Prose lawsuit hits fed appeals court

Four-and-a-half years after declaring he was tired of being "bullied" by former Plymouth Community Crier publisher W Edward Wendover and Plymouth city officials, the \$100 million federal lawsuit filed by Plymouth businessman Tom Prose will be headed to the US Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals in Cincinnati

"I think our chances are very good," Prose said this week, citing some lower court rulings in his favor

The hearing is scheduled for 1 p m Tuesday Each side will be given 15 minutes to argue their position, and possibly take questions from the panel The judges could rule on the spot, but the most likely scenario is a written ruling several months after the hearing

"The sad thing here is how many people have lost hundreds of thousands of dollars in legal fees, time, stock value and other things because of this guy's (Prose's) frivolous lawsuits," said Wendover

"Theres no legal issue here" The troubles began when Prose and Wendover argued over an easement on Fleet Street, which belonged to Prose, but was used by Wendover as a loading dock for the newspaper However, that issue became somewhat secondary as Prose was upset by two charges of disorderly conduct filed against him The first resulted in Prose being detained by police In the second incident Prose was ticketed for swear-

ing at women and children Both of the disorderly charges were eventually dropped, then reinstated by the prosecutor's office

In the lawsuit filed Sept. 18, 1999, Prose claimed his civil rights were violated when Wendover, city officials and city police conspired to file charges of disorderly conduct Along with Wendover, the lawsuit names as defendants his wife, Sally Repeck, former Plymouth police chief Bob Scoggins, Lt Ed Ochal, former Crier employee Mike Carne, former Plymouth mayors Don Dismuke and Joe Koch and former city manager Steve Walters

In his March 2002 ruling, US District Court Judge John Corbett O'Meara ruled Plymouth police officers acted properly when they arrested Prose However, Prose asked for a reconsideration of the ruling, and four months later O'Meara affirmed his decision to grant all the defendants summary judgment, which cleared them of any charges

Attorney Gus Morris of Cox, Hodgman & Giarmarco of Troy, who is representing the city, said he expects the lawsuit to be dismissed by the federal appeals court

Successfully educating children is much like baking a cake, according to state Rep Ruth Johnson

"It doesn't take any one thing It's like the recipe, it takes all the ingredients," she said

But the Republican legislator, whose district includes Orion and Oxford townships, said there is one ingredient that stands out from her days as a teacher in the Clarkston district

"The single biggest ingredient is parental involvement That's the flour of the recipe," she said

Johnson, like educators and legislators from Wayne and Oakland counties, said that while financial resources are important, other factors weigh more heavily in driving education

As a member of the House Education Committee, Johnson found her belief in



Campaigning for kids

YMCA fund-raiser finances future for children

For Gina Peterson and the legions of people who care about the YMCA of Plymouth, its all about the kıds

And that s the focus of the Ys 2004 'Strong Kids Campaign," a fund-raising drive aimed at a target of \$52,400 that will help fund five programs that are the heart of the YMCA's mission

While the Y's summer camp program gets the biggest piece of the fundraising pie, other programs include volunteer efforts and YMCA memberships

'We want people to support the Y, so it's important they know what we re trying to do,' said Peterson, the Plymouth YMCA's executive director "It's people helping people'

The YMCA's summer camp program (\$30,400) has the biggest financial need The YMCA operates a trio of day camps (for 3-5 year olds, for 6-11 year olds and for 12-15 year olds), providing an outdoor experience Peterson said "challenges the body as well as the mind and spirit"

Last year's camp program served 428 kids, a third of whom needed financial help to manage it This year's goal is to help 22 children through YMCA camps Toward that end, the YMCA has worked with Plymouth-Canton schools to identify one child from each of the districts 15 elementary schools

The financial aid is vital to the YMCA's cause, according to Peterson

"We help a lot of people who have been financially stable for a long time, but suddenly find themselves in need," she said "A lot of them are moms who have to go back to work They're trying to be full-time moms, carry a full-time load at school and have full-time jobs'

Last year's camp program served 428 kids, a third of whom needed financial help to manage it. This year's goal is to help 22 children through YMCA camps.

Another prominent YMCA program that will benefit from the campaign is its volunteer effort Working with the Wilcox Foundation, the Plymouth Y has developed a database of some 650 youngsters who last year performed more than 1,000 hours of community service

A lot of agencies in our community were helped by our volunteers, Peterson said 'They rang bells for the Salvation Army, they helped out at Tonquish Creek and

the Council on Aging"

Other YMCA programs helped by the campaign (with their fund-raising goal in parentheses)

Youth programming (\$5,000) - The youth sports program consists of six seasons focusing on skill development, fair play and character development The YMCA even offers a backyard swim program


Program development (\$10,000) — The program committee will conduct a needs assessment to identify new programs

Memberships (\$2,000) - The goal is to provide financial assistance to 100 children

Peterson said the YMCA campaign will last about a month

10 years later, education funding equity still an issue

Mention Proposal A, the school financing mechanism that now is 10 years old, to a group of educators and you're bound to get the same reaction

"My contention is its not equitable,' Redford Union School Supt Brian Motter said

Proposal A was designed to provide a base foundation grant per pupil after evening out disparities between lowand high-spending districts In fact, it hasn't worked that way, with high-spending districts having been 'held harmless' in being allowed to levy an additional millage

The result has been a range of revenue from \$11,880 in Oakland County's Bloomfield Hills to \$6,700 in Wayne County's Redford Union (See accompanying graphs)

But even within counties, there are discrepancies Troy schools, relatively close to Bloomfield Hills, receive \$9,035 or nearly \$2,000 less per student In Wayne County, Wayne-Westland schools at \$7.396 receive nearly \$700 more than Redford Union

While educators say money ısn't the sole driving factor behind producing well-educated students, without it districts such as Redford Union close buildings and put off buying buses and needed maintenance

Frank Thomas, Redford Union's executive director of fiscal and operational services, puts the blame squarely at the foot of Proposal A

"Proposal A has eliminated Redford Unions ability to go to our taxpayers (for a millage increase) We were just at that base amount when we couldnt go for a (hold harmless) millage, he said "Proposal A was supposed to have taken care of the equity of doing business We still don't have 1t

A CALL FOR CHANGE


He's not alone in his thinking In November, the Michigan State University Education Policy Center issued a 66-page report calling for changes in the way education is funded in Michigan

That call 1s growing as state legislators debate Gov Jennifer Granholm's proposed education budget that would restore cuts to the \$6,700 base grant to all but those districts which spend more than \$9,000 per student

While the debate goes on, the Observer & Eccentric takes a look at some of the concerns with Proposal A

The changes called for in the MSU study are designed to stabilize revenue for the funding of education, make it more equitable and take into account the cost of education in different regions of the state and with different students and programs

"Proposal A affected school districts in very different ways," said David Plank, MSU professor and co-director of the Education Policy Center, which was established four years ago 'Some got pretty dramatic windfalls



What we have found for the last two years, and now the third year, is that we have stepped back We're trying to get back to \$6,700, but there is no accounting for inflation'

Thomas says going three years without an increase has hurt Redford Union "When Redford Union opens on July 1 for the new school year, it will cost just \$1 5 million more just to open its doors And that's with no new salary increases,' he said

The state also is strapped for cash and is looking for ways to supplement its income

Granholm has suggested raising the cigarette tax by 75 cents a pack, something that doesn't sit well with Thomas


We can t tie it to the econo my," he said 'What we've got ten away from right now is a more secure revenue for schools"

Plank said he and co-author David Arsen weren't recommending changes in taxes, but if there were to be a state tax increase, the best one to increase would be the property tax, he said It's more stable and it's deductible from income taxes

LEGISLATION PROPOSED

Among the recommendations in the report is that districts not be harmed financially when students leave the district, thereby reducing funding

State Rep John



Eccentric Area School District

Pappageorge, R-Troy, has introduced legislation into the House which he thinks will help Pappageorge said his bill would target families and communities - he specifically mentioned Clawson - with small houses

Families growing now need more room (With his bill) if they add on to a house and stay five years, they won t be taxed,' he said

This allows them to stay (in the school district), and it won t hurt because in five years there will be a bigger tax base'

State Rep Ruth Johnson took a look at the tax increas es that were being proposed for education before Granholm's budget address

I don't think we need clever or creative ways to raise: taxes," she said "We have to maximize what we ve got"

And for Johnson, maximizing what we ve got means putting the emphasis on education

Noting that Michigan ranks near the top nationally in education appropriations, Johnson said, "Education is one function thats not debatable at all "

which pays its first-year teachers \$38,262 (See accompanying charts)

Garden City Supt Richard J Witkowski contends, however, that teachers quickly move through the base level to the master's degree maximum At that point, Garden City's salaries are at the mid-point of Wayne County school districts, he said

Raw dollars can translate into buying power According to Tim McAvoy, Troy schools community relations director, the district has 10,000 resumes from teachers online hoping to get jobs there

But, he said, it is also a curriculum that includes advanced placement courses, Latin, Japanese and a gifted program in first grade that has produced 15 Michigan Blue Ribbon schools and six national Blue Ribbon schools in Trov

Nearly 30 miles to the southwest, Supt Brian Motter at the Redford Union School District in Wayne County believes the driving force behind good education is in the "relationship in the classroom between the teacher and students

And Motter said the cashstrapped district uses that relationship — and the minimal \$6,700 state aid perpupil allotment, \$2,300 less than Troy - to give the community what it needs That may not be a college curriculum

"Twenty to 25 percent of our students don't go on to college," he said So the district offers auto shop and wood working programs, and that s why he thinks the MEAP tests are unfair

"They don't measure what it takes to tear down an engine,' he said But Motter said Redford Union schools nonetheless are doing a good job because students are being trained so they won t be a burden on society'

'We've done it on a limited budget, \$6,700 is the lowest you can have," he said

For Troy, cuts in state aid and the squeeze in other revenue meant it had to cut \$4 7 million from its budget, leaving the district with \$129 million It also meant it dipped into its fund balance. now at \$23 million

SYSTEM INEQUITIES

That points out what Motter says are inequities in the system Frank Thomas, Redford Union's executive director of fiscal and operation services, said that the district operated for two years in a deficit In 1999-2000, the deficit was \$1 4 million

This year the district has a \$192,000 fund balance

The turn around came with some hard decision-making The district put off maintenance items, tough when its newest building was built in 1963 Bus purchases were delayed

We have an old fleet,' Thomas said Three split classes were instituted at each grade level, while two elementary schools were closed Employee contracts were settled at a 'reduced rate"

Two requests for a sinking fund were narrowly defeated by voters "So now we hope nothing breaks It's a matter of time," Thomas said

Like Ruth Johnson and Troy school officials, state Rep John Pappageorge believes resources go hand-inhand with other elements in driving education forward

The most important element by far 1s the teacher We have to have good teachers and reward good teachers,' said the Republican from Troy 'The second priority is administrative But the third thing you have to have is enough dollars so the first two can do the job

McAvoy poses the question Do schools get community support because they are good, or are schools good because they get community support?

Troy officials say that research shows it's a "mutually reinforcing cycle Without it, things go downhill



Michael Schwartz said Anderson's admission of guilt should be the turning point in

his client getting a new trial She brought into this case false evidence, designed to cause my client to be convicted, he said, 'not based on the facts as they exist, but based upon false claims'

Plymouth Police Chief Wayne Carroll, who led the investigation, obviously doesn't share Schwartz's view

The disgusting antics of Ms Anderson, as hemous as they are, fortunately weren't used at the trial, and I think our case will stand," Carroll said "We knew from the outset there was a problem with the hacksaw

blade and never used it in the case "

Schwartz acknowledged the blood-stained hacksaw wasn't introduced as evidence during the trial, but said there were several references made about the blade during testimony

"There were references made to that particular hacksaw by Heather Spillane of the Michigan State Police crime lab, comments were made in front of the jury by prosecutors about a hacksaw, and an expert witness was brought in to speak about saws," said Schwartz What the jury didn t know is that the saw itself was the subject of a perverted attempt to introduce bogus evidence into

the proceedings for the purpose of my client to be convicted unjustly

Despite the optimism of Schwartz, the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office 1s confident the conviction of Islam will be upheld



Senator: Utility deregulation isn't working as planned

While in its advertisements, DTE claims the wolves are at the door, state Sen Bruce Patterson urges electrical consumers to contact their legislators or Gov Jennifer Granholm

tition But Patterson, R-Canton, now has

doubts 'I m not sure what we have 1s competition,' he said I think what we have is something other than competition"

The 2000 Michigan Electric Choice Program, also known as Public Act 141, has allowed large commercial and industrial customers to seek electrical service from companies other than DTE Energy, leaving retail customers - homeowners and small businesses - to face potential 20- to 30-percent rate increases when the existing rate cap disappears Jan 1, 2006

'Right now, residents are paying 70 to 80 percent of the costs at the most, said Patterson, chairman of the state Senate

Committee on Technology and Encrgy With fewer of the larger customers paying the costs, especially for the expensive infrastructure, those costs will fall on retail customers Residents really don t have the chance to buy electricity at a lower price, Patterson said

Pattersons committee has conducted public hearings to determine what is right and what is wrong with PA 141, especially with the unintended consequences of the legislation that was designed to introduce competition and prompt lower utility costs for customers

Is competition getting us to the end we want? Do we know where we want to go?" Patterson asked

Though customers may feel they are paying more, rates today are less than those in 1993, Patterson added

Claiming a steady erosion of profits in the aftermath of PA 141 DTE was given a partial and immediate rate increase by the Michigan Public Service Commission in February The MPSC found that DTE has a revenue loss of about \$248 milhon yet most customers won t feel a rate increase because of the cap The MPSC ruled that DTE could increase its rate for a total of \$101 million or about 4 percent, which will be paid by large commercial and industrial customers who are not protected by the rate cap

The commission has informed the Legislature - and we are very aware of the prob lems - that we believe we have the tools to address the concerns," said Gary Kitts, chief administration officer for the MPSC According to Jim Padgett, director of regulatory policy at DTE, the interim ruling provides the requested immediate relief while the MPSC continues its study of the utility's case Once complete, the MPSC can either leave the increase as is, choose to increase it or tell DTE is has to give a refund According to the MPSC, rate cases are the appro priate method of addressing

issues and concerns, rather than legislating additional reform

DTE CEO Anthony Earley sees it differently In a letter to customers Earley wrote It is important for legislators to hear directly from people who will be affected by the unintended con sequences of how PA 141 has been implemented

He also wrote 'Michigans Electric Choice Program demands immediate attention If left unattended, it will lead to a California like energy crisis I am referring specifically to rate increases of 20 percent to 30 percent for residential and small commercial customers, a financially crippled Detroit Edison, potential job losses in Michigan's electric industry and service and rehability problems'

According to Leslie Rich, a senior analyst for Bank of America Capital Management, who testified before the Senate Committee on Energy and Technology, utilities in Michigan are in limbo between a regulated and deregulated model She also said the current business model under which Detroit Edison is forced to operate under PA 141 isn t a good one, especially with the utility's Wall Street standing diminishing

Those customers who went to use alternate suppliers and who later wish to return to Detroit Edison may cause a problem, forcing the utility to buy additional power at a higher price, Patterson said This is just one of the issues Patterson believes need to be addressed Another is the use of nuclear power

'We have market segmenta tion, not competition, he said

Consumers need to ask their legislators an important ques tion, Patterson said Have you thought of a fix yet? 2006 is looming and it is not too far away'



f someone - God, say - put together a blue-ribbon committee to find the best possible person to try to save

blasted and troubled Detroit, it is easy to imagine Freman Hendrix as the more or less automatic choice

Handsome, athletic, a political operator to the marrow, Hendrix is

power When asked what he is proudest of, the 53-yearold US Navy veteran could say school reform, masterminding Bill Clinton's triumphant re-election campaign in the state or working out casino contracts

But he doesn't Yes, he was the guy who made it happen for the eight years of Dennis Archer's administration, as deputy mayor and chief of staff, sometimes publicly and more often behind the scenes He presided over efforts to reform the schools

Like Bobby Kennedy, he dispatched his man's political enemies with cheerful ruthlessness (some said, too much ruthlessness), did the deals, ran the office with efficiency and dignity, and tried (mostly in vain) to get the city's bureaucrats to treat common people as valued customers

Yet what he really would like people to know is that he was the guy who revived Little League baseball in Detroit, putting together a league from scratch, coaching his son's team and later serving as commissioner

"I always say if everybody who was so quick to jump on a

soapbox to bring some attention to themselves - if they spent time working in a youth recreation program - I think many of the problems we face today wouldn't be as bad "

Now, however, Hendrix is testing out the soapbox, trying to get the public's attention The city he served is in a deepening mess, and he wants to be mayor

Personally, he doesn't need the job He walked away from politics without bitterness in early 2001, when his boss couldn't decide whether to run again Hendrix then became chief operating officer of Strategic Staffing Solutions, an information technology company, and started making serious money for the first time in his life He played golf, took some vacations, got his son and daughter in good colleges

Last month he stepped down, however, to begin testing the waters for a run for mayor next year Though he chooses his words carefully, he is plainly appalled by the present administration's priorities and ways of doing business

The idea of spending unrevealed millions to buy the ruins of the old train station on the city's southwest side and convert it into a police headquarters strikes Hendrix as something close to, well, nuts "The police station needs to be downtown, and they need a state-of-the-art new facility,' he says, shaking his head

He also thinks Mayor Kwame Kılpatrıck's other recent proclamation, that Detroit needs a new millionsquare-foot convention center, is overreaching too (As with funding to pay for the train station, the mayor has been mysterious about much of the convention center details, including how to pay for it and where he plans to put it)

And Hendrix is willing to commit the ultimate political heresy and tell the truth, even when it hurts Detroiters have taken to saying their town is a "world-class city" or on the brink of becoming one Freman Hendrix, who himself was known to say that on occasion, now wishes he hadn't "That's something we wanted to move towards, but we aren't even close But we need strong leadership to start getting us there'

He thinks he could provide that leadership, combining his corporate and political contacts with the common touch that the somewhat stuffy Dennis Archer, a corporate lawyer, lacked But the big question is whether he will get the chance

Kılpatrıck, who likes to call himself the 'hip-hop mayor," will assuredly run again So will Sharon McPhail, a city council member who is charismatic and controversial Both have vastly higher name recognition than Hendrix, and perhaps the only thing they have in common is that they loathe him

Hanging out in his northwest Detroit neighborhood coffee shop, "Free" hopes that there will be a general sense in the city that it is time for a rational, competent, compassionate grownup

"Right now I am testing the waters," he says, spending a few months in boardrooms, on talk shows, and in the neighborhoods

He wants to see if the money needed to run a major campaign is there, and trying to gauge whether the votes will follow If not, he'll do something else He wants, but doesn't need this job, which just may be a powerful argument for putting him in it







Even under the glare of the ESPN-2 cameras and a national TV audience Saturday afternoon, University of Central Florida point-guard Gary Johnson remained focused on the task at hand

It was the Atlantic Sun Conference championship game between the top seeds. Troy State (Ala) and Central Florida, and an intense struggle developed with an NCAA mens basketball tournament bid hanging in the balance

The Wayne Memorial High graduate certainly did his part, nailing four critical free throws down the stretch to preserve a 60-55 win in a game played at Belmont University (Nashville, Tenn)

The transfer from Schoolcraft College, who had six points, four assists and three rebounds, is going dancing He and his Golden Knights teammates are in the field of 64

'Just because it's on ESPN, you can't play outside yourself," said the 6-foot-1 Johnson, who is averaging 77 points per game and has started 28

games while leading UCF to a school-record 25 wins "I knew what got us there and you can't do anything different just because you're on TV

"It felt real good, it's just started to soak in

Johnson, who averages 30 minutes per game, is a passfirst, shoot-second style of point-guard He is a 77 percent free throw shooter and leads UCF in assists with a total of 122 Johnson, a defensive stopper, 1s also second on the team in total steals (54)

UCF, the second seed in the Atlantic Sun after going 17-3 in conference play, opened the tourney last Thursday with a 71-63 win over Jacksonville as Johnson scored 12 points and dished out four assists He had seven points, two rebounds, six assists and no turnovers while playing 30-plus minutes in a 64-62 semifinal win the next night over host Belmont

'It was no cakewalk, it was close all the way through,' Johnson said of the threegame tourney "It was not easy (against Troy), but we did what we needed to do

It was only two weeks earlier that Johnson got some unexpected and harsh news He never anticipated he had to fly home during a crucial part of the season

But the day Johnson was slated to start his 24th game of the year against last-place Gardner-Webb (NC), he flew home from Orlando to attend the funeral of his closest friend, Jermaine McDaniel, who died of heart failure at age 22

'I felt I needed to be at the funeral and I had enough faith in my teammates to hold things down," Johnson said "He (McDaniel) was a guy I met when I first got to Wayne We were on the same team in the ninth and 10th grade, then he moved away to Inkster

"It's tough to realize he was gone, being there with him at the casket, instead of being at one of my games"

The day Johnson flew home, his teammates delivered some welcome news as they held on for an 87-79 overtime win

Coach (Kurt) Speraw could see I was hurting," Johnson said "I told him I would have to have to leave and that I needed to be at the funeral I had enough faith in my teammates that they could hold

Johnson has scored in double figures nine times, including a game-high 24 against Belmont, a team which won against Big 12 foe Missouri back in December

"We needed a quarterback to run the show and be unselfish, get the ball to the right people," Speraw said "Gary's our leader in assists and he's had to make big shots He's starting to shoot better"

Under coach Wayne Woodard, Johnson was primarily scorer at Wayne Memorial But when he arrived at Schoolcraft, he had to change gears

A back-up to the University of Detroit Mercy's Rulon Harris his freshman year with the 35-1 Ocelots, Johnson got a daily dose in the rudiments of / playing the point

"I learned a lot from Rulon," Johnson said "At first I was upset that I had to play behind him, but I was still able to get some quality minutes' I wouldn't have had it any other way because he made me a better defensive player Going against Rulon in practice every day made me better"

Johnson also credits Briggs, a former point-guard at Baylor University, for getting him squared away from a mental standpoint of playing the position

"Coach Briggs is a unique type of coach because he's so in touch," Johnson said "He's

played so long and he's played pickup with us He taught me to be a point-guard, as far as learning time and score He got me to slow down and use time off the clock."

Johnson blossomed his second season at Schoolcraft. helping the Ocelots to a 31-4 record and a berth for the third straight year in the NJCAA Division I Tournament in Hutchinson, Kan During his second year with the Ocelots, Johnson averaged a team-high 6 6 assists per game while averaging close to 10 points

And it was in Hutchinson where Johnson, who was probably the most consistent Ocelot in their three NJCAA tourney games, who caught the eye of UCF assistant coach Tom Schuberth

"Gary's a very personable young man and he wants to learn," Speraw said "Going from a JUCO (junior college) to the Division I level is not easy, but he's getting better because he's so coachable He's worked hard and is also wanting to learn more"

Johnson credits his brother Eric Williams, whom he lived with in high school, along with coaches Woodard and Briggs, for steering him in the right direction

And there was also his close friend McDaniel, who had talked about going down to see Gary play in the conference tourney

"I knew if he was still alive he'd be one of the happiest," Johnson said "I know at least he'd be watching it on ESPN"



Patriot grad Terek rules indoor meet

Livonia native and Franklin High graduate Paul Terek repeated Sunday as the 2004 USA Indoor Combined Events champion Sunday at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill

Terek, the 2002 Big Ten Athlete of the Year at Michigan State, posted six indoor personal bests in the seven-event heptathlon while scoring a total of 6,040 points, seventh best alltime on the American list

Former University of Tennessee standout and 2003 NCAA decathlon champion Stephen Harris was runner-up with 5,989 followed by former Western Michigan standout and 2002 USA Outdoor Championships decathlon thirdplace finisher Phil McMullen with 5,898

World decathlon champion Tom Pappas (Knoxville, Tenn), who led after the first day of competition, did not compete in the pole vault on Sunday, choosing to rest his right shoulder following surgery there to remove cartilage on Jan 27

TRACK

Terek, who was fourth after the first day, set a new American multi-event record in his specialty, the pole vault, by clearing 17 feet, 9 inches

He also had indoor personal bests in the 60meter dash (7 04), long jump (22-2 3/4), high jump (6-6), 60 high hurdles (8 48), and 1,000 run (2 42 97)

He threw the shot put $50-2 \ 3/4$ after recording a personal best of 52-6 in an indoor meet last month in Boise, Idaho

A year ago, Terek scored 5,870 points to beat runner-up Jeff Sander by 139 points for the Combine Events title

"I'm happy to score over 6,000, but I also won by less than 100 points," said Terek, who currently trains in San Luis Obispo, Calif "He (Harris) had a bad hurdles race and did not do as well in the pole vault But It was a really steady decathlon for me, nothing big or bad This is the starting point for the outdoor season"

Terek is gearing up for the U.S. Olympic Trials, July 16-17, in Sacramento, Calif He was third in the 2003 USA Outdoor Championships decathlon and finished 12th in the 2003 World Championships in Paris

"It's going to be a dogfight in the outdoor trials," said Terek, who is gunning for one of the three decathlon spots to represent the US at the 2004 Summer Olympics in Athens, Greece "I know what I have to fix and I have more confidence in the respect that I know and I can perform hke this on a daily basis This will give me even more confidence when I do really have good meet"

Terek moves on to the outdoor season, which includes stops at Cal-Poly, Tucson, Ariz, Mt San Antonio Relays (Calif) and Austria.

"Even though I'm tired, this week we'll build strength, heavy lifting even though we're still in recovery," he said

What's Going On with My Water Bill?

Rate increases effective July 1, 2004 through June 30, 2005 were recently approved for the Detroit Water and Sewerage Department. Here are answers to some of the most frequently asked questions we have received about water rates:

How much will my bill go up?

Every city or township served by DWSD will be different, but the average increase for all suburban customers is 3.9 percent the lowest in four years. An average household uses 7,500 gallons of water a month (1.000 cubic feet). If that is what your household uses a 3.9 percent increase will raise your water bill 77 cents a month, less than a cup of coffee these days. Your final bill is a combination of Detroit's wholesale charge to your local government plus charges added by your local government to cover the costs it incurs in delivering water to each household and business.

Why do you need an increase?

We have to comply with all state and federal environmental regulations That is very expensive. For instance, we're modernizing our Wastewater Treatment Plant to keep it in compliance with state and federal environmental regulations. That alone is costing more than \$500 million in addition, we re-installing a computer system that keeps track of the entire water and sewerage network and lets us know immediately about any problems. That's costing almost \$250 million.

I thought you were trying to hold down your operating costs?

We're doing that There is no increase in the new rate for the day-to-day operating budget of DWSD. In fact, the coming fiscal year will be the third consecutive year in which DWSD has avoided any increase in its operational and maintenance budget a major accomplishment

Why are these improvements necessary now?

Putting off the needed improvements will not make them go away In fact they would only cost more in the future The City of Atlanta delayed making similar improvements through the years Now, they face a situation where their water bills are going to triple - that's an increase of 300 percent - in the next five years

How do DWSD rates compare to other water and wastewater systems?

Detroits wholesale rates to its suburban customers are significantly lower than those charged by other service providers in the Great Lakes region Suburban

customer communities in Grand Rapids Kalamazoo Saginaw, Bay City Cleveland, Columbus Cincinnati and Dayton all pay significantly more for wholesale water and/or sewer service than does the average community that receives service from DWSD

Why didn't you adopt the moratorium on rate increases some have been urging?


Adopting a moratorium would violate state law because we are prohibited from adopting a deficit budget which is what a moratorium would produce In addition a moratorium would violate the terms of our bonding covenants and place us in violation of cost-of-service rates formulation. The next time we try to sell bonds it would cost us and our customers considerably more money.

How much of a profit does DWSD make?

DWSD is a not-for-profit system. All rates are based on the actual costs of delivery for water and wastewater services. The rates we charge each community are based only on the actual costs we incur delivering water and wastewater services to that community.

The Detroit Water and Sewerage Department is proud of how we are holding down costs while continuing to bring our customers water that ranks among the highest quality in the nation.


And they've already started work They've done about 17 estimates so far and have already contracted several jobs

Remembering the true meaning of St. Pat's Day

ıke her mother before her, Sıster Ann Stamm will be pinning on a shamrock before heading to Mass on St Patrick's Day The three-leaf clover symbolizes the Felician nun's affection for the priest who converted thousands of pagans to Christianity in fifth century Ireland

Sister Stamm and many other Irish Americans haven't forgotten the true meaning of the Catholic holy day that's turned into a secular holiday celebrated with green beer They're recognizing the March 17 anniversary of St Patrick's death in a variety of ways that begin with a trip to church

As a professor and chairman of the religion and philosophy departments at Madonna University, Sister Stamm says it's especially important to remember the man and his mission She learned about it from her mother, whose mother Annie Croughan came from Galway, Ireland, the country Patrick roamed for 30 years to deliver the message of God

People can read the life of Patrick," Sister Stamm said "He was enslaved as a young man and went through a tremendous internal conversion Once freed, he made a deliberate choice to do the exact opposite of what was done to him He wanted to serve. and free people from the real bondages - idolates bitterness, lack of forgiveness, intolerance He dedicated his life to God as a priest with the idea to free all forms of enslavement."

Husbands are participating in tasks around the house more these days than ever before But every study continues to show that women do the majority of work around the home, even when they work outside the house

Veteran journalist will talk about Washington

Bob Levey still laughs about the time he hung up on President Ronald Reagan when he was in the White House The Washington Post journalist thought it was a wise guy on the city desk After a second call Levey realized it was the president telling him he'd sent \$250 for one of his fund-raisers

Levey's column has raised \$17 million for various childrens charities since it began appearing five times a week in 1981 Levey's as proud of his social contributions as the stories hes written about politics, Congress, campaigns, local news, and sports over the last 36-years Until he retired at the end of last year, Levey was an award-winning daily columnist covering everything from presidents to people who swept the street And his colleagues noticed In 2001 he was named one of the three best columnists in Washington, DC, by Washingtonian magazine for the fifth time

Levey looks back on his time in Washington in a lecture for the Livonia Town Hall series Wednesday, March 17, at St Marys Cultural Center in Livonia He saw a lot of changes during that time, not all of them good

"It isn't as much fun as it used to be The two party system is acrimonious in the worst way In 1967 senators were truly colleagues,' said Levey who lives in Chevy Chase, Md

"I m going to tell some of my favorite war stories involving mostly presidents and the business of journalism, and take a look at the campaign

Levey 1sn't predicting a winner in the 2004 presidential election but is predicting a turn around in the number of people who vote

The number of people who vote has gone down in the last 50 years," said Levey "It makes me crazy that 20 somethings aren't interested in voting They have to be persuaded that their vote makes a difference They're even more cynical than

their parents I wish campaigns could be aimed more at young people" One wish Levey is beginning to realize is to write Levey lengthier arti-

to do free lance work for The Washington Post, magazines, radio, and television He says, he's not really returng Hes not a shuffleboard type of guy who'll go off and live in a cabin in West Virginia

'I was so privileged to be in the business I worked for Katherine Graham 30 years, Ben Bradley 25 years It was the privilege of a lifetime They're both missed so incredibly much," said Levey

'I would hke to have done a wider range of longer pieces rather than dishing up a column every day for a quarter of a century Thats one good trend in the business Gone are city editors who beat you over the head if you wanted to spend more than five minutes on a story

Livonia Town Hall president Dee Dee Ditmar is looking forward to hearing Levey's stories about his years in journalism and politics She's just delighted that the veteran journalist could fill in after author Micaela Gilchrist canceled to do a book tour in Germany

"I'm excited about Bob Levey coming and excited about the new season we'll be announcing," said Ditmar "We have a very literate audience These are people who get excited about interesting people"

Ever since registered dietitian Beverly Price began seeing clients with eating disorders in the 1990s, she felt there was something miss ing from the team approach used to treat anorexia nervosa, bulimia and bingeing

Then she began taking yoga The classes haven t changed her mind about the need for clients to see a psychiatrist or psychotherapist, dietitian and physician, but she is recommending yoga to them as a complementary approach along with Eden Process workshops by psychotherapist Renee Steiner Hinkins

She and Steiner Hinkins have teamed up to offer yoga and the 21week non-traditional therapeutic approach at Integrated Nutrition in Farmington Hills Price teaches clients yoga privately at Integrated

"Yoga brings mind and body together," said Price Eastern medi cine looks at yoga as a way to control emotions, heal disease Renee is using an approach with a similar philosophy'

Through the Eden Process Steiner Hinkins encourages clients in various stages of the disease to develop coping skills Her current class includes women who range in age from their 20s to their 50s

"It's a positive, future-oriented approach, said Steiner Hinkins I don't allow discussions of unhealthy behavior I begin by creating awareness of their self and how their eating disorder impacts their life

Steiner Hinkins leads the women through structured workbook exercises to conquer stress and build assertiveness Another approach, EMDR (Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing), helps clients work through past traumas by focusing on them

Sherry Saginaw never realized she had an eating disorder until signing up for the Eden Process Owner of Get a Grip on Fitness in Keego Harbor, Saginaw thought the experience would help her help clients at the studio Instead it uncovered feelings, she said, that had been festering since she was sexually molested as a youth

Eating disorders can be caused by a number of factors including genetic/environmental, a chemical imbal ance in the brain and trauma Sufferers deal with the psychological illness by starving themselves (anorexia), bingeing and purging (bulimia), or not purging but using inappropriate behaviors such as fasting or excessive exercise

Saginaw, now 53, says in her younger years she swam a mile three four times a week, weighttrained for two hours three-four times a week, and ran six miles a day several days a week until one day she couldn't stop eating and crying because she couldn't break the cycle She d sustained several overuse injuries by this point

I always thought I could resolve any eating issues by exercising more The great thing about Eden is the more I got into it I was able to see all of these behaviors and deal with them, said Saginaw of Bloomfield Hills

Diane Hopp uses the yoga Price taught her to control binge eating For years she d been on diets only to go off them and gain weight A retired psychotherapist, she knew from teaching children to breathe properly that it could lessen anxiety

Every doctor has told me yoga would help me," said Hopp of West Bloomfield Its because of the process of relaxation I also needed to find out what makes me eat and find ways to cope with that I can't exercise I'm $58/_2$ years old and not waiting for instant results It will probably be about a year before I meet my weight loss goal

Since I started yoga breathing I ve been able to work through the urge to eat when I shouldn't It's a good feeling to know I have control I learned to understand my hunger"


Dr Alexander Sackeyfio's eating disorder patients haven t reached the point of being able to work on emotional problems Their bodies are so ravaged by anorexia and bulimia that his first concern is nutrition

'An anorexic feels better when empty A bulimic feels better when eating Once they start starving themselves and exercising it becomes part of a physical illness,' said Sackeyfio, a psychiatrist and

Experts to discuss findings on colon cancer

In observance of Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month, Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan is hosting a "Private Screening Goes Public" forum on Tuesday, March 16 Experts in the fields of radiology and gastroenterology will discuss the value and effectiveness of various means of detecting colon cancer, with a focus on the new technology called "virtual colonoscopy'

The forum, at the Blues complex at 53200 Grand River in New Hudson (near I-96 and Wixom Road), is free and open to the public Registration begins at 9 a m with the program scheduled to run from 10 a m to noon

"We encourage everyone to hear the facts about colon cancer and screening techniques Our goal is to promote discussion among physicians, payers and patients on medical technology," said Dr Tom Simmer, Michigan Blues chief medıcal officer

Colon cancer is the second leading cause of cancer fatalities for men and women There is a 1 in 16 lifetime chance of devel-

oping colorectal cancer and approximately 150,000 new cases will be diagnosed this year Fortunately, colon cancer is highly preventable, and when discovered in its early stages, highly treatable Unfortunately, according to the American

Cancer Society, less than half of the people who are at risk get recommended screenings

Simmer said the Blues forum will focus on 'virtual colonoscopy" Due to recent media attention, there is a high degree of interest in the new test However, Simmer said most discussions fail to mention important details people need to know about the test's effectiveness, limitations and cost, or the reliability of conventional tests

To encourage a thorough and balanced dialogue, the Michigan Blues have invited two noted industry experts to present their findings and viewpoints at the forum Dr Beth McFarland, associate professor of radiology at the Washington University School of Medicine in St Louis, is the lead investigator on the university's study to

evaluate diagnostic performance of virtual colonoscopy, funded by the National Institute of Health's National Cancer Institute She is also on the American College of Radiology's Commission on Research and Technology Assessment

Also on the speaker's roster is Dr Ronald Fogel, a senior staff physician in gastroenterology at Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit Fogel is listed in the Consumer's Guide to Top Doctors for his specialty (stomach, colon and intestinal disorders)

Information gathered at the March 16 forum will be shared with the Blue Cross and Blue Shield Association's Technology Evaluation Center, which is preparing a report on virtual colonoscopy scheduled for publication in July Virtual colonoscopy is currently considered experimental and is not covered by most insurers, including Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan

name a few if you have high cholesterol these drugs play an important role in reducing the risk that you will have a heart attack in addition the statin drugs may have a place in preventing osteoporosis However in a few people the statin medications cause an unusual side effect. The drug affects your muscles. The problem can be an annoying irritation in leg muscles or can go so far as to inflame the muscle fibers causing serious weakness There is no test you can take before using the cholesterol lowering drug to know that you are at risk for this side effect. In most cases, but not always, your doctor can order a test to see if you are experiencing inflammation of muscles while you are taking the statin medication If you develop muscle pain or weakness and are on statin therapy the only way to confirm the drug is the cause is to stop the drug. You need to do so for three to four weeks. If your muscle pain or weakness resolves then that result implicates the statin as the cause Your doctor can put you on another statin drug in most instances another one will not cause the same muscle effect. Because cholesterol lowering medications are associated with this risk you will find your doctor almost always wants you to change your diet before prescribing a pill no matter how easy that solution appears

Development creates 'nice streetscape' in Birmingham

BY NORMAN PRADY CORRESPONDENT

What were they thinking in the 1920s? What kind of a house would you build on a 20-foot lot?

Well, 80 some years later, someone gathered up those 30 lots that had been laid out on Pierce in Birmingham, hooked them together in a new way and spread them back out as 14 home sites

The someone was Robertson In-Town, a new division of longtime

builder Robertson Brothers Company, Bloomfield Hills, now specializing, they said, in "downtown" living


According to James Jehle, the division's president, "the group was formed to provide to urban in-fill or individual lot situations the same expertise home buyers expect from our larger-scale communities"

The builders combined the platted lots, 129 5 feet deep, into a pattern of two 40-foot lots followed by a 60-foot lot "to give it a nice streetscape as you're driving down Pierce," Jehle said The lots are on the west side of the street in the first block north of 14 Mile

The 40-foot lots, Jehle said, are for the 'Pierce' design and the 60-foot for the 'Hamilton" The architects are Laurence Hornbeck & Associates of Troy

The Pierce, Jehle said, is 2,250 square feet with a second-floor laundry room, hall bathroom and three bedrooms. including a master suite with private bath and his-and-her walk-in closets

down, Jehle said, was a special consideration because of the lot size 'Whenever you have a house that s narrow and deep, the challenge is getting light in



The Pierce is one of two models offered by Robertson In-Town on Pierce Street in Birmingham. The Hamilton is also available, and features a second-floor laundry room

"By opening up the stairways we were able to get glass on three levels, including first and second floors and basement, said Jehle

The Pierce, he said, 'has a contemporary-lifestyle kitchen-nook-family room combination" leading out to a future patio or deck

At 2,704 square feet on the 60-foot lot, the Hamilton, also has a secondfloor laundry room Buyers can choose three or four bedrooms upstairs along with two or three bathrooms Both houses have two-car garages

The houses, Jehle said, are designed within the local restrictions, meaning the house and garage cannot occupy more than 30 percent of the lot Ceilings are nine feet on the first floor and eight on the second Basements are 8-foot-6, the deepest the builders could go, Jehle said, due to existing sewer lines





Economist predicts rental housing rise in coming years

(PRNewswire) - The National Multi Housing Council refutes recent analyst claims that new federal and private-sector homeownership initiatives will automatically translate into meaningful losses for the apartment sector

NMHC chief economist Mark Obrinsky issued the following statement

"Housing demand is not a zero-sum game Population growth – through natural population increase, continued high levels of immigration and increased life spans - will increase demand for both owner- and renter-occupied housing

"While the recently announced homeownership initiatives may turn some renters into owners, the overall demand for rental housing should be on the rise for at least the next 15 years

"The key factor driving housing demand in the next decade will be demographics And many of those demographic trends will clearly favor rental housing, especially the swell of echo boomers (currently between the ages of 8 and 27) and the continuing shift toward single-person households

"After declining for two decades, the population in the prime renting years (ages 20-29) is expected to increase 11 percent between now and 2010

'Eventually more than 80 million echo boomers will move into the housing market, most likely as renters first And there is no 'baby bust expected behind this generation just a plateau

Then there are continuing changes in household composition The households most likely to own married couples with children - are declining in number and now account for less than one-quarter of all households

"Meanwhile, two-thirds of all new households in the past decade were non-family households (including single-person households), which have the lowest homeownership rates By itself, this demographic shift would cause the rentership rate to rise by 70 basis points by 2010

"Immigration will create even more new renters More than a million legal immigrants a year have been entering the United States this decade In fact, fully 50 percent of the expected population growth in the United States will be immigrants And half of all

Owning a home getting easier for those first-timers

(NAPSI) - The dream of home ownership may be easier immigrants - and three-quarters of recent immigrants (those who have been in this country no more than five years) - are renters

"Apartment demand will be further bolstered as the 10b market rebounds

'Most of the twenty-somethings who had returned home or had doubled up with roommates to save on living costs while the job market was so weak will move out and once again form their own households

"Even if the recent rash of election-year initiatives and new private-sector programs were to raise the homeownership rate by 3 percentage points over the current decade - a possible, but unlikely, scenario the number of apartment renters would still rise by almost 1 million

"Moreover, if the recent run-up in housing prices makes homeownership too expensive, the number of new renters expected in the next decade could easily grow from 1 million to 5 or 6 million, according to Harvard University's 2003 State of the Nations Housing report

'The new apartment supply expected to come online in the next few years is in line with these demand projections This is good news for apartment investors and apartment operators

As the Mercury Sable approaches its 20th year gracing American roads, it seems to get only better and better Twenty years Amazing that a nameplate has been around that long, especially in this day and age of change, change change

I first spied the Sable, albeit totally innocently, when I was handed a Ford of Europe annual report when I visited Ford offices in Rome, Italy in the spring of 1985 There right on the cover, was a beautiful picture of the Sable

I was in Italy with my parents, my husband, my uncle and aunt and their newly-wed son and daughter-in-law I remember showing them the materials I had received during that Ford visit and my mom oohing and aahing over the Sable

When it was unveiled that fall (that s when they showed new models) at the Ford preview, I was really surprised By October, my parents had bought one Then another, and another They truly enjoyed that car

So that's my history with the Sable

This year, the Sable is even better with more refinements, better styling and more options than ever before You can opt for a five-passenger or six-passenger seating arrangement I would opt for the five passenger model for comfort, however In the six-passenger arrangement, you can pick up the center armrest, which holds a storage bin, coin holder and cassette storage, and allows you to pick up that center passenger Good in a pinch, but not on a long haul

By the way, the Sable is still offered in a station wagon configuration, if you see it necessary That gives the top of the-line LS premium package a seven- or eight passenger option

There are two engines available on the Sable the 3 0-

liter 12-valve overhead cam Vulcan V6 and a 3 0-liter 24valve V6 Both are designed to travel to 100,000 miles before the first tune-up Maintenance free Just about

Acceleration was constant, on the city roads and on the freeway I didn t feel the need to worry that it wouldn't get up to speed when I wanted it to

Power is delivered through a front-wheel-drive system and a four-speed automatic transmission that has a host of shift quality improvements this year Anti lock brakes are standard, too And is variable assist power rack-and-pinion steering Thats a plus

As for safety, you have to understand that after all these years, Ford has perfected the safety issues for the Sable and its reflected in the fact that the Highway Traffic Safety Administration has voted the Sable a five-star crash test designation for front passengers since 1999 Thats a pretty nice badge to put on a passenger car

Inside was comfortable The seats were comfy, the instrumentation was absolutely above board in accessibility and the controls were where I wanted them to be for my

comfort zones

I have to tell you that the Sable was a quiet car In city driving or freeway driving, it was really quiet

I did have one complaint The driver's seat didn't conform to my driving habits I love my seats to be at the most upright position I have a bad back and it makes a difference to me The Sable didn't at all get straight enough for my liking, although it wasn t as if I was uncomfortable throughout the week. I didn't take for a long, long ride, but I wonder that if I did, I would feel fatigued I need that ultimate straight-back support that I couldn't get with the seats in the Sable

If that's my only complaint, call it lucky

I have a long history with this vehicle I can't imagine being displeased with it I don't think you will be displeased either Go take a look What are the ads saying today? Look again I think you'll be surprised


