More than three dozen layoffs, less extensive cleaning of school buildings and cuts in middle and high school athletics are among the list of budget cuts and reductions being discussed by the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education to balance a projected \$8 6 million budget deficit for the next school year The administration believes

an earlier projected deficit of \$9 2 million will be reduced by \$650,000 as the state indicates it won't change the formula for funding student enrollment However, Superintendent Jim Ryan said its still difficult to find cuts and reductions totaling more than \$2.6 million that wont have a dramatic impact on the district, employees and students

Tuesday night, Ryan presented the board with \$2 2 million in reductions that include 40 layoffs, including 16 custodians, four high school nurses and the security director at the high school complex

According to Ryan's figures,

the district could save more than \$480,000 by performing what he termed 'modified cleaning" in the district's buildings

"It's better than every other day cleaning and we think we can reduce costs," said Ryan Ryan is looking at another

\$200,000 cut from the athletic department budget, which could be addressed in a number of wavs

We ve asked the middle schools to look at the restructuring of sports and to see if there is a pay-to-participate opportunity there,' Ryan said

High school athletes currently pay a \$125 fee to participate in as many sports as they choose "Some people have sug-

gested that students pay per sport, rather than a one-time fee," he said "They've also discussed ticket price increases at athletic events as a possibility for more revenue'

Ryan is also looking at reorganization of high school athletics, and has put all three high school athletic directors on notice for possible layoff

Slashing the jobs of four of the five high school nurses

would save \$300,000 However, George Shea, whose daughter is a junior, told board members he's not in favor of that option

"I know all the cuts are difficult, but as a father I want my kids to be safe and I want someone there to take care of them, he said I strongly urge you to keep nurses at the park'

The list of cuts also includes limiting the number of hours the media centers in elementary school buildings are open, saving the district an estimated \$225,000

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"I would assume that within a month we should be digging in the ground," said Mayor Pro Tem Dan Dwyer, who has pushed the project since being elected to the city commission five years ago "It hasn't been easy, but there is a lot of credit to a lot of people for seeing it through "

The commission voted in September to go ahead with the project, provided the estimated \$154,000 needed to construct the bathroom was committed through private donations Dwyer met with Patrick O'Neill, president-elect of the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce, Wednesday and counted \$160,000 in committed funding Dwyer expects the commission to vote on awarding the contract to EGH Contractor Inc of Plymouth at Monday's city commission meeting

"Right from the beginning, (Chamber Executive Director) Fran Toney and I said it wouldn't happen unless we got a lot of people involved, and many different people and companies stepped up,' said Dwyer "I've got to credit the Plymouth Downtown Development Authority, when they committed the \$50,000 the ball started to roll '

Dwyer has committed \$1,000 to the project, which will be constructed to the rear of The Gathering and next the Penn Theatre

Others donating to the project include the Kiwanis, Lions and Rotary clubs, the Community Band, downtown retail merchants, New Liberty Bank, UBS Financial, Compari's, Raymond James, Johnson Controls, Visteon, and Ferris, Baker Watts

He hasn't had to wait long for much else in his career Former boss Alan Breakie, who spent nearly 40 years building the hospital, hired Ley in May 1979 as an assistant administrator and put him in charge of the ER.

Ley spurred improvements in the department, including an upgrade of the quality of doctors working there, all the while learning at Breakie's feet

"He was a 'people person' the whole way, and you don't learn that in school," Ley recalled "After five years, we both had the people side down He and I trued to think that way (But) I to this day get (employees) who say, 'Mr Breakie wouldn't do it that way"

Ley's big break, if it's possible to see it that way, came when the hospital flooded in



July 1987 Four inches of rain fell in some three hours, and the hospital flooded When staffers saw the waters move a car from one end of the parking lot to the loading dock, the decision was made to evacuate

The hospital discharged about 150 patients, moved most of the others to nowdefunct Wayne County Hospital, and used the donation of some 25 generators from the community to care for the rest

In dealing with the aftermath, however, Breakie suffered chest pains and was hospitalized for some five weeks Ley stepped in, working with staffers every day to get the place back up and running, and solidified his spot as Breakie's heir-apparent

## OUR VIEWS JCI choice good for community

That great whoosh' you heard last week was the sound of Plymouth Township officials breathing again after their second-largest taxpayer decided to build its \$140-million expansion in the township

But the decision by Johnson Controls Inc to build on 100-plus acres of former Detroit House of Corrections property, while enhancing its current facilities in the MetroWest Industrial Park, is significant for more than just tax-roll purposes

It also keeps a great neighbor in the community

JCIs choice impacts the Plymouth community in ways most people don't realize It's difficult to overstate the capacity to which the automotive supplier gives back to the community

JCI gives of its people, its time and its coffers The company supports countless Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce programs, including its industrial committee and the Leadership Plymouth program JCI is a major sponsor of the annual auction, the fund-raiser that helps keeps the chamber viable

The company is also a major sponsor of the annual Plymouth International Ice Sculpture Spectacular, and just about every other major event that happens in the community

Many organizations seek donations, and JCI seems to drop something in every hat and hand that pops open, all in an effort to maintain solid relations in one of the communities it calls home

There was speculation that Johnson Controls used its flirtation with Salem Township – going so far as to make water and sewer arrangements for its new facility – to squeeze favorable agreements out of Plymouth Township

JCI officials deny that and, given the fact Plymouth Township board members have rarely met a tax abatement they didn't like, such a stratagem probably wouldn't have been necessary Clerk Marilyn Massengill generally votes no on principle when it comes to tax abatements, but even she sees the value of having such a solid corporate partner in the township's midst

JCI officials described the situation as a "win-win' for the company and for the township, and they're right The company's expansion and renovation projects keeps tens of thousands of dollars in tax revenue rolling in

More importantly, though, it keeps Johnson Controls – like the neighbor who mows your lawn and snow-blows your sidewalk – right where you want them in your own back yard

## Not surprising

County last week was a good first step in bridging the communication gap that exists between Detroit and its suburban water customers

Kılpatrıck, who March 25 became the first Detroit mayor to ever visit the Oakland County Board of Commissioners, will make similar visits to Macomb and Wayne counties in the near future

He promised more transparency" in the operations of the Detroit Water and Sewerage Department, which supplies water to 4.5 million people in 125 southeast Michigan communities Approximately 75 percent of those customers live outside of Detroit

For several years, suburban leaders have criticized the way Detroit has operated the water system, particularly how it has set water rates, which have jumped dramatically in recent years. The suburbs want more say on how the rates are formulated by the Detroit-owned system

A little face to face dialogue is sorely needed because the two sides have traded barbs through the local media, intensifying an issue that has become very political

But the fact is, this is a regional problem that must be solved through regional cooperation The Southeast Michigan Council of Governments estimates it is going to cost more than \$20 billion to update aging water and sewer infrastructure in the region

Many people, including Kilpatrick, Gov Jennifer Granholm and Oakland County Drain Commissioner John McCulloch, are pinning their hopes on the Southeast Michigan Consortium for Water Quality as the place where the differences between the city and its suburban water customers can be solved Granholm said the group, represented by a variety of interests from the city and suburbs, is a model of cooperative spirit

Kilpatrick made it clear that Detroit has no intention of giving up control of the water system However, by crossing Eight Mile Road, with all its history and symbolism, Kilpatrick showed he is at least willing to work with his suburban counterparts For that, he should be applauded

# Foot-dragging on mercury places everyone at risk

ıke many other Mıchıganders, I'm an avıd fisherman

Some of the happiest times of my life have been spent on trout streams in the U P (Upper Peninsula, that is) with my father's old 8<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-foot Leonard bamboo fly rod in hand And there is nothing on earth that makes better eating than a freshly caught 12-inch brook trout, fried up gently next to the river

And like many others in our state, I have been nervous about eating fish from our lakes and streams for fear of mercury built up in the flesh

In fact, Michigan has had since 1988 a statewide mercury advisory recommending reduced consumption of walleye, largemouth and smallmouth bass, northern pike, muskie and lake trout

Evidence about the harm mercury does has been building for many years The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention places mercury poison high on the list of environmental pollution And in January, the CDC published a study estimating

that one American woman in 12 of childbearing age has mercury levels in her blood above what the EPA thinks is safe for a fetus

A scientist with the Environmental Protection Agency recently estimated that 63,000 newborns each year are at risk of permanent developmental disabilities from mercury poisoning

Now mercury doesn't normally occur in fish Instead, it comes from mercury in the air, which falls with the rain and enters lakes and streams, where it gets into the fish And it s clear that the main source of mercury air pollution is smoke from coal-burning electric power plants They release 42 percent of all mercury emissions in the United States, according to the National Wildhife Federation, which has reducing mercury pollution a top priority The amount of mercury released makes you blink 48 tons every year!

Yet there is no federal regulation dealing with mercury emissions from power plants Back in 2000, the EPA said it intended to issue tough rules to require coal-fired electric plants to slash the mercury emission rate Not surprisingly, some in the electric power industry were not pleased, and the EPA in the Bush administration has moved with all dehberate slowness on the subject

The new EPA administrator, Michael Leavitt, came into office boasting that new EPA rules would cut mercury emissions by nearly 70 percent by 2018 But a couple of weeks ago, the *Los Angeles Times* reported that political appointees topside in the EPA had ignored previous scientific studies on mercury pollution and refused to authorize the economic and scientific work to underpin the new rule Some of the language in the new rule turns out to have been written word for word by electric power industry lobbyists

So now the EPA has announced an "extended comment period" for whatever rule it is thinking about promulgating I suppose we can confidently expect such a new rule will necessarily be delayed until after the election in November Meanwhile, the mercury continues to fall from the skies

Things are rather better in Lansing Gov Jennifer Granholm says her overall goal is to eliminate all human-generated sources of mercury pollution in Michigan by 2020 In response, the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality has convened a work group to make recommendations for state action to reduce and eventually eliminate mercury pollution from coal-fired electric plants in Michigan Former state Sen John H ("Joe') Schwarz — a practicing physician and now a Republican candidate in the 7th Congressional District — is a member of the work group With Schwarz involved, I'm sure whatever recommendations emerge will be both tough and practical

There is nothing mysterious about the technology to scrub mercury out of coal smoke More than 90-percent reductions in mercury emission have been achieved in nearly a dozen coal-fired plants across the United States An outfit in Michigan called We Energies plans to install such technology at its Presque Isle plant in Marquette

Of course, there are at least two problems First, anti-mercury technology costs money How much depends on whose arguments you believe, but many experts say installing scrubbers likely would not add more than a couple of percent to the average energy bill Second, eliminating mercury pollution from Michigan power plants is essential — but we still will get airborne mercury from power plants in other states until tough federal regulations are adopted and enforced

So while the Washington bureaucrats, political appointees and lobbyists do their peculiar dance, we have a good chance of actually getting something done here in Michigan There are advantages, it seems, to a decentralized federal system Though an enlightened federal government really would offer the best advantage for all

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# Moldy house prompts lawsuit Race for the Cure needs volunteers

When Canton residents Craig and Donna Nehasil bought a small home on Burnham in January 1998, it wasn't exactly a dream home

They'd been living in a townhouse, their family had expanded (they then had two children) and they wanted a home of their own

When they signed on the Burnham house in December 1997, it was the first home they had bought and Craig was nervous about the commitment they were making But it was a real home, not an apartment or townhouse

'We wanted a house we could update," Donna said "It was all 70s style inside the house"

Craig, who works for an office furniture company as a technician and used to be in the carpenters union, began fixing it up

Within a week after moving in, we had a river running through the basement," he said "Water was coming over the joists in the foundation, over the top of the wall We tried to find the source I started knocking down walls and lo and behold, we had a big problem

When he started ripping out walls, he said every wall but one had plastic sheeting under the drywall

'It seems like every time they had a problem with something, instead of going to the source and fixing it they put a Band-Aid on it and just tried to cover it up,' Craig said

Meanwhile another son was born "He was sick constantly," Donna said 'We were all getting sick all of the time"

In October 2002, the Nehasıls filed suit against the sellers and the real estate broker who handled the transaction for failing to disclose the problems that the house had when they bought it That suit is still pending in Wayne County Circuit Court A trial date is scheduled for April 19

The suit alleges that the sellers failed to disclose existing problems with the house, including water problems in the basement, roof problems, electrical problems and others

Finally, as Craig kept uncovering more problems, they hired a Troy-based inspection company to inspect the house

But Donna, who can only enter the house wearing a HAZMAT suit, fears that if furniture and other items are placed on the street they may be hazardous to their neighbors, especially if someone should decide to take some of the furniture into their own homes



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

Raising heirloom bulbs is a way of preserving history protecting genetically rich plants, and helping endangered plants survive, while adding distinction to a garden or yard

breeding food crops and ornamental plants that will meet future needs

Some of the bulbs are endangered In the 1800s, about 10,000 distinct cultivars of dahlias were named Today only three of these survive

Kunst, who started Old House Garden's in 1993, is a nationally recognized expert



If you have the urge to plant seeds, yet it's too cold or damp outdoors, plant some indoors

Indoor sowing might also be the only way to have in your garden that special variety -Violet Queen purple broccoli or Border Beauty zinnia, for example - that you'll rarely find for sale as transplants

The ideal transplant, when ready to go out in the garden, is stocky and dark green Growing such a plant takes a combination of art and science

For quick germination, seeds need warmth, moisture and, in some cases, light


Any container about 2 inches deep is suitable, as long as it

has holes in the bottom for drainage

Fill the container with potting soil, sow the seeds to a depth equal to twice their thickness, then firm the soil Water from below by setting the containers in a pan with an inch of water in it

Cover the container with a piece of clear plastic, then set it somewhere warm Seventy degrees Fahrenheit is a good average temperature to suit most seeds

Even seeds that need light to germinate are sufficiently stimulated by relatively little light, the amount in an average room being sufficient





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

cold at all (No doubt folks, Chris has got a problem<sup>1</sup>)

Chris and I talked, and I would like to point out some of the do's and don ts when it comes to a refrigerator new or used

Chris used the refrigerator for a few months before moving it to storage and he kept it in a shed for over three years without running it You should never shut off a refrigerator for more than a 90-day period and if you do, make sure you run it for a few hours every month or

That idleness and inactivity can also create internal restrictions in today's modern refrigerators sealed system This situation is caused by any moisture that remains in the system while it was constructed at the factory That small amount of

moisture will "grow He moved his refrigerator from the shed to the house by using a pickup truck and laying it down He also carried it off the truck into the house using a typical moving dolly

When moving any refrigeration product (a refrigerator, freezer, dehumidifier or room air conditioner), it is best to stand it up in its normal position This is so critical to the product's operation, because when you plug it in and turn it on, the oil in the bottom of the compressor has moved throughout the sealed tubing and can cause a valve to break It is imperative that you leave

the product standing in its normal operating position for a period of at least two hours before you turn it on or even plug it in That oil I speak of

must have time to return to the bottom of the compressor

In my travels I see refrigerators on their backside in truck beds and usually in summer months I see room air conditioners and dehumidifiers in the back of a car trunk with the hd tied down against it I see the lettering upside down or sideways Many times I have pulled up at a stop light, rolled the window down and informed the driver to make sure they let the unit sit for two hours before plugging it in You would be surprised at how many people don't know this

When moving a used or new refrigerator out of the box, keep in mind that the underside is full of metal tubing which carries the refrigerant throughout the sealed system Use care with the moving dolly that the lip of it doesn't damage any of this tubing Any tubing on the outside back of the product must also be treated gently

Our server's problem is now going to cost him some money to have repaired If the service technician is made aware that Chris caused the problem, that technician has all of the right to charge him the full price for replacing a compressor, which costs in the range of \$550 The compressor on this 4-year-old refrigerator has a limited fiveyear warranty, which means Chris could pay \$100 or so in only labor charges

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

Offering constructive criticism to others can be beneficial but only if the other person is receptive to our comments In teaching situations or during on the job training constructive criticism is usually necessary to instruct and help a person develop a trade or vocation. It often seems so easy to criticize others because we mistakenly believe that we are without fault or are such experts on most everything. The Bible tells us that we look at the speck in our brother's eye but we pay no attention to the log in our own (Luke 6.41) Faultfinding and being overly critical of others especially behind their backs are wrong and can become habit forming. However, kind words are good for the soul and help to build a person up

An authority on home energy savings has some troubling numbers for homeowners who think all there is to energy savings is enough attic insulation Matt Lamb says the energy savings in an average home could easily improve 15 percent to 25 percent

It wouldnt take a lot of sweat equity on the part of the homeowner to get those savings,' Lamb said

While icy blasts of winter are largely past, memories of staggering energy bills are warm in the minds of many homeowners

Lamb, a manufacturing vice president for Pacesetter Corporation, an affiliate of The Home Service Store, suggests now is the time to go on the offensive to correct energy deficiencies

The trouble 15, homeowners tend to overlook subtle sources of energy loss that, in total, amount to big-time energy inefficiency

Pacesetter pressurizes home interiors to check for telltale leaks Results uncover the usual suspects drafty windows and doors along with minuscule exterior cracks that allow air to stream in and out

'I see small 1/8-inch gaps around a door jamb or window and it may not seem like much but when you multiply it by the length of the crack that's a lot of space and a lot of energy loss," said Lamb

Room for improvement in saving energy

Any cracks should have homeowners reaching for their caulk guns, for one of the fastest, easiest home maintenance tasks

Some cracks aren't so small Pressure tests showed one of the largest sources of energy loss was at the juncture of outside walls and foundation Those spaces, too, are targets for caulk

Replacement windows are the new stars among energysavers Fiberglass has just debuted in window frames The advantage with fiberglass is that it won't expand or contract This improves the seal when installed and reduces cracking

Window installation is a chance to steal even more energy savings Homeowners should ask installers to fully insulate crevices around the window before the window is fitted You can compare the energy efficiency of replacement windows before you buy There are three measures worth paying attention to

The first is an NFRC number This shows a U-value It's akin to the R-value assigned to insulation The smaller the Unumber, the better

Also shown 1s a Solar Heat Gain Coefficient (SHGC) This reveals how much solar energy will come through the window

If you live in sunny southern climates, a smaller number is better Northerners may want warm solar heating rays from windows with larger SHGC numbers

The final window energy measurement is a visible light transmission (VT) number This equates to the amount of light allowed through the glass Again, the smaller the number, the better

There's an added plus to efficient windows Lamb says some windows are Energy Star rated This rating is reserved for the most energy-efficient of products It may earn rebates from utility companies

For those who covet lots of attic insulation, Lamb offers some final advice "One of the worst things you can do when you add attic insulation is cover the vents This traps moisture, and insulation does a far better 10b when it is dry than when it is damp"

Some projects boost values of homes

NEW YORK (Dow Jones/AP) - When it comes to renovating your home, it isn't how much you spend Its how you spend it

A recent study finds that you may be able to sell your home for more if you add a second bathroom or a fireplace Other additions - such as a home office - can depress the home's value

The study, sponsored by the National Association of Realtors, analyzed 28,828 home sales across 21 counties in the Philadelphia area between 1996 and 2003

The average home sold for about \$213,335, had 3 5 bedrooms and 18 full baths and was on the market for about 72 days The study was conducted by Florida State University professors G Stacy Sirmans and David Macpherson If there's any renovation

project you undertake this year, adding a new bath is likely to give you the most bang for your buck The study found that each full bath adds about 24 percent to the selling price

Each additional bedroom adds about 4 percent to the price, while each additional 1,000 square feet of living space increases the selling price by about 3 3 percent Central air conditioning, basements and fireplaces all consistently add value

Some projects typically have little effect on a home's value

Intercom systems, kitchen pantries and aboveground swimming pools, for example, add little value (although an in-ground pool adds about 8 percent), while price differences for houses that are on flat lots versus sloping lots are

Other attributes actually detracted from a home's value A home office or an in-law suite lopped off about 5 percent from the homes' prices, although less than 2 percent of the homes in the sample had either type of room

"It could be that people don't see this as an efficient use of space because they don't need rt," Sırmans saıd

The property's style 1s likely to have an effect on selling price Contemporary and Dutch-style houses command the highest prices, while Victorian style homes cut 5 8 percent from the selling price

Houses with stucco and wood exteriors sell for about 9 percent more, while those with vinvl and aluminum exteriors sell for about 4 percent less

The study also found that the best time to sell your home is in the fall Houses advertised as fixer-uppers sell, on average, for 24 percent less than other houses

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

There are three types of peas English, snow, and snap The only thing you'll have to do when they're ready to harvest is pick them frequently Peas are certainly not a

new" vegetable Archaeologists have found them in ancient tombs, at Troy (dating back to about 1340 B C) and at Thebes, but no one knows positively when people began cultivating them By the Middle Ages, peas were stored, dried and used for Lenten eating as a hedge against food shortage and famine

Because the dried pea kept indefinitely, it accompanied the English colonists on their way to America.

It was one of the first crops planted by the colonists Late in the 17th century, colonists began to regularly eat peas fresh

Our garden pea was developed in England, thus its name

Although peas don't lend themselves easily to crossing, due to the configuration of the flower, most blooms self-polhnate while still in bud Some of the more popular ones were developed in the 1800s Telephone plants remained popular until around 1930 when the original stock ceased to exist and subsequent plants became Alderman

Europeans and Americans have bred peas in various programs, resulting in improved vigor, disease resistance, flavor, keeping qualities, and higher yields

The biggest advance occurred in 1970, a plant scientist, working on breeding new shell peas for commercial food processors, discovered an unusual pea plant in his field, which was later called a snap pea or edible-podded pea.

Peas need full sun (at least six hours a day), a fertile, somewhat sandy soil with good drainage, and a neutral or slightly alkaline pH These httle veggies give back to the soil by fixing nitrogen in it That in turn benefits plants growing nearby

Their long root systems help loosen the soil as they search for moisture Spent plants decompose into organic matter to further enrich it At the end of the season simply dig them into the soil where they will decompose Follow label directions on

the seed package when you re ready to plant

## COLORS BRIGHTEN

Dianthus has been – and still is – a favorite plant in many gardens and its bright single colors shine in many settings

There are also bicolors picotees, with solid colors edged in white or a paler hue 'eyed" blooms with dark marks at their centers and streaks of multi-colored blooms

Sizes range from petite 6inch plant for edgings, rock gardens or container, to 3-foot plants great for borders and cutting gardens

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

The holiday is significant for families, in reading the stories of the Haggadah with one another and answering the Haggadah's four questions

The symbolism of the foods served is explained as follows

Karpas – Served as an appetizer, these are root vegetables dipped in salt water Parsley, carrots and celery can be used

Markofsky's family has boiled potatoes "Some use parsnips," Markofsky said

Haroset – apples, nuts and sweet wine, which signifies the mortar and bricks of pyramids built for the Pharaoh

Bitter roots – Grated horseradish signifies the tears of the Jews for leaving their homeland

WINEMAKING IN ISRAEL

American-born Lewis Pasco is an enology graduate of the University of California-Davis and an accomplished chef Before – taking his talents to Israel, Pasco made wines at Napa\_\_\_\_ Valley's Chimney Rock winery and Marimar Torres in Sonoma County

His palate is distinctly American and he has crafted the wines to be appealing to American wine drinkers, Jewish or not You don't have to be Jewish to drink and like these wines

Yet kosher wines have production restrictions which include, Pasco said, that the vineyard must be at least 4 years old He continued with a few more regulations Once in the winery, the grapes must be handled by Sabbath-observant Jews (Orthodox)

No grain, such as rice hulls frequently used in pressing grapes, can be used Certified kosher yeast is required for fermentation No case (a protein formed in milk by the action of rennin or another agent) can be used to clarify the wine Fresh gelatin can be used for the same purpose but not classic gelatin

Israel has an 85 percent rule which means that if the wine is labeled cabernet sauvignon, it must contain at least 85 percent of that variety

## Bread pudding is versatile comfort food

This simply enriched version of bread pudding is a delicious alternative to the classic recipe

Prepared with the addition of drizzled butter, bread and butter pudding is a comforting treat Its light custard base makes it a perfect addition to a brunch or breakfast table, although it s commonly served as dessert

Vague historical records indicate that bread pudding evolved in the 13th century in Europe, most likely England

The original intent of this recipe was to make use of stale bread Saturating the bread in a sweet hquid and baking the concoction provided an inexpensive pudding that could be eaten warm or cold

As the accessibility of foods increased, the liquid began to include more refined ingredients such as milk, cream, eggs, sugar, spices, dried fruit and nuts It is likely that each region and family used their own method and variation of ingredients

Today, bread pudding is con-

sidered a versatile comfort food Whether the bread is fresh or stale, the texture is a matter of personal preference

This recipe suggests using challah or brioche, and you can make other substitutions if desired Croissants, panettone, Italian or French bread would each make their own delicious version

The custard is a simple mixture of milk, sugar, eggs, vanilla and cinnamon The addition of plump, rum-soaked raisins adds an unexpected kick to the subtle flavor of the pudding

Baking the bread and butter pudding in a water bath prevents the delicate egg-based custard from curdling from the direct heat of the oven

To prepare a water bath, choose a shallow pan large enough to hold the baking dish or ramekins, with at least 1 or 2 inches of space between the ramekins Once the bread pudding has been prepared, place the shallow pan with the filled dish or ramekins inside the

oven "To avoid spilling water, fill the pan with hot water while resting it directly on the oven

rack," suggests chef Mark Ainsworth, associate professor in culinary arts at The Culinary Institute of America "The water should reach halfway up the sides of the ramekins

The following recipe is from Cooking at Home with The Culmary Institute of America (Wiley, 2003, \$40)

#### BREAD AND BUTTER PUDDING

/4 cup raisins

/a cup rum 8 slices enriched bread such as challah or brioche cut into 1

inch cubes 3 tablespoons unsalted butter melted and kept warm plus

more as needed for greasing 2 cups whole milk

3 large eggs lightly beaten

I large egg yolk lightly beaten

⅓ cup sugar ½ teaspoon vanilla extract

¼ teaspoon ground cinnamon

Preheat the oven to 350° F Combine the raisins with the rum and warm in a small saucepan over low heat

Remove from the heat and allow the raisins to plump for about 10 minutes

#### Drain and reserve

Meanwhile, drizzle the bread cubes with the melted butter, spread on a baking sheet, and toast in the oven, stirring once or twice, until golden brown, 10 to

yolk, sugar, vanılla extract and cinnamon and stir until the sugar has fully dissolved

Grease a 2-quart shallow casserole, 8-inch-square baking dish, or individual<sup>3</sup>/-cup ceramic ramekins with butter and place in a larger rectangular baking dısh

Add the bread cubes and raisins to the ramekins or dish, and ladle the milk mixture over the bread, reserving about<sup>3</sup>/4 cup Refrigerate the bread pudding(s) and the reserved milk mixture for about 30 minutes while the bread absorbs the liquid

Preheat the oven again to 350° F

Spoon the remaining custard mixture on top of the soaked bread


Place the baking pan containing the dish or ramekins in the oven, and pour hot water into the pan to create the water bath

Bake until the custard is set but still jiggles in the middle when gently shaken, about 30 minutes for small ramekins and 50 minutes for a larger baking dısh

Let stand for 15 minutes after removing it from the oven The pudding may be served warm or chilled Makes 6 servings

### dumplings for dinner

Try your hand at easily-made malfatti and you'll be able to boast about making pasta so light it floats Better yet, these bite-size spinach and ricotta dumplings take barely 15 minutes to make and serve, starting from scratch Malfattı, which translates as

"badly made," are essentially the same as the filling for spinach ravioli But instead of being enclosed in sheets of pasta, the spinach-cheese mixture is shaped into finger tipsize rolls, then lightly floured and cooked in water They are also called gnudi or "nudies" by some people, again referring to ravioli that lacks its outer envelope

Making this pasta is as easy as combining chopped spinach and cheese with an egg Roll tablespoons of the mixture in flour, toss into simmering water and, when the malfatti rise to the surface, in about three minutes, set them on a plate with warm tomato sauce Presto you have home-made

Malfatti are easily confused with gnocchi (nee-yok-ee), another type of diminutive Italian dumpling Gnocchi can be made from semolina, which is coarsely-ground durum wheat, or using mashed potatoes and regular flour Either way, they are exceptionally hard to make well They should be airy and light, but instead are often doughy and tough Turning out cloud-light malfatti however, is in my experience almost foolproof, even the very first time

If your children like to get involved with cooking, or if you want to lure them into learning some cooking skills, rolling the malfattı ın flour ıs a perfect experience for them Kids like to watch them sink into the water, then quickly bob back up It's almost like magic And parents should note that helping to malfatti is often a good way to get kids to eat spinach

When buying marinara sauce, check the label for the fat content Some prepared sauces contain as much as a whopping nine grams of fat per half-cup serving, others a mere one-half gram



# Say hello to broccoli's punchy cousin

We have long been grateful to the Italians for introducing us to broccoli

In recent years, more Americans have also gotten to know its cousin - broccoli rabe (pronounced ROB) While there is a distinct family resemblance, they are different vegetables

Broccoli rabe is a nonheading variety of broccoli that's also known as rapini

It looks like a thin, leafy bunch of broccoli stalks with stunted buds But while broccoli is rather mild green vegetable, broccoli rabe packs a punch

It has a slightly bitter flavor, like some greens, and adds punch to anything bland, like pasta When eaten on its own.

broccoli rabe is usually steamed or lightly sautéed in olive oil

Many recipes, including the one that follows, recommend quickly cooking it first, then draining and sauteing it

This leafy green is common

in Southern Italy and has recently become popular in the United States Italian farmers brought broccoli rabe to North America, but for a long time, it was uncommon outside Italian and Asian communities, which were not put off by its slight bitterness

#### SPICY BROCCOLI RABE

- 1/2 pounds broccoli rabe 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 4 cloves garlic (or to taste) finely minced
- /2 teaspoon dried hot red pepper

flakes or hot sauce to taste Salt and freshly ground black pepper taste

Rinse the broccoli rabe in cold water and drain completely Cut 2 inches off the stems then chop the rest into 2-inch pieces

Blanch in boiling water about 3 minutes Drain well Heat oil in saucepan large enough to hold broccoli Add garlic and red pepper and sauté quickly until garlic turns golden Add broccoli and saute until just tender Season to taste with salt and pepper Makes 5 servings

# What do you do with cactus? Why, make soup, of course...

Few things inspire interest in the cuisines of warm climates the way a good Arctic blast can

So when the temperature recently dropped to a brisk 35 degrees below, I shouldn't have been surprised to find myself staring longingly at Internet pages featuring cacti

Of course, this prompted the question every proud foodie asks when encountering the unknown – can I eat it? • For Southwesterners and those of Hispanic descent, there's only one answer, of course Cactus paddles – or nopales to those in the know – have been an integral part of their cuisines for centuries

But in the Northeast, cacti remain funny, hard-to-kill plants seen mostly in cartoons

Don't tell that to John Dicus, owner of Rivenrock Gardens in Nipomo, Calif, one of only a handful of farmers in the country who cultivate edible cactus plants

Dicus has been shipping

organically grown cactus paddles around the country since about 1993, and every year sells about 5 tons of paddles he grows on just<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> acre in his central California community He initially grew salad

greens, but became frustrated by how quickly they spoil, he said in a recent telephone interview

Cactus paddles can remain on the plants much longer

Though cactus cultivation still is limited in the United States, Dicus says Southern Europeans and North Africans have been doing it for more than 400 years, ever since samples were brought back from the Americas

"It's so common there now that the people there think it's natural to their lands," he said

Much of Dicus' business comes from the Hispanic community, but he hopes cactus catches on more broadly He expects that earning wider appeal will take a bit of positive public relations for the industry

"It seems like an intimidat-

ing thing to look at in the store and it takes a little bit of

learning to scrape those spines off with a knife, and you might mangle a few leaves before you get it down,' he said

Indeed Several weeks before we spoke, I ordered 2 pounds of paddles from Dicus When they arrived they were smooth and attractive Seeing no spikes on them, I figured Dicus had been kind enough to defang them prior to shipping

Without another thought, I used the paddles in the recipe for mushroom-cactus soup with roasted tomatillos that follows It was thick, delicious and perfectly spicy Unbeknownst to me, it also apparently was full of thorns

While speaking with Dicus, he asked whether I had trouble brushing the spikes off the paddles Huh?

"Evidently it didn't hurt you," he said, laughing "Generally we would recommend scrubbing them down with a little green scrubbing pad, and then you trim around them with a little pairing knife to get any little blotches off" Cooking with cactus is easy Very fresh paddles add a mild, lime-like flavor to dishes Even out of season paddles are delicious, Dicus said, noting they taste like and can be used similarly to green beans

The paddles, also called beaver tailed or prickly pear cactus, are great chopped raw in salads, diced and simmered in soups, or cut into thin strips and baked on pizza

One of Dicus' favorite preparations is breakfast burritos He adds finely diced cactus paddles to eggs After the eggs are cooked, he wraps them in a flour tortilla and spoons on salsa

Though there are many varieties of edible cactus, Dicus suggests starting with the flat nopales paddles which I purchased He said the mild flavor and low spike count make them more approachable for first-timers

This recipe is adapted from a variety of similar soups found on the Internet This version simplifies preparation and reduces the number of potentially hard-to-get ingredients

## MUSHROOM-CACTUS SOUP WITH ROASTED TOMATILLOS

I pound nopales

Olive oil // pound fresh tomatillos (about 5 medium) husked and washed

/2 pound ripe tomatoes (about 2 medium)

8 cloves garlic peeled and finely minced

% cup sliced jalapeno peppers 1 onion cut into/z inch thick slices

/4 teaspoon ground anise seed

6 cups vegetable stock 8 large sprigs cilantro

/2 pound fresh shiitake mush

rooms stems removed and

thinly sliced Sait and pepper to taste

### Preheat the broiler

If the nopales have spikes, carefully trim them from the cactus paddles with scissors, then rub the paddles with a clean plastic scouring pad Rinse with water and brush with olive oil Set on a rimmed baking sheet

Broil the paddles, turning

occasionally, until hmp, about 10 to 15 minutes Set the nopales on a large plate to cool When cool, cut in half lengthwise, then cut each half into<sup>1</sup>/-inch-wide shces Set aside

While the nopales cool, place tomatillos and tomatoes whole on a baking sheet and broil until soft and blackened in spots, about 4 minutes Turn and broil on the other side Set aside to cool Once cool, peel the tomatoes

Combine the garhc, jalapeno peppers, onion, anise seed and olive oil in a large stockpot Saute over a medium flame until onions are tender and garhc fragrant, about 6 minutes

Combine the roasted tomatoes and tomatillos in a food processor with 2 cups of stock and the cilantro

Puree until chunky smooth Add to the garlic and onion mixture along with remaining stock and simmer over a medium flame

Add mushrooms, reduce heat to low, cover and simmer 20 minutes Add the cactus pieces to the soup and simmer another 5 minutes

# Here is a fresh take on a classic soup

#### BY DANA JACOBI CORRESPONDENT

French Onion Soup requires a long simmering period to allow its flavors to build slowly Japanese miso soup is ready in minutes So what might they have in common? The answer, surprisingly, is miso

A savory, peanut butter-like paste made from soybeans, miso ranges in color from creamy ivory to earthy blackbrown It can be used many ways in Japanese cooking, but primarily to make a pale gold or deep russet soup Miso's flavor can also take several different forms, but generally has a salty-sweet taste or even a slight meaty flavor, like beef broth

Which brings us to Miso Onion Soup Classic onion soup recipes, like the one in Julia Child's Mastering the Art of French Cooking, get their flavor from deeply browning the onions, then adding wine and beef broth By using the same technique for the onions and adding miso, you can make a golden brown, fabulously flavorful onion soup When I serve this soup topped with the traditional toasted bread and grated Parmesan cheese the few people who notice a difference want the recipe

Supermarkets offer several kinds of miso For onion soup, I use brown rice miso (sendai in Japanese) or red (aka) miso Mellow barley (mugi) miso is good, too You must cream the miso before adding it to the soup This simply means combining it in a small bowl with an equal amount of liquid by mashing the miso with the back of a spoon against the side of the bowl until it dissolves

If you don't cream the miso, it forms tiny balls that never dissolve in the hot liquid Stored in the refrigerator, miso keeps for a year or more

Use it to make regular miso soup, and to increase the flavor in other soups and stews

## MISO ONION SOUP

2 tablespoons canola oil 3 peeled Spanish onions halved and thinly sliced and stir in Increase heat and saute until omions are well browned, about 12 minutes stir ring often with a wooden spoon to scrape up omions as they stick to pot Remove from heat Scrape the bottom of the pot vig orously to gather up all the browned bits Stir mustard and thyme into the broth and add to pot Add the water Return heat to high and cook until liquid comes to a boil Reduce the heat, partially cover the pot and simmer until the onions are very soft, 30 to 40 minutes

Meanwhile brush bread on both sides with remaining olive oil Grill bread or toast it in 400° F oven Set aside to cool When cool, cut into rough cubes with a sharp, serrated knife

Place the miso in a small bowl Gradually stir in about<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup of the soup, mixing until well blended Stir the mixture into the soup Season to taste with salt and pepper

To serve, ladle soup into deep bowls Sprinkle top with toasted bread cubes Sprinkle 1 scant tablespoon cheese on top, if using Makes 8 servings

Miso takes on the same texture and flavor as beef broth, so it can be used in French onion soup, other soups or stews



1 teaspoon sugar
1 tablespoon Dijon style mustard
3 cups fat free reduced sodium beef broth
1 teaspoon dried thyme
5 cups water
4 cup brown or red rice miso
Salt and freshly ground black pepper
Six 1 inch thick slices whole wheat Italian bread
4 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese (optional)

Heat the oil in large Dutch oven or pot over medium-high heat Add onion, stirring to coat them with oil Cover tightly, reduce heat to medium low and cook until onions are wilted, about 10 minutes

Sprinkle sugar over onions

## SPANAKOPITA (SPINACH PIE)

2 pounds fresh spinach 1 pound sliced green onions 1 cup extra virgin olive oil /4 cup dill 2 thinly sliced leeks 4 eggs 1 pound Greek filo Greek sea sait or regular salt fresh ground pepper 1 pound Greek imported feta cheese

Wash the spinach and boil it Pour spinach in a strainer and strain Then tear up the spinach in little pieces Brown the green onions and the leek in a pot using half the olive oil Turn the burner off and add the eggs, dill, spinach, cheese, salt, and pepper Oil a sheet pan and open the filo sheets across the pan, about 40 percent of the sheets


Put the spinach combination over the filo and then place the remaining filo sheets over the spinach Oil the top and bake in medium  $(350\ ^{\circ})$  oven for about 1 hour

## Resolve disputes in arbitration

Does Michigan have a stance about civil arbitration?

Yes The Michigan courts have favored it for a long time as a method of resolving disputes Public policy favors arbitration over litigation in the resolution of disputes because the purpose of an arbitration agreement is to avoid protracted litigation. It does not always result in a savings of time but, generally speaking, it is a reasonable alternative

#### I am interested in buying an undeveloped parcel of land, but am being encouraged by my attorney to get a survey. Do you think that is necessary?

Generally, you are welladvised to listen to your attorney's advice and in this instance he or she is correct A survey will be necessary in order for you to determine the exact location of the property that you are purchasing A survey can resolve any issues concerning boundary and/or fence disputes, among other things, and is extremely important to have

Our association is being required to turn over the books and records to a member who claims that the books and records include ballots. Do you have any comments on that?

It is not clear from the Condominium Act or the Nonprofit Corporation Act whether "ballots" would be records of the association, although there's a good argument that they would be We recommend to our association clients that they pass a resolution defining what they consider to be books and records of the association, although that may not necessarily have precedential value if the case is contested in court





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# Fixed-rate mortgages rates nudged up, Freddie Mac reports

Rates on 30-year and 15-year mortgages nudged up this week, while rates on one-year adjustable mortgages dropped to their lowest level on record

The average rate on benchmark 30year, fixed-rate mortgages rose to 5 40 percent, up from 5 38 percent last week, mortgage giant Freddie Mac reported March 25 in its weekly nationwide survey of mortgage rates

In mid-June last year, rates on 30year mortgages sank to 5 21 percent,

their lowest level on record Rates on 30-year mortgages have bounced around since then

For 15-year, fixed-rate mortgages, a popular option for refinancing, rates this week increased slightly to 4 70 percent from 4 69 percent last week Rates for one-year adjustable mort-

gages fell to 3 36 percent That was down from 3 39 percent and was the lowest since Freddie Mac began tracking rates on one-year ARMs in 1984

"As long as general inflation remains in check, we expect mortgage rates will stay in their current range

and that will leave open the window of opportunity for refinancers and potential home buyers," said Frank Nothaft, Freddie Mac's chief economist

## **AVERAGES**

A year ago, rates on 30-year mortgages averaged 5 91 percent, 15-year mortgages were 5 21 percent and oneyear adjustable mortgages stood at 384 percent

The nationwide averages for mortgage rates do not include add-on fees known as points

Thirty-year and 15-year mortgages each carried an average fee of 0 7 point this week, while one-year ARMs carried an average fee of 0 6 point

Low mortgage rates propelled home sales to record highs in 2003 and economists expects sales to be brisk for all of 2004

The National Association of Realtors reported Thursday that sales of previously owned homes rose by 2 percent in February to an annual rate of 6 12 million

The climate of low mortgage rates is supporting home-mortgage refinance activity The Mortgage Bankers Association said that refinancing accounted for 63 1 percent of all mortgage applications filed last week. That was up from 62 8 percent the previous week

"The recent drop in long-term interest rates has started a mini-, mini-consumer refinancing boom," said Carl Tannenbaum, chief economist at LaSalle Bank.

# Add up the benefits of owning a home compared to renting

(NAPSI) - President Bush's 2003 tax cuts did more than put some money back in people's wallets For lots of folks, it also reduced - and in some cases, eliminated – the tax benefit they got from owning a home

That certainly wasn't the intent of the legislation But by lowering tax brackets and. more importantly, boosting the standard deduction for married couples filing jointly, it certainly was the result That shouldn't cause you to shelve your plans to buy a house,

however The tax benefits to home ownership have long been exaggerated

## **BENEFITS OF OWNERSHIP**

Fortunately, there are a lot of other good reasons to own a home One of the best, financially speaking the chance to benefit from appreciation as the value of your home (one would hope) rises through the years Over the past 30 years, houses have appreciated, on average, six percent a year

All calculations on home value come with caveats

House hoppers won't get all of the benefit Every time

you change homes, you lose about 10 percent of the value to selling and moving costs

Out-of-control spenders can still lose If you drain off every dollar in appreciation through home equity loans and lines of credit, you aren't building wealth, you re destroying ıt

Home prices don't always appreciate Sometimes they plateau or even decline

## **RENT VS. BUY CALCULATORS**

Since Dec 31, 1998, the S&P 500 is down 72 percent But my home in the insanely hot Southern California market

has appreciated about 65 percent There's no way I could have predicted the performance of either market-stock or real estate-in advance Yet most of the "rent vs buy" calculators you find on the Internet pretend that you can, and these base their results on those crystal-ball assumptions

That's not their only flaw Just like many first-time buyers (and even some long-time homeowners), the calculators tend to ignore or underestimate the total costs of owning a house Outlays for maintenance, repairs, insurance and utilities almost invariably will be greater for a homeowner

than a renter, yet many calculators fail to consider the full impact of these expenses

## HOW YOU CAN WIN BY OWNING

You're most likely to win by owning, rather than renting, if the following are true


You plan to stay put at least three years and preferably more In most markets, it can take three to six years for a home to appreciate enough to offset the costs of selling and moving

■ You're psychologically prepared Home ownership means dealing with whatever comes up-from noisy neighbors to

clogged plumbing You can't just pack up and move as easily as when you were renting or call the landlord for help

You have some extra savings Homebuyers who spend every dime they have buying a house inevitably get blindsided by repairs, maintenance and all the other costs of owning a home

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
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






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# The 2004 Pontiac GTO

Advertising Feature





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### Review by Dale Buss

With the 2004 Pontiac GTO, General Motors has revived one of the original muscle cars of the Sixties And while product handlers did an excellent job of bringing back the "muscle," they could have done a little bit more with the "car" – at least when it came to the increasingly important element of external styling

But in a way, knocking the lack of a breathtaking design is almost picking at nits with this car This new GTO is *all* about what happens when you take off in the GTO – a perfect illustration of head-snapping – and the perfect exhibit action of being in any compartment attached to the 350-horsepower, modified Corvette V8 engine that powers this car With the GTO, everything is so much about the engine that the vehicle is offered only in one version – one level of options and trim, and certainly one powerplant, for a suggested retail price of about \$33,000

Pontiac rolled back the clock with this car and finally brought out of hibernation the GTO brand that was such a glorious hallmark for the division the Sixties The GTO legend began in 1964, when Pontiac offered a GTO option package to buyers of its Tempest and LeMans models It became so popular that Pontiac made the GTO its own model, competing for a whole generation of young men along with the Ford Mustang

After a few years, however, during the era of gasoline "crises," pollution controls and government-mandated bumpers, GM watered down the GTO concept to the point where the 1974 version was based on the anemic Chevrolet Nova and had only 200 horsepower Through the next generation of automotive consumers and the next several generations of automobiles, GM allowed the GTO moniker to rest



### The 2004 Pontiac GTO is all about power!

Until now GM selected a rear-wheel-drive vehicle that is built by its Holden subsidiary in Australia, known there as the Monaro CV8, as the basis for the GTO (An earlier version of the Monaro actually appeared in the vehicle-obsessed movie *Mad Max*) Clearly, GM executives coveted for America the 350-horsepower, 57-hiter V8 that can go from zero to 60 miles per hour in just 53 seconds and run the quarter mile in under 138 seconds, at 105 mph The car comes in either a sixspeed manual or four-speed automatic transmission And it gets decent mileage, 18 mpg in the city and 29 on the highway, despite all those horses

The GTO-s focus on the engine is well deserved In the six-speed version that I drove, pull-away from a standing stop was gloriously quick and powerful, more impressive than any other vehicle I have reviewed in the last year or so except maybe the Audi TT Coupe Far from being light and effortless, shifting took some effort and some skill, but only an amount that seemed fitting to an engine with that kind of power Best of all, the engine emitted a highly satisfying, complementary growl, GM says that the performance-tuned dual exhaust system was developed after modeling the sound of the original 1964 GTO In any event, it served to remind driver, passengers and onlookers that this was a car entirely about speed and power Which brings us to the styling A few things about the GTO's exterior are impressive, such as the 17-inch alloy wheels and performance tires that are matched to a fully independent suspension But while the styling itself could be generously described as "taut" or "lean," I didn't find either adjective appropriate To me, the GTO was simply non-descript, with nothing in particularly outstanding about its modified wedge shape I'm not sure why GM didn't put more into the styling of this vehicle or, alternatively, why GM designers found this satisfactory It's a big black mark for the car but certainly not a fatal one

They made up for much of the external blandness with a marvelous interior that includes a satinfinish steering wheel, race-inspired metallic pedals, four leather bucket seats that are firm yet soft and can be color-coordinated with the vehicle's exterior color, a six-disc CD changer and 10-speaker sound system, and a host of other features The only real complaints I had about the interior were how low the ceiling was and how slowly the power front seats moved forward and back to accommodate entry and exit by rear passengers

But like its original version, the new GTO is all about power And on that most significant count, this car came through with a checkered flag *Write Dale at daledbuss@aol com*



# Big screen Coen brothers' 'The Ladykillers' eventually runs out of steam

The Ladykıllers looks like a Coen brothers movie, with its inventive camera angles and magical imagery from Roger Deakins, the genius cinematographer who also shot the Coens Fargo, O Brother, Where Art Thou<sup>2</sup> and The Man Who Wasn t There, among many others It sounds like a Coen brother more

### with the lyrical cadence of its dialogue and a soundtrack of gospel songs collected by producer T Bone Burnett, who gave O Brother a similarly rootsy, Southern feel And, unfortunately, it runs out of steam after about an hour like the last Coen

brothers movie, *Intolerable Cruelty* Until then, this remake of the 1955 comedy caper starring Alec Guinness is wacky, quirky, and has a terrifically twisted eye for detail Tom Hanks, playing his first truly bad bad guy, is a marvelous mixture of Foghorn Leghorn and Sideshow Bob as the pretentious leader of a gang of thieves who use an elderly woman's cellar to tunnel into a casino vault

Hollywood s perennial nice guy has played flawed characters in other films – including A League of Their Own and Road to Perdition – but they weren t evil to the core There was always hope for redemption


It s a performance that moviegoers will either embrace unabashedly or reject wholly as being too mannered and selfconscious, though it s a perfect fit for Joel and Elhan Coen, who wrote, directed and produced the film

Hall avoids caricature and shows real poignancy as the feisty landlady, who proves herself to be a far more formidable adversary than she initially appeared

Professor Dorr (Hanks) has told Mrs Munson that he d like to invite the members of his band over to practice church music in the cellar, but these guys are really his partners in crime

It s a promising premise, but like Intolerable Cruelty – in which George Clooney and Catherine Zeta-Jones married and manipulated each other in a tediously repetitive cycle – the film s main joke gets old

# Small screen Film paints realistic portrait of legendary artist

Released in 2002 Frida is the biopic of Frida Kahlo, a very well regarded artist in her own right but perhaps equally famous for her tempestuous relationship with fel low artist Diego Rivera

Frida is played by Salma Hayek in a

performance that breaks her completely out of the 'just another pretty face mold, and Rivera known best for his murals and his world class womanizing (despite being a profoundly unattractive specimen of humanity) is played by Alfred Molina

What you will like or not like about this film is that there really isn t much of a story or plot here It is, after all a

woman's life, and our lives rarely fit snugly into two-hour increments for the edification and entertainment of moviegoers Instead, what the film trues to do is to present the distilled essence of who Frida Kahlo was, both in a realistic and an artistic sense

Given that, the centerpiece of the film, oddly enough, occurs very early in the

film, just as it occurred early in Frida's life As a teenager, Frida was involved in a horrific traffic accident that put her in a complete body cast for months The rest of her life would be spent in some degree of pain or discomfort, but the forced mactivity



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

during the process of her recovery was what opened up the world of art to her and caused her to devote the rest of her life to it

### **CIRCULAR MOTIF**

Like some other films of a more artistic inclination (e g *Critizen Karie* or *La Strada*), *Frida* utilizes a circular motif to tell the film's story It begins, intriguingly enough, with an older yet beautifully attired Frida

being carted somewhere in the back of a truck, still in her bed Where is she going? How did she come to be there in the first place? Well, all of that is revealed at the film's end as we are brought back to where we started

The film is elegantly and cleverly directed by Juhe Taymor and is especially notable for the traffic accident sequence and the animation done by the Cray Brothers, which lends an appropriately surreal feel to Frida's initial hours in the hospital following the crash Lush, vibrant color is used throughout, the music is terrific, and the film also includes what amounts to cameo appearances by Ashley Judd, Antonio Banderas and Geoffrey Rush as none other than Leon Trotsky (who filed to Mexico to try and avoid Communist assassins and found time for a fling with Frida) All in all, you will enjoy this film if you enjoy character studies and you tend to view film as more of an art form and less as simply entertainment. If you like a tightly wound plot and you're suspicious of directorial flourishes because you feel they get in the way of the story, then you might find the film a little frustrating and wonder exactly where it's going. Where it's going is, in fact, where it started, because this is not a film that's about where you end up, but rather, what you learned along the way


Beginning in July 2003, Zimmerla built sweat equity as he tore down walls inside the structure to create a more open feel with a New Orleans street scene in the main during area
