Voters: Read our lips on taxes Challenger tops ballot **Residents nix Headlee** rollback by 3-1 margin

Voters overwhelmingly told city officials to start making cuts - rather than raise taxes to erase projected budget deficits ranging from \$1 2 million next year to \$2 4 million in 2008-09

By a 3-1 margin, residents rejected Proposal 1, which called for increasing the city's millage rate from its current 11 mills to a maximum 15 mills for each of the next three years

The administration, along with some commissioners, wanted the tax increase to ease the pain of mounting expenses and reduced revenues on the fiscal budget However, the defeat of Proposal 1 by a margin of 1,419-474 indicated the electorate wants the city to dig deeper

"The way they worded it

(Proposal 1), they weren't specific on where the funds are going," said Dan Lixie, who has lived in Plymouth for 15 years "It's a little slush fund for the fire department, police department and municipal services

"If I had a little more direction on where the money was going, I might have voted differently," said Lixie

Guy Kananen, who has lived in the city for 30 years, said he came prepared to vote "no" on Proposal 1

"We're in the middle of a recession and every one of these companies are cutting and lowering overhead, so why is the city raising taxes?" asked Kananen "Cut back, figure it out, be efficient The rest of us are doing it, so why don't they?' John Shevlin, a 30-year resi-

dent of Plymouth, said he just doesn't want to give any more "It seemed very threatening," said Shevlin of the literature he received over the weekend "It said if we don't vote for the increase, there would be reduction in police, and parks and recreation It sounded like an ultimatum

"Taxes are high, we've hit our

max, enough is enough," he said Among the suggestions by the administration to balance next year's budget are cuts in leaf pickup, snow removal, restructuring of police and fire services and the elimination of concerts in Kellogg Park

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Going into Tuesday's Plymouth City Commission election, challenger Dave Workman felt the two incumbents were quality candidates who would easily win re-election

He was right, but Workman also pulled off perhaps the election's biggest surprise, becoming the top vote-getter and earning a four-year term

Workman drew 1,220 votes in an election which saw nearly 28 percent of Plymouth's electorate either show up at the polls or vote absentee

"I'm very surprised," said Workman, as he looked over the results at City Hall shortly after 8 p m "When we have two" incumbents who have done very good work in Plymouth the voters of Plymouth have always listened closely and been aware of what they're voting

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Brothers turn store's focus to winery

Mark Tanski and brother Jim have owned Plymouth Marketplace for 10 years The pair recently decided it was time to take the Ann Arbor Road store, which originally began as a produce market, to "the next level'

"We wanted to break our identity of being a grocery store," said Mark Tanski, who left his job as an electrical engineer (his brother was a chemical engineer) to open the business "We wanted to

expand on all the qualities of Plymouth Marketplace, but we didn't want to close the store and reopen as something else"

With that idea, the Tanskis spent nearly \$200,000 on renovations, which include a winery and a wine cellar, expanding the bottled selections to more than 2,200 different varieties on the floor.

"The things we are good at are meat, produce and wine," said Tanskı "We always were a wine shop, but never had a statement in wine Now, we've opened the door to a whole new customer base

With the new direction, and the focus on bottled wines, Plymouth Marketplace 1s now known as BellaVino

"Bella means beautiful, and vino is wine," Tanski said "It hit me like a ton of bricks while driving down the road "

Tanski said BellaVino has both federal and state licenses to begin

In a perfect world dreamed up by Plymouth Township officials, township residents would be able to get anywhere they wanted simply by walking along a sidewalk

That world is a step closer now, with the completion of the township's 2003 sidewalk program Gaps in township sidewalks along 5 Mile, Ann Arbor Trail and Haggerty were among those closed this year, as the township spent some \$75,000 adding walks in those areas

'It's been one of our priorities, improving the sidewalk infrastructure and allowing our residents to get around the township safely," said township Supervisor Steve Mann

"It connects not only our subdivisions, but the whole community"

The township has spent some \$250,000 in the last three years alone improving the sidewalks, with three goals in mind, according to Mann Allowing residents to get from neighborhood to neighborhood, providing better access to Plymouth Township Park, and providing township residents a way to reach city boundaries Crews put the cap on 2003 construction by paving sidewalks particularly around township park, located at Ann Arbor Trail and McClumpha More projects are on the way for Spring 2004, but plans are being delayed by the need for county approval

Renaissance Festival helps open doors to medieval history

Discovery Middle School seventh-graders opened the doors of medieval history for parents and fellow classmates with the likes of Christopher Columbus, Joan of Arc, King Henry VIII and one of his wives, Anne Boleyn, who lost her head centuries ago

"It's exciting as a teacher to Associates "A lot of them are in see how proud these kids are of their work," said Ted Younglas, seventh-grade teacher

> Younglas and fellow teacher Kathy Nichols helped students delve into history with a fiveweek lesson and a hefty peek at the Middle Ages The lessons culminated with a Renaissance Festival that allowed students to show the era in all its pageantry and all its inhumanity with topics as far ranging as heraldry and the Black Death

Before the actual all-day festival at Discovery, students were asked to pick a person or a topic to research

Students were asked to include a visual aide in their project

When festival day dawned, students turned out in splendor portraying their historical figure of choice or their topic, such as arms and armor

Booths for the festival were the common visual aide, which allowed more than 500 parents and other Discovery students to stop by, ask questions and get informed on the ms and outs of the Middle

Ages "We turned the entire seventh-grade wing into the Middle Ages," Younglas said

"We did a mini lesson on heraldry They made a coat of arms or put their family names on banners for the festival parade that opened the festival

They did a fantastic job' Curriculum was changed four years ago to include the Renaissance era


"So this is the fourth time we've done this It definitely gets better and better each time, Younglas said

were willing to pay more to keep the services they expect in Plymouth "Costs are going up, and I'd hate to see services decrease," said Christine Beaudoin "I play in the Community Band, so I'd like to continue to play in the concerts" Kathleen Mundt said it was

the level of services she currently enjoys that inspired her to vote "yes" on Proposal 1 "Do I want to pay more

taxes? No But, I would rather pay more taxes than lose services," said Mundt 'I really appreciate the services we have, and I don't want to lose employees or have less people on the police force"


City Commissioner Stella Greene, who will be one of

those determining what cuts will be made, said she was disappointed in the outcome

"It's going to be painful," said Greene "We're left with the dilemma of dismantling the picture-perfect city that's been the envy of communities across the state With cuts as drastic as we're left with making, there are going to be some things that will be impossible to reverse which will dramatically alter the community that we all value so much'

Commissioner Michele Potter was re-elected to a second four-year term by voters with a stance of no more taxes

"We need to sit down as a team - the commission and administration - and really start crunching numbers, understanding every process, and looking at ways to trim without cutting city services, and hopefully without cutting staff," she said Commissioner

Ron Loiselle, a proponent of Proposal 1, said the commission needs to meet quickly to decide on a direction "I believe this commission needs to look where we can cut this year, so we can have a small surplus next year when we know we're

going to have a problem," said Loiselle "We should be looking at a hiring freeze, and cut anything we won't need for the rest of this fiscal year to save money, because I'm expecting even bigger revenue sharing cuts from the state'

Workman will now switch hats, leaving the planning commission for the city commission when the winners are seated Monday night

Finishing second and third were incumbents Michele Potter and Dan Dwyer - with 1,197 and 1,089 votes, respectively

The top three vote-getters will serve four-year terms

With 947 votes, Anthony Guilliom finished fourth and received a two-year term on the city commission

"I'm really excited," said Guilliom of his election "I think we have a good team and the commission will work well together'

Peter Bunting, who lost in his first bid two years ago, fin-1shed fifth with 805 votes

Mayor Bill Graham did not seek re-election, and Mayor Pro Tem Colleen Pobur was term-limited and couldn't run

The main focus for the new city commission is obvious how to deal with projected budget deficits the next four years, with the most immediate a \$1 2 million shortfall in the 2004-05 fiscal year With the defeat of Proposal 1, which would have raised taxes to help absorb some of the shock, commissioners will have to take a hard look at the operations of the city

The Proposal 1 results will let us go back and take a good, hard look at the budget," said Workman

"And next time, and I think there will probably be a next time, we'll see something of this sort of proposal We'll do a better job of making the information more specific, and start sooner'

Potter, who has been a proponent of budget cuts versus raising taxes, said the voters have spoken, and it's time for commissioners and the administration to evaluate how services are delivered

'I'm humbled and honored that the residents of Plymouth entrusted me with another four-year term to do the right thing with their money and city," said Potter "I will do everything within my power to make sure we do the best job with the money we have to deliver the same quality of services the residents have been used to

Potter didn t count out the possibility of a tax increase in the future

"At some point, in years down the road, it will become an issue," she said "I just don't think now was the time to come forward and ask citizens to tax themselves, when it doesn't appear we've done an in-depth study on how to trim the budget"

Dwyer, who voted in favor of Proposal 1, said he was disappointed in the outcome

"The people spoke loud and clear, and now we'll have to go from there," he said

As for the cuts expected as a result of the defeat of the ballot proposal, Dwyer said, 'They will be huge I don't think any one of us has begun to realize how hard it's going to be And, I think a lot of things that make Plymouth a great place are going to change"

Guilliom looked at the defeat of Proposal 1 as a challenge to begin his tenure as a city commissioner

"I didn't think it had a snowball's chance in hell, and that's about how well it did," said Guilliom "Our work is going to be cut out for us, but that's OK because I'm up for a good challenge I think all of us are up for it'



To see a model of the ideal situation, we need not look to France We need only to look back in our own country's history And we need only look back a few decades, to a time when families understood the value of having a parent at home during the day to raise their own children, a time when families were willing to sacrifice material things in order to do what was best for their children

I also find it ironic that Gov Granholm is touting a program whose motto is "education begins at age zero" This coming from a woman who leaves two small children at home while she chose one of the most demanding positions in the state of Michigan

Gov Granholm has said in the past, "I found out that the brains of children who are nurtured, stimulated and loved actually look different than those of children who were raised in a high stress environment 'What could be more stressful for ayoung child than being dropped off by her mother each morning into a large group in a day care center where she'll be supervised by strangers? Gov Granholm, the Office of Governor will be available for a long time These precious years in your children's lives will not

Michigan has survived nearly 100 years without a mourning dove hunting season and there's no urgent need to lift that ban now

Nonetheless, legislation that would put these small. sweet-sounding songbirds in the cross-hairs is pending If passed, the mourning dove - a traditional symbol of peace - would join the ranks of game animals open to hunting

The legislation, H B 5209, was introduced in August by Rep Susan Tabor, a Delta Township Republican It was approved last week by the House Committee on Conservation and Outdoor Recreation and was scheduled to be considered Tuesday by the full House

Backers point out that mourning doves are hunted in 39 other states and say Michigan is missing out on tourism dollars by not allowing the birds to be targets here

Perhaps, but the argument that "everybody else is doing It so why shouldn't we?" is a relatively weak stance, especially since it wouldn't apply in so many other instances

Other than a vocal hunting lobby that says gunning for mourning doves can make for a challenging and tasty experience, there's little reason to believe Michigan residents want to see these birds come under fire


It's debatable whether mourning doves are a nuisance because of their numbers and therefore due for a controlled kill, but it's clear that they offer little in the way of meat and are about as threatening as pupples

Michigan hunters are good folk and they contribute a lot to the state through their sport and stewardship But ısn't it true that there are plenty of species of animals to hunt and fish to catch already?

Adding docile doves to the list of animals facing lethal force won't do much good to improve the public's perception of hunting and may only inspire unnecessary ill will

If our state's hunters really need to shoot mourning doves, let them go to Ohio or Indiana or Illinois or Wisconsin No one is trying to deprive them of this pursuit of happiness

But Michigan has protected these birds since 1905 and is none the worse for it Our lawmakers should respect this tradition and keep the bull's-eye off this particular target

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Time for governor to make bold statement on budget

There is a tide in the affairs of men Which taken at the flood leads on to fortune Omitted all the voyage of their life Is bound in shallows and in miseries

here comes a time in the career of all seriousminded politicians when a clear choice must be made between doing the safe thing and taking the bold and courageous step Gov Jennifer Granholm is at such a point

Although it hasn't received much notice in the media, virtually everybody with an interest in politics is still buzzing about her capitulation to

Detroit Mayor Kwame Kilpatrick and the Detroit Federation of Teachers in l'affair Thompson. To recount, Bob Thompson, a

retired Plymouth-area businessman, offered \$200 million to build 15 500-student independent charter high schools in Detroit with a targeted 90 percent graduation rate State legislation would be required, of course, and for a while it looked as though Gov Granholm, Mayor Kılpatrıck and the Republican-dominated

Legislature were about to agree on an enabling bill But, lo and behold, the Detroit Federation of

Teachers skipped work, staged an angry demonstration on the Capitol grounds and leaned on Kılpatrıck, who withdrew his support. Granholm then accused the Republicans of slipping unacceptable language into the draft bill And the whole thing collapsed in a maze of recriminations Tellingly, Janna Garrison, the president of the DFT, was quoted in a Time magazine piece last week as injecting racial politics into the deal "If someone from outside came to Bob Thompsons suburban town and said, 'I m gonna give you a lot of money for education, but we spend it my way,' they just wouldn't tolerate it

Virtually all the politicos I've talked to since have castigated the governor for not having the guts to stand up to the mayor and the DFT "Here's a governor with a demonstrated interest in kids and their education Now she's got a guy with \$200 million in his hand for kids in Detroit And the DFT and the mayor say, 'No deal' She should have stuck to it and challenged them about where they were gonna go, said one insider

And here's why all the criticism of Gov Granholm is of such moment just now The state faces another budget deficit crisis this fiscal year, this time a \$900 million shortfall Sadly, it's likely both the governor and the Legislature, left to their normal political instincts, will resort to a cuts-alone strategy to remedy the deficit. They'll take a nip here and a tuck there, but never have the guts to address the core issues that lurk behind the deficit These have to do with the basic structure of Michigan's tax system, the chronic structural deficit

built into the state budget and deeply ingrained bad habits in the way the state spends money

I urge Gov Granholm to take a courageous step and submit two entirely different state budgets One would solve the deficit by spending cuts alone and provoke screams of protest from every known constituency The other would propose a far-reaching restructuring of the workings, costs and revenues of state government At that point, the governor would be entirely justified in challenging the Legislature to have the guts to talk about the root causes of our financial problems rather than take the safely partisan course of fooling around their edges And out of such a discussion might emerge enough political courage to get at long-term solutions to our chronic budget problems

Here are two examples of what such a far-reaching budget might propose

1) Address defects in the architecture of the state's tax system Right now, the two big taxes are the 6 percent state sales tax on most goods (excluding food and prescription drugs) that yields around \$7 billion a year, and the Single Business Tax that is indescribably complex (though basically a tax on payroll) that yields around \$2 billion a year and makes Michigan look like a terrible place to do business Why not broaden the base on which the sales tax is levied to include services of most sorts, making it possible to maintain state revenues and allow a rate reduction? Experts tell me, for example, that eliminating the SBT and placing a reduced 5 percent sales tax on both goods and services would be roughly revenue-neutral, while adding a flat corporate profits tax would increase fairness

2) Correct silly ways of spending money Take, for example, the way the state pays for foster care Right now, the state pays by the day for custody of children whose family situation is unstable or unhealthy This costs around \$325 million per year, not counting medical expenses But the point of foster care is not to keep kids there, it is to get them either back to their families or into adoption The state should improve the incentives to reward either outcome

Of course, none of this will be easy Frankly, I wonder whether this term-limited Legislature has members with the experience to participate in such a dialogue And I wonder whether the governor's advisers have the guts to embark on such a courageous course But I do know that Gov Granholm is one of the few politicians around with the communication skills to explain and sell such a package to the voters of Michigan All she now needs is the courage of her convictions and the sense that there is, indeed, a tide in the affairs of not just men, but women, who are destined to lead

Kmart case teaches a stern lesson – but to wrong students

he check was not insubstantial

"What's this?" asked my wife, examining the 1 with three trailing digits "Tax rebate?

"Uh-uh," said I "Our share of a classaction lawsuit'

Which brings us to the ongoing tale of Kmart, southeast Michigan's homegrown retail giant

A few months ago, I wrote a column tak-ing Kmart to task It would never get out of its difficulties until it did a much better job of keeping its advertised products in stock At least according to me

Unfair, wrote back the wife of a Kmart management type The real problem, she alleged, stemmed from greedy, corrupt upper-level executives Turns out, she may be

right Trial began a few days ago for a pair of former Kmart executives who are accused of defrauding shareholders by manipulating corporate accounts

Trial doesn't always bring conviction and it's yet to be proved that the allegations of securities fraud are even true

But the two Kmart execs join a long list of 1990s-era corporate heads whose own heads are now on the Justice Department's chopping block

They join the Enron boys and the Tyco chief, whose private party/bacchanal has been popping up all over the news lately

Whatever the outcome in court in the local trial, these Kmart execs left a trail of closed stores and runed careers in their wake Stores I used to frequent in Southfield and Auburn Hills are among those now shuttered for good

Some of those now unemployed might be happy their corporate leaders are up before a judge Yet there's the sense that workers pay more for corporate mismanagement, in every case, than those directly responsible

Even if the worst happens (for the Kmart ex-execs), they'll probably serve out their time in a minimum security facility, then go back to a comfortable, if somewhat diminished, lifestyle, most likely with their retirement savings still in tow

Shareholders, i e folks like me, might get at least some of their "lost" investments back, too, as lawyers pick clean the corporate carcass

It's a far cry from the fate suffered by any company's laid off workers, many of whom have to burn up their own life savings while sweating out the possibility of a new job

Even in good economic times, it's estimated that a \$60,000-a-year corporate drone will need at least six months to find a similarly-paying job Check your own bills and life savings to find out just how costly those six months could be

Then, too, there are the struggles of those left behind, now working longer hours with less support

As I've said in the past, I hope Kmart succeeds With at least one store remaining in local communities from Farmington Hills to Lake Orion, and thousands of local residents still on staff at its Troy headquarters, Kmart's failure would be devastating to the local area

For what it's worth, Kmart stores seem to have picked up the pace since this year's massive post-holiday closings Stores seem tidier and better organized

with major items more readily available

That might not be enough to prevent further store closings and corporate layoffs, but it's a sign those in the front lines are doing their part

They're going to have to That's because when justice is served, workers are always last in line for a helping

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



The state finalists will take a second exam – a proctored, written exam at a selected loca-


tion near their home The state champion, along with a parent or guardian, will travel, expense-paid, to Orlando, Fla, for the national finals

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

No, the finish doesn't seem overly impressive But to Baker, the Rocks' performance was


"Well, everybody ran their personal bests, so you have to be happy," he said Can't ask for more than that, right? "You could," he answered, "but you'd be



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CC grinds down Brighton, 28-7

If you happened to be driving past Redford's Hilbert Junior High on Saturday afternoon, looked up at the scoreboard and saw 'Home 28, Visitor 7, you'd probably think that Redford Catholic Central had an easy time with Brighton

But it wasn't exactly the case – at least not for most of their Division 1, Region 3 district opener

True, the Shamrocks outgained the Bulldogs, 260 145 But it was one of those games where the raw numbers don't tell the story

'We had a battle on our hands," said CC coach Tom Mach as his team improved to 9-1 on the year and lived to play another day - in this case, right back at Hilbert on Saturday afternoon against 8-2 South Lyon at 1 p m


"We ended up with more points but it was a closer game than the score showed They have a very good defense and took away a lot of our trapping and some of our outside plays We went with our base blocking and it helped a bit"

After a first half where the Shamrocks and Brighton were virtually dead-even in passing (36 yards for Brighton to 16 for CC), rushing (90-90) and score (7-7), things finally started to go CC's way

"We went toe-to-toe with them and we were on defense too much in the second half," said Brighton coach Bill Murray as his team ended the year at 6-4 "We needed to control the football and we didn't When you are on defense the entire game, it wears you down'

It wasn't the entire game, but it seemed like it CC took a 14-7 lead on its first possession of the second half - a nine-play, 45-yard, 6 26 clock burner capped by Eric Vojtkofskys 4yard run

Brighton sandwiched two more possessions around another long, but empty, drive by CC When the Shamrocks got the ball back, they used another clock-burning drive of 49 yards and 11 plays in 4 53 to take a 21-7 lead with 5 52 left in the game - capped by a 10-yard scoring run by Derek Brooks in his longest play from

scrimmage in the contest

"They had a swarming defense and it really played great," said Brooks, who had 80 yards on 17 carries 'It seems like this year, it takes us a while to get going anyway - whether it's the second quarter or second half But their defense was much better than it was on film'

The Shamrocks added another touchdown late in the game as Darnell Tyson picked off a Doug Clark pass and went 28 yards for the final score

The first half was a different story as Brighton marched down the field on its first possession and looked like it was going to surprise the Shamrocks Anthony Besso sprinted 68 yards down the sideline on the Bulldogs' third play of the game and failed to score only because CCs Anthony Sabo caught him from behind But three plays later, quarterback Joe Powell flicked the ball to Chad Baliko on a play-action touchdown pass from the CC 9

CC had a chance to get on the board two possessions later, but Jason Gingell's 50-yard field goal try fell short He hit the first of his four extra points on the next possession after quarterback Dave Thomas capped a 52-yard drive with a fiveyard bootleg

'I think our defense did a nice job holding them in the first half," said Murray 'In the second half, they just muscled us CC's a big, physical team and eventually they will wear you down'

Vojtkofsky added 75 on the ground for CC in 17 carries, while Nick Barrett had 48 yards on 10 carries and Thomas had 37 on nine Besso had 68 yards on eight carries for Brighton, while Jordan Muns added 46 more

Shamrocks must get set for Lion passing

For the second straight week, Redford Catholic Central's football team is playing an opponent whose style is 180 degrees different than the one with which it built its reputation

Brighton, for years a pass-happy team with quarterbacks like Drew Henson Cullen Finnerty and Brendan Finnerty, morphed into a ground machine

"He sees the field very well and knows what secondaries are going to do, so he's able to find the open receiver,' Scheloske said "We have some very solid receivers, too, in Brett Curtis, Derek Wilcox and Jeff Schaible"

Along those lines, the Lions have gone from a ground team to a

spread-the-field-and-let-loose team "We just spread them out, let

them run and hide in coverage and hopefully, they'll let someone loose," Scheloske said "We try to hide and have someone pop up here and there d^r

Ever the observant coach, this hasn't gone unnoticed by Mach

"They can give anybody fits," Mach said 'They use four, sometimes five, receivers and put a lot of "I pressure on you by stretching the game across the field If you play a zone, they might beat you, if you play man-to-man, they might beat you You have to switch the defenses up and keep (Reedy) guessing

Compounding the issue is that the Lions do have a solid running back in Nate Spurgess, an 800-yard plus runner this season who ran for 164 yards against Western

"They will pass 95 percent of the time, but they can run,' Mach said "The running back is good and they have this fake quarterback draw that keeps defenses looking for the run"

As for CCs offense, the Lions fı know what to expect It doesn't make it any easier to defend, but Scheloske knows what to look for

'They want to run and lull a defense to sleep and pass here and there,' Scheloske said "They try to hang on to the football so your offense cant do anything'

And it's the same way for the Shamrocks defense

'The problem for us is trying to imitate what they do," Scheloske said "They're so big and physical on the defensive front, they move so quickly, that our scout kids can't imitate the speed and reaction they have"

Mach knows his team won t always be able to stop South Lyon But he'll settle for that

"With the way they throw the ball" you can't worry about stopping them every play,' Mach said "You can stop them eventually We just have to keep them guessing so they can't stay back and do what they want to do

"Hopefully, we can get pressure by our defensive line without too much stunting, but if not, we're ready to stunt"





What impressed Baker, though, were the drops Warner, 20 seconds off his previous best, Walsh, a 20-second drop, Kosteva, a 30-second drop, Kapadia, six seconds, and Fysh, eight seconds

Baker didn't alter his training pattern any from previous seasons, although everything seemed to work well 'Maybe we went to our speed work at the right time," he noted "It seemed to work well with this group

"But once we got into race shape, our

I m very happy with the way we ran Now we start getting greedy and looking forward to next year

He won't have to rebuild next year, that much is certain

It was everything a coach could have asked for

The performances were outstanding, but it was the timing that boosted their importance Salem's girls cross country team did as well as coach Dave Gerlach could have hoped, and the Rocks did it at the perfect time — the state finals

No, Salem wasn't a contender for a state championship But the Rocks did fin-1sh 16th in the 27-team field with 399 points, edging Western Lakes Activities Association rival Livonia Churchill (the Chargers were 17th), at Saturday's Division I state meet at Michigan International Speedway in Brooklyn

The end result left Gerlach gushing over his team's performance "We had four personal bests out of our top five,' he said It didn't really shock him, considering 10 Rocks broke 21 minutes this season "I know coaches who would kill to have one," he noted Two Rocks — Laura

Friedman and Hannah Cavicchio - broke 20 minutes

and all five scorers were at 20 20 or better

"We've never had that," saıd Gerlach "The best team I coached before this was in '96 They made it to the state finals, and this team would pound that team '

Quality of depth was the reason "In the past I've had some great distance runners," Gerlach said "They could go 10 miles at a good pace, but they didn't have the speed

This year's team had good foot-speed I had three frontrunners, any of them had the potential to be No 1"

Gerlach pushed this team harder than his others, increasing their mileage to 35 a week (up from 25 for past teams) and also spending more time working on their speed

"We did a lot of speed work," he said "I knew they could handle the mileage, and they showed me they could handle the speed work, too "This team has accom-

plished quite a bit"

Friedman and Cavicchio were at the top of the performance list for Salem Friedman finished 59th overall in 19 30 6, Cavicchio was 65th in 19 35 5

Next best for the Rocks was Lauren Kane, 122nd in 20 10 9, followed by Monica Przebienda, 134th in 20 18 5, and Amanda Kassem, 136th in 20 20 3 For all but Kane, the times were season-bests

Salem's other state-meet runners were Danielle Malone, who was 189th (21 10 6), and Lauren Medley, who placed 191st (21 11 3)

All things considered, the state meet was something for the Rocks to be collectively proud of But the best wasn't necessarily what they accomplished, but what lay ahead There were no seniors on the team, Friedman, Kane, Przebienda and Malone are juniors, Medley and Kassem are sophomores and Cavicchio 1s a freshman

"The outlook for next year 1s good," Gerlach said "We had 17 runners under 22 minutes and 14 return next year"

SC tips off the season, 7 30 p m Monday, Nov 10 at home against Marygrove College



BLANKETS

Blankets an illustrated novel by Craig Thompson (Top Shelf Pro ductions \$2995)

At 582 pages, "Blankets" is a doorstop of a book But its an illustrated novel, and doesn't take all that long to finish In fact, it's so engrossing that,

from the very first blackand-white sketch, many readers will feel it ends all too soon Illustrated by Craig Victoria Thompson,

Diaz

Cıty, "Blankets" tells the story of a young misfit (named Craig Thompson), growing up in Wisconsin (where the talented artist was raised)

who was born

in Traverse

Eventually, at a church camp, he meets a Michigan girl named Raina, his first love Their bittersweet relationship is at the center of this story, but the novel is considerably more than a teen-age romance It's also a story about family, friendship, and religious faith

While leading character, Craig, seems just a touch selfpitying now and then, most readers will root for him from beginning to end, anyway And all characters vivify the story, thanks not only to Thompson's ability to draw them with words, but also to his dazzling talent for illustration

With a line or a squiggle or a smudgy shadow, he's superb at setting a scene, depicting a mood, expressing the subtlest emotion

The story opens on a scene in which Craig and his younger brother, Phil, are sharing a bed

As most normal little boys do, these two are fighting over their share of the blanket It seems an almost comical scene Almost

Soon, though, one boy pushes the other boy out of bed, and their angry father storms into the room Almost before we realize what is happening, young Phil has been

jerked up, dragged off, and locked in "The Cubby Hole," a dark, disgusting place "uninsulated, unlit, and uninhabited – except by spiders and vermin'

"You'd better make yourself comfortable," the boys' father tells little Phil, as he closes up the tight space, leaving the terrified child to beg in the darkness

This is not the home of Beaver Cleaver

At school, things are not much better In fact, they're worse in some ways Frail, dreamy-eyed Craig is almost constantly taunted by classmates

"You look like a girl" and "faggot" are typical remarks tossed in his direction by some of the ham-fisted teens he encounters in the hallways

He's no less of a misfit within his fundamentalist church and church groups In fact, within his world, the Biblereading boy's only real escape seems to be through his art, although he often feels torn by the pleasure it brings him, and considers it too "secular" and "selfish'

And then he meets Raina. Rather a misfit herself at church camp, her parents are in the midst of a divorce, and she's often caught in the middle, while being left to shoulder the responsibilities of an adult

Some time after Raina and Craig meet, he goes to spend two weeks with her at her home in the snow-blanketed Upper Peninsula of Michigan She gives him a colorful blanket she has made for him and as his love for her deepens, so does the plot of this story

"Blankets" is a nicely written, reader-friendly tale that sometimes borders on the sentimental


But it's also awful-funny now and then, and ultimately touching and perceptive.

Though some of the illustrations are sexually explicit, they are never gratuitously so

And without the book's marvelous illustrations overall, the impact of "Blankets" would probably be considerably less

An oldtimer told me to liberally sprinkle oatmeal on the pet to absorb the skunk oils and to do this several times I figured he worked for Quaker Oats, but I remember a few years ago our boxer got skunked Oatmeal helped get rid of the lingering oils from the skin folds in her face Probably the most popular remedy I found and the one we used (successfully, I might add) is a mixture of 1 quart 3 percent hydrogen peroxide, 1/4 cup baking soda and a couple tablespoons of dish detergent (not dishwasher detergent) Much of the power comes from oxygen action, so you should use this mixture while it is still fizzing Never try to store this mixture, particularly in a sealed container, as the contamer could burst Once the fizzing stops, rinse the pet This formula will also work on humans

As for clothing and furniture, soap, water and ammonia are

said to work well There are several good odor neutralizers

on the market Skunk-off, Nil-Odor and Smells-be-gone are just a few brand names These, or several others are available at most pet supplies and from veterinarians A product we have successfully used for just about all smells in our house is

OdoBan available at Sam's Club Only time will eliminate

skunk odor Even using any or all of the above, you'll probably notice some lingering smell on a damp day Above all, use caution and common sense when removing skunk odors I once heard of a person using tomato juice to remove skunk odor from a light beige sofa Need I say more about common sense?

Contractors should be licensed before you hire them

Q Bob asks I enjoyed your article about replacing foundations

When I faced this problem a few years ago, I found that the two bids I received from general contractors were twice what I eventually paid a house mover to do the job Whats more, since house movers do the shoring up of houses daily, I found that their equipment and experience were far more

suited for this task than that of either of the general contractors

A We applaud your creativity, but we have a few reservations about the 50 percent savings you report House movers have the equipment required to move a home and make way for a new foundation, but whomever you hire, it is important to make sure that he is properly licensed by the state to do the kind of work needed We recommend that the services of a licensed soils engineer

and a heensed civil or structural engineer be enlisted to determine the proper size and strength of the replacement foundation Since the structural integrity of a home depends primarily on a solid foundation, this is one area of construction where one should not skimp When receiving bids, make sure that each contractor uses the same specifications List the specifications and have the bidders price the differences The right price is usually the average of the bids

Prepare your home for winter

Check roofing, heating, drainage before cold weather hits

Americans recently marked the end of Daylight Savings Time by turning back their clocks This time of year should also serve notice to homeowners to replace smokealarm batteries

According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, fire is the second leading cause of unintentional death in the home Each year, nearly 2,700 people die in residential fires, and there are more than 330,000 residential fires reported to fire departments

Manufacturers and fire-safety experts say if your unit is more than 10 years old, an alarm that sounds when the button is pushed just means it's getting electricity and not necessarily that the sensor chamber is activating properly To be certain, either test older units with a smoke device or replace them Sensor chambers can become dirty and ineffective or non-operational even if the button test works For safety's sake replace an older unit, then you'll know it'll be workıng

Though safety is first, there is a laundry list of other homemaintenance tasks that should be performed as we move through fall and into winter The following tasks will help save money on utilities and prevent the need for major repairs, improve comfort and safety, save energy and preserve the integrity of your home

Gutters and downspouts: Wayward water is one of a home's biggest enemies - especially rainwater that is shed off the roof of an average home When allowed to collect at the perimeter of a foundation, excessive water can result in a

damp and musty basement or cause foundation movement that produces cracks over windows and doors If your home doesn't have gutters and downspouts, install them If it does, be sure they are clean before heavy rains begin Consider installing a gutter protection system to prevent leaves and other debris from clogging gutters

Drainage: Having clean gutters and downspouts is only piece of the water damage prevention puzzle A mistake that many make is to allow downspouts to discharge at the base of the foundation This condition is worse than not having gutters at all due to the high concentration of water

To avoid this problem, downspouts should discharge into a subsurface drainage system and into a municipal storm drain or other water-collection facility Further minimize ponding around the foundation by ensuring that all soil immediately surrounding the house is graded to drain away from the foundation

Landscape Irrigation: Throttle back on the amount of water used to irrigate landscaping by adjusting automatic timers and use the "rain-off" switch when weather dictates If you live in a part of the country where the mercury dips below freezing, use compressed air to blow water out of irrigation lines to prevent freeze damage

Water heater and plumbing pipes: You can maximize your water heating dollar by removing sediment at the base of your water heater's tank The sediment that collects over time greatly reduces burner efficiency and can even cause damage to the interior lining of the tank when allowed to superheat Adjust burners for

the most fuel-efficient and safest combustion For flames, blue is good, and yellow isn't Uninsulated water pipes are an energy-waster and a burst pipe waiting to happen Insulating cold water lines will prevent a burst pipe during freezing weather while well-insulated hot water lines will improve both energy efficiency and comfort as hot water will be delivered more promptly

Roofing: The time to discover you have a leaking roof should not be during the middle of a rain storm Replace damaged shingles, patch damaged flashing and remove surface debris to facilitate proper watershed and prevent leaks

Binoculars provide a means of inspecting shingles and flashings without getting on the roof

Attic insulation and ventilation: According to the US Department of Energy, a wellinsulated attic is one of the best ways to improve energy efficiency, save money and increase comfort

A well-insulated and properly ventilated attic will also prevent ice dams from forming

Weather-stripping and caulking: Gaps around windows and doors are a leading cause of drafts that rob a home of comfort and result in high utility bills All exterior doors should be weather-stripped and have an adjustable door shoe and threshold

Weather-stripping and vinyl gaskets at door shoes and thresholds that have become brittle over time should be replaced with new supple material Trim that surrounds windows and doors (at both the interior and exterior) should be caulked to prevent drafts Gaps and large penetrations, such as those made to accommodate plumbing pipes or conduits, should be filled with expandable foam sealant

Siding: Gaps and cracks in siding should be caulked and patched to prevent leaks and

the subsequent damage Raw siding should be primed as a means of temporary waterproofing until spring, then a more thorough job can be done

Brick exteriors should be sealed with a high- quality masonry sealer to prevent freeze-thaw damage

Fireplace: Creosote-lined fireplace flues are a chimney fire - and potentially hazardous explosion - just waiting to happen The National Chimney Sweep Guild recommends that a fireplace flue be inspected before each season of burning In addition, the guild recommends that a fireplace be cleaned after each cord of wood is burned Inspect the condition of the spark arrestor that sits atop that chimney to ensure that are no tears in the fabric that could allow embers to escape and result in a house and fire

Before making your first fire for the season, be sure to open the damper and leave it open whenever there is a fire in the fireplace

Heating: Give your home's heating system the once-over to be sure that all components are in good working order, clean and well lubricated Be sure that the burners are clean and the flame 1s properly adjusted Replace dirty filters to improve air flow and efficiency and to lower utility costs

Also, consider installing one or more decorative ceiling paddle fans to move heated air trapped high up at ceilings Doing so will make your home more comfortable and lower your heating bill A side benefit is reduced condensation at windows and glass doors

A little seasonal home maintenance can prevent big problems down the road and save you money

Architect turns from teapots to towel bars and faucets

NEWARK, N J (AP) – Long known as the designer of a best-selling teapot and a host of other stylish household items, architect Michael Graves has now turned his attention to bathroom and kitchen fixtures

Graves developed the line in partnership with Delta Faucet Co, marking the first time the world's largest faucet maker has collaborated with a celebrated designer Indianapolisbased Delta Faucet is a wholly owned subsidiary of Masco Corp, of Taylor, Mich

The Michael Graves Collection, which includes about two dozen items ranging from faucets and robe hooks to towel bars and lighting, is aimed at average consumers, he said, just like the products he markets through Target stores, although this line will not be sold at Target

"We wanted something affordable," Graves said in a telephone interview from Princeton, where he makes his home and bases his firm, Michael Graves & Associates "While I've worked for all economic groups, I wanted something that would be built by builders, homeowners, people who would go into a big box store"

The new line seeks to tap into the growing, multibillion U S bath market, which is being driven by remodelers and builders who are constructing larger and more lavish bathrooms and kitchens The results of the collaboration, which Delta is announcing Tuesday, are to be unveiled in January at the International Builders' Show in Las Vegas, in conjunction with the 50th

anniversary of Delta Faucets The company and Graves declined to display the line or release pictures before then, but Graves offered this description "The inspiration for us was certainly to look good What looks good? For me, what looks good is what feels good"

"We tried to make something where the various parts of this puzzle are easy to understand," Graves said "Everything is pretty obvious It's done in a way that fits your hand"

While the collection entails a single design line, buyers will be able to customize faucets through a choice of different handles, he said

It extends the line and the look from one bath to the next,' Graves said

"We hope that all of the elements work together, but have their own personalities"

The collection has been two years in the making, but was not delayed by an illness that left Graves paralyzed below the waist in February, he said Doctors had initially thought

he was stricken by a viral infection called myelitis, or bacterial meningitis

Graves, 69, now uses a wheelchair to get around, and said he hopes recent surgery may restore his ability to walk He sees no incongruity

between designing buildings such as the Team Disney headquarters in Burbank, Calif, and designing housewares, such as a fondue set marketed by Target

"There was a time when we made products for the home," Graves said, citing a tradition in which the architect would outfit the home with lighting and furniture He pointed to the work of Frank Lloyd Wright and Le Corbusier

"At some point in time, the architect abandoned the idea of craft tradition and handmade and the disciplines were split," with specialists such as interior designers and landscapers filling the void, said Graves, who was awarded the American Institute of Architects' highest honor, the Gold Medal, in 2001

The Michael Graves Collection will be available at home improvement centers and through remodeling and new construction channels, said Ray A Kennedy, Delta Faucet senior vice president for sales and marketing

The company chose to work with Graves because he "believes in making good design accessible to all," Kennedy said

The increased attention being given to bathrooms and kitchens includes "a strong desire by homeowners for designer products that reflect their distinctive lifestyles," he said

Vinyl fencing sales at \$600 million - and growing

Most homeowners don't hide their feelings when it comes to maintaining a wood fence

Homeowners despise the annual ordeal that forces them to repaint, replace or shore up cracked or rotted timbers

But now, fence fans can kiss dreaded maintenance goodbye New vinyl fences are seeing to that

The vinyl fence industry accounts for \$600 million in annual residential fence sales, up from \$10 million as recently as 1990 And those numbers will only rise, rise, rise as homeowners get a taste of free weekends away from fence upkeep

"We don't see any slowdown in vinyl fence sales in the next five to seven years,' says John Harsch of Kroy, a vinyl fence manufacturer and a supplier to The Home Service Store "We'll

ź

grow at least 25 percent a year as we have for the last seven or eight years'

Harsch says non-wood fencing is gaining rapidly on market leader, wood, because once a vinyl fence is in place, there is virtually no maintenance aside from an annual hosing off of dirt and grime

Homeowners should pay particular attention to the amount of protective compounds and longer warranty that come with better grades of vinyl Quality vinyls have higher concentrations of impact modifiers and Ultra Violet (UV) inhibitors Impact modifiers provide strength, while UV inhibitors protect against brittleness Top-grade fencing will have a lifetime warranty and adhere to American Society of Testing and Materials (ASTM) guidelines The warranty for lower grade vinyls may be limited to a few years, if that

The average installed fence in North America is 200 feet in total length

Consumers should expect to pay \$25 to \$55 per running foot for a vinyl fence, including installation Variables include the height of the fence and the number of gates Vinyl comes in traditional white as well as tan, gray and khakı Newer vinyls even mimic a wood gram

Because vinyl fence has some unique installation requirements. Harsch recommends homeowners hire professionals 'A professional knows the soil conditions, the slope of the lot, and knows how to handle gates, post holes and obstacles," says Harsch

"They know how to overcome the little things, like what to do when you hit a tree root or a rock " The installer should be certified by the American Fence Association The Association Web site is

The biggest seller in nonwood fencing? A 6-foot privacy fence "Really, the smaller the yard, the bigger the need for fencing," says Harsch

It defines your area and gives you the privacy you want That's what a fence 1s for But there's no need to maintain it year in and year out That hassle has been taken care of"

Think through the project and select everything to be included This selection will determine the budget Allow 10-20 percent of the budget for changes that may come up later

The best way to save money is through product choices Shop around and compare products and prices to see if you can get the same look with a lower priced alternative "Keep an open mind and be creative," suggests Helfman

Considering the amount of labor that goes into some proj-

ects, there may be a less timeconsuming option Some homeowners choose to start small with plans to add on later, to help spread the cost out However, staging a remodel in this way can sometimes cost more in the long run Ask your remodeler

Adding square footage to a home can be costly Other ways to add space include space reconfiguration, remodeler lingo for stealing space from a neighboring room such as using a linen closet for a bathroom expansion Another way to give the illusion of added space in a small room is with a bay window, skylight or vaulted ceilings

If you are going to add square footage, a two-to-four foot addition may eliminate the need for excavation and foundation changes

In the kitchen, reuse appliances if possible and build new cabinets around them, which can save thousands of dollars Keep major fixtures in place to avoid moving plumbing,

wiring and jacks

Chrome faucets are the least expensive and won't be out-ofdate when color schemes change In flooring, vinyl or laminate 1s less expensive than wood, tile or slate

Use existing floor if it's in good shape A hardwood floor may be underneath your old vinyl, ready to be sanded and refinished A synthetic floor leveler can be installed over existing vinyl flooring with new floor on top, eliminating the need to rip up the old flooring

Cabinets are the bulk of the cost in a kitchen Refacing cabinets is a major savings If you go with new, choose standard over custom cabinets or a combination if possible

For countertops, laminate is the most economical choice Add trim in wood or tile for some pizzazz Connect new light fixtures to an existing box instead of adding new lighting, which may require a new ceil-

To cut costs with a bathroom

remodel, a worn tub can be reglazed or replaced Less expensive marble sheets and fiberglass surrounds are easier





Experience (Greentree Publishing, \$19 95) is her first cookbook

Measure all ingredients and have them ready to go before you even turn on the mixer This bit of preparation makes for a smoother baking experience, and eliminates frustration

When using butter, margarine or cream cheese, always take out of wrapper when cold Put it in a bowl you will be using and cover with plastic wrap or plate for 1-3 hours prior to using

To grease pans, take paper towel and spread Crisco - or similar vegetable shortening generously around sides and bottom of all inner surfaces

Use this tip for grating lemons, hmes, or oranges First cut fruit in half and squeeze out the juice Grate 1/2 fruit at a time by putting four fingers into the hollow of the fruit and putting your thumb on the outside skin Then grate it against the grater while you rotate the fruit half Your fingers will be protected

Lee also recommends using the pulp that you have squeezed It helps to intensify the flavor This is in addition to the measured amount of citrus juice Of course, you should remove and discard the seeds

Cakes usually unmold better when they are lukewarm about 15 minutes after removal from the oven The cooler they get, the more likely they are to stick to the sides and bottom of the pan

To unmold pans, place a flat platter on top of lukewarm cake and invert Sometimes after inverting, covering the bottom of the pan with a hot damp towel for a few minutes will make the cake come out more easily

To freeze, put cake uncovered in freezer for about 2-3 hours When no longer sticky, slide cake into large zippered plastic bag and continue to freeze and store

Butternut squash 1s one of the handlest and healthlest vegetables you can serve

It might win the vegetable versatility award, as you can bake or roast it, steam or boil it, use it in stews or a stir-fry Butternut squash is good in soups, main dishes, as a side dish, and even for dessert, where it can take the place of pumpkin or sweet potato as a pie filling

The slightly sweet, nutty flavor of butternut squash is enhanced by a wide range of seasonings In America we tend to stick to cinnamon and nutmeg, but butternut squash also turns up in highly spiced North African stews, chile pepperspiked Latin dishes and in incendiary Thai curries It is even delicious seasoned with Mediterranean herbs such as thyme and oregano

The texture of butternut squash is flexible enough to be served in hearty chunks, or finely chopped and mixed into risotto, or whirled into a creamy puree that is delicious presented as a soup or a side dish

Nutritionally, butternut squash has more vitamin C and beta-carotene than any other winter squash It is also easier

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

SEARED SCALLOPS ON WATERCRESS WITH FRESH PINEAPPLE SALSA

Winning Recipe of the 2002 Search For the Seasoned Chef Recipe Contest

Marinating the scallops infuses fresh citrus flavor to this appetizer However, marinate them only 15 minutes to assure scallops remain tender during cooking

1 cup lime juice 1 ½ tablespoons Diamond Crystal Kosher Salt 24 sea scallops

3 tablespoons olive oil

1 bunch watercress large stems removed

(about 4 cups)

Balsamıc vinegar

1 orange cut into wedges if desired 16 red pepper strips if desired

Stir together lime juice and salt in large glass bowl Stir in scallops Cover and refrigerate 15 minutes Make Pineapple Salsa (below) Drain scallops in large colander at least 5 minutes

Heat $1-\frac{1}{2}$ tablespoons oil in heavy 10-inch skillet over high heat Sear half the scallops in hot oil 1-2 minutes per side or until scallops are firm and opaque in center (Reduce heat to medium-high if scallops are very thick, and cook 3-4 minutes per side)

Repeat with remaining oil and scallops

Divide watercress and Pineapple Salsa among eight salad plates Sprinkle with balsamic vinegar Place three scallops over salsa Garnish with orange wedges and red pepper strips

4 cups diced fresh pineapple (about 1 small)

/2 cup finely chopped onion

1 red bell pepper chopped



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
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

Condo trash ordinance unfair, legal

We have a city ordinance that prohibits trash collection from condominiums based upon economic considerations. I think that is unfair and unreasonable. Do you have any comment?

I agree with you that it is unfair and unreasonable, but unfortunately, the federal appellate courts have felt that it's not a violation of the US Constitution's Equal Protection Clause The courts have stated that because of the presumption of constitutionality, and the legitimate economic rational for these types of ordinances, the ordinance generally survives equal protection scrutiny and is upheld It does not mean, however, that you cannot exert political pressure on your local municipality to change these conditions


Can our association amend our documents regarding the leasing of condominium units to eliminate leasing?

A number of cases in Florida, including a case from the Supreme Court of Florida, have upheld the right of an association to amend its documents to prohibit owners from leasing condominium units The courts have said that that was a valid exercise of the association's amendment power because the owners were on notice that the leasing provisions in the master deed were subject to amendment In the case at hand in Florida, condominium documents were amended to limit leasing of units to no more than nine months in any 12month period and prohibiting the leasing of all units within the first 12 months of ownership

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No cash, no excuse

omebuyers with very lit-tle cash — or very little desire to spend their cash — often use high loanto-value loans to purchase properties Unlike traditional mortgage lenders who grant loans based primarily on borrowers' strengths, 'equity lenders" grant mortgages based more on the value of the property

Buying a home using a very small down payment lets borrowers leverage their investment. If you pay \$10,000 out-of-pocket for a home that appreciates \$5,000 per year, you would achieve a 50 percent annual rate of return on your investment Purchase the same property with \$1,000 instead, and your rate of return jumps to 500 percent

FHA mortgages are great for homebuyers with small down payments Qualified FHA borrowers can get up to 97 percent financing to purchase homes if the loan amounts do not exceed prescribed limits Others with badly bruised credit, those in need of 100 percent financing, or those requiring very large or "jumbo" mortgages, may still qualify for "FHA lookalikes" which some lenders offer to fill those niches

Equity lenders offer loans (or loan combinations) totaling up to 100 percent of a property's value without deeply scrutinizing the borrowers' credit history Most will also allow the property seller to pay for the borrower's closing costs and will not require escrow accounts Mortgage insurance premiums are usually factored into the interest rate so they can be tax-deductible




Beautiful land, not golf, reason people choose home on fairway

Living in a home along a golf course has long been a sign of serious wealth After all, condominiums are not built along golf courses Or are they?

More and more subdivision and condominium communities are going up along golf courses You don't have to play golf to enjoy living in one of these golf course developments, said David Steuer, owner/manager of Steuer & Canvasser Inc of Farmington Hills, which developed Golfside Village of Superior and Golfside Village ofWestland Many people, perhaps most of the people who buy condominiums along golf courses, do not play golf But they like to be associated with the golfing lifestyle and perceive many benefits from living next to a golf course "Only 30 percent of the people who buy along a golf course actually play golf," said Paul Robertson, president of Robertson Brothers "It's just such high-quality open space It's well-maintained It's always green And for those who enjoy people watching, there's always someone walking by It's all good and no bad



benefit than a big deal," said Jill Gallagher, the sales manager at the condominium community

"Not a lot of the people are really excited to be on a golf course," Gallagher said "Most of the people I've talked with are more interested that they won't have to concern themselves with whether their neighbor mows his grass and takes care of his yard They know the golf course will

It isn't just the beautiful land For some future homeowners, its the activity 'People like to sit on their balconies and watch the active sports, said James Clarke, Robertson Brothers vice president and chief operating officer "It's a good place for

"When an opportunity to built along a golf course comes up, we make contact with the seller and see whether he's interested in working with us to develop a golf course community," Clarke said "We can go in and tell the owner of the golf course that we have experience doing these type of projects We are familiar with the spaces necessary and the way homes should be built along courses In some cases, we build on land made available to us by the golf course In others, we buy land next to a golf course and give some of the land to the golf course in exchange for the right to build

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COMMUNITIES BENEFIT

Golf course condominium developments can be good for the communities in which they are built "The golf course takes up maybe 150 acres that otherwise might be filled with more homes and stores," Steuer said "This way, there is less traffic and puts fewer cars on the neighborhood streets'

These condos use land efficiently, yet the "attached" golf course provides the feeling of extraordinary spaciousness Pretty land is just one of the benefits of a golf course community

"There is a certain amount of prestige associated with golfing communities," said Suzette Collins, sales representative at

vice president and chief operating officer, and Melanie McCarthy stand in front of Melanie's condo at Links of Fellow Creek in Canton

The Links of Fellows Creek in Canton "And people like to be a part of the things they enjoy

"A lot of people come in here (The Links of Fellows Creek) because they are golfers and want to be identified as a member of a golf course community But we also get a lot of people who like the look of a home along a golf course'

OPEN SPACE

Even having a home along a fairway is not critical to many people "Just having the golf course there adds another 155 acres of open space to our condominium community (Golfside Village of Superior)," Steuer said "People love it They love the scenery The land is maintained by someone else It's paid for by someone else'

"Having the lush green backdrop of a golf course, this place (The Ponds at Gateway in Romulus) has a resort atmosphere Coming here is like being on vacation," said Ron Benivegna, president of Benivegna Building Co in West Bloomfield

"The golf course here (The Ponds at Gateway) is more like a people-watching"

'Some golf courses allow neighbors to cross country ski in the winter," Steuer said 'That means year-around recreation"

More than half the land at Pine Knob Enclaves condo development in Independence Township is devoted to open space, said Mario D'Agostini His condominium development adjoins Pine Knob Golf Course

People who buy a condo at that development get a deal -\$5,000 worth of golfing at the course is included in their purchase price

D'Agostim also made a deal with the landowner so he could build alongside a golf course 'The man who bought the golf course bought it with an additional 20 acres included We are building on that additional 20 acres,' D'Agostini said

THE FUTURE

There would seem to be an extreme shortage of space next to golf courses, but Robertson says that's not necessarily so

"Golf courses have been a bit overbuilt, so we can sometimes make deals that benefit both the golf course owner and Robertson Brothers by converting the last nine holes into a condominium community," he said

Because it's the beautiful land, more than the sport of golf, that attracts people, developers are looking beyond golf courses

"We're always looking for more high-quality land," Robertson said "Our next opportunity may be building along two lakes near Milford It's the same high-quality open space along lakes that you find along golf courses"

HISTORY

The local boom in golf course community probably began in the 1980s, when Robertson Brothers bought a former gravel pit in Bloomfield Township

"It was unbuildable," Robertson said "I was turning over in my mind what could be done with the land, and I came up with the idea of putting a nine-hole golf course on top of the gravel'

That plan became The Heathers

'We acquired the land in '84, but weren't able to begin construction of the homes until '89," Robertson said

"Our interest in golf course communities sorta rolled on from The Heathers," Clarke said "A golf course is a good amenity for the lifestyle we're selling

MINIMUM DOWN

If you decide to pursue a minimum-down home purchase, the lender will validate that the property is worth the requested amount You should plan on added time and expense for a "review appraisal" prior to final loan approval Also, expect to pay a slightly higher interest rate on your new mortgage, especially if the PMI is factored into the rate A very high LTV makes for a more risky mortgage because the borrowers have a small or non-existent ownership stake

There are plenty of discounted homes on the market right now A small or non-existent down payment should not keep you from a great opportunity If you can secure an appropriate "nothing down" deal right now, you could realize some hearty gains as the economy revs back up

Mortgage rates dip this week

Mortgage rates around the country edged down this week, a dose of good news for people thinking about buying a home For the week ending Oct 31, the average rate on 30-year mortgages dipped to 5 94 percent, down from 6 05 percent the previous week, Freddie Mac, the mortgage giant, reported Thursday in its weekly nationwide survey of mortgage rates

Rates on 30-year mortgages have bounced up and down since the middle of June when they slid to 5 21 percent, the lowest level in more than four decades

"Fear of inflation is still unwarranted And, that should keep mortgage rates from rising too quickly or steeply anytime in the near future," said Frank Nothaft, Freddie Mac's chief economist

For 15-year mortgages, a popular option for refinancing, rates declined to 5 26 percent, from 5 39 percent last week Rates for one-year adjustable mortgages averaged 3 74 percent, down slightly from last weeks 3 76 percent

Even with the recent gyration in mortgage rates, home sales are expected to set new record highs this year And, home-mortgage refinancing activity remains healthy


The Mortgage Bankers Association of America reported that refinancing activity accounted for 53 3 percent of all mortgage applications filed last week, up from 50 5 percent in the previous week

'The ARM share of applications is at its highest point in over two and a half years," said the association's manager of member services Michael Cevarr Adjustable-rate mortgages accounted for 26 5 percent of all mortgage applications filed last week

The nationwide averages for mortgage rates do not include add-on fees known as points Thirty-year and 15-year mortgages each carried an average fee of 0 6 point, while one-year ARMs carried an average fee of 0 7 point this week

A year ago, rates on 30-year mortgages averaged 6 13 percent, 15-year mortgages were 5 51 percent and one-year adjustable mortgages stood at 4 25 percent


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

If you're looking for a well-appointed, rugged SUV but don t want to have to shell out way north of \$40,000 for it, what you're looking for is the Mercury Mountaineer It's powerful, it's stylish, it's roomy, and the upper versions of it are full stocked with the multiple amenities that SUV buyers prefer

And although it essentially is the Mercury version of the much plainer Ford Explorer, the 2003 Mountaineer I drove was much more reminiscent of the upscale Lincoln Aviator and Navigator than of the Explorer Its an impressive package, especially for the price

Mountaineer emerged in 1997 when Ford Motor Co took advantage of the SUV sales boom by re-badging the popular Explorer as a Mercury, giving it unique front and rear styling and somewhat different equipment Fortunately, Mountaineer was able to escape relatively unscathed from the human and business disaster that was created by Ford with Explorer s tire-related rollover debacle in 2001 A complete redesign of Mountaineer for the 2002 model year has kept it fresh

The design is bold, expressive and unapologetically aggressive, with a large grille that stretches from headlight to headlight, stylish 17-inch machined-aluminum wheels on the Premier version that I drove, running boards, chromed roof rails, and a moonroof Mountaineers appearance contrasts nicely with the blandness of Explorer, a necessity for the Mercury version to be considered in the near-luxury class with its higher-priced competitors In fact, while Explorer seemed designed to fade innocuously into its typical suburban setting, Mountaineer actually makes a design statement in a crowded SUV field where it s increasingly difficult to get noticed

Like Explorer, Mountaineer's standard powertrain is a four-liter, single-overhead-cam V6 engine mated to a five-speed automatic transmission driving the rear wheels This engine generates 210 horsepower and 254 pound-feet of torque All-wheel drive is available up and down the lineup For the Premier version, a 4 6liter V8 is available, putting out 239 horsepower and 282 pound-feet of torque, and I found it more than substantial enough Acceleration was responsive enough for a vehicle this massive, producing a satisfying rumbling that quickly reminded me of

Mountaineers truck-base origins At 14 miles a gallon in the city and 19 on the highway, Mountaineer's fuel efficiency isn't exceptional for its class - but neither is it a concern

More softly tuned than Explorer, it was clear that Mountaineer is designed to coddle driver and occupants on the pavement, not off - although it is capable of towing up to 7,300 pounds The independent rear suspension gives Mountaineer a pleasantly firm ride and helps the chassis swallow up all but the biggest bumps and potholes on the roadway Handling is excellent, predictable and stalbe in corners and higher speed turns But for some reason, Explorer offers an anti-skid system that is unavailable in Mountaineer

Where Mountaineer will most impress buyers, however, is inside For 2003, Mercury added a substantial list of new standard equipment, including securityapproach lamps that nicely light up the area around the vehicle, automatic head lamps, dual illuminated visor vanity mirrors, heated exterior mirrors and power-adjustable pedals Luxury models received color-keyed running boards and an Audiophile sound system as standard, and Premier added the power sunroof, a safety canopy system of head airbags, and rollover-protection sensors bundled with a reverse sensing system

The interior space in Mountaineer is impressively large for a vehicle that, on the outside, doesn t necessarily look as if it will yield that much room Seven can be seated comfortably in this vehicle with a nifty

(though not huge) cargo area left over in the rear The new DVD-entertainment system for the rear seats came in handy for my teenaged son during one of those long parking lot waits for Mom There's also an easy new rear-entry and -exit system for third-row passengers

The interior of the Premier version is nicely swathed in a pleasing blend of black and gray leathers, including the leather-wrapped steering wheel A nice touch that you still seldom see in any SUV was an amply sized, open tray on the floor and toward the front of the center console, which was the perfect size and configuration to serve as a generic catch-all for things like cell phones, house keys, change, a pen, sunglasses, a wallet - even a purse Wisely, instead of dividing the real estate up into a bunch of tiny compartments, Mercury kept it whole - and handy

The only esthetic exception I took to the Mountaineer inside was a patterned, metallic-looking (but definitely plastic) trim around the audio console on the dashboard and in certain other places It smacked of the sort of low-quality compromise of which you knew Mercury had to make a few at this price point but were hoping not to find evident

Fortunately, signs of compromise in the Mountaineer are few and far between Its worth putting on your short list for this class of SUV



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

f television is an accurate barometer, the entertainment-seekers are viewing less fiction and more reality

Hot Ticket

And that's probably why documentaries are so popular of late, said Chris Walny, the brainchild of Detroit Docs, a local fes tival of documentaries set to run Friday Sunday at three locations

It's part of that reality-TV craze People love a real story It's so much juicer," said Walny, a freelance PBS producer who resides in Royal Oak But it's also a great way to gain perspective on issues and other cultures

In its second year, Detroit Docs features 50 documentaries by filmmakers living as close as here in Michigan and as far away as Japan

Show times vary at each of the participating venues the Birmingham 8 theater, Detroit Film Center (formerly the Detroit Film Coalition) and Hastings Street Ballroom in Detroit

Suffice to say, Detroit Docs films are running all day into the wee hours of the night all weekend long

Documentary subjects traverse a wide spectrum, from Tom Dowd & The Language of Music, a profile of the legendary music producer with appearances by Ray Charles, Eric Clapton and other big names, to Classic Cruise Mania's footage of the Woodward Dream Cruise, to Hot & Bothered, an inside look at the feminist pornography industry

Scrabylon, a film about the super-com petitive world of tournament Scrabble, comes from Scott Petersen, a filmmaker who grew up in Birmingham and now lives in Los Angeles

Among the 30 filmmakers represented, 19 live in Michigan

Last year, it was very difficult to find local films, so I'm hoping the festival inspired people,' said Walny 'One of my intentions is to support local filmmakers and give them an outlet for their work"

Documentary filmmaking is on the rise here and across the nation Advances in technology have made film equipment more accessible and affordable

But making a documentary film is one thing, getting it into theaters and securing distribution is another Film festivals give directors a venue and exposure, said Walny

They also give audiences an opportunity to see works they're not likely to encounter in mainstream theaters, said Katherine Weider, a 34-year-old filmmaker from Ann Arbor whose documentary is showing at the festival



Weider's film, In a Heartbeat The Story of Mosaic Youth Theatre, follows the Detroit performance group of at-risk, inner-city kids ages 12-18 from the audition process to performance

The program provides nine months of free intensive training in acting, vocal music and technical theater Ensemble members work with professional actors, writers, musicians and designers, rehearsing after school and on weekends The students are involved in every element of production and ultimately perform at Music Hall in Detroit

"Mosaic is a real story This group of

kids and their stories are moving and powerful," said Weider, who has a master's degree in film and video studies from the University of Michigan and works as a freelance producer "It's a really, really intense program There's something really special going on there"

However, *Mosaic* isn't the cliche story of inner-city youth making good, said Weider 'That story is really old, it's one that perpetuates stereotypes Mosaic shows another image of Detroit teenagers and teenagers in general"

Stories like the one told in *Mosaic* aren't likely to emerge from the Hollywood filmmaking machine, which is what makes film festivals so interesting


Big screen Terrific acting compensates for casting in 'Human Stain'

He won an Academy Award as serial killer Hannibal Lecter

He's played Hitler, Nixon and Picasso He's been a servile butler and fearless vampire hunter Van Helsing Now Anthony Hopkins has one of his toughest jobs convincing audiences he's black.

Hopkins and Nicole Kidman star as doomed lovers in the beautifully performed, artfully constructed *The Human*



Starn, adapted from Philip Roth's novel by director Robert Benton and screenwriter Nicholas Meyer

As good as the leads and their co-stars are, it's a stretch for viewers to accept Hopkins, a pasty-faced Welshman, as a light-skinned African-American who has been passing as white for most of his life

Stretching the credibility gap further, the young actor (the biracial Wentworth Miller) plausibly pulling that ruse as the same character in flashbacks bears not a remote resemblance to Hopkins

That makes it hard to relate to them as the same person Millers introduction to the film is disorienting, triggering viewers to pause and dubiously ask themselves, "Wait, so that's supposed to be young Anthony Hopkins?

As the flashbacks reveal that the character grew up African-American, the film jars again when it returns to modern times, leaving moviegoers staring at Hopkins in skepticism, not quite buying him as a black man

Roth's novel hinges on the fact that some blacks have light enough skin to pass as white The transition from the darker-toned Miller to Hopkins, though, feels like the cinematic cheat that it is

Hopkins plays Coleman Silk, a classics professor disgraced and beset by tragedy after he is ironically accused of uttering a racial slur against two black students Quitting in fury, Coleman loses his wife to a brain embolism, and months later, two new relationships send him down a road of self-reflection

Coleman blissfully tumbles into romance with Faunia (Kidman), a sultry campus janitor with a calamitous past At the same time, Coleman befriends reclusive writer Nathan Zuckerman (Gary Sinise), Roth's alter-ego in several novels, who becomes witness to Coleman's final fling and the unmasking of his life's secrets, which unfold with equal parts joy and melancholy

Granted she's not my first love Granted she's not my great love," Coleman tells Zuckerman of Fauna 'But she sure as hell 1s my last love"

Faunia's baggage includes a harsh upbringing and a menacing ex-husband Lester (Ed Harris), a volatile Vietnam vet who blames her for the deaths of their two children

ture and the prurient tone of the late 1990s, a time – according to Zuckerman's narration – between communism and terrorism, when Americans could afford to obsess on the Clinton-Lewinsky scandal

Terrific acting all around heavily compensates for the implausible casting

Hopkins lustfully leaps into the role of Coleman, a man who thought he'd seen it all and has made peace with his flaws and blunders, yet finds to his surprise that he's not only able but eager to make more

Kidman seems as though she just walked out of a Tennessee Williams play, blending fierce strength and damagedgoods fragility in a magnificently hushed and haunted performance

Her Faunia is another complete makeover that effaces her star-power persona as effectively as the fake nose she wore in her Academy Award-winning role as Virginia Woolf in last year's *The Hours*

Sinise brings depth, compassion and subtle humor to what could have been the straight-man role as Zuckerman

Harris commandeers the movie in his brief screen time, creating a dangerously unstable character that is the utter reverse of his saintly coach in *Radio*

Along with Miller as young Coleman, able support is provided by Jacinda Barrett as Coleman's first great love, Anna Deavere Smith as his lamenting mother and Harry Lennix as his imperious father

The film's examination of racial passing 'will spark thoughtful conversation among moviegoers of all colors – but not as much conversation as the idea of Hopkins playing a black man



Small screen Take another look at 'The Godfather' and see orange

Most people who enjoy films have seen *The Godfather* at some point, and it is generally acknowledged to be one of the finest American films ever produced Much of that has to do with Francis Ford Coppola's direction, the performances of such acting luminaries as Marlon Brando, Al Pacino and Robert Duvall, and the epic story of the Corleone family that would subsequently run through two sequels as well

However, like many great films, what makes *The Godfather* especially enjoyable is the fact that you can see something new at almost every viewing There is some nuance, some detail that escaped you



Marlon Brando stars as Vito Corleone in 'The Godfather, a film that on second glance seems to use orange – both the color and the fruit – as a symbolic device before, but now that you notice it, you realize how well-integrated it is into the film as a whole Some of these details are easier to spot than others, but one that is well worth being aware of in *The Godfather* is Coppolas use of the color orange, or more specifically, the fruit itself

Throughout the film and throughout both sequels, there are oranges in abundance New York City seems to be full of oranges at every turn There is a bowl of oranges here, a cart full of oranges there. This isn't happenstance Instead, it is Coppola's visual cue to the audience that there is some kind of threat to the Corleone family

If you see a character pick up an orange at any point in *The Godfather* trilogy, you can pretty much assume you are looking at a dead man Maybe it will only be a few seconds or maybe it will be a couple of hours, but whoever picks up an orange can pretty much start making his funeral arrangements

As noted, this applies not only to the fruit, but to the color itself You see a guy wearing an orange suit? He's a dead man Perhaps a horse wears an orange blanket? Well, that's a dead horse Once you pick up on this motif, it adds an entirely new layer to the film and it's interesting to see how the "orange" scenes are set up and then how they are paid off

Aside from using oranges as a visual cue to foreshadow the fate of certain charac ters, Coppola also uses audio cues to fore shadow events If you hear any kind of harsh, discordant sound during *The Godfather*, it is fairly certain that an especially violent scene is on its way

The sound can be a baby crying, the squealing brakes of a subway train or a thunderstorm, but in almost every instance gunfire will erupt soon afterward and there's a good chance a major character will be dead

Did Coppola really need to include these visual and audio motifs in his film? Well, no It's still a remarkably wellmade period piece, and the manner in which he makes Mafia Don Vito Corleone a sympathetic character and then charts the slow movement of his son Michael Corleone from absolute outsider to absolute insider is compelling enough in and of itself

But as the expression goes, "the genius is in the details" and it is the details in this film that make it worth seeing over and over

ts late Friday night in the lower level nightclub of Boocoo restaurant in Royal Oak A hip, standing-room only, 20-something crowd is there to see Gryphon Shepherd – a rock band that's distinctly different from other bands in metro Detroit's vast talent pool

The mood is sultry as the six-member band plays its rhythmic, bodymoving rock. The music has steady back beats, you can hear its influences – the beauty of Jane's Addiction, cerebral Pink Floyd and Velvet Underground – blended with Middle Eastern beats, a hint of jazz and occasional obeisance to reggae

Don't be mistaken, Gryphon Shepherd doesn't regurgitate music from the past

"We look for ways to push the music, to do something different with the guitar, even if it's just one tone, something that hasn't been heard before,' said vocalist/guitarist Zach Kadro

Gryphon Shepherd is a serious band that s headed for a musical career beyond metro Detroit's borders Not that the band doesn t adore its hometown, Royal Oak, they'd rather make good music here than run out to L.A

Gryphon Shepherd has been playing steadily since 1999, with regular grgs at the Blind Pig in Ann Arbor and Bell's Brewery in Kalamazoo They released their second CD, Consciousness, this year as a follow-up to A Vision of Youth

"In the beginning we weren't concerned with the length of our songs or our intros, Kadro said "We made our own rules and played what felt good to us On the second CD, we started to condense things more, to bring the listener in right away"

Their third CD, currently being recorded, will have a harder edge *Consciousness, which appears* on the

CD with the same name, is influenced by Kadro's days living and working in Jamaica Jamaican singer Eddie Fitzroy guided Kadro's songwriting skills, and taught him how to write what he sees

The first CD, when we were younger, was more about finding your way emotionally in life, learning to assert a foot in the ground," said Kadro, a University of Michigan graduate "Now it's more about the people you see, the things you observe And this band has observed a lot While the members have been friends since childhood, their experiences go beyond Michigan

Detroit band's rock music

is bigger than the city itself

Kadro, a spiritual person whose mother is Catholic and father is Muslim, spends time reading the Bible, traveling to different corners of the world and learning as much about people as he can – whether it is the man selling bananas on a dirt road in India or a Jamaican teacher caught with an arsenal of guns His experiences come across in the band's smart approach and philosophy of music-making

We don't live in a bubble, life is about engaging with others and music can be that way as well – it can suggest, engage, evoke emotions and raise questions," said Kadro

Kadro spends as much time praising his bandmates as he does discussing the music Band member Andrew Phillips minored in music at Western Michigan University After high school, Tim William's studied sound engineering and has made demos for most of the band's music Adam Linden is heavily involved with music arrangement Robert Wedge, who also graduated from WMU, is the band's music historian Drummer Will Sulaka, who left the band recently to study medicine, will always be involved John Phillips is an accomplished guitar player who is new to Gryphon Shepherd but already contributing hard

Kadro said the band members are equals — all contributing to the music-writing process The band members knew at age 13 they wanted to make music. As friends at school dances, they remember Nirvana's *Smells Like Teen Spirit* that caused the dance floor to erupt into an energetic mosh pit

"I remember the feeling that song gave to me," Kadro said "From that moment, I knew that I needed to play music we all did"

Although Gryphon Shepherd has been together four years, they aren't hurrying their search for major label attention Music is their life and has been since they were teenagers The band's days are spent writing and playing music full time

The company has an inventive, if not new, dance style in the making Lizt Alfonso, Dance Cuba's director and choreographer, is responsible for this blend of Cuban and Afro-Cuban dance, Spanish flamenco, ballet and modern jazz

'On first blush, it's flamenco, but it's so much more complicated," said Paul, who first saw the group perform in a small secondstory dance studio in Cuba

Alfonso also directs the Folkloric Group of the Spanish Society Concepción Arenal and the Vocational School of Dance of Grand Teatro de Havana

With Dance Cuba, flamenco pose quickly will turn ballet pirouette

Some have described the group's style simply as the Cuban way to mix different forms of dance

An eight-member orchestra accompanies Dance Cuba 'And the music will blow you away as much as the dancing will,' said Paul

Costume changes offer traditional Flamenco - red hot ruffles - but surprise looks, too

The dancers "are not like sex bombs," added Paul "They're young and they smile a lot This is something that is more charming and very endearing'




Table hopping Come as you are to war

"Every cook's dream is to open his own restaurant," said Gavin McMillian, proprietor with his wife, Colette, of the new Fiddleheads ın Royal Oak.

And after 20 years cooking, Chef Gavin is living his dream You can tell it in his smile, his enthusiastic talk about his food, in Colette's eyes, on your plate and on your palate

The McMillians chose the name Fiddleheads - chewy, edible ferns used as side dishes or in salads - to enhance their back-to-the-earth food focus

"Fiddleheads grow in Michigan," Chef Gavin said "We'll serve them in spring Yearround we're dedicated to using local products in season, especially organics

CREATING A FEEL

Fiddleheads transformed the former location of Ann Sayles restaurant with a contemporary minimalist decor With a low, flat roofline, an interior stone wall and earthfocused colors, it's reminiscent of a Frank Lloyd Wright architectural style

Your eyes gravitate quickly to the creative wall design of folk art sticks against a leaf green background, designed by Bloomfield Hills artist Virginia Farris, Colette's mother Her design concept revolves around the thought that one stick can break, but a group of sticks is stronger - and that's what family ıs like

As the menu indicates, Fiddleheads is a cooperative between the McMillian and Farris families. With the aid of general manager Kara McClanaghan, Gavin did much of the interior labor, from fashioning the bar top to crafting the dining room chairs

The setting - white butcher block paper covering white tablecloths - does not come across as formal, but rather adds to the crisp, modern feel in this new 90-seat eatery

MELTING POT CUISINE

Chef Gavin dubs his food style contemporary American "I say that so that I'm not pigeon-holed," he said. "That way, I'm not tied to a specific cuisine and I can be more creative with a melting pot concept."

The one-page menu with a wine list on the reverse side is straightforward, listing appetizers, pasta, meat, fish and fowl

Two appetizers are large enough to share smoked trout salad with wild rice, pecans, dried cherries and buttermilk scallion dressing or combread chipotle-stuffed Indiana boneless quark with a chayote ragout

If you like to order totally off the appetizer menu, this is a good one for that style of eating

Roasted Yukon gold potato gnocchi with

wild mushrooms and dulce gorgonzola or braised Indiana duck with saffron linguini, cherry tomatoes, arugula and orange fennel broth are Chef Gavin's favorite in the "Pasta and such" section

Fiddleheads does not have a kid's menu, but spaghetti and veal meatballs, oven-dried tomatoes and balsamic vinegar is a kid-friendly dish Chef Gavin and Colette have two young children, so consider the chef kidfriendly and willing to satisfy a child's appetite

Lime-marinated and grilled lamb loin with r spiced lentils and baby bok choy is succulent The lentils are cooked in unsweetened coconut milk and on their own are a vegan favorite

Another main plate is roast suckling pig with corn pudding, chorizo, mussels and hot smoked paprika Served in a bowl, it takes the "bowl concept" to new heights







The Haymakers' music is an odd mix imagine the 1980s band Wall of Voodoo (remember their hit song Mexican Radio?) meets Chris Isaac meets EJ Wells

He describes it as spooky desert music influenced by ghost towns of the West and spaghetti westerns It's not country/western, it's rock n' roll mixed with the creeps The music is based on the West that Wells adores

The desert is the most glorious thing ever," Wells said "The history there, especially the ghost towns, the Gold Rush there's just something about it where my heart will always be

Wells, formerly of Nevada, and his band the Haymakers of Ohio, are bringing their music to Memphis Smoke in Royal Oak on Wednesday, Nov 12, to celebrate the release of Rhyolite

Its a refreshing, interesting, funny and well-written CD The band is just beginning to grow and gain momentum, but its members are longtime musicians Wells is

founder of the Toledo Angels and played with the Human Darts, The Defectors and Loved by Millions His musical career began in 1977 The Haymakers are Wells, singer/songwriter/guitarist, Don Binkley, bass and vocals, Dan O'Connor, guitar and vocals, Rick Nease, guitar and vocals, and Chuck Caswell, drums

Wells' fascination with the West doesn't come without personal demons Born in upstate New York and raised in northern California, he moved to Nevada in the 1980s and spent four years there addicted to amphetamines and alcohol

While high, he'd spend days at a time in the desert writing songs that were later lost

'Nevada did equal amounts of good for my songwriting and bad for my liver,' said the now-healthy Wells "My life was ball of confusion until about five years ago The partying started out as fun, but then got terrible and there was nothing fun about it'

He had to leave the state he loved to get clean and hasn't returned in 10 years Still, the vast desert and endless blue sky lives in his music and his heart This year he plans to revisit the West Some of the songs are tongue-in-cheek, others more serious He covers Del Shannon's Keep Searchin', but the rest of the CD is original The creepy song, Motherload, was written in just two hours, Downstairs at the Funeral Parlor is about his days spent living above a funeral home His job was to pick up dead bodies - a task Wells said could be very odd

"A 'new' dead body makes all sorts of rickets and rumbles when it's in the back of the car and you're bringing it to the funeral home," he said

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
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More music Black celebrates joys of fatherhood

Gus Black is tackling a subject that touches many men – the joys of fatherhood.

The public radio darling, singer/songwriter, who writes and performs pop acoustic guitar melodies, just released his latest CD, *Uncirilized Love* It's his first since the free-flowing hit single, *Laugh I Could Learn to Love* in 1999

"The track remained unfinished for a while until one day I was carrying Angus in a baby sling across my chest while playing the song over and over," Black said "We were staring into each other's eyes, and I felt this intense desire for strength and a need to protect and provide for him and that was when the string section and piano line came to me It was an incredible feeling'

Black considers his music a father-son collaboration, Angus made his first musical appearance in the song *Debut*

"We bre ught him down to the studio and (he) laughed hke crazy, so we recorded him and wrote a song around it in hke 15-20 minutes No lyrics, just his httle laugh with music around it. I'll never forget that day," said Black



record s first single 12 51 with its Nintendo like guitars) The cunning guitar work is a little like Interpol but overall this record is still very much what makes The Strokes who they are The skins sound more like a drum machine and become an element all to themselves Guitars are never overblown there is not an egotistical rock solo in

the whole record - but they are experimental Vocals are still

sung as if recorded through a children's karaoke machine from RadioShack

If nothing else The Strokes are good at convey ng cool The End had No End Automatic Stop and I Can t Win are the kind of layered cool that makes you wish you could be a New York hipster strung out on lost loves and hard drinking. But the real reason to pick up this record is the mesmerizing ballad Under Control With its layered criss crossed guitar melody sporadic

drum solos and lyrical lament, it will easily make it to every mix tape this winter But can this album live up to the hype? I m going to have to rely on my gut about this one. Generally, if I immediately like an album (that pop whizz wow thing) it is something that will stand the test of time if it takes me a few turns to get into it it tends to mean that while this record won t leave my stereo for a few weeks it will be forgotten in two years time. And if The Strokes will ever live up to their media hypel they will need a record that lasts Still overhyped claims of not pushing the envelope are hardly true - The Strokes have refined their sound and made a good album 1 just can t wait for that great one

Lets be honest For most us, Thanksgiving is dinner with the family and not much more

Which is not to say such an act falls short of a bona-fide tradition or even a ritual of sorts

But if you ve grown weary of Mr Turkey and his trappings, why not seek out a fresh point of view one that's truly a cornucopia of rituals ceremony and legend?

The 11th Annual Autumn Harvest Indian Festival scheduled for Saturday and Sunday, presents such an opportunity

Native Americans representing the People of Three Fires - Michigan's indigenous tribes - and their art work crafts. music and especially dance ceremonies are the heart of this festival

In full regalia, ceremonial dance may be customary to the Ottawa, Oubwa and Potawatomi tribes all of which are represented here, but not to outsiders, said William Memberto a Native American and coordinator of the festivals ceremonial programming

Its not just our dances, but our culture, that really kind of catches people, he remarked, adding "It's interesting, a lot of people are very moved by the fact that we still have this culture"

More than 50 Native American dancers,

all from Michigan, plan to perform Some do so as families, but each performer has been handpicked by Memberto The youngest dancer 15 5 One family will represent four generations, Memberto said

'We are primarily doing a social type of dance that really has its origins in the Pow Wow forms of dancing We will talk about the history and of the different types of dances presented also"

Several categories of dance, including the ever-popular hoop dance, are done Each form, and each dance for that matter, tells a narrative story while also exploring Native

American spiritual behefs Cultural chants, traditional songs, drumming and storytelling are prominent elements, as well.

CRAFT DEMONSTRATIONS


New this year are craft demonstration areas where observers can watch the making of dreamcatchers, moccasins, baskets and headed wares

All food will be Native American, so look for Indian tacos, buffalo burgers, corn soup and the crowd favorite, fry bread

Likewise, all arts and crafts are Native American, with vendors coming from the Midwest, East Coast and Northern Canada, said Alexis Bourkoulas, festival coordinator About 15,000 attend the event annually Currently, about 4,000 pre-show tickets have been sold, she said

"The culture and ritual are so beautiful and rich," added Bourkoulas "It's really an educational event that's entertaining, which is a good formula for families It's around the time of Thanksgiving, so many kids are learning about Native Americans, it's part of the curriculum in many schools during the next two weeks'


