Bird students take cultural journey

If someone had said "Jamba!" to Bird Elementary School fifth-grader Drew Smiley before Thursday, he wouldn't have known how to respond.

Now, Drew knows the proper retort: "Hello!"

It's one of the many things Drew and his fellow Bird students learned Thursday from author and storyteller Jacqueline Galloway-Blake, who conducted a storyteller assembly on Black History Month at the school Thursday afternoon.

Blake used musical instruments, storytelling, authentic ethnic artifacts, singing, visual aids and a ton of audience participation to take students on a 600year journey through African-American history and culture.

"She was wonderful," Bird Principal Susan Kelty said of Galloway-Blake. "It was rich in African history, children's literature and historical facts."

It was rich in fact partly because Galloway-Blake has a pretty rich history herself. Her great-grandfather was a slave. At 15, she marked with Dr. Martin Luther King in the March on Washington, and heard King's "I Have A Dream" speech.

When civil rights legend Rosa Parks died in October 2005, Galloway-Blake was a flower bearer at her funeral. And when Americans elected their first African-American president in November, she was invited to Barack Obama's inauguration.

With that kind of history, it's no surprise Galloway-Blake's resentation drew ra administrators, teachers and students. Kelty said by Friday morning she'd already received several thank-you notes from students, including one from Drew Smiley.

"I thought the way she asked for so many volunteers was cool because we got to participate

in the show," Drew said. "Even though I already knew a lot of the information, it was a fun way to

"I also learned some interesting new facts ... like 'Jamba' means hello," he added. "That will be a fun way for me to greet my fam-

Galloway-Blake, who has done hundreds of presentations to schools and libraries around the area, approached Kelty last month with the idea of doing an assembly in conjunction with King's birthday, but an assembly couldn't be worked into the school's schedule.

Kelty said she wanted to take lvantage of Galloway-Bla availability, and the pair coordinated a Black History Month assembly, instead.

"I think it's important for our children to understand all cultures," Kelty said. "They need to value all people, of all races and colors and religions."

Hearing delayed; township, union look at arbitration

A Thursday hearing on an unfair labor practice charge against Plymouth Township was postponed as township and union officials looked for a faster way to resolve the dispute.

At issue is the Board of Trustees' decision in December to cut the work weeks of seven full-time employees to 30 hours a week, which meant they lost benefits such as health insurance.

The American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees

local that represents the seven, as well as 20 other mostly clerical township workers, contended the move violated the contract with the township because the jobs are defined in the contract as full-time

The decision came three weeks before local members voted on whether to continue with AFSCME, join the administrative section of the Police Officers Association of Michigan, or do without union representation. Having such disruption so close to such an election could

have tainted it, union members say. **Township Supervisor Richard**

Reaume said the cuts were made because of budget concerns and that the board was within its rights to make them.

AFSCME lawyer Robert Fetter said Friday that the union and township officials were going over the language of an agreement that would scrap the planned unfair labor practice hearing with the Michigan **Employment Relations Commission** in favor of binding arbitration, which

could take place late next month. "I think we're very close" to an agreement, Fetter said Friday after-

Under the proposal, the results

of the Jan. 8 vote by local members on representation, which have been sealed because of the dispute, would be opened, Fetter said. The MERC process could drag on for months, he said, but the union's chief concern is the job status of the workers whose hours were cut and the fact that their benefits were eliminated.

If a deal is not reached, a MERC hearing that was rescheduled for Tuesday would take place, Fetter

said. Township officials could not be reached late Friday.



Neighbors wary of firm's expansion plans

Plans by a Plymouth Township business to enlarge its Wilcox Road headquarters have raised concerns among some residential neighbors.

Herriman & Associates
Inc., a condominium management firm, is planning
a two-story addition to its
building on Wilcox near
Schoolcraft Road, next to
the Lake Pointe subdivision. Site plans show a
single-story office layout of
nearly 4,000 square feet; a
company spokeswoman said
the second floor would be
reserved for possible future
expansion.

Some nearby residents fear the addition would mean a more intense use of the property that would hurt their quality of life. Some complain that commercial trucks and vans are now being stored on the site, which, they say, is prohibited under the current office services zoning.

"This is like a truck stop here in a residential area," said Sonia Mayer, who lives on Shadywood, behind the Herriman property. Township planning consultant McKenna Associates, in a report to the Planning Commission, also questioned the vehicle storage.

"I'm very concerned about the Herriman property ... and the affect it has on our neighborhood," said another resident, Dorothy Davenport.

Township public services director Jim Anulewicz said the Planning Commission will address residents' concerns when it meets Wednesday on the site plan. The meeting begins at 7 p.m. at the township hall.

"They will look at this hard and long, and if they think there are potential impacts in some negative manner, they will make sure those are addressed," Anulewicz said. Mayer and others complain they weren't formally notified of Herriman's plans, but Anulewicz said no notification of neighbors is required for a site-plan review. Only in the cases of a zoning change or a specialuse petition are notifications required, he said.

Herriman spokeswoman Beverly Ellis said the planned additions intended to add a conference room, more office space and barrier-free restrooms. The company plans to hire one or two new associates this year, she said.

Ellis said Herriman is reviewing township regulations related to vehicle stor-

for the American Cancer Society Relay for Life. "It's for all types of cancer.


"Now more than ever people need help," Flora said. "One of the best ways to feel good about yourself is to give."

Although costs have increased by almost 6 percent, the schools decided not to pass that increase on to students' families.



Ficano accentuates the positive in State of the County

Wayne County may be at the center of the United States' economic woes, but on Thursday County Executive Robert Ficano chose to accentuate the positive in his seventh annual State of the County address, including touting several development projects for western Wayne County.

"I am determined to lead the county through tough times," Ficano told an overflow invited audience at the Village Theater at Cherry Hill in Canton Township. "Our assets far outweigh our challenges. We have a diverse county that looks like the rest of the world. We have a skilled workforce, first-class universities, an international border, a world-class airport and a resolve to succeed."

Ficano hit on some themes he has been promoting for years including the development of an "aerotropolis" around the two Wayne County airports, expanding business contacts with China and promoting a more diverse economic base. He also touted his administration's cost-cutting efforts that have included downsizing the size of the executive branch, which he said has 1,500 fewer employees than during the previous administration.

He was pointedly critical of Sheriff Warren Evans for suing the administration over budget cuts.

But the heart of the speech was the announcement of several economic initiatives:

Center will be built in Plymouth Township on property formerly occupied by Pfizer. The Innovation Center is being developed by Dr. Roger Newton, a former Pfizer executive and co-founder of the drug Lipitor. Ficano said the county is partnering with Washtenaw County, the state, Ann Arbor SPARK and others to develop the center.

will be created at Wayne State
University's Tech Town. The

based state legislation that allows embryonic stem cell research. Ficano said the center will be the first of its kind in Michigan.

"We are creating a new biotechnology industry that will attract new companies, new jobs and alliances with researchers around the world," he said.

The county is working with AT&T to build a fiber optic infrastructure to connect key business hubs throughout the region, including the airport development areas.

ing this year, which Ficano said would save the county millions of dollars in rent. The county purchased the historic skyscraper for \$14 million.

Ficano took note of the county's hard economic situation, including a county government deficit that could reach \$100 billion.

"Unprecedented cuts in the auto industry and a struggling economy have ravaged this region," he said. "Many of you have lost jobs. Some of you have lost your homes. All of you, in some way, have been

affected by the pain."

As an example, Ficano introduced Jacqueline Madden of Redford Township. Madden, a single mother with a teenage son, had lost her job at Ford Motor Co. and was facing fore-closure on her house. Ficano said county foreclosure counselors were able to work out a short-term reduced payment program to help give Madden time to renegotiate her mortgage and stay in her home.

Ficano touted the county's Mortgage Foreclosure Prevention Program as a "national model" that has helped more than 600 county residents resolve their mortgage problems.

But it was Ficano's upbeat assessment that seemed to draw the best response, including loud applause when he said that groundwork be broken this year on the controversial expansion of Cobo Hall.

"It's always good in these economic times to have something that's uplifting," said Richard Reaume, Plymouth Township supervisor. "It makes you proud when you think about what's going on in the county. We have to believe in ourselves and the future."



Changes ahead for estate inheritance taxes

Dear Rick: If the steppedup basis for inherited assets is canceled in 2010, do you anticipate its reinstatement in 2011?

Yes. The stepped-up basis will be back in 2011, although the estate tax exemption will be much lower than it is today. The

important to explain what is happening with **Money Matters** estate tax laws. Presently, there **Rick Bloom** is a \$2.5 million exemption for

That means upon your death, the first \$2.5 million — above and beyond money going to a charity and/or a spouse — in assets is estate tax free. Remember it is not the beneficiaries who are subject to the estate tax, rather, the estate

itself. Basically, upon death your assets are valued at fair market value. After deductions for charitable contributions and/or what a spouse inherits, the first \$2.5 million is estate tax free. Then and only then does the estate pay federal estate taxes.

Over the last several years, the exemption amount has grown dramatically. It wasn't too long ago that the exemption was only \$600,000. The problem arises because of quirks in the estate tax law. In 2010, there will be no estate taxes. Basically, if someone passes away in 2010 their estate is not subject to any estate tax. However, in 2011 the law reverts back to an older version of the estate tax law and the exemption drops to \$1 million. The other quirk in this law deals with stepped-up basis.

When someone inherits money from an estate, that money is not subject to estate taxes. In addition, the beneficiary receives what is known as a stepped-up basis in the assets that they are inheriting.

For example, if you inherited ABC Stock and at the time of inheritance the stock was selling for \$10 a share but the decedent had only paid two dollars a share, your cost basis would be \$10 a share. That means if you sell stock for \$11 a share, only one dollar is subject to income tax.

If you inherit money in 2010, you receive a transfer-cost basis as opposed to a stepped-up basis. In the example above, if you sold the stock for \$11 a share your transfer cost basis is only two dollars a share, thus you would pay taxes on \$9 per share. The quirk in the law only deals with 2010. In 2011, the stepped-up basis rules are reinstituted.

What makes this issue a little more complex is there probably will be some estate tax reform this year that will have an impact on 2010 and beyond. We don't know what the changes will be and when they will take effect.

When it comes to estate planning, many believe it's necessary if you have a large estate. Although reducing and

eliminating estate tax is one goal of planning, it is only one factor. As far as I am concerned, every adult needs some sort of estate planning.

Estate planning also deals with how to handle family emergencies when you are alive. I believe the more you keep judges, courts and lawyers out of family affairs, the easier life is. The Medical Durable Power of Attorney and Michigan Patient Advocate Form, which is a free medical durable power of attorney, is available at public libraries or download one at www.bloomassetmanagement.

"Everybody brings their dog and walks," said Kern. "Friends and family donate pledges for the walk. There's doggie entertainment and doggie games, a contest for the best dog trick. a bone and biscuit hunt, bobbing for weenies, a pet psychic, sponsors with tables and lots of giveaways."

A raffle offers prizes including \$1,000 and four tickets to see the University of Michigan football team play rival Ohio State.

"Last year, we raised \$130,000. We're trying to raise \$140,000 this year," said Kern. "The money goes to our general operating fund. We did 2,029 low cost spay and neuters last year and are building a new facility. It will increase dog space by almost half, cats almost triple. We're an open admissions shelter. It doesn't matter what kind of animal it is. We have a 72 percent save rate. We aspire to do the best for every animal."



Marching for life

Local youth join together to stop abortion

Curtis Schuelke is only 15 but he's already fired up about abortion. As a young person he's not alone. High school and college students made up at least half of the hundreds of thousands of pro-life marchers in Washington, D.C., Jan. 22.

Schuelke was one of the teens from St. Michael the Archangel Catholic Church who took part in the event. Youth groups from St. Michael in Livonia and St. Gerald Catholic Church in Farmington joined together to travel to the 36th annual March for Life that marks the anniversary of Roe vs. Wade, the U.S. Supreme Court decision which in 1973 gave women the right to choose. They recently spoke about the trip that left St. Gerald with every bus seat filled.

"Abortion isn't really talked about," said Schuelke, a 10thgrade student at University of Detroit Jesuit High School. "We need to start publicizing what abortion is. The march is one of the ways to do it.'

Patrick Cummings not only demonstrates annually in Washington, but is out on the streets every Saturday morning counseling women on their way in to abortion clinics. The Westland man is one of the Guadalupe Partners, a nonprofit organization that will present a Life Fair on March 1 along with St. Michael's Gospel of Life Committee, which sponsored their youth group at the march. The March 1 event is an opportunity to learn about right-to-life activism in the community. In

addition to sidewalk counseling, **Guadalupe Partners supports** mothers emotionally and materially by delivering food and furniture and helping them get assistance, a GED or job training.

"Guadalupe Partners tries to support them to have their children," said Cummings. "The first time a mom decides not to go in you know you've saved a life. It changes you forever. More people would be against abortion if they knew the truth about how far the baby was along."

TEEN ACTIVISTS

The sea of young people attending the march gave Cummings hope for the future. It was his 16-year-old daughter, Alex Cummings, who enlightened Mike Shesterkin, her best friend's father, about abortion and the belief that life begins at conception. The Livonia man even voted against Barack Obama after he learned about his pro-choice stand.

"It was important to be counted among the many who were there," said Shesterkin,





Figure 1. The second of the se

Steps lead to research, education, advocacy

When Laura Bertalan's 58year-old mother died from lung cancer in 2007, she felt she had to do something. She

packed up and came home to Troy leaving her job as part of the producing team for The Ellen DeGeneris Show in Los Angeles.

Along with being closer to her family Bertalan wanted to work to prevent lung disease and promote lung health. At 10 a.m. Sunday, March 8, she'll be one of hundreds climbing 70 floors of steps at the Detroit Marriot tower of the Renaissance Center to raise funds for the American Lung Association of Michigan (ALAM) where she became marketing director in April. She's taking on the challenging 1,035 steps in honor of her mother Georgena Bertalan.

"I just felt I had to take action," said Bertalan, 32. "She was coughing and asthmatic and would have to go to the ER. They did a scan and found lesions. They tried radiation then chemotherapy, but it was stage 4. It was very aggressive. She died in three months."

Georgena was not a smoker but inhaled second-hand smoke that's why it's important for Bertalan to support ALAM's work in research, education and advocacy. ALAM is part of a campaign for smoke-free air. The national ALA grades each state on the quality of air in its State of Tobacco Control Report. Michigan received an F in

"All of the money stays in Michigan for research on lung cancer, COPD, asthma education in schools and for adults, and the campaign in Lansing," said Bertalan. "Mom was a bowler, You can't go to a bowling alley without breathing in second hand smoke.'

Many of the climbers have family members who died from lung disease. Rick Braun lost his grandmother to COPD weeks before the first climb three years ago. He trains by running up almost 200 stairs in Bloomer Park near his Rochester home.


"We'd be out and she had to sit down and catch her breath." said Braun. "One of the hardest parts is watching. You are so powerless. I'd hate for anybody to have to go through

that and to watch people go through that if I can help. Even though I'm not a scientist I can do something just to get the word out, I'm a runner, It's perfect for others who like to run and compete. I'm trying to talk to as many people as possible, work my network of runners and those who are active.'

Patty Brehler won't be running up the stairs this year. She'll have to walk because of her asthma. The manner in which she reaches the top doesn't matter though. For years Brehler was able to compete in long distance bicycle races, stair climbs and running marathons until being diagnosed with asthma. Maybe someday research will make it possible for medication to completely control the respiratory disease.

"People are put off by maybe how hard it can be but if you approach it as for a good cause and a fun day," said Brehler, 52. "If you train I think anybody can do it if you pace yourself and take a little break. I'm trying to get permission to walk up with the Leader Dog puppy I'm raising."

Brehler is still looking for climbers to join her team,

Participants without a plan can visit climbdetroit.org for a program designed by a personal trainer who's completed the climb. Jessica Jimenez thinks it's a great way to keep a new year's resolution to get in shape. Last year 521 people participated in the climb that attracts ages 12 to 80. About 400 have signed up so far. The cost to register is \$50 until March 4 plus \$100 to participate. Registration closes March 6,

"A lot of people do walks. This is a little bit more of a challenge," said Jimenez, ALAM development manager. "It's for people who do very

little exercising to those who do marathons. It depends on how intense you make it. You can do all 70 floors or 40. Propelling your body up 70 sets of stairs is a much more intense workout than cycling or running. It's a timed event and takes 12 to 24 minutes to finish. There's a post climb celebration in the GM Wintergarden where visitors can come for \$5 for food and beverages to congratulate participants."

G8 Is Flagship Of Pontiac's GXP Performance Series

For years Pontiac's tagline was that it is General Motors' Performance Division, though in recent years its vehicles haven't lived up to the claim.

That started to change last year when the 2008 Pontiac G8 sedan hit showrooms. It gained instant popularity for its rear-wheel-drive dynamics.

The 361 horsepower GT version was particularly well-received for those with the belief, "The more power the better.'

But for all of its praise, some wanted more power. And they found it elsewhere in its domestic rear-wheel drive competitors, the Dodge Charger and the Chrysler 300.

Now with the 402 horsepower 2009 G8 GXP, Pontiac can truly tout its performance lineage again. Pontiac has dropped the 2008 Corvette's 6.2-

liter LS3 V8 engine into the G8 GXP to give it the oomph it needs.

This upgrade gives the G8 GXP a 0-60 mph time of 4.7 seconds. To harness all of that power will be a choice of a

six-speed automatic transmission or a Tremec six-

speed manual transmission. The latter will likely be available on the GT model eventually. We expect fuel economy ratings of a little less

than last year's GT's number of 15 miles per gallon in the city and 24 mpg on the highway. At around \$35,000 this car is notably cheaper than

its direct competition the Dodge Charger SRT-8 that starts at about \$40,000.

A limited-slip differential is standard on the GXP, as is an aggressively tuned independent suspension developed at the Nürburgring racetrack in Germany.

The fully adjustable suspension consists of MacPherson struts up front and a four-link independent system on the rear, while a variableratio rack-and-pinion steering assembly keeps the G8 GXP tracking straight on its 19-inch 245/40 summer performance tires.

Not much differentiates the GXP from the regular G8 on the outside. Exterior changes include more aggressive front and rear fascias and the same 19inch polished and machined aluminum wheels that last year's GT version got.

Pontiac interiors have received criticism in recent years for being bland. But the company changed that with the 2008 Pontiac G8's interior and went one step further with the GXP's.

Available in black or red and black, the GXP's leather-trimmed interior features GXP badges embroidered on the high bolstered seats. The center stack is imbued with Pontiac's traditional, racecarinspired red lighting.

The GXP's cabin is functional as well. There's ample leg and shoulder room front and back. The rear seats don't fold down, though there is a ski pass-through. The trunk offers a capable 17.5 cubic feet of storage space.

Besides the upgraded hardware, the 2009 Pontiac G8 GXP provides buyers with anti-lock brakes, traction and stability control systems, six airbags, XM satellite radio and OnStar telematics.

For those looking for less power, but the same rearwheel drive performance of the G8, Pontiac didn't

stop at the GXP. A sport truck of the G8 will be available for the 2010 model year.

It's no surprise that Pontiac will produce another offshoot of the G8. It is doing what any other carmaker would do with a successful model - make tons of variations of it in hopes of selling more units.

However, Pontiac only gets half-credit for the G8. It is based on GM's global Zeta platform, which was developed by its Australian subsidiary, Holden, for that company's Commodore sedan. The same platform also underpins the 2009 Chevrolet Camaro.


The Commodore and the G8 are virtually twins under the sheet metal, although the Pontiac benefits from meaner exterior styling that hints at the brand's performance-oriented nature.

With the G8 GXP, Pontiac has done what it has promised for years. It has taken the driving experience of its performance series to a new level.


