### Governor says 2005 will be a great year of job growth, tax reform

Despite the fact Michigan's unemployment rate is among the highest in the nation and her approval rating is starting to take a beating, Gov Jennifer Granholm believes the state has taken a turn for the better

"2005 is going to be a great year for us," said Granholm during an

end-of-the-year news conference in Lansing Dec 16, the mid-point of her first, four-year term 'It's going to be a year of job growth, not straight up, but on a subtle trajectory'

Despite an unemployment rate that hovers at 7 percent - the national average is 5 4 percent -Granholm said it's still lower than last year and the state is on the right path But Granholm does

acknowledge the state's future still rides with the automotive industry

"We know the state is in a challenging economic time because of the reliance on the auto sector.' said Granholm "The Big Three's (General Motors, Ford and DaımlerChrysler) share of the market has been declining, and that poses a challenge for us Thats why we have to focus on

diversifying the economy and creating an environment for growth in areas in addition to the auto sector"



# Holiday shoppers return for exchanges and deals

For retailers across western Wayne County, it might be hard to tell the difference between the crowds of last-minute shoppers the day before Christmas and those who rush back Dec 26

One noticeable change, however, is the number of shoppers who arrive at stores armed with bags of merchandise — ready to return or exchange

Gifts might come in the wrong size color or style And some recipients get more than one of the same item Shoppers have their reasons for returns, and retail employees hear them all

"Hopefully they'll find what they re looking for," said Denise Mills, marketing manager at Westland Shopping Center in Westland She anticipates large crowds at the mall throughout the week

To offset the post-holiday race to the cash registers Sunday, the mall will open three hours early, at 8 a m , and close at 6 p m

Parisian, in Livonia's Laurel Park Place, also holds extended store hours today, Sunday, Dec 26, to accommodate the still thriving crowds Randy Dell, store manager, said the hours are only an hour shorter compared to the holiday rush — from 7 a m to 8 p m — and the store will be fully staffed

"People are just as antsy when they find an item they like," he said of those who come to return or exchange

And shoppers keep coming, for the entire week following Christmas to do so

Owners of The Colonial Collection, 44465 Ann Arbor Road in Plymouth, allow returns on holiday merchandise through Jan 10

"It gives them some time to return or exchange," said Kathy Ayers, a Plymouth Township resident who co-owns the store with

her daughter, Marilyn Von Gerichten Ayers took over the business in September after having managed the store for 33 years She knows what to expect around the holidays

"We have done very well, Ayers said 'We bought cautiously, put in things we loved It's been a good Christmas"

Unlike area malls, she doesn't expect huge crowds today

In fact, the shop will open at its normal time, 10 a m Ayers said shopping will likely be continuous, thanks in part to those after-Christmas bargain-hunters' Post-holiday shoppers in the area can make the returning or exchanging of merchandise even easier by remembering two things: bring the receipt and leave the tags on the item.

Mills said bringing a receipt or a gift receipt does speed up the process, and maintains the value of the item at the time it was purchased Without a receipt, the item may be returned for the current, possibly sale, price

In any case, Mills suggests all who venture out the day after Christmas should "be patient '

The Parisian store policy is clear with regard to exchanges of its merchandise

According to Dell, gifts under \$10 may be returned for cash back, or a credit to the customer's Parisian card Items over \$10 can be charged back to the Parisian card or returned for store credit

Even exchanges of identical items are processed most quickly, he said

Leaving tags on the items for return will also expedite the process, according to retailers

"If you have the barcode, the store can tell two things, Mills said 'One, that it was bought from that store And two, (you can tell) the price'

A barcoded tag also makes it easier for employees to seek out the same item for an even exchange For Dell, saving shoppers' time is important

Because it is Sunday, buyers will not be in the office to help locate merchandise,' Dell said

Overall the 2004 shopping season has been good one at area shops Mills said sales have been steady and strong and the after-holiday sales have barely begun

"It's important to turn those returns into sales, Dell said

The sun came out and its midday, so we felt like we could handle it, Graham said

Snow emergencies had been declared Thursday in communities throughout western Wayne County, meaning that on-street parking was prohibited in order to keep roads clear for plows

Local and Wayne County crews were out plowing the roads and applying salt

The county had about 140 vehicles plows, graders and dump trucks - at work Thursday morning, said Patrick Hogan, director of the county's roads division

He expected crews would be out Friday as well - on overtime, because of the Christmas Eve holiday

We've been at it pretty steady since 10 30 or 11 o clock last night, and we're beginning to see some headway, Hogan said shortly after 10 a m Thursday

Plowing was initially focused on the and freeways, but Hogan said he hoped sidewalk in front of his parent's home crews with smaller trucks would begin

plowing residential streets in area townships - including Redford, Canton and Plymouth - later Thursday The county is responsible for snow-plowing in townships

Hogan said road crews planned to make a lot of progress during a 24-hour period, beginning midafternoon Thursday, during which no snow was expected

As far as todays commute is concerned " he said Thursday, it's a slow go but (drivers) can still get where they need to go

Sponsorships have been easy to come by this year, even with the economy in a downturn, McClendon said

Sponsors include tech call center Minacs in Southfield, which will house the phone bank on New Years Eve, and the Northville Police Department

Project LifeRide is targeting 300 bars in Oakland County and 300 in Wayne County this year, she said Free taxi rides home will be offered to those who ve had too much

The annual effort is also sponsored by 94 7 WCSX Classic Rock, Cameron's Clean-Up and presenting sponsor Takata Taxi rides are paid by MADD and reimbursed with funds from Takata

In 2003, Project LifeRide received 364 calls for taxi rides for about 865 people on New Years Eve

The project has provided approximately 8,000 safe rides to 24,000 people since its inception

The Wayne County Sheriff's Department and local police plan additional patrols during the holidays "Their primary responsibility will be enforcement of OUIL," said Wayne County Undersheriff Harold Cureton of his department

Law enforcement supports the MADD effort "I think anything that would stop a person who is impaired from driving is a good thing, Cureton said He's seen business owners be responsible about getting peo ple home

'I think its a very good idea,' Cureton said of Project LifeRide "The police cannot do this alone'

Project organizers ask revelers to make advance plans to get imbibers home safely Other tips from MADD ınclude

■ Don't drink if you will be driving

Host an alcohol-free party Call for a copy of MADD s Safe Party Guide

Choose a designated driv er

Stay overnight at a relatives or friend's home

Buy a hotel party/room package and enjoy an evening away from home

MADD provides other services to aid those grieving the loss of a loved one due to drunken driving This time of year is difficult for those people, McClendon said



She indicated the net job decline from 2000-02 was 196,000 In 2003, it was 94,000 And this year she expects it to be at 15,000

"We re headed in the right direction as far as the overall job decline," she said "With state assistance, we created 132 000 jobs When the country catches a cold, Michigan catch es pneumonia because of the auto sector Were very excited about the path we are on

Granholm said shell pursue changes in the business tax next year that will be revenue neutral, meaning the changes won t bring in additional dollars to the state She wouldn't be spe cific about any changes until her State of the State address next vear

We need to restructure the business taxes to make the state more competitive," said Granholm "Its clear the busi ness community is clamoring for that

The state Legislature, which is controlled by Republicans in both the House and Senate, have blocked her attempts to change the business tax structure And, since November, Senate Majority Leader Ken Sıkkema, R-Wyoming has been highly critical of Granholm and her administration

I think there was a switch that flipped, and that's too bad,' she said "I hope it doesn't continue

Granholm believes the way out of the state's dependence on the auto industry is to have a highly educated workforce

"Other states have focused on higher education, and if we had done this 10 years ago, we would have the most robust economy in the nation because we would have the most welleducated workforce, said Granholm 'High-end diversification has to be an emphasis

Granholm is focused on retaining college graduates many of whom are moving out of Michigan to fill the more technical jobs the auto industry and its suppliers will need to fill in the future

state with the most technologically advanced, creative economy in the country, said Granholm "We need to focus on high-end research and development, life sciences, and advanced manufacturing opportunities We're going to take some bold steps

Southeast Michigan, in particular, has and will continue to be, the epicenter of designing for the automobile industry, and that is what we've been focusing on, Granholm said

Granholm has been working to bring more international auto-related companies to commit to southeastern Michigan

"Thats why I went to Germany and got commitments to get jobs here from German suppliers, she said Toyota is interested in bringing their research and development facil ity, and we will continue to pursue that

Even though Granholm is taking a number of steps to improve Michigan's business climate Chuck Hadden, vice president of government affairs for the Michigan Manufacturers Association said the main goal needs to focus on retention of the states current jobs

"The No 1 goal should be to retain jobs, said Hadden It costs less to retain jobs and keep them than look for new jobs

And, she needs to settle the business tax issue added Hadden and then business can decide if it likes it or not While critics have blamed

Granholm and the legislature for politicking instead of solving the states problems state Rep John Stewart R-Plymouth

Township, said the games must stop

We must all put our heads together and not play the blame game," he said 'We must form consensus in regard to cuts and raising revenue

Stewart said he expects Treasurer Jay Rising to come up with a new business tax struc ture that will offer some per sonal property tax relief, it will focus more on a corporate prof its tax

Stewart, a small business owner with an attorney's office in Plymouth, said hed welcome a cut in personal property taxes but, we must replace that revenue stream to local govern ments The only source, it would appear, is the corporate profits tax"

Stewart said his main goals are to stop more cuts in K-12 education and revenue sharing to local governments

State Sen Laura Toy, R-Livonia, agrees with Granholm that jobs are the No 1 priority, but said state government needs to take a look at its own house

'We have a changed world and a changed economy, we ve got to being to be creative and run government more like a business," said Toy, a flower shop owner for 25 years 'We have to find out what people want to spend on government

While Toy gives Granholm a B-plus for her first two years in office, she acknowledges Granholm needs to work more closely with both the House and Senate to get more accomplished "She needs to bring us into the front office more, said Toy Its a tough arena and needs some tough solutions and we ve got to work together, regardless if there is a D (Democrat) or R (Republican) in front of your name

Not only is Granholm getting criticism from the legislature, recent polls have seen her popularity drop below 60 percent However the governor remains undaunted If someone had said to me that in the face of budget deficits, loss of jobs recession and all the challenges we face that I would have a 57 percent approval rating at the end of my second year I d say that s really great Granholm said But, what is really impor tant is getting stuff done not the polls


Musically, he plays both the plano and guitar, and leads the music portion of the school s weekly youth chapel sessions


'It seems like I've been playing basketball since I started walking, Sumner said 'I have great memories of going to my sisters games and running around on the court

# University big band teaches teamwork

Mark Nılan's hands move as effortlessly over the keys as those of his teacher Matt Michaels The 21-year old jazz student has come a long way from his classical beginnings Now in his third year with the Wayne State University Big Band, Nılan plans to earn a master's degree in jazz studies at the University of Southern California after spending next summer playing with legendary musicians such as Earth, Wind & Fire, and Smokey Robinson in Greece Nilan began playing piano at age 5 but it was only six years ago that he first tried his hand at jazz as part of the Creative and Performing Arts Program at Churchill High School in Eivonia The WSU Lab Band I is the group to play with at the aniversity It is composed of graduate and undergraduate students who must pass an audition to perform alongside musicians such as Mel Wanzo, lead trombone with the Count Basie Orchestra for 28 years, and Vincent Chandler who played trombone with the Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra and Wynton Marsalis before returning to school During the year, they perform at a variety of venues around town includ-

ing the Ford Detroit International Jazz Festival and Michigan Jazz Festival at Schoolcraft College

'The band gives us an opportunity to play in front of a crowd, said Mark Nilan whos interest in music comes from his father who owns the Live Wire recording studio in Livonia 'Twice a week we get to play just for ourselves'

Lab Band I is one of many opportunities for students to gain experience playing with a group The 60 jazz majors can take their choice of two guitar bands, 11 combos and three big bands

Michaels co-founded the jazz studies program with Dennis Tini and James Hartway in 1979 Today, students earning undergraduate and graduate degrees learn not only to perform, but compose and arrange music

"The most important function of the band is to give students discipline in learning to play with other people so when they do it in the professional world they will have had that experience,' said Matt Michaels, a Southfield pianist who plays frequently around town with his trio Michaels is

director of jazz studies at the university

Michaels steps down as director of Lab Band I in January when Chris Collins returns from a sabbatical Michaels led the group for 18years

'We train them to do theater or shows at the Fox,' said Michaels Our goal is the ultimate in training as a big band We try to make them team players

To practice what he preaches, Michaels takes the bands to play at high schools

'We take it out to schools to expose the younger people in high schools, said Michaels 'Most high schools have jazz bands now I also use it to recruit students

Playing for crowds is important to Joshua Marion of Romeo, a 23-year old baritone saxophonist Marion graduates in May with a bachelor's degree and plans to go on for a master's before teaching junior high students

This is the premier band at Wayne State, said Marion 'The music is very challenging You learn to read very well and it gives you an idea of what its

like to play a club scene"


Colton Weatherston of West Bloomfield especially appreciates being able to play with musicians that were on the road with the likes of Basie and Marsalıs

I m interested in jazz history We have living history in the band with Mel Wanzo, said Weatherston, a 31-yearold graduate student who earned his bachelor's at the University of Michigan School of Music

Jazz is kind of the foundation for many other kinds of popular music Jazz musicians need to perform with each other It creates a greater understanding of our form of expression

Big band styles, were popular in the 30s and 40s The foundation was created during that era For young guys it helps us learn about our instruments and repertoire Even though the bands are no longer economically viable it helps us to study that and take the ideas to play what we do now"







# Hands-on education

Center gives hope to parents of children with autism

#### **BY LINDA ANN CHOMIN** STAFF WRITER

In a colorful room filled with toys, Gail Hieronymus coaxes 4-year old Max to make a happy face Expression doesn t come easily to the young Livonia boy with autism, a neurodevelopmental disorder affecting a childs ability to speak, play and interact socially

Max 15 slowly learning to communicate thanks to training Hieronymus received at the HOPE Center, the Hands-On Parent Education program run by William Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak. At the center, staff showed Hieronymus how to teach Max during three-hour sessions, five days a week for three months His father Mark and brother Justin, 13, went a few times as well so they could work with Max on fine motor skills like tying a shoelace Upon completing the program, families have the option of continuing behavioral intervention at the center or with the assistance of a consultant at home

'We use a scavenger hunt for teaching prepositions It takes two people, Gail Hieronymus said during a working session in the basement of her home 'We try to get Max to include you in play and promote verbalization It teaches him to interact with others

'You have to be real creative and have reinforcers that are fun for him Treats aren't real effective with Max

Mark says hes seen a huge improvement since Max and Hieronymus attended the program He was more





like the old Max they knew until shortly after his second birthday Until then Max was able to say words like mama, but then quit talking and making eye contact after a bad reaction to an HIB vaccination Hieronymus first thought it was speech delay when Max was a puppy for Halloween and wouldn't bark.

For the last two years, Max has attended preschool three hours a day at Perrinville Early Childhood Center, a Livonia Public Schools program for children with visual impairment and developmental delays Hieronymus leads a support group there on the fourth Tuesday of every month For more information, send e-mail to gail61500@aol com

His speech has improved tremendously eye contact, listening,' Mark Hieronymus said 'You can tell him to do things he now does He had some verbal skills, but not a lot'

child It's teaching based on rewards - what will motivate them? Every child is different A lot of times it's food, but we soon substitute with praise, sometimes toys, tickles, bubbles, which are more natural"

Joan Kern has seen tremendous growth in her 4-year-old son Luke since they participated in the program this fall The Bloomfield Township boy was diagnosed with autism a year ago Since age 3, he has been enrolled in an early intervention program through the Avondale School District Like Hieronymus, Kern is continuing to teach Luke at home with the help of a consultant

"When Luke was little he was a good baby, but I had a son who was speech delayed and noticed Luke was quiet," Joan Kern said "But autism is more than communication There's cognitive abilities involved

"The HOPE Center designed a program for him, then they teach you They're always there working with you It helped Luke a lot He didn't talk before Now he. can say I want a cookie Before he would just get what he wanted '

# Make your house safer, more livable as you age

hey say that we live in Peter Pan" housing Built for people who never grow old But we all grow old The

grow old But we all grow old The overwhelming tendency for aging adults is to adapt their behavior to the house It's a natural response because aging takes place so slowly we don t even realize we're doing it We use the furniture to steady ourselves when we get up quickly We hold on to the wall when climbing into the bathtub We put brighter bulbs in our lamps so that we can keep on reading the newspaper

But there comes a time when you find yourself scooting sideways to make your walker fit through the bathroom door and yet you just keep adjusting to the house you've always lived in It never occurs to you to make your house adjust to you

That one step from the family room to the kitchen level that is all too prevalent in the 1960's houses is a prime example You have to somehow get all four legs of your walker up or down that step, which requires you to lean entirely too far forward A small ramp would solve that problem Falls in the home are the singular most significant problem among aging adults

# Continuity Loses Big With `Board Busters'



People want

continuity, one key ingredient for stability, but this need can block constructive change An

entire literature on change has emerged, stressing that people will almost go to the ends of the earth to assure continuity but avoid change. Fortunately, this is not always true. Sometimes, people form teams to use work skills, then contradict that assumption.

More than a year ago, we moved into an upper-middle class neighborhood outside of a major metropolitan area This new community showcases wellmaintained oversized yards with geese flying overhead and nocturnal visits from deer and raccoons. Every morning, it empties of school children and workers commuting to jobs of all kinds, from IT to financial services, manufacturing and education. Three months after arriving, a neighbor told us that we were members of a repressive homeowners association. like it or not Non-payment of dues leads to violations and fines.

CATALYST

-

Meanwhile, we began to notice unusual traffic and loud music across the street It was impossible to identify

who actually lived in the house there. A mid-afternoon burglary occurred, which required a sheriff deputy's visit for about three or four hours right afterward, including a

forensics team. The theft of two fur coats and a safe led to supposition that the property was an alleged drug house

Drugs may be everywhere these days, but not on my street The homeowners association president was too busy assessing and collecting fines to be of help. In response, I formed The Neighborhood Watch over 500 properties, a larger version of one I'd block-captained in Seattle

Homeowners couldn't separate their association grievances from The Watch I kept telling residents that this is a crime prevention vehicle, period. It wasn't about membership in a homeowners association

BREAK

For 18 years, the president of our association had held monthly meetings on second Tuesdays at 7 30 p.m. He presided with arrogance, insults and swear words, even when children attended. Turnout was slim -- only eight to 15 residents each month

A favored few members were exempt from rules All others were not The neighborhood was brimming with anger over board malfeasance, condescension and partiality. Member dues evaporated ınto

-- legal fees,

\ -- an ineffective property management group, punitively meting out violations,

- expensive aquatic developments directly benefitting only 25 properties and allegedly hning the pockets of one board member, and

-- property upkeep directly funding the president's lawn service, and

-- neighborhood security funds that were passed to a third board member. 'BOARD BUSTERS'

Change had been in the air, with two members collecting signatures for petitions, which were ignored by the board. Members were so accustomed to working in large organizations that they didn't know how to structure and effect change We formed a "change board" united in purpose and resolve. Here's what we did:

-- The leader devoted hours reading the by-laws and rules, then developing a strategy for December's election.

-- Another member found a person to draft a proxy form pro bono

-- A third spearheaded the recruiting of board candidates.

-- A fourth communicated directly with the one somewhat sympathetic current board member. (He had attempted to stem the corruption, but was outvoted)

-- A fifth, retired from the IRS and

EPA, provided invaluable information and perspective from having presided over a condominium owners' association'

-- Our flamboyant go-to-guy kept recruiting people to vote, even during the two-hour election He gave us our name "Board Busters."


Unlike this fall's presidential election, this one wasn't close The community dumped one incumbent receiving compensation Three new people now ---fill the three available slots. Some people do want change



If you take a look at the Chevrolet Aveo the first thing you think is that it's too small for anyone over 4 feet tall to fit inside either the front or back seats And cargo space in the rear shoot, it's got to be totally non existent Looks like there's about a foot of space, maybe less, from the outside Well, looks are deceiving

I've finding that out more and more with every small sub compact that I ve driven lately What looks ultra small is very very surprising on the inside and in the cargo area How can they put that much room in a car that small, for Pete's sake?

I know I know the 'ol move the tires out farther and stretch as much as you can out of that sheet metal Its been done with the Chevrolet Aveo and done well too This entry level vehicle is a breath of fresh air and full of value for the money you'll pay

Sounds like I've been touting small cars and their wonder ful features lately Well, with gas prices the way they are lately although they are dropping just a tad sounds like a good way to spend your hard earned bucks You II get any where between 26 mpg in the city to 36 mpg on the highway depending on the transmission you choose Not bad

I still don't like small cars because of the safety you'll sacri fice I'm talking about the chance of getting creamed by a huge SUV or a larger, full size vehicle but its a risk you ve got to take sometimes, I guess

There are two Aveos to choose from a four door sedan and a five door These subcompacts will seat five adults and are available in three different trim levels depending on your pocketbook Special Value Base and LS

Powered by a 1 6 liter dual overhead cam four cylinder engine affording you 103 horsepower the Aveo is peppy enough for a small vehicle like this. Its available with a four speed automatic that features a hold control allowing you to stay in the appropriate gear on slippery roads or hills. I drove the five speed manual. It was difficult to shift took its time getting up to snuff and the feature that you have to lift up a level on the shift knob to get it into reverse was

more than a pain in the reverse Annoying to say the least Maddening to say the most

The Aveo was styled and created in Giorgetto Giugiaros well known Italdesign studio in Turin, Italy The styling of the Aveo is more than pleasing to the eye lending itself to invisible lines rounded corners that flow into just about infinity and a high roofline that gives it the appearance that its a little larger than it really is

The front treatment, with its wrap around headlamps turn signal lamps, front air dam that sports the familiar bow tie and rear air intake makes a bold statement looking like it has command of the road Fenders on the side are flared for added sportiness

The interior of the Aveo isn't tight and can accommodate four not five adults comfortably I m talking about taking a few people out for a night on the town with full regalia including coats and purses and umbrellas. It would be tight for five

You have to know, however, that the Aveo has the roomiest interior of any vehicle in its class, which is a plus There's also a higher H point (head to toe) ratio than others in its class as well

There are features on the Aveo that you wont find in most subcompact vehicles in this price range all of which allow more comfort than you would expect There's a standard tilt steering wheel seats with recline, seat height and headrest height adjustment and a 60/40 split folding rear bench seat with built in headrests that also feature grocery bag hooks The interior instrumentation is easy to read and under stand and is very basic You ll find a tach speedometer odometer trip odometer fuel gauge and coolant temperature gauge There's a center storage tray, ashtray 12 volt outlet and clock in the center console

Some of the creature comforts you'll find in the Aveo include Am/FM stereo, tinted glass intermittent wipers, rear defogger, remote fuel coor and trunk release day/night rearview mirror vanity mirrors up front, and dual front cupholders that don't hold large cups

I have a bone to pick on the trunk release Okay, there's a trunk release on the interior of the vehicle, located just left of the driver's seat There's also a remote keyless entry that allows you to lock and unlock the doors But you've got to use the key to open the trunk from the outside of the vehi cle There isn't even a latch if it's unlocked You're forced to put the key in the keyhole to open the trunk Mighty inconvenient Id say

I didn t have any issues with the ride and handling of the Aveo It whipped around corners and took bumpy roads and highway imperfections without so much as a whimper I was never uncomfortable in the Aveo but I never took it on a longer trip than 45 minutes or so I don't see a problem with a long trip, but I never took it on one, so I can't comment

I loved the styling, I loved the interior room and I loved the fact that this subcompact is a great entry level vehicle that's perfect for the college bound kid or even a high school sopho more getting his/her first car Great on mileage great on economy What more do you want?

Dr Levi, my husband and I have very similar diets, we both brush and floss regularly and use the same toothpaste Yet, I am constantly fighting plaque build up while he never seems to develop any What gives here? Also, is there any connection between oral plaque and the build up of plaque in heart arteries?

Firstly, there is no known connection between atherosclerotic plaque found in coronary arteries and the plaque found on teeth There are however studies that draw a direct connection between periodontal disease and heart disease This is believed to be associated with the chromic inflammation of periodontal disease

The variation in plaque levels between individuals is accounted for by several factors

1) Amount of calcium foods that are ingested The more dairy products you eat the higher the calcium levels in your saliva the greater the incidence of plaque

2) The teeth closest to salivary ducts invariably have more tartar build up The calcium in your saliva causes the tartar to form Think of the amount of tartar on the tongue side of your lower front teeth This area is just in front of the large salivary duct under your tongue and is any area we often find plaque build up

3) Genetics are probably the biggest factor in differing plaque levels between

people Your husband just has better genes (At least in this department anyway)

My pearls appear to be dirty, can I clean them with my liquid jewelry cleaner?

There are several methods used to clean pearls however liquid jewelry cleaner isn't one of them In most cases pearls appear dirty because the material used to string them has become stained The only way to solve this problem is to restring the entire strand When this service is preformed the pearl itself is lightly rubbed with a polishing cloth to remove any surface dirt In most cases we recommend that placing a knot between each pearl to ensure that during wear, the pearls are protected from abrasion by the bead next to it A general rule we recommend to keep your pearls fresh looking is to make them the last thing you put on when dressing and the first thing you take off when you come home This will help to ensure the necklace is not exposed to perfumes and lotions For more information stop in or e-mail us at dave@minersden com
