

Lights, cameras, action at Compuware

A sign of the past could be in Plymouth Township's future

A Farmington Hills company, Movies at the Drive-in, wants to erect drive-in movie screens in the Compuware Sports Arena parking lot to show first-run movies between May and September Joseph Cobb said his company picked

the Plymouth Township location because the area has a family environment

It's alternative and affordable entertainment, Cobb said 'Where a family might spend \$60-\$70 at a traditional theater, they'll be able to spend about \$25 and see two first-run movies Cobbs company is the same one which opened a drive-in in the parking lot of the Pontiac Silverdome last October

'We were only able to operate it for six weeks, but it exceeded our revenue goals for the window of opportunity we had," he said The six-screen Pontiac drive-in is scheduled to open this month

The idea is a good fit for Compuware, which is home to the Plymouth Whalers junior hockey team, as well as a number of youth leagues Those programs are at their peak in the fall and winter, leaving a big void in the spring and summer

It seems like a perfect fit for us," said Dennis Moore, vice president of arena operations "We're a seasonal business, and it's our slow time So it's a great alternative use for this facility"

The company is currently working with the Plymouth Township planning commission to get approval for the concept, with additional information to be presented at the April 21 meeting

"We're confident we can work it out with the township,' Moore said "If it doesn't get approved in a couple of weeks, it could be a deal breaker We need the time frame (May-September) to capture revenue Economically, it wont work unless it opens in May"

While the screens at the Silverdome were anchored into the parking lot, Cobb said the three 30-by-60-foot screens at Compuware — with each to accommodate 500 cars — will be inflatable 'We will inflate the screens, and bring them down when the movies are over so we don't create any problems," he said 'The sound of the movie will come through the car's FM radio via a transmitter, so there won't be any speakers or poles"

Cobb said movies will run seven days a week, and there will be special prize giveaways, such as flat screen televisions and entertainment systems, each night There are thoughts of putting in a playscape for children, but that's an idea for down the road

"We're focusing on getting the theater open, and then we can expand on our social offerings," Cobb said tbruscato@oe homecomm net | (734) 459 2700


Township officers may go high-tech with new Tasers

The Plymouth Township Board of Trustees sat in the dimmed meeting room, eyes affixed to the television screen, and watched the video footage of an Arizona man who was reportedly having trouble with his crystal methamphetamine habit that day

The man was locked in a jail cell, screaming and beating his head against the wall A swarm of police officers stormed the cell, and one aimed the Taser gun at the inmate In less than one second, the inmate was on the floor, unable to move, and officers were able to handcuff him and restrain him before he further harmed himself

The township police department will likely approve the purchase of 10 such Taser guns (enough for every on-duty officer to carry one) and enough belt holsters to outfit each of the department's 31 officers, at a cost of \$14,000 The item was discussed at the board's April 5 study session According to Chief of Police Tom Tiderington, the township has been awarded \$2,000 from its hability insurance carrier, Michigan Municipal Risk Assessment, to be used toward the purchase of the Tasers

The Taser - which is the brand name for the electrical less lethal weapons – is the best new law enforcement technology to come along in two decades, Tiderington said Before the Taser, officers had few options when dealing with dangerous suspects "This is what we would use in that scenario now," said officer Mike Lego, who in one swift move pulleda collapsible club from his belt, extending it with a quick jerk of his wrist. The club made a loud metallic whack" sound as it reached its full length "We basically have no choice - other than lethal force - but to beat them with a metal pipe" Six months ago Lego was sent for training on use of the Taser, and is certified to train his fellow officers He has been the target of the Taser several times, he said during a demonstration, and took aim at a metallic target in the meeting room He pulled the Taser's trigger, and out shot two small metal hooks, which embedded themselves into the target Fine metal wire sparked against the target for five full seconds, creating purple and yellow flashes of light The Taser delivers about 162 milliamps of electrical charge, compared to 400 from a defibrillator, used to start a human heart following cardiac arrest 'It's not enough to affect someone's heartbeat, but it definitely is enough so that you just can't move while the charge is on," Lego said The township board is expected to approve the purchase at an upcoming board meeting, and deliver of the Tasers should be approximately three or four months after approval

When the high school government classes of Darrin Silvester and Bill Boyd heard about the plight of a Discovery Middle School student with a brain abnormality, whose mother is facing breast cancer, students decided to help collect money for a fund that has been set up for the family

"We set up a goal to see which of our two classes could raise the most," said Silvester "Bill said whatever class wins will get pizza and doughnuts

"I went a little further and said if they collected \$2,000 I would shave my head," he said "They ended up getting triple the goal At least I'm shaving my head for a good cause"

Students raised \$5,872 - with the help of a \$1,000 donation from Word Ministry in Royal Oak- for Traci McGuire and her son, Micah

Weakland They invited McGuire to class Wednesday morning, handing her the clippers to shave Silvester's locks McGuire's daughter, Cassondra – a Salem High School student - assisted her mother in giving the buzz cut

Financial and spiritual support has been mounting for McGuire and her son since a letter from Discovery Principal Roche LaVictor was distributed throughout the school community, detailing the family's medical/financial hardships

After suffering a seizure last summer, doctors at Children's Hospital discovered a brain abnormality on the right side of Micah's brain The 13-year-old, who hasn't attended school since November, has little short-term memory and regresses Surgery is being contemplated by doctors, but that could leave him without the ability to speak and walk

Meanwhile, McGuire is battling breast cancer, and is waiting word on whether it's terminal

Charities hold special place for shop owner

Terri Bennett opened her first pet supply store in 1979 so she wouldn't have to leave her pets at home while she went to work Today her store, Specialty Pet Supplies, at 1449 Ann Arbor Road, is a daytime home not only to her three "store dogs' (the pets who come to work with her daily), but also a weekend hot spot to homeless rabbits, working dogs and ill-mannered puppies

It's the events that take place in the back of Bennett's store that get Bennett the most excited these days While her customers who shop out front are like friends to her, the charity groups who use the back of the store are quickly becoming like family

'We had the Rabbit Rescue people here last week, and they are just so great I want them to come back as often as they can,' Bennett said about the volunteer organization which harbors pet rabbits who are no longer wanted by their owners They often have to nurse the rabbits back to health before hosting an educational adoption clinic to find them new homes They ve held one such clinic at Bennett's store, and she plans on hosting more

The store is also a site for occasional grooming clinics and training classes for Paws with a Cause dogs for the disabled Although Bennett used to hold obedience classes for dogs, she stopped doing them because they were cutting into her charity groups' usage of the

Seeds are sown for bigger farm market

Its already one of the best little farm markets in the area, but its about to get better

The Plymouth Farmers Market is expanding this summer, and will offer visitors more variety, according to Fran Toney, Plymouth Chamber of Commerce Director

The market will still offer fruit, vegetables, plantings and crops, hot coffee, cold lemonade and homemade pastries, but will also be open to handcrafted garden items, as well, she said

The additions will double the size of the market – from the current 15 vendors, up to 30 The additional booths, which have been situated in the gathering across from Kellogg Park, will require more room The market will close Penniman, just short of Main Street in front of the Penn Theater, Toney said

"We're very excited about this, and the expansion will make it an even better family outing Its so beautiful to see the families enjoying the market, then heading over to the park to enjoy the park and the fountain, Toney said

The market attracts thousands of visitors every summer, for half the year, from the May through October, Toney said

Another addition will make the market an even better experience for families, according to Toney

'By the end of this summer one of the few farmers markets with our own bathroom, she said Monday, the City Commission approved the construction of a \$160,000 comfort station with three bathrooms The structure will be paid for with private funds, and contributions from service clubs, and corporate and business citizens, said Toney.

We used to go to the Plymouth market all the time, but then stopped When we wanted to come back there wasn t enough room,' he said He got word this spring about the expansion, and is thrilled to return to the market

"It's a nice little market It's a Saturday morning phenomenon Customers seem to like to come to the market then go do other things downtown,' he said "The expansion will make it even better It feeds on itself The more vendors you have, the more variety you have, the more customers you have. It just works that way

Ficano will fill economic development position by month's end

Wayne County Executive Robert Ficano is expected to name a new economic development director by the end of the month And that's good news to business leaders who say major projects like the Pinnacle Aeropark near Metro Airport have been on hold waiting for a new director

There has been concern in the business community that the absence of an economic development director has put some critical projects on hold, such as the Pinnacle Aeropark, a multi-use county development south of the airport, projects to develop along the corridor connecting Detroit Metro and Willow Run Airports called "an aerotropolis, and development of a new commercial truck crossing between Windsor and Detroit

It s critical, they've been working on this a long time We ve been losing jobs and businesses, said Wayne Doran, a member and former chair of the Wayne County Airport Authority

A search committee will interview six candidates April 14-16 for the recently established Wayne County Economic Development Corporation

On April 20, the top candidate will have a final interview with Ficano and the chairman of the search committee, busi nessman Frank Hennessey of Hennessey Capital

Doran said it was essential that the county have someone that corporations can call to set projects in motion

He said the county needs to create an environment that makes corporations want to come here

The pool of labor is here, the labor in our Downriver communities, we have a huge skilled labor force, said Doran

He said the airport authority was ready to work with the county and its economic development director

We re not a development group but we re willing to try anything to bring jobs to this area he said

John Kasarda, who was hired to consult with Wayne, County on airport development when Edward McNamara was county executive, said a number of projects have been put on hold because there hasn't been an economic development director It hasn't moved much even though Mr Ficano is a strong supporter the idea," said

Jakeway sees strong potential for Wayne County

Donald Jakeway, who was named president and CEO of the Michigan Economic Development Corporation in September, said real economic development happens on the local level

In the county we ve seen so much happen, there is an attractive opportunity for broad-based cooperation," Jakeway said "I would like to think, based on my six, months experience, that some very taiented economic development people will be pursuing this opportunity'

Jakeway said timing is critical but that the county shouldn't sacrifice quality for speed and needed to pick the best candidate possible

Jake way said he doesn t know of any specific projects Wayne County has lost because it hasn't had an economic development director

If you don't have someone dealing day-to-day with opportunities out there you may lose those opp ortunities,' he said

The international opportunity for development is wonderful, said Jakeway "We need to plan what opportunities are so we are driving the initiative not someone outside MEDC would like to play a support role It could be an international destination of air cargo'





he leading representative of the party of Teddy Roosevelt came to Michigan last

week, to hold a town hall meeting in a city where there really aren t any Republicans, and visit a state where, four years ago, he overwhelmingly won the Republican presidential primary

Hundreds crowded into a law school auditorium at Wayne State University in Detroit to see US Sen John McCain of Arizona, one of the very few politicians today that has what used to be called charisma, and who small children might think of as a hero

"This is a man who should have been presi-



dent," said former state Sen Joe Schwarz, a friend and admirer who is now running for Congress from a southern mid-Michigan district that includes Lenawee and Hillsdale counties Many in the audience plain-

ly agreed While the crowd was bipartisan, it mainly consisted of people who think George W Bush's presidency has been a failure and that his re-election would be a disaster

What they want to know now was whether US Sen John McCain, conservative Arizona Republican, would consider running as Massachusetts Democrat John

Kerry's candidate for vice president That idea has excited a lot of people McCam has a quality of instant presence that makes people sense that he is somebody As, indeed, he is The son and grandson of admirals, he spent five years being tortured in North Vietnamese prisons during the years Bush may or may not have been showing up for the Alabama National Guard

"There is no way Bush wins if that happens!" one excited law school student said

But whether or not that's true, it's not going to happen

"The vice president has only two duties,' McCain teased Presiding over the Senate and inquiring after the health of the president ' Turning serious, he told them he thought he could get a lot more done in Congress

Later, when I had a chance to talk to him privately, I asked him directly whether there was any way he would consider an offer Though they are of different parties, McCain and Kerry are friends

He told me, flatly, no

He couldn't do that, he said, because 'L feel that, one, I would be leaving my party, whether I nominally did so or not, and I don t want to do that I am a Republican I believe in the party of Lincoln and (Theodore) Roosevelt"

t's not easy being a parent in today's world I am sure that statement comes as no


surprise to any parent, and especially those faced with the daunting task of raising a teenager

I knew being the father of two daughters would be no cakewalk I just didn't have the good sense to recognize the warning signs of just how tough it was going to be

Don't get me wrong My 10-year-old and 13-year-old daughters are great kids They are bright, well-adjusted young ladies who excel at school, are gifted athletes and in general are a joy to be around

So what's the problem? For me, it is trying to stay connected to them as they continue

their metamorphosis while 27 helping to keep them on a



To be an effective parent, I (begrudgingly) came to the conclusion that I needed some new ammunition The world was very different when I was a teen, and the tools my parents used in a feeble effort to keep me in line are irrelevant in the 21st century

For instance, I frequently used the expression, "Do you know what would have happened to me if I spoke to my father the way you are speaking to me?" when one of my daughters was (I believe) being disrespectful

Of course they don't In today's world, kids are taught to be independent and question authority, and even the suggestion of any form of discipline - physical or otherwise is lost on them

And that is probably a good thing But the world my daughters are living in is much more scary and dangerous than the one I navigated as a teen Peer pressure (tattoos and body piercing come to mind) and the multi-media onslaught of sex, drugs and violence is everywhere, and it is impossible to protect them completely from it

When my wife suggested we attend a parenting session at St Mary Mercy Hospital in Livonia last weekend, I figured it might be a nice thing to do as much for myself as for my daughters, who increasingly had been giving me that 'what planet are you from, dad?

In a nutshell: When your kid screws up, instead of going ballistic and responding with immediate and severe punishment, parents should respond with love and compassion, and wait until a less-emotional time to discuss the issue and settle on an appropriate consequence.

look when I tried to reason (read do it because I said so) with them on an issue

The parenting session followed the principles of the Love and Logic Institute (www loveandlogic com), developed by Jim Fay and Foster Chne Essentially, the parenting techniques advocate allowing your children to grow through their mistakes, to learn γ_{t} from the consequences of their choices, and for parents to set limits through enforceable statements, and apply consequences without anger

In a nutshell When your kid screws up, instead of going ballistic and responding with immediate and severe punishment, parents should respond with love and compassion, and wait until a less-emotional time to discuss the issue and settle on an appropriate consequence

The theory sounds good on paper, but will it work? Only if the parents are willing to take the time and effort, we were told And there's the rub It is so much easier to lose your temper, engage in a shouting match and send them off to their room.

But is that behavior going to help our kids become happy, healthy adults? Probably not Walking out of the three-hour session, we

came to a couple of conclusions What we heard made sense and we would give the Love and Logic technique a shot, and compared to some of the issues raised by the other parents, we were pretty darned lucky

Jealousy of husband is not a sign of true love

I feel jealous when my husband talks to other women, so I have tried to make my husband jealous by flirting, talking and paying extra attention to other men in his presence Nothing I do gives him a jealous twinge. Does this mean he doesn't love me anymore?

Many people assume that jealousy is a sign of true love or how much your partner loves you But studies show that this is an incorrect assumption You need to be careful about trying to make your partner jealous to show his love, because it can backfire Men and women differ in how they respond to jealousy Women respond to jealousy by wanting to preserve and improve the present relationship Your



response to feeling jealous by wanting confirmation of your husband's love is consistent with this finding In contrast, men want to protect their egos They get angry and consider leaving the relationship Women are more likely than men to try to make their partners jealous, because they think that men will respond to the experience like them But in reality, women who succeed in making their

male partners feel jealous actually just drive them away There is also quite a bit of controversial research that shows men and women differ in what provokes the experience of jealousy Men are more likely to feel jealous when their partners engage in sexual infidelity or they perceive their partner may be unfaithful On the other hand, women are more likely to experience jealousy when their partners engage in emotional infidelity or when they perceive their partner is becoming too emotionally close to another female It also is important to realize that there are two types of jealousy Reactive jealousvis when you become aware of an

actual threat to a relationship you value The event may not be current or it may be anticipated in the future, but it always occurs in response to a realistic danger Suspicious jealousy occurs when your partner hasn't misbehaved and your suspicions do not fit the facts at hand Suspicious jealousy often results in worried and mistrustful behaviors to confirm suspicions This distinction is important, because everybody feels reactive jealousy when they realize that their partner has been unfaithful, but people vary a lot in their tendencies to feel suspicious jealousy in the absence of any real threat If you feel jealous, here are some Love Doctor tips on how to cope or deal with that jealousy

1 Be sur h not to view jealousy as a sign of true love or as a way to test the relationship Actually, feelings of jealousy say mor/e about your own desires and self interests

Flat head syndrome

Incidence increasing in infants

Shannon Fischer still wonders how flat is too flat when it comes to her young son's head At 1 year old, And rew no longer wears the helmet custom made by the Orthotics & Prosthetics Center of University of Michigan Health System's Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation in Ann Arbor

Bone growth slows after the first 12 months, rendering the orthotic device ineffective for treating positional head deformities The flatness on the back of Andrew's head remains noticeable, but should improve with time The young Livonia mother worries until it does

According to a clinical report in the journal of the American Academy of Pediatrics, the incidence of cranial deformities in infants has risen since the Academy began its 1992 'Back to Sleep" campaign to prevent sudden infant death syndrome While SIDS has decreased 40 percent, flat head syndrome is on the increase Fischers concern is that parents might not recognize the problem early enough to prevent or correct the deformity

Andrew's pediatrician noticed a flattening at two months, but said it was quite common, nothing to worry about By four months, Fischer started obsessing" over the deformity Repositioning techniques were suggested and followed for the next two months Although the flattening did improve, it was still classified



as moderate to severe Andrew was referred to the

Craniofacial Anomalies Clinic of Pediatric Plastic Surgery at C S Mott Children's Hospital, where a helmet was prescribed For optimal results he wore it 23 hours a day for $3\frac{1}{2}$ months

"We saw a big change after just one month," Fischer said "His head was really flat Now ht's more of a cosmetic problem At the center they felt he had the correct shape and it would round out on its own for up to two years I hope they re right" Dr Steven Buchman thinks

Fischer needn't worry He says lot of people don't have round heads 'Having a slightly misshapen head has always been with us to a certain extent," said Buchman, who's chief of time,' but with careful observation "Tummy time" not only helps prevent flat spots on the head, but promotes development of upper-body strength Time spent in strollers and car seats should be kept to a minimum The longer an infant's head rests against a flat surface, the likelier they are to develop a skull deformity,

Stephen Strasburg and other orthotists see about 300 children a year at U-M Andrew Fischer wore a helmet 23 hours a day for 3½ months to help correct a skull deformity

we did start one at 11 months and were successful, by 15 months it's probably not worth it I see a lot of infants where the symptom is there at four months, but pediatricians say it might resolve on its own and then we don't see them until six or seven months Time is of the essence We have a lot better success at four months then at eight months Every second of the day the head is growing With the helmet on, we're getting the growth to occur in areas where we want it to occur Even when they're not on the back, it's still doing something" Strasburg warns parents should also keep an eye on their child's neck to detect torticollis, which can lead to flattening of the head "Torticollis is where one side of the neck is tighter and the baby can't turn his head as well," Strasburg said "For the first three months, parents need to be observant as far as the baby's head movement Is it turning both ways or favoring one side? They should talk to their pediatrician right away if it is and they should probably get into some type of physical therapy, which can go a long way cutting down on the incidence of the deformity "There can be some possible complications with the jaw in severe cases of deformity" For more information about the Danmar helmet, call **UMHS** Orthotics & Prosthetics at (734) 973-2400

pediatric plastic surgery at Mott "If a child has an extremely odd-shaped head, see a pediatrician so they can make a determination about the flatness by five or six months of age If repositioning fails, a helmet can be utilized to allow the head to reshape and fill out I'm not recommending surgery. They first need to try to change the position before going to a craniofacial surgeon or neurosurgeon

"The key is not always to have the child in the same position Get them off their back Put them on one side or the other and monitor them when they're on their stomach It's all right to put them on their belly if you're monitoring them"

The American Academy of Pediatrics new positioning guidelines released in July 2003 don't reverse the recommendation to place infants on their backs for sleeping During the day, parents should provide more "tummy Orthotics & Prosthetics Center as a result. The helmet of choice there is a Danmar designed by center orthotist Ammanath Peethambaran After an initial evaluation and casting of a baby's head, the family returns within 10 days for a fitting Parents are then given a break-in wear schedule and instructions on cleaning and caring for the helmet

"Danmar exerts a force, not a great force, so that the head is contained in the areas that the skull shouldn't grow and hollow for the skull to develop in," Strasburg said "A DOC Band (by Cranial Technologies and available in several states except Michigan) is a onepiece helmet that opens on the side over an ear almost like a halo over the head, and works on the same principle

"The helmets are most effective between four and six months when the head is still soft and there's time to reshape the head Once the baby ages to 1 and over, the head becomes solid Although

One of the moms at my daughters' school stopped me as I was walking in to pick up the kids and asked me what I was driving She loved the copper color, she said, but she liked something about the 2004 Infiniti FX45 even more "You know when you go to the Auto Show and they

the FX45 one of the more solidly planted vehicles on the planet It also provides a remarkable amount of interior passenger and cargo room

There are two engines available for your driving pleasure – the 4 5-liter that produces 315 horsepower and a 3 5liter 24-valve V6 with 280 horsepower Opt for the bigger engine if you really want some fun

That's the engine Infiniti places in its Q45 and M45 luxury sedans and believe me, the power is there to let you open up and get up and go That engine is also mated to a 5-speed automatic transmission that gives you the option of a manual shift mode for optimum control when you want it

Without the fob, however, it will not start It was unnerving at first not to have a key to start the car – it's the essence of every vehicle, right? But I soon got used to it See? She was right Ultra-futuristic
