 65 people took advantage Twelve of them paid to actually cook with Famie, who shot to fame based on his appearance on the CBS reality show Survivor and the rest were there simply to eat what he cooked

And what he cooked according to Savastano who owns the year old Bella Cucina was

marvelous Mushroom risotto, South African Bobotie Casserole, roast turkey tenderloin, and tomato and onion arugula buffalo mozzarella salad

It turned out to be a pretty popular meal

It was phenomenal, said Savastano, who schedules these cooking classes weekly in the dining area at Our Lady of Good Counsel Church The crowd loved him They applauded him four or five times

According to Savastano, Famie was ever the congenial host, frequently kibitzing with the guests over appetizers and other facets of the meal An autographed book came with the class Famie showed up at 11 15 in the morning and stayed until 9 30 p m , setting up tables and autographed Survivor props

He wanted everything just right Savastano said Hes just a very nice man to work with

He was also the first in a line of celebrity chefs Savastano will import for her classes Next up is Chef Tony Yaquinto of Comparis who cooks Sept

30, and Chef Toula Patsalis, owner of Kitchen Glamor, who teaches Oct 28

Famie returns for classes in November and December, though dates have not been finalized yet Still, that's good news to Bella Cucina students

'I thought I'd learn something (from Famie), and I did, said Folino 'The food was excellent, and (Famie) was very friendly, helpful and entertaining It was a lot of fun

The class has been a successful venture for Bella Cucina In addition to the support they get from businesses like Breads & More, House of Fudge and Mama Mucci Pasta, who donated for Famie's class, the community has warmed to the classes

I think they're popular because they're so hands-on, said Savastano 'People aren't just sitting there watching someone else do the work

Arab community hosts business conference

wo years ago, in the aftermath of Sept 11, Detroits Arab community was under siege, under a micro-

scope, and torn from without and within

For many, the issue was merely survival, and the way to do that, many thought, was to keep their heads down The idea that they could counter perceptions by putting on a huge international conference would have seemed a mirage

But that's exactly when and why the Arab-American Chamber of Commerce

went to work At the suggestion of the government of Bahrain, they threw themselves into planning a world-class international

business conference Nasser Beydoun, executive director of the chamber and a delegate to the Arab League, saw it as crucıal

Our goal was not just to promote understanding and knowledge of our two cultures. though of course we want to do that, Beydoun said "Our goal is to make this area a global leader, an international trade center, and to bring jobs to the region

They knew that wouldn't happen if they brought together a collection of third assistant ministers and some professors So from the start their goal was to get world leaders Secretary of State Colin Powell, Prince Saud al-Faisal, the Saudi foreign minister, and Crown Prince Shaikh Sakman bin Hamad al-Khalıfa of Bahraın

To their own community's amazement, they got them, along with a host of other Arab dignitaries and top American corporate and government leaders Richard Wagoner, CEO of General Motors, Donald Evans, Secretary of Commerce, and the CEOs of companies like HewlettPackard, Boeing, Intel, Pepsi-Co and a flock of others

"How did we do it? Well, we asked And then we asked again, often three times," Beydoun said, chuckling Subtle lobbying by another guest at the conference, Amre Moussa, secretary general of the Arab League, undoubtedly helped

But the Bush Administration is also keenly aware of the economic importance of the community and the region, the President has traveled to Dearborn, a city of less than 100,000 people more than once since the attacks

And so a galaxy of business and government leaders will all crowd into Detroit and Dearborn, the informal capital of the North American Arab world, for a three-day meeting beginning next Sunday, Sept 28 The conference, which cost \$3 million to stage, 1s called 'One World Two Cultures Endless Possibilities," and is designed, Beydoun said, to enable the policy leaders to put together an "action plan to enable a future rich with economic collaboration, cultural dialogue, and innovation "

That may happen - but clearly, a lot of business and professional types are also coming for the time-honored purpose of networking and maybe doing a few deals As of last week, 740 had signed up to pay the full price, \$2,250, to attend the conference Rubbernecking is a motivating factor also, some paid \$450 just to attend a dinner with the heads of state, it isn't every day you can claim to have rubbed water glasses with a crown prince Most of all, this may be about breaking stereotypes

The United States does \$55 billion in trade a year with middle eastern countries, and ıt ısn't just about oil,' Beydoun said He should know When he took over the Arab chamber four years ago, it had barely 100 members and could not pay its bills It has 1,100 members now, and the ability to do

a conference of this scope

We have changed and I think we want — we need to see real change in the relationship between the United States and the Arab world' Beydoun, a 38 year-old Lebanese native considers himself both an Arab and fully American, he has lived in this country, mostly in Detroit, since he was 4 Though estimates of the region's ethnic population vary, he maintains that the area has 380,000 Arab-Americans, easily making it the largest concentrated Arab population outside the Middle East

That population, however, is virtually as diverse as the United States It include Shutes from Iraq who defiantly learn no English, and thoroughly Lebanese Christians whose families have been here for generations, don't speak a word of Arabic and have taken pains to disassociate themselves from the Muslim world


Beydoun hopes to bring them all together, and to make non-Arab Americans more comfortable living with and trading with the Middle East That won't happen overnight, he knows It will be many years before either community recovers from 9/11

But he has converted one very prominent non-Arab, Detroit Mayor Kwame Kılpatrıck, who enthusiastically threw himself into helping make the conference happen When new mayors of Detroit take office, they have often gone abroad looking to snare investment and jobs Some have gone to Germany, others to Japan Mayor Kılpatrıck thinks he sees a different future, his first trip was to Dubai

He named other department stores like Neiman Marcus and Nordstrom, which don t rely on sales either





programs such as free health screenings, food and grant programs for low-income seniors, the Senior Housing Expo and contracting help for odd jobs and repairs around the house

"Transportation is our number one issue, and probably always will be," said Marsha Koet, director of the PCCA, in her office at Plymouth city hall Some seniors still drive around town, but they don t want to go far Some are in good physical condition, but their eyesight is bad and they can't drive They need to get everywhere, from the grocery store to medical appointments"

The City of/Plymouth and Plymouth Township share the cost of two buses - the newest purchased by the Plymouth Community United Way which transport seniors to errands around town and to medical facilities throughout the area, such as the University of Michigan Hospital in Ann Arbor

However, Koet noted there

are a multitude of issues confronting todays seniors Medicaid, Medicare, long-term health care, prescription drugs and recreation, to name a few

'Many seniors have nice retirements, but don't have coverage for prescriptions,' said Koet 'I've seen monthly bills for prescription drugs for up to \$1,000'

For 88-year-old John Symons of Plymouth Township, prescription drugs are a top priority

The costs are too high,' said Symons 'Seniors are going to Canada for cheaper prices, and now the (federal) government is trying to stop that Many seniors are on fixed incomes and just can t afford it'

Symons, and nearly 500 other seniors from the Plymouths and Northvilles, participated in Senior Fest 2003 last week at Waterford Bend in Hines Park, another activity co-sponsored by the PCCA The day was filled with eating, line dancing and fellowship for seniors



services "Preliminary indications are we could save between \$50,000-\$100,000 annually, he said

According to figures produced by Plymouth Finance Director Mark Christiansen, the city last year paid \$216,000 for dispatch services provided by Plymouth Township That doesn't include the \$105,000 the city paid the township for equipment costs over a three-year period

Snyder, who is also negotiating to provide dispatch services for the City of Northville,

said a contract with Plymouth would not include payments for equipment upgrades, unlike the current pact with Plymouth Township

'It s not my intention to have either of the communities bear the cost for capital improvements, maintenance or equipment breakdowns," said Snyder 'The cost to the communities would allow us to put a third dispatcher on duty'

Snyder said preliminary discussions indicate an annual cost of approximately \$100,000

Plymouth Township Supervisor Steve Mann said he's been kept abreast of the citys search for more costeffective services

'I think we run a very affordable dispatch center, and I'd be surprised if there was drastic savings by going with another community, he said 'If they decide to go with Northville Township, we may have to reevaluate the number of dispatchers per shift as the workload would go down some percentage But, we plan on continung our own dispatch center"

Sincock is also looking at ways to trim the city's fire services bill, which is projected at \$900,000 in the next fiscal year Alternatives being evaluated include a part-time paid fire department and a public safety department, in which police officers are also firefighters Sincock declined to discuss

the fire department discussions, however, Mann said he's heard the rumors of the city taking on part-time paid firefighters

"I would be leery of going to that type of service," said Mann 'I wouldn't want to be faced with having to tell our residents that we were going to a volunteer fire department

Mann said while the cost may seem high, the township has not charged the city for property and liability insurance, or for any firefighters hired after the inter-governmental agreement in November 1994

'I don't know how they re going to do anything to provide adequate fire protection at a lower cost than what they're currently paying," said Mann They saved a drastic amount with the merger'

City officials admit the initial cost to buy fire equipment would negate any short-term savings, but in the long run the cost could be half of what is currently budgeted

Sincock said he's in the process of determining cost factors, because if the millage proposal fails in November, and the city wants to sever its ties with Plymouth Township, it has to give a year's notice to end the pact The city would need to give Plymouth Township word by January 1

And, despite what Sincock finds out, he's quick to point

out, Anything to be decided will be up to the new commission that is elected in November

But I m certainly no paleontologist so don't quote me on that



With the second place fin-1sh, Ferguson also moved into first place in the point standings of the B.A S S Masters Northern Division The top three in the point standings after three tournaments qualify for the prestigious B.A S S Masters Classic The top 20 qualify for the BASS Masters Open Championship Tournament

Ferguson placed fourth in the first Northern Division Open Tournament, held on the Potomac River in Maryland The final tournament of the series is slated for the first week of October on Lake





Countdown to **Ryder Cup begins**

Things are really starting to heat up for Steve Cook

The Ryder Cup - the worlds most prestigious golf event 15 just a year away So, as Golf Course Manager at host Oakland Hills Country Club, Cook is entering his Ryder Cup zone

Theres no question, it's very exciting personally and professionally said Cook while seated on his designated cart outside the Oakland Hills Country Club maintenance area Thursday morn

"Its pretty demanding A lot of hours, certainly a lot of pressure, but it kind of comes with the territory We ve been waiting for it for five years now, so theres a lot of anticipation

The key thing is to be planned and organized It takes away a lot of stress if we re planned and organized, he said And we ve spent a lot of time doing that Every day we come in, we think Ryder Cup We think members too, but right now, this close, 12 months out its virtually on our doorstep and were thinking Ryder Cup

Cook took over as golf superintendent at Oakland Hills Country Club m the spring of 1997, just after the 1996 US Open - the last PGA Tour major the world renowned club in Bloomfield Township hosted

Since then he has been busy building a staff - a group that currently stands at 55 in preparation for the Ryder Cup He has 15 full-time staff members who have all worked a PGA tournament major, either at Oakland Hills or another club around the country In addition, he has another 40 volunteers who will be on hand during Ryder Cup week, which runs from Sept 14-19

Cook is proud of his staff rd onfident in their ability Clearly this is the biggest

golf event in the world, he said This is outstanding It's a great motivator One of the things that s nice is you don t have to come in every day and motivate the staff

They're motivated just by whats going to happen And its nice to see the members happy and excited, he said Its a great experience because it's probably only going to happen once in a lifetime So having it at your golf course is special"

Besides keeping the golf course in pristine condition with regular cutting and trimming, Cook and his staff have many other projects in the bag over the next few months


They are currently widening paths to the corporate chalet locations around the course and, starting Oct 1, will narrow seven of the fairways to 30 yards or less Those seven fairways will be determined next month by the PGA

One of the main course renovations was rebuilding the No 6 tee area which was moved approximately 55 yards toward the par 4 hole It went from 360 to 305 'because the PGA wanted a reachable par-4' to add some excitement

Cook and his managers spend hours walking the course, searching for trouble spots Whether its improving a sewer basin tampering with the imgation system or finding unsightly patches in the grass, they are constantly tending the course

If the weather is anything like it was this past week ideal conditions Cook does not foresee any problems He plans to run two shifts during the week, one in the morning and one at night

If the weather holds, and our planning is good, we should just be out prepping the golf course in the morning, he said Everybody knows their job and everybody is trained to handle problems as they come up We ll take the rest of the day

off, watch some golf and come back at night If we ve done all of our

planning and all our prepara tion, the week of the Ryder Cup will be the easiest part of all,' he said And that's what we want My statement to the staff is we have to have fun It only happens once in a lifetime, so we've got to enjoy ourselves The more we plan and organize the more fun well have then

The Ryder Cup is a compe tition that occurs every two years featuring golfers from the United States and Europe

The Europeans enter the 35th Ryder Cup as defending champions and this marks the first time this colossal event will be hosted by Oakland Hills

While golfers are matching skills on the course, Cooks meal ticket is to stay out of the limelight He figures if he goes unnoticed, Ryder Cup week will have been a success from his point of view

"We really enjoy being behind the scenes, that's what we do best," Cook said "We don't need a lot of media coverage or limelight We want to go out, do our jobs, get off the golf course and go back where nobody can see us Thats what we re successful at

Video screens to show action

Andy Odenbach, Ryder Cup Tournament Director for the PGA. said spectators lucky enough to come up with tickets for next year's tournament at Oakland Hills will not miss any action Odenbach expects close to

38.000 people daily for the six-day affair that begins Sept 14 and ends Sept 19 That's a lot of people converging on the 150-acre South Course

But Odenbach, who works out of a trailer office on the north side of Maple near the Maple crossover bridge, is not worried

He said there will be nine video display screens set up at scattered locations around the prestigious Bloomfield Township course Radio headsets that monitor live action also will be for sale and will feature selected US and E@ropean channels

There will be a lot of people here, especially considering the Ryder Cup only has 24 players and only a few groups of golf being played at any one time out on the course, said Odenbach 'We're going to have the nine video boards set up opposite major grandstands That way when peo

ple come to the golf course they wont feel compelled that they have to be exactly on the hole where play is taking place

They can get a few holes ahead, sit down in the bleacher, watch the matches and how they unfold until the players actually get to their hole Then we shut the screens down and the get to watch all the golfers come through and actually play the hole they're on

"When the golfers move on we'll turn the screens back on so they can watch how the matches finish,' he said "It's a good way to spread people out throughout the golf course'

Odenbach said Ryder Cup excitement is growing among his PGA staff, club members and volunteer workers

"For us here, that's all we think about, and now that we're down inside of 12 months, it's just like we're running through the checklists, dotting the Is and crossing the Ts,' he said The good thing is that we ve been really fortunate to work with a club that's so experienced in hosting these events and a community that s so supportive of having this event held here

I m very confident that if we get some good weather, everything else will take care of itself he said


Through the years, our family has held discussions of another dog At first, it was just too soon to think about owning another dog Then we were just too busy Now we teeter, in a limbo







Mail carrier calls it quits after 42 years

Plymouth postal carrier Cary Black figures he's walked more than 100,000 miles in the last 42 years, on a journey that has taken him from Plymouth to Fort Lewis, Wash, and back

But Blacks boots won't need to be made for walkin much longer The veteran mailman hangs it up Oct 2, when he retures after 37 years on the same route

It s time," Black said "I'm as high as I'm going to get as far as my retirement percentage, and I m healthy The people I've known on the route have really made it enjoyable They re like family"

Black was born in Pennsylvania, the son of a military family When his father was discharged, he moved the family to the Lilley/Joy Road area of what was then Plymouth

He got started in the business back in October 1961 Hed spent a year at Ferris State University, studying architectural drafting after graduating from Plymouth High School in 1960 That summer, he was looking for a job, and his mail carrier suggested he take the civil service exam

'Back then, you could work a clerk's job or you could be a carrier," Black said After about six months, I decided I wanted to be a carrier, because I wanted to be outside '





Dylan picks out an irresistible toy and carries it around while they shop The longer he holds it, the less irresistible it seems Kay said, "By the time we leave the toy store, he's lost interest in it I put it back without a problem Perhaps four-year-old Dylan doesn't cling to those toys because mom gives no resistance to fight against

TRADING UP

A helpful way to reduce

tantrums at the grocery store is to put kids in charge of choosing one item Sharons daughter Brianna would swap choices throughout their grocery store trip On a typical trip, she

would start out with a box of fruit roll-ups She'd trade the fruit roll-ups for a box of popsicles Then, trade the popsicles for a carton of chocolate milk Sometimes she makes four or five trades before leaving the store This is a great way to keep kids occupied, while increasing their thinking and reasoning skills

Two fundamental skills for responding to a child's upset feelings include

• Validate feelings When kids are upset, they don't need explanations, lectures or criticism They need their feelings acknowledged

• When kids cannot get what they want in reality, give them their wishes in fantasy

Ethan screamed at his little brother, Take them off Those are my pajamas Mom had no right to give them to you" Mom resisted the urge to give explanations, and she also

resisted lecturing It was particularly hard for her to resist criticizing Each response would only

aggravate her upset child Instead, mom validated Ethan's feelings, "Even though you know the reasons why, it can still be hard to see Michael wearing your old pajamas" Ethan gave mom a nod with a sigh, then began playing with his brother Even if Ethan had remained upset, at least he would feel comfort in having a parent who understands how he feels

GRANTING WISHES

Another way of validating feelings, is to grant kids wishes in fantasy Mom could have said, I wish I had a machine that would make your clothes

get bigger as you get bigger"

Curb disappointment when wishes don't come true

Robert couldn t believe how well his son responded to receiving wishes in fantasy 'Just before dinner, my son Paul had a tantrum because I wouldn't let him eat any carmel corn I looked at my wife for support She said, 'You're the one taking parenting classes Show me what you've learned' I decided to give Paul his wishes in fantasy I said, Hey Paul, look what I have' Paul came over and watched as I pretended to eat carmel corn out of the back of his toy truck Want to eat some of this delicious invisible carmel corn with me while we watch TV?' Paul jumped on the couch and started munching the pretend snack My wife couldn't believe her eves

TEEN TALK

Being given wishes might work well for young children, but what about teenagers?

Michael's 16-year-old daughter borrowed his car to drive to a school swim meet Soon after, the phone rang His daughter had been in a car accident No one was hurt, but she was pretty shaken up The accident was her fault and the car was totaled

While driving to the hospital, he thought, "I'm going to tell her she was being careless I m going to tell her she could have been killed I'm going to tell her she could have killed someone else ' He stopped himself to consider the skills

he had just learned during a lunch-hour parenting class Listen more than you talk, and give kids their wishes in fantasy

His daughter broke down in tears when she saw him He dıdn't know what to say so he remained silent as he hugged her Since he wasn't talking, she began talking

Between sobs, she said 'I'm so sorry I wasn't being careful I could have been hurt I could have killed someone I'm going to get points on my license Because of me, our

car insurance is going to go up

Michael was amazed She was telling him the lecture that he had planned for her He said, "Honey, I imagine you wish you were up at the high school swim meet having fun with your friends instead of being here like this " His daughter stopped crying and gave him a look of deep gratitude


Several months later I called Michael He said, 'My daughter has become more responsible since the accident, not only in driving but in other areas of her life too I believe the way I handled things made a difference for her"

Michael resisted the urge to blame and lecture Because he listened more than he talked, his daughter had a chance to think through her actions He chose words of compassion and verbalized her wishes

I once heard the expression, 'Only talk when it improves upon silence" Words that express the wishes and desires of your children, spoken with compassion, improve upon silence

Make shopping fun with kids

uring one of the parenting classes I run, one of the parents asked me what I did when I witnessed a parent lashing out at a child in public How many of us have come across this? It's either a very angry parent we encounter or the child is whining incessantly because its really too late or way past nap time for him to even be out in public!

Shopping with small chil dren can be trying, even highly stressful I came across some good information distributed by the National Child Protection Agency that offers tips for shopping happily with your child and also how to act when you see a child being



gry to shop? If yes, postpone your trip or find a sitter

Agree on rules Before entering the store make your expectations clear such as Stay close to me and/or Use your quiet voice

At the store

■ Make a game of it Who can see the music store or shoe store? Who is wearing green? Which store name begins with a T?

Give children choices When possible, allow your child to make some decisions Blue or red socks? Chocolate or vanilla ice cream? Be prepared to compromise

Play 20 Questions Choose something and ask the child to guess what it is

Praise your childs behav-10r "I like it when you cooperate A hug can be reassuring and say more than words at times Later use encouraging words with your child, "You really worked hard at cooperating today

If all else fails

Remember kids will be kids They are not perfect Of course neither are we, but we are the adults

Ignore inappropriate behavior unless it becomes dangerous, destructive or annoying to others

Remove a child who is out of control Take the child to the restroom or out of the store Tell the child quietly, eye-toeye, that his/her behavior is unacceptable

■ Wait, saying nothing else, for the child to calm down Then ask if he/she is ready to try again You may need to restate your expectations

Go home if the child cannot calm down If the shopping cannot wait, arrange for child care and return alone

Now, what do you do when you are the other shopper and someone elses child is out of control and so is the parent? What should you do, if, for example you are in line at the grocery store and right ahead of you is a parent and three screaming children? Suddenly the parent grabs a candy bar out of the 2 year olds hand and yells 'You idiot' I said no' When we get out of here I m throwing you in the garbage can'

Your heart probably will go out to the child, yet you feel helpless These are positive things you can do when you encounter a potentially abusive situation

📕 It looks as if its been a long day for both of you Can I help?

My child used to get upset like that Believe me, it does get better What can I do to help you?"

Children sure can wear you out, can t they? Is there anything I can do for you?

Start a conversation with the adult See if you can direct the parent's attention away from the child so the parent can have a moment to calm down

A word of caution - don't give the parent dirty looks or make snide remarks These reactions are likely to increase the parent's anger If you sense that a child is in danger or left unattended, seek assistance from a store manager or security

nine-digit zip codes and sorting machines

Now, of course, things are computerized and mechanized, and the carrier, while still required to put in a pretty physical day, spends less time sorting When he first started not every carrier had a truck, mail was delivered to 'relay points' along the routes, and the carrier picked it up there Now, Black uses a truck, as

all carriers do His local career was inter-

rupted in the early 1960s, as careers were for so many young men, when he was drafted into the Army in 1964 After basic training at Fort Knox, Ky, Black was sent to Fort Lewis, Wash

His unit was eventually sent to Vietnam, but Black wasn t, because he didn t have enough time left on his enlistment After his two-year stint, he returned home

When they found out I worked at the post office, they made me the post mail clerk, Black said 'That was OK with me



back into the uniform (out of force of habit), Black said "But I've always been an early riser I don't think thát'll change"





Red alert Undetected heart disease a killer

The pain in Carol Pyke's chest came on suddenly Had she pulled a muscle carrying her granddaughter? Within minutes an aching crept into her back, then up into her neck, jaw and teeth

The Bloomfield Hills woman knew something was wrong, but never dreamed she was having a heart attack. She admits to living in a constant state of rushing before retiring as an elementary school principal in Southfield, but had always been healthy

"I was on vacation at Disney World with my family and said, 'I don't feel right to my husband, but did not go to a hospital and decided on urgent care," Pyke said "I walked to the van, and by the time he came out I couldn't sit up straight I was doubled over, but still denying what was happening Like thousands of women, Pyke never thought she might die from a heart attack. Yet one in two women do

Risk factors add up Undiagnosed high blood pressure was just one of the strikes against her 'I had rheumatic fever at an early age that left

me with a heart murmur. but carried on a normal life Then I started thinking My mother died of congestive heart failure and had bypass surgery,

time I thought truly you were a fool with your history I don't know when I

had the last EKG' Dr Pamela Marcovitz isn't surprised by Pyke's initial denial Since opening the Ministrelli Women's Heart Center at Beaumont Hospital in June 2002, the medical director has seen hundreds of women with simılar beliefs, but they're not alone According to a 1997 study by Yankelovich Partners, women believe cancer is their primary threat - not heart dis-

ease, the leading cause of death in women 'A lot of women have come through the clinic

since it opened, a lot more than we projected," said Marcovitz, a cardiologist at the women's heart center in Royal Oak 'We expected that When we looked at statistics, death from heart disease in women is not declining as it is in men In women they're staying the same or increasing slightly By the time most women are diagnosed, they re 10 years past menopause and have more risks - diabetes, high blood pressure, high cholesterol We re trying to diagnose heart disease earlier before it becomes so severe We're seeing more younger women coming in with heart attacks'

Mary Jane Kata was 39 when she began having pains in the chest, arm

and back, and nausea Like Pyke, the Rochester Hills woman denied the symptoms, rationalizing she was too young to have a heart attack Marcovitz hopes to

change that perception She and the rest of the staff at the Ministrelli Women's Heart Center regularly present educational talks in the community And it seems women are getting the message that heart disease 15 their No 1 threat About 70 percent of the women's heart center patients are self-referred

Dr Stephen Smith thinks the increase in women patients he's seeing at Henry Ford Hospital is due in part to growing awareness The Birmingham cardiologist says women are becoming more alert to their health, but it's not simply a question of recognition

"Risk factors such as obesity are on the rise,' Smith said "We re all getting heavier That leads to problems of diabetes, high blood pressure Diabetes is still on the rise

"They need to make sure they're eating properly, if needed take medications for controlling blood pressure, diabetes, and increase their activity

level Sixty percent of North Americans do nothing That's detrimental to your health and state of well being and quality of life," said Smith, who runs on a treadmill at a health club and also does cross training 'Find something you like swimming, cycling, jogging, Stairmasters

Its clear, directed to women and heart disease You ll find if you don't understand the terms, there's a page where they explain them,' Smith said 'There's demographic data, general dietary

information, understanding what it's all about, how to cope with risk factors, and an online forum in case you want to talk It gives general advice on dealing with what you can - obesity, smoking, controlling lipids to reduce complications and cardiovascular events

Pyke has become a champion for women since her heart attack After angioplasty on a 90 percent blocked artery, she's on her way to controlling risk factors, including her fast-paced lifestyle Pyke makes sure her three grandchildren, duties as president of the Birmingham branch of AAUW, and volunteering in the mammography department one day a

week at Beaumont keep her busy, but not so much that she's stressed

'I began exercising, joined Curves, and walk three miles several times a day, Pyke said 'l eat right I never had eaten a lot of fat, but love sweets and snacks, doughnuts and cookies I m working on it I went to a nutritionist at the womens heart center and increased soy, cut back on meat I make a soy pizza with tofu mozzai ella, put vanilla soy milk on my cereal Measure your waist If you cairy extra weight, that can be harmful It's hard work Take care of yourself

Pain in the stomach, nausea - women sometimes confuse flu symptoms with those of a heart attack Dr Pamela Marcovitz says symptoms in women usually don't include the feeling like an elephant is sitting on your chest

Women differ from men not only in symptoms they experience, but in their response to stress testing At the Mınıstrellı Women's Heart Center at Beaumont Hospital, researchers are discovering new ways to help women prevent and conquer heart dis-ease, including designing stress tests specifically for women that won't yield false positive results

In the future, these findings will help doctors and staff at the center to detect heart disease earlier A Beaumont study presented at the American College of Cardiology meeting in 2003 shows a link between bone loss and heart disease

Compared with high blood pressure, it was one of the strongest predictors that women were going to have a coronary blockage The more doctors know about risk factors, the better they can educate women on ways to prevent problems before they begin

Prevention is the most effective treatment The Ministrelli Women's Heart Center is not only staffed by physicians, but an exercise physiologist and a registered dietitian, and offers a free risk assessment tool to measure a woman's risk for heart disease In return for mailing in the completed questionnaire, women receive a letter informing them as to whether they're low or high risk, and how to minimize the odds against them For more information, call the center at (248) 551-4760

Obesity is a major risk factor, according to Marcovitz, as is diabetes

signs of diabetes and there's an epidemic of obesity and diabetes in America," Marcovitz said 'Women need to be aware of blood pressure, cholesterol and diabetes, one of the strongest risks for women

A study of the patient population at the center showed half of women had high blood pressure, 60 percent were overweight and half had cholesterol over 200

"Michigan is an obese state," Marcovitz said "Michigan is replete with heart disease risk factors Eventually we're all going to have some, so we need to start exercising The latest guidelines recommend 45 minutes four to five times a week, eat a low-fat, high-fiber diet, quit smoking, control high blood pressure which is now less than 120 over 80 If you're rushing, you re much more likely to have elevated

It's also important for women to recognize the symptoms of a heart attack

"Men complain of pressure in the middle of the chest Women complain of pain in

the left or right arm, neck or jaw pain, high back pain between the shoulder blades when walking, shortness of breath, pressure or pain in the abdomen and profound fatigue,' Marcovitz said When women ask me how to tell the difference between flu and heart attack, with the heart it's the sudden onset of profound fatigue

'If they have these symp-

toms and risk factors like cholesterol and high blood pressure, they need to go to doctor for a stress test whether they're in their late 30s or older, especially with heart disease in the family or other risk factors This is not a mystery Mild abnormalities combined need to be taken seriously"

A Beaumont study showed that 75 percent of the women under the age of 45 coming

into the emergency room with a heart attack were smokers



Nostalgia drives demand for restored potbellied stoves

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

Steve Hund Jr bought his first potbellied stove for just \$15 at an auction in 1971

He needed something to heat the old farmhouse he was restoring between the northeast Kansas towns of Paxico and Maple Hill The home had been abandoned for several years and had no heating system or plumbing

Then the 1970s energy crisis struck and the price of heating fuel skyrocketed Friends who saw how effective Hund's old stove was at keeping his farm house warm asked him to look for stoves to install in their homes

What started as a sideline turned into a full-time business after Hund lost his job Hund — Bud to friends — now operates an antique store in Paxico's once-empty but now flourishing downtown He makes most of his money selling restored wood- and coal burning potbellied stoves from the turn of the last century and vintage gas ranges from the 1930s to the 1950s

The stoves sell for between \$1 500 and \$2,000, with the fanciest gas ranges going for up to \$4,000

His restored stoves reside in homes from Kansas to California Hes also rented stoves to be used as movie props Some of his customers are attracted to the stoves for their beauty and functionality For others, nostalgia is the lure Older customers recall that their mothers heated their bath water on top of the stoves And Hund has heard others tell of being placed in the stove's warming oven when they were born prematurely

I think people are looking for a little simpler life, Hund said of the stove's appeal A stove means a simpler time'

UNIQUE ELEMENTS

Some of his stoves feature finials and gargoyles The embellishments fit with the Victorian homes that were popular during the turn of the last century when most of the stoves were built Heavy competition from gas ovens put most heating stove manufacturers out of business by the 1940s

More than half a century later, appreciation of the stoves is growing Old cook stoves and vintage ranges are appearing in decorating magazines. Some people are designing kitchens around them

These things were art in their day, said Delmar Joyce, of San Diego, past president of the Antique Stove Association 'A really high end stove was like having a Duesenburg in your driveway'

It s a tough business and Joyce said the number of businesses that specialize in stove restoration would be measured in dozens

Its not anything people are real anxious to be involved in, Hund said They're heavy, rusty, dirty and a lot of work to restore "

The stoves first are taken apart and cleaned If cracks are found, the piece is welded back together, or a new one is recast Damaged nickel parts are sent to Independence, Mo, to be replated The stoves then are reassembled The work is done in a shop behind Hund's store, Mill Creek Antiques which is nestled between a cafe and another antique shop The buildings were constructed around the time the railroad arrived in Paxico in 1886 Now neatly restored, the downtown looks as though it could be the set for a Western

But that s not what it looked like when Hund bought an abandoned section of a general store in 1973 for \$2,200 Some buildings were selling for even less then

He worked at the store dur ing the day At night, he worked in Topeka as a switch man and brakeman for the now defunct Rock Island Railroad Business was terrifyingly slow at first 'We would wait sometimes a week for a car to pull up in front of the store,' he said If they found it, it was an accident

He and a partner re caned chairs and restored furniture to occupy their time

First one billboard, then others went up along Interstate 70, directing travelers to the shop and later other antique shops that began filling the empty storefronts in the city s downtown, which is about 80 miles west of Kansas City

Hund advertised his wares in a farm publication And customers told their friends and family about the little antique shop in Paxico

STORE RESTORATION

Gradually, Hund started doing more and more stove restoration Stoves were easy to find at farm auctions in the

1970s when Hund often was the only person bidding on the century old relics

Initially, Hund restored only stoves that didn t need much work, selling them for \$100 to \$150 The antique store became his full time job in 1980 when the Rock Island Railroad went under and Hund lost his job It was a scary time His wife, Kathryn, was pregnant and had quit her teaching job to care for the baby

He initially tried selling modern heating stoves along with the older stoves But he was unimpressed with their quality

He focused on learning more about fixing the older stoves with a local blacksmith as his early tutor Now hes teaching the business to a Paxico man who also turned to stove restoration after losing his job

Martin Hurla started renting space in Hund's workshop after he was laid off in November from a sheet metal fabrication shop in Topeka If someone wants a stove restored, Hurla does the work He also restores stoves in Hund's showroom on a contract basis

Gone is Hurla's commute His house is located across the alley from the workshop He can go home for lunch and peek out the shop's back door and see his children — ages 9, 6 and 4 — playing and riding their bikes in the alley

Hurla called losing his job a blessing Hund had a similar assessment

It's pretty amazing, he said, that it's worked out the way it has

New loan requirements could price manufactured home buyers out of market

David Burnett thinks business is about to get worse for his already slumping manufactured home dealership in Alabama

That's because mortgage giant Fanme Mae, in response to a rising number of delinquencies and foreclosures, is making it tougher to get manufactured home loans The company now requires a 10 percent down payment for 30 year mortgages on such homes, plus a fee of 0 5 percent of the loan amount

Previously, those who qualified could put no money down, while others put down no more than 3 percent No fee was required

For those who cannot afford 10 percent, Fannie Mae has introduced a 20-year loan requiring a 5 percent down payment However, monthly payments are higher

Critics say the changes could price some would-be home owners, especially low-income families, out of the market That would hurt dealers like Burnett, who have already been affected by the glut of recently built, repossessed manufactured homes

It's putting another nail in the coffin said Burnett, who owns the Deep South Home Gallery in Montgomery, Ala He said seven of his areas 13 dealers have gone out of busi ness over the past two years

Business was slow then, and now I expect it to be slower,' he said

MANUFACTURED HOUSING

Manufactured homes are built in factories and assembled on building sites They include mobile homes, though many manufactured dwellings have characteristics found on traditional single-family homes — pitched roofs decks and porches

The Department of Housing and Urban Development says mobile or manufactured homes account for one third of all new single family home sales There are about 7 2 million such homes, many in rural areas and the South The average sale price is roughly \$49,000, compared to about \$164,000 for a traditional single-family home, according to the Manufactured Housing Institute an industry trade group

According to Fannie Mae's Deborah Tretler the changes put into effect Aug 24 were prompted by a spike in delinquencies and foreclosures on manufactured home loans That came after many home sellers and lenders in the late 1990s extended loans to buyers with poor credit histories or not enough income to pay their mortgages industry experts say

We don't serve borrowers well when it is easy for a borrower to get into a home under very flexible terms, only to have them lose their home, their credit ruined and their home ownership dreams turned into a nightmare, said Tretler, vice president of single-family homes




Lance George, research associate for the private Housing * Assistance Council, said of the changes In some remote rural areas that will knock people out of the housing market

But he also said, Its not all Fannie Maes fault Its the industry They let a lot of the retailers go wild and give loans to everyone

Fannie Mae is shorthand for the Federal National Mortgage Association, a publicly held company chartered by Congress 30 years ago to keep a steady supply of cash in the home mortgage market It now is the nations largest source of money for mortgages, with a large number of loans going to first-time home buyers

Fannie Mae and its sister company, Freddie Mac, essentially dictate the terms that banks, mortgage lenders and other financial institutions set on their home loans Because of that, George said, the Fannie Mae changes will have a big effect on the home financing market even though manufactured home loans represent a " small percentage of the companys \$2 trillior business

Building a remodeling Pildbrook business isn't easy

Someone recently tossed a \$40,000 deck building job in Sean Brady's lap Although Brady would thank the donor, he's in no particular hurry to learn the source of his windfall

The reason? The contractor who landed the work reneged on the job So the customer turned to Brady And Brady knows this won't be the last such "gift his firm will receive

'I get a minimum of two calls every week from homeowners left high and dry by contractors who didn't show up, didn't turn in a bid, or left a job undone,' says Brady, a Midwest contractor with 20 years of deck building under his belt "I appreciate the business, but man, it creates a ton of bad impressions for me and other contractors It seems we're just below used car dealerships in the number of complaints'

Brady's circumstance — taking on work by default - isn t unusual for experienced contractors with sterling track records But it points out the problems faced by construction entrepreneurs who start a business with nothing more than a pickup truck and a cell phone

The issue is just as thorny for homeowners Do they delay a project until experienced help is available or roll the dice on someone - anyone - just to get the job started? Most national organizations, including the Federal Trade Commission, caution homeowners to suck with entrenched contractors with plenty of experience

Brady says up-and-coming contractors have a steep learning curve ahead of them Good craftsmanship skills are just one part of the success equation

He suggests de facto apprenticeships of up to 10 years in a narrow range of related trades before a worker ventures on their own His curriculum would go beyond workmanship to com-

munication, respect for the homeowner, and empathy for the stress home improvements brings to a household

Would-be contractors also need to polish backoffice skills in business finance, accounting, billing and promotion, although the latter is taken care of by a combination of good work and a good reputation bolstered by a history of promises made and promises delivered

Brady often sees fresh faces in the business that profess to be a jack-of-all-trades but in truth are a master of none When poor work, tardy scheduling or miscommunication run afoul of homeowner expectations, the results only serve to hurt the public impression of the home improvement profession

"Fly-by-night contractors are a poor reflection on our business," says Brady "Every time I go out on an interview, I have to battle this stigma of either the crooked contractor or the no-show It's a constant battle Every good contractor or good doctor or good lawyer has to fight this stigma "

Homeowners can short-circuit bad contractors by making sure the contractor has the licenses, financial wherewithal, insurance and specialty skills before signing a contract A check for the Better Business Bureau for complaints is a must

For Brady, his one Better Business Bureau complaint still haunts him and is a reminder that a contractor is only as good as their most recent, successful job "I still wake up at night trying to figure out how to take care of the one complaint ever filed against me,' he says "It just means you learn something new on the job every day"

As for the contractor who bailed on the \$40,000 project, Brady is philosophical I'd like to say 'thank you, but I can only stand here and wonder if he learned a lesson It's not the way I like to get jobs, but if the other guy goofs up, the good guy is going to get the business

Several years ago, a colleague of mine was looking for a small sport utility vehicle, but one that wasn't so small that he couldn't take a few state to state trips once in a while

He had a girl who hadn't seen much of the Midwestern and eastern states, so he was determined to show her the wonderful sights of Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia, Ohio and Indiana He's a historian at heart and loved all of what those states has to offer that's rich in our early American history

And, believe it or not, she actually wanted to see all those sights But a small sport utility just wouldn't do He quickly dismissed them

Until he saw me in the Honda CR V when it first came out and I had the chance to drive it The wheel squealed as he pulled away on his way to his local Honda dealership He bought one the same day

More than 100,000 miles later Joe still loves his CR-V And other than normal maintenance, has had no major problems with it And is still taking three day weekends around the United States He's now concen trating on the middle southern states for historical jaunts these days, however

The thing I like most about the Honda CR-V is that it's large enough to accommodate a couple of adults on a short trip, yet has the versatility and fun to drive attributes of a small vehicle And the mileage well, at nearly 30 miles to the gallon on the highway, that's a lot of short trips you can take on a regular basis espe cially with the price of gas these days

If anything else, the Honda CR-V is a nice way to get your feet wet in the entry-level sport utility market I'll give you a taste of the sport ute market while taking the bite out of the expense of a large SUV (and I'm only talking about the insurance and gas bite here, nothing else)

And, of all the smaller sport utility vehicles out there, you re going to find just about the best value in the CR-V than anything else out there

Let's start with what's under the hood The 2003



2003 Honda CR-V. Vehicle type: Special purpose vehicle. Power: 2.4-liter DOC=HC 16-valve 4-cylinder engine. Mileage: 22 mpg city/26 mpg highway. Where built: Sayama, Saitama, Japan. Price as tested: \$22,860.

Honda CR V is powered by a 24-liter 16-valve dual overhead cam 4-cylinder I VTEC engine (one of Honda's own) that promises 160 horsepower

Ah, VTEC It just keeps on getting better and better and better The low and mid range torque was increased to deliver better overall acceleration, while still maintaining more-than-respectable mileage emis sions standards Safety is the key these days when choosing a vehicle that will protect your family The Honda CR-V will please you in that respect There are dual advanced stage driver's and front passenger's airbags available side airbags, beams galore to absorb crash intensity and get this the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration rated the CR-V "good" in frontal and side impact By the way, "good" is the best you can get

You have three distinct Honda CR Vs to choose from LX LX 4WD and EX 4WD This is standard equipment on all of them power windows on both side, intermittent front and rear window wipers and washers, air conditioning with filtration, power windows with automatic down on the driver's side, power door locks, floor mats, anti-theft with engine immobilizer, cruise control and front armrest

I drove the CR V five-door 4 wheel drive EX model which had all the amenities that mattered to me I've grown accustomed to an outdoor temperature gauge which the EX driven didn't have, but heck, there's still AM traffic and weather radio if you really need to know, right?

Speaking of the radio, the EX driven was equipped with an AM/FM/cassette stereo with an eight-disc CD changer and eight speakers thrown strategically around the cabin It also had an anti-theft device attached to it I like the stereo which had some really nice sounds

Some of the other standard features found on the EX driven included a waterproof rear storage wall, 12-volt accessory sockets, a removable picnic table, a ton of storage compartments both front and aft, power moon roof with tilt and shade, power door mirror and a 60/40 spht rear sliding fold and tumble seat

The week in the CR-V was enjoyable, including a longer than normal trip up to the central part of the lower peninsula I wasn't fatigued too badly when we exited the vehicle

But, like I did say, I loved the mileage we got on the trip I also enjoy the deceptively large cargo area in the rear Sure looked small, but when we started loading, it just held more and more

If you're in the market for a small SUV and don't want to sacrifice mileage cost or comfort, take a look at the Honda CR V It may surprise you


