
Former teacher eager to get back to 'normal'

ary Beth Carroll said shes been approached by just about every major news media outlet there is to tell her story

However Carroll said shes happy to turn them all down - for the time being - for an opportunity to lead a much more normal life than the one shes lived the past few months

Carroll, a retired Plymouth Salem High

Mayer and others have been complaining for by nths that Fiermin h shol tel several township e din a e s rachidur, one that 1 rohibits dumping of materials from off site The 1 si dents have also complained Herriman put up an air conditioning unit on top of his building, which he bought in the mid 1990s from Comerica Bank, and also has a Dumpster that is unscreened The property also features a storage bin Mayer said isn't allowed

doesn t want to be well-known Its against her grain," said Carroll 'And, besides, there's great sadness involved, especially with the death of her translator" Jill Carroll was kidnapped Jan 7 in a western Baghdad neighborhood, on her

Convertino pleads not guilty of lying to jury

Former US Attorney Rick Convertino of Canton is free on a \$25,000 unsecured bond and was forced to give up his travel documents after pleading not guilty Friday morning - in the same downtown Detroit US District Court courtroom where he used to practice - to charges of lying to a jury and federal Judge

The four-count indictment charges Convertino, and US State Department security officer Harry Raymond Smith, with mently deny the charges, and misleading a federal jury in Detroit in a case that won two convictions - later overturned in the nation's first terrorism trial after Sept 11, 2001

Two men were found guilty in June 2003 on terrorism charges, however, the convictions were thrown out after the US Justice Department claimed prosecutors suppressed evidence

Not-guilty pleas were entered on behalf of Convertino and Smith before Judge Arthur Tarnow

"The bottom line is we vehe-

our intent is to completely and 100 percent vindicate Mr Convertino, said Jeffrey DelFuoco, an ex-federal prosecutor who is one of Convertino's attornevs

Convertino, who has a private law practice in Plymouth, continues his claim the indictments stem from his 2004 whistleblower lawsuit against then-Attorney General John Ashcroft, claiming gross incompetence and mismanagement of the war on terror Convertino said it was strange

to be the defendant in front of a judge he used to face as a prosecutor

"It was a judge I'd seen many times and know well," said Convertino, 45 'There were several FBI agents, court officers, state troopers and police officers who were there to support me, something I didn't expect"

The Justice Department has declined comment on the charges, which could land Convertino in prison for up to 30 years and cost him a \$1 milhon fine if convicted

But the concessions from Herriman didn't satisfy Mayer or some of her neighbors, who believe Herriman should be held to the letter of the ordinances Mayer and Holly Good were at the March 14 board meeting, where Good told the board, "While we appreciate Herriman and Associates are complying occasionally with some of the township ordinances, there is concern regarding what appears to be a proposed 'negotiating' of the law by the township and the property owner

Mayer beheves Herriman is being protected because hes a friend of the township and a former township board member Township building officials said the citation of Mayer for the fence was sparked by "anonymous complaints but Mayer believes someone on the board is responsible

"Citing a resident for a fence that was installed prior to 1983 by the previous owner is retaliation with a capital 'R," Mayer said

Plymouth Township Building Official Mark Lewis said that wasn t true

These things are always prompted by a complaint, Lewis said "It is definitely not retaliation. We don't operate that way







Stewart steps down to set up for 20th House race

Prez to run museum

After 17 years as the director of the Plymouth Historical Museum, Beth Stewart will step down June 1 to campaign for the Republican nomination for the 20th District seat in the Michigan House of Representatives

In accepting her leave of absence, the Historical Society board has appointed its president, Sandy Burr as interim director

"This is one of the hardest decisions I ve ever had to make" Stewart said "I love what I do here, its very challenging always new collaborations, working with people new exhibits and things for kids We re currently working on a five year plan some of which may or may not be affected depending on what happens

However, I m positive things will continue on with or without me" she said We have the best volunteer corps anywhere They love this place and see the vision like I do"

Stewart is vying for the seat currently held by her term limited husband John Stewart R Plymouth Township Thus far shes expected to face Phil Pursell of Plymouth and Don Schnettler of Plymouth Township in the primary Only one Democrat, Plymouth-Canton Community Schools Board of Education trustee Joanne Lamar of Plymouth Township, has announced a run for the seat The deadline to file nominating petitions or a \$100 filing fee, to the Wayne County Clerk's Office is May 16

Stewart said she will resume her role as director if she loses in the primary or the Nov 7 general election

Burr 79 is a second generation president of the Historical Society following in the footsteps of his parents George and Mildred Burr He was presi dent one other time in the 1970s

"This is going to be a new experience, kind of exciting said Burr Beth has laid the groundwork and we plan on holding the line (on new projects)

"We need to build on our historical timeline, and there are some things we can do with education, he said 'We need to reach out to our public and let them know we have a wonderful facility We will have the summer months where we re not deluged with school groups so that will give us a breather Burr said the nearly 100 volunteers will make it

easier for him to serve as interim director There are some fabulous people to work with, he said I marvel at the talent we have

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

Its with a mixture of excitement and apprehension that Plymouth District Library staffers are awaiting start of expansion work the end of May or early June

It is exciting Everybody's looking forward to it," said Patricia Thomas, director of the library on Main, which opened its current facility in 1998 "Were hoping to make it as easy as possible for our patrons"

McCarthy & Smith is general contractor for the project, pegged at just under \$3 7 million

That includes the furniture and technology,' Thomas said The project is set to last about 15 months and should wrap up in late summer 2007

When built, the facility had an empty third floor, essentially an unfinished attic with a concrete floor.

"We're just really kind of tying up loose ends with contracts right now," she said Thursday There's paperwork and building permits needed as well Staff members are talking about the logistics of moving people around the building, which will remain open

When built, the facility had an empty third floor, essentially an unfinished attic with a concrete floor Shed dormers will be put in on three sides not only to enhance lighting but also to provide more space

A height of eight feet is

needed there for bookshelves, Thomas said

Date nears for Plymouth library work

In the first phase, adult nonfiction and reference will be moved to the third floor, where computers will also be housed The lower level will then be closed and converted into a children's room

"Thats in response to comments we ve gotten over the years from parents,' Thomas said "This pulls it all together in one place" That will allow parents with younger children and older siblings to have them all together

In the third phase, a new teen space will be created on the main floor in the current children's area. That will free up more space for such adult offerings as popular fiction and magazines

Staffers are striving to keep the building user-friendly

throughout, the director said, noting the book drop will remain open The only closings anticipated are isolated days for work on major systems such as electrical and plumb-

There's a real need," said Hugh Harsha, library board president, noting the growth in youth and others served by the hbrary "We need to reorganize it a little bit and expand in some areas'

He's pleased the library will remain open During the 1990s when the current building was under construction, a supermarket site further south on Main was temporarily used as the hbrary

"We didn't have an alternative then," Harsha said "This is much better"

The list of unacceptable items includes smoke detecals, PCBs, ammunition and fireworks and medical waste



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
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

the telephone call she'd been waiting to get for nearly three months, "Mom it's Jill'

After Jill Carroll was sent to US military facilities in Germany for a medical checkup, it was on to Boston to be reunited with her mother, father and twin sister

"We had seen her on television and talked to her several times, but to be able to touch her, to know that she was really " said Carroll "And, to there immediately see her personality she was the same old Jill, exuberant, curious The nuances of her personality were all there

Carroll said one of the first things Jill did was to cut and dye her hair at a salon that stayed open after-hours for Jill "It meant her identity, that

she was back in control of her hfe," said Carroll

The family was reunited in a private home in central Boston, where they visited, ordered Indian food and even took walks unnoticed But, to get to that point, Carroll said Jill's arrival from Logan Airport was more like something out of a spy movie

"There was the switching of cars to throw the press off," Carroll said "They drove into an underground garage and came out a different exit Jill was delivered to the house down a back alley

When she arrived, we just mobbed her," she said "There were lots of tears I don't even remember what I said to her' Carroll said Jill has been

taping her story to keep the details fresh As for why Jill was kidnapped, still no one really knows

'I think they were trying to just kidnap a foreigner, and got Jill," said Carroll "There was no physical abuse whatsoever All of it was mental abuse We have some fears about how this will affect her emotionally down the road

'During Jill's entire time in captivity, we asked journalists who knew Jill in the Middle East to speak out and establish the fact she was a journalist,"

added Carroll "If they thought she was the CIA or in the military, they would have killed her I really believe that"

Carroll said with Jill's release, it's time to focus on some of the other hostages in Iraq, some of whom haven't been seen or heard from for a vear

Carroll said Jill will most likely remain out of the limelight for awhile, and will most likely tell her story in The Christian Science Monitor In time, the family might contemplate book or movie

deals But, for now, Carroll 15 content to have a life without reporters, photographers and camera crews camping outside her home

'My head 1sn't turned by fame, and neither is Jills," Carroll said 'During this whole ordeal, I've only talked to the (newspapers) so people I care about can read and know my story That's good enough"

cations to the Birmingham Chamber of Commerce recently While Berman promised that the governor would put on a quality campaign," Mitchell had the numbers The polls show that most Michigan voters think the state is moving in the wrong direction and a large percentage have lost confidence in the governor

GOP state Chairman Saul Anuzis met with Observer & Eccentric editors and was similarly upbeat for his candidate's chances Anuzis points to Michigans grim economy and what he sees as Granholm's mability to get major players to the table He concedes the governor's charm and 'movie star looks, but thinks she's lost her early touch

As Anuzis sees it, Granholm worked well with the Republican-majority Legislature in her first two years, but hasn t been as astute in the last year Of course, you could also see it a different way The first two years, the Republican legislators were looking toward the mid-term elections They and the governor needed to show that they were working together for Michigan 'The last year, the Republicans might have been more interested in setting the table for their gubernatorial candidate, who would be even more receptive to their views

DeVos has been effectively using his Amway fortune to present a flurry of very early campaign ads showing him as a great family guy, a wonderful employer, a generous community benefactor and a businessman's businessman As with the GOP's plan to replace the Single Business Tax, details of DeVos' plans for the state are vet to come As Anuzis allowed, too many details this soon might turn away some voters

As the polls show, this Getting to Know You approach is paying off with voters

This would have seemed unthinkable a year ago At that time DeVos was a scary figure to many on this side of the state He was per

Yet, in spite of the flaring partisanship of this election year (with both a governor and U.S. senator appearing vulnerable), the state's business needs to go forward and the governor and Republican legislators need to appear above all that.

ceived as too conservative He was pictured as someone who took a large share of his business to China He was seen as a threat to public education because of his support for vouchers Democrats were gloating at the prospect

They're not gloating anymore Yet, in spite of the flaring partisanship of this election year (with both a governor and US senator appearing vulnerable), the states business needs to go forward and the governor and Republican legislators need to appear above all that This week, Granholm's office sent two press releases that put the emphasis on bipartisanship (remember, the theme from her first two years in office)

On Thursday, she signed the new state high school curriculum The governor takes credit for setting the change in motion by having Supt of Public Instruction Mike Flanagan develop the new curriculum for approval by the state Board of Education But the release ends by acknowledging that the final bills were sponsored by Republicans Sen Wayne Kuipers and Rep Brian Palmer

Later Thursday, the governor's office released a joint statement from the governor and Republican Majority Leader Ken Sikkema and Speaker of the House Craig DeRoche on an agreement to funnel \$400 million into road programs The agreement is expected to move forward mass transit projects for Grand Rapids and the Ann Arbor Detroit rail project, provide \$15 million to Travel Michigan for marketing and fund several road projects, including major work on US 131 and I-75 between Eight Mile and M-59

Announcements like these seem like old times, though such cozy relations can't last long in an election year

As for the polls, Granholm can take heart from the history of two politicians in 1948 Harry Truman and G Mennen (Soapy) Williams were down in the polls and not expected to win The Chicago Tribune famously jumped the gun election night to proclaim 'Dewey Wins and the relatively unknown Williams was running against a well-known governor and what seemed a Republican tide

We know how those contests worked out No doubt, the GOP won't take early polls too seriously



he Military Order of the Purple Heart is well-known for its collection of household discards We regularly get calls asking if we have anything for their next pickup in our neighborhood, and sometimes we do

Plymouth Township resident Roger Kehrier is hoping to expand awareness of

another Purple Heart endeavor, in which he and others bring activities to the Veterans Administration facility in Ann Arbor



ans affairs/volunteer services representative Theres a July party in the works for baseballs All-Star Game

Activities include bingo and chess or poker tournament variants for the veterans Volunteers will order pizza for the VA patients, drawing around 40 for bingo and good-sized crowds for movie nights

"We do other things across the spectrum of the hospital," said Kehrier, a Vietnam veteran who served in the Army 1965-71 and in the Army Reserves 1980-98

He appreciates the support of such groups as the Plymouth-Canton Civitans and the Lions 'The bottom line is to try to get the word out' on volunteers, who must be age 14 or older

Prospective volunteers should call Beverly Leneski at the VA, (734) 761-7995, for an appointment There will be an interview and brief written test

Last year, the Purple Heart got 26 students from Ann Arbor schools to volunteer in the summer There are scholarship opportunities as well, said Kehrier, adding the group's present in five VA hospitals and two veterans homes in Michigan





OLGC grid program irked by field-usage rate hike

The Our Lady of Good Counsel junior, football program is flagging the Plymouth-Cantón School District for unnecessary wallet-lightening in the wake of a field-usage rate increase that kicked in before the 2005 season

Plymouth-Canton Schools Superintendent Dr Jim Ryan countered that the field-usage rate hike was one of many difficult – yet necessary – policies the district has had to implement to help offset significant cuts in state funding over the past three years

Prior to last season, OLGC was charged an annual field permit fee of \$50 to use the Central Middle School football facility for Saturday home games for its eight CYO teams The fee was raised to \$62-an-

hour beginning last year, which cost the OLGC football program an additional \$2,755, according to OLGC Football Director Mike Nelson

In February, the school district sent us a letter informing us that they have the option to raise the rates as much as they deem necessary each year," said Nelson 'They try to justify the increase by saying that the Livonia School District charges its junior football teams \$80 an hour for its facilities, but Central Middle School is not comparable to the facilities they use in Livonia.

'We — along with the Canton Lions and Plymouth Steelers programs -- seed, fertilize and maintain the (Central Middle School) field We have to provide our own scoreboard, we rent a port-a-john on game days, and we use the Steelers' P.A system That's not the case in Livonia.

In the past couple of years, all three teams that use Central's field have painted the press box, repaired the lights and painted the fences at Central, to name just a few things Now, the school district is telling us that none of that matters

Ryan emphasized that the plan to raise the field-usage fees was thoroughly researched before it was implemented

I know they're frustrated over at OLGC, but we're frustrated, too," said Ryan 'Before we made the decision to charge the hourly rental fee, we looked at all the other districts in the area and what they charged for renting their fields Yes, the rates are up, but based on what surrounding districts are charging, it's not an unrealistic amount - and they still get to practice at West Middle School during the week for nothing

'All of the teams that use Central have

done a great job with the facility, but, unfortunately, we're in a position where we have to make tough decisions"

Nelson said one way to reduce the rate would be to eliminate the need for a district-paid custodial employee to be present at Central Middle School on game days

"The school district has told us they need someone there in case of an emergency, but we always make sure we have a doctor present during all of our games," Nelson said "Plus, we have 200 parents in the stands who could call 911 with their cell phones if there was an emergency' Ryan said the presence of a district

employee at the games is essential



"Last year, Bryan was off and on for us, but this year hes been on most of the time He keeps the batters off-balance and he has a good fastball, too'





Kaczmarek, meanwhile, has no soccer plans aside from the Ignition


"It's kind of neat coming back to Plymouth It'll be cool," he says

A few clicks of the mouse is all it takes for Livonia Police Detective Wade Higgason to find personal information that could lead predators to middle and high school students in any ZIP code across the country



mander 'We're here to augment the Livonia PD We want the public to know if they are a victim of a crime, that crime will be solved We work with all Oakland County departments We make presentations at detectives associations to let them know what we have'

In addition to assisting local agencies and partnering with the Drug Enforcement Agency, FBI, US Marshal Homeland Security, and Immigration and Customs Enforcement, CID investigates violent crimes including multiple murders, abduction, rape, and armed car robberies, computer crimes, public corruption, election fraud, narcotics violations, identity theft, casino gaming, organized crime, cold case homicides, and child pornography and predators A recent case involved a subject who attempted to hire a hit man to kill a Rochester Hills man

TOOLS OF THE TRADE

"We have dogs, divers, aircraft, a bomb squad,' said Inspector Ellis Stafford, assistant Division Commander, central sector

Historically Michigan State Police didn t publicize what we do, but there's rarely a large investigation going on in this area that the MPS isn't involved

"One of our most requested services, about 700 times a year, is the video clarification unit"

Detective/Sgt Bill Torley works to clarify the image of a suspect in an armed robbery for Livonia PD Stafford estimates that the average person is caught on video 12 times a day Torley used everything from betacam footage to phone cameras to investigate the brawl at The Palace in Auburn Hills, and security tapes from a Troy hotel where an attendant was murdered About \$50,000 in Avid computer forensic equipment sits on his desk in the Technical Services Unit Sometimes a suspect will try to destroy a tape but Torley says it's amazing how a small strip can still yield information

"(We'd be nowhere) without videos and tips," said Torley, who regularly testifies in court "Video is a silent witness"

Down the hall, rooms housing the Fugitive Team and Major Case Unit (formerly Organized Crime) are empty These detectives are out on the street except for Sgt Paul Dipietro The Major Case detective is dressed casually for surveillance He'd planned to do undercover work in a crap game, but instead is manning the phones The unit works on cases involving gambling, organized crime, election fraud, public corruption, liquor smuggling, and identity theft

'It's very interesting," said Dipietro 'You're



sometimes doing surveillance on one and another crime happens"

COMPUTER CRIMES

In the Computer Forensics Unit, Rebecca MacArthur 1s working on a case involving a rapist of at least three children, a homicide cold case, and child pornography After hours, she does graphic arts to relieve stress


"Its very difficult and disturbing but being a part of the conviction process and having our evidence assist in the trial process makes me feel good," said MacArthur, a computer forensic analyst 'Forensic evidence is best because it stands on its own

To the left of Thomas Kish is the hard drive he copied for a child pornography case Kish is team leader for the Computer Crimes Unit and calls the Birmingham attorney mentioned earlier a true predator Kish is going to be working with America's Most Wanted to find more of his victims Gone are the days when detectives used only pagers and voice mail to track criminals

"Today's computers have 100 to 500 gigabytes of storage so it can take a few days to just get evidence," said Kish

"In addition to computers, there are full function phones such as Blackberrys We have to keep up with technology, retrieve text messaging'

Judy Anderson displays thousands of dollars of counterfeit stamps made in Lebanon The money would have gone to pay for Medicare/Medicaid recipients' health care Since 1998, all tobacco is required to have a tax stamp affixed to the package The team visits retailers and wholesalers to look for seven security features to determine if stamps are legitimate Investigators have found that some of the money from counterfeit stamps goes back to terrorists in the Middle East Along with cigarettes, products include cigars, chewing and molasses tobacco, which is smoked with a water pipe One case netted 20,000 boxes of molasses tobacco, made in Egypt and brought from Lebanon

Countless times in countless hospitals across the United States, fragile, tiny babies are born in peril - extremely premature and with plenty of medical landmines for them and their families to wade through on the way to health

In 2004 alone, more than 500,000 were born prematurely For the preemies and their families there are unhappy results to be sure, with everything from cerebral palsy to chronic lung disease

But beacons of light are everywhere - including Livonia - that all is not hopeless in the world of prematurity Consider Livonias Katie Blacker and Elizabeth Smith both very normal and very active for having gone through so many early trials and tribulations in hospital neonatal intensive care units

now more than a decade ago

THE FIGHT REMAINS

Katie, who is a freshman at Livonia Clarenceville, is actively recruiting schoolmates to join the team for the six-mile walk at Hines Park in Westland and Plymouth on Saturday, April 29

"It's still happening to kids,' said Katie, the daughter of Laurie and David Blacker, born about 10 weeks early weighing just three pounds, 12 ounces, in January 1991 "I guess I'm really lucky because I didn't wind up with any major problems But there are kids who still are'

Born even earlier and timer was Elizabeth, who weighed one pound, 14 ounces, when she arrived at 25 weeks gestation in November 1994 After four months at William Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak she finally went home to her parents (Donna and Tim an Observer & Eccentric staff writer)

Today, Elizabeth is a fifth-grader at Randolph Elementary School in Livonia Public Schools who swims, enjoys softball, is excelling in school and participates in the Grand Tradition Martial Arts Program (Tang Soo Do) out of New Morning School on Haggerty Road in Plymouth Township There are no health problems of note and the lone reminder of her difficult first months are her glasses - while at Beaumont, she had laser surgery on her eyes to correct retinopathy of prematurity The condition is caused by extreme levels of oxygen administered to babies

in the NICU which if left unchecked can cause blindness

"I just feel good inside that I can help other babies (who are) going through the same thing that I went through, said Elizabeth about doing WalkAmerica. "Hopefully, they can live healthy lives like I am

PLENTY OF PROOF

Similarly as healthy and happy as can be 15 Katie, who along with younger brother Danny (also a preemie) were WalkAmerica ambassadors for several years Katie has no preemie-related medical concerns, carries a 3 0 gradepoint average, plays flute in the marching band and competed on the Trojans' junior varsity volleyball team

Nobody could guess the trials and tribulations both girls were faced with more than a decade ago So, in recent weeks, Katie has had to share with potential Preemie Stars recruits her old photos and stories to prove her tenuous early life

2006 graduation employment outlook



■ More than three million U S teens enter the workforce every summer and thousands of these teens are admitted to emergency rooms due to work-related injuries


Nearly 200,000 adolescents suffer injuries on the job and approximately 70 die from these injuries each year Teens have the highest rate of nonfatal work-related injuries, even though they encounter the same potential on-the-job hazards as adults

The reasons for teen work-related accidents include lack of experience, gaps in current laws and enforcement, inexperienced supervisors, working in industries that don't generally hire professionals trained in industrial hygiene and/or safety, physical limit tations due to lack of size and strength and simple lack of maturity (goofing off 'on the job)

The majority of deaths and injuries of teen workers on the job occur in retail stores and restaurants

■ Common potential hazards include automobile and machinery operation (for teens old enough for such tasks), working in highhomicide industries such as retail, working with or near electrical or hot equipment, working jobs with fall hazards and working jobs requiring manual lifting To learn more about safety


I hired a real estate agent to sell my house and I am dissatisfied with his performance. What are some reasons to fire him?

👞 ome sellers are unhappy with their Realtor The No ⁹1 complaint that sellers have is that once you hire them, they disappear on you I would certainly have a problem with a Realtor that won't return calls To me, that isn't only unprofessional, but rude You are entrusting your Realtor with what is most likely your most expensive investment, your house, the least he/she can do 1s call you back.

There is a tendency for Realtors to not communicate with you when there is little or no activity regarding your house Often, Realtors are reluctant to call you when they don t have something positive to tell you Its more fun for real estate agents to call you to tell you about an offer on your house rather than non-activity When you are not getting activity is the most important time for your Realtor to update you

If you are having no showings, you need to find out why, and correct the problem Usually, the reason these days is because houses are overpriced for the current market Even though it can be unpleasant to hear this information, if you are serious about selling your house, you need to hear it and deal with it

Realtors should also know what they are doing It's OK to hire your nephew who just got his real estate license However, its important for your nephew to have a mentor to help him through the process If your nephew doesn t know what a Seller's Disclosure Statement is or about the basics needed to get your house



sold that should cause some concern

Real estate agents must present all offers to their sellers If you find out that your real estate agent has not presented an offer to you in a timely manner that is a reason to be a little upset Realtors should tell you what their plan is to get your house sold and do what they say they will do Just like you wouldn't knowingly get on board a plane with a pilot who doesn't have a plan how to get you from point A to point B, you should be hesitant to hire a Realtor who doesn't have a detailed marketing plan how to sell your house Your real estate agent also has a responsibility to do what he/she said he/she would do

I am in no way implying that most Realtors deserve to be fired, they do not Most are hardworking professionals However, in any field you have people who aren t that great Also, keep in mind that in many cases you cannot simply fire your Realtor because of the length of the Exclusive Right To Sell Agreement The reason for this is that Realtors invest money into your house from the time you hire them They would like some time to get the job done and see a return on their investment

When I test drive a vehicle, one of the ways I evaluate it is to try to put myself in the position of the buyer the automaker might be aiming for That's why I had such fun with the Scion tC With the tC, Scion - a division of Toyota - is making a pitch for young car buyers, emphasizing features like audio upgrades, sporty looks, and a reasonable price As a (temporarily) young potential car buyer, I can tell you that the Scion tC has a lot of appeal You get a lot of car for the money, its fun to drive, and it looks cool in the driveway Wait - do we say "cool" in my (temporarily) young age group?

We'll start with how cool it looks This two-door liftback sits low enough to look sporty, but not so low that my real-life, over-40 body couldn't get in and out easily The lines are tight and the front fascia is nicely done. The tC comes with 17-inch alloy wheels, graphite finish/chrome exhaust tip, and power outside mirrors You can add a Toyota Racing Development (TRD) performance exhaust system, fog lights, rear spoiler lip, and color-keyed ground effects to the package, as well

The tC is powered by a 2 4-hter DOHC, 16-valve, four-cylinder engine with electronic throttle control and Variable Valve Timing with intelligence (VVT-1) Its rated at 160 horsepower and 163 lb -ft of torque, it does, however require premium fuel It's mated with a five-speed manual (automatic is available as an option) transmission and will give you a decent getaway Shifting is fairly easy and the clutch feels good

The ride's a little harsh, but maybe that's my over-40 body talking The front suspension is an independent MacPherson strut system with stabilizer bar, while in the rear it's a double-wishbone system with stabilizer bar There's plenty of road feel, and, combined with the optional TRD exhaust system, it's not a very quiet ride That means, of course, it's probably just perfect for its

the car is fairly easy to maneuver Four-wheel anti-lock brakes come with the tC and are very good

steering is standard and performs well,

Inside, there's a lot to like The instrument panel is well laid out and looks sharp The standard cloth seats are comfortable, but can be difficult to adjust to a good driving position Legroom is fine, but headroom is tight for tall drivers, and that's due to the power moonroof, which tall drivers will brush up against What's nice, though, is the moonroof is standard equipment on the tC, and when it's open, there's no headroom problem

The rear seats recline and there's a good amount of cargo room in the tC There's a cloth-covered storage compartment in the center console and map pockets in the doors You can add brushed stamless steel sport pedals and one of three different shift knobs (mesh, leather or "speed star" stainless steel)

Air conditioning is standard, as are power locks and windows, cruise control, rear defogger, tilt steering wheel, and keyless entry A Scion security system is a \$469 option

The audio system is actually behind a panel in the center panel, above the climate controls A touch at the bottom panel and the panel lifts up to reveal the audio system I have mixed feelings about this system The standard configuration is an AM/FM/CD system with six speakers You can upgrade to a system that will give you a six-CD changer, you can also add either XM or Sirius satellite radio, and a connector for your iPod that allows you to play and control it through the audio controls

The system also comes with something called Scion

Sound Processing This a button that allows you to choose through three pre-set equalizations - feel," which has more bass, hear,' which has more top end and bass while dropping the mid-range slightly, and 'neutral,' which allows you to set the bass and treble controls where you prefer The sound is very good, although I found one setting not to be optimum for all the kinds of music I listen to

Different songs sometimes require you to hit the SSP button a few times to get the sound you want - which could be a distraction while driving The controls on the head unit itself aren't the most intuitive, no knobs, just buttons, which you'll have to memorize quickly if you want to adjust while driving You can also adjust the color of the screen through several different colors at the touch of a button to really customize the look.

The 2006 Scion tC starts at about \$16,000, which is pretty good for the car you get Even adding the optional driver and passenger seat bolster side impact airbags, and overhead front and rear side curtain airbags (a good option to get here), the security system, the six-CD audio system, performance exhaust system, ground effects, and rear spoiler hp keeps you around \$20,000

Im not sure I d necessarily buy one – they re not aimed at people like me - I can tell you that if you're looking for something that looks cool, is fun to drive and doesn t cost a ton of money, you might want to take a look at the 2006 Scion tC

Spring fashion is in the air this month in downtown Birmingham, as close to 30 shops and boutiques take part in the area's biannual trunk show

From Thursday, April 27 through Saturday, April 29, customers will get to meet designers, talk to manufacturer representatives, request special orders, and view expanded collections of designer lines at a variety of independent merchants in downtown Birmingham

"The goal is to invite customers in to look at more merchandise or to look at special merchandise they might not normally have on hand," said Maureen Evans of the Birmingham Principal Shopping District, publicist of the event. "It's really to add some emphasis to what they already have"

The term "trunk show" refers to the trunks in which manufacturers and designers used to bring their collections, either to sell to a store or directly to customers Although modern trunk shows rarely feature actual trunks, the idea behind the events is the same

"It's to offer your clients their choice of a complete collection," said Karen Daskas, who co-owns Tender along with her sister Cheryl

The upscale boutique, which features European and American designer clothing, accessories and shoes, will host former Detroiter Peter Soronen A relative newcomer to the fashion industry, the 38-year-old designer already has attracted celebrity fans, including Sarah Jessica Parker, Reese Witherspoon and Brittany Murphy

"He is a very nice person and very accommodating We're excited to have him here," Daskas said Tender carries evening gowns, cocktail dresses, separates and suits created by the designer

Some stores will have representatives from manufacturers on site to answer questions and take special orders from chents Claymore Shop, which specializes in "updated traditional clothing," will feature Oxxford, Samuelsohn, Talia Hartz, Polo by Ralph Lauren and boys clothing manufacturer Hickey Freeman "We're focusing on all these manufac-

turers for Birmingham because it's an important trunk show," said Bob Benkert, founder and chief executive officer of the 40-year-old store The shop will offer special discounts on custom garments, and a tailor will be on hand for chents, Benkert added

Caruso Caruso, recently named one of the top 10 denim stores in the country by a menswear magazine, will have a representative on hand for a line of merchandise the store recently started carrying — Hush Puppies shoes

The store carries suede slip on and tieup shoes to pair with their wide selection of jeans

"It's all more creative denim — not what you'd find in the mall," Owner Frankie Caruso said The newly expanded store (Caruso Caruso moved and doubled its size a year and a half ago) carries jeans from more than 55 companies, with a myriad of different styles and washes It also sells sweaters, sweatshirts, T-shirts and some children's clothing

The downtown Birmingham Trunk Show began last spring, although some individual stores have been hosting their own trunk shows for years

"We thought, why not do it all at once It's an easy message to the customer and it brings more foot traffic for all the stores," Evans said. "We had a fantastic response from patrons [last year]"

The event also showcases what downtown Birmingham has to offer

"We hope it gives people a reason to come to Birmingham and support the local independent merchants," said Daskas She points out that shopping at locally owned stores helps support the community through sales taxes Local merchants are first to donate back to the community, she added

"I hope [chents] have a great time, enjoy themselves, bring their friends, and find a nice dress or suit for their next event," Daskas said.

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'Threading' removes hair old-school style

Today, women have lots of choices when it comes to getting rid of unwanted hair Yet some choose to skip the laser in favor ancient Middle Eastern technique called "threading"

Threading promises to remove hair at the root relatively painlessly, using nothing more than a single piece of thread

I had heard about threading but never quite understood how it was done, so I was excited when Nahla Shaaya offered to show me

Shaaya is owner of Nahla's Place, a beauty and fashion boutique located on Pierce Street in the former Todd's Room location Decorated with Nahla's fashion sketches, the boutique is filled with "Nahla Maher" — Shaaya's own line of clothing, makeup and skincare products, along with unique clothing and accessories for day and evening

Along with great shopping, Nahla offers makeup application and thread-ing

Shaaya learned the skill as a child growing up in Baghdad

"I would watch my mother She used to do her sister and her friends," Nahla said "I would pick up a thread and practice on my legs"

When I sat in Nahla's makeup chair, she looked carefully at my brows, then unfurled a long piece of everyday lavender thread She twisted the thread around her fingers Cat's Cradle style, then, holding one end between her teeth and the other in her hand, she worked the thread around my eyebrows As she swept it across my skin, the coils trapped hairs and pulled them out

The process removed not only visible strays, but hair too fine to pluck It can be performed on any part of the body

"This technique is from way, way back," Nahla said "Back when there were no tweezers, no scissors, women found a way to remove hair"

Nahla wrapped up my threading session by tweezing, trimming and filling my brows, and applying chamomile lotion to calm the skin

The whole thing took about 10 minutes

"Eyebrows are so important They frame the face When they're shaped and clean they make a whole difference Trust me," Nahla said. "I'm the queen of eyebrows '

Tweezing Tips

Natural, manicured brows never go out of style To find the best shape for your face, determine the "eye space" The space between the brows should be equal or slightly smaller than the width of the eye Take a brow pencil parallel to the side of the nose. The inner edge of the brow should align with the bridge of the nose. Do this on both sides, it should keep you from tweezing too severely between the brows. Next is the arch. To find the high point of the arch, hold the pencil parallel to the outside corner of the iris. For length, hold the pencil diagonally from the nostril, following the outside corner of the eye to the temple, basically a 45-degree angle

Tweezing mistakes

Too close If the brow hairs meet about the nose, you'll have the appearance of one long brow, which can make the face look tired and sad.

Too far apart This creates an unbalanced look, and your nose appears wider and eyes smaller.

Arched too high This makes you look surprised or angry

Bushy brows This makes you look unkempt and unpolished It also can make you look older.

When Heidi Scheer learned her son. Gannon, 5, had autism, she immediately went on the Internet and learned as much as she could about the developmental disability that typically involves delays and impairment in social skills, language and behavior

The Commerce Township woman was impressed by The Autism Research Institute in California, which promotes Defeat Autism Now!, offering an alternative approach to treatments

The mother of three children, Gannon, Carson, 6 and Ella, 2, immediately took the family off products that had gluten and saw improvements in Gannon a few weeks later

Scheer is the reigning Mrs Michigan International and has promoted the importance of autism awareness as her pageant platform. She also convinced Gov Jennifer Granholm to proclaim April 5 as Autism Intervention Day PINK spoke with Scheer about autism and the issues she faced as a mother of an autistic child

How did you first learn Gannon was autistic?

It was brought to our attention by a speech pathologist when he was four



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

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all, it's kind of horrifying to hear the word autism. They said he was showing autistic characteristics

What did you do?

I basically spent the weekend research-

ing autism and the different types and the whole spectrum I found out that having a gluten sensitivity was a large issue My sister-in-law. who is 30, was just diagnosed with a gluten sensitivity I put him on the (gluten free) diet. You have to follow it 100 percent. We did it as a family Anything with wheat, oats, rye or barley in it I took out of the house I was told I had

to give it at least three months After three

weeks we saw dramatic results His vocabulary went from 50 to 80 words to about 350 words We were very impressed

How do you handle his diagnosis?

We have a biomedical approach looking at his diet and ordering blood tests and urine tests and finding out what his body can't tolerate, whether it's gluten or casein They crave what they're having trouble with. They don't have an enzyme to break down the gluten, which is the protein

the dairy protein There's a chemical that goes to the brain that affects them like an opium and makes them not have a clear head, they're spacey, lethargic and frustrated We also have him on a regimen of supplements, some homeopathy and

herbs

Do doctors support your methods?

Most pediatricians don't know about the DAN[†] program. It is alternative It's not modern medicine It's definitely seeking out other ways to heal the body naturally, but more and more doctors are getting on board

What's your advice for others who have a child with autism or suspect there is a problem? There are so many people out

there who are searching for answers They may not have ever gotten a diagnosis, but they know something is not quite right Or, they have a diagnosis and they don't know about the biomedical approach There's so many kids out there who can get some improvements

Each child is different with their characteristics and classifications They will all react and respond differently with treatments And the parents have no idea and

What does the future hold?

I tell people we are in the process of recovering I can't say if it will ever go away 100 percent I've seen kids who have become 100 percent recovered Next year we're going to put him in a regular kindergarten class He's got four years of catching up to do with emotions and relationships

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
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
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
