

Parking for dollars

Commission OKs plan to keep retail spaces open

Enforcement of time-limited free parking in downtown Plymouth could come in time for the holiday shopping season

The Plymouth city commission Monday night passed the policy; which is mainly an effort to keep business owners and their employees from parking in prime downtown parking spaces

Clearly, employers and employees working in the stores should be aware of the fact they shouldn t be parking in front of businesses, said City Manager Paul Sincock They should be parking in more distant locations so customers can have the first opportunity to get in and out Sincock didnt have an exact timetable as to when enforcement will begin, but said it could start in December, during the holiday shopping period crucial to the success of many retailers

The city has a variety of parking ordinances, and parking rules in the downtown area are rarely enforced due to the lack of staffing.

new program, the DDA will fund a parking enforcement officer to patrol the downtown area 9 a m to 8 p m Monday-Saturday, though not necessarily full-time

The policy specifically states "at this time the city shall not designate any public parking as metered parking However, it does give the city manager the option of setting 'event parking rates during major events, including Art in the Park, the Fall Festival and Ice Spectacular The rate will be \$5 per vehicle for the day to park in the downtown deck

Canton, Salem fail . standards

Canton and Salem high schools - for the second consecutive year - failed to meet federal standards under the No Child Left Behind Act

The 2004 School Report Card released this week by the state indicates 436 high schools failed to score high enough on the MEAP tests, have enough 11thgraders take the test, or graduate enough seniors to earn a passing grade

"Both schools earned an 'A on the report card based on the MEAP test scores," said Mike Bender, director of secondary education for Plymouth-Canton Schools "But, Canton and Salem didn t make adequate yearly progress, which caused our overall grade to go down to a 'B You can t earn an A ıf you haven't earned AYP '

Adequate yearly progress is Michigan's response to the federal No Child Left Behind Act to make schools more accountable for improved test scores

For Canton, the problem was failure to reach the 95 percent goal for 11th-graders taking the MEAP tests

"We weren't off by much," said Bender 'We were very close'

In Salem's case, the reason for not reaching AYP stemmed from special education students failing to reach the standard of achievement on the MEAP tests

We re in the process of digging very deeply on how those individual students did, and identify the areas they need additional support to help strengthen their skills, Bender said

Starkweather, the districts alternative high school, failed to meet AYP standards in the English-language arts portion of the MEAP tests

Plymouth High School will take the 11th grade MEAPs for the first time this year because the 3-yearold high school has its first junior class

Last year, Canton and Salem both failed to meet 🌋 AYP for failing to get 95 percent of students to show up for the MEAP tests The district is discussing the

While downtown street parking and the lower level of the downtown parking deck will be limited to two hours, some areas, such as the upper level of the parking deck and the lot behind the Gathering, will have eight-hour time limits

'We re considering making it a graduation requirement so that all students would at least participate in the MEAP testing, said Bender It's been successful in other districts, and we re giving it some thought to see if its the right fit for our school district

If a school fails to meet AYP for three consecutive years, consequences could range from providing a change in curriculum, additional staff development, to replacing the principal and staff

Bender said the district is well aware of the possible consequences

The stakes are certainly higher, said Bender 'The standards for performance increase next year, and we need to hit our target '

However a new downtown bookstore could soon be in Plymouth's future

Robert Reid who leases store fronts along Ann Arbor Trail, just west of Main Street, said hes negotiating with a major bookstore chain to fill the location formerly occupied by Plymouth Office Supply

'It's part of a chain, they came to me, " said Reid, who operates Richard Reid Corp in Southfield 'Based on the history of the other operation, they feel fairly confident a bookstore in Plymouth can fly

"We d like to see that in Plymouth, it would be a good addition," added Reid They want to get in, and we d like to get them in '

Reid wouldn't comment on which chain

is involved, however, another downtown businessman familiar with the discussions said it was Little Professor, which at one time operated the former bookstore

Plymouth Office Supply closed operations at its Ann Arbor Trail and Forest Street location during the summer The 4,000-square-foot building has been empty since

We got a lot of inquiries from restaurants interested in the space, but we were hesitant to add another restaurant at this stage, said Reid Personally, I think

we've got a few already, and we need to have some time to digest those We'd like to see some balance in the type of retailers we have downtown

Reid also owns the space currently occupied by Angelo's Card & Gift, Breads & More and Milano Fine Apparel

The Little Professor franchise, which opened on Main Street in 1984, was operated by Jackie Powers until she passed away in 1999 After her death, the store





Play provides young thespians more than acting experience

Students involved in the debut performance of Our Town at Canton High School expected to be taught how to be better actors as they rehearsed for play performed in the DuBois Little Theatre this weekend

But along the way they also learned some valuable lessons in hfe

The classic by Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright Thornton Wilder celebrates love, marriage, life and death through the eyes of the residents of a small town

Canton junior Marie Dolney played Emily, a young woman who grows up during the production Dolney said the play makes participants and audience members think about things you don t normally think about

"It teaches you to respect everything around you and take note of things around you, Dolney said, reciting one of the themes in the play "Later 1s sooner than you think

Junior Matt Kownacki said he learned a great deal as teacher Shannon Henry worked to interpret the play

ly helps you understand the deeper meaning of the play, and helps you get in character really well, Kownackı saıd of Henry

The life lessons depicted in the play were precisely why Henry chose Our Town as the first production of the new theater program

She wanted students to get more out of the experience than having fun acting in a high school play

In addition to teaching students in her classes the deeper meaning of the play, she was joined in the effort by several PCCS English teachers, who used the work in their classes

Henry said the play is full of great messages about being encouraged in our dreams, giving and receiving unconditional love and seizing the moment to appreciate those in our

lives

We would treat people differently if we knew it was going to be our last day with them" Henry said Thornton Wilder says do that every day He says we also need to appreciate who we are and to add our own thread to the tapestry of life, as insignificant as it may seem

The production which also runs next weekend, is the first to be held in the DuBois Little Theatre Henry decided to offer extracurricular plays in response to increased demand for drama experiences from students at the three high schools

The donation of a lighting system from Spotlight Players and a num ber of other upgrades to the theatre allowed her to begin the program this fall

Salem senior Kyle Gnagey, who plays George, likes working in the smaller theatre

I like it because you have a more intimate connection with the audience, Gnagey says Its more exciting to be up close



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



Stroke doesn't slow voter from casting ballot

For 57 year-old Sunday Spence of Plymouth, casting a ballot in Tuesday's presidential election was important So important that, despite suffer ing a stroke five days before the election, Spence found a way to cast her ballot while bedridden at St Joseph Mercy Hospital in Ann Arbor

It was that important to me, Spence said from her hos pital room Every vote counts and if you want to elect someone you have to put in your vote

I feel strongly about that, and I practice what I preach said Spence

Spence suffered her stroke in her Plymouth home about 8

a m Oct 28 but wasn't found until 10 hours later The stroke left her partially paralyzed on the left side, with some speech impairments I have to really think hard when I talk, she said

Spence had been active in the campaign, canvassing the neighborhood with her friend Shirley Erickson to get out the vote

I campaigned for (Democratic presidential can didate John) Kerry in the neighborhood, and to get people out to vote, said Spence It was the first time I ve ever been so involved because I wanted Kerry in but mostly I wanted (President George W) Bush out

Erickson called the Plymouth city clerks office Monday to find out if there was a way Spence could get an absentee ballot to vote despite not being able to get to the voting booth the next day

I thought it was hopeless but they told me there was a provision for an emergency ballot and Sunday qualified said Erickson All we needed was a letter signed by Sunday as to why she couldn't make it to the precinct

Plymouth city clerk Linda Langmesser said its not unusual for her office to accommodate voters especially senior citizens on election day

Its important to make sure everybody that desires to vote has a chance to do so said Langmesser Its always been forefront in my mind that you don t disenfranchise anybody if

challenged two term incumbent John Stewart, admits he made mistakes common among first time campaigners He said he started the campaign with one goal (in addition to win nıng) in mind Not embarrassing himself

I knew I was going to have to catch lightning in a bottle and it was a pretty small bottle said Corriveau As I went through the campaign I started gaining more confidence Corriveau had his wife

Wendy, serve as campaign manager - mistake No 1 he said - and campaigned in a district the Democrats hadn t targeted and weren t intending to spend much money

'You learn a lot just about the process something as small as how a piece of literature is laid out he said You see how people become good at campaigns Unless you know someone who has done it you don't learn until you go through H

Doroshewitz had a better result winning a four-year term on the Plymouth Township board but he learned a lot as well Estimating he knocked on some 3 000 doors

Doroshewitz said his biggest lessons were about people

You knock on their door and they just know you re there to sell them something or try to convert you to their religion, but they open the door anyway Doroshewitz said Most of them open the door with a smile even when they find out you re a politician People are friendly

Doroshewitz estimates hav ing spent some \$6 000 to get elected, half from donations and the other half out of his own pocket He said he spent half of that on mailings about \$1 000 on lawn signs and more on literature and other campaign materials


Mostly he spent it realizing nothing was pre-determined, that he was going to have to work hard, particularly since no one really knew him


I knew I d have to overcome (a lack of) name recognition, Doroshewitz said I had to convince people I d work hard People appreciate the candidate taking the time and energy to do that



Deviatkin serves a congregation in Arkhangelsk in the European part of Russia Hes







Democrats ⊷swept all but one of the eight seats for education boards, and gained five seats in the state House of Representatives Democrats also scored signifi cant gains in county commission seats in Detroit's principal suburban counties, Oakland and Macomb In Royal Oak, an area of tidy houses and suburban families with young chil- 🐲 dren, Marie Donigan, a supporter of gay rights beat a far better financed opponent for a state legislative seat

What does this all mean? Probably it means less that Michigan has moved left of center than that the center has moved away from where Michigan used to be Republicans still control both houses of the Legislature, and have a solid edge in the delegation to Congress, although that is more due to creative redis tricting than anything else

There were echoes of the national results in the Wolverine State The turnout was huge There was increased support for President Bush in blue-collar and rural areas, -such as Macomb and Monroe countries, both of which Bush lost four years ago and won this time

But the president didn't

make a visible dent in Detroit, or among minorities generally Better educated affluent voters in flaces like Oakland County continued to be uncomfortable with him, and his candidacy was hopeless in any county that contained a major university

Overall, Bush lost Michigan by 165 000 - slightly less than four years ago but by more votes than he won Ohio

The real winner, some felt, was Gov Jennifer Granholm, the chair of the Kerry campaign, who also got some credit for other Democratic success-

Curiously, she is the first governor since 1980 to have backed a presidential candidate who actually carried the state For most of her first two years in office, she has been cautiously non-controversial, generally going along with the GOP-dominated Legislature on most major issues

Much of her term has been spent grappling with how to balance the state budget, mostly by cutting various programs Yet for the first time, she took a forceful stand on two controversial issues She did radio commercials urging a "no" vote on Proposal I, which was designed to give the casinos a gambling monopoly, and also came out (less loudly) against Proposal 2, which called for a state constitutional amendment against gay marriage

Her side lost badly in each case, though she got little blame The margin by which voters approved of the gay marriage ban was 58-42 - less than in many other states where it has been on the ballot

Her stands earned her new warmth from Democratic core groups - but don t expect any talk of Jennifer Granholm on the party's presidential ticket next time, she was born in Canada, and is as ineligible as Arnold Schwarzenegger Ironically, a big Michigan

winner and a big loser as a

result of this weeks election were two people whose names appeared nowhere on the ballot

The big loser was clearly Detroit's mercurial mayor, Kwame Kilpatrick, who faces what is sure to be a major chal lenge for re-election next year He was heavily involved in a campaign to give the mayor authority over the city's troubled schools, which were so bad and so corrupt the Legislature took control away from the elected board five years ago

Under his plan, the voters would have elected a board which could only approve or reject the mayor's nominee for a CEO to run the schools Despite pleas from many urban leaders, the voters chose by a 2-1 margin to reinstate a traditional and typical school board

A steady stream of allegations about the mayors personal behavior in office, and stones about sweetheart financial deals crafted for his family members and his vivacious chief of staff, undoubtedly hurt

The secret winner Tuesday, however, may have been freshman US Sen Debbie Stabenow, D-Mich, who has to run for re-election in 2006 Republicans are gearing up to make a major effort to oust her

Democrats hope that two years from now, a traditional "six-year fatigue with an incumbent administration will have set in, and make her much easier to re-elect than if it were president Kerry trying to cope with economic doldrums and whatever the state of Iraq may be

But as all great columnists might say, only time will tell



Following my visit to the sanctuary conversation buzzed among the zookeepers and administration about the Detroit Zoo's ability to humanely care for Winky and Wanda Modern research provides solid scientific proof that elephants confined to small spaces, forced to live on unnaturally hard surfaces such as concrete, in cold climates and deprived of the room necessary to stimulate activity, develop painful life threatening diseases including arthritis and osteomlyitis After long discussions, all parties agreed that it was impossible to emulate an environment similar to the facility in Tennessee Ron Kagan was right in his declaration that if the Zoo couldn t do the elephants right, it shouldn't do them at all This philosophy fits with the Zoo's motto of Celebrating and Saving Wildlife It was observed that Winky and Wandas situation necessitated a change, and since the Zoo is not able to rightly care for the elephants, it is taking the necessary actions to ensure their continued liveli hood

Why the AZA feels that placing the elephants at another zoo 15 beneficial 15 beyond me It has been observed, for instance, that the hard, cold concrete floors Winky and Wanda stand on in the winter months is hard on their feet Both Winky and Wanda suffer from chronicfoot abscesses

How could the Columbus Zoo improve that situation? By placing wood chips on the floor 'to break up the monotony, as Jerry Borin, director of the Columbus Zoo, states in the Oct 24 2004, edition of the Detroit Free Press? The Detroit Zoo is currently doing


compare to the natural grassland found in the Tennessee sanctuary? And for that mat ter, how could the Columbus Zoo care any better or offer any additional perks for the elephants that the Detroit Zoo has not already attempted?

In addition and most importantly Winky and Wanda are currently in a protected contact management system at the Detroit Zoo This system of management is totally void from negative stimuli, i e chains, bullhooks Both Winky and Wanda have thrived from this management system Columbus management combines both practices of protected contact and free contact Expecting either of them to revert back to the opposing management system of negative reinforcement training to any extent is putting them and their future keepers in harms way Wandas behavior has indicated that she has experienced an abused past and is known for lashing out If she enters a free-contact environment, even on restraints, she is likely to hurt someone, or be hurt by someone in self defense Sending her to Columbus Zoo would not be improving her future I congratulate and fully

support the Detroit Zoos motion to appeal the AZAs decision I am asking the San Antonio Zoo Director relin quish the rights to Wanda so that she can retire to the sanc tuary I am urging that the arbiters who will decide Winky and Wanda's fate will realize the undisputed advantages of an elephant sanctuary and not send them to another zoo

Please join me in my effort to save Winky and Wanda from an unjust retirement and write to the Detroit Zoo Many voices are better than one

different from those experienced by Roman Catholics




Hazards Awareness Week

To focus attention on winter safety precautions Gov Jennifer Granholm has declared Nov 7-13 as Winter Hazards Awareness Week in Michigan

Heavy snow, extreme cold ice and wind routinely affect Michigan during winter and, individually or together, pose dangers to life or property However, Michigan residents must remember that it does not necessarily take record-breaking low temperatures or mountains of snow to make winter in Michigan dangerous The abrupt changes in winter weather are enough to turn enjoyment of the season into tragedy

The 2003-2004 winter season's temperatures averaged near or slightly above normal across Michigan Snowfall was also slightly above the average for more locations The winter season started very mild in November and December However, January demonstrated what winter can do in Michigan The state plunged into the cold Arctic air as temperatures fell well below the average Numerous snow storms moved through the state leaving most locations with one of the snowiest Januarys on record By the end of the month, cold and snow gave much of lower Michigan its deepest snowpack in 10 vears

Despite the mild start to the winter season, the first winter storm to hit the state moved across the Straits of Mackinac on Nov 12, 2003 l) and across Lake Superior on Jan 21 with up to 12 inches in north west Lower Michigan



crowd Kavulich said "Now, the bigger the crowd, the more relaxed I am





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Girl needs to stand up to her 'friends'



Survivor runs life's marathon

Runner uses New York race to give back to charity

Have you ever dreamed of crossing the finish line in the world-renowned New York City Marathon?

Imagine the cheering crowds, the excitement, the sense of accomplishment

That is exactly how Jennifer Corrao, a full-time mother of three, felt when she told her best friend, Katie, that she had decided she was going to run in the New York City Marathon before she turned 40

But she wanted to make it more personal, do something meaningful in the process As the two of them discussed her plans, Katie suggested Jennifer consider running to raise money for an organization very dear to her, The Life Raft Group

Then she told Jennifer the story of her brother, Michael, who battled a type of cancer called GIST (gastrointestinal stromal tumor) and how the Life Raft Group had made a huge impact in his life as he experienced all the ups and downs of cancer treatment

Jennifer was immediately anxious to help, and soon was onboard for an incredible journey She had never even met Michael, but Katies passion quickly drew Jennifer into the closely knit family and into an experience she would not soon forget

RAISING THE MONEY

After much discussion, Michael Byrne and Jennifer Corrao decided to run in the marathon together to raise money for the organization called Life Raft that has been integral in Michaels struggle against the disease that almost took his life more than once in the last 11 years Life Raft is an organization that developed from families, like Michael's, who refused to give up when there seemed to be no options left These families pursued participation in clinical trials using experimental drugs which ultimately saved Michaels life Throughout the journey of finding clinical trials, becoming a participant, getting better, and receiving a second chance, many families learned lessons about the entire process that they wanted to pass on to others who could benefit from their experience And, so the Life Raft organization was formed to assist families with both education and patient advocacy during a very difficult time in their lives According to Michael, the LRG was crucial in coordinating his lifesaving treatment

haal Ryrna was never a runnar until he got

Gleevec for the first time, his tumor had shrunk by 60 percent He and his family were elated¹ And now, of course, he takes his Gleevec religiously It has been a miracle drug for Michael Byrne

According to Michael's wife, Mia, the family originally heard about Gleevec through our Internet group "This Internet group later became known as the Life Raft Group The Life Raft Group has gone on to become an internationally recognized nonprofit organization accessed by thousands through their Web site at www.liferaftgroup org

Others receive the group's newslet ter, which provides the latest scientific information as well as stories about families involved in the battle against GIST The group's goal is to help patients survive this deadly cancer through education, advocacy, research and special initiatives steps on the brakes for the growth of cancer cells, causes shrinkage of tumors for most'

Some people do start having resistance to the drug over time, but Michael has not shown any signs of resistance In addition to the drug regimen, Michael also travels to Boston every six months to remain in the clinical trial for Gleevec at the Dana Farber Cancer Institute which allows him to get the drug for free

At a potential cost of about \$30,000 per year, he doesn't mind making the trip There is a group of researchers there who run the clinical trial, a unit headed by Dr George Demitri In addition, Michael has a CAT scan every three months at a local hospital to make sure the tumor maintains its smaller size

"It's stressful because you worry that every time he has a scan, it will be the one that's going to show that he has become resistant,' Mia said, "and no one knows if that will happen or not

I'm 17 and am dating an old guy who is 20 He lives on his own and wants me to move in with him I'm only a junior in high school and I don't think my mom will let me move out. Next year is an important year for you, it's senior year and you should expect to have fun

You shouldn t have to worry about just getting by to pay bills

You should be thinking about what you want to do after graduation Do you want to go to college or a trade school? If you want to be an adult so badly, then act like one and make responsible choices

'LRG was good as far as giving feedback on different trials Every doctor can t know everything, so it's important," Michael said

Michael's life took a dramatic turn when he received his first round of a drug called 'Gleevec, made by Novartis Pharmaceutical, in 2000 By that time, he had tried just about every approach from multiple surgeries to chemotherapy while still experiencing weakness, pain, fatigue, loss of hair and, ultimately, loss of hope

But, within a month of taking

Jennifer and Michael wanted to give back to this lifesaving organization, so they decided that any money they raised for their competition would go directly to Life Raft to be used to help other families facing what Michael had already faced

Michael's family feels the last four years have been wonderful '

[•]During all the ups and downs, early on, I was constantly wondering if he was going to make it, [•]Mia Byrne said

GOOD HEALTH

But for the last four years, Michael s health has remained stable, and, of course, he still takes Gleevec every day According to Mia, 'The drug kind of Michael was never a runner, had never competed in any kind of race before When he got sick, he started exercising to recover from surgeries, to stay healthy to prepare for the potential of more surgeries later

He started taking his health more seriously, and he knew recovery from surgery would be quicker and easier if he stayed fit Then he started reading about triathlons and thought that competing in events would help him by providing a specific goal for his exercise

Soon it wasn't just the fitness goal anymore He was actually having fun In his first race in 2000 he wore the number "571 as a tribute to the life-



Speech impairment afflicts thousands

Dysphonia often misunderstood

Barb Meteyer knows communication is key when it comes to informing people about spasmodic dysphonia.

But like 50,000 others nationwide who suffer from the neurological affliction, she also knows that's nearly impossible when you're rendered near mute, left with a half-broken voice and capable of mouthing only breathy, sometimes suffocating, sentences

Many mistake the disorder for stuttering Or even mental incapacity

In truth, it affects only a person's vocal ability and appears unannounced between the ages of 30 and 50 At first it sounds like laryngitis, or a sore throat scratchy and irritated But a proper diagnosis typically reveals one of two dysphonia forms adductor or abductor

Adductor results in a strained, choking-like voice, abductor in a breathy tone

Meteyer is the wife of Northville High School biology teacher and girls soccer coach Ron Meteyer She is also a Farmington Hills special education teacher who for three years has watched her voice wane

She was 52 when she self-diagnosed herself via the dysphonia Web site (www.dysphonia.org) Since then, she s watched public misperceptions — about dysphonia and herself — grow exponentially

"We re still very normal," she said, sitting at dinner alongside four other women who share the incurable affliction All five women found each other via an Internet billboard, one of the few ways those suffering from dysphonia can effectively communicate For some, sign language offers relief

Telephone communication is useless Too often it leaves those on the other end stepping between broken words, splayed along a roadway of dead-end sentences

'We hate talking on the phone" Meteyer said 'No on understands what we are saying most of the time Other times, they think we are just pulling some prank

What is spasmodic dysphonia?

The cause of spasmodic dysphonia remains unknown And though since 1989 Botox injections — \$1,000-2,000 each, straight into the throat — have been FDA-approved, the relief such treatments offer

is temporary and alleviates only the symptoms, not the disorder itself

Vocal chord surgery offers longer-lasting relief, but still provides no long-term cure Nothing eliminates public misperceptions

People mistakenly feel you re nervous They think you're uncomfortable talking in public, said Bronzie Dabney, a 47-year-old former high school teacher who has been battling the affliction since she was 24 She was working as an office assistant when her voice splintered in half the first time A year later, she was diagnosed

Between those two moments, the precise cause of her suddenly breathy voice — a vocal balloon constantly losing air — was a mystery

People would call and think I was just playing on the phone,' she said I would try to tell them sometimes they would just hang up

Holly Barnett, of Farmington Hills was diagnosed in 2001 The international flight attendant worried a 38-year career was headed for a crash landing Suddenly she had to contemplate ways to effectively pass along pre-flight instructions

Looking back, she said symptoms were apparent 10 years éarlier

"I traveled to all these places, but I never really enjoyed walking through the streets with my coworkers because I could never really participate in the conversations, Barnett said 'I didn't want to draw attention to my voice"

What she gave up were her own personal opinions

inner thoughts defining her as a person religion, politics, pop culture Every topic suddenly became offlimits because to speak was to draw unwanted attention

Even participating in restaurant conversations became nearly impossible Background noise drowned out the sound of her nimble voice

'I just wanted to have a voice in the world,' Barnett said 'But that was taken away from me"

Hope arrives begrudgingly I'd rather not speak than not walk, she said with a Botox-enhanced voice But its still very hard sometimes

Shirley Prather, a retired insurance industry worker and fledgling author who lives in Farmington

Hills, said she has given up hope a cure will be found 'I don't have hope, she said I ve had this 40 years,

and the research has been minimal People automatically think you have a handicap'

She said her own senior citizen peer group can sometimes be harsh

Some of my friends don't hear very well, she said Sometimes they'll just say, 'I can't hear you and just walk away"

Donna Collins outlook is a more pragmatic

'We are trying to educate the public, even doctors, about what spasmodic dysphonia is, she said That's not always easy because people immediately think the worst'

Collins said relief comes with diagnosis Just find-

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
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Doctors: Lots of options for pain relief

The recent announcement that the drug Vioxx was being pulled from pharmacy shelves because of heart and stroke risks left a lot of pain patients stunned, confused and worried Some are even wondering if they should abandon medications in the same family as Vioxx

But doctors from the University of Michigan Health System say there are plenty of options to relieve pain and arthritis symptoms, and that patients should talk with their own doctors about what medication or combination of medications is right for them

The choice may come down to letting your heart or your gut decide Patients should be treated with medications based in part on their individual risks for heart disease and stomach problems, said Mark Fendrick, M D, a U-M professor of internal medicine who has studied the use of the family of medicines that includes Vioxx, known as non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs or NSAIDs

In 2002, he co-created a pain-medication guideline for doctors that was published in Pharmacy and Therapeutics and adopted by the Michigan Quality ImprovementConsortium It

took into account early evidence that Vioxx and its cousins might raise the risk of a heart attack

"Every patient is different. but there are clear options even in the wake of the Vioxx situation,' said Fendrick "Patients should work with their clinicians to determine the best combination for them, and to persist until they get relief No one should have to live with pain and other symptoms that interfere with their daily life"

Fendrick's guide for treating patients pain takes into account risk for heart disease and risk for gastrointestinal problems caused by NSAIDs It's based on research showing that Vioxx and similar prescription drugs, a subset of NSAIDs called Cox-II inhibitors or 'superaspirins", can ease pain just as well as other NSAIDs But Cox-II inhibitors may carry a lower risk of ulcers or of bleeding in the digestive tract than the more traditional NSAIDs, such as ibuprofen or naproxen Traditional NSAIDs are available both by prescription and over-the-counter in stores But either way, they're much less expensive than Cox-II inhibitors

Fendrick's guide also takes into account the fact many people take another NSAID, aspirin, every day to reduce their risk of a heart attack Taking aspirin with any other NSAID, including Cox-II inhibitors, creates a combined effect that markedly increases the risk of gastrointestinal complication including ulcers and bleeding

"Most patients and many clinicians are unaware of the fact that adding aspirin to a Cox II inhibitor takes away a great deal, if not all, of the gastrointestinal safety benefit,' said Fendrick "In fact, a recent national study showed that over 50 percent of Cox II users also take aspirin, and are therefore putting themselves at risk for ulcers and gastrointestinal bleeding"

Add to that the added heart risk that Cox-II inhibitors appear to carry, and it turns

out that people who have suffered heart attacks, chest pains or strokes, or have a high risk for them, probably shouldn't take Cox II drugs at all In fact, a warning to that effect was placed on Vioxx years ago

But many patients who take NSAIDs may get benefit by adding a stomach-protecting drug called an acid blocker, or proton pump inhibitor These are available by prescription under the names Nexium and Prevacid or over the counter Prilosec

"So, the bottom line is, patients should talk with their clinicians about their pain, their heart risk, and their risk factors for gastrointestinal complication from NSAIDs," said Fendrick "Don't assume that what works for one person will work for you, or that risks or side effects are the same for everyone, And no matter what, be frank with your doctor about pain that you're feeling, because in the end you should be able to get relief'

ALL patients should talk to their chinicians about these 4 general guidelines to decide what drugs are right for them and what dose to take If you have pain, and if you are under 60, have never had ulcers or gastrointestinal bleeding, and aren't taking a blood thinner or oral steroid and if you are over 60, have ever had ulcers or gastrointestinal bleeding, or take a blood thinner or an oral steroid, and your heart risk is low and you don't need to take aspirin regularly, consider a traditional NSAID such as ibuprofen or naproxen These are available as pre-

scription drugs or over the counter as brand name drugs (Advil, Aleve, Motrin, Nuprin) or as less-expensive store brands that contain the same drug and are just as effective Acetaminophen (Tylenol or store brand) might also work.

It's all right to switch to a Cox-II inhibitor other than Vioxx, such as Celebrex or Bextra Or, you could take a traditional NSAID (such as ıbuprofen or naproxen, prescription or over-the-counter), together with a proton pump inhibitor drug (Nexium, Prevacid or Prilosec) to protect your

stomach If you have risk factors for heart disease (history of heart attack, stroke or chest pain, or smoking, high blood pressure, high cholesterol or family history of heart disease, try a traditional NSAID, such as ibuprofen or naproxen (prescription or over-thecounter) If you're taking aspirin to protect your heart, you may want to add a proton pump inhibitor drug (Nexium, Prevacid or Prilosec) because of the added gastrointestinal risk that comes from taking aspirin and another NŠAID If you're not on aspirin, ask your doctor if you should be You need to combine an

NSAID (such as ibuprofen or naproxen, prescription or over the counter) with a proton pump inhibitor drug (Nexium, Prevacid or Prilosec) to protect your stomach Or, ask your doctor if you should take acetaminophen or a low-dose non-NSAID painkiller If you're not on aspirin, ask your doctor if you should be

Facts about dysphonia

What is spasmodic dysphonia? Basically, it's a neurological disorder affecting about 50,000 people nationwide Those afflicted often lose their voice No cause has been identified

Who else has been diagnosed? Among those diagnosed Chuck Hannah, speed boat racer. Robert F Kennedy Jr. Diane Rehm, National Public

ing that there is a name for this is a big relief It's not cancer You're still an intelligent person Your emotions are still normal, despite how people suddenly view you"

All five women said the Internet has helped bridge what until now has been an anonymous divide filled with silent suffering This Saturday, they will join others in Troy for a special support meeting The goal increase public awareness and understanding and lend support to those who need it most

No cure yet Botox injections and vocal chord surgery offer temporary symptomatic relief How do those afflicted deal with it? Internet billboards have become increasingly popular Also, sign language and support groups How to find out if you have it? Visit the National Spasmodic Dysphonia Association Web site at www.dysphonia.org where audible examples of the disorder are available

"It's very important to know you don't have to go through something like this alone," Meteyer said "The five of us are very fortunate to have found each other'

She and Barnett began their friendship via a simple Internet billboard posting "I live in a small Michigan town called Farmington Hills Barnett originally wrote

"I replied, 'I do, too," Meteyer said "Sometimes that's all you need to get you through, one personal connection

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The antiphospholipid syndrome is a condition that often comes to the attention of obstetricians before rheumatologists see it The antiphospholipid syndrome causes blood platelets to aggregate causing occlusion in arteries or veins The effect is to block off blood supply to a part of the body or put you at risk for a blood clot to the lungs


One of the ways that the antiphespholipid syndrome reveals itself in women is with recurrent miscarriages. For this reason, the possible presence of the syndrome may be initially suspected by an obstetrician Miscarriages occur in antiphospholipid syndrome because the condition occludes the small vessels of the placenta causing early loss of the embryo in its sac

Antiphospholipid syndrome can accompany a joint condition such as Lupus and for this reason meumatologists are familiar with the syndrome's features. In men and women who are not pregnant antiphospholipid syndrome causes arthraigias and recurrent occlusion of blood vessels in the legs or arms

Your doctor diagnoses the problem by its presenting features and blood tests which confirm the presence of high titer antibodies associated with the syndrome

In pregnancy the treatment consists of medications like aspirin or heparin that decrease clotting The same medications are useful in other individuals who have antiphospholipid syndrome if the woman is pregnant the anti clotting medication is stopped when her labor begins In other individuals the drugs are used indefinitely

From Employee To Business Owner -- 'Between Trapezes?'



WORKWISE In September, 1977, car rental clerk by Claudette Mildred L. Harris of West Cuip Milford, W Va., was earning

minimum wage at the airport About 20 travelers stranded by flight cancellations swamped the car rental booths Inspired, she persuaded two strangers to drive together to Pittsburgh, splitting the \$167 cost A highly successful entrepreneur was born, helped by an aunt,

who cashed a \$10,000 CD to back her

Within 11 months, her husband, Jeff, quit his job as a full-time truck driver to work full time at The Shuttle Rose "There are times that occasionally get tough," he says, "but we live a better lifestyle than we ever thought we would Not rich, but anything within reason we can get." The company has 17 drivers and 22 vans covering about 750,000 miles per year in 17 states Insurance for the vans totals \$140,000

per year.

Does it take a trapeze artist to open what becomes a successful business? Not quite The Shuttle Rose service is just one example Cindy Rowe of Harrisburg, Pa., an R.N for 13 years, also felt ready for a change. Twenty-five years ago, "someone showed me an ad in an auto-truck magazine," she

recalls. "It said, 'Repair windshields, be your own boss ' It sounded pretty wild, but I decided I'd call " Shortly thereafter, she was in Minneapolis for three days' training in repairing stonechips in windshields Nursing



remained her fall-back With \$2,500 capital paying for the training, repair kit and office supplies for her mobile office, she drove a 1975 tan Vega for eight years, "a three-speed that never let me down," she says affectionately In 1985 Rowe married Dave One year later, he abandoned his 23-year retail career for good In 1987, they acquired an existing business for a second service -- auto glass replacement -which he was charged with learning while she traveled, continuing to open accounts and train technicians

Today this award-winning entrepreneur has her 11(th) shop under construction, more than 80 employees, a corporate office with a strong management team, and 10 callcenter employees

THE UNKNOWN

Are these two business owners trapeze artists? You might think so if you read "Between Trapezes" (Rodale, \$22.95) by Gail Blanke, a coach who encourages readers to take risks

Blanke affirms that "the real thrill in life is not in the landing -- it's in the flying," which you cannot do unless you "let go of the *need to know* " Flyers "have a sense of levity," she writes, "an intuitive understanding that it's all just a game."

Wait a minute

"I never felt that way," Rowe states "But I understand about the adventure If you have everything lined up, it's not an adventure I think I felt grounded. I loved what I was doing "Harris is of the same mind, saying, "We wanted to be a little bit more sound than a trapeze artist "Earning a living isn't just a game for either person If you absolutely can't get yourself off the dime, reading the book might help you break free But be careful The book's subtitle, "Flying

into a New Life with the Greatest of Ease" implies a level of risk-taking that isn't suitable for everyone

Note that Rowe and Harris both selected basic services that many

people need. Rowe developed contracts with The United States Marine Corps that spared marines driving recruits to and from the processing center in town With the (free) help of the Small Business Administration and one of SCORE's retired executives in Fairmont, West Va (www.score org), she spent three weeks developing a business plan, which she'd never done, to qualify for a contract The Shuttle Rose also needed insurance When a severe snowstorm collapsed the Marine Corps' recruiting station, a state of emergency was declared The Shuttle -Rose was expedited through the Department of Defense, thanks to the Marine Corps's sponsorship by getting a waiver for the one-year-in-operation clause The Shuttle Rose has since diversified its revenue streams, with contracts with the Air Force and Air Force Reserves and small group trips to amusement parks, such as Atlantic City.

Blanke, the author, is confusing when she advocates "defin(ing) ourselves by the moments when we *fly* -- the time when we got the job, nailed the report






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

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

As both of my daughters were watching a DVD in the back seat with the headsets on, my 11-year-old took off her headset and asked me what I thought then was an out-of-this-decade question

Mom, Francesca asked, 'Why can't we view cable networks on the cars that have televisions?

Stars visit Detroit to film *The Island*

eep your eyes open around town and you might catch a glimpse of Hollywood starlet Scarlett Johansson and actor Ewan McGregor on the streets of Detroit

Johansson (Lost in Translation, Girl With a Pearl Earring) and McGregor (Star Wars Episodes I and II, Moulin Rouge) are in town to film The Island, a science fiction action-adventure movie set in Los Angeles 20 years in the future

According to Chad Rumminger, publicist for Solomon Friedman Entertainment in Bloomfield Hills, location scouts researched a few cities and decided to film in Detroit because its buildings are similar to those of L A

'If you go to Los Angels now the outside of the buildings are basically the same, but here, they had the ability to have more space, and shoot in the intersections and do traffic shots and pick up some of that action," Rumminger said

Crews transformed the intersection of Griswold and Larned into a futuristic subway stop, complete with concept cars and buses

More than 200 extras, selected at a

casting call held Oct 23 in Southfield, filled the scene

Spectators gathered on the street or in offices above to watch filming, which included car chase sequences

Later in the week, film crews moved inside the abandoned railroad depot downtown

The film tells the story of Lincoln Six-Echo (McGregor), a resident of a seemingly utopian facility Like all of the inhabitants of this carefully controlled environment, Lincoln hopes to be chosen to go to The Island — reportedly the last uncontaminated spot on the planet But Lincoln soon discovers that he and everyone else in the facility are actually human clones whose only purpose is to provide spare parts for their original human counterparts

Realizing it is only a matter of time before he is harvested, Lincoln makes a daring escape with a beautiful fellow resident named Jordan Two-Delta (Johansson)






