# STEP AT A TIME

Runner finds meaning helping others reach fitness goals

**By Matt Jachman** 

Whether it's running a business, running an event or running for the health of it, Randy Step is enjoying the race.

A dedicated runner for almost 40 years, Step is the president of Running Fit, Inc., which just opened its eighth area running gear store and includes fitness event-management and racetiming businesses.

It doesn't seem like work at all, the South Lyon resident says. "I'm so fortunate to be in a business where everyone who works here is passionate about what they do," Step said during an interview at the Northville Township Running Fit. "They're passionate runners."

Step and his co-workers, who produce well-known Michigan running events such as Dances With Dirt and Run Woodstock, recently took on management of the inaugural Heroes on Hines, five-kilometer and half-marathon races in honor of Wayne County police officers and firefighters who lost their lives on the job. The Saturday, Oct. 5, event, which will raise money for the maintenance of the county's First Responders Memorial, begins and ends near Hines Drive and Haggerty in Plymouth Township, where the memorial. under construction, will be locat-

Running Fit joined Wayne County parks and recreation officials to plan Heroes on Hines and the company designed runners' shirts and medals, mapped the course and is promoting the event and handling registrations.

"I'm just trying to create something that I think would be really cool," he said.

# **Running kismet**

Step grew up in Detroit and Redford Township, where his father worked at the Charles Step Funeral Home, which was founded in Detroit by Randy's grandfather and is now run by Randy's brother, also named Charles.

Step didn't run in high school - he is a 1974 Redford Union graduate - but took it up at Michigan State University, where during his sophomore year, as a transfer student, he found himself in a dormitory with a concentration of Spartans cross country runners.

"I pretty much got hooked and put in a lot of miles with those guys," sometimes logging 80 to 100 miles a week, Step said. He majored in mortuary sci-

ence and began his career as a funeral director, something he did for seven years. He has great respect for

the work. "You have the opportunity to help people in the most difficult days of their lives," he said.

But the running bug had taken hold and Step also trained for races and triathlons (running, swimming and cycling), even taking time off with his wife Kathleen, a top female triathlete at the time, to train and

"I never ran those kind of times where I thought I could make a living," he said.

# **Achieving goals**

Still, he lived and breathed running and opened the first Running Fit in Ann Arbor in December 1984, eventually transitioning into retail full time. He also sold commercial exercise equipment for several years; when his partner bought Step's share of that business, he said,

he decided to refocus on running. Step said he felt guilty about leaving the funeral home for a business

# Physical Street Laugmotive suppliers planning expansion

More than 100 engineering jobs expected to be added

A \$6.8 million investment in Plymouth Township's industrial corridor by two auto suppliers could bring more than 100 engineering, research and manufacturing jobs

there, plus help retain over 40 more jobs. Webasto-Edscha Cabrio USA and AD-VICS North America, Inc., were each given the green light Tuesday by the town-ship for a tax break on building improvements and new tools and equipment they plan to bring to their facilities in the Metro West Industrial Park, off of Five Mile and Sheldon. Both Board of Trustees votes were unanimous; final approvals are up to state officials.

Webasto, part of a German company and the descendant of Karmann USA, makes convertible and open-air automobile tops and is the largest manufacturer of such systems in the world, said Stephen Chesna, the chief financial officer. The company plans \$291,000 in improvements

# Owners close the book on Old Village shop

Neighborhood mainstay abruptly closes after some some 30 years

The Old Village Bookshop, a second-hand bookstore on Starkweather in Plymouth's Old Village neighborhood, has closed, or perhaps started a new chapter somewhere else.

Neighborhood residents say the store closed abruptly about a month ago. A for rent sign sits in a window of the empty store, although the overhead sign and the store's website remain up. The website appears to be out of date, however.

The shop had been an Old Village mainstay since the 1980s; the last owner, J. Karen Kelchak, obtained it in 2000. It had had two or three locations in the neighborhood; Kelchak opened the last location in May 2008.


Kelchak could not be reached for comment and a woman who answered the phone at the number on the "for rent" sign Friday said she

would not discuss the store's departure.

The store offered used books, mostly paperbacks, of all kinds and did probably its biggest business in mysteries and romances. Kelchak obtained many of her books through a trade-in system that gave customers credit toward future purchases when they turned in old books

In a 2009 interview, Kelchak said she had a stable base of repeat customers, some of whom could go through six paperbacks in a

he found so enjoyable, but came to realize his new career gave him the chance to help people through difficult times,

"We have the ability to change people's lives dramatically and we see it all the time," he said. Step described how nonrunners looking for a healthier lifestyle walk in after a serious talk with a doctor or an Alcoholics Anonymous meeting "and think this is going to be some kind of torture. Running Fit, which offers running classes, gait analysis and other support services for runners, helps them get to the next level and beyond, he said.

"It's all personal," Step said of the goals runners set as they progress. "The psychological side's huge. The physical side's huge."

Step likes to tell runners to "run fast and take chances," meaning, he said, to get outside of their comfort zones.

### Close call

But he also urges safety, saying that he prefers trail instead of street running, wears bright colors, runs without music and stays aware of his surroundings. "I hate running near a road," he said.

The dangers were painfully illustrated for him Aug. 14, when Step's wife Kathleen, competing in Running Fit's T-Rex Triathlon at Island Lake Recreation Area, collided with a car while bicycling at top speed, he said. An inexperienced driver apparently didn't see her and turned sharply in front of her to get past a stream of T-Rex cyclists, Step said.

Kathleen Step flew clear of the car and landed in gravel, her husband said, and is pretty banged up, but expected to recover.

# City closes deck's upper level

The upper level of the downtown Plymouth parking deck will be closed today (Sunday) and Monday so contractors can seal and recoat the top floor of the parking structure.

Plymouth Downtown **Development Authority** officials said the top level is expected to be closed until about 5 p.m. Monday, Aug. 26.

'While it will be an inconvenience, we scheduled the shutdown of the

top level on a Sunday and Monday when there are usually fewer visitors and employees downtown during times when there are no special events," said DDA operations director Tony Brus-

The best place to park those two days, according to Bruscato, is the East Central public parking lot, behind the Penn Theatre. Drivers can park all day without receiving a ticket. There

are also some all-day parking spaces in the public lot at Wing and Harvey and in the public lot on Penniman.

Drivers who park in the lower deck (three hours) or on the street (two hours) will be ticketed for parking over the time limit.

The schedule may change based on site conditions, crew scheduling, equipment scheduling and weather, Bruscato said.

nizer last winter. "We had such a great time doing it and I'm very pleased with the way it came out," Latawiec told the board.

The picnic at Plymouth Township Park this year had several new features, including live music by the rock oldies band Detroit DeVilles and an obstacle course for kids.

to a building on Pilot Drive, plus the purchase of another \$5.3 million in machinery and other production equipment.

In a letter to the township, Chesna said Webasto is planning to take on the manufacture of a new roof system for General Motors Corp. in October and of another roof system for Ford Motor Co. in 2014. The work is expected to create 104 new jobs within two years, plus retain another 43. Chesna said about 200 people currently work at Webas-

to in the township. The 12-year, 50-percent tax abatement the

company seeks on its \$5.6 million investment would mean a savings of just over \$34,000 in its first year, township Treasurer Ron Edwards said.

At ADVICS, which researches, designs, tests and produces vehicle brake systems, the company is planning to spend nearly \$1.5 million to boost its brake development capability, said Simon Hendy, the company's director of technical administration and planning. Most of that will be in new equipment, while \$75,000 will be in building improvements, the company's application system says. The building improvements are nearly done, he said.

ADVICS has active development programs

with six auto manufacturers, Hendy said, including the Detroit Three, and company officials want to fully support those customers from the Plymouth Township technical center rather than relying on the parent company in Japan.

The expansion is expected to create eight new jobs for engineers and lab technicians. Hendy said the hiring is expected to be completed this year.

If approved by the state, Edwards said, the 12-year tax break for ADVICS will save it just over \$9,000 in the first





# Marchers gear up for new season

With the sun shining bright on a Saturday afternoon, more than 300 moms, dads, grandparents and band alumni gathered to watch the 2013 Plymouth-Canton Marching Band showcase the opening number of its new program, "Inferno."

The show was a culmination of a week-long band camp hosted at Plymouth High School in Canton. Musicians and color guard members gathered daily for a full week of rehearsals. The preview show is the annual kickoff to a

brand-new competition season. Director of Bands David Armbruster thanked the large audience for coming out to support the program.

"It was a wonderful week, particularly weather-wise," he told the audience before thanking Superintendent Dr. Michael Meissen and the Board of Education for supporting the program, including the purchase of eight new sousaphones. "It's wonderful to see a community and our schools embrace music and the arts."

## **On-field excellence**

Jonathan Thomann, director of PCEP Marching Band, took several minutes to share his thoughts on band camp and how a program rich with tradition continues to move toward a new competition season.

"Excellence takes a lot of hard work – something this community knows well," Tho-mann said. "The unparalleled staff with deep talent is the most impressive team I've seen in my career and they came here to Plymouth-Canton to work with our kids.'

Thomann described "Inferno" as a "hot" show and predicted the team of 170 marchers will heat up Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis (site of the nationals) "with great passion." Plymouth-

Canton will compete at four local band competitions, a regional Bands of America event in Toledo and the state championship at Ford Field, before ending its season in mid-November at the Bands of America Grand National Championship in Indianapolis.

"We have a lot of tricks up our sleeve that won't be seen in the public eye until much later in the season," Thomann said. Only part one of three music components were finished and demonstrated Saturday. The students will continue to rehearse a few days each week up to the start of school. Then rehearsals will change to after school and Saturday.

Once all the introductions were complete, the students picked up their instruments and readied themselves for the opening number of the 2013 show, "Inferno." A new musical preshow number was unveiled, which had the strong sound of a vocal choir and quickly grew louder, ending with powerful organ music piping through the speakers.

# **Different experience**

"Camp was good and challenging," said senior drum major Sarah Wohl, who directed the performance. "I'm super proud of how far we've all come as a team."

Plymouth High junior Katie Wolf shares drum major duties with Wohl. "I am so excited for this year," she said. "It's a dif-ferent experience (being a drum major).'

With the first competition scheduled Sept. 21 at Novi High School, there is still time to join this year's marching band. Wind players are encouraged to contact Thomann in the band room at Plymouth High School. Also, the color guard is actively recruiting additional members to complete the ensemble. Students with dance or theater experience are encouraged to attend a rehearsal.



# Robotics team shares its secret

The East Middle School Robotics Team, known as the Robo-Rockets, has a secret it wants to share: Teamwork, math and science can be more fun than ever imagined by the typical kid in America.

The RoboRockets recently held an informational meeting to help spread the word about FIRST Robotics to elementary and middle school students in the Plymouth-Canton community. FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) combines the excitement of sport with the rigors of science and technology.

Under strict rules, limited resources and time, squads of students are challenged to hone teamwork skills and build and program robots to perform prescribed tasks against a field of competitors. Organizers say it's "as close to real-world engineering" as a student can get.

And just like varsity sports, college scholarships are now available to students on robotics teams. With support from three

out of every five Fortune 500 companies and nearly \$16 million in college scholarships, FIRST continues to grow and help kids see that it's actually more fun to design a video game than to play one.

Recently at the Canton Township Hall, these middle school students talked to approximately 150 parents and prospective team members about the program and the different benefits and opportunities available in three different leagues from fifth to 12th grade.

To inspire the participants to join FIRST and form new teams, the RoboRockets demonstrated robots used in previous FTC robotics competitions and asked the Miller Elementary Banana Bots to demonstrate FLL robots. Those who attended were able to watch and even drive the robots.

As a result of this meeting, four new teams are likely to form, based out of East Middle School and Isbister, Miller and Dodson elementary schools.

They are taking advantage of the grants available to rookie teams through support from corporations such as General Motors and Consumers Energy.

The RoboRockets team was a first-year FTC team for the 2012-13 season and the first middle school FTC team in Plymouth-Canton Schools. It finished its first FTC season earning the Motivation Award at the state tournament and members are excited to be back.



# Pretrial rescheduled in embezzlement case

A Canton man accused of real estate fraud faces a pretrial hearing next month in Wayne County Circuit Court after being bound over earlier this summer.

Samer Salami, a Redford real estate agent, is charged with two counts of conducting a criminal enterprise, two counts of embezzlement of \$100,000 or more, three counts of using a computer to commit a crime and five counts of false pretenses.

The charges stem from an investigation done by Wayne County that determined Salami was using his position as an agent of Villa Realty in Redford to convince mortgage lenders Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac to sell homes to a company he operated on the side. His company would then sell the properties at a higher rate, keeping the profits,

according to prosecutors. Salami allegedly made

more than \$265,000 off of the venture, which lasted from August 2007 to April 2010. The charges were announced earlier this spring by Wayne County.

Two of the homes Salami attempted to sell are in Redford; one in the 9500 block of Fenton, the other in the 9700 block of Woodbine. The other homes were located in Dearborn Heights and Detroit.


Prosecutors announced the charges against Salami in April after an extensive investigation. He was bound over to circuit court April 23 by 17th District Judge Charlotte Wirth.

If convicted, Salami faces up to 20 years in prison. He is currently out of jail on a \$750,000 cash or surety bond and is required to wear a GPS tether and not have any involvement with the real estate business.


Ed Snyder will spend his 99th birthday Friday at Woodland Lanes in Livonia, where he bowls twice a week.

cane for balance while walking, but he doesn't need it when he bowls. "When he gets up to bowl, all that goes out the door," she said. "He knows how to throw that

She drives him to the bowling alley and to St. Theodore Catholic Church in Westland, where he plays cards every Wednesday.

A World War II veteran, Synder served 41/2 years with the Army's 3rd Armored Division in western Europe.

"He was over there for the (Normandy) invasion," his daughter said.

He worked for 43 years for the former Burroughs Corp., a manufacturer of business equipment, in "the front office" doing technical writing and an assortment of other jobs.

Snyder and his wife Catherine were married 64 years before she died in 2008. They bowled on leagues together. Snyder still lives in the house they bought in 1956. They had four children, who gave them eight grandchildren and three greatgrandchildren.

Hatch said her father used to work out with weights and bowling continues to be good exercise for him. But equally beneficial, she said, is the socialization: "He loves to go down and

visit with the people.' All of Woodland's league members are invited to Snyder's birthday party. "We hope to have a nice crowd," Winkel said.

sion? A: Congratulations on your new job and on having the financial maturity to start thinking about your finances. All

too often, new college graduates are only concerned about spending money as opposed to saving it.

I recommend using the \$500 a month you are saving to pay off your charge card. By paying off your charge card, you are getting a guaranteed 17-percent return on your money. I don't know any

investment that guarantees a 17-percent rate of return. I have always believed that whether you're saving for your retirement or a new home, for most people paying down their charge cards is one of the best investments they could ever make.

Once your charge card has been paid you, then begin to think about your retirement. Taking advantage of the company's 401(k) Plan, particularly the Roth option, presents a great opportunity for you. The ad-

vantage of the Roth is that money can grow tax-free. Just think if you could start investing money now in a Roth how much money would be available to you in the future.

I know this is not what you want to hear, but the last thing you begin to save for is a new home. Renting is actually a better option than owning, from a financial standpoint. Look at the literally millions of people who lost their home in the financial crisis and all the people whose



# Couple hopes story 'rings' a bell after 40 years

Act of kindness not forgotten, now they'd like to return the favor

Mike and Patty La-Pradd will be married 40 years in March and they want to give back her wedding and engagement

No, they are not splitting up - they would just like to give the rings back to the original own-

The tale begins in 1973 as a story of young love, when Patty was a senior at Livonia's Bentley High School. She met and fell in love with Mike La-Pradd, who was 21 at the time and had just moved in across the street with his family.

"We met as neighbors," she said. Both families lived on Hoy Street off of Five Mile between Merriman and Middlebelt in Livonia. "His family came from Detroit. I went to school with his brothers," Patty said. The brothers were her age, but Mike was older and out of school.

They decided to marry while she was still finishing high school, against the wishes of their parents. They didn't have much money for rings, but they found an ad in the Livonia Observer. It read, "Wedding ring set for sale. 477-1658

"My mother found the ad in the paper," Mike LaPradd said. "We were young and in love and had no money, obviously. We didn't have two nickels to rub together."

In answering the ad, Mike and Patty went together to a home in Farmington or Farmington Hills; after all these years, they are not sure which community it was. Patty waited outside in the car, while Mike went in to buy the rings.

It was said that the wife was sick, they think with cancer, and the couple had horses, as the area was more rural at

the time, Patty said. "She was ill and they wanted to feed the horses. The bills were piling up,' Patty said was the reason they gave for selling the rings. Mike bought them for \$100. That was Feb. 4,

Fast forward nearly 40 years. After an apartment as newlyweds in Livonia, they bought their first house in Plymouth, then moved to Westland and later to Garden City, before moving to Howell 17 years ago. For now and the foreseeable future, science cannot stop senescence of the immune system, the brain, kidneys or the joints. What each of these body systems have in common is that they depend on cells that cannot reproduce: brain cells and their connections cannot multiply, the kidney glomeruli, the cells that separate urine from blood, die off with age, like leaves in winter, joint cartilage wears with age like tread on a tire.

The immune system is slightly different. We continue to make white blood cells and lymphocytes every day of our normal lives, but the quality of those immune cells lessens. They cannot respond with the appropriate antibodies in the amount and rate that gave protection

in maturity. It is the lessened ability of the immune system to respond to an attack that causes physicians to treat older people in a different manner than when the same patients were younger. For instance, prednisone is a marvelous drug, but a physician needs to use it sparingly in people in their 70's and 80's. Prednisone impairs the immune system, making the older person taking it vulnerable to infection. The individual may look healthy and live vigorously, but the immune system is aging and

# Japanese-American school seeks to bridge gap

Like many other firstgraders, George Goonis wakes up every morning singing a song.

The 5-year-old Livonia resident's song might sound a bit unfamiliar to some – because chances are good he is singing in Japanese.

Raised in an Englishspeaking household by monolingual parents, George started earlier this month his second year as a student at the Hinoki International School in Livonia, a twoway immersion elementary school chartered by Livonia Public Schools.

"I think George has learned over 100 songs in Japanese. He's a happygo-lucky kid and he loves it," mother Patty Goonis said of the school. "And I love the fact that he is learning another language.

In addition to reading, writing and arithmetic, her son is getting something even more, according to Goonis, a librarian with the city of Livonia.

# **Broadened world**

"It has been a wonderful opportunity for my son to get a whole new world view. He is learning to embrace other cultures and those who are 'different' from him,"

Although the country of Japan and the city of Livonia are separated by some 6,400 miles, the

school, the first Japanese-American school in the state of Michigan, is seeking to bridge that gap, bringing the rich culture and language of Japan to local elementary school students and their families, said Ted Delphia, the school's principal.

Officially chartered by LPS, the school was founded in 2010 by a group of interested supporters looking to provide a two-way bilingual learning environment for temporary Japanese residents, Japaneseheritage families and American families with an interest in the concept, Delphia said.

Now entering its fourth year, the school takes the best practices of both Japanese and American schools in an effort to create a global learning community, giving students a nurturing, culturally rich learning environment and successful educational experience in both Japanese and English, according to Delphia.

"We are not just teaching the Japanese language, it is a parallel world of understanding," he said. "Students bring their own languages and cultures from home into the classroom and work together to help one another learn.'

# Only one like it in state

Currently serving approximately 135 students in grades K-3

throughout the area, including Novi, Plymouth and Canton, the school "is completely different from any other in Michigan," said Delphia, who is a Livonia resident along with his wife Mitsuyo, a teacher at the school.

Students at Hinoki attend school for six hours each day, with an elongated school year allowing for six weeks off for summer vacation, similar to the school calendar followed by

students in Japan. "We wanted to have more contact points with our students and avoid the summer slide," he

According to Delphia, the school follows the state of Michigan elementary school curriculum, blended with Japanese content expectations that create a unique two-way setting. Lessons are taught in both English and Japanese, allowing students the opportunity to increase their skills in a new language, while strengthening their skills in their native lan-

"It is very different we are not trying to load on top of the kids; we are trying to work both sides and provide Japanese and American students with an opportunity to learn from each other and become bilingual, bilateral, bi-cultural and globally-minded individuals," Delphia said.

The Hinoki International School charter is overseen by LPS and

"provides another program we can't offer within the district, at the same time generating added revenue to help support our current programs in the district," LPS Superintendent Randy Liepa wrote in an email.





# Volunteers important to Wayne Metro work

During a time when most government-funded organizations are feeling the squeeze from budget cuts such as federal sequestration, individual gifts slowing down and fundraising event attendance decreasing, one -Wayne County service organization has found a treasure trove in human capital as a way to do more with less.

Wayne Metro Community Action Agency is leaning on volunteerism to get the work done.

In recent months individuals, community groups and corporate partners have stepped up to accomplish great things. PNC Bank, DTE Energy, AmeriCorps VISTA, the agency's Regional Advisory Councils, Board of Directors, concerned parents, civic and political leaders and other service providers have given more than 10,000 hours of time. With an average full-time staff person making an annual salary of \$30,000 per year, the agency believes it has benefited from \$144,230 in donated time and services.

"Our volunteers are helping to keep the safety net in our community intact," Wayne Metro CEO Louis Piszker said. "Our most vulnerable citizens, including seniors and families with children, depend on us and these unpaid man hours fill a gap so that we don't have to turn people away."

In addition to the man hours, the agency's unpaid workforce is eliminating large expenses from the organization's budget. Volunteers from DTE's Marketing Department helped to paint an entire early childhood

center earlier this month.

Their elbow grease helped to purge a \$10,000 expense the agency would have incurred for a contractor to do the work. The money will instead be used toward the purchase of new technology, events for parents and new Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) based program supplies and materials.





# IN THE NICK OF TIME

Brandon takes 'Cats' top coaching job, expects immediate success

Nick Brandon demands excellence of himself.

That will continue for the 33-year-old Canton resident in his new job as varsity girls bas-ketball head coach at Plymouth.

He'll also expect his players to follow his lead — hopefully all the way to the top of the KLAA South Division, for starters.

"I feel incredibly fortunate," Brandon said Tuesday night, shortly after district co-athletic director Sue Heinzman announced the hiring. "I just feel tremendous confidence from everyone around me to get this position.

"And I know there's a lot of people out there that believe that I can lead this program into a championship program. I believe we can do that now. I don't believe in transition years, I don't believe in making excuses about why we can't win now."

Brandon, who was JV girls coach and an assistant varsity coach on Bob deBear's staff the past three seasons, added that he will "put all my energy — and I'm going to expect that my players will put all their energy into working hard every day to be champions."

According to a statement sent Tuesday by Heinzman to players and families in the Plymouth girls basketball program, it was unanimously decided by a committee composed of a parent, teacher, coach and player to select Brandon.

Also hired were Patrick Foley

and Colleen Flaherty, as the new JV and freshman coach, respectively.

Both Foley and Flaherty joined Brandon to run the girls summer program, doing a job that drew raves and put them over the top.

Now, Brandon will begin looking for varsity assistants to augment Foley and Flaherty (a player from Plymouth's first graduation class in 2006).

"One of the things right off the bat that I need to do to get this program in the right direction is hire the best coaching

staff in the state," Brandon said. "We already have a couple people in place in our lower levels, but it's my job to go out and find a great team of (assistant) coaches.

'You can't have a great team of players without outstanding leaders as coaches.'

Brandon was an early favorite to land the job vacated by deBear, who stepped down under apparent duress from players and parents wanting a new voice and direction for the program. Plymouth finished 12-10 in 2012-13.

Asked about that situation, Brandon would only outline what he will be demanding from everybody connected with the girls basketball team.

In short, it will be exactly what he expects from those on his varsity boys golf team, which came within an eyelash of capturing the 2013 Division 1 championship.

"I've built my program on a number of principles," Brandon said. "But the ones most important to me are accountability, discipline, respect and, above

all, team.
"That's my philosophy, that's what I'll talk about every day. That's what I'll show through my own actions as a leader every day. And that's what I expect everybody associated with our program to buy into and follow 100 percent."

The former prep cage star at Plymouth Christian Academy added that he likely will coach the Wildcats boys golfers for just one more year.

"My intentions are to coach golf one more season," Brandon said. "I want to see those seniors through the program and finish their journey. But as far as anything beyond that, in the end it's really a family decision.'



# Walk 4 Water raises funds for wells

Local church hosting event to help pay for well drilling in South Sudan

The Livonia Church of Christ is taking steps to help build a clean water well in South Sudan, Africa.


Members of the congregation will walk one to four miles starting at noon, Saturday, Sept. 14, at Stymelski Veter-an's Park, 14275 Stark, in Livonia, to raise awareness and funds for clean water sources abroad.

The Walk 4 Water is open to the public and will culminate in a community picnic with food, games, and an information table from Healing Hands International, a Christian-based organization that leads clean water projects around the world. With its own drilling equipment, Healing Hands has created more than 200 wells in Ethiopia and more than 60 in Haiti. In other countries, such as Zambia, Zimbabwe, Nigeria, India and Honduras it pays commercial companies to dig community wells. It also distributes water filtration systems to communities where wells aren't feasible.

"I worked in Africa for 23 years as a missionary, so I know the importance of clean water," said the Rev. Larry Stephens, pastor of Livonia Church of Christ. "Clean water is the one thing that can make a 100 percent difference in the quality of life of people in rural areas. The needs in Africa are huge."

The congregation raised \$3,670 at its first walk last year and needs to raise another \$1,130 to fund one well, which costs \$4,800. Any money raised in addition to that amount will go toward drilling a second well.

"It's a big need in South Sudan," said Jessica Allen, who suggested the walk to her church last year. She organized the inaugural event, which drew approximately 50 walkers, and is coordinating the second annual walk next month. "South Africa is dangerous. It took them (Healing Hands) a year to try - because of politics - to get into South Sudan. They've gotten in and

they've been able to dig wells."

# **Giving back**

Allen, 33, who is married and has two young sons, said she became interested in clean water projects after attending a concert and poetry session at her church. One of the performers was accompanied by a speaker about clean water.

"In third world countries people don't have access to clean water. I started becoming aware of it," Allen

She researched clean water advocacy groups and discovered that Healing Hands International offered an annual Walk 4 Water event n Ten-

It also encourages others to donate to its cause by creating their own Walk 4 Water fundraiser.

"My husband and I were at a turn-



# Plymouth teen pens award-winning

Anna Mitchell turned a high school assignment this year into a national award-winning essay worth \$5,000 in scholarship funds.

How did she do it? "I took an online AP English language class. My teacher requires everyone to enter the peace essay contest. She assigned it because she thinks it's really good practice in writing a research paper. It was quite a lot of work, a lot of research." Her effort paid off.

Anna, a 16-year-old home schooled student from Plymouth, took first place in Michigan for her entry into the United States Institute of Peace's annual contest. As a state finalist, she was invited to a weeklong program of sightseeing, peace-building simulations and educational speakers in Washington D.C. earlier this summer. National winners were announced during a banquet. Anna took second place for her work, titled "Up and Out: Women's Peacebuilding From the Ground Up in

Liberia and Afghani-

The contest, which drew approximately 1,100 essays from high school students nationwide, required each entrant to consider the effect of gender on peace efforts, and how women could become more instrumental in the process. Writers compared and contrasted countries where peace had succeeded and failed, offered recommendations for future peace-building and considered the messages and approaches that were most effective

in creating peace.

## Learning about peace

Anna chose to focus on Libera's successful peace efforts because she had watched a documentary on the West African nation and she has a friend from the country. She compared Liberia to Afghanistan.

"I already knew a little about Afghanistan. It seemed like there was a lot I could write about," she said. "I didn't know much about peace building. When you say the word 'peace' you think of hippies and all that. But it's really complicated. There are a lot of different ways you can build peace and I think it has to come from the ground up. Military occupation and big plans don't work. It has to come from people's attitudes.'

In her essay, Anna used Liberia as an example to argue that women must work within their culture and religion to be effective peace builders.

"Leymah Gbowee, leader of the women's peace movement, and her group were blockading men in a room so they

would come to an agreement. They (the women) were going to be kicked out by security guards, so they threatened to strip," Anna said. "They used their culture there, and they did eventually reach an agreement."

Anna said the research paper helped her to improve as a writer and enhance her persuasive skills.

Although she's not formally involved in debate, she enjoys arguing "all sorts of topics' and political issues. She and her younger sister attend a home school co-op where Anna took a

"hot topics" course that involved debating controversial issues. She often brought the conversation home.

"There is a lot of discussion around the dinner table," said Linda

Mitchell, Anna's mom. "It can get pretty heated," Anna agreed.

# In Washington D.C.

Linda and Mark Mitchell were both on hand at the Institute of Peace banquet to watch their daughter receive her awards.

"I met so many great kids," Anna said. "I was a little afraid they'd be all

stuck up about their achievements, but everyone was so nice, friendly, hilarious and fun to be around. I made a lot of friends.

Anna, who will be a junior this year, is considering a career in economics. She works as a page at the Plymouth District Library, where she hopes to start an economics club for kids. She also plays piano and has volunteered on political campaigns.

ing point where we wanted to start giving back. We looked into different ways to help. Everyone needs water. It shows you how blessed we are here, too. We can go to the faucet - and we have more than one get water, and these people (overseas) have to go and fetch water every

"Women and children in third world countries walk up to four miles a

jug." Healing Hands International estimates some 780 million individuals lack clean water worldwide. Communities that drink water from rivers and streams are vulnerable to disease and parasites.

"A well supports the whole community. They are not getting diseases from water. They don't have to carry water," Allen said, adding that a well frees children from the chore of lugging water a long distance.

"They are able to go to school."

Although the Walk 4 Water will start at noon, Allen said participants also may walk during the picnic, which runs to 5 p.m. Registration for the walk is free and participants will receive a Tshirt. The picnic also is





hildren who have higher levels of the chemical, Bisphenol Ahad a higher risk of obesity and adverse levels of body fat, according to a new study from University of Michigan researchers.

BPA has been used in manufacturing polycarbonate and epoxy resins used in a variety of products for children, including baby bottles, protective coatings on metal food containers, plastic toys and dental sealants.

The U-M team studied the levels of BPA found in children's urine and then measured body fat, waist circumference and cardiovascular and diabetes risk factors, in a study published in Pediatrics.

"Studies in adults had shown an association between high BPA levels and obesity,

diabetes and cardiovascular disease, but little was known about its effects in children," said Donna Eng, M.D., lead author of the study and recent graduate of the Pediatric Endocrinology Fellowship at C.S. Mott Children's Hospital.

**BPA** and obesity

The study found that higher odds of obesity — defined as a BMI above the 95th percentile on Centers for Disease Control and Prevention growth curves was associated with higher levels of urinary BPA. Researchers also found that children with higher BPA levels also were more likely to have an abnormal waist circumference-to-height ratio.

"Our study suggests a possible link between BPA exposure and childhood obesity. We therefore need more longitudinal studies to determine if there is a causal link between

BPA and excess body fat," Eng

Manufacturers have voluntarily recalled BPA products because of suspicion about the toxic effects on children and other vulnerable consumers. Many countries, including Canada and members of the European Union, as well as several U.S. states, have banned BPA use in products frequently used by infants and young children.

Last year, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration announced that baby bottles and children's drinking cups could no longer contain BPA. But it didn't restrict the use of the chemical in other products.

"We were surprised that our study did not find an association between BPA and measures of cardiovascular and diabetes risk, which has been established among adults,' said Joyce Lee, M.D., M.P.H, associate professor of pediatrics at C.S. Mott Children's Hospital and an investigator in U-M's Child Health Evaluation and Research Unit.

# Four growing healthcare careers

The healthcare industry is rapidly expanding in spite of the slump in the economy, and will continue to do so right up to the year 2020, according to U.S. Department of Labor projections. Here are five rapidly growing healthcare careers for you to consider, as well as their educational paths.

Respiratory therapists: Respiratory therapists provide medical care and attention to patients suffering from breathing difficulties and other respiratory diseases and cardiopulmonary disorders. Respiratory therapists can earn yearly salaries anywhere between \$39,990 to \$73,410, depending on location, education, and experience. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics predicts a 28 percent increase in the employment opportunities of respiratory therapists between 2010 and 2020.

Number of new jobs: 31,200

Educational path: Associate's or bachelor's degree in respiratory therapy

Medical and health services managers: Medical and health services managers, also known as healthcare administrators, plan, coordinate, and supervise the medical and health services provided by healthcare institutions. Depending on their educational qualification and work experience, they could man-

age either a unit within a healthcare institution or an entire facility. Medical and health services managers can earn salaries ranging from \$51,280 to\$84,270, depending on location, education, and experience. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics predicts a 22 percent increase in employment opportunities for medical and health services managers from 2010 to 2020.

Number of new jobs: 68,000

Educational path: Bachelor's degree in healthcare administration, health information management, or similar.

Registered nurses (RNs): RNs are responsible for looking after patients in healthcare institutions. They not only provide medical attention to these patients, but also give them emotional support and educate them about health conditions and prevention. RNs can earn salaries ranging between \$44,190 and \$95, 130, depending on their education qualifications, geographical location, size of facility they're working in, work experience, etc. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics predicts a 26 percent increase in employment opportunities for registered nurses from 2010 to 2020.

Number of new jobs: 711 900

Educational path: Associate's or bachelor's degree in nursing, followed by the National Council Licensure



Examination in order to become a registered nurse (NCLEX-RN).

Physical therapist assistants and aides: Physical therapist assistants and aides work under the supervision of physical therapists and work to help patients recovering from injuries and illnesses regain movement and effectively manage their pain. Physical therapist assistants and aides can earn yearly salaries between \$31,070 and \$68,820, depending on location, education, and experience. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, employment opportunities for physical therapist assistants and aides are expected to increase by 46 percent between 2010 and 2020.

Number of new jobs: 51,100

Educational path: Associate's degree from an accredited physical therapist program.





# Car Report **Advertising Feature** Nissan aims for pickup relevance with Titan co-branded with Cummins

The US pickup-truck market keeps coming back, so brands are looking for every which way to gain an edge. Nissan, for example, has just turned to cobranding a diesel engine with Cummins.

Both Nissan and Toyota mostly idled over the last few years in trying to improve their standing in the full-size pickup-truck market as a downturn in the segment reflected the Great Recession and the toll it took on many important vertical markets for the vehicles, especially construction and contracting. But now that housing has bounced back and pickup trucks are outselling the general vehicle market again, the Japanese brands are re-focusing on a segment that long has been dominated by the Detroit

Nissan has struck a deal with Cummins to provide a turbodiesel engine in the 2015 calendar year. It'll be a 5.0-liter V8 based on a design unique from the turbodiesel engine that Cummins long has supplied for the heavy-duty versions of Ram pickups, which is a 6.7-liter inlinesix cylinder.

"We will definitely leverage the Cummins brand name," Nissan spokesman Dan Bedore said.

But Nissan hasn't revealed details yet of exactly how it will go about this marketing exercise. One thing yet to be explained is how the co-branding will work visually. A Nissan spokesman told Automotive News that Cummins would work with Nissan on a logo for the Cumminspowered version of Titan, just as there is a Cummins logo on the heavy-duty Ram that provides a strong imprimatur for the Chrysler brand.

Cummins uses a stylish chrome capital "C" and black block letter "Turbo Diesel"in its logo that has adorned Ram heavy-duty pickups for nearly a quartercentury.

"It's our logo, not a Ram logo," Cummins spokesman Dave Groggin told the publication. "We worked with Ram on the logo and we'll work with Nissan. Clearly both automakers see value having our logo on the side of their vehicles." Silver Cummins Diesel logos are attached to the fenders of Ram truck models with the Cummins engine.

It's clear that Nissan is trying to take the most direct, least complex route to making Titan more relevant in the segment. Titan sales dropped 21 percent for the year to date through July compared with a year ago, while Nissan's overall US sales rose by nine percent.

But the nameplate hasn't been fully revamped since its introduction in 2013. And while American pickup-truck buyers aren't necessarily style mavens, they do want the latest technology and most improved fuel economy possible in these high-expense vehicles.

"Truck owners told us there's a demand for the performance and torque of a diesel in a capable truck that doesn't require the jump up to a heavy-duty commercial pickup," Fred Diaz, vice president for North American Nissan sales and marketing, said in a statement. "There is no question that the new Titan will turn heads."

Presumably one reason that Nissan took this step is the advice of Diaz. He was president of the Ram brand until recently jumping to Nissan. Diaz presided over Ram at a key time, when it was transitioning away from being part of Chrysler's Dodge marque. He also oversaw the opportunistic revamp of Ram that Chrysler decided to launch last year, and the brand's highly evocative "Farmer" ad during the last Super Bowl ran on Diaz's watch.

So if anyone understood the potential for an association with Cummins to goose prospects for the hoary Titan, it was Diaz. And apparently he was able to convince his bosses at Nissan quickly that Cummins could be key to a needed boost for Titan.

Expect Diaz's former colleagues at

Chrysler not to be happy about all of that. Nissan doesn't offer a heavy-duty version of Titan, and Ram uses its Cummins engine only with its heavy-duty versions. But there remains plenty of potential for confusion among American pickup buyers, who often eye diesel power and its ample torque as an important differentiator for their needs - regardless of whether the automaker calls its truck "heavyduty" or not.

The Ram with a Cummins diesel is rated at 850 pounds-feet of torque and can tow an industry-best 30,000 pounds. Ram spokesman Nick Cappa told the publication that buyers associate the Cummins engine with an ability to tow and haul huge loads.

"People buy heavy-duty trucks for their capability, and that's what we deliver," he

Chrysler officials declined to comment to Automotive News on Nissan's deal with Cummins or whether the name on a competitor's truck could hurt Ram's sales or dilute the brand's exclusivity. But you can bet they're concerned about it.


