Sheldon rezoning vote postponed

A request to rezone a warehouse property on Sheldon, under heavy criticism from residential neighbors and those who say a shopping plaza there would threaten downtown Plymouth, was postponed at Wednesday's Plymouth Planning Commission meeting.

Grand/Sakwa Properties, which owns retail centers in Canton and Northville townships and other neighboring communities, says

it will revise its rezoning petition for the 36 acres on Sheldon near the CSX Railroad tracks, where a warehouse of more than 500,000 square feet now sits. The revised bid will be offered at the planners' next meeting, on Wednesday, March 14.

Grand/Sakwa, which is in negotiations to buy the property, is seeking a change in zoning from light industrial to a general business category that would allow for retail, medical, office and a variety of other uses. The building, built in the 1950s as a facility for the former Western Electric, is only partially used.

The developer hasn't specified tenants, but has talked about a regional shopping plaza of 200,000 to 300,000 square feet.

However, residents of the nearby New England Village subdivision, and some in Plymouth Township, which is adjacent to the site, have objected to the rezoning, saying a shopping center could bring crime and noise and light pollution and dangerously increase Sheldon Road traffic. Those who fear more retail space


would sap downtown businesses are also against the project.

Gary Sakwa, a partner in the development company, outlined in a recent letter to planners a list of conditions he said Grand/ Sakwa was willing to impose on own petition as an effort to allay opponents' fears.

No Walmart

Those included a pledge to not locate a Walmart or a Sam's Club on the site, nor a automobile

Book decision in committee's hands

The fate of Graham Swift's 1983 prize-winning novel "Waterland" is in the hands of a complaint review committee after a nearly threehour meeting Wednesday to determine its appropriateness for use in Plymouth-Canton's Advanced Placement English curriculum.

After listening to the com-

plaint from Matt and Barb Dame of Canton and the response from AP English teachers Brian Read and Gretchen Miller, and taking written comments from some of the several dozen people in attendance, the committee repaired to closed session to debate the book's merits.

The committee will meet again Monday, in a private session, to continue the debate. A decision could come as early

as next week.

"This is not typically a public process," said director of secondary education Erin Mac-Gregor, who is facilitating the committee. "Because of the high public interest, we wanted to make sure this part was public."

Similar complaint

It's the second committee to meet in less than a month over

Big Boy closing, Kroger to expand

It's closing time at the Big Boy res taurant in Plymouth Township.

Today is the last day for the Big Boy, a fixture on Ann Arbor Road just west of Sheldon for more than 30 years. The building will reportedly be razed to make way for an expansion of the neighboring Kroger supermarket and an additional commercial space.

Owner Imad Hakkani could not be reached on Friday, but the closing was confirmed by day manag er Mike Elewa and a waitress. The closing had been rumored for several months.

The development follows the approval in December, by the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees, of an amendment to a 1998 consent judgment between the township and the owners of the Plymouth Square Plaza at Sheldon and Ann Arbor Road. But Hakkani said at the time the Big Boy was not for sale.

The amendment will allow several planned changes at the plaza: the addition of 15,550 square feet to the north side of Kroger, the building of 10,850 more square feet in an attached building, and the addition of a Kroger-brand gas station at the northeast corner of the plaza, where a vacant bank building now sits.

In addition to the Big Boy and the bank, plans on file with the township call for razing a third building at the plaza, one that houses four businesses, including Plymouth Beauty Supply and the Pagoda Inn restaurant.

Locals largely positive on Snyder's budget

Legislators representing the Plymouth-Canton area were largely positive after Gov. Rick Snyder released his fiscal 2013 budget Thursday.

Lining up along party lines, Republican state Rep. Kurt Heise, R-Plymouth Township, and state Sen. Patrick Colbeck, R-Canton, reacted positively to Snyder's presentation. Democrat state Rep. Dian Slavens was more critical, saying Snyder should have done more for education.

Snyder was determined to make sure the first surplus of his administration would not be the last. He issued funding increases in small doses for education, cities and roads, while giving a 16-percent boost to the Michigan State Police as he prepares a major policy address on public safety in March.

Snyder stressed a pay-as-yougo approach in which state funds increasingly are allocated to programs based on performance.

After major changes last year in tax policy - including elimination of the Michigan Business Tax, increased income taxes on public and private pensions and elimination of large numbers of tax credits - Snyder's 2013 budget contained no new tax cuts or increases. The governor also introduced no significant changes to state government's structure or programs.

The 2013 budget recommends \$8.62 billion in general fund spending, up 3.1 percent from \$8.36 billion this year. The total budget, including federal and other funds, is up 2.4 percent, to \$48.2 billion.

"I think this is a very sound budget. We are living within

our means, it's a balanced budget, doesn't tweak the tax code at all," Heise said. "It provides more money for K-12, which I like. I wish it were more, but at least it's not being cut any more."

Snyder's plan doesn't increase the per-pupil foundation grant at all, although districts will have to pay less into the teacher retirement system because the state will pay more. Any additional K-12 funding will come through the following of "best practices" and other incentives. Plymouth-Canton earned an extra \$100 per student last year following such practices.

Slavens criticized the budget for not doing more to help local school districts.

"I am disappointed that the proposed budget only includes a tiny restoration of last year's devastating education funding

cuts," Slavens said. "The damage that last year's budget had on our public schools cannot be restored with per-pupil foundational funding staying the same as last year. Our children's education was presented in charts and dollar signs, but what the majority fails to understand is that our children's future is priceless and the foundation for moving our state forward."

Colbeck likes the incentiveladen budget plan, calling it "100 percent in line with my proposed transparency legislation" he said encourages consolidation of services and places emphasis on providing quality services while holding down costs through best practices.

"I'm very appreciate of the governor's focus on service-oriented government," Colbeck said. "The incentives the governor proposed will encourage

adoption of these best practices. With regard to school funding, the foundation allowance will be same as last year. However, there will be an additional 2.5 percent available for schools in return for performance. Michigan is 21st in our per-pupil funding, but in the mid- to high-30s in regard to performance. We need to do better for our kids."

While Heise was OK with Snyder's incentive plan, he's concerned about the continued use of Proposal A funding for community colleges and universities.

"I still don't understand the use of Prop A K-12 money going toward community colleges and universities," Heise said. "It isn't as bad as last year, but it's something I still think we need to get away from that."



an AP English book. Late last month, a similar committee recommended Toni Morrison's Pulitzer Prize-winning "Beloved" remain in the curriculum. The complaint against that book was also brought by the Dames.

Their complaints were largely two-fold: That the books weren't vetted properly and that content in both was inappropriate for high school students, even those in AP classes. "Waterland" deals with issues of teenage sex and abortion and contains two passages the Dames found objectionable.

Dame said the vetting process wasn't followed because the books weren't approved by the Board of Education. He played videotape of Jeremy Hughes, the district's superintendent, saving at a recent board meeting the books were never approved by the board.

'This isn't just my opinion that it was never vetted," Dame said. "It's fact.'

But Read countered by saying "Waterland" was not a textbook, but an instruction resource like many other books being taught throughout all curriculums, not just

AP English. Forcing the board to read every book in the curriculum would be "unwieldy," Read said.

Literary merit

The Dames took turns discussing the objectionable passages, one that features a teacher recounting a sexual encounter with a girl when both were 15 years old, and another a graphic depiction of the abortion the girl had to end the resulting pregnancy.

"There is no literary merit to this book," Barb Dame said. "It's not on the AP (test) list. I don't see any reason to have it in the class. I wondered as I read it what the relevance was to an English class.'

Read extolled the virtues of both "Waterland" and "Beloved" as books that dovetail with each

other to teach students how to think critically.

"('Waterland') is a wonderful piece of literature," Read said. "It may not be to everyone's taste, but claiming it's pornography is absolutely incorrect."

That was in response to a comparison made by Dame between "Waterland" and Playboy magazine, which he pointed out features articles with brilliant writing about people like Martin Luther King, Jimmy Carter, Steve Jobs and others.

But Read said the comparison was unfair.

"It's obvious what the first purpose of Playboy is ... it's sexual arousal," Read said. "The idea ("Waterland") is about sexual things is just inaccurate."

Changes coming

Another part of the complaint was the contention by the Dames parents aren't warned fully enough about the content of the books in the class.

'Teachers know these books, they know what's there," Barb Dame said. "Parents aren't going to find that out before it's too late."

Both Read and Miller conceded a more specific warning would be helpful, and said such a disclosure would be developed before next school vear.

Read also said "Waterland" will not be returned to the classroom this year due to the length of time it's been out. Hughes removed it in mid-December.

"There just isn't time," Read said. "We're moving on."

Fuel flagged

The catalytic converter was cut from a Chevrolet Cavalier as the car sat outside an apartment on Ann Arbor Road in the township late last month.

The victim told police she discovered the theft on Jan. 30, after seeing her car's muffler sitting next to the Cavalier in the apartment parking lot. She drove the Cavalier to a muffler shop for repairs, she said, and the repairman told her the catalytic converter had also been cut off.

Catalytic converters are typically stolen for the valuable metals inside.

Kids see Black History through artists' eyes

It was hard to tell who was having more fun, master drummer Kevin Collins or the fifth-grade students he was entertaining at Canton's Village Theater at Cherry Hill Tuesday.

Collins, a musician for more than 40 years, was one of a trio of performers brought in to help Plymouth-Canton Community Schools fifth-graders to see African-American history through the eyes of artists in a field trip to the Village Theater.

It was part of a four-day excursion that saw students from all 16 of Plymouth-Canton's elementary schools take part in the interactive assembly.

While folk musician Matt Watroba and fellow musician Robert Jones, also a pastor, used their talent to demonstrate how music from different cultures have blended to create the American experience, it was Collins who had feet stomping and students clapping at the end of

each session.

"You have different cultures, and we're all on this Earth together," Collins said. "A lot of times, kids go and watch things. When they take part (in the process), you're getting them involved. They love that hands-on aspect, and it's really the best way to learn."

The venue was also an integral part of the effectiveness of the presentation. The 400-seat theater allowed four classes of students to get the message at once.

"It's not (learning from) a book, it's not in a classroom," said Jill Engel, director of the Partnership for the
Arts and Humanities, one of
the sponsors of the program.
"There are probably lots of
kids who've never been to a
theater before. It's a fabulous experience."

While Collins used a variety of drums and a bell to demonstrate how messages were sent and how music was used throughout history, Watroba and Jones continued an act they first put together in the late 1980s, one

they take around to schools around the state and the country to show how music has crossed cultural and chronological borders to help unite cultures.

Their musical trip took them from the beginnings of slavery through the civil rights movement and showed them how music was used to help slaves escape in the underground railroad, and how non-violent protesters used it to move their agenda in the 1960s.

When they first came up with the program, Jones — a blues musician — and folk musician Watroba noticed similarities in their music. They bring those similarities out during the program, showing how the same three chords and the same five notes can be found at the base of music ranging from slavery songs in the 1800s to music used by followers of Dr. Martin Luther King.

While the program was heavily influenced by music, Jones, who is also an artist, took some time to show how pictures can be used, with

their varying shades and colors, to tell a story, too.

"We are all influenced in one way or another by culture, by history," Jones said. "That's what we have in common."

Watroba noted music throughout the years helped foster an environment where his best friend — Jones — can be an African-American, something not possible decades ago.

"In our lifetime, a black man and a white man singing up here together would have been against the law," Watroba noted. "So when I celebrate Black History Month, it's because now I can have my best friend based on his character, and not on the color of his skin."

The students left impressed.

"Ît was fun listening to all the drums," said Charlotte Bruscato, a Miller Elementary fifth-grader. "I learned all people are equal, no matter what their race is.."

Canton academy honored for math programming

Canton Charter Academy is among 23 Michigan charter schools honored as "Academic State Champions" for their excellence in the classroom, earning recognition for everything from outstanding MEAP scores to high graduation rates. There are currently 255 charter schools in Michigan, educating about 115,000 students.

The honors were announced by Bridge Magazine, an online publication of the Center for Michigan, a non-partisan "think-and-do tank" created to help craft an agenda to move Michigan forward.

This is the first time that Academic State Champions have been crowned in Michigan. Bridge Magazine evaluated every charter school in the state based on their 2010-11 performance in eight academic areas: graduation rate; college readiness; fourth-grade math, writing and reading; and eighth-grade math, science and reading. The schools were also broken up into two socio-economic groups (based on the percentage of students qualifying for free or reduced lunches).


Canton Charter Academy, a K-8 school with 734 students, was honored for its eighth-grade math program.

The award came as something of a surprise to Canton Charter Academy staffers, who hadn't realized anyone was rating such performance.

"We were honored when we got the phone call and had the opportunity to talk about our practice," said Cathy Henkenberns, Canton Charter Academy's principal. "It was exciting for our staff to talk about what we do with our kids. It really comes down to our team approach with everything we do in the building around teaching and learning."

Dan Quisenberry, president of the Michigan Association of Public School Academies, the state charter school association, called the recognition an "outstanding honor and well-deserved recognition."

"It's wonderful that Bridge Magazine came up with the Academic State Championship program, because it shines a spotlight on the quality education that students are receiving at charter schools throughout the state," Quisenberry said. "I'm sure that the parents at each of these schools are thankful they had the choice of sending their children there."

dealership, nor any business that could be construed as adult entertainment. MDOT rolls out I-275 fix plans

Michigan Department of Transportation officials have rolled out an estimated \$36.8 million in bridge and road projects along the I-275 corridor that appear certain to frustrate motorists in Canton, Livonia, Plymouth and Van Buren townships, Westland and Romulus.

State and local officials say certain road closures, sometimes for months, are likely to snarl traffic and test the collective patience of western Wayne County drivers. But, they say the yearlong effort is intended to boost safety, reduce roadway congestion and improve deteriorating bridges and roads.

"We will try to minimize the frustration,' Gorette Yung, MDOT development engineer, said Thursday evening as state officials shared project details with local leaders and residents during an informal gath-

ering inside Canton's Summit on the Park ballroom.

The projects involve work on 34 bridges along the I-275 corridor from Hannan to Six Mile, a resurfacing of the inter-

state between Ford and Ecorse roads and adding a right-turn lane on westbound Michigan Avenue at northbound Haggerty to accommodate increased traffic near the Canton-based Michi-

gan Institute of Aviation Technology.

Bridge closing

Yung confirmed closings of 12-16 weeks for the Warren Road bridge that crosses I-275, 10-12 weeks where Plymouth Road crosses the interstate and several-week shutdowns where Hannan, Palmer, Cherry Hill, Joy, Ann Arbor Trail and Tyler roads cross I-275.

Yung said other areas actually on I-275 will involve lane closings, though traffic should be maintained where the interstate crosses Van Born, Michigan Avenue, Ford Road, Koppernick, Ann Arbor Road, Six Mile and Hines.

Local officials worry that some road closings will dump more traffic on already-clogged Ford Road near I-275 — an area where Canton officials continue to lobby for still-elusive interchange

improvements to ease bottlenecks.

"It will put a lot of additional pressure on Ford Road," Canton Municipal Services Director Tim Faas said. "That's the reality of it, but what can you do?'

Nonetheless, Faas and others welcomed news of area bridge and road improvements.

"We're certainly glad the repairs are being completed on the bridges," Canton Engineering Services Manager Bill Serchak said, "and we're glad for the rehabilitation projects."

Long year

He, too, voiced concerns about road detours and shutdowns that are certain to make for a long construction year along the I-275 corridor.

Yung said the projects reflect MDOT's effort to maintain bridges and roads before repairs become more costly. State officials couldn't

provide a precise schedule of when the projects will happen.

Work crews will complete 34 bridge projects such as resurfacing decks and approaches, replacing rails and deck joints, painting beams and constructing paths between Hannan and Six Mile.

Though the schedule isn't known for repairs to bridges crossing I-275, road closings are expected to last four to six weeks on Hannan and Tyler; three to four weeks on Palmer, Cherry Hill and Joy; five to six weeks on Ann Arbor Trail: 10 to 12 weeks on Plymouth Road; and 12-16 weeks on Warren.

MDOT expects to maintain traffic, though some lanes will be closed, along I-275 where it crosses Van Born, Michigan Avenue, Ford Road, Koppernick, Ann Arbor Road, Hines and Six Mile.

Work crews also plan to resurface I-275 between Ford and Ecorse roads, though traffic should be maintained in both directions with reduced lanes.

Michael Budai, MDOT traffic and safety engineer, said efforts will be made to alternate the closings of roads in close proximity to each other.

"If we have Palmer closed, Michigan Avenue and Cherry Hill should be open," he said.

Nader Judah, sales director for the Comfort Suites and Fairfield Inn by Marriott near Haggerty and Ford in Canton, was among the few residents who turned out Thursday evening to ask questions about the projects. His said his concerns about possible road closings near the businesses he runs were addressed.

"I feel pretty good about it," he said.

District adds academies to curriculum

A survey commissioned by Plymouth-Canton Community Schools officials told administrators a high number of respondents said better, more challenging programs would either keep them in the district or encourage them to move their children from outside schools.

So, this fall, PCCS officials will offer four academies to freshmen and sophomores interested in everything from science and engineering to an international program.

"(The academies) give us more options for our students." said Tim Schoenherr, the district's director of innovative programs. "We want to make the world bigger for our kids."

Officials are responding to

numbers in the EPIC/MRA survey they commissioned to help them define ways to attract more students. Of the more than 400 respondents, some 14 percent said reasons for sending their children to non-Plymouth-Canton schools included the curriculum and the quality of the education.

The biggest response came from parents of students interested in an International Baccalaureate program. Some 94 percent of respondents said they'd at least consider PCCS if an IB program were offered; 50 percent of those said they'd "definitely" enroll if such a program existed.

Parents expressed interest in other academies, which PCCS will offer in September:

• STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math): Some 93 percent of the respondents said they'd at least consider sending their kids to PCCS schools if this academy was offered. Some 55 percent said they'd "definitely" enroll if this were offered; another 38 percent said they'd consider it.

The academy will partner with international businesses near the district and with Schoolcraft College.

• Business Academy: Some 77 percent (although only 27 percent were "definite" about it) like this idea. It's designed to prepare students for postsecondary opportunities in the business world. It'll include instruction in areas such as accounting, entrepreneurship, finance and marketing.

 Arts Academy: Some 75 percent (including 32 percent "definitely" answers) like this idea. The academy will offer opportunities not only for students who would normally be part of

the current TAG program, but also offer chances for students musicians, photographers, actors, painters, etc. who see the world from an artist's perspective.

"We don't want any of our students to be left out," Schoenherr said. "Each academy targets a specific group of kids. We're enhancing and creating options for students who have a strong interest in what these academies have to offer."

While targeting specific students with these academies, Schoenherr said the district isn't ignoring the needs of students not interested in any of the academies.

For instance, he said, all 19 of the current Advanced Placement programs, and perhaps new ones, will still be offered.

"(Academies) are just options for some kids," he said. "Our

curriculum is still rich with options. Our electives are not going away.'

Schoenherr said the current debate about school closures and facility use won't affect the startup of these academies, because they're all at the high school level. He also said the academies won't cost teachers jobs; in fact, he said, officials are asking teachers now if they're interested in teaching any of the academy courses. He said nearly two dozen teachers have expressed such an interest.

He said the district wants the academies up and running for September 2012, acknowledging it's an ambitious schedule.

'We've got some work to do academically and logistically," Schoenherr said. "It's aggressive, but we're moving forward."

Couples are also making dates at the LaVida Massage Centers in Plymouth Township (on Sheldon Road) and Canton (on Ford Road); both places are almost fully

booked for couples massages through Tuesday, Mark Davis, who owns both places, said Friday. "We probably still have a few openings left, but we pretty much have started a waiting list," he said.

LaVida, a national chain based in Commerce Township, specializes in therapeutic massage and also offers body wraps, body scrubs and facials. In couples massages, each person has an individual massage therapist in the same room; prices start at \$39.95 for an hour-long session.

And for those who haven't quite planned that far ahead?


"You can never go wrong with a box of chocolates and flowers," Mackey said.

Study that 1099 for accuracy

Q: Dear Rick: I heard that people were getting 1099s for frequent flyer miles that they received. I get frequent flyer miles based upon my purchases. Do I have to pay taxes on frequent flyer miles? And, if they are not taxable, what happens if I receive a 1099?

A: First of all, just to ease your mind, frequent flyer miles are not subject to income tax. When you receive frequent flyer miles, they are not treated as income rather as rebates on spending. Therefore, they are not subject to income tax. You should not receive a 1099.

If a 1099 is issued in error, there are a couple ways to resolve the issue. The first is to contact the company that issued the 1099 and have them issue an amended 1099. This is very common and won't

not issue an amended or corrected 1099, you need to

raise a

with the

IRS. On

er hand, if

they will

attach a schedule to your tax return with an explanation as to why you are not reporting the income as indicated on the 1099.

The mistake would be to ignore the 1099. It's always important to remember that when a 1099 is issued, not only do you, the taxpayer, receive a copy, the Internal Revenue Service also receives one. Therefore, since the IRS receives a copy, if you don't report the income or do not attach an explanation as to why

the amount is not being reported, you can rest assured that the IRS will send you a bill.

It's just not 1099s that are sometimes issued in error, but also other tax forms such as a W-2 and K1. I cannot stress enough how important it is to review each tax document you receive for accuracy. If there is a mistake, you need to take steps to correct it. If you ignore the mistake, the IRS won't.

Regarding the issue of 1099s for frequent flyer miles, I did some investigating and I did locate the story referred to above. The story dealt with Citibank who had given frequent flyer miles as a reward for opening checking and savings accounts. When you open a checking or savings account you are not spending money therefore, the receipt of frequent flyer miles can-

not be treated as a rebate. Under tax laws, in a situation such as this, that money is taxable to you.

One last important note. Because of changes in reporting rules, it is possible that you may receive 1099s for things that you never did in the past. Remember, if you receive a 1099 that means the IRS has also received it. It is always important to be aware of what our tax laws are and if you receive something of value from an institution such as a bank, it always pays to inquire about the tax consequences ahead of time so you're not caught by surprise. Good luck!

Returning veterans get educational opportunities at Schoolcraft

Lawrence Smith, 48, of Canton is a Detroit police officer. He enrolled at Schoolcraft College for his associate's degree, and is continuing coursework with plans for a bachelor's degree in public safety from Eastern Michigan University.

Smith is among those receiving Post 9/11 Bill benefits through the federal government via Schoolcraft.

"She's wonderful," he said of Pam Paxton-Keehner of Plymouth Township, Veterans Services coordinator at Schoolcraft. "It's been wonderful for me. She even answers her e-mails. I have no complaints about Schoolcraft College. The things you can get from here are unbelievable."

Work and study

He's been able to work full time as a policeman and study part time with enough credit hours to earn housing assistance. Smith was encouraged by his wife, who's also former military, and started at Schoolcraft in 2009 with the first Post 9/11 Bill enrollees.

He appreciates not having to pay at the time of registration, with Paxton-Keehner and a colleague of hers dealing with the paperwork. Smith earned a Schoolcraft associate's degree with honors.

He was in the Army, most recently as a sergeant first class, from 1983 to 2005. He served in Germany, Japan and Egypt.

"I think it was a chal-

lenge," he said of going back to school. "It was actually a smooth transition"

The military gives those leaving information on education, he said, and both the VA and Paxton-Keehner had the information. "Not having to pay those financials makes it a smooth transition," he said.

Paxton-Keehner was able to work around his schedule, and Smith keeps his police work and study time separate. "I sit up front with the older people" in class, he said.

He agreed life experience made his schooling different from a late teens enrollee. Smith applies what he's learning to the course syllabus, and knows what's expected. His faculty experiences have been nearly all

positive.

The couple's youngest son has been motivated to better grades by dad. "It's almost like a challenge," Smith said. "He gets mad when he gets a B-."

Enrollment to climb

Paxton-Keehner started in Schoolcraft admissions and then moved to counseling as an academic adviser. She now works with the veterans, some 225-250 a semester, including dependents, out of enrollment of around 13,000 on the Livonia and Garden City campuses.

"Maybe they're older guys from Vietnam," she said. Schoolcraft only recently began to ask about veteran status, so numbers are approximate.

There's a Montgomery GI Bill for educa-

tional benefits, which is older but has continued with modifications. Students really need to do the math, she said, to see which plan is best for them.

The Post 9/11 Bill gives a stipend for books and

supplies, a housing allowance and money for tuition and fees.

Paxton-Keehner has a colleague who works part time and does data entry for students through the VA.

Schoolcraft's unique

among community colleges, she said, in having dedicated staff for veterans.

Those leaving the military have an orientation, she said, and the VA has a good website. Some veterans face readjustment issues to civilian life as they return to school.

"Most of them are very aware there's this benefit out there for them," she said. Students can retake a course once if they struggled with it: "Math is pretty common. That's a tough one for most people."

Several children of service personnel are using educational benefits at Schoolcraft, including children of parents who've completed school earlier. Spouses are also eligible in some cases.

'Good opportunity'

"I just think it's such an opportunity for them to get education," she said. Some young men aren't good students in high school but return later with more motivation.

"It's almost like a second chance," she said.
"The service turned them into men."

There's a new group for veterans that meets in Schoolcraft's McDowell Center 1:30 p.m. the second Friday of the month. Paxton-Keehner expects to be busy with more veterans coming home from overseas.

"With bringing them all home, we expect to see more," she said. Army veteran Smith wants to welcome all service personnel home.

"America really needs to embrace the soldiers because they sacrificed a lot," he said.

The win gave Plymouth its first D1 district title, although in 2005 the Wildcats won the D2 crown despite not having a senior class.



Is OnGARD the answer to engineering woe?

to excuse me on this one occasion because the information I'm about to give you is so important. There is

no money exchanging hands between this new company and myself nor do I expect there will be. It is a product produced here in Michigan and they need all of the publicity they can get. But most important the smart

consumer who is concerned about a clothes dryer fire needs to know about this product. It is called OnGARD and is a simple fire extinguisher which attaches to the back wall with a piece of plastic tubing leading into the base of the clothes dryer. I don't mean to simplify the concept but it took Gerald Flood, the inventor a short time to create this wonderful safety device.

In the past, I have talked to engineers and others about an extinguisher that could be installed within a clothes dryer to prevent fire. I'm sure the feeling from a manufacture is that installing a fire suppression system within a dryer would mean admitting that the product is at fault. Not so, I claim as the homeowner is at fault here.

Manufacturers build a fine product which does the job very sufficiently and we con-

sumers don't pay enough attention to how a clothes dryer operates. There are over 16,000 dryer fires reported each year in this country and I'll bet that twice that amount go unreported. Many people are injured and many die and yet the news media does a terrible job of educating the American public. While this lack of concern seems prevalent and the way it is. this new invention can begin to save lives and make more homeowners aware.

I have been approached many times to endorse someone's new product and I don't bite all that often. There was a product invented a few years back that would save energy costs by simply plugging your refrigerator into it. I stated that it might cause a compressor failure and it did, but millions were made before the product was removed from store shelves. Someone is always out to make

a quick buck in this world, which should raise the caution flag for shoppers.

This new invention just now is hitting the market place and as you can tell, I believe in it very strongly. It is not difficult for a typical homeowner to install themselves. You mount the extinguisher to the wall behind the dryer and then run the plastic tube through a louver on the back of the dryer. The tube lays on the inside floor of the dryer and when the heat of the flame hits the tube, it propels a proven fire suppressor powder throughout the base of the dryer, putting out the fire. Another important factor is that there is enough powder expelled that some of it will travel up the vent line to extinguish and prevent the fire from spreading outside of the dryer. It is not an expensive item, especially when compared to the cost of damages caused by

SHOULDER PAIN AFTER AN INJECTION


A person with shoulder pain should expect that after an injection the pain will end; often that is not the case. The delay reflects the nature of shoulder injury and how Nature crafted the joint.

The most common underlying problem is a fraying of the tendon of the supraspinatus tendon; past injury to the tendon is the usual

When the injury occurs, the body tries to heal the site by building a scaffold of calcium on which new fibers can grow, eventually filling any defects in the tendon. However, for reasons unclear, on occasions the body lays down calcium, but new fiber growth does not follow. In that instance, the person may feel great pain almost as if someone has thrust a lance through the shoulder, as the calcium takes on the attributes of a sliver.







Benefit set to help Plymouth woman buy cancer treatments

Linda Cutrera-Harms of Plymouth figures she and her husband, Jymi, are about a quarter million dollars in debt — and it's all because of cancer.

"Every three weeks it's difficult to come up with \$2,300," said Cutrera-Harms, 50, who has undergone six expensive rounds of chemotherapy since she was diagnosed with lung cancer in September last year. A PET scan discovered two tumors in her right lung, a mass in her sinuses, and tumors on her spine and adrenal glands.

"My oncologist told me it was advanced and serious. He gave me a 50-50 chance of survival. I needed to do the chemo. I want to live and be a survivor."

Family and friends plan a fundraiser Saturday, Feb. 18, to help Cutrera-Harms pay for treatment. The event will run 2-9 p.m. at the Wayne Masonic Temple, 37137 Palmer, just east of Newburgh, in Westland. Tickets are \$20 per person and will include a Spaghetti dinner, four live bands, door prizes, a 50/50 raffle and baskets raffle. Chil-

"She is a terrific girl, kind-hearted," said Kim Mullinix, who is helping to coordinate the fundraiser. Mullinix worked with Cutrera-Harms at Medical Weight Loss Clinic. "She has to pay 2,300 to get the chemo treatments she needs. She will start her next round soon. She needs another PET scan, too. They scan you and tell you how your body is responding to treatment. That's like \$5,000."

Cutrera-Harms grew up in New York and New Jersey and moved to Michigan in 1978. She lived in Canton and Garden City before moving to Plymouth. She and her husband have two children. Daughter Nikki is a mom with three daughters, and son Cody, is an infantryman in the U.S. Army, serving in Afghanistan. Jymi is self-employed in information technology. Both Cutrera-Harms and her husband perform with a local band called Stiletto, which will participate in

the fundraiser.

Cutrera-Harms worked in banking for 26 years and was a corporate tax accountant before being laid off. She was managing Medical Weight Loss Clinic's Novi office when she became ill with pneumonia last June.

"I didn't take it seriously. I continued working. I didn't rest," she recalled. "They gave me antibiotics and I finally got over it. Then in August 2011 I got full-blown pneumonia and was put in the hospital. I had to have my lungs drained twice. That's when I was diagnosed with cancer."

Her mother had been diagnosed with a more aggressive form of lung cancer and had died four years earlier.

"I don't know how long I had the lung cancer before they saw it. I had a little high blood pressure, but I felt perfectly healthy and

fine. I could do anything," she said.

The couple has health insurance, but it covers only \$1,000 of the chemotherapy treatments, Cutrera-Harms said.

"We thought we were covered, until we needed to use it. That's when we found out it's not worth the paper it's printed on. It's been pretty scary. We're barely covering our household bills and we're getting creamed with bills from doctors," she said. "I need tests done. CAT scans costs \$2,500 a piece and a PET scan is \$5,000.

Cutrera-Harms said the chemotherapy has helped. Tumors in her lungs and sinuses appear to be shrinking.

"My focus is on living. We are over-the-top stressed out, but I have to focus on living and getting better. My husband, family and friends have been helping me so much.'

Chat online with lung cancer physician

Dr. Gregory Kalemkerian, head of U-M's Multidisciplinary Lung Cancer Center, will answer questions about lung cancer through an online chat Feb. 16.

"Lung cancer is the biggest cancer-related health problem in the United States right now." Kalemkerian said. "This event will allow participants to ask important questions related to the disease's causes, symptoms and prevention.'

Participants can register for the online chat — which will begin at noon - at mcancer.org/ chat.

Although smoking is the main cause of lung cancer, Kalemkerian said 10 percent of those who have the disease have never smoked. Second-hand smoke and occupational hazards such as asbestos exposure can also lead to lung cancer.

Former Wolverine football player and Ann Arbor policeman Vada Murray was one of the 10 percent. His wife, Sarah Murray, started the Vada Murray Fund for Cancer Research at U-M shortly after he died in 2011. The fund

has raised more than \$70,000 for research aimed at exploring early detection and the causes of various types of lung cancer, with an emphasis on environmental issues and cancer treatments.

Because many of the indicators for lung cancer are also common ailments for smokers, it can be hard to diagnose the disease, Kalemkerian said. Lung cancer often is diagnosed in the later stages because patients do not report symptoms earlier.

"Screens like CT scans can help detect early signs of cancer in those at high risk," he said. "When we can catch it earlier, there's a much better chance of treating the disease.'

Do You Have Enough **Experience For That Job?**

Just because you were a senior manager at one company doesn't mean that your next job won't be a midlevel role. Often, appropriate job titles can get confusing during a job search. "There's no standardization as to how the titles are done," says Jim Beqaj, founder of Begaj International, an executive search firm and consultancy.

Not sure which job title you should target when looking for a job? Here's a rough guide to deciphering how to categorize your skills and what to keep in mind:

Entry level

This category is misleading, because it's not just for those new to the workforce. Plenty of people who have been in the workforce for five years or fewer can fall under the entry-level umbrella.

When going after an entry-level job, try to let your personality and enthusiasm shine. "Entry level is all about personality fit ... basic skills of good communication, eye contact and a sign of eagerness and genuineness are key in securing entry-level jobs," Begaj says.

Midlevel

For job seekers who are no longer newbies in the market, a midlevel position has entirely different demands. "A midlevel manager typically directs people, departments, functions or projects as well as budgets," says resume writer Deborah Schuster, founder of Lettersmith Resume Service.

"For most companies, this would require a minimum of a bachelor's degree and five to 15 years of experience."

Additionally, conveying to hiring managers how you would fit in with the company hierarchy is key. "Midlevel requires experience in previous jobs, so making sure that you have the experience and skills sets required is paramount. Your ability to articulate your experiences and how they positively impacted your previous employer are critical," Begaj says.

Senior-level and executive

Just because you were a senior-level employee at one company doesn't mean you should be targeting only senior roles for your next gig.

"There are many definitions for the word 'executive' and 'experienced," Schuster says.

Corporate structures vary and larger companies have few seniorlevel slots. Before applying, use a site like LinkedIn to see where an employee with duties similar to your desired role fits in. "It helps if you know the size of the company and have a description of the qualifications they seek. And be sure your résume and cover letter is tailored to show that you have those qualifications," Schuster says.

Match skills not level

Just because you fall into a certain experience bucket doesn't mean you can't apply for a position that

requires your skills but is on a lower level. Most companies are happy to consider a more junior person for a job, especially if that means they can get away with paying a lower salary. Before you apply, consider whether "your natural instincts [are] making you feel comfortable or uneasy; trust your senses," Begaj says. Many larger companies may also start employees at a lower level. In other words, your seniorlevel role at a technology startup may result in a midlevel position with a Fortune 500 firm.

Understand what or whom you're managing

Another good test for figuring out which level to target is to gauge your current job responsibility. Whether you're getting the information from a recruiter or through your own personal connections, get a sense of whether you would be managing entry-level employees, other managers, a department, a group of businesses, the entire enterprise or just your own time, says George Bradt, managing director of PrimeGenesis, a company that helps executives become established in their new jobs.

The higher the level, the more senior the job title should be for your next position. "What matters when reviewing job descriptions for entry level, midlevel, senior and experienced positions is what people are managing," Bradt says.




