

Firefighters, township spar over transport

As Plymouth and Plymouth Township officials look at ways to contain the cost of firefighting and emergency medical services, Plymouth Community Fire Department firefighters say they can bring in additional revenue by transporting more patients on medical runs.

Fire Lt. Rick Tefend, president of the International Association of Firefighters local that represents PCFD firefighters, said transporting patients to local hospitals 100 percent of the time could mean \$550,000 to \$750,000 a year, or more, in transport fees.

Township officials, however, question those numbers. The fire department, with a budget of about \$4 million a year, provides services for the township and the city of Plymouth and is managed by the township, which finances some 75 percent of its budget, with input from city officials.

Fire department paramedics currently transport patients in about 10 to 15 percent of medical runs. The private Huron Valley Ambulance transports the majority of patients, and bills for that service, even when fire department paramedics are first to arrive on a scene and provide care. Of some 2,677 medical runs last year, 1,738 patients were transported to a hospital by either HVA or the fire department, Reaume said.

T've got a perfect, guaranteed plan for them," Tefend said. On the lower end of his estimate, the new revenue would pay for five firefighters; on the higher end, it would pay for

seven, Tefend said. "They're basically just giving that money to HVA. We've gone to them many times and said we'll transport," he said. Tefend said more patient transports would require addi-

Plymouth post offices not on list to close

As the U.S. Postal Service considers closing postal stations, including 15 in the Detroit area, in order to deal with a budget crunch, the two stations that serve the Plymouth area are not on that list. "Nothing at this moment in

Plymouth is slated for consolidation," said Ed Moore, a Postal Service spokesman for the Detroit

That was good news for visitors to Plymouth's downtown station on Penniman Friday afternoon.

"This post office gives wonderful service, it's convenient and it's historic," said Bob Hess of Plymouth, who added that during some weeks he's at the station every day. "To close it would" mean disrespecting Carl Pursell, the late Congressman from the Plymouth area for whom the station is named, Hess said.

"I'd rather bring (mail) to the local branch than put it in a drop box," said Jill Arella of Plymouth Township. She agreed the downtown station is convenient, "except for the parking."

The Plymouth area's main post office is on Clipper Street, just west of Beck Road and south of Five Mile. Plymouth Township Clerk Joe Bridgman said the branch is sensitive to the township's needs, especially when it comes to absentee

ballots at election time. "The Plymouth post office bends over backwards for us to make sure they get our ballots mailed out in a timely manner (and) make sure they get them back in a timely manner," Bridgman said. "They have been just overwhelmingly supportive of us when it comes to election time."

The branch even goes so far as to collect incoming absentee ballots on election days, Bridgman said, and hold them for his office to pick up that evening. Absent that, Bridgman said, such ballots would be delivered to the township the day after the election, too late to be counted.

"That's probably above and beyond what most post offices do,"

Among the post offices that could be closed or consolidated into others are the branch in the city of Wayne and the station inside Westland Mall, according to a press release from Moore's office. Customers of those branches are being asked to fill out questionnaires in order to help postal officials make their decisions.

Moore said the Postal Service ended the most recent quarter with a \$2.4 billion operating loss, and could see a loss of \$7 billion for its fiscal year.



tional personnel; he estimated five or six paramedics would have to be added to the current force of 25.

But he proposed transporting 100 percent of the time for one year with the current staffing level, then putting half of the additional revenue toward new hires.

"Our membership is behind transporting. ... We want to do it for the citizens and we're willing to do it," Tefend said.

Township Supervisor
Richard Reaume, however,
said the best estimate for 100percent patient transporting
is about \$400,000 a year. The
township currently brings in
not quite \$100,000 yearly for
the transports the department
does perform, Reaume said.

"I don't know where they're thinking they're going to get \$500,000 to \$700,000," Reaume said. "There's no guar-

For the patient transports it does make, the department charges \$325 for a basic life support run and \$575 for an advanced life support run. The bills are typically paid for by insurers or by Medicare; Reaume said the amount of uncollectable ambulance fees would go up along with the number of transports.

By comparison, in Canton Township, which does all patient transports on medical runs, the revenue is about \$1.1 million a year, Reaume said. But Canton's population of 85,000 is more than twice that served by the PCFD, and Canton has I-275 running through it as well as a busy stretch of Ford Road. (Plymouth Township has stretches of I-275 and M-14 running through it, Reaume acknowledged, and many medical runs are to those freeways.)

Reaume said more patient transports would mean paramedics would be out of the community for longer periods. "We're keeping more firefighters and paramedics in the community," he said.

In addition to personnel costs, Reaume said, the revenue from more transports would also be offset by added fuel costs and equipment wear and tear.

Fire Chief Mark Wendel said he's a fan of having department paramedics do patient transports, and would not be opposed to doing all transports. But he agreed there could be additional

"If it's going to cost me more money, where's the savings? Where's the benefit?" Wendel said.

Wendel suggested that if elected officials want to go that route, they could have the department do all transports for a year with current personnel, then use that experience as a way of determining personnel needs for a possible permanent expanded transport program.

"The bottom line is determining the level of service the elected officials want to provide," Wendel said.

Foundation helps students with the cost of college

College is an expensive proposition, and Fernanda Pereira of Canton knows it's not getting any cheaper.

That's why she was so happy when officials of the Canton Community Foundation announced its annual list of scholarship winners. Pereira, a 2009 graduate of Canton High School, won a \$2,000 scholarship sponsored by Yazaki North America, Inc.

"It adds up - buying storage bins for your room, whatever - it all adds up," said Pereira, who will study chemical engineering at Western Michigan University. "I just received a letter saying the costs are increasing this year because of the economy. (The scholarship) is going to help out a lot.'

Pereira is one of 23 students of all ages and all hopes and dreams to earn more than \$20,000 in scholarships handed out by the CCF. She found out about it naturally enough from a notice placed on the school's bulletin board used for just such a purpose.

Her scholarship could actually be worth \$8,000 it's renewable for four years if she keeps her grade point average up (she was a 3.96 student at Canton High School). It would give her a good start on her career -

when she decides on one. "That's why I like chemical engineering, it's very broad," Pereira said. "You can go into nutrition, pharmacy, alternative energy you can do all kinds o things with a degree like that. And I don't know what I want to do yet, so I didn't want to be locked

Rabbits rescued: Shelter hops to find homes for bunnies

David Brown of Ann Arbor loves rabbits. He also likes to give back to the community.

So, when he met Jill Pernicano and Dominique Moroz, founders of the Plymouth-based Midwest Rabbit Rescue, back in 2005, he discovered a way he could do both.

Now, Brown is a member of the shelter's board of directors and volunteers on a nearly daily basis for MRR, the nonprofit dedicated to rescuing and adopting out at-risk rab-

"I don't know where it comes from, but I've always loved animals, and in particular rabbits," said Brown, the retired CEO of Kaiser Optical Systems. "I love rabbits, and I love contributing to the group. I like volunteering with small groups who can really make a difference.'

MRR isn't the biggest operation in the world. It operates on a budget of \$50,000 a year, raised from private donations and fund-raisers, and depends on staffing from some 80 volunteers, including a core group of about 25.

The shelter currently houses about 100 rabbits, with others in foster care. The mission, according to board member and uber-volunteer Lisa Powell, is simple.

"We want to bring in rabbits that need homes," said Powell, who has volunteered 2-3 hours a day for the shelter since losing her job as a corporate attorney. "We want to educate people about adoption versus buying a rabbit from a pet store.

Officials at MRR believe rabbits are the third-most popular household pet, after dogs and cats and not counting fish. According to Brown, studies show there are some 5.5 million pet rabbits in the U.S.

MRR depends on volunteers like Brown and Powell, who acknowledges she "knows every rabbit" in the place. Powell, who has been volunteering for MRR for just over a year, said her husband found the shelter after she got laid off at work.

Powell, who already owned rabbit, said she dove right in And she's not the only one; she estimates volunteers turn in some 1,100 hours a month.

"I needed a project, so I jumped in headfirst," Powell said. "I really think our core group is as dedicated as any group of people I've been around. They're excitement pushes me.

MRR workers think the public knows little about rabbits, particularly as pets. For instance, Powell said, rabbits are "easily litter trained," and are very social animals, which is why they recommend adopting them in pairs.

They get a lot of companionship together," she said. "I started with one, and I had to get him a buddy.

MRR benefitted from a fund-raiser at a local comedy club last month, and has scheduled a charity poker fund-raiser starting Friday at


"It's a way to reach beyond our usual support," Brown said of the charity poker gig. "These events usually have their own followers.'

The shelter appears to be working. Brown said MRR has adopted out some 750 rabbits over the last four years. That's happy news to the board and to the shelter's volunteers.

"It's really gratifying when a rabbit gets a home," Brown said. "Most of the rabbits in here would have died. It really is a second chance."


Summit closes for annual maintenance

Watch out for Project 100 to give away 50th \$100 bill on Monday

When given \$100, a Detroit woman used some of it to buy canned good for Gleaner's Community Food Bank.

A man named Larry, given \$100 while doing yard work, gave it to his neighbor, who was just coming home from the hospital.

These are some of the inspiring stories witnessed by Project 100 in the last few weeks.

The new, Livonia-based non-profit organization's sole purpose is to encourage the positive aspects of giving and community participation by giving away \$100 bills.

"It's inspiring," said Adriane Schulte of Project 100. "We have stories on our Web site." Project 100 is giving away its 50th \$100 dollar bill on Monday, Aug. 10.

Reaching the 50th recipient marks the halfway point of Project 100's mission to give out 100 dollars to 100 people over 100 days, in an effort to encourage giving back in our communities.

"Monday's the big day and our 50th recipient is going to be in for a real treat," said Jeremy Cybulski, Project 100 spokesperson. "In addition to receiving \$100, we're going to throw in an extra \$50 and a couple of other surprises to celebrate the occasion."

The organization has not yet been to the Farmington area; communities are randomly selected. Schulte said that they won't know which community they will be going to until Monday.

"Right now it's completely random," she said. "We are told the day of the giveaway what community we will be visiting. If someone is outside, we approach them."

In September, she said, money will be given to those who have signed up on the Web site.

Over the last month, Project 100 has given away \$4,900 in communities throughout Southeast Michigan.

"We're encouraging everyone in the community to visit our Web site, www.whatisproject100.com, where they can sign up to potentially receive a visit from the Project 100 team," said Cybulski. "While they're there, they should also check out the rest of the site as it is a great source of information on how people can get involved in their community."

Insurance: Buy what suits your situation

Q: Dear Rick: I am a single mom with two children ages 7 and 9. I need to buy life insurance to protect the kids if I am not around. I've talked to my homeowner's insurance agent who has recommended a type of whole life insurance. My parents recommended a term life policy. My insurance agent said that the downside of term insurance is that it gets very expensive down the road. Considering the ages of my children,

how should I proceed? with your parents and

recommend term insurance for you. As far **Money Matters** as I am concerned, for the Rick Bloom great majority of people, term is the best type of insurance

A: I agree

available. There are a number of reasons why I like term insurance better than whole life or other types of insurance. First, term insurance is relatively straightforward and simple and it's much easier to receive competitive bids. The only issues are how much insurance you want, how long and do you want the

return of premium option. In whole life or other types of permanent insurance, there are a variety of issues and the policies are much more complex and difficult to understand. In addition, it is hard to compare whole life or permanent types of insurance policies because of the different variables.

One reason I am a big fan of term insurance is because most people do not need insurance for their entire lives. You need insurance while your two children are still on your payroll. Once your children are independent and on their own, you no longer need insurance. With term insurance you are able to buy insurance for a fixed period of time. When you buy a whole life, universal life or some of the other permanent type of policy, you are paying a much higher price because you have coverage for your entire life. My view is: Why pay for something you do

The most important reason I ke term insurance is vou can cover your insurance needs at a fraction of the cost of a whole life policy.

Whole life insurance is sold more than term insurance because there are greater commissions on whole life.

Term insurance is straightforward, simple to understand and offers few options. These are 1) the length of time that you want to be insured -5 years, 10 years, 20 years or 30 years; 2) the amount of insurance that vou need 3) whether you want a return of premium option.

The return of premium option works like this. If you hold the policy and pay the premiums to the end of term, you receive all your premiums back.

This sounds like a can't-lose situation. Either you collect on the insurance if you pass on during the term of the policy or at the end of the policy you get your money back. It sounds great. However, the reality is

somewhat different. Selecting a return-of-premium option increases your premium. It becomes a forced savings vehicle. In addition, on many of these policies if you cancel the policy before the end of term

you receive nothing back. I am not a fan of the returnof-premium option. My philosophy is insurance is not an investment. It is a matter of risk management and there are much better investment vehicles than an insurance policy. Therefore, in the majority of cases I do not recommend a return-of-premium option.

Life insurance is important when it comes to personal financial planning. If you do need life insurance, the key is to buy what suits your situation. Shop around for competitive bids and don't get caught up with aggressive sales people.

A good insurance agent, and there are many out there, is one who doesn't worry about commissions, but rather whose goal is to match you with the correct policy. Good luck!





Livonia's future: battery technology

Michigan has turned a new page in its industrial history, and the city of Livonia may be a part of a chapter yet to be written on battery technology.

Vice President Joe Biden announced Wednesday that \$1.35 billion in federal grants will be awarded to 12 projects in Michigan to support advanced battery and electric vehicle manufacturing and development.

Gov. Jennifer Granholm visited A123 Systems in Livonia Thursday to highlight that company's \$249.1 million grant from the Department of Energy at the site of what will be the company's new regional headquarters and production facility.

The grant will help A123 develop a strategy for constructing lithium ion battery manufacturing facilities in the United States with the first construction location in Livonia. Under the grant's terms, A123 will be required to match the funds over time as they are spent. Grant funding comes from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act's electric drive vehicle battery and component manufacturing initiative.

A123 will be located at 39000 Seven Mile, just west of I-275. Company officials would not comment Thursday on specific plans for the build-

A123 officials said the manufacturing system is expected to be U.S.-based with research and development, manufacturing of the company's proprietary Nanophosphate cathode powder, electrode coating, cell fabrication, module fabrication and so on through the final assembly of complete battery pack systems for vehicle integration.

David Vieau, A123 Systems president and chief executive officer, said battery development will reduce the dependency on foreign oil and lead to cleaner air. "We hope to be a big part of that," he said.

The grants were necessary

to help with capital investment tunity was a "game-changer," in factories, he said.

With the recession, the cash was tightening up," Vieau said. "Battery factories require a lot of cash." The grants allow companies to fulfill commitments, he said.

A123 was born out of the research labs of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and was funded initially with a \$100,000 grant from the Department of Energy in 2001. The company says it has raised more than \$350 million in private capital from investors, including GE. The company will make lithium-ion batteries for Chrysler.

The press conference gave A123 officials a chance to thank state, county and local officials for the grants and tax incentives to A123, and allowed state, county and city officials a chance to thank A123 for locating in Livonia and facilities in Brownstown Township and Romulus.

Granholm thanked A123 for choosing Michigan. More than half of the federal grant money was going to Michigan, she said. That level of opporshe said.

With this seismic shift, we want people to understand how significant this is for Livonia," Granholm said. Statewide the grant's projects are estimated to create 6,800 jobs in the next 18 months and up to 40,000 jobs by 2020. A123 is expected to create 300 new jobs by 2011 in Livonia and another 500 more at a later date.

Earlier this year Granholm signed into law legislation providing refundable tax credits to encourage companies to develop and manufacture advanced batteries. In April, the Michigan Economic Growth Authority approved \$400 million in refundable advanced battery tax credits for A123 Systems and three other companies.

"We worked and cooperated in a bipartisan way," said Sen. Glenn Anderson, D-Westland, who also represents Livonia, referring to the tax credits granted to battery companies.

"This investment represents exactly how federal, state and local officials can come

together to support local businesses and move toward diversifying and reenergizing Michigan's economy," Anderson said.

Senate Majority Leader Mike Bishop called it "great day for Michigan."

County Executive Robert Ficano said A123 was a company working in a developing economy in a traditional industry of automobiles. "You could have chosen any place in the world, but you chose Wayne County and Livonia," Ficano said, referring to the Watertown, Mass.-based company. A123 is currently manufacturing in Asia, but will bring 90 percent of its operations to the U.S. next year, Vieau said.

State Rep. John Walsh, R-Livonia, admitted it was difficult to vote for tax incentives for companies while cutting the budget.

"We're competing with other locations," Walsh said. "Investors and companies are going to be looking at taxes, and we need an active MEDC (Michigan Economic Development Corporation) to

compete with other states for locating their business. These companies can go anywhere, and they do. It's a bottom-line decision."

Mayor Jack Kirksey, a onetime school principal, called it an outstanding lesson from a civics textbook of all levels of government working together on an issue. Kirksey cited his city's work on local tax breaks in discussions with Maria Thompson, general manager of A123's governmental solutions group, along with Turkia Mullin, director of Wayne County's Economic Development, who helped the city lobby to get A123 to come to Livonia, and the Michigan **Economic Development** Authority, which approved the state's tax credits.

"There's a lot of competition with other venues, and to get (A123) here, we are absolutely delighted," Kirksey said.



Joseph Dube doesn't hand out any easy grades when it comes to assessing his performance recently in the junior



Michigan Rams' manager savors Johnstown trip

The 6-hour car ride to the All-American Amateur Baseball Association Tournament in Johnstown, Pa. never gets old for Michigan Rams manager Rick Berryman.

Representing the Livonia Collegiate Baseball League, the 20-and-under Rams will open the 16-team, double-elimination tournament Monday following the draw on Sunday.

This will be Berryman's eighth trip to the hills of western Pennsylvania and the site of the historic flood.

Teams from Johnstown, Altoona (Pa.), Zanesville (Ohio), Brooklyn (N.Y.), Buffalo (N.Y.), Columbus (Ohio), Elk County (Pa.), Lansing, New Orleans (La.), Schenectady (N.Y.) Washington (D.C.), Youngstown (Ohio), Toledo (Ohio), New Brunswick (N.J.) and Philadelphia (Pa.) will join the Livonia-based Rams at the tournament.

And for the Rams manager, the novelty never wears off.

"Johnstown is a very historic and one of the unique tourneys," said Berryman, who also doubles as the baseball coach at Livonia Stevenson High School. "It's been going since the 1940s. It's a small town and the whole town gets into it. And if you draw that first (Monday) night game at Point Stadium, you'll see 8,000 or 9,000 fans. There's the parade and the fireworks - against the backdrop of the mountains - it's what makes it unique.

"The other thing that makes it special for the teams is that they pay for your housing and two meals per day, which most tournaments don't do."

Berryman's squad finished runner-up with a 22-10 record in the wooden-bat LCBL to the 22and-under Michigan Bulls, who posted a league-best 26-6 mark.

The Rams, 23-13 overall, will start left-hander Tom Hansen in Monday's AAABA opener.

After a stellar season at Madonna University where he went 8-2 with a 3.52 earned run average, Hansen continued his strong mound work this summer with the Rams going 6-2 with an 0.46 ERA with 40 strikeouts.

"He was a late addition and he's been the biggest surprise," Berryman said of the Rochester Adams grad. "He's not a large man (5 feet, 11 inches, 158 pounds), but he's thrown wonderfully all year. He's got a good fastball, a great changeup and a great curveball. And he just gets people out."

Berryman said that Wayne State's Brady Cooper, who is 2-2 with an 0.88 ERA with 38 K's, will most likely get the call to start on Tuesday.

"He's another guy under a 1.00 ERA and the won-loss record doesn't reflect how well he's pitched," Berryman said.

Meanwhile, the offense starts with lead-off batter Aaron Cieslak, a Dearborn Divine Child High grad who has signed with Oakland University after playing this spring at Kellogg Community College.

The center fielder leads the Rams with a .388 batting average and sports a team-best .500 on base percentage. He also leads the Rams with 41 hits and is second in RBI with 22 only behind teammate Jason Forster, an infielder from Spring Arbor College who has 28 (while batting .366).

"Aaron came out hitting from the first game and has been hitting all year," Berryman said. "He's had no slumps and he's a tremendous center fielder, especially at (Livonia's) Ford Field because he's been worth so many outs."



That could all change after a week in Kalamazoo as Dube looks to make the grade.



Jump-start the school year with reading, routines

The start of school's still a ways off, but local educators have some common sense advice for parents on getting young kids off to a good start.

Jan Blumberg, principal of Henry Ruff Elementary in the Garden City district, says parents can begin developing a routine for September now. They can start gradually with earlier bedtimes and evening rituals.

Morning wakeup times also should be earlier. Children need time for a good breakfast, as well as grooming, and should be able to pick clothes independently. Children need comfortable, washable clothes, layered and clearly labeled with the child's name.

Blumberg, a Canton resident, suggests talking about school, perhaps with a countdown calendar. Kids need time to voice hopes, dreams and fears about school.

Walking the school route now is a good idea, especially for kindergartners, and parents can drive the school route now "so that it becomes a comfortable part of normal routine," Blumberg said.

Parents can talk about expectations and beliefs. Parents who didn't have positive school experiences should "think before they speak and talk about how important it (education) is."

Children should understand appropriate behavior and expectations, such as the need to wait and use "manner words" like please and thank you. It's good to work on reading, writing and math in the summer, and public library resources and good Web sites will help.

A good idea is a journal or album of the child's summer, with writing and artwork, Blumberg said.



he gentleman called the radio show and informed me that his 20-year-old side by side refrigerator was no longer cooling at all. It was kitchen temperature inside the product and he wondered if he should just junk it and go out and purchase a new one.

After asking a few questions I directed the man to pull the refrigerator out away from the wall and remove the cardboard cover on the lower back portion of the refrigerator. He did so and informed me that the compressor was hot to the touch. He noticed that the fan blade on the cooling

refrigerator. Now it was a simple matter of changing the fan motor. Not a difficult job for any homeowner, he removed the three screws that hold the motor into a bracket

and replaced it himself. The old motor had a dry bearing and would only work some of the time. The compressor overheated and stopped cooling.

Another person called and said the jam on the top shelf in the refrigerator was warm and so was the rest of the refrigerator section. I asked him to open the door and press in on the light switch button to see if the light goes out. It didn't and so the light stayed on while the refrigerator was operating. The person replaced the light switch and solved the problem themselves.

Speaking of light switches

I've read where there is a problem with a certain model of LG refrigerators. The light switch is failing and causing the plastic covers to melt and create smoke inside the refrigerator. They are using two 60-watt light bulbs which will cause any plastic piece to possibly catch fire. I expect we will hear more on this problem as soon as it has been reported to the Product Safety Commission.

The major appliances of today are still made with many of the basic concepts incorporated many years ago. Yes, there is a ton of electronics designed to make appliances more energy efficient than ever before and these have proven to be very expensive repair tabs for consumers needing service. Even so, I still maintain that the do-ityourselfer can do many of the repairs necessary when the need arises. Many times all a homeowner needs is a little direction on how to take the product apart and the rest is common sense. The problem is sometimes finding a place to call or a service technician who will take the time to explain what has to be done in order to save the expense of a service call. This has always been an age-old problem. The manufacturers may direct you to a toll-free number which allows you to speak to someone in a far off land. The conversation sometimes turns out to be far-out and you're more irritated than before you

A few months ago my son Mark decided to open his own business in appliance repair and do what I spent years teaching him. Located in Livonia, he is doing quite well and I am receiving compliments from his customers and thankfully no complaints. any sports played, said David, a former second-grade teacher.

"It's always a good idea to let children know what your expectations are ahead," said David, a 14-year veteran of teaching, mostly at Grant. Routines help children feel more secure, she said.

David recommends sticking to the school supply list and avoiding unnecessary purchases. There are sales now for supplies, and kids will need such basics as crayons, markers and pencils. "The moderation thing applies," she said, adding some items are available at garage sales.

Younger kids need help with homework, so parents can sit with them to boost confidence. Parents can check over work of older kids, circling problem areas or adding a question mark to give a hint.

"Sometimes they speed through it and they think nobody's going to notice," she said of checking homework.

OPEN A BOOK

"Children should be reading every single night," said David, a view echoed by Blumberg. Parents can read to young children, reminding them of left to right and beginning to end. "The pleasure reading is most important," she added, noting fourth-graders typically read

30 minutes of pleasure reading a night.

Parents may tire of a certain

book, but children benefit from rereading. "Sometimes you comprehend new things," the Livonia teacher said. "It helps build your confidence level."

David was just back from a Wayne RESA conference and excited about the new school year. "It's always a good school year," she said. "It always turns out that way. It's what we make of it."

Also excited is Laura Beckman, principal of Jefferson-Barns Elementary in the Wayne-Westland district. "Routines are the key to success," agreed Beckman, who lives in the Wayne-Westland district part of Canton.

Beckman cites bedtimes, evening routines and having the child's backpack and lunch ready "so students come to school rested and ready to learn."

TURN OFF TV

The Westland principal recommends a well-lit homework area with needed supplies. Getting into the routine of doing homework and reading each night will help.

"That will make the biggest difference, especially with the early learners," Beckman said.

"Turn the TV off," she added of nightly reading time. She

does that herself as a mom. Beckman likes to post the school newsletter on the fridge to help keep organized.

She urges parents to meet the teacher early and keep lines of communication open. Open houses are a great meet and greet, and a chance to learn homework procedures.

You can meet the teacher at another time if you have a work conflict, she added.


"It's going to be a great school year. I'm looking forward to it," Beckman said.

The educators agree teachers need to know about family issues like a divorce or major illness at home. A family death will be shared with classmates as appropriate, David said, noting children will be encouraged to show sympathy to the grieving child.

Blumberg finds there's some sense of entitlement and an assumption of "My child is perfect" among some parents. She said parents "have to come in with an open mind," and have the ability to sit back and listen.

David urges parents to maintain a positive attitude toward learning and not to badmouth a teacher. If there's a problem, parents should talk to the teacher first and not the child.

"We're the adults, they're the children," David said. "You can talk it out" by being honest and forthright, she said. "Communication is really important."

Here's the buzz on Killer Cicada Wasps

Sphecius speciosus is here. They're building homes right under your nose — at the edge of your lawn, near your favorite park, along your daily walking route.

They're skimming the ground, flying through the air, poised to paralyze and kill. But don't worry. These

winged invaders aren't intent on harming you.

They've got it out for summer cicadas.

'They'll fly around shrubs and trees and lawns looking for cicada. I think 'Cicada Killer Wasp' gives them a bad name. They're not really aggressive toward humans," said Brian Wilson, Livonia superintendent of public ser-

Still, that's what the scarylooking insect, with its yellow-lined black body, reddish-colored head, and yellow wings is commonly called. The two-inch long wasp also has been dubbed "Sand Hornet"

and "Giant Ground Hornet" or "Giant Cicada Killer."

Cicadas are those beetlelike bugs that live in trees and make loud creaking sounds on summer nights.

Wilson said his department has received calls from residents wondering what to do about the sandy-looking, ant hill-like nests and big, buzzing insects.

"We've been advising them that they are not aggressive and that it's not a situation like yellow jackets or hornets," Wilson said. "I did a little battle with bald-faced hornets who are extremely aggressive. If you come near their nest they'll come after you."

But simply walking near Cicada Killer Wasp nests isn't likely to stir up any stinging action. The males don't sting and the females are busy hunting for cicadas, which they sting and stockpile at home.

"Now, if you decide to take a shovel to their nest, it may be a different story. They're not aggressive toward humans unless you want to make them

aggressive," he said, adding 'We don't typically spray for the ones we encounter on city property."

He said that although there have been more inquiries about the insects this year, the bugs will be gone by the end of September. They generally appear in mid-July and live through summer, depositing eggs in August before they

Wilson suspects the coolerthan-usual temperatures in June and July postponed their arrival this year and likely will lengthen their stay into next month.

An over-the-counter insecticide will kill them, but good lawn care may be the best method to control Killer Cicada Wasps. They generally settle in dry, sparse, sandy areas. Allowing bare spots and dry, brown areas to spread in a parched lawn is like putting out a welcome mat for these insects.

"If you have more of a lush type of lawn, they're not going to pick on it," Wilson noted.





Go back to school healthy Walks raise donations, With the start of school just around the cor-

ner, Deepa Pai, M.D., a physician in Family Medicine at Henry Ford Medical Center - Canton, talks about the importance of backto-school physicals.

Q - How often do children need a complete physical?

A - At least once a year, a health care provider needs to examine the child and touch base with the parents. The beginning of the school year is a good time for this. Students who will be participating in athletic programs need sports physicals.

Q - Aside from examining the child, what else is included in a physical?

A - I am going to be looking at ageappropriate development, activity levels, nutrition, safety and check that immunizations are up to date. A good family history from the parents is important, as any significant family history can indicate if a child is in a high-risk group for a future condition. In that case, further screening may be needed.

The annual physical is a good time to review any prescriptions. Although most children do not take medications regularly, those with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), diabetes, or asthma need to have their medications adjusted periodically.

Q - Don't children with asthma have some restrictions on their activities?

A - I don't recommend restricting their activities, as long as the asthma is under

However, it's important for coaches to be informed about medical concerns, so they will know what to watch for in students on their teams. A doctor may need to consider whether the child should be using rescue medications (bronchodilators) prior to activities.

Q - Do you talk to families about healthy eating?

A - Yes, nutrition concerns are becoming increasingly important. Working parents don't always have time for cooking healthy meals, but they are in charge of what foods are available in the home for children to select. The alternative is that the next generation of children will be obese and at high-risk of heart disease. I'm seeing more teenagers with elevated blood pressure and diabetes, and they are taking medications at a younger age than in previous years. This definitely tells us the next generation is



going to have more advanced cardiovascular

Q - Even kids have full schedules. What about getting enough rest?

A - Eight to 12 hours of sleep a night is recommended for children. I always emphasize a good bedtime routine. Proper rest helps to keep metabolism at an optimum level.

Q - Is there anything parents need to bring to their child's physical?

A - Bring your child's current immunization records, medications the child is taking, any test results from other doctors, medical issues, and your questions. It's a good idea to write down your questions in advance, so you will remember to discuss them with the doctor.

Q - So parents and doctors are equal partners in their children's health care?

A – Parents need to take an active part in their children's health care. The doctor only gets about 20 minutes with the child. Parents have the best effect on their children's health and can always ask their health care provider for advice. That's the way it should be.

Arnage Is Big, Bold, Big-ticketed Bentley

The stalwart Arnage sedan is the classic choice for old-school buyers of Bentleys, even wheels, badging and entertainment systems. though it has ceased production.

However, the nearly decade-old platform age shows, especially when you hop from the T and into the Continental GT.

The Arnage last received a major update for 2005, when Bentley re-engineered each model from bumper to bumper. But there have been enough customizations and technological upgrades to keep it current.

The Arnage comes in three trims: the \$221,990 Arnage R, the Arnage T and the Arnage RL. The Arnage R has 18-inch wheels, xenon headlights, power front seats with fourposition driver memory, reclining rear seats, tri-zone climate control, DVD navigation, Bluetooth, and front and rear parking sensors.

The \$250,000 Arnage T gets a sport-tuned suspension, seven-spoke, 19-inch alloy wheels and front fog lights. But more importantly, the Arnage T has 50 horsepower edge over the R.

The stretched \$270,000 Arnage RL is more like a limousine than a sedan, featuring a 10inch wheelbase extension. So it's no surprise most RLs are likely to be chauffeur-driven. The RL also includes a bottle cooler in the center rear armrest, as well as a rear backup

Buyers can further separate their Arnage by choosing from 40 factory body colors or specify a two-tone combination.

To ensure special attention to each customer, Bentley also offers plenty of customization options for colors, materials,

For years nearly all Arnages have been built to order. Bentley's Mulliner coachwork division processes just about any request, and the options list is so comprehensive that few duplicate cars are produced.

There are eight different wood veneers, including Vavona Burl derived from the sequoia tree. Whatever your choice, it takes two weeks to prepare the wood and several more days to apply the five coats of lacquer. The remaining pieces do not go into other cars but are placed in a giant humidor so the wood will match perfectly if repairs need to be

For the interior trim you can choose from among 27 colors of premium leather hide, with 16 secondary hides to complement the main color scheme. It takes 17 hides of the softest, unblemished leather to complete a standard Arnage interior.

Your choice of colors for seat belts, carpets and lamb's wool rugs will further enhance the ambiance of your Arnage interior.

Steering wheels are double-stitched by hand using one continuous piece of thread. Far too complicated to be done by a machine, this hand-stitching process takes as many as fifteen hours to create one steering wheel. Every machinist who creates a finished piece of upholstery signs it on the back with his or

An optional "Flying B" emblem —



which Bentley discontinued this model year, offers a 500horsepower T trim level. Not only are Arnages fast, but they are also highly customizable with no two quite the same.

Bentley's iconic symbol — can sit above the grille, and it's retractable.

Safety is provided by stocking every Arnage with side and head airbags for front and rear passengers, anti-lock brakes, traction control, stability control, front and rear parking sensors and a tire-pressure monitor.

A couple of technological innovations also accompany the Arnage's high price tag. The outside mirrors feature electrochromatic glass to reduce night glare and can fold in electronically when required. And the driver's seat automatically moves rearward to ease entry and exit, and both sides of the rear seat also move.

A performance upgrade was added in 2007 by way of the new six-speed ZF transmission. With three driving modes, it transforms the Arnage into a sharply responsive sport sedan. It drives smoothly when in full automatic mode. Switch into sport mode and the transmission holds the gears a bit longer for better acceleration and a quicker downshift response. Select the manual mode by using steering wheel-mounted paddles or the chrome-and-leather shift lever to shift the gears manually.

For increased performance, the suspension has adjustable shock absorbers that can be set to provide a ride that's stiff and sporty or

cushy and comfortable.

All Arnages use Bentley's nearly 50-yearold 6.8-liter V8. By working with a new sixspeed automatic transmission, the Arnage T's engine kicks out 500 horsepower, which rockets it to 60 mph in 5.2 seconds.

The Arnage R and RL's engines are good for 450 horsepower.

The main downside of the Arnage is its bad fuel economy, but that's expected from a three-ton ball of steel. It only gets 11 miles per gallon in the city and 16 mpg on the highway.

There's no doubt that the stately Arnage is built for those who can afford its \$200K-plus sticker. That said, if you can't get over its bad fuel economy stats, you probably don't fall into that category.
