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Township closes on Massey land

Plymouth Township officials took a big step forward toward a new township hall Wednesday, signing the purchase agreement for the land on which the new hall will be built Township Supervisor Steve Mann met with representatives of auto magnate Don Massey to finalize the details of the \$158 million purchase of some 95

acres at Ann Arbor Road and Haggerty

The deal helps move the \$12 million township hall project onto the fast track "We're happy to continue

with the progress on the township hall project," Mann said 'This is just one in a number of continuing steps'

The next step, according to Mann, is finding an architect Bids for that contract are due to the township by Friday, and

Mann said some 40 firms had already submitted bids

The township hall committee will sift through them and make recommendations to the township board Board members will then interview the top candidates and make a decision, hopefully within about four weeks, Mann said 'Once the architect is on

board, we expect the design phase to take about six months,' Mann said "We're hoping to

break ground and get some footings in the ground before the end of this year, but if not, it will certainly be by spring 2005'

Assuming that timetable is met, Mann said, township staffers could be in their new 56,000-square-foot digs before the end of 2005 Some 25,000 square feet will be township hall, the rest will house the police and fire departments

The township, which paid

cash for the Massey property, will also issue municipal bonds to offset half (\$6 million) of the total cost Township Treasurer Ron Edwards said hes eyeing a May 1 date for those bonds

"It's all driven by the economy," Edwards said We're trying to time it so we get the best interest rates for the communitv







Board invests in senior center

Federal money pays for additional space

The renovation of Friendship Station will continue after the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees approved another \$76,000 in Community Development Block Grant funds this week

The federal money, administered through Wayne County, must be spent primarily on low-income or senior citizen projects The township board has, for the last several years, focused on senior citizen programs

Work began last year on the township's only senior citizen facility, with the addition of floor space and new windows, along with some Americans with Disabilities Act compliance issues

Other recent expenditures came in the form of a second van for the senior transportation program in partnership with the City of Plymouth

The next step for Friendship Station is the addition of some 1,500 feet

'This is our only facility for seniors, and it only houses 100 or so people right now. They've had requests for people who want to join the activities there, but they can't physically fit them

The total price tag for the renovation is nearly \$300,000 At a recent board meeting, trustee Charles Curmi said it was too high a price to pay

I can't support spending that much, Curmi told board members

But Mann said the expense is a necessary one

"This is typical of many of our township facilities in that it was neglected for years, Mann said "We're looking forward to bringing it in line with the needs of our residents

The suggestion was made at a recent meeting to include some form of a senior facility in the new township hall, but Mann said thats unlikely

"We've thought about it, but not a lot,' the supervisor admitted

We're happy with having a separate facility It gives us another polling place during elections, and it has other uses Once we expand it, it ll have the possibility of even more diverse uses

City looks for partnerships to bail out budget deficit

The Plymouth city commission will make an all-out effort to find municipal partners to share in the costs of recreation and public works, as well as fire and police dispatch services, in an effort to trim a \$12 million budget deficit for the 2004-05 fiscal year

"I've already sat down with the mayor of Northville and the supervisor from Northville Township, and within the next week will talk to them further, said Plymouth Mayor Stella Greene 'We are reaching out to the various communities that have the potential of being viable partners with us, giving them the opportunity to come to the table and talk with us about the options to be equal working partners in combining services when and where we can

Green said recreation is probably the first item on the agenda

There isn t as large an overhead, and we can do it quicker than some other areas, said Greene

Currently, six-tenths of a mill is taken from the general fund to pay for recreation, which City Manager Paul Sincock said generates approximately \$220,000 Despite the millage

money and fees collected for the various programs, Sincock acknowledges the recreation department barely breaks even

Officials from the city and township talked last year about partnering for recreation, but the sides couldn't reach an agreement and Plymouth Township trustees backed off

Mayor Pro Tem Dan Dwyer said the time has come for city officials to decide which programs are viable and which aren t

We have one of the best recreation departments in the state - my kids use it yearround - but if it's not costeffective ' he said 'We plow streets better than anyone around, and its a great thing, but its gone thats my point of view We have to figure what we want

City officials have been discussing police dispatch fire services with Northville and Northville Township because of concerns with delivery of service and increasing costs in agreements with Plymouth Township

We re not really happy with the (dispatch and fire) agree ment," said Commissioner Michele Potter, 'and its up in 2006"

At Monday's budget discussion, most commissioners

wanted to stay away from using the 'P' word But, Commissioner Ron Loiselle said it needs to be deliberated

The police department (budget of \$2 6 million) is close to half our (\$6 million general fund) budget," said Losselle 'If we don't look at the police department, we're not going to save big amounts of money

However, Greene noted the police department is already losing two police officers, whose positions are not being filled

'It's obviously a very emotional topic at this table," she said 'Given the immediate priority we have before us in trimming the budget we (should) step back from police and look at these other areas where there are cost factors we haven't looked at

Commissioners also discussed the possibility of an early retirement program for the 19 eligible city employees - which could reduce the number of possible layoffs - to go along with the six unfilled positions

"We could lose a total of 8-12 people, depending on who leaves, retirement options and how we consolidate our operations," said Sincock

As part of their investigation, which began in the fall of 2002, Western Wayne CRT officers began conducting surveillance on some of the shoplifters, which led to more arrests

More than 40 years ago, President John F Kennedy implored the nation's youth to "ask not what your country can do for you, but what you can do for your country'

With deadlines for filing application to run for public office looming, perhaps it's appropriate to paraphrase the late president in terms of what residents can do for Plymouth Township and the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools district

People wishing to run for the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education have until April 12 to make that decision and get 40 signatures on a petition You can pay a \$100 fee to get around the 40-signature requirement, but maybe if you don't know 40 people willing to support you, you should rethink the idea of running in the first place

Thinking about running for the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees? You've got until May 11 to get a minimum of 50 signatures on a petition

Two seats are up for grabs in the June school board election President Judy Mardigian and Trustee Liz Givens Givens has indicated she won't seek re-election, which leaves at least one seat open for a newcomer

In Plymouth Township, speculation is that at least one, and possibly two, incumbent trustees will not seek reelection, opening that board for some new faces

It's especially important to get people involved in running for the school board Traditionally, there isn't a lot of interest in being elected to it, although in the last couple of years it has grown somewhat

It's also generally not a big draw for voters, last year's race drew a woeful 3 8 percent of some 71,000 registered voters That's an astonishingly low figure considering every decision the school board makes directly affects the education of our children

Four years ago, more than two dozen people ran for the seven spots on the township board This year, at least two of the incumbents have been noncommittal about running again, and only four outside candidates have declared

The potential pool of candidates for both school and township office is not only vast, but talented They come from all personal, professional and economic walks of life Vaunted fields in both races could be put together from such a diverse group

Been thinking you'd like to know more about your school board or local government? Now's the time Been thinking you'd like to hold a public office? Now's the time Been thinking there must be something you can do for your community?

I feel compelled to respond to (Neil) Goodbred's vitriolic comments regarding Sen John Kerry

Contrary to Mr Goodbred s unsupported assertions, Kerry has served his country both in war and at home and deserves our respect The mounting casualties of the Vietnam War were the result of political decisions

In the newly released documentary, Fog of War, Robert McNamara, the secretary of defense during the Johnson administration and the man some called the "architect' of the war, discusses the process that led to our involvement in Vietnam, and our leadership's decision to remain in spite of growing dissent at home and an increasing awareness of our inability to win

Unlike Mr Goodbred, Mr McNamara does not defend the war, nor does he place blame for mounting American deaths on the thousands of men and women who protested As for Sen Kerry's alleged association with Jane Fonda, the picture that forms this "link" was taken two years prior to Ms Fonda's trip to Hanoi and shows a young John Kerry seated at least two rows behind Ms Fonda in a crowd of probably hundreds On one hand, Mr Goodbred espouses freedom, yet on the other he rails against Sen Kerry's decision to speak out against a war which, based on first-hand knowledge, he viewed as wrong Isnt the hallmark of a free society freedom of speech, particularly the freedom to speak against our own government's policies? It is inconsistent with the principles on which our country is founded to condemn as traitors our citizens who exercise their right to criticize their government That Sen Kerry chose to follow his conscience and protest a failed policy demonstrates courage of conviction in the best tradition of our country

Maybe I had better take another look at this whole issue After all, I drink, smoke, and drive a car Experts, with facts, say I m paying more in taxes to enjoy a beer or a cigar or a trip to the store — all because I live in Michigan Yes, our children benefited from attending school in Farmington rather than Detroit, our former address

No, I won't jump on the bandwagon celebrating higher taxes for citizens who smoke or drink or drive, and I require a fuller picture of public schools in Michigan

There's a lot of talk about Hillary Clinton in this election year, but the first woman to run for president did so even before women won the right to vote

Victoria Woodhull, a stockbroker and publisher, ran for the nation's highest office on the Equal Rights Party ticket in 1872 The obstacles she faced were typical of any political campaign fund-raising and organization They didn't stop her, and they shouldn't stop any woman with political aspirations

The rise of Michigan's first woman governor, Jennifer Granholm, shows some progress has been made In 1979, only 12 women served in Michigan state government, all in the House of Representatives Today, about three times as many women legislators hold office, but women are still vastly under-represented in Lansing


At the local level, women are better represented (about 40 percent) on local school boards and township boards However, at the city and county level, women occupy less than 30 percent of elected posts

The problem 1sn't necessarily that people don't vote for women According to a recent study by political scientists at Brown University and Union College, women are less likely than men to even consider seeking public office

Only 2 percent of the women, as opposed to 43 percent of the men, said they were encouraged to run for office by someone else

Women may face different obstacles when it comes to running for office, but they also bring a greatly needed perspective to the table They're more likely to be consensus builders, a quality sorely needed

On March 6, the Women Officials' Network will host a panel discussion featuring some of the area's best role models It has a fitting title, "Me? Run for Political Office???' We hope many women will attend — and answer that question in the affirmative

Rhetoric obscures reality when it comes to education

hese days, they're really shakin' and bakin' in the usually staid world of education

Consider

US Secretary of Education Rod Paige last week called the nation's largest teachers union a "terrorist organization" because it opposes some parts of the No Child Left Behind Act The National Education Association called for Paige's resignation, after which the secretary sort of said he was sorry - "for the insensitive choice of words, I express my deepest regrets" - but said he still believed the NEA was obstructionist



🖬 Last month, Michigan **Republican Party Chairman Betsy** DeVos called on state School Supt Tom Watkins to resign "for failing to do what he has been hired to do - make schools accountable" Wayne State University Gov Paul Massaron, a union official and a Democrat, called for DeVos' resignation Both are still in their jobs



Republicans in both houses of the Michigan Legislature introduced a joint resolution calling for a constitutional

amendment to eliminate the State Board of Education's authority to appoint the state superintendent Not to be outdone, The Detroit News called for the abolition of the entire state board So far, however, no one is calling for the abolition of The Detroit News

Plymouth philanthropist Robert Thompson last week put his \$200 million for Detroit public schools back on the table Thompson last year offered to build 15 charter schools in Detroit, but Mayor Kwame Kılpatrıck and the Detroit Federation of Teachers eventually nixed the deal for all the wrong reasons

Steamy rhetoric usually obscures simple fundamentals

First fundamental: Most public schools in Michigan are pretty good and gradually getting better The districts that are in trouble are mostly in urban areas like Detroit, where poverty, unemployment, dysfunctional family structures. monopolistic and aggressive teachers unions and bizarre school board politics swirl evilly together The bad districts get most of the press coverage, but most of the others are quietly getting on with their job of teaching kids

In her attack on Watkins, DeVos called Michigan school graduation rates "frightening" and applied the same adjective to dropout rates However, the graduation rate as reported by Michigan Center for Education Performance and Information has steadily increased from 83 8 percent in 1997 to 88 5 percent in 2002 According to Standard & Poor's School Evaluation Services, the average state dropout rate has declined every year, from 4 5 percent in 1997 to 3 2 percent in 2002 This is hardly sufficient evidence to call for Watkins' resignation

Sadly, however, some good school districts have been hard hit in the years following passage of Proposal A The original deal was to increase support for weaker districts, but "hold harmless" the richer and better ones Over the years, however, funding for the better districts has been capped while their expenses have risen with inflation It's perverse that a consequence of the biggest school reform in Michigan history should be the systematic erosion of those few schools of high quality

Second fundamental: The logic behind school reform is simple Define what kids are supposed to learn, test what they are actually learning, use the results to improve the bad schools I served for a decade on the board of the leading advocate for reform, the National Center for Education and the Economy, and we worked hard to persuade Presidents Bush I, Clinton and Bush II that this approach made sense Indeed, this newspaper has over many years advocated public release of the MEAP test results for every individual school in the district on the grounds that information will help schools improve

So some of us were enthused at the prospect of rigorous testing being placed at the heart of the No Child Left Behind Act But as the legislation moved through Congress, however, the old adage that "two things you really don't want to watch being made are sausage and legislation" turned out to be all too true The No Child Left Behind Act turned into a bureaucratic nightmare, replete with inflexible requirements producing no less than 50 ways whereby a school can be determined not to have made "adequate yearly progress" The testing required by NCLB has produced odd results in which schools rated exemplary in one year were downgraded as madequate the next

The No Child Left Behind Act offers federal money to American schools totaling about 7 percent of their collective budgets, yet the act also imposes performance requirements and testing methods for all schools at a cost often disproportionate to the federal contribution A fair number of states are now considering rejecting the money from the feds

Third fundamental: Our schools may be making progress, but the rest of the world is moving faster than we Incremental improvement may not be enough to help our kids compete in a suddenly global world where kids in European and Asian schools score far better than ours in math and science I'd love to see the state board demand a quantum improvement

Fourth fundamental: It is very bad manners to scorn a gift sincerely offered Kilpatrick and the Detroit Federation of Teachers were given a second chance by Thompson I cannot believe they will be so stupid and self-destructive this time around

n all honesty, I'm not going to see *The Passion of the Christ* for one main reason I'm a wuss

Gory, violent movies have always left me with permanently disturbing memories I even had to stop watching ER because the increasingly bloody treatment and operating room scenes turned my stomach

But there's more to my avoidance than any concern about the effect of flayed flesh and pools of dark red human blood More to it even than having married a man who is Jewish, although the interfaith implications here are enormous

Rabbi Daniel Nevins of Adat Shalom has gone on record saying this

movie could damage Joni

progress made in Christian/Jewish relationships Even some Catholic leaders say director/producer Mel Gibson's project violates many long-established guidelines for portraying the Passion of Christ

Christians who've seen the movie say they've come away with a new and deeper understanding of what

Christ suffered and sacrificed for their sins For them, The Passion of the Christ demonstrates how we all put Christ on that cross Here's my question Is The Passion of the

Christ how people really want to remember such a loving and gentle soul?

Historically speaking, Jesus was different from the political rebels of his time Many made attempts to overthrow the bloodthirsty Romans who crucified hundreds Jesus was feared largely because he and his followers were different They didn't seek political power, rather, they sparked an enormous base of support with a message of love, forgiveness and a beneficent Father who longed to bless his children

Look at the Gospels, each of which relates a slightly different version of the Passion Jesus didn't call attention to his suffering and pain, but went off to pray just hours before his death This is consistent with the story of how he began his ministry, wander 5 ing alone in the desert

Gibson's movie - consistent with his cinematic style – shines a glaring light on brutality and blood-lust, casting in darkness the love and compassion Jesus shared with everyone he met.

Those cherished gifts are what I want to remember about Jesus, whose teachings have been a part of my life since I was old enough to mimic a nighttime prayer I can no more focus on his death than that of my father, whose dying took nearly three months and caused the kind of pain drugs do little to relieve

Once, Dad asked his pastor if it was a sin to pray for death But with his family, he maintained a quiet strength and mustered enough energy to still share his deep Christian faith and show us we were loved

It took me years to let go of those last three months Only then could I enjoy my father's memory, without grief and sadness

Mel Gibson's epic film has touched lives and moved people to tears But Jesus of Nazareth has been dead for 2,000 years

Isn't it time to move past the darkness of his death and fully embrace the light of his life?

For Salem, Musa scored two goals and assisted on another Mike Barr got a goal early in the third period to make it a 6-2 game (assisted by Musa and John Peterson), but Swiatek's third goal of the game (unassisted) restored Brighton's five-goal advantage Musa scored late, with assists from Brooks Belhart and Ryan Jones

Belhart and Craigen Bauldry assisted on Musa's second-period goal

Brandon DeMars started in goal for

Salem, allowing six goals and making 12 saves in the first two periods Joe Moore replaced DeMars in the third period and had 12 stops and gave up one goal Gidcomb had 12 saves for Brighton


The final was a different story, however

Wayne's 'little man' is too big for Salem

It wasn't a big problem for Salem Only about 5-foot-2, which, in the world of boys high school basketball, 1sn't very much

Unless, of course, that "problem" is Genois Safford



Tips help with installing wall paneling

In the 1960s and 70s, home centers had an abundant supply of wall paneling Retailers had to keep the shelves stocked to meet the ferocious demand of consumers looking for an easy-to-install and affordable means of dressing up barren walls

During that era, hardwood flooring, short-pile carpeting and plaster or wallboard walls were out, and wall-to-wall shag carpeting and paneling were the rage

Across the land, folks were covering stark walls with richlooking wall paneling of varying wood species, styles and shades Decorating trends changed from paint to wood paneling of walnut, oak, pine and birch – to name a few And, there were decisions

other than species Should the paneling be grooved, and if so, which pattern? What shade of stain, or should you use a natural finish?

For some, finishing the paneling defeated their reason for choosing wall paneling in the first place

This "set it and forget it mentality fueled the synthetic "photo finish vinyl" counterpart to natural wood veneer paneling

What consumers have discovered (as they have with vinyl siding) is that nothing is totally maintenance-free, and when tastes and trends change, the vinyl finish cannot be successfully painted or papered over

Before minivans and SUVs, the back end of the family station wagon or bed of a pickup truck served to transport sheets of wall paneling from the home center to the home

There, do-it-yourselfers undertook an interior facelift that would change the look of their homes – that is until the '80s and '90s, when they grew tired of raking their avocado green shag carpet and discovered that their paneling absorbed natural light, making

the home dark and unpleasant Thus, home-improvement retailers experienced a drop in wall panehing sales. However, the cash register was ringing in the paint and wallpaper department, as do-it-yourselfers sought ways to brighten their homes without removing the paneling

Consumers traded hammers and panel adhesive for detergent and a scrub brush – materials necessary to degloss the paneling and then cover it with paint or wallpaper

CHANGES

What comes around goes around Hardwood floor is more popular than ever, variegated shag carpeting is back, wallpaper is increasingly in use and homeowners again are singing the praises of natural wood finishes – wall paneling included

What's different today? It's not all about one finish or the other Rather it's about a blend of finishes throughout the home Some hardwood here, wall-to-wall carpeting there, and a clever combination of paint, wallpaper and paneling can go a long way to create the ideal space

TIPS

Now that it's back in good graces among do-it-yourselfers, we offer the following wall paneling installation tips to make your paneling project easier

A partial sheet of plywood or a couple of studs draped across a couple of sawhorses offers solid support and makes the job of sawing the paneling easier and safer

To prevent the material from splintering, use a fine-tool hand saw or circular-saw blade when trimming paneling

If the paneling will run from floor to ceiling, leave a halfinch gap between the bottom of the paneling and the floor to allow for movement and expansion

There are two means of fastening paneling – paneling nails and/or adhesive Use one or both Though an adhesiveinstalled paneling job (without nails) can be more attractive – since no nail heads are exposed – be prepared for substantial wallboard repair should you ever decide to remove the paneling

Begin hanging the paneling in a corner and work your way around the room

Establish a vertical or plumb line about 47 inches (a standard sheet is 48 inches wide) out from the corner, which will allow you to scribe the material to the shape of the corner Trim it using a saw

Matching trim can be installed at corners, the floor and ceiling to conceal lessthan-perfect joints

When using panel adhesive, squeeze a generous amount in a serpentine pattern on the wall where the paneling will be installed Hold the adhesive back a few inches from the perimeter so that it doesn t ooze into the joints Allow the adhesive to sit for a few minutes until it becomes tacky

Put the first sheet of paneling into place, carefully aligning it with the plumb line Press the entire sheet against the wall, firmly embedding it into the adhesive Drive a cou ple of paneling nails at either corner of the two top corners to prevent the sheet from slipping Drive additional nails at 6 inch centers along the top and bottom edge of the paneling

If you will also be nailing the paneling in the field, now would be the time to do it – before the adhesive sets up

With the first sheet of paneling firmly in place, butt the next sheet up against the first (leaving about a dimes width between panels for expansion) and repeat the process with each successive sheet Install corner trim and baseboard using a miter saw and panel nails

Hint Use a dark paint on the walls behind the joints to make the connections less obvious

Make cutting out for electrical outlets and switches an easy job by ruling the edges of the box with chalk, and press the back of the panel against it before applying the adhesive

Drill a pilot hole and use a jigsaw to make cutouts for outlets Use a utility knife with a sharp blade to score the line before cutting This prevents splintering

As promised in an earlier column, here's the scoop on how to keep your poinsettia going Stop watering when it drops its leaves, move to a semi-shaded window and

water once a month In late March or early April, cut stems back to 4 inches, then place in a warm, shady spot In summer, repot in new soil combine 2 parts all-purpose loam, 2 parts sand and 2 parts peat moss (look at the Pro-Mix products) Place in a sunny window and water sparingly After the last frost, set poinsettia outdoors in full sun Prune to prevent legginess and keep evenly moist Bring it back indoors in September, place in a dark spot, like a closet, for at least 14 hours a day through October When new growth sprouts, water and feed once a week Good luck

Last February we had the pleasure of sailing through the Panama Canal and visited several countries along the way We always learn something interesting when we travel and this trip was no exception

In Puntarenas, Costa Rica, we saw cashew fruit that resembled a yellow/orange sweet pepper (It had been one of the exotic fruits on the buffet table on the ship) The fla-

vor was rather bland, the skin had a slightly bitter taste

Why am I telling you this? The stem of the fruit of this plant encloses the actual cashew nut with which we are all familiar! We learned this at a roadside market where they put the nuts in narrow sleeves of plastic and sell them By golly, they're real thing! The Perennial Plant Association has named

Athyrium niponicum "Pictum' the 2004 Perennial Plant of the Year This low-maintenance Japanese painted fern is one of the showlest ferns for shade gardens It's hardy in zones 3 to 8, grows 18 inches tall, and as it multiplies can make a clump more than 2 feet wide The 18-inch fronds are a soft shade of metallic silvergray with hints of red and blue It makes an outstanding combination plant that contrasts well with other shade-lovers such as hosta, bleeding heart, columbine, astilbe and coral bells, Tiarella (foam flower), and others

The fruit of the cashew resembles sweet pepper. The nut (to the left) is what we eat drained, compost-rich soil and special program Heirloom flourishes where moisture and humidity abounds It has the best color in light shade Add 2-3 inches of compost or peat

Othering constructive criticism to others can be benched but only in the other processary to comments in teaching situations or during on-the-job training constructive criticism is usually necessary to instruct and help a person develop a trade or vocation. so you can spend time on projects instead of sorting through sewing materials Some people have sewing rooms and others have sewing areas or use a box with sewing supplies Whatever your circumstances make sure you have a system that enables you to find what you need

I have a sewing area and future dreams of a sewing room Right now all my potential sewing rooms are filled with children My future room will have a lot of light and many shelves I will make it a combination sewing/ironing room

My present sewing area is in a space between my bedroom and my walk-in closet It is a small area but well lit and not visible when entering my bedroom I keep my sewing supplies in my walk-in-closet and on a shelf in my basement

I have been sewing and doing crafts for 30 years so I have accumulated a lot of supplies

I developed a system to organize supplies no matter what the quantity You should vpurchase several different sized plastic containers to organize materials Use the system of dividing into categories

I keep all of my patterns in two containers One container has patterns for crafts and the other container is for clothing projects File the crafts alphabetically, couch covers, dolls, pot holders, and so on File clothing patterns into types (children's and adults) and by size

I have several boxes of material from previous sewing projects as well as larger pieces I have purchased for future use I have a box filled with Christmas scraps, one with cal-1co, one with lace, silk and satin, one with corduroy, wool, felt and other scraps, and one with new material I have purchased

Put yarn, ribbon and lace trim in a separate container Buttons can be separated by colors, types and sizes in glass jars Group thread by colors in a plastic container created for spools

I spent many years doing counted cross-stitch Thread can be wrapped around cardboard, separated by color and placed in a container File pattern books alphabetically Store cross-stitch material in a separate container I work on several projects at once so each project is in a separate container with the patterns, cross-stitch material and thread colors needed for the specific project

It is very important to use the right tools when sewing I have a pair of scissors, a rotary cutter and pinking sheers for cutting material I keep smaller scissors for cutting thread and a special pair for cross-stitch All of these are used exclusively for sewing and nothing else

Store miscellaneous sewing supplies in a sewing box divided by compartments This box would include things like elastic, pins, needles, tape measure, seam ripper and scissors In your sewing machine keep bobbins, pins, needles, and scissors

Sewing projects create mini messes It is important to return items where they belong when you have completed a project

"Is there something simple to check or should I be shopping because I've certainly gotten good life out of this machine?" Bruce asked

Most dishwashers, even those built back 16 years ago, have a "pump-out" cycle when you mitially turn it on This process has to do with safety and washing performance

If any water remains in the bottom from a spilled container from the last time you unloaded clean dishes, you don't want to use the old water for the current wash, so it pumps it out the minute you turn on the timer (This lasts for a very short period You can hear the water coming out if you put your ear near

the sink drain)

The next sound you should hear is the valve opening and water filling the bottom of the dishwasher Next should be a slight "thump" sound as the fill back out immevalve closes and then the motor starts to work During the time of the wash cycle, there should not be any water running out of dishwasher into the sink or drain If there is, it's time to

check the drain hose To check the drain hose, remove the lower front kick panel by removing the retaining screws You can observe the rubber drain hose which leads to either the drain line or to the side of the garbage disposer The dram line is supposed to be elevated or looped so it sits higher than its connection If it does not, you will have a gravity drain condition

You can create a siphon by sucking the air out of the hose to get it going and then gravity takes over similar to siphoning gas from a vehicle (You can also use a handheld siphon pump from a hardware store) If you break the flow by lifting the hose even for a second, you have to start the procedure all over again (For those like myself who used to spend 20 cents for a gallon of gas back m the 1950s, we are very versed

on this procedure.) Judging from the circumstances you describe, the drain hose problem is quite common The wash arm in the bottom of the dishwasher will not spin if there is not enough water in the bottom of the dishwasher and your dishes won't get clean I'll bet that if you added a couple of big pots of hot water to the bottom, the wash arm would spin during the wash cycle



Remember the quick tips I have so often written about Always let the hot water run at the faucet for a few minutes before turning on the dishwasher Make sure the hot water coming out of the faucet gets up to 140º F or more for proper cleaning and sanitizing of dishes

Use the proper amount of powdered detergent in the container (2 teaspoons total when using a water softener system in your home and 7 teaspoons when on city water When on well water, fill the container to the top) Rounded bowls will prevent the spray from hitting other dishes and decrease efficiency Glasses and cups should be placed at an angle to prevent them from holding water in the beveled areas Give a Tang treatment twice a year and call me if you haven't heard that one before







At 19, Louis returned to Italy to study winemaking, but after graduation, settled in California to apply his knowledge In San Francisco, he continued to help his father during the day and made wine at night The wine was sold from the same wagon used for delivering fish in the city

Even before the repeal of Prohibition, Louis anticipated the demand for California and especially Napa Valley wine With financial backing in 1922, he produced sacramental wine as well as grape juice and concentrate for home winemakers By 1933 and the end of Prohibition, he began building his new winery in Napa Valley and continued to invest in vineyards in Napa, Sonoma and Carneros

Louis M's son, Louis P Martini, carried on the tradition established by his father and became a winemak-er in 1954 "He could really size up good vineyard land," Michael said "His acquisitions in Carneros, the, Russian River Valley, Chiles Valley, Pope Valley and Lake County made him a pioneer in vineyard development'

After graduating from the University of California-Davis in 1977, with a degree in fermentation science, Michael took the reins as third-generation winemaker He has traveled in France with legendary cabernet winemaker Andre Tchelistcheff, studying winemaking techniques in Bordeaux and Burgundy

And Alley highlights them taking readers worldwide from Mexico to Great Britain, from the United States to India Alley upgrades the traditional one-pot recipes, emphasizing freshness while maintaining the integrity of the dishs ethnicity

'My goal with these recipes was to present fresh ideas a cut above the kind of food usually associated with slow cookers, Alley writes

"I wanted to try a more gourmet approach, for people who appreciate simple meals, but don't want to sacrifice flavor and complexity"

Slow cookers have undergone a revival of sorts Betty Crocker Kitchens found that 80 percent of US households own a slow cooker in a study in June 2002

Place ingredients that take longer to cook, such as larger pieces of meat, carrots or potatoes, near the bottom of the slow cooker

Speed up your slow cooking Most of the recipes in this book call for an initial sauteing of ingredients to impart some caramelization and flavor, but that isn't always necessary "In many cases, the outcome of the dish would not be adversely affected if you skipped this step and simply combined all the ingredients in the slow cooker at once," Alley writes

Browning the meat in a saute pan before slow cooking can jump-start the heating

process and kill any bacteria on the meat's surface

If you are particularly concerned about health risks, follow the US Department of Agriculture's recommendation of cooking such recipes on high for the first hour, and then decreasing the heat for the balance of cooking," she said

Alley added that most slow cooker cookbooks caution against lifting the lid, because the food will take longer to cook.

"But I think that lifting the hd, smelling the food and poking it around is half the fun of cooking I highly recommend it," she said

And, of course, it's always better the next day

POTATO, CHEDDAR, AND CHIVE SOUP



'I wasn't even thinking about it, really," she said Eating lunch at a local

restaurant that day inspired her to create her own version of a menu item, flavorful Spicy Asian Lettuce Wraps When her recipe won a standing ovation from her two teenage daughters, Baldwin quickly jumped up from the dinner table and logged onto the contest Web site She finalized and submitted her entry about three minutes before the deadline

As Baldwin learned, great Bake-Off recipes don't have to come from years of experience or research, but often spring from a single moment of inspiration and the simple belief that you too can be a winner 'If you try,' she says, you can eventually come up with something' Created using Green Giant Create a Meal meal starter, Baldwin's recipe is an example of the kind of entry that could be selected in the Weekends Made Special category for the current Bake-Off Contest

Another Bake Off finalist in 2002, Misty Waltman of Lyons, Ind , had been cooking 'since she could reach the stove,' but her job as a touring country and western singer didn't leave much time for preparing elaborate meals

"I am a busy person, but I want to serve nutritious, goodtasting food," she said Her love of seafood prompted her to begin inventing original seafood recipes in her spare time, and much to her (and her family's) delight, Waltman created her very own chart-topper Seafood Appetizers

After some encouragement from her family, Waltman entered her recipe in the appetizers category Made with Pillsbury crescent rolls, these easy-to-make treats pack loads of seafood flavor into just seven ingredients

When Waltman learned she was a finalist, she immediately called her family and friends "I was astonished I couldn t believe it was really happening I was so excited " But not nearly as excited as when her first entry into competitive cooking won \$2,000 In this year s Bake-Off Contest, a recipe like Waltman's would fit into the Fast Snacks & Appetizers category Her recipe also uses a total of 1-1/2 cups of two varieties of American-made cows milk cheese, so its also an example of the kind of recipe that could win a new prize, America's Greatest Cheese Recipe Awards Sponsored by American Dairy Association, this Award will give four \$5,000 prizes to the best recipes made with cheese

Finalist Phil Capaldi of Sounderstown, R.I., discovered that necessity truly is the mother of invention when he devised his 40th Bake-Off recipe

Looking for a warm pickme up while painting his house on a cool September day, Capaldi created a fast and tasty new twist on the classic club sandwich that was perfect for holding in one hand while tending his young sons

The secret of Pat Murphy's prize winning entry wasn't so much what he added as what he was forced to leave out Murphy, a postal worker from Modesto, Calif, was just about to prepare chicken wings for his son when he realized he was nearly out of cooking oil "I didn t feel like going back out for oil, so I rummaged through what I had The result of that last-minute improvisation was a recipe that earned \$10,000 in the 40th Bake-Off Contest

These accounts are just a small portion of the stories that come from every Bake-Off Contest To inspire potential Bake-Off entrants for the 41st contest, the Pillsbury Editors have created a new magazine that pays tribute to years of amazing recipes and finalists *Real People, Everyday*

Kumquats are very small, round or oval shaped, they can be orange or yellow in color Kumquats are mild in flavor and have an edible rind They are great as a garnish, mixed in a salad or eaten as a snack

Grapefruit are the largest fruit of the citrus family Varieties are white, Red Ruby and Star Ruby The Red Ruby and Star Ruby are the sweetest of all grapefruits

With lemons, the juice can be used numerous ways in drinks or cooking Don't forget to use the colored outer layer for zest

Limes can be used for

drinks, cooking or for zest The color ranges from dark to lighter green or yellow-green

Oranges basically come in three groups, regular, navel and blood Navel and Valencia are the most popular Valencia oranges are the most versatile, they make good juice and can easily be eaten out of hand They have thin skins and have only a few seeds The navel orange 1s seedless and 1s really considered an eating orange

Mandarın ıs really a class of small oranges that have loose, easy to peel, "zipper" like skin These are tangerines, clementines, Temple and Tangelos A Temple 1s a cross between a tangerine and an orange and resembles an overgrown juncy tangerine with seeds A Tangelo 1s a cross between a tangerine and a grapefruit and have a taste all their own Tangerine juice mixed with strawberries or raspberries, peaches, bananas, pineapple or cranberry juice in a blender makes a wonderful breakfast drink

When buying oranges, look for firmness, heaviness and even shapes Rule of thumb, the thin-skinned oranges are juicier than thick-skinned and small- to medium-sized fruits are sweeter than the larger ones Mandarıns will feel soft and puffy compared to an orange but still should feel heavy for their size

Don't try to freeze whole oranges or other citrus fruits Very cold storage makes brown spots on the skin but won't hurt the taste

Most oranges are sold in bags that have holes so they can breathe

Freshly squeezed orange juice can be frozen up to four months Oranges can be kept at room

temperature for one to two weeks, or refrigerated for longer storage Tangerines will stay nice for one week at room temperature, but refrigeration is the best for them The skin protects the vitamin C, so after you peel the orange, eat it

Room temperature oranges yield the most juice, especially if you roll them on the counter or microwave for 20-30 seconds before juicing The citrus shells can be frozen for use later They make beautiful serving containers for salads, desserts and sauces

Warm maple flavored syrup and orange slices or make a great tasting topping for French toast, waffles or pancakes Marinate meat, fish or poultry in orange juice Cook white or brown rice in orange juice and water with a pinch of zest to serve with chicken

Slice peeled oranges, sprinkle with shredded coconut and powdered sugar and top with a little white wine or orange lıqueur

Orange shces can also be added to tossed green or cabbage salads

Add a little grated orange or lemon peel to your favorite sandwich spread

Grated orange rind can flavor custards, creams, dough, stews, pastries and cookies Oranges and all citrus bring the feeling of sunshine and freshness into a dull winter diet

If you're not able to visit Florida, California or Texas this winter to pick your own citrus fruits, visit the local grocery store and buy some fresh to brighten your day







ust about anybody can sell a home Just like anybody can hit a baseball, pull a tooth, write a will, fly an airplane, cook a meal, or perform heart surgery However, two questions persist What is the true value of a job well done? And what happens if there's a glitch?

I absolutely love working with true full-time professionals, and I enjoy paying them fairly for their work Why? If all goes well, the result is usually fantastic If there's a hiccup, a real professional coolly brings the issue to a satisfactory resolution – sometimes without you even knowing there was a problem

My all-time favorite movie quote came from *Apollo 13* when Gene Kranz, the NASA flight director at Mission Control, said, "Failure, gentlemen, is not an option" For true professionals, failure is truly beyond comprehension It's an anomaly All-star hockey players

All-star hockey players expect to score Commercial pilots take off fully expecting to land safely Professional Realtors expect to sell every property they list And mortgage professionals get real estate money to the table every time

REAL PROS

True professionals get paid well because failure in their industries is more costly than the wage they demand Real pros will not scalp you, nor will they scalp themselves Professionals deserve to be paid based on their ability to serve you If you expect five-star service at a fast food restaurant, you will go hungry As handy as I am around my home, there are certain tasks - like hard-wiring new electrical service and cutting down 200-foot tree - that I leave to professionals Why? I cannot deal with the "down side risk" of a goof-up Any property buyer or seller who has had a transaction go bad will tell you, in retrospect, that they got burned by trying to cut corners They used the brother-in-law who is new in the mortgage business, or the Realtor who is a friend-ofa-friend If you have the expertise required to sell your own home, go for it! If you don't, then don't short yourself by skimping on experience and expertise When failure is not an option, hire a professional

exposure of the association for insurance claims by, among other things, limiting the responsibility of the association to insure only common elements It will also be necessary to modify the repair responsibilities of the condominium bylaws as well as certain other provisions regarding payment of deductibles by negligent co-owners Every association should reconsider reviewing its condominium documents to protect it from unreasonable claims being filed against it and to limit its exposure because of the increase in insurance premiums



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30-year mortgage rates steady, others mixed

BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

Rates on benchmark 30year mortgages held steady at a seven-month low this week, while rates for other types of mortgages were mixed

The average rate on 30year, fixed-rate mortgages was 5 58 percent, unchanged from the previous week, which had marked the lowest rate since 5 52 percent for the week ending July 11, Freddie Mac, the mortgage giant, reported Feb 26 in its weekly nationwide survey of mortgage rates

Rates on 30-year mortgages sank to 5 21 percent in the middle of June, the lowest level in more than four decades Since then rates have bounced up and down

For 15-year, fixed-rate mortgages, a popular option for refinancing, rates rose to 4 89 percent this week, up from 4 87 percent last week

ADJUSTABLE RATES

Rates for one-year adjustable mortgages, meanwhile, decreased to 3 50 percent, compared with 3 53 percent last week

"There was very little movement either way this week," said Frank Nothaft, Freddie Mac's chief economist "And it looks like consumers are taking advantage of the low level of mortgage rates as applications for home purchases and refinancing are up for the last two weeks " The Mortgage Bankers

Association said its gauge tracking mortgage loan applications for home purchases and refinancings increased by 2 1 percent last week from the previous week. Federal Reserve

Chairman Alan Greenspan earlier this week questioned consumers' preference for fixed-rate mortgage loans

"American homeowners clearly like the certainty of fixed-mortgage payments," he said That stands in sharp contrast with homeowners in other countries, who prefer adjustable-rate mortgages, he noted

"American consumers might benefit if lenders provided greater mortgage product alternatives to the traditional fixed-rate mortgage," Greenspan said

"To the degree that households are driven by fears of payment shocks but are willing to manage their own interest rate risks, the traditional fixedrate mortgage may be an expensive method of financing a home," he said

A year ago, rates on 30year mortgages averaged 5 79 percent, 15-year mortgages were 5 14 percent and one-year adjustable mortgages stood at 3 83 percent

The nationwide averages for mortgage rates do not include add-on fees known as points Each loan type carried an average fee of 0 7 point this week

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


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The 2004 Ford Focus

It isn't even summer yet, but some cars give you that feeling year-round And Ford Focus is one of them

Well, alright, this is a very personal sentiment, not universally shared But zipping around recently in Ford's very worthy entry in the fast-dwindling, American-made small-car segment, I couldn't help but be impressed by what a great little ride the Focus gives And it made me wistful for the days when, as a college freshman, I bought my first car, a manual-transmission Chevrolet Chevette Now, that car gave first cars a bad name


But Focus is an entirely different proposition It's still great to look at , even a few years after its cheeky styling debuted It's appealing both to men and women, to girls and boys, as indicated by the thousands of teenage males who are wont to soup up this vehicle Focus is not just spritely but downright zippy in its performance, yet it yields 25 mpg in city driving and 33 mpg on the highway It's got an appealing interior with more than adequate amenities for an entry-level vehicle

And at a suggested retail price of just \$18,760 even for the ZX5 Premium version I drove, it's plenty affordable for many people as a first vehicle – and even, dare I say, appropriate for all sorts of twentysomethings?

Did I say I like this car?

Focus's styling remains fresh even a few years after it supplanted Escort as Ford's economy-car stalwart And, in fact, it's possible to argue that the styling influenced many other small vehicles that came afterward, some of them much pricier – much as Ford's groundbreaking "jelly-bean" design of Taurus clearly did in 1986

Focus's large and downswept windshield, sweeping arcs, large pie-section headlamps, crisp creases, robust wedginess and eye-high taillights blend very nicely into a distinct design statement clean, effi-

cient, even hip, yet substantial The roofline is highly arched, which particularly makes Focus stand out when it's parked next to other vehicles Lower bodyside PVC coating provides protection from stone dings on all models ZX3 and LX versions have black rather than body-color bodyside protective molding, which is offset in the ZX3 by black rocker panels

I'm hearing that the 130-horsepower, two-liter engine that comes in most Focus models is plenty adequate, starting instantly and providing a smooth, quiet ride But I was very happy to have been driving the ZX5, which comes pumped up with a 2 3-liter, dual-overhead-cam engine paired with a five-speed manual transaxle Driving this car was just a load of fun For one thing, it proceeded crisply through the gears, much more smoothly than many a vehicle I've driven that cost twice as much as Focus

Focus was very responsive, providing plenty of power in every driving situation and not seeming to strain a bit I especially enjoyed the car's handling, which was taut but not overly sensitive, smooth in cornering and stopping, and simply pleasant to pilot overall Missing was the usual noise, vibration and harshness that four-cylinder engines often issue, and I couldn't even get much wind noise going at way past the speed limit on the freeway

Neither does Focus disappoint when it comes to the interior The front seats were plenty roomy, and so were the rear The only area where I noticed a pinch was the cargo area in the rear – but you can't have everything Suffice it to say that there's plenty of room with the rear seats folded down for whatever a couple would need to stash in the car for a weekend trip or even a week-long vacation trek

Nice touches abound in the ZX5 They include a power moonroof with a moonshade I also liked the simple layout of the climate controls and nifty little discoveries such as a wedge-shaped coin tray just to the right of the instrument panel Design-wise, too, I appreciated the interior, especially the upswept design of the dashboard

This is a vehicle that makes a great statement not only about Ford but about what US carmakers still are able to do in the long woebegone small-car marketplace Long live Focus

Gibson's 'The Passion of Christ' brutally shocking

The frightened speculation from religious leaders and frantic banter from 24hour cable news pundits can end now *The Passion of the Christ* is playing in theaters – about 2,800 of them – in a shrewd marketing move by Mel Gibson to let the everyone see and judge the film for themselves

And the film is frightening – not for its dogma, but for the relentlessness of its brutality

Gibson, as director, producer and cowriter, is fetishistic in his depiction of the



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pain Jesus suffered during the last 12 hours of his life The beating and whipping and ripping of skin become so repetitive, they'll leave the audience emotionally drained and stunned

HUMANITY OF SACRIFICE

Yes, yes That s the point, Gibson has said – he wants his film to be shockingly graphic to show the humanity of Christ s sacrifice

But the idea that children should see The Passion as a learning device – that churches are organizing screenings and theater trips for their parishioners and catechism classes – is truly shocking Grown-ups – even true behevers – will have difficulty sitting through the film Just think of the trauma it will inflict on kids

As for the widely reported criticisms that *The Passion* might foster anti-Semitism, let's just say nearly everyone ends up looking responsible for the death of Jesus (a lean and intense Jim Caviezel)

Roman soldiers, speaking Latin, strip him down to practically nothing, chain him to a rock and scourge him until he collapses in a bloody heap of shredded flesh, when Pontius Pilate asks the surging crowd, "Isn't this enough?" Jewish elders, speaking Aramaic, call for Jesus' Crucifixion, which the Romans' gleefully carry out

The few sympathetic figures are Jewish Jesus' mother, Mary (Maia Morgenstern, a Jewish actress whom Gibson frequently consulted on the set), his disciples, and Mary Magdalene (Monica Bellucci)

BEAUTIFULLY PHOTOGRAPHED

Despite its gruesome content, *The Passion* is beautifully photographed – and it's a huge, meticulously detailed film, as

you would expect anything from Gibson to be Early scenes in the Garden of Olives, where Jesus is being tempted by Satan (the androgynous Rosalinda Celantano), are bathed in mist and moonlight, similar to the opening battle sequence in *Braveheart*, which earned Gibson Oscars for best picture and best director

Gibson asked cinematographer Caleb Deschanel to make the film look like a painting by the Baroque artist Caravaggio, and Deschanel has accomplished that The lighting of the Italian locations is intrmate and dramatic, often ominous in its contrast with the consuming darkness

But any of the film's subtle beauty, or the possibility for religious inspiration, will be drowned out by John Debney's score – which is unnecessarily insistent considering the intensity of the action on screen – and washed away amid the bloodshed

The Passion of the Christ a Newmarket Films release runs 127 minutes in Latin and Aramaic with English subtitles Two stars out of four

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

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

Small screen Peter Sellers triumphs in his masterpiece, 'Being There'

Chance the Gardener, the hero of 1979's Being There, is perhaps the simplest, most literal protagonist to ever appear in a film

Based on Jerzy Kosmski's novel of the same name, *Being There* is the story of a man who is almost entirely devoid of content.

He is a perpetual blank slate, capable of httle more than mimicking the words and actions of the people around him or what he sees on television In fact, Chance's motio, which he repeats several times throughout the film, is simply, "I hke to watch" This may seem hke a dubious idea for a

This may seem like a dubious idea for a film After all, film protagonists are always supposed to be striving to accomplish something, and they have to overcome one obstacle after another before they ultimately triumph

Chance really wants nothing more than to tend to a garden and to watch television. When he is turned out of the home he has lived in since he was a child, Chance wanders the streets, utterly lost, having no idea where he is because he has never been out of the house before

When he is accidentally struck by a limousine belonging to a Washington, D C,

power broker, Chance's fortunes take a turn for the better

He is taken to a palatial estate for medical attention, and it is there that his silence is mistaken for strength His innocent com-

Peter Sellers as Chance the Gardener as profound metaphors for the state of the

country and the economy Whether being questioned by journalists or diplomats, all the people he meets project their own meaning onto Chance Soon enough, he is regarded as a sage, a man of immense wisdom and knowledge, and all the more appealing because he seems to have appeared out of nowhere

The film was a pet project of Sellers', and one he desperately wanted to make

After the novel was published in 1971, Kosinski received a telegram from Chance the Gardener that simply said, "Available in my garden or outside of it." When Kosinski called the accompanying telephone number, Peter Sellers answered

As an actor, Sellers claimed to feel a

strong affinity for Chance, capable only of repeating words created by others and with no true personality of his own


While this is arguably Sellers' masterpiece, he is ably assisted in the film by his co-stars Melvyn Douglas and Shirley MacLaine are both ideally cast as the crusty old plutocrat who comes to admire Chance and his younger wife who comes to love Chance

And if you think that bodes ill for Chance,

think again The dying plutocrat gladly hands his wife off to Chance, knowing she will be in good hands

And indeed she will, as this gentle fable concludes with the clear indication that Chance is headed straight for the White House







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Drinkology Get Vitamin C the cassis way

L Heritier-Guyot a proprietor in Burgundy, is best known as a hqueuriste, and among its portfoho of fruit hqueurs is Creme de Cassis de Dijon \$22 50/750mL

Owner of 40 acres of black currant (cassis) bushes in the Cote d Or, bordering Vougeot and founded in 1845, L Heritier-Guyot is one of the oldest producers of creme de cassis in France

Cassis berries are harvested and carefully crushed to avoid breaking the bitter seeds and immediately macerated in eau-de-vie to stop oxidation during a process of color and aroma extraction that lasts two months or longer

Once infusion is complete, the liquid is drawn off the skins and seeds, sweetened with neutral beet sugar and adjusted for alcohol content. No fruit juice additives, colorings or flavorings are permitted to alter the slow fruit maceration. After resting for several days in lined neutral vats, the creme de cassis is bottled.

Aside from its purity and great fruit fla-

vors, creme de cassis is arguably a healthful liqueur Black currants naturally contain one-half gram of vitamin C per hundred grams of fruit — seven times that found in oranges Vitamin C oxidizes quickly, but if the fruit is processed immediately, a high degree remains preserved in the infusion, remaining suspended in the finished liqueur for 14 months or longer

Slightly chilled L Heritier-Guyot Creme de Cassis is dessert in a glass, delicious as a topping for vanilla ice cream or served as Kir Royale when a splash is topped off with champagne in a flute Store unopened bottles of creme de cassis away from heat

and light Once opened, they should be kept refrigerated and used as quickly as possible Creme de Cassis will oxidize in two to six months, turning dark brown and losing its fresh, fruity quality



Russian pianist finds freedom in jazz

Eugene Maslov is never enchanted when listening to the music he creates Perhaps that's why he's so good

As a child, my father always picked apart my music saying when you become satisfied you stop growing,' the Russian jazz pianist said

Maslov, a classically trained pianist, turned to jazz for its creative freedom He's signed to Detroit-based Mack Avenue Records and will play on Friday at Baker's Keyboard Lounge in Detroit

He's yearned to be part of the American Jazz community and is excited about playing at the legendary Baker's Maslov's promoting his third Mack Avenue CD, *The Fuse is Lit* He's accompanied by Vinnie Colaiuta, Boris Kozlov, Hubert Laws, Pete Christheb and Joe Labarbera.

Maslov performed in Russia last month and just returned to the US Russian audiences, he said, are thankfully accepting of jazz

was a self-taught balalaika instructor When Maslov was 6, his father bought him a piano

"Every day my father would go to the music store to teach himself and then he taught me to study theory, to harmonize," said Maslov

Maslov started his formal musical training at age 7 and soon won many classical music competitions He graduated seven years later with honors When he was 15, without his father's knowledge, Maslov went to St Petersburg to apply at the renowned Mussorgsky College — "a wise decision," he said


His life changed when he heard jazz "It was when I first heard a recording of Ella (Fitzgerald) that I fell in love with jazz music,' he said "Not long after, I heard Oscar Peterson's *I Remember Clifford* and that convinced me without any doubt that I wanted to be a jazz pianist

The problem was he and other Russian musicians didn't have a jazz scene to embrace Maslov was thrilled when a friend invited him to live in Boston For the past 14 years he's played nightclubs and halls throughout the country, including a three-year stant at the Universal Hilton Hotel in L.A. He also played at Carnegie Hall in a concert to honor Antonio Carlos Jobim

ON THE PROGRAM

Maslov's performance at Baker's will include classic jazz standards that he says allow for greater creativity

"When you have the base established, you can present your ideas, your emotions and if the audience is willing, you can take them to where you feel," he said

His show at Bakers, like his CD, will include bright up-tempo tunes and, of course, ballads The audience will also hear silence – something that Maslov said can be performed

Theater gives puppets stage to play on

What do you get when you mix papiermaché, umbrella skeletons and other prosaic ingredients with a bit of Old World storytelling magic and let it simmer in the heart of Detroit?

The PuppetART Detroit Puppet Theater – a center of imagination and color that rivets audiences with tales from places as diverse as Russia, West Africa and Japan

Founded six years ago by three Russian immigrants, the theater performs weekly for general audiences and more frequently for schools and other groups In the current season, the troupe has played week after week to full or overflow crowds in its cozy theater that seats 70

Firebird, based on a Russian story, features rod puppets – the kind that are supported by sticks held by people hidden behind a wall Depending on the puppet, a variety of rods and levers under its clothes can make hands and legs move and eyes roll

Like almost all the theater s puppets and sets, the firebird is the work of Irina Baranovskaya, one of PuppetART's three founders In addition to traditional materials hke papier-mache and foam, she also incorporates objects from everyday life such as umbrellas, milk jugs and straw baskets into her creations

Both Baranovskaya and her husband, Igor Gozman, the theater s artistic director, worked in puppet theaters in Russia They came to the United States in 1990 and soon made their new home in Southfield, working at everything but puppetry

Éventually, they teamed up with Lyudmila Mikheyenko to create PuppetART Today, the three founders are joined by a handful of volunteers and actors brought in for particular shows

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
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
